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Lake Property Assoc. Demands Right To Use Dexter Township Hall

One week after the Portage and Base Lake Property Owners Association filed a law suit challenging the constitutionality of the Dexter Township Zoning Ordinance, the Dexter township supervisor shut the doors of the public township hall to this taxpayer group, says Donald Gibb, secretary treasurer of the Association. The supervisor has refused to explain his action, he adds.

The Association is an active environmental interest group that has used the hall without complaint for many years for monthly public meetings, hearings before Department of Natural Resources representatives, and hearings before many other state and local officials.

Members of the Association consider the "arbitrary act of the supervisor" to be a denial of the use of public facilities for public environmental purposes and demand their right to continued access to the hall, according to Gibb.

Baseball Team Opens Season On Saturday

Co-captains Joel Sprague and Randy Guenther will lead the Chelsea High school 1976 baseball team as they begin their season this Saturday with a game on the home diamond against the Manchester Dutchmen. The Bulldogs will take the field at 10 a.m. Saturday before a group of fans looking forward to a good year.

Known as the Revelli All-Star Band, the 120-member ensemble consists of the finest musicians representing more than 50 high school bands from throughout the state of Michigan.

Selected to play in the band from Chelsea are senior Linda Jennings on the flute and junior Kim Brown on the french horn.

More than 200 students were nominated by their high school band directors for seats in this band which will be conducted by William D. Revelli, director emeritus of the University of Michigan Bands. A special committee of professors from Western's music school subsequently selected those who will have the opportunity to rehearse and perform under Revelli's baton.

The day-long schedule of events including William D. Revelli, guest composer Fisher A. Tull and Western Michigan University's music faculty is part of the eighth annual Spring Conference on Wind and Percussion Music.

The evening concert, featuring the Revelli All-Star Band, begins at 8 p.m. in Miller Auditorium on the University's Kalamazoo campus and is open to the public, free of charge.

Kindergarten Round-Up Set For April 29

Registration for all pupils in the Chelsea School District who will enter school for the first time in September 1976, is scheduled for Thursday, April 29 at South school in the cafeteria.

Both rural and town parents are asked to come from 7 to 8:30 p.m., at which time there will be a short period for comments from the school staff. Since there is nothing planned for the children, parents are requested to not bring them.

Parents who find they cannot attend this evening meeting, may register their children from 1 to 3 p.m. in the South school cafeteria on this same date, April 29.

To be eligible for kindergarten this September, children must be five years old on or before Dec. 1, 1976. Parents should bring a legal birth certificate to Round-up. Necessary health forms will be issued at this time.

Because it is essential that all children be enrolled at this time to help kindergarten planning, parents are urged to call either elementary school if unable to attend the afternoon or evening registration sessions.

Townships All Increase '76 Budgets

Area townships held their annual meetings Saturday, April 3. In each of Lima, Lyndon, Dexter and Sylvan townships, increased budgets were approved.

Dexter Township

A budget of \$128,800 was proposed at the Dexter township meeting with 15 persons in attendance. The budget is up about \$11,000 from last year, due largely to increased fire and police protection and additional election expenses.

Sylvan Township

Ten Sylvan township residents voted to raise the township tax levy from three-quarters of a mill to one mill for one year to pay for a new card filing system for assessing purposes. The new system will cost \$35,000.

The police services with the sheriff's department was increased from \$9,500 to \$13,006 for additional protection and the fire protection went up to \$21,000 from \$17,000. An additional \$3,000 will be needed for elections.

A proposed budget of \$150,588.80 was passed. It was \$111,781 this past year. The higher budget is due to \$3,000 more for fire protection, increased township operating costs and pay raises for township officials.

Salaries of township officials remained the same. The supervisor is paid \$10,000, the clerk and treasurer, \$4,000 each.

\$2,000 was allocated to the Chelsea Area Transportation System (CATS) and an increase of \$600 over last year's \$1,600 was given to the Chelsea Recreation Council.

The regular board meeting will be held on the first Tuesday of each month at the township hall beginning at 7:30 p.m., instead of 8 p.m.

The clerk's salary was boosted from \$8,000 to \$7,500. The treasurer's pay was hiked from \$6,500 to \$7,500. The base pay of the supervisor was set at \$3,000. The supervisor will receive an additional \$5,000 if he also does the assessing.

Lyndon Township

A proposed 1976-77 budget of \$67,110 was approved during Lyndon township's annual meeting Saturday. Last year's budget was \$39,000.

