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Gridders Close Season With Win Over NW

Chelsea High's varsity football team blasted Jackson Northwest last Friday with a 39-0 shut-out win in a fourth victory in their last five games. As a result of the triumph, Chelsea's finished the season with a 4-5 record.

"We came a long way this season," Coach Phil Bareis said of the Bulldogs who had opened the year with a series of losses. "Things look a little brighter for next season."

Chelsea opened the scoring at 3:36 in the first quarter on a 37-yard touchdown run by Steve Pennington, which capped a 67-yard drive. Bob Gottfried converted for the extra point.

The Bulldogs scored again with 10 remaining in the first period on a 12-yard pass from Jesse Coburn to Chuck Broderick. Gottfried again kicked the extra point.

In the second quarter, a six-yard pass from Coburn to Broderick at 1:18 in the period ended a 9-yard drive with an additional six points. Gottfried's third conversion kick was also successful, to give the Bulldogs a 21-0 half-time lead.

Returning for the second half,

Rick Beeman carried the ball eight yards for another touchdown at 7:49 in the third quarter to wrap up a 35-yard Bulldog drive. The extra point kick fell short this time.

Then with only 10 minutes left in the fourth quarter, Al Augustine scampered six yards to cross the goal line and close a 30-yard scoring drive for Chelsea. The ensuing kick was wide to the left, as was the final conversion attempt which followed Chelsea's final touchdown of the game. That touchdown came on a four-yard plunge by Jeff Powell.

In the game, Chelsea collected 288 yards rushing and 48 yards passing, while Jackson Northwest gained only 81 yards rushing and 22 passing.

Leading Bulldog tacklers were James Bollinger with 11; Scott Price, 8; Todd Headrick, 5; Phil Steinhauer, 5; Dave Schrotenboer, 4; Jim Brown, 4; Gary Packard, 4; and Dan Gerstler, 4. Jeff Powell had two interceptions.

Phil Steinhauer led Chelsea in quarterback sacks with 3 for 28, followed by Jim Brown with 2 for 13, and Gary Packard with 1 for 1.

Delivering record setting performances in the 13- and 14-years division were Phil Hoffman,

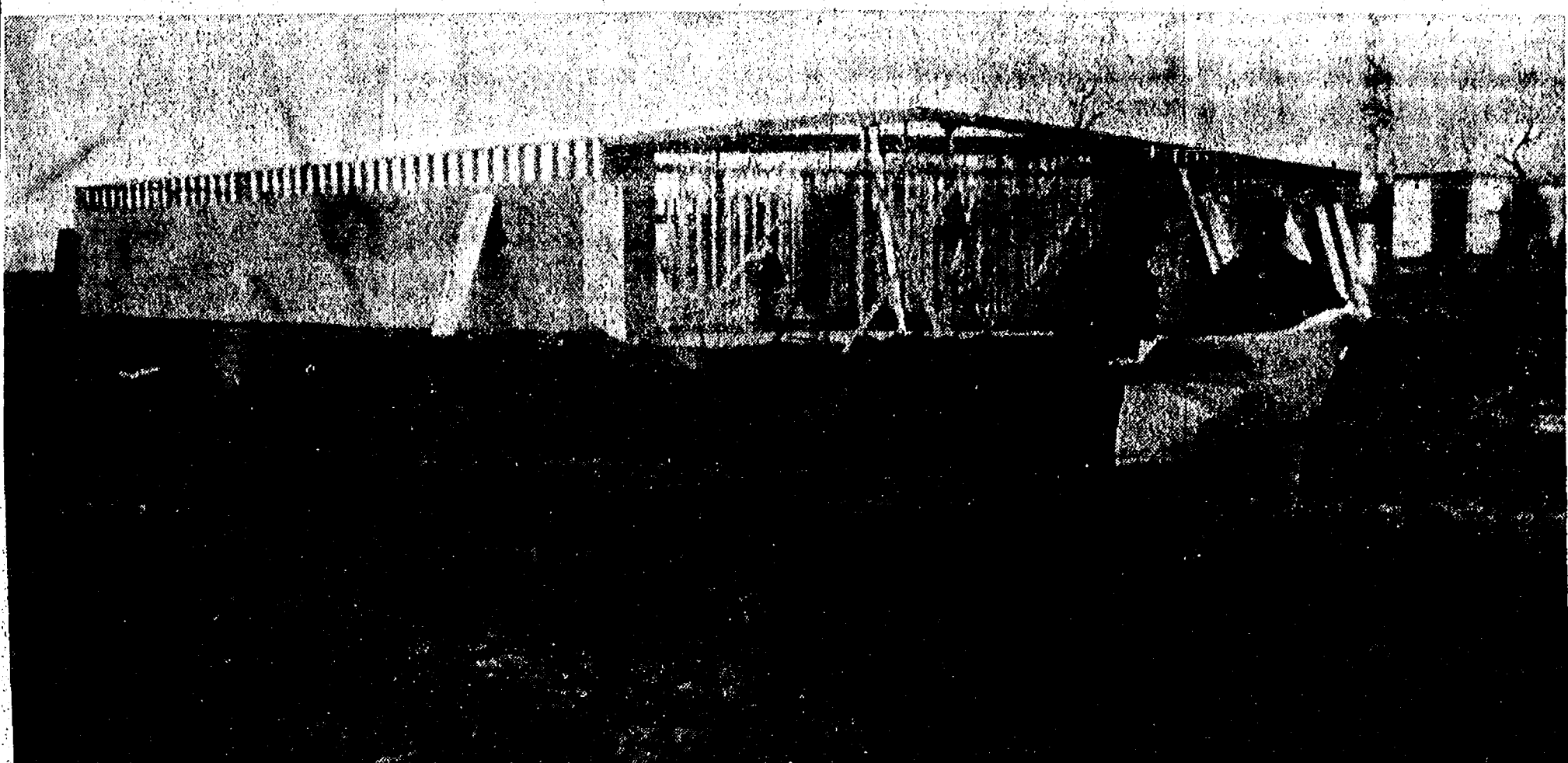
Dave Nicola, Mike Mason and Dave Mason.

