> Although Mrs. Donley has mixed feelings about leaving Chelsea, where she watched Spaulding for Children grow from experimental stages to a nationally recognized leader in the special adoptions field, she looks forward to the challenge of her

"After 81/2 years here in Chelsea, I feel it's time to expand my efforts and try to get an agency, two or three times larger in size, into motion," she said. She will attempt to adapt her experience in close agency and family relations to the perspective of New York's Spaulding operations. "It's a basic part of our philosophy at Spaulding for Children," she explained.

Mrs. Donley will be taking countless memories of Chelsea's Spaulding for Children with her to New York, Many will reaffirm her commitment to the need for personal interaction on the part of the adoption agency and Spaulding families.

And, Warren Spaulding, founder of the Chelsea agency, will most likely be the primary source of her fondest memories, Although old age and failing health have forced him to relinquish some of his agency involvements, he continues to attend all special agency functions involving adopted Spaulding children. On one of these occasions, a

The idea for a special adoptive agency for hard-to-place children originated in Ann Arbor about the same time Spaulding, who has had a life-long interest in children, decided to fund some type of foundation or agency dedicated to helping needy youngsters. The result was Spaulding for Children.

The agency is operated by a Board of Directors and a 30- to 40-member council representing geographic areas state - wide. Serving on the Board are Frank Renton, Larry Flanigan, and two Chelseaites, Robert Daniels and

Dorothea Pielemeier. As the reputation of Chelsea's, Spaulding for Children grew, other communities interested in establishing a similar type of adoptive agency asked for permission to use the Spaulding name. Consequently, a network of nine similar agencies emerged country-wide, three bearing the Spaulding name, These agenCleveland and New York, and were formed in 1970, 1976 and 1974, respectively. Last October, Parents for Children, an adoptiveagency again patterned after Spaulding, began operations in England.

Mrs. Donley was asked to direct Spaulding for Children in Chelsea in 1968, ending a lengthy search by its Board of Directors for a qualified individual with a successful social work background. She accepted the offer and resigned from her job with the Michigan Department of Social Services, Office of Protective Services, Flint, where she had worked for seven years.

If Mrs. Donley's outstanding skill and dedication to Spaulding for Children in Chelsea is to be duplicated at LCS-Spaulding in New York, several thousand homeless children will suddenly find themselves in an atmosphere of love and care. They will have what so many take for granted—



But what I'm really trying to say is I shouldn't be taking it out on Ms. Shave as a personal matter or otherwise.

To the Editor: Re: The letter of March 24, 77 from Brian Knickerbocker.

Brian wrote to protest the ticketing of students who park on streets adjacent to the high school. He asks, "What gives 'Chandler' the right to ticket people? . . . Are we going to stand for the few people in this administration and especially on the School Board to play God with our lives: . . . Since when did the school become the police?"

In answer to this, a school rule states that, "All cars driven by students must be parked in the parking lot on the east side of the school." The students at Chelsea High school are aware of this rule. Parking lot rules have been distributed and have been announced many times. This gives Mr. Chandler the right to ticket student violaters. Another rule states that, "Anyone ticketed is suspended from school until the fine is paid and a sticker is purchased, if one has not been previously pur-chased." This gives Assistant Prin-cipal Schave the right to suspend

Brian for refusing to pay the fine.
These school rules are justified. Uncontrolled student parking creates problems. When students park on streets adjacent to the school, they become a general nuisance to the people who live on these streets. Some conduct dope dealing and pot smoking here. There are sighs along these streets specifying "Two Hour Parking" and "No Parking", that are being violated. Facilities for student parking are provided. Many high schools have rules of this kind and Chelsea's are not excessive. If Brian doesn't agree with the rules, he should discuss the matter with the School Board, and not the po-

Furthermore, it would be more advantageous for Brian to park in the school parking lot because he would be closer to his morning classes and wouldn't have to walk

 The school does work to maintain an adequate parking facility, even though they are not responsible for the broken glass, as Brian seems to imply. The school didn't leave it there. It was put there by a few irresponsible students who have yet to realize that they're causing problems for the students who do follow the rules, and park in the parking lot. The parking lot is swept several times a year. The money in the parking lot fund also goes to pay for the parking lot stickers and the paint for the parking lot. Some money from the fund may also be used, by the Student Council, to finance the purchase of

bicycle racks for the school.



The United States Department of Agriculture's 1975 Young Executives Committee, made up of 20 middle-level bureaucrats appointed annually to study department operations while continuing with their regular jobs, says USDA should bring consumers into a policy-making partnership.

Although farmers and agribusiness firms have been the depart ment's primary concern in the past, such programs as food stamps have come to dominate its budget and deserve more consideration. he committee said.

News reports credit the new Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, with saying he intends to bring "consumer voices into the highest policymaking circles" to help shape a joint food-farm

The committee even suggested a change in name to reflect this consumer concern — something like "department of food and agriculture" or department of food, agricul ture and resources." It further suggested that failure to expand its approach to consumer interests could result in "a reduction in the department's role and influence in

Maybe so. But a good many experienced and concerned farmers sideration of farm, ranch and agribusiness interests in the depart-

Many will feel, also, and feel strongly, that in a world where technology has led to larger acreages and fewer farmers, the recommendations are another blatant effort at "empire building." And in many areas, they've had about all the "big government" they need.

After all, if you want to take a good look at the "after alls," the armer and rancher need the consumer for a market—but the consumer needs the farmer and rancher just to eat and stay alive.


Diane Klemer Chosen For U-M Honorary Pharmacy Society

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
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
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
