
Easter Egg Hunt Set For April 9

New Chemical Alarm Some state officials say that potent poisons found in a common wood preservative could ultimately mean a broader and more costly tragedy for agriculture than did Michigan's PBB crisis. Eight Michigan dairy herds have been quarantined already on the suspicion that their milk or meat may contain detectable amounts of highly toxic dioxins that occur as a contaminant in the wood preservative pentachlorophenol, or penta. Dioxins already have been found in animal livers from one of those herds, but tests are continuing on the others, particularly their milk.

4 Years Ago...

Thursday, April 5, 1973— With dour expressions, village grocers, all with the exception of Luther Kusterer, admitted this week that the April 1 meat boycott is no joke. Kusterer was ignoring the whole thing. Chelsea consumers joined a nation-wide boycott to protest rising meat costs. Terrific Tailors, a Freez Acres 4-H group, rated blue ribbons for each entry from their group at last week-end's 4-H Spring Achievement Show at Dexter High school. Nine local girls are members of the group. Only two people, the zoning inspector and a constable, attended the Sylvan township annual meeting last Saturday in addition to the township board. Township clerk Dan Murphy said he read the meager turnout as a sign of confidence. At the meeting, township taxes were cut by 50 percent. Chelsea High's track team opened its 1973 track season March 30 by participating in the Huron Relays at Bowen Field House in Ypsilanti. In the meet, Bruce Guster placed 7th in the long jump with a leap of 20' 1/4".

24 Years Ago...

Thursday, April 2, 1953— Chelsea's biennial election will be held April 6 to select new township officers and state education agricultural, judicial and highway officials. In Sylvan township, only the Republican Party has named a slate of candidates, led by Elba H. Gage, supervisor, Robert Foster, clerk, and Florence O'Hara, treasurer. George Doe, Chelsea police chief, has been named Civilian Defense director for Chelsea, effective April 1. His appointment was announced by Anton Nielsen, village president. John W. Griffin, Chelsea High school principal, has been advised that the local school has received accreditation by the University of Michigan for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1953. A new business, Wayne Heat Treating Co., will begin operations here this week in the quonset-type building at the rear of Production Marching Co. on N. Main St. Wayne G. Gow, formerly of Brighton and now a resident of the Winans Lake area, is owner and operator of the new business.

14 Years Ago...

Thursday, April 4, 1963— Michigan's new Constitution was approved Monday by a majority of about 12,000 votes. Total number of "yes" votes was approximately 800,000. All but one local township approved the Constitution. The dissenting township was Lyndon, where 157 voted "no" and only 98 voted "yes." Thursday, April 1, 1943— Application blanks for the qualifying tests on Friday, April 2, for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Training Program are now available at the Chelsea High school, principal Marshall Richards announced this week. Effective April 1, farmers will be required to obtain government permits to sell meat from livestock they butcher at home, and livestock dealers will have to obtain permits to buy and sell livestock by order of Claude R. Wickard, Secretary of Agriculture. At a special meeting of the Village Council Monday night, it was voted to place the supervision and management of the sewage disposal plant with the Chelsea Electric and Water Department.



ship would receive very large tax increases in the next few years. Mr. Musolf has also seen this writing on the wall since he took over as supervisor. I was trying to start an education program concerning the Farmland and Open-space Preservation Act. When the large tax increases came along, Lima township would then be ready to give some relief to the landowners," Fusilier explained.

He concluded, "I have wasted my time and effort trying to solve this problem because taxes are still relatively low in Lima township. Taxes should almost double in the next two to three years. It is unfortunate that Lima township won't be as ready as it could have been."

Along with his resignation as township trustee, Fusilier resigned from several other councils and commissions related to his work interests as trustee. These positions included Lima township delegate to SEMCOG; Washtenaw county township's delegate, Executive Committee, SEMCOG; and alternate to the Regional Clearinghouse Review Committee, all appointments which were dependent on his position as an elected township official.

To avoid other potential conflicts stemming from his resignation, he further resigned as Lima township delegate to the Huron River Watershed Council; as executive committee member of the Mill Creek Research Council; and as Lima township delegate to the Chelsea Area Regional Planning Commission.

Fusilier was again joined by Donald Bauer who resigned from two appointed positions in Lima township, as vice-chairman of the Lima Township Planning Commission and as acting chairman of the Lima Township Board of Zoning Appeals.

Bauer's brief statement said, "After having served on various committees in Lima township for over 11 years, and with a zoning Ordinance becoming effective soon, and in view of the recent questions raised concerning possible invalid decisions that have been made, I feel that it is time to step down and let someone else fill these positions."

"I have enjoyed working with the people of Lima township over the years. I will support their efforts to improve our community in the future," he added.

