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## Law Suit Filed Against Dexter Twp. Zoning

Suit was filed on March 29 in the Circuit Court for Washtenaw county against Dexter township, the Dexter Township Board and the Dexter Township Zoning Board by Portage and Base Lakes Property Owners Association, T. Leo Castle and Bernadine Quigley, as plaintiffs. The suit asks the court to declare the Dexter Township Zoning Ordinance unconstitutional and invalid.

The complaint filed in the action alleges that the provisions of the Ordinance make 1,634 of the approximately 1,688 privately-owned platted lots in the township non-conforming, which prohibits the landowners from making reasonable and normal use of their property and which amounts to a deprivation of property without due process of law.

The complaint further states that the requirement that any landowner who wants to make a reasonable and normal improvement in his property must first apply for a variance, which amounts to a denial of equal protection under the law, which is unconstitutional.

Another ground for attack on the validity of the ordinance is that the ordinance excludes multiple residences and industry from the township, and that where such exclusion is total, it is unreasonable and a violation of the police powers.

The third ground for claiming that the ordinance is invalid is that the ordinance was made effective on March 27, 1973, but the adoption of the ordinance took place at an unpublished meeting held by the board on March 31, 1973, which is contrary to state law providing that such actions must be taken at open, public and published meetings, and that it was unlawful to give retroactive effect to the ordinance.

The principal thrust of the suit is the provision that requires a minimum of one acre per building lot, which applies to existing lots which have been platted for many years and which, in effect, gives the Township Zoning Board the power to say to the owners of those lots, "You can only build on these lots, or make improvements to the buildings which you have on these lots, if we say you can."

Plaintiffs claim that prior to filing the suit, they petitioned the Township Board to take action, on its own initiative, to remove the inequities from the ordinance in the hope of avoiding this suit, but that the Township Board has failed, neglected and refused to take any action.