Lima Township

Mrs. Donald Bauer, Lima township clerk, reported that 22 residents were present for the township annual meeting during which the 1976 budget of \$89,131.73 was approved. Last year's budget was \$76,502.

The higher budget results from increased township operating costs, \$2,000 more for fire protection and \$600 to the Chelsea Recreation Council. Township officials received no pay raises.

The Parker Rd. project was tabled because of a problem with matching funds with the Washtenaw County Road Commission, Mrs. Bauer said.

Clerk Doris Fuhrmann explained that this year's budget is higher because the budget is reflecting both anticipated and actual revenues. Last year, the budget only reflected the actual revenue.

Residents also voted to give \$500 to the Chelsea Library.

Although no motion was passed, township residents agreed that one extra mill is needed to improve township roads. The township now levies 1.16 mills for operating expenses. (Continued on page six)

Girls Track Team Defending Their Title

"The track team's number one goal is to repeat as Conference Champions," remarked Chelsea High school girls track team coach, DiAnn L'Roy, as she spoke of the team's ensuing season. The Chelsea girls were the first girls track team in Southeastern Conference history to take the championship title last year.

According to Miss L'Roy, the girls look strong in the sprints, hurdles and middle distances. They are hoping, she said, to "improve our consistency in field events and to improve in the distance events."

The entire team is under the direction of a new coach this year, Paul Terpstra. Both boys said the transition has been smooth. "Coach Terpstra has an easy manner and presents the game well to his players. We work a lot on conditioning and fundamentals," Sprague said.

Susan Frisbie, one of the team's top stars last season, took second in the 300-yard dash with a time of 41.4. Teammate Kathy Treado took second in the long jump, posting a new school record with her jump of 15'8 1/2". Miss Treado came in fifth in the 50-yard hurdles with events.

Informative speakers Beth Flanagan and Sue German were second and third place winners, respectively.

Brenda Shadoan took the first-place award for her performance in Girl's Extemporaneous while Kim Brown was awarded second place in that category. A third place alternate position was awarded to Dennis Petsch for his work in Boy's Extemporaneous speaking.

Tax Cap Sought
GIVE taxpayers a handle on state government spending. Stop the constant increase in taxes.

Make the legislature set priorities for programs that drain the treasury.

Those are the goals of Taxpayers United, a group trying to fix a constitutional limit on the amount of taxes the state can levy on its citizens. The group currently is conducting a petition drive to pit its tax limitation amendment on the November ballot.

"Say there are 100 people at a meeting," explains one backer of the amendment. "If they vote that everyone at the meeting should have an apple, and there are only 50 apples in a basket on the table—there's a problem." State spending can go some what the same way. Programs are voted—then there has to be some way to pay for them.

More taxes usually are the answer. The Taxpayers United amendment would help avert such a situation by telling lawmakers exactly how much money they have to deal with—8.3 percent of the personal income of Michigan reported for the previous fiscal year, or the average of personal income of Michigan for the previous five calendar years, whichever is greater.

Don't confuse the 8.3 percent with Michigan's personal income tax rate, now pegged at 4.6 percent. That 8.3 percent limitation would include ALL taxes, the personal income tax as well as sales, property, gasoline, single business, etc.

The total of taxes for 1975, according to Taxpayers United, was 8.9 percent—the 4.6 percent income tax plus those other taxes. Just six years ago, the total was 6.2 percent.

Total state spending went up by 820 percent between 1960 and 1975, Taxpayers United reports. This compares with an increase in the collective personal income of the people of Michigan of 330 percent.

"This tax and spending limitation would, from here on out, prohibit state spending from growing any faster than personal income," says an explanatory note from Taxpayers United.

One other point: In 1960, Michigan spent \$1 million in 7 hours and 33 minutes. Last year, it took only 1 hour and 22 minutes to spend \$1 million.

In order to put the question on this fall's ballot, Taxpayers United must come up with 285,000 petition signatures by July 5.

Help for Doctors?
Help for member doctors who may be the victim of frivolous malpractice suits may be on the way from the Michigan State Medical Society.

The MSMS is working on a possible set of internal procedures to provide medical evaluation for any member who thinks he has the basis for legal counteraction in professional liability cases.

"If the House of Delegates approves the plan, MSMS will become very active in this medical-legal area by helping physicians determine medical merit and by offering legal advice," explains A. Stewart Kerr, legal counsel for the MSMS.

The House of Delegates is to consider the plan when it meets May 1 in Troy.