In her statement of resignation, Mrs. Bauer confirmed some of Fusilier's implications. She wrote, "It concerns me that for the past several months we have not been able to constructively work for the residents of Lima township as we have in the past. I sincerely hope the residents of Lima township will help find the answers to all the unfinished problems facing our township."

Mrs. Bauer also extended her thanks to residents of Lima township for allowing her the chance to serve them as township clerk in past years, and thanked her husband and family for their help and sacrifice of time, which she needed to spend on township matters.

While public reaction, stirred by this series of resignations in Lima township, may once again split the seemingly pastoral community into strongly opposed camps of opinion, one thing is certain. Township operations will suffer the brunt of the blow as the new skeletal Township Board attempts to conduct business as usual.

They are faced with two alternatives, according to County Clerk Robert Harrison. They may either schedule a new township election immediately to fill the now vacant posts, or appoint temporary replacements until the next scheduled election is to be held. It is likely they will choose the latter alternative.

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Motorcycle Chase Results in Arrest

A mile-long motorcycle chase over residential streets in Chelsea ended early Sunday evening when local police arrested a 19-year-old Chelsea youth, Donald W. White, on charges of fleeing a police officer. No injuries were reported in the incident.

According to police records, the high-speed odyssey began when Patrolman John Dettling observed a motorcyclist riding without a helmet on Pierce St. while on routine patrol. Upon seeing the officer, the suspect accelerated and turned north on Taylor St.

Officer Dettling turned on his patrol vehicle's top light, headlight flasher and siren, then notified the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department of his pursuit.

What followed was a chase from Maywood and Pierce Sts., down Taylor, Lincoln, Grant and Pierce Sts., to Pierce and Lincoln Sts., where White was finally apprehended. The pursuing officer remained behind White's motorcycle at a distance of about 200 ft. throughout the chase, police reports stated.

While fleeing on his motorcycle, the suspect allegedly failed to stop at a stop sign at Taylor and Lincoln Sts., raced at speeds in excess of 60 m.p.h. while westbound on Lincoln St., and at one point traveled between a house and garage in a further attempt to elude his pursuing officer.

The chase was consummated when Jack Dettling, an off-duty Sheriff's deputy, stepped into the path of the fleeing motorcycle in an attempt to waive it to a stop. White skidded his vehicle at the end of Pierce St. to avoid hitting the deputy, and the motorcycle stalled.

As Officer Dettling closed the distance between his patrol car and the motorcycle, he saw that the suspect was dismounting from the stopped motorcycle. The officer applied the brakes of his vehicle which locked due to wet pavement and loose gravel on the roadway, forcing the patrol car into a skid. The car came to rest after impacting the dismounted cycle. The impact moved the motorcycle backwards, pushing its rider to the ground.

Officer Dettling then advised White he was under arrest, and took him to Chelsea Community Hospital for examination. White refused treatment and was taken to police headquarters for questioning. From there, he was released to appear in court.

Damages resulting to property in the chase was limited to an indentation on the crankcase of the motorcycle which occurred when it was hit by the patrol car.

Athletic Booster Club Licensed for Bingo Games

At the School Board meeting on Feb. 21, the Athletic Booster Club requested and was given approval to hold a bingo party each Monday evening in the high school cafeteria. Roger Schrotenboer explained to the board that the Booster Club would be licensed through the State Lottery Commission and all games would be operated in accordance with state laws and regulations.

In return for the use of the cafeteria the Booster Club will pay the school system \$50 per night. The club will also be responsible for setting up the tables and chairs and sweeping up after bingo is concluded.

On March 23 the Booster Club did receive their license from the Lottery Commission and have a target date set of April 18 to begin the games. Alcoholism Seminar Is Well Received

A seminar on alcoholism, sponsored by the Social Concerns Committee of First United Methodist church last Sunday, was well received by the numerous area residents in attendance.

"Those who were there came away with some very valuable information and insight into the problem of alcoholism," sponsors of the seminar reported.

Four panel members, two of whom were alcoholics and two who were married to alcoholics, shared their experiences with their audience and answered questions relating to alcohol abuse.

The overriding concern of panel members was to point out that even though the alcoholic may not admit it, he does need help. "If people don't get help, we bury them. We bury the alcoholics," one panel member said.

The panel continued to explain that alcoholics generally either commit suicide, die from declining health, or are involved in traffic accidents. Panel members concluded that the main way to help an alcoholic is to encourage the alcoholic to "own" his problem rather than make excuses for him, deny there is a problem, or cover up for him when he is drunk.

Alcoholics and their families were urged to contact Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) which helps alcoholics to deal with their problems. The organization helps family members, whether or not the alcoholic attends AA, through Alateen or Alanon.