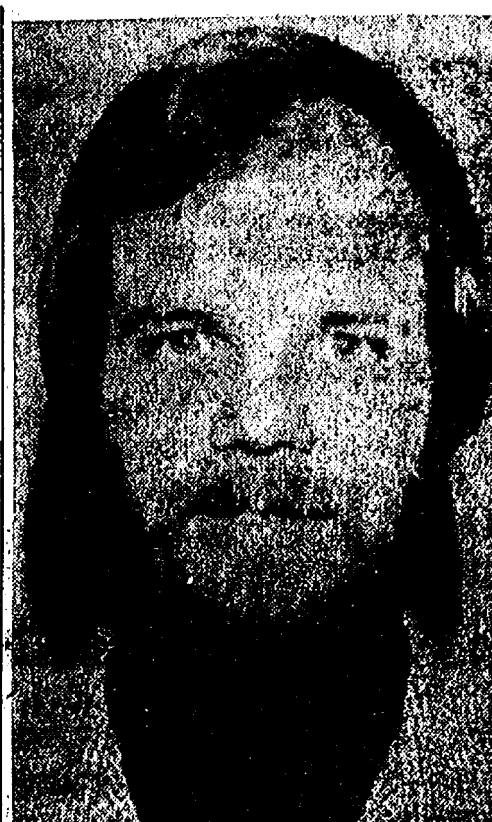

## Galbraith Appointed to Arts Advisory Council

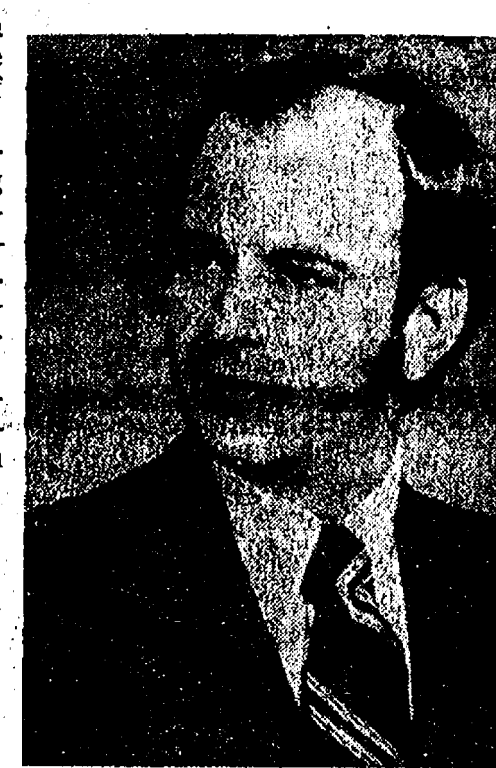
Bruce W. Galbraith of Chelsea has recently been appointed to the newly established State Board of Education's Arts Advisory Council.

Galbraith, his wife, Karen, and their three children reside at 56 Chestnut Dr.



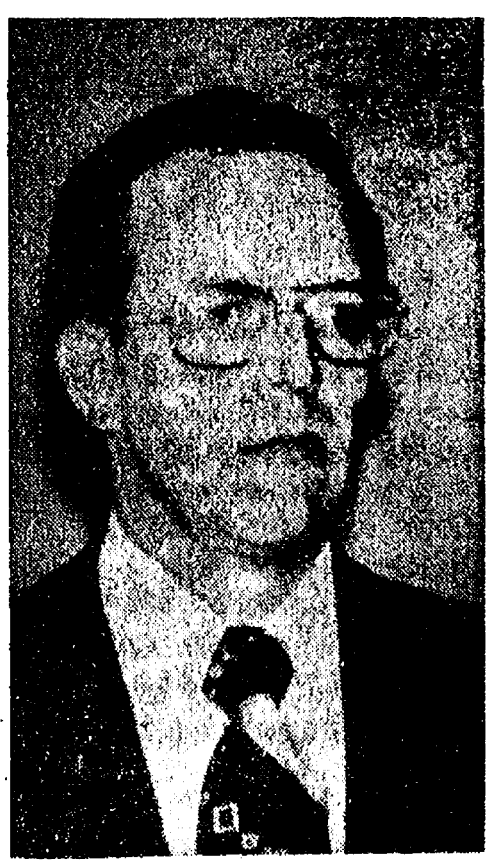

## CHS Baseball Team Promises Race for Title

Chelsea High school's varsity baseball team will open their 1976 season Saturday, April 10 with a doubleheader against Manchester on the CHS diamond.

According to this year's coach, Paul Terpstra, the team hopes to improve its over-all record of nine wins and 16 losses and a league record of five and nine posted last year.

Terpstra replaces Phil Bareis who relinquished the coaching position when he assumed the position of athletic director last fall.

The team's four seniors, eight juniors and three sophomores have spent the early weeks of spring conditioning indoors. The team has been working hard developing strong pitchers and catchers. They also have the benefit of the pitching machine which Terpstra says, "helps them find their batting eyes."

Infield practice has been an important element of the team's work-outs. Game situations such as run-downs, covering bases and stealing techniques have all been stressed by the coach.

Terpstra said this year's league favorites is Brighton, with Lincoln looming into the picture with many returning veterans. However, the Bulldogs are optimistic. "It all depends on how well our pitching develops," Terpstra said. "But the team outlook is optimistic based on our potential offensive punch."

Heading up this year's roster are four seniors. Leading off will be Randy Guenther at shortstop and the first baser Joel Sprague who achieved all-conference honors last year. Adding to the nucleus of these two men are Tim Reed, outfielder and catcher and Jim Marshall at third base. "These four seniors," Terpstra said, "are expected to provide good strong leadership for the rest of the team."

Four of the eight juniors on the '76 squad are second-year men. They include Don Nadeau, catcher and outfielder, Don Morrison, pitcher and first base, John Toon in the outfield and Anthony Houle at second base.

