St. Paul Pastor W. Siebert Accepting New Challenge

My colleagues have told me that I'm crazy to leave St. Paul's," says the Rev. Warner Siebert. "And I know that I'll never find a better congregation, with better facilities—I have nothing but good to say for St. Paul's and Chelsea in general."

Rev. Siebert, who last week informed his congregation that he intends to accept a call to participate in a new concept, as of Jan. 20, "the shared ministry" in Zion United Church of Christ in North Canton, O., seems positive that his own reasons for leaving dwarf the reasons to stay.

"The ministry is challenge and adventure—at least I look at it that way," the Rev. Siebert continues. "And this opportunity to attempt the shared ministry concept is a fresh start for me."

Zion United Church of Christ is one of the strongest churches in the area, the Rev. Siebert says, with a number of innovative programs that seem to intrigue the man always ready for a new adventure. The church boasts a 20-piece orchestra, a day care center, a Sunday school class for retarded children, and approximately 300-500 member participation in Christian education of some sort.

What is Zion's primary attraction to the Rev. Siebert, however, is the chance to move into a new form of ministry. The older form of multiple-staffed churches "where one man is 'top dog' and the rest are assistants," simply does not lend itself to the "lib movement" of the recent years, he says.

"There's a definite discrepancy involved in multiple staff ministries not only in salary and accommodations, but also in basic respect. And assistants who don't feel that they have to put up with this sort of treatment just decide to leave and get their own churches."

The shared ministry is designed to avoid, ideally, these kinds of inner problems. While

Finnish Exchange Student Enjoys Life in Chelsea

Juha Paunonen didn't come the direct route to Chelsea like most of the Youth for Understanding exchange students who spend a year in the area.

From his home in Helsinki, Finland, Juha (pronounced YOU-ha) was placed originally in an Ohio family's home, but the "understanding" touted in the title of the program apparently was a bit lacking on one or the other side. A mutual dissatisfaction brought Juha to Chelsea to become the third foreign student, and in fact third Scandinavian, to enroll in the high school this year.

"We just didn't get along very well," he says of his original life with the Ron Harris family at 175 Park St. seems much more pleasant.

"It's nice living in a small town. I like Chelsea and I like the school. I like it here," he reflects on his new residence.

The school situation here in Chelsea is quite a change from the one he attended briefly in Ohio, which was a parochial school where strict dress-up requirements were in effect. "But you know, its sort of fun to dress up sometimes. I didn't of freedom in American schools—dress regulations aren't really that important, anyway."

Other aspects of the Chelsea school situation he finds a bit annoying, however. Like Swedish exchange student Per Gellstrom, he commented on the lack of freedom in American schools—the requirement to stay in the building during lunch hour, the

ever-present need for a hall pass.

In Finnish schools, too, classes are structured in a manner more similar to this country's colleges than high schools.

"Our 'school week' actually is 10 days, and we follow a different schedule every day for 10 days. It's fun to get off at noon on some days. And it keeps us from getting bored or losing interest."

When Juha returns to Helsinki, the capital of Finland, where he lives with his parents, he will have two more years of high school ahead of him to finish his 12 years of Finnish schooling. This year in the United States, of course, counts for no credit towards his graduation program, but admittedly is good experience. "Being here helps with my English of course," he says, "and I am interested in languages."

But his real passion, he says, is music. Although he plays percussion in Chelsea's band, bass is where his actual interest lies. He speaks possibly of a career in music of some sort, but says that when he attends the university at home, he will major in "who knows what? Business, languages. . . I don't know."

His perceptions of American life bring out the whimsical amusement found in foreign observers in any country. "Americans are funny," he muses. "It's hard for me to say exactly what is funny, but you know, there are just things that are different." The American passionate enthusiasm for sports

and obsession with their cars are two examples he can pinpoint, but he is certain that there are more he is just unable to explain.

