Since no present or future emergency debt is required to be paid off, the effective tax rate will esculate sharply by the interest expense, guaranteeing that no bank will loose a penny of its precious interest or bonds by default.

Any or all of these symptoms do not necessarily mean leukemia, but should be brought to the attention of a physician. It's what you don't know about cancer that can hurt you.