Vying for starting positions in their first year on the varsity team are John Adams, potential pitcher and outfielder, Scott Owings, catcher and outfielder, Dale Headrick in the outfield and Mick Check at second base.

Three sophomore players have displayed varsity qualities and will join the team in the spring lineup. They are infielders Joe Ewald and Chuck Broderick. Starting his second year on the varsity squad is sophomore Kurt Owings, pitcher and first baseman.

Pitching which may make all the difference in a winning or losing season for the Bulldogs will be placed on the shoulders of three underclassmen. Only one of the team's top pitchers is an upperclassman.

Three members of this year's varsity squad batted over .300 last season and Terpstra said he expects good things from Guenther, Sprague, Nadeau and Morrison this year. The four batted .378, .338, .307 and .300, respectively.

Despite pre-season predictions and difficulties, Terpstra said the "Bulldogs figure to be in the thick of the race."

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## Uncle Lew from Lima Says:

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

Out here in the country, the mail ain't a bit more important to us than the nose hooked to them fella's that float out in space. Our mailboxes are treasure chests, so natural we are concerned about anything having to do with whether and how we get our mail. So the state of the U. S. Postal Service natural had a high place on the agenda at the country store Saturday night.

It use to be, declared Ed Dee-little, that when a real crazy idea come up in Congress, there was somebody around to put a stop to it. Now it looks like the crazier the notion, the more determined

everybody is to carry it out. Ed was of a mind that when it comes to mail service, Congress is like the lawman that leaped in his saddle and galloped off in all directions. The lawmakers, Ed said, have lost sight of their goal so they have doubled their effort.

To make matters worse, Clem Webster allowed, the post office people ain't doing anything to help themselves. Clem said the last he heard the postmaster general had come up with the idea that the way to improve mail service was to give less service, and that daily delivery was a "luxury" the country can't afford and don't need. With this kind of April fool thinking, declared Clem, it's no wonder we pay him \$65,000 a year.

The mail is expected to spend \$1.4 billion more than it takes in this year, and 85 percent of the Postal Service's \$14.2 billion budget is going for wages. But Clem pointed out all these people are being paid to handle less mail. The volume of mail is dropping, and this is causing the \$65,000 a year men to hatch up more ideas. Like spending \$15 million to run ads to encourage folks to mail more letters. This comes on side ways, cause letters is the mail the post office people say needs the most handling and cost the most. That's where they lose money. Back when private outfits started delivering packages, the post office said they were taking the cream and leaving the mails with the high-cost work. Now they want to cut back on because it loses money.

Zeke Grubb said one plan the Postal Service come up with made sense, and that was to cut out hundreds of little post offices where services of larger offices overlap. The postal people said no post office would be closed unless equal or better service could be provided.

So what Congress does, said Zeke, is sue to make the Postal Service keep all those little post offices open. The same Congress that has give the mails until 1980 to reach breakeven operation blocks a move that would help the mails do what Congress says it must do.

Folks were appointed to run them little post offices, Zeke said, and upsetting them in a election year ain't what Congressmen call a public service. Closing post offices is like closing army bases. It's a wise economic move in somebody else's district.

## MICHIGAN MIRROR

### Overhaul Needed?

"Legal pollution"—a term used to describe the reliance on courts to resolve all social problems—"is bad for the health of our society," says Michigan's Supreme Court chief, Justice Thomas G. Kavanagh.

In a State of the Judiciary message presented earlier this month to the legislature, Kavanagh said all disputes need not be settled in court. In fact, he suggested, it could be quicker and cheaper to resolve some problems administratively—through mediation and arbitrators.

So long as adequate alternative means are provided for the citizen seeking redress, no reason appears to require the court system to be the only forum for the settling of disputes, he said.

Crowded civil dockets can cause injustices, Kavanagh said, noting that some litigants are forced to settle claims because they face a three- to four-year wait before their cases can be tried.