Local 1284 Union Hall Under Construction

Depending on the weather, Chelsea's new UAW-CIO Local 1284 Union Hall, currently under construction on M-52, south of I-94, should be finished and ready for meetings by January of next year, according to Nelson Rooke, president of Local 1284.

Work on the new building began three months ago when dirt was moved on the driveway leading to the structure, and went into full force 5-6 weeks ago when actual construction of the new union hall was launched with the laying of a foundation for the building.

A zoning violation nearly halted construction two weeks ago, but the misunderstanding was quickly ironed out with the Sylvan township zoning inspector and work on the new building proceeded without interruption. Cause of the violation was Local 1284's negligence to file a site plan with the Sylvan Township Board for review by the Sylvan Township Planning Commission.

Cost of the new 52'x78' wood frame, truss-roofed hall is \$130,000, which is being financed by union funds. The building will have only one floor, and will include a 48'x52' assembly hall, a warming kitchen, two restrooms and two storerooms. Only union members or their guests will have use of the hall.

The new structure was designed by Sanborne, Stekette, Otis & Evans, a Flint architectural firm, and is being built by Wacker & Tuthill Construction Co. "Ground for the project was purchased in 1974," Rooke said, "and we've been saving ever since for the construction." He said construction of the new hall had been due to start in 1975, but the many lay-offs, due to inflation, had caused a shortage of funds and postponement of the project.

Friday's performances will range from a jazz flutist, humorist, and rock group, to folk singing, a soul routine, and magic acts. Several "surprise" acts will also be featured.

Novice Debate Team Coming on Strong

A good practice opener Oct. 29 by Chelsea High's novice debate team preceded the team's first official showing of the season last Saturday in the Ypsilanti Novice Tournament which drew competition from 41 Michigan high schools.

In the October warm-up, Chelsea hosted Ann Arbor Pioneer, Jackson Parkside and Jackson County Western, and won 18 of its 24 debates. The Bulldogs were less successful in the Ypsilanti tournament.

In the latter contest, the novices defeated every Class B team they encountered, falling only to Class A schools, according to Coach William Coelius.

"Even though we lost more debates than anticipated, our tournament showing was still quite a strong one," he maintained, "because most of the novices forming the opposition were in their second and third meets at the time of the tournament."

A highlight of the Ypsilanti event was the presentation of individual speaking awards to two Chelsea debaters, Janet Walz and Drew Sprague. Walz won a fifth-place trophy, while Sprague received a third-place trophy for his individual performance.

The national topic under debate by the novices this season is "Resolved: that the federal government guarantee comprehensive medical care for all citizens of the United States."

A Chelsea novice unit composed of Mark Snyder and Sprague on affirmative, and Walz and Jenny Clark on negative, finished the tournament with a 4-4 record for the day, while another unit with Sarah Schwarze and Julie Botsford on affirmative, and Todd Wursler, Sue Inglis and Dan Blough on negative, finished with a 3-5 record.

The best showing by a Chelsea unit came from the affirmative team of Gayle Albrecht and Tom Gilbreath, coupled with the negative team of Cindy Wolters and Ruth Rawson, who argued their way to a 5-3 finish for the day.

A call for township unity by more than 60 Lima township residents attending Monday night's meeting of the Lima Township Board was answered by a concerted effort on the part of both board members and Supervisor Robert Musolf to work together in spite of a six-month political battle in Lima that ended in an unsuccessful attempt to recall the supervisor Oct. 25.

Topping the lists of accomplishments Monday night was the appointment of three new members to the Lima Township Planning Commission, after numerous efforts in the past six months had failed to produce a working body.

Success came with a compromise, and a round of applause from those attending the meeting, as Ron Ziegler, a civil engineer and leading supporter of the supervisor, was appointed along with Ken Burkhalter, a planner by vocation and a member of the recall committee. Willadean Miles, a secretary employed by Gelman Instruments of Ann Arbor, was the third appointee.

The three were named to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of Jim Roberts, Don Bauer, and Marge Nusca.

At first it did not appear that the appointments would be made, after the board balked at the supervisor's first choice of Planning Commission appointees. He named Ziegler, Walter Inglis and Carol Hatt to fill the vacancies.

According to Supervisor Musolf, his choice of Hatt was prompted by the fact that, as a secretary for Frisinger Realty, she would have some knowledge of zoning. He said at least one woman would be needed on the planning body to act as its secretary.