The Washtenaw Council on Alcoholism at 2301 Platt Rd., Ann Arbor, has additional information on these groups. The council may be reached by calling 971-7900.

Ask Project COPE

Question: I just found out that my first grade boy needs speech therapy. I feel angry about this, because I tried to get help for him three years ago. He didn't begin to talk until he was two, and people had a terrible time understanding him. My doctor, family, and friends all told me that he was a "late bloomer", that I shouldn't worry, and that he would out-grow the problem. Where can parents of young children get help? When should parents worry about speech problems in pre-schoolers?

Answer: Whenever a parent has a concern about his child's growth and development, he can call the

Director of Special Education, Dr. Henry DeYoung, at 475-9131, ext. 48. He will help answer questions and can direct you to an appropriate staff person for further help. Public schools legally must serve pre-schoolers who have special needs and must provide both diagnostic and treatment programs for those who are eligible.

In the area of speech and language problems, a speech therapist should be consulted when any one of the following conditions exist in a child:

1. A child is not talking at all by 2.
2. Most of his speech cannot be understood by 3.
3. He is omitting the first sounds of many words after 3; for example: ud for mud.
4. He is not using two-to-three word sentences by 3.
5. He uses mostly vowel sounds (a, e, i, o, u) when he talks.
6. The endings of words are usually missing after 5.
7. He has trouble speaking in sentences at 5.
8. He is embarrassed or disturbed by his speech at any age.
9. He is noticeably non-fluent (repeating or stretching out sounds, syllable, words, or phrases, or using a lot of um's and ah's) after 6.
10. He is making many errors with sounds after 7.
11. His voice is monotone, too loud, too soft, or of a poor quality that may indicate a hearing loss.
12. His voice sounds too high or low for his age and sex.
13. He sounds as if he were talking through his nose or as if he had a cold.







The Rev. Carl Schwarm of Chelsea's First Congregational church will address the congregation during the first portion of the service, while the Rev. James Stacey of Chelsea Baptist church will speak during the latter portion. Pastor Schwarm's topic will be "Because of Calvary," and Pastor Stacey will discuss "A New and Living Way."

Special music for the service will feature Norman O'Connor of St. Paul United Church of Christ, and a quartet from the local First United Methodist church. The Rev. Marvin McCallum of First United Methodist church, and the Rev. Ira Wood of the Chelsea United Methodist Retirement Home, will also participate in the traditional event.

The Community Good Friday Service has been planned with support from the Chelsea Ministerial Fellowship.

Youngsters Report Alleged Abduction

Perhaps in reaction to the well-publicized, tragic kidnap-murders of at least four children in the Oakland county area, three Chelsea elementary school children reported an alleged abduction attempt to North school officials last Thursday, March 24.

According to Chelsea police reports, the children were returning to North school after completing safety patrol duties when one of the children claimed a car carrying two women and a man stopped nearby.

The child said one of the women got out of the car, shook him, and her male companion asked him to get into the car and show the occupants of the vehicle where Chelsea Community Hospital was located. The youngster maintained he refused and returned to school with his friends where they reported the incident.

Upon investigation, police officers located the two women suspects at Chelsea Community Hospital where they were visiting a friend. The suspects acknowledged stopping their car to ask directions to the hospital, but vehemently denied asking any of the youngsters to get into the car.

One of the women explained she had left the stopped car and had shaken one of the children, but that was because he had thrown a snowball at the car and she felt a child on safety patrol should not be acting in such a manner.

The woman also said she jokingly asked one youngster to run ahead of the car to point out the hospital entrance, and told him the car would follow behind.

Officers left the suspects and went to North school where they again talked to the three children involved in the incident. One child admitted to throwing a snowball, and of the three, two denied hearing any of the vehicle's occupants say "get into the car." However, they did state they overheard one of the women ask them to run ahead of the car to the hospital entrance.

Police are holding the case open pending action from the parents of the juvenile complainant involved. Though they believe a misunderstanding is at the root of the alleged offense, assault and battery charges have been lodged against the one woman for shaking the youngster who threw the snowball.

Purple Martin Scouts Arrive

In addition to a few days of balmy weather, nature came through with yet another sign that spring is here this week. Mrs. John Dvorak of 16893 Waterloo Rd., reported Wednesday that purple martin scouts were feeding in her yard.

"It's time for people to get their birdhouses cleaned up," Mrs. Dvorak said. "Usually the rest of the purple martin flock appears three days after the scouts." "The purple martins are here early this year," she added. "We have been keeping track of their arrival for the past seven or eight years, and this is the earliest we've ever seen them come."