He pointed out that studies are being conducted on the question of removing traffic cases from the judicial system. "This and

other ways to limit the input into the court system must be explored and implemented," he said.

Kavanagh also repeated an earlier recommendation that "so-called 'victimless crimes' be decriminalized because he said 'this overbreadth (is) another example of the legal pollution that threatens our court system.'

### Bills and More Bills

How to worsen your own workload is demonstrated by Michigan legislators, and workload should not be confused with accomplishment. The main function of senators and representatives is to make new laws. There seems to be no end to the ideas people have for new laws.

By the end of this year, legislators will have dealt with, or left un-dealt with thousands of resolutions and bills, some of much importance, some of virtually no importance.

Stanley Powell, R-Ionia, made a count of these on March 15. He found that the House has an even 3,000 bills and resolutions on its records. The Senate had 2,108. This made a total of 5,108, and the number is larger by now.

Cars, trucks, boats, tractors and other gas-propelled vehicles consumed well over one billion gallons of fuel during the third quarter of 1975—up 3.4 percent from the same period in 1974.

Figures contained in a Department of Commerce quarterly energy review show that motor gasoline used on highways by cars and trucks accounted for nearly 1.1 billion gallons, or 88 percent of the total state motor gasoline consumption.

If passed, this would be the first time a set amount, 8.3 percent plus all the interest expense, could be confiscated from the citizen unquestioned under the supreme law of the state. The income, sales, and other taxes are presently under attack in the courts by patriotic citizens due to their questionable constitutional authorization.

All present interest owed and all future emergency interest expense authorized by the proposed amendment would be added on top of the 8.3 percent limitation. The interest on the national debt is well over \$100,000 and going up. The State interest is ???

Since no present or future emergency debt is required to be paid off, the effective tax rate will escalate sharply by the interest expense, guaranteeing that no bank will lose a penny of its precious interest or bonds by default. Do not sign.

## M. Davis Trial Set for April 3 In Circuit Court

Melvin Davis who was arrested here March 19 on charges of armed robbery and attempted murder was bound over to circuit court Tuesday afternoon following his arraignment in 14th District Court, Chelsea. A trial date of April 3 has been set for Davis, who will remain in Washtenaw County Jail until that time. His bond was increased to \$100,000.

Arrest of the 24-year-old man from Wayne came following a bizarre abduction which ended in Chelsea early Friday morning.

According to Chelsea police it all began when Davis abducted acquaintance Ronald Stacks in his Detroit apartment.

The pair allegedly stole beer from a party store on Michigan Ave. then headed west on the I-94 freeway. Arriving in Chelsea at the Brayton Mobil Station to get a map, Davis left his car and Stacks drove away. According to reports, Davis ran across the street to the Tower Shell Service Station and commandeered a 1975 Ford belonging to three nuns of the Gabriel Richard Convent in Riverview.

Davis then began to drive away in the sisters' car, police said, but he saw his captive, Stacks, returning south on M-52. Davis drove his car onto M-52 and rammed the rear end of Stacks' car, blowing out a rear tire. Stacks continued south over the I-94 bridge, but had to abandon his car because of the flat tire. Davis caught up with Stacks, and began striking him with his pistol, knocking him to the ground. Stacks scuffled with Davis, and was able to get up and run away, with Davis firing his pistol at him as he ran.

Davis then fled in his stolen car east on I-94, where he got off at the Fletcher Rd. exit. In his haste to get away, Davis lost control of the Ford, and it slid into a ditch. Davis then went to a farm home, and solicited a ride back to Chelsea under the pretense of catching a bus back to Detroit.

In the meantime, Sgt. Lenard McDougall of the Chelsea police answered a radio call informing him of the robbery. Sgt. McDougall went to the Shell Station and immediately requested a road block to be set up in an effort

to locate Davis, who was considered armed and dangerous.