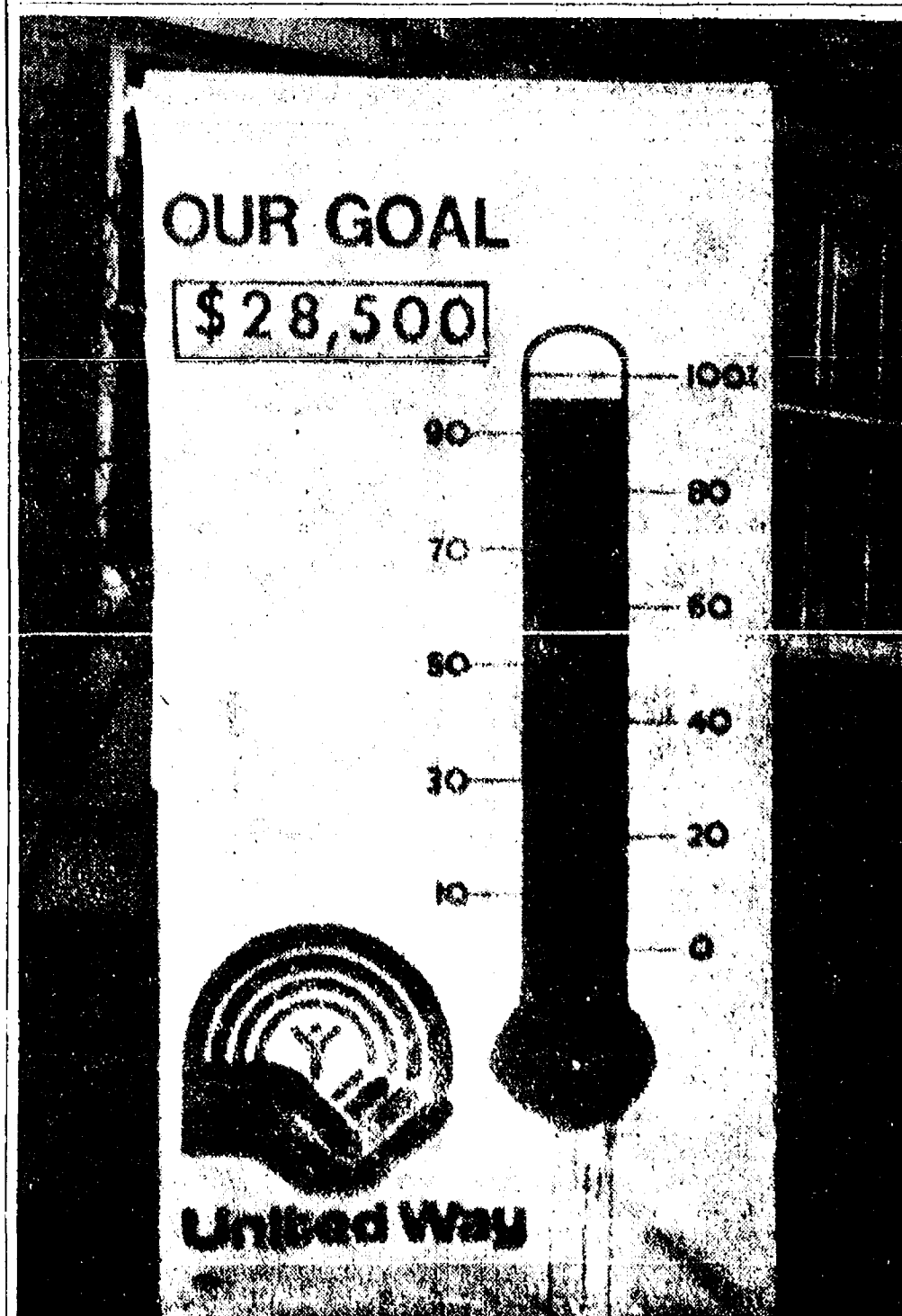

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Uncle Lew from Lima Says:

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:
 I recollect reading some weeks back where a doppel locomotive somehow started running in a switch yard and took off down the track by itself. The engine went 25 miles before it slowed on a grade and people were able to hook to it from behind and stop it. Mister Editor, I wonder if that's what we're doing in this country, trying to catch up with a Government system that has taken off by itself. I was think-

ing about this the other day when I saw it took a 77-page report to tell President Carter that federal paperwork is getting out of hand. The report said the Federal Government spends \$100 billion a year filling out, shuffling and filing papers.

I mentioned this report at the country store Saturday night, and it got the fellows started. Clem Webster said he had saw where a column writer noted that the 18th Amendment that gave the Federal Government the right to tax income came to 31 words. It was adopted in 1913, and laws covering income tax collecting come to more than 500,000 words. To the average person, Clem said, all them words might as well be Greek for all the understanding we got of em. To get the benefit of tax laws, Clem went on, you got to hire a lawyer to chase the runaway words.

Actual, Ed Doolittle said, out of control tax laws is just a tip of the iceberg. Look into anything the Government is tied up in and you'll find the same maze of regulations to understand and forms to fill out. Ed said it has got to where a farmer can't farm any more for playing questions and answers with Washington. If a farmer or rancher wants to use any of the services the Government offers, he has to take a course in keeping books to be able to put in fer what he wants. And the sad part is, Ed went on, we have come to depend so much on farm subsidies and other Government help until we can't run agriculture in this country on a free market base.

Fer instant, Ed said, President Nixon tried to loosen up Government controls with that 1972 wheat sale to Russia. At the same time the Agriculture Department lowered supports and quit paying farmers not to grow crops. Everybody planted all they could when the price of wheat shot to \$6 a bushel.

Furthermore, declared Zeke Grubb, we got controls working agin controls. The USDA subsidizes tobacco and controls how much we can produce, and the HEW is trying to do away with it. Zeke said he saw by the paper the other day where HEW Secretary Califano is hung up on tobacco farmers' health and welfare. He wants to work up a anti-smoking drive to put farmers out of work, so he's got to turn to welfare programs to make up fer the loss of income. Here we got a situation where the left hand knows what the right hand is doing, but neither one can do anything about it.

MICHIGAN MIRROR

Probate Code Revision
 With House of Representatives approval, a major revision in the state's probate code to update and simplify took a step toward becoming law. Sponsors now hope for Senate passage yet this fall to get the proposed new code on the books by the beginning of 1978.

The rewrite provides for an "independent probate" through a personal representative to minimize court supervision. Under this

feature, all interested parties to an estate would be notified of their rights to request court review on any matter, their right to an estate inventory and a closing notice.

While both the personal representative and the interested parties would be permitted to petition the court on any question, the court would be limited to answering only those specific questions.

The court also would have only

a limited power to act if there was reliable information that there might be fraud or waste of the estate.

Estimates indicate that more than half of all estates in Michigan could be settled in this manner.

The probate code rewrite also increases the value of estates which can be closed in one day from \$7,500 to \$20,000; increases the homestead exemption allowance from \$3,500 to \$10,000; reduces bonding requirements; provides rights in choosing a guardian to any person needing such; and puts probate court organization under the revised judicial act, where the organization, jurisdiction and authority of all other courts is found.

Nowhere To Go

Now that the state has a strong law to eliminate the final traces of PBB from the food chain, disposal of tainted animals has been halted pending a court decision.

Effective Oct. 1, any dairy animal found to have more than 20 parts per billion of PBB in fat tissue would be purchased at fair market value, destroyed and disposed of by the state.

The Department of Natural Resources found a site in Oscoda county but local objections brought about a permanent court injunction against any burial there.