Last week-end he was provided with a further opportunity to

Donald Hafner Dies Sunday In Auto Crash

A 22-year-old Chelsea youth was killed early Sunday morning when his careening car struck two trees on McKinley St. and slid more than 400 feet before final impact. Chelsea Police say that Donald H. Hafner, 512 Chandler, apparently was traveling at a high rate of speed, heading south on McKinley St., when he failed to negotiate a curve in the street where Dewey St. intersects McKinley.

Hafner's 1971 Oldsmobile Cutlass jumped the curb on the right side of McKinley, where the right rear of the vehicle struck a small

tree, officers report. The impact set the car into a sideways slide that continued for 402 feet before finally striking another tree. The impact of this final collision caused the car to break in half. Dr. Blanchard of the Chelsea Medical Center pronounced the youth dead at the scene of the accident. He suffered extensive broken lower extremities and a crushed skull, according to police reports.

Hafner's girl friend, Brenda McGuire, said Monday that he had left her off at her home at around 2:30 a.m., after attending a movie. She thinks that he was on his way to the home of his sister, Mrs. John Norris, when the fatality occurred.

A 1970 graduate of Chelsea High school, Hafner had been employed by Harper Sales & Service until October of this year, when he went to work at Federal Screw Works.

Funeral services were conducted at St. Mary Catholic church on Wednesday, Dec. 5, at 11 a.m.

of course we are talking about energy crisis and the possibility of not being able as families to travel quite as much as we have been used to. 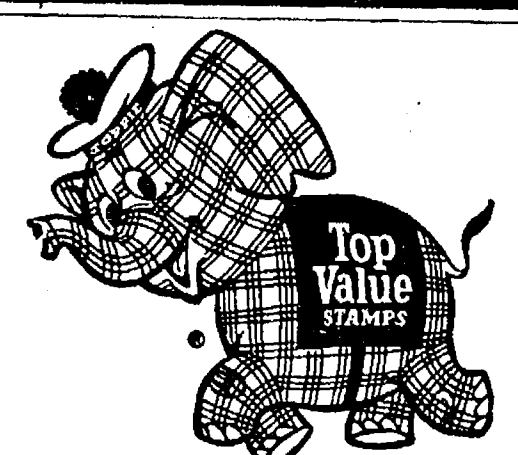