At about 9:30 a.m., Michigan State Trooper Don Hiskins of the Jackson Post, spotted Davis entering the Wolverine Bar on Old US-12. Trooper Hiskins requested assistance on his police radio, and several officers responded, including Sgt. McDougall and Sgt. Nuel Schneider of the Washtenaw County Sheriff Department, Dexter office. In an apparent effort to escape, Davis hid his pistol in the men's washroom, and tried walking out the front door of the bar, where he was immediately arrested without a struggle by the waiting officers.

The exhibit assembled by Burton & Helaine Fendelman in conjunction with Mrs. Fendelman's recent book "Tramp Art," will provide the midwest's only opportunity to see this extensive display, talk with the author and exchange information on Tramp Art.

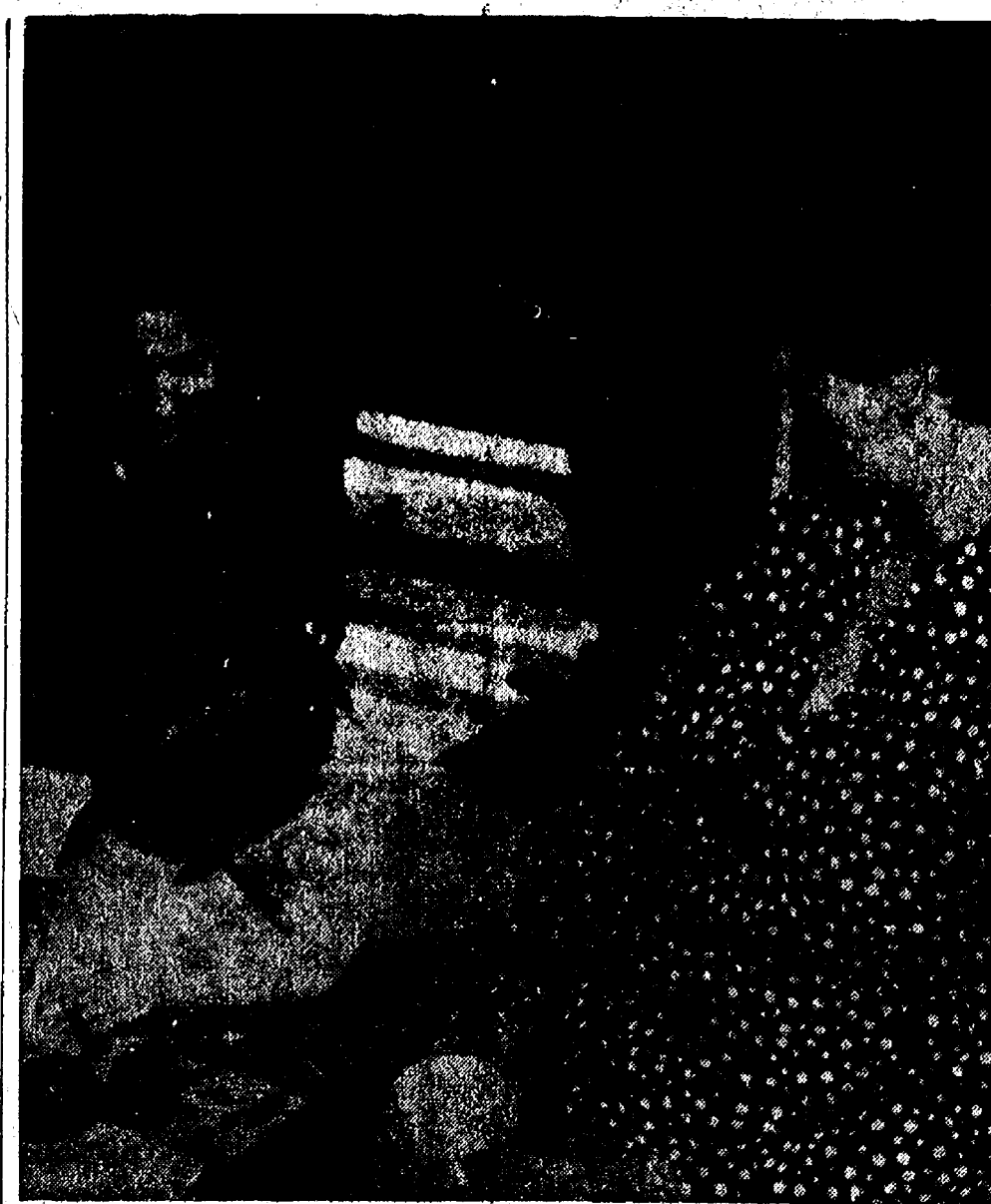
Tramp Art is the anonymous work of mostly untrained artisans who roamed the American countryside from the 1880's until the 1930's. Constructed of chip carved pieces of cigar, fruit and vegetable-box wood, which are layered one upon another. Diverse objects include chests of drawers, beds, tables, chairs, clocks, hanging comb cases, frames, and all types of boxes. Tramp Art is becoming a very popular collectors item.