Meanwhile, farmers are holding the animals on their farms until appeals are exhausted and a site is ready. A legislative proposal is pending to pay farmers a per diem for maintaining the animals.

Also, feasibility studies are being conducted as to the possibility of construction of an incinerator for safe destruction of all toxic materials.

Tanker Inspections Shocking
 Single and double-bottom tankers carrying hazardous materials on state highways has fared miserably in meeting inspection and certification standards.

After two weeks of inspections being conducted following an executive order, only 78 of 241 tested double-bottoms have been approved—an over-all failure rate of 68 percent.

Tankers must be inspected and certified before Nov. 25 or taken out of service until approved.

Motor Mechanic Certification Due
 Consumers can be assured auto repairs will be done by or under the supervision of a certified auto mechanic starting Jan. 1, 1978.

Michigan auto repair shops have one final chance to get their mechanics tested and certified by the state to meet deadlines.

Besides general certification, any shop doing major repair must employ someone certified in the areas of major repair offered by the facility.

Under the new law, there are 16 certification categories for motor vehicle mechanics. They include eight categories for major auto repair, six for heavy duty trucks, one for motorcycles and one for recreational trailer repairs.

An accident on I-94 claimed the life of a 21-year-old Dexter man Wednesday, Nov. 2, when his automobile slammed into a concrete overpass abutment, according to the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

Deputies reported that Alan R. Fifield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard S. Fifield of 3470 Pineview, was eastbound on I-94 near Parker Rd. in Scio township, traveling at a high rate of speed, when he ran off the roadway and struck the concrete pillar head-on, killing him instantly and nearly tearing his vehicle in half upon impact. The accident happened at 4 p.m. No reason was given for the collision.

The board agreed to file a joint action suit, with Sylvan township to collect fire run fees from Con-Rail.

Gas service has been denied to those customers since April, 1974.

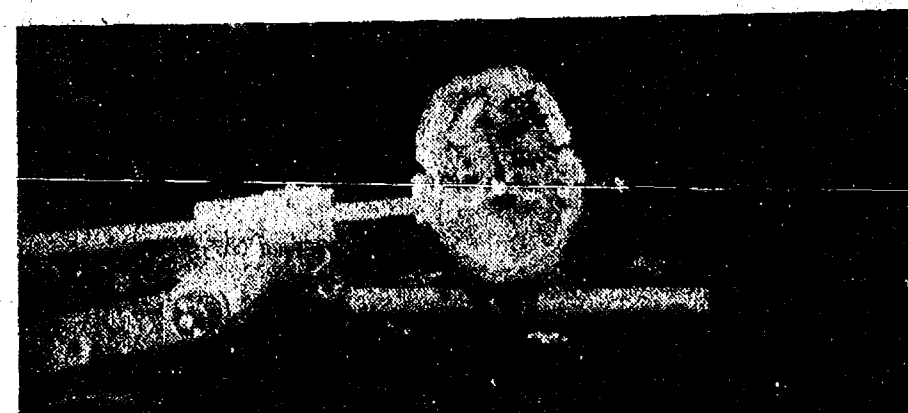

"Good, strong playing," Coach Vogel said, "increased the lead to 31-11 at half-time." Then, after a weak third quar-

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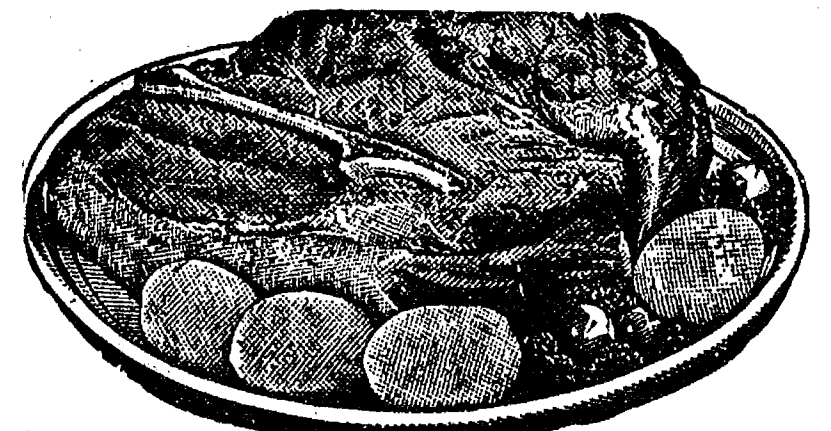

Swim Club Downs Willow Run, Dundee

Chelsea High's girls varsity swimming team continued to show its power and bring honor to the community this past week with a 55-29 victory over Willow Run, and a 95-77 triumph over Dundee.

The two wins raised Chelsea's record to 9-2 over-all, and boosted its home meet win record to eight in succession, five of which came this season.

Both of the swimmers' losses have been to Class A teams, but they have also defeated two Class A teams.

Chelsea's victory over Willow Run was the team's second this year against the Flyers. Winners in that meet for the Bulldogs included Michelle Alexander, Nancy Heller, Sara Borders, Dawn McDowell, Shannon Springer and Shelly Springer.

Leading the way was Heller with a varsity and freshman record in the 100-yard breaststroke.

Other freshman records were set by Sue Cobb in the 200-yard I.M. and 500-yard freestyle; and by Borders in the 100-yard butterfly.

Setting personal performance records were Donna Alexander (50-yard free), Kristi Fahner (100-yard butterfly), Marcia Warren (100-yard backstroke), and Teresa Degener (100-yard breaststroke).

When the Chelsea girls swam against Dundee last Thursday, they were competing against a squad that had established a 10-3 record for the season with the losses all to fine Class A teams—Ypsilanti, Monroe and defending state champion Milan.

Bulldog Coach Larry Reed had told the members of his team that on paper they were probably a little better than Dundee, but they would have to beat the opposition in the water.

At first, Chelsea could not fill

the assignment, losing two of the first eight events to trail Dundee by 10 points.

"The team then buckled down and won seven of the last nine events to win by 18 points," Coach Reed reported proudly.