A Matter of Weight
Short, tall, fat, skinny, married or single—you can't be discriminated against in employment situations because of any of those things.

Gov. William Milliken recently signed the new prohibitions into Michigan's law which already bans discriminatory employment practice based on race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age or ancestry.



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PREP Awarded \$800 To Fund Program

The Parent Readiness Education Project (PREP) the new pre-school program in the Manchester and Chelsea Public Schools, has been awarded \$800 by Project INFORM.

Project INFORM, based in Westland, is the "Facilitator" project for the State of Michigan. INFORM's task is to help school districts in adopting successful programs developed by other school districts. In this case, the PREP concept originated in the Redford Union School District near Detroit, and is being adopted for use by the Chelsea and Manchester schools.

David Frankel, staff development specialist for Project INFORM, hosted luncheons at Klager school on March 9 and Chelsea North school on March 11 for the PREP staff and other staff members who participated in the

screening of local 3½ to 5-year-old children. Frankel has consulted with the PREP teachers, Mrs. Linda Hiatt and Mrs. Linda Buch about construction, materials, and procedures necessary for starting the program.

Dr. Virginia Reznierski, Director of Special Education, said that the \$800 grant from Project INFORM will be used to establish a parent lending library and to equip traveling suitcases of pre-school materials which will be signed out to parents and circulated in conjunction with the program.

In addition, INFORM will sponsor several meetings at which the PREP staff will explain the program to the community and to other school personnel in the county who may be interested in initiating PREP in their districts.



Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure
SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and requesting in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer, legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote
SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

Transfer of Registration, Application, Time
SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made after the Fifth Friday preceding any election or primary election (unless such Fifth Friday shall fall on a legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day.)

Transfer of Registration on Election Day
SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for the primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall then transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

PROCLAMATION LIBERTY BELLES

WHEREAS, the good men of the Chelsea Community have so nobly sprouted bushy hairy outgrowths in commemoration of the Chelsea Bicentennial which will take place from Aug. 13, through Aug. 28, and

WHEREAS, the feminine citizenry of this area has been permitted to enjoy absolute freedom,

THEREFORE, as President of the Village of Chelsea, I do hereby proclaim that in memory of their pioneer great-grandmothers of yore, any and all members of the female sex working or residing in our community and a goodly proportion of those in the rural area are requested that from this date until they join the Liberty Belles Organization they shall refrain from appearing in public or on the highways of our community while wearing lipstick, rouge, eyeshadow, foundation cream, powder, mascara, nail polish (both metatarsal and metacarpal extremities), tinted or bleached hairy halos, perfume or jewelry, either singly or in matched combinations, without first joining the newly formed organization known as the Liberty Belles, and obtaining the Official Liberty Belle button. 



Former St. Clair Shores Resident Dies Here March 31


Mrs. Harry (Margaret) Hallett of the Chelsea United Methodist Home died March 31 at the Home. She was 88 years of age.





Father, Son Banquet Set For Saturday

"Guidelines and Goals for Fathers and Sons" will be the topic of discussion at the Father-Son banquet sponsored by the First United Methodist church of Waterloo to be held Saturday, April 10 in the Waterloo Town Hall at 6 p.m.

Speaking to the fathers and their sons will be Ernest L. V. Shelley, PhD, professor and chairman of the Department of Psychology at Olivet College and chief psychologist for the Ingham County Probate Court. Much of Shelley's work has been along the lines of counseling youth and adults in penal institutions. He joined the Michigan Department of Corrections in 1955 as a research psychologist, youth division retiring in 1968 as supervisor of treatment. Prior to that he was with the Michigan Boy's Training School as chief psychologist.

Shelley has had experience in the classroom teaching grades seven through graduate work in the University and has served as a high school principal, psychologist and school superintendent at different times in his career.

In 1937 he was on the survey team of American Correctional system for Governor Rockefeller's Crime Commission. In 1970 he was part of the United States Delegation to the World Council of Consultation on the Church and Penal Reform in Geneva, Switzerland.

He has been published in 68 professional and church periodicals and has written a number of books on counseling, the courts and offenders of the law.

He is a member of the Peoples Church of East Lansing and past president of the Lansing Council of Churches. He is a former member of the State and National YMCA Youth Committee and currently a member of the Michigan Council on Crime and Delinquency and the National Council of that same organization. In 1971 he was listed with Outstanding American Educators.