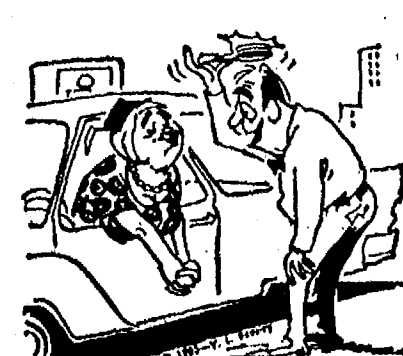

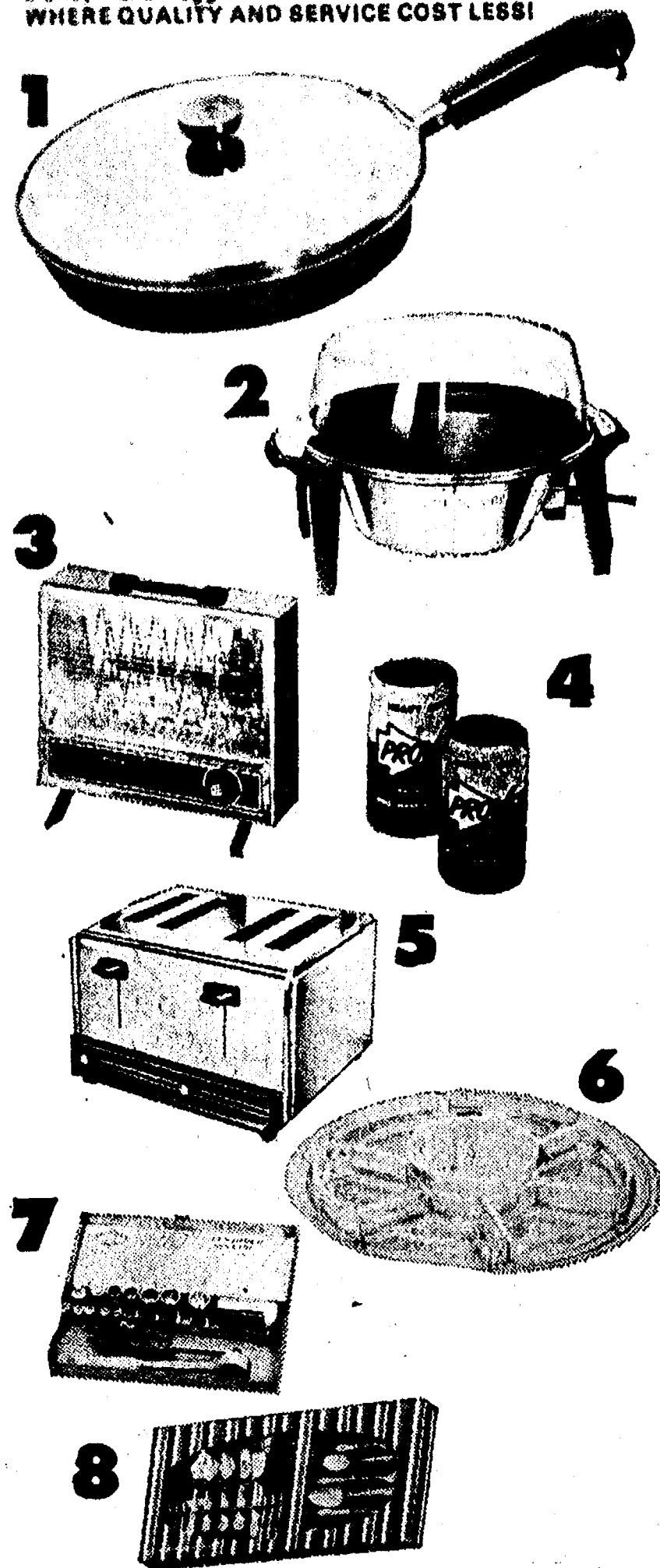

explore the American student, when he attended a Youth for Understanding conference in northern Michigan which was attended by 100 foreign students and 100 American counterparts. "The idea," he explains, "was to let us get to know each other. It was fun."

His life in Finland had already been touched by things almost as American as apple pie and comic books. "In Finland, we have all the American television shows. I used to watch 'Batman' all the time... but we also have a lot more television from other countries—movies with the words written at the bottom," is the way he explains foreign films with subtitles.

His avid interest in politics is also fueled by Finnish media. "The radio and television are state-controlled," he says, "so during the Vietnamese War every night there were pictures and maps with diagrams of exactly where Americans had bombed that day."

Politics intrudes into the

schools' governmental functioning, too, he says. In Finland he was an active member of student government, which he says is in continual contention between Communists and conservatives. The school council, too, composed of four students and four faculty members, has a greater amount of power in the administration of the school than in this country.

But his home for a year will be an interesting one, he is certain. Already he has spent some time in Ann Arbor before placement with the Harris

family and was impressed with the University facilities and the city. And Chelsea, as he said, is a good place.

Senior Citizen Tax Rebate Data Available

Sylvan Township Supervisor Maurice Hoffman reminds senior citizens that whether they own their home or rent, they stand to receive a rebate from the state this year, providing they follow rules set forth for the rebate.

The formula to figure the amount of rebate, Hoffman says, "is quite complicated, and should be made out by either a tax expert or a local attorney."

"In my opinion," he continues, "most will benefit, especially those with limited incomes. Heretofore the average credit was around \$90; it appears to me that credit with this formula will be substantially more."