"Many tremendous performances were turned in," he continued, "but the highlight of the meet was an incredible performance by freshman Sara Borders, who smashed her personal best time in the 100-yard butterfly by 6 seconds to break both freshman and varsity records and become Chelsea's first swimmer of the year to qualify for the state meet."

Another varsity record was set in one of the most tightly contested races of the evening by freshman Sue Cobb. She lowered her own best time in the 500-yard free by 13 seconds, and the school record by 6 seconds.

Cobb was behind all this way until the last 50 yards, when her superior conditioning led to a victory," Coach Reed said.

In other events, Shannon Springer won the 200-yard free; Shelly Springer, the 50-yard and 100-yard frees; Cathy Volta; diving competition; and Dawn McDowell, Cobb, and the two Springers, the free relay.

Chelsea will swim one more dual meet today, Nov. 10, at Dundee, and will then host the six-team Chelsea Invitational to determine a championship winner.

The team will close out its season Dec. 2-3, when it travels to Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant for the State Meet. According to Coach Reed, Chelsea appears likely to qualify swimmers in seven of the 11 state meet events.

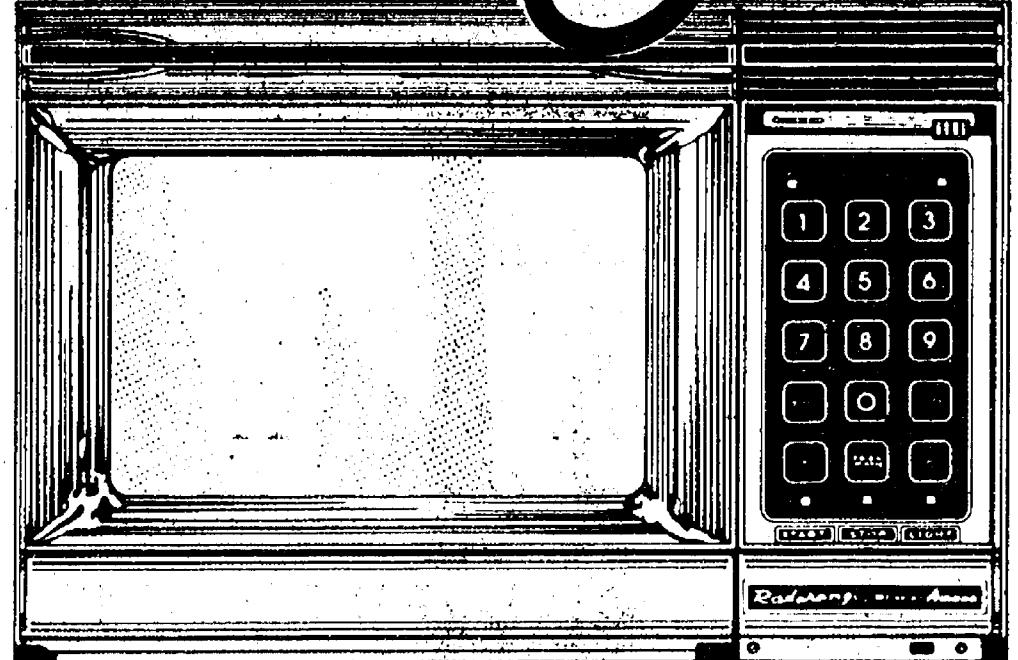

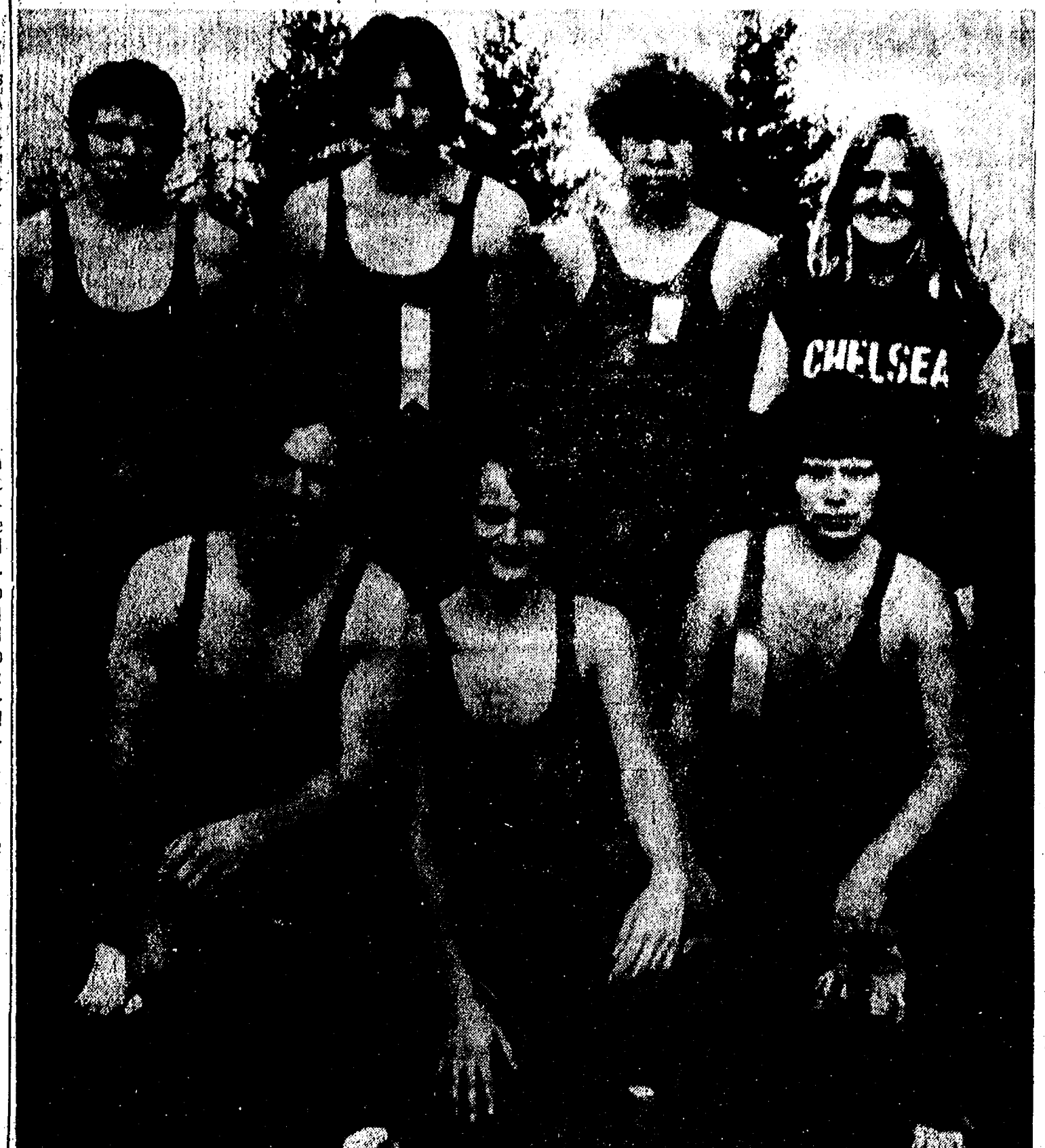

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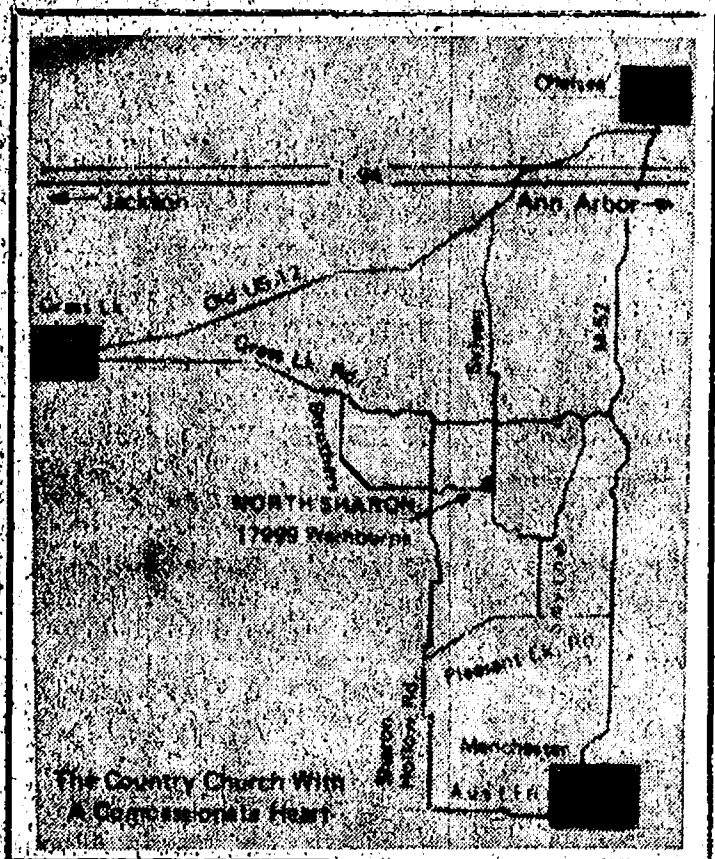

BOND AUTHORIZING RESOLUTION

Village of Chelsea, Michigan

WHEREAS, the Village of Chelsea, Michigan (the "Municipality"), is a municipal body corporate organized and existing under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Michigan and is authorized by Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Act No. 62") to acquire lands within or without its corporate limits and to construct and/or acquire, improve, enlarge and remodel industrial buildings thereon and to acquire and install industrial machinery and equipment therein and to lease the same in order to alleviate and prevent conditions of unemployment, to assist and retain local industries, to meet growing competition for new industries and to strengthen and revitalize the economy of the Municipality in general; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality is authorized by Act No. 62 to issue industrial development revenue bonds payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project thus acquired or constructed through the issuance of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has made necessary arrangements with AmBus Properties, Inc., a Delaware corporation (hereinafter defined as the "Company") for the location of the Project within the Municipality, from which Project the Municipality