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

lieve that some units are assessing according to the directives in the State Tax Commission and some according to the directives of the County Board of Commissioners and since these directives are in conflict, it appears, I'm requesting: 1) a written opinion from the Corporation Counsel regarding the legality of the County Board of Commissioners action or; 2) if this is not forthcoming, I request clarification by the Attorney General's Office or; 3) if that is not possible, I request permission of the Board to hire a private attorney for an opinion to present to the Board." Comm. Minick supported the motion. Comm. O'Connor stated this is just a request and not a resolution.

Corporation Counsel, Robert Guenzel spoke to the Board: "I suggested that before we put anything in writing that George Kostishak and I talk to maybe the Ways & Means Committee about this. It's a potential thing that could be in litigation and to commit something in writing now by me, Attorney General or another attorney might be inappropriate until you hear from George and from me about it. 

To the Editor:

Re: The letter of March 24, 77 from Brian Knickerbocker.

Brian wrote to protest the ticketing of students who park on streets adjacent to the high school. He asks, "What gives 'Chandler' the right to ticket people? . . . Are we going to stand for the few people in this administration and especially on the School Board to play God with our lives? . . . Since when did the school become the police?"

In answer to this, a school rule states that, "All cars driven by students must be parked in the parking lot on the east side of the school." The students at Chelsea High school are aware of this rule. Parking lot rules have been distributed and have been announced many times. This gives Mr. Chandler the right to ticket student violators. Another rule states that, "Anyone ticketed is suspended from school until the fine is paid and a sticker is purchased, if one has not been previously purchased." This gives Assistant Principal Shave the right to suspend Brian for refusing to pay the fine.

These school rules are justified. Uncontrolled student parking creates problems. When students park on streets adjacent to the school, they become a general nuisance to the people who live on these streets. Some conduct dope dealing and pot smoking here. There are signs along these streets specifying "Two-Hour Parking" and "No Parking", that are being violated. Facilities for student parking are provided. Many high schools have rules of this kind and Chelsea's are not excessive. If Brian doesn't agree with the rules, he should discuss the matter with the School Board, and not the police.

The school has a right to enforce its rules. The school is held accountable for student actions. More than 900 students attend Chelsea High school, and with such a large number of students in attendance the Administration and School Board must be able to enforce the rules, to keep things under control.

Brian's attacks are weak. The convenience of parking on these streets is not a factor. There is no problem getting in and out of the high school parking lot, even right after school, when the largest number of cars are leaving. Furthermore, it would be more advantageous for Brian to park in the school parking lot because he would be closer to his morning classes and wouldn't have to walk so far.

The school does work to maintain an adequate parking facility, even though they are not responsible for the broken glass, as Brian seems to imply. The school didn't leave it there. It was put there by a few irresponsible students who have yet to realize that they're causing problems for the students who do follow the rules, and park in the parking lot. The parking lot is swept several times a year. The money in the parking lot fund also goes to pay for the parking lot stickers and the paint for the parking lot. Some money from the fund may also be used, by the Student Council, to finance the purchase of bicycle racks for the school.

Brian says of the violators of the parking lot rules, "We're only human. We're just like everyone else." I hope people realize that the vast majority of students at Chelsea High school are not as rude and disrespectful as Brian's letter implied, but are conscientious and upright young adults.



★ *After All . . .*

The United States Department of Agriculture's 1976 Young Executives Committee, made up of 20 middle-level bureaucrats appointed annually to study department operations while continuing with their regular jobs, says USDA should bring consumers into a policy-making partnership.

Although farmers and agribusiness firms have been the department's primary concern in the past, such programs as food stamps have come to dominate its budget and deserve more consideration, the committee said.

News reports credit the new Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, with saying he intends to bring "consumer voices into the highest policymaking circles" to help shape a joint food-farm policy.

The committee even suggested a change in name to reflect this consumer concern — something like "department of food and agriculture" or "department of food, agriculture and resources." It further suggested that failure to expand its approach to consumer interests could result in "a reduction in the department's role and influence in broad policy formulation, and perhaps its eventual demise."

Maybe so. But a good many experienced and concerned farmers and ranchers will view the committee's recommendations with suspicion. They will resent any downgrading of the importance and consideration of farm, ranch and agribusiness interests in the department's activities.

Many will feel, also, and feel strongly, that in a world where technology has led to larger acreages and fewer farmers, the recommendations are another blatant effort at "empire building." And in many areas, they've had about all the "big government" they need.

After all, if you want to take a good look at the "after all," the farmer and rancher need the consumer for a market—but the consumer needs the farmer and rancher just to eat and stay alive.

Technology has helped the farmer and rancher produce more food and fiber efficiently—but it hasn't replaced him.