All area fathers and their sons are invited to attend the banquet prepared by the women of the First United Methodist church. There will be no admission charge, however, a "free will offering" may be made.

Mike Kozminski is Family Leader of Tomorrow

When Chelsea High school senior Mike Kozminski learned he had been named the local 1976 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow, his first reaction was "Well, that's great, but I don't exactly fit the stereotype."

Mike won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors here and throughout the country Dec. 2. "I just took a test and answered logical questions that had nothing to do with baking cakes," he commented. He said that most of the questions concerned balancing a budget, etc. "If you took some time to think about them, the questions were not difficult. And they were not female oriented," he continued.

Mike, who has never taken a home economics class of any kind, said that he entered the Family Leader contest because of a college scholarship it might earn him. He plans to attend Albion College in the fall and to major in pre-medical studies. "With the cost of college these days, the extra dollars will always help."

Currently Mike is employed at the Chelsea Community Hospital where much of his earnings are put toward his college education. This summer he hopes to work in the emergency ward or inhalation therapy... anything that would give him some direct medical experience. In preparation for this, he is enrolled in an evening and week-end course at Washtenaw Community College entitled

"Emergency Medical Technician." The two semester, eight credit course is designed to train the layman in advanced emergency work that extends far beyond the basic Red Cross type of course. At Chelsea High school he is treasurer of the Student Council, a member of the Key Club and a member of the National Honor Society.

Mike will receive a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living and becomes eligible for state and national honors. From the ranks of all school winners in the state, a State Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with their faculty advisors, will gather in Washington, D.C., in April for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city. During the tour, personal observations and interviews are conducted to select the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship.

Robbins Family Attends National Wildlife Meet

The Dan Robbins family of Grass Lake were among the representatives from MUCC attending the National Wildlife Federation annual meeting in Louisville, Ky., last week-end. More than 1,000 persons participated, including delegates from all 50 states, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

"A Conservation Odyssey—from the Bicentennial to the Year 2000" was the theme of the annual meeting's special day-long session Saturday, designed to provide scientific and authoritative viewpoints for those concerned about the future of our wildlife and natural resources. Highlights included the keynote address by T. S. Kleppe, Secretary of Interior, "Today's National Wildlife—the Current Issues." Sir P.M. Scott, C.B.E., D.S.C., honorary director, Wildlife Trust and chairman, World Wildlife Fund International, showed his slides and pictures of the Loch Ness monster during his presentation "The Future for International Wildlife." Walter Huddleston, Senator from Kentucky closed the "historic" session with "American Agriculture—Setting the Example."

Among those receiving special awards at the banquet was John W. Harms, vice-president and director of marketing for the Detroit News, who received for the paper the Conservation Communication Award. The Outdoors Page of the Detroit News, established Nov. 25, 1923, is the oldest in the nation. Among the issues supported by the News in more than half a century of fighting for conservation causes are: the establishment of Isle Royale National Park; elimination of bounties; contributions for endangered wildlife; and preservation of non-political resource management in Michigan.

National Wildlife Week is a yearly reminder of the need to become actively involved with improving

our environment. It is observed during the week that includes the first day of spring. In 1976 the theme, "Save Our Wetlands," focused attention on the need to help wildlife by working to protect and improve wetland habitat.

Dan Robbins' family will be showing in area civic groups and school classes the NWF filmstrip on Endangered Species and passing out more literature as they did at the Outdoorama Sport and Camper Show held at the Detroit Armory March 6-14. More than 300,000 persons attended this show sponsored by the Michigan United Conservation Clubs of which Robbins is the current president. The first local showing will be Friday afternoon, March 26 at Cedar Knoll Rest Home.

Other Chelsea persons also participated in the MUCC Outdoorama show. Todd Halner wrestled Victor, the 600-pound bear, and enjoys telling about it. Chelsea High School teacher, Craig Deimlow, attended and received the special teacher packet prepared by MUCC for presenting conservation and ecology in the classroom. Ninth graders Robert Ostrander and Mike Robbins helped each other sell 250 new subscriptions to Michigan Out-of-Doors, the newspaper published by MRCC. Six-year-old Scott Robbins passed out 1,000 free Save Our Wetlands posters and stickers to children to show their teachers and classmates and let them know that their local sportsman's club can get them good movies about animals and conservation and ecology material in general. Mr. and Mrs. Don Wiltzie enjoyed the show, too, and especially appreciated the fact that there was a booth devoted exclusively to scuba diving. The Bruce Kincaid family also attended.