will receive the benefits contemplated by Act No. 62; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 62 the Municipality shall finance the cost of acquiring, constructing or installing the Project by the issuance of the Bonds to be issued in accordance with the Indenture (as hereinafter defined) and to be paid solely from the net revenues received by the Municipality under the Contract (as hereinafter defined) and neither said Bonds nor any interest coupon appertaining thereto, if any, shall ever constitute a general obligation of the Municipality within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory or charter provision or limitation; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the estimated amount necessary to finance the cost of the Project, including necessary expenses incidental thereto and to the issuance of the Bonds will require the issuance, sale and delivery of Series A Bonds in the principal amount of \$1,500,000, and that completion of and desirable improvements to the Project may require the subsequent issuance, sale and delivery of Additional Bonds (as hereinafter defined) at such time and from time to time as may be found necessary, which Series A Bonds and Additional Bonds are more particularly described in the Indenture and which Bonds are to be secured in the manner and under the terms and conditions set forth in the Indenture; and

WHEREAS, the acquisition, construction, installation and leasing of the Project and the issuance of the Bonds by the Municipality as herein recited and provided will serve the intended accomplishments and in all respects conform to the provisions and requirements of Act No. 62;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Village Council of the Municipality:

1. The following words and terms as used in this Resolution and the preambles hereto shall have the following meanings unless the context or use indicates another or different meaning or intent:

"Acquisition Fund" or "Village of Chelsea Industrial Development Acquisition Fund-AmBus Properties, Inc. Project" means the fund created by Section 10 of this Resolution.

"Additional Bonds" means the additional bonds of the Village of Chelsea, Michigan, Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (AmBus Properties, Inc. Project) which are authorized to be issued in one or more series from time to time under Section 207 of the Indenture to provide funds for the purposes contemplated by Paragraph 2.2 of the Contract.

"Bond" or "Bonds" means the Series A Bonds and the Additional Bonds of the Municipality to be issued under the Indenture.

"Bond Fund" or "Village of Chelsea Industrial Development Revenue Bond Fund-AmBus Properties, Inc. Project" means the fund created in Section 9 of this Resolution.

