★ Bad Advice

The vegetable oil industry spokesmen have had a field day over the past few years in their efforts to lure consumers away from animal fats and into the vegetable oil fold. Their excuse is that the polyunsaturated oil diet will prevent the buildup of cholesterol, and thereby, prevent heart attacks. thereby prevent heart, attacks.

A career investigator of heart disease and nutrition at Vanderbill University says the hypothesis that saturated (animal) fats and cholesterol cause coronary heart disease has been repeatedly tested and found wrong. Dr. George Mann, speaking at the recent annual meeting of the National Live-stock and Meat Board, said, "The American Heart Association, the American Medical Association and other official agencies which endorse that hypothesis as fact have given the public bad advice."

Mann said that a polyunsaturated (vegetable) oil diet recommended as a means of preventing heart disease "doubles the rate of gall bladder disease and it may increase the frequency of cancer

and thrombophlebetis."


Mann attacked the advertisements pared with hydrogenated vegetable oils. He said, "The sales pitch is based on the promise that eating these products and avoiding animal fats will prevent coronary heart diseases. The fact is that the hypothesis on which this copy and advice is based, that saturated fats and cholesterol cause heart diséase, a proposal raised in 1950 on shaky evidence, has been re-peatedly tested and found wrong."

Dr. Mann is no crackpot scien-tist. He is highly respected in his field, and has traveled the world over in his research with much emphasis on tribes in Africa who are on high animal fat diets, but do not have heart disease.

He pulls no punches in his speeches. He said he expects no relief from the medical profession in telling this story, and he also expects no help from the media. "They are a part of the problem

because there are advantages in sensationalism," he said. It would seem that Dr. Mann's research should be a sensational story for producers of milk, meat and eggs and those who enjoy eating them.



#### Woolworth Discouraged

Profits from nickels and dimes proved initially disappointing to Frank Woolworth who established his first "five-and-ten" on Feb. 22, 1879, in Utica, N. Y. A few weeks after its opening, the store was taking in only about \$2.50 a day. Four months later, Woolworth Four months later, Woolworth moved the store to Lancaster, Pa., where it proved a success. Woolworth's five-and-ten was in many ways a later development of an alteady established institution—the general store, that place where Americans went to swap goods and stories. One such general store, built in Waterford, Mich., in 1854, stands today on the green at Greenfield Village in Dearborn. Its shelves contain everything from the candle molds and coffee mills to the dry goods and doll heads that attracted the attention of our ancestors.