Cagers Lose to Stockbridge in Final Seconds

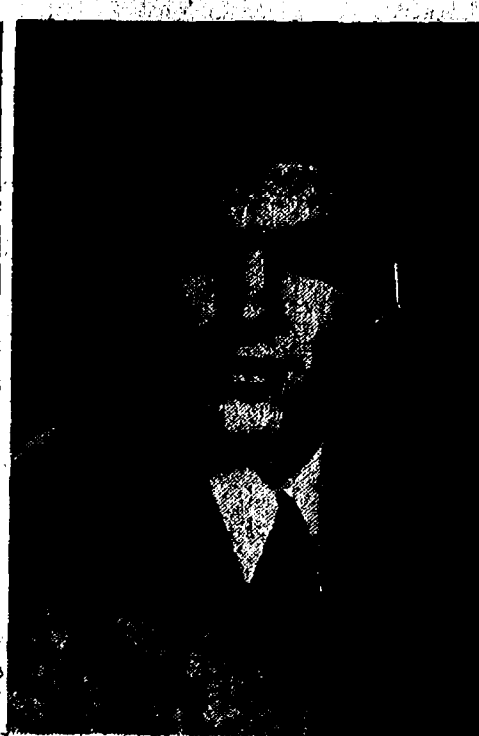
Another breathtaking thriller for Chelsea's varsity cagers ended again in defeat for the local team, 56-54, this at the hands of Stockbridge Tuesday night.

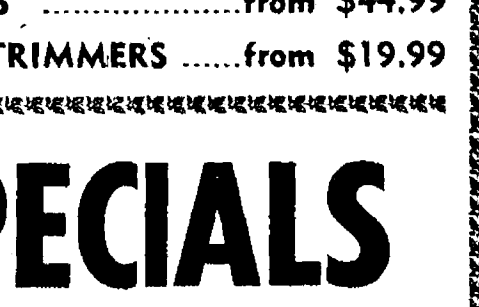

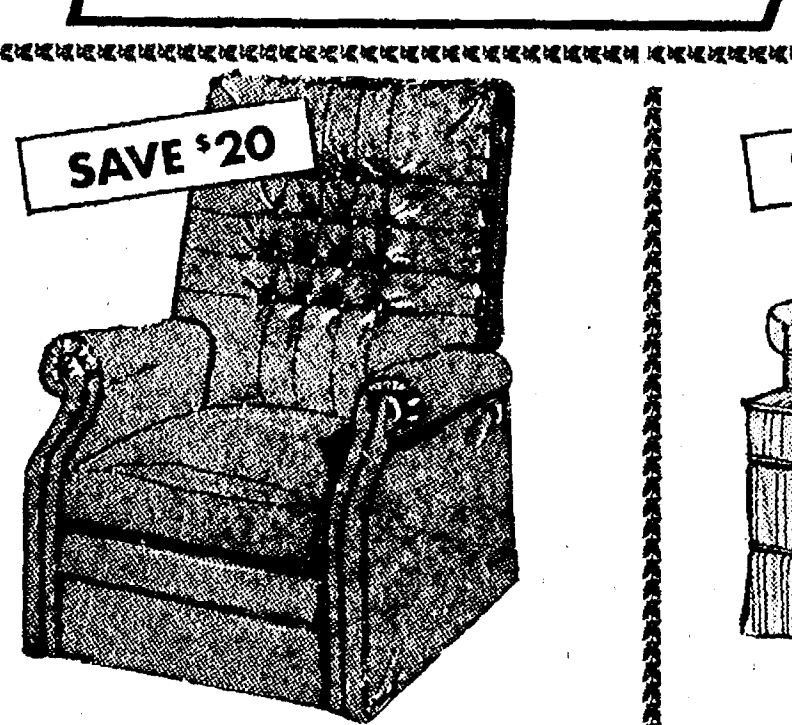

Discussion on the tax equalization question revolved primarily around an informational update. The main points on which the townships and the county and state differ mainly concern agricultural land valuation; the county and state view agricultural areas as potential subdivisions, while Lima township in particular considers the land's agricultural value.

Trailer permit procedures were reviewed.

A copy of the Township Zoning Ordinance will be sent to the Huron River Water Resources Council for review.