"Bondholder" or "holder" (when used with reference to Bonds) or "owner of the Bonds" means the bearer of any Bond not registered as to principal and the registered owner of any Bond registered as to principal or as to principal and interest and "holder" (when used with reference to coupons) shall mean the bearer of such coupons.

"Bond Purchase Agreement" means the agreement by and between the Municipality and the Bond Purchaser, as approved by this Resolution relating to the sale by the Municipality and the purchase by the Bond Purchaser of the Series A Bonds.

"Bond Purchaser" means, collectively, The Detroit Bank and Trust Company, a Michigan banking corporation, and National Bank and Trust Company of Ann Arbor, a national banking association.

surviving, resulting or transferee corporation as provided in the Contract.

"Contract" means the Lease Purchase Contract executed by and between the Municipality and the Company dated as of November 1, 1977, as approved by this Resolution, as the same may be amended from time to time.

The term "coupon" means the coupons issued under the Indenture, if any, evidencing the semi-annual installments of interest on the applicable Bond or Bonds.

"Guarantee" means the Guarantee Agreement executed by and between the Guarantor and the Trustee, dated as of November 1, 1977, as approved by this Resolution, pursuant to which the Guarantor, as an inducement to the Municipality to issue the Bonds and to the purchasers of any such Bonds to purchase the same, unconditionally guarantees the full and prompt payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds when and as the same become due, as the same may be amended or supplemented from time to time.

"Guarantor" means American Business Products, Inc., a Delaware corporation, guarantor under the Guarantee, and its successors and assigns and any surviving, resulting or transferee corporation as provided in the Guarantee.

"Indenture" means the Mortgage and Indenture of Trust, to be made and entered into by and between the Municipality and the Trustee, dated as of November 1, 1977, as approved by this Resolution, as may be supplemented from time to time in accordance with its terms.

"Municipality," "Village," or "Village of Chelsea" means the Village of Chelsea, Michigan, or any successor municipal corporation succeeding to its rights and obligations under the Contract and the Indenture.

"Project" shall mean the industrial building, the improvements thereto, and the site therefor, as set forth in Exhibit A to the Indenture, including such modifications of the site as may be made from time to time pursuant to the Contract, and the machinery and equipment to be installed therein, as set forth in Exhibit B to the Indenture, including such modifications thereof, substitutions therefor, and improvements to the Project, and excluding deletions therefrom, as shall be made in accordance with the Contract, but not including the Company's own machinery and equipment installed under Section 6.3 of the Contract.

"Series A Bonds" means the \$1,500,000 principal amount of Village of Chelsea, Michigan, Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (AmBus Properties, Inc. Project), dated November 1, 1977, authorized to be issued under Sections 201 and 202 of the Indenture and Section 3 of this Resolution.

"Surplus Fund" or "Village of Chelsea Industrial Development Surplus Fund-AmBus Properties, Inc. Project" means the fund created by Section 11 of this Resolution.

"Trustee" means The Detroit Bank and Trust Company, a Michigan banking corporation, and its successors and any corporation resulting from or surviving any consolidation or merger to which it or its successors may be a party and any successor trustee under the Indenture.

2. The Village Council of the Municipality does hereby determine that it is necessary and for the best interests of the Municipality to acquire and construct or install the Project and lease the Project to the Company, and does hereby determine that the estimated cost of the Project including all costs of the issuance of the Bonds, all engineering, architectural, inspection, fiscal and legal expenses and all other costs and expenses in connection therewith as provided in the Contract and Indenture is not less than One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000) Dollars. The Village Council, based on advice of the Company, does hereby determine that the cost of the industrial machinery and equipment as a part of the Project will represent less than two-thirds (2/3) of the total cost of the Project, and that the estimated period of usefulness of said industrial machinery and equipment is not less than fifteen (15) years.

3. The Municipality shall borrow the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000) Dollars and issue its Series A Bonds therefor in the form of coupon bonds as provided herein to provide the funds to defray the costs of the Project as set forth in Paragraph 2 above and as provided in the Contract and Indenture.

4. The Series A Bonds shall be designated "Village of Chelsea Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (AmBus Properties, Inc. Project) Series A." They shall be dated November 1, 1977, and shall bear interest from the date thereof of until due at the rate of SIX and THREE QUARTERS (6 3/4%) percent payable May 1, 1978, and semi-annually thereafter on May 1 and November 1 of each year. The Bonds shall bear interest on overdue principal and interest amounts, if any, from the date when due until paid at the rate of NINE and THREE QUARTERS (9 3/4%) percent (but not in excess of the maximum interest rate permitted by

law). The Bonds shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each, and shall be numbered consecutively from 1 upward and shall mature in numerical order on the dates and in the principal amounts set forth in the following schedule:

The Bonds and interest thereon except as otherwise provided in the case of registration as provided in Section 209 hereof, shall be payable to bearer upon presentation and surrender of the Bonds or interest coupons as they respectively become due at the principal office of the Trustee or at the option of the holder at the principal office of any alternate paying agent designated by the Municipality pursuant to the provisions of Section 1405 hereof. Payment aforesaid shall be made in lawful money of the United States of America.

The Series A Bonds may, in addition, be issued and delivered, but only in the original instance, as two fully registered Bonds without coupons, one in the principal amount of \$625,000 and the other in the principal amount of \$875,000, numbered R-1 and R-2, respectively, payable on the dates and in the principal amounts, respectively, set forth in the following schedule, and at the rates with interest due at the times, and with such rights of prepayment as the Series A coupon Bonds have:

The fully registered Bonds shall be convertible, at the option of the registered holders thereof, and without expense to said holders, into coupon Bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 each in the principal amount remaining unpaid on the fully registered Bonds at the time of conversion with maturities and interest rates conforming to those remaining unpaid at the time of conversion.