## PREP Receives \$10,065 Grant for New Program

Parent Readiness Education Project (PREP), the new pre-school program in the Chelsea and Manchester public schools, has received a grant from the Michigan State Department of Education and the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The \$10,065 is channeled through the PREP program in Redford Union where this outstanding project concept originated.

The grant must be used to defray the initial costs of the program in both Chelsea and Manchester and for first-year purchases. A major expenditure is special equipment for an observation booth from which parents and a teacher will observe children in the classroom. Special one-way vision glass must be purchased, which will appear as mirrors to the children outside the booth, but allows parents sit-

ting inside the booth to see the children. A sound system to allow parents to hear the classroom activities will also be installed.

The grant will also reimburse the districts for purchases of some of the special pre-school equipment and materials needed for young children. Picture books, records, building toys, art materials, language development kits, and educational items are covered by the grant, as well as small-sized tables and chairs and classroom accessories. Special notebooks and information for parents are also being prepared.

## Leukemia Treatment Making Rapid Advances

"Slowly but surely years of good living are being added to the lives of many acute leukemia patients by the brilliant work of research scientists and dedicated physicians," declared Mrs. John Dunn and Mrs. Robert Daniels, co-chairwomen of the Chelsea Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

This is in contrast to a survival of only three months before the beginning of drug therapy as pioneered by the late Dr. Sidney Farber in 1947. Dr. Farber was a past president of the American Cancer Society. As Chelsea women begin this year's educational and fund raising Crusade, special emphasis will be placed on the progress against leukemia, a form of cancer of the blood forming system.

The American Cancer Society spent \$5 million in 1974 on leukemia research and \$5 million in 1974 on leukemia-related research.

"The important thing to remember is that the latest treatment for leukemia is available for all children at some 80 medical centers throughout the country. Combinations of drugs, sometimes along with radiation, have prolonged the lives of young leukemia patients for up to 10 years and more."

Leukemia, however, is not only a cancer of the young, it strikes adults as well. While success in treating leukemia in adults has not approached that of children, there is some prospect for improvement as cancer centers are beginning to treat the disease in adults more aggressively.

Parents should be aware of the first signs of leukemia. The child becomes listless, acts tired, shows muscle weakness, bleeds easily, and may complain of bone and joint pain. Any or all of these symptoms do not necessarily mean leukemia, but should be brought to the attention of a physician. It's what you don't know about cancer that can hurt you.

The co-chairwomen suggested that if there are any questions about leukemia or other forms of cancer and about treatment facilities, the Chelsea Chapter may be contacted through either one of them.

"Remember, we want to wipe out cancer in your lifetime, and during April volunteers will be hosting many fund-raising activities, both public and private, throughout the Chelsea community, bringing them life-saving information about cancer and raising funds to continue the society's battle against this disease."