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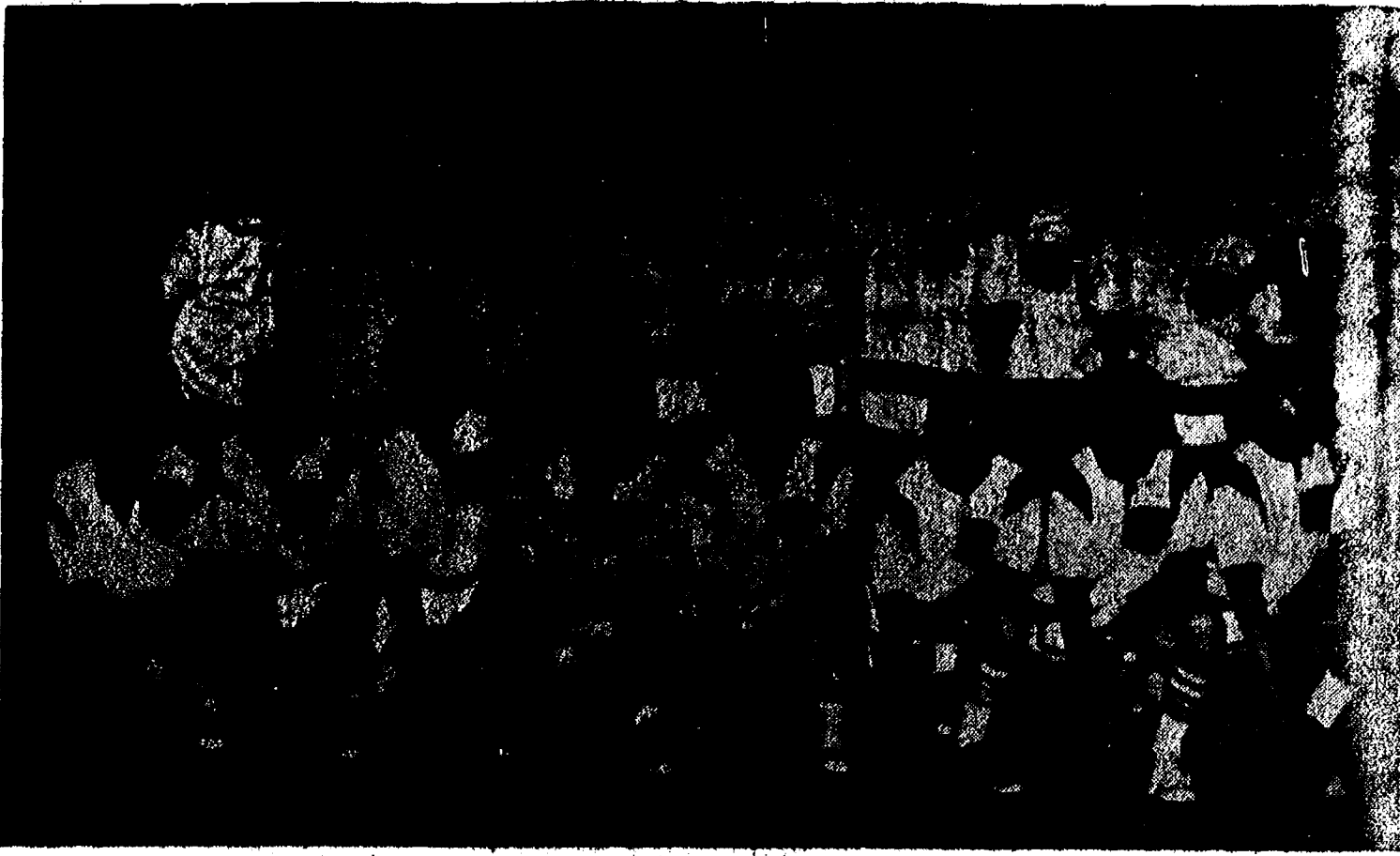