The Series A Bonds are not subject to redemption prior to maturity except as hereinafter provided. The Series A Bonds are subject to redemption in the event of exercise by the Company of its general option under the Contract to purchase the Project, but only when following:

(a) damage or destruction of the Project to such extent (i) that the Project cannot be reasonably restored within six months to the condition thereof immediately preceding such damage or destruction, or (ii) that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project for a period of six months; or

(b) condemnation of the Project or taking eminent domain of such use of the Project that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project for a period of six months; or

(c) constitutional, legislative, judicial or administrative action voiding the Contract or rendering it unenforceable or imposing unreasonable burdens or excessive liabilities, including tax liabilities, on the Municipality or the Company. In such events, the Series A Bonds shall be subject to redemption on any interest payment date on or after May 1, 1979, in whole at 100% of the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the redemption date.

Any Series A Bonds which mature on or after May 1, 1988, are also subject to redemption prior to maturity on any interest payment date on or after November 1, 1987, in whole or in part and, if less than all of such Bonds are redeemed, in the inverse order of maturity in multiples of \$5,000 at 100% of the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the redemption date.

The Series A Bonds are also subject to redemption in the event of a "Determination of Taxability" which is defined to mean either (i) the issuance of a statutory notice of deficiency or ruling by the Internal Revenue Service which holds

in effect that the interest payable on any of the Bonds is includable in the gross income of a holder thereof (other than a holder who is a "substantial user" of the Project or "related person" as such terms are defined in the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended (the "Code") as a result of the limitations prescribed in Section 103(b) (D) of the Code, having been exceeded, or the Bonds being "arbitrage bonds" under Section 103(c) of the Code, or the proceeds of the Bonds being used for purposes which are not permitted under Section 103(b) (6) or (ii)

of a statement by the Lessee to the effect that it has exceeded or intends to exceed the maximum amount of capital expenditures permitted under Section 103(b) (6) (D) of the Code. Such a Determination of Taxability shall be deemed to have occurred on the date borne by said statutory notice of deficiency, or said ruling or the date borne by such statement, whichever shall be applicable. In such event should there occur a Determination of Taxability the Series A Bonds shall be redeemed in whole on the first interest payment date following the date of closing of the purchase of the Project under Section 12.2 of the Contract for which the requisite notice of redemption can be given after the occurrence of such event, but not before February 1, 1979, at a redemption price equal to 100% of the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the redemption date; provided, however, that such interest shall be computed to yield, before taxes, 200% of the prime commercial lending rate from time to time in effect of The Detroit Bank and Trust Company (but not in excess of the maximum rate permitted by law) between the date of such Determination of Taxability and the redemption date; but

Notice of the call for any such redemption shall be given at least 30 days prior to the redemption date by publication or by mail as provided in the Indenture. Prior to the date fixed for redemption, cash funds shall be placed with the Trustee to pay the amount of principal fixed to be prepaid, accrued interest thereon and the premium, if any.

5. The Bonds and the attached coupons, if any, shall not be a general obligation or indebtedness of the Municipality and shall never constitute nor give rise to a general pecuniary liability of the Municipality or a charge against its general credit or taxing powers. The Bonds and the attached coupons, if any, shall be special obligations of the Municipality payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project (except to the extent payable out of moneys attributable to Bond proceeds or the income from temporary investment thereof and, under certain circumstances, proceeds from insurance and condemnation awards, as provided in the Contract and Indenture). All net revenues from the Project shall be pledged and a security interest therein shall be granted in and unto the Trustee and unto the respective successors in trust for the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds and the performance of the other obligations of the Municipality contained in the Indenture, except amounts payable under Article V of the Contract and the rights of the Municipality under such paragraphs. The payments when paid by the Company, pursuant to the Contract, except those payments received under Article V of the Contract, shall be paid directly to the Trustee for the account of the Municipality so long as any of the Bonds and coupons pertaining thereto, if any, shall be outstanding and unpaid. The Municipality shall assign, set over to, and grant a security interest in the Contract and its right, title and interest therein, except the Municipality's rights under Article V of the Contract, to the Trustee for the benefit of the Bondholders. The Municipality acknowledges that any amounts received under the Guarantee shall be deposited in the Bond Fund and applied to pay the principal and interest on the Bonds.

6. The Bonds shall be signed on behalf of the Municipality by the manual signature of the Village President and countersigned by the manual signature of the Village Clerk and the corporate seal, if any, of the Municipality shall be affixed thereto. The coupons attached to said Bonds shall be executed for the facsimile signatures of the Village President and Village Clerk. Each said Bond shall be endorsed on each of said Bonds the Trustee's certificate of authentication, substantially in the form hereinafter set forth which shall be duly executed on behalf of the Trustee by a duly authorized officer thereof the Indenture. Said Bonds shall be titled to any right or benefit under the Indenture. Said Bonds shall be delivered in the manner provided by the Indenture and the Bond Purchase Agreement.

7. The Bonds shall contain a recital that they are issued pursuant to Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended, and said Bonds and the coupons attached thereto, if any, shall be in substantially the following forms with such appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as are permitted or required by this resolution and the Indenture:

8th Grade Gridders Finish 4-2 Season

Beach Middle school's varsity football team closed out its season this past week by dropping a 14-12 decision to Saline. This loss, the team's first in league play, gave the 8th graders an over-all season record of four wins and two losses.

Previous to the Saline game, the junior high griders had defeated Lincoln 30-8, Brighton 8-0, Dexter 40-24, and Milan 48-12. Their other loss was at the hands of a strong Willow Run team, 42-6.

The 1977 season marked the 13th consecutive year Chelsea junior high teams have had winning records, according to this year's coach, Pat Clarke.

In reviewing the recent season, Coach Clarke said: "The thing that I liked about this year's squad was the way the players were able to fill in and adjust to the fact that we had some injuries, illnesses, and other problems throughout the season. We started 23 different players on either offense or defense at one time or other during the year."

"The line was hardest hit, with several players injured early in the season, or held out because of injuries," the coach continued. "We also lost several other linemen during the course of the season. Some of the replacements were not as big in size as their predecessors, but they did a capable job and gained valuable experience during the year."

In analyzing the performance of his offensive and defensive lines, Coach Clarke remarked: "The offense scored a lot of points during the year, but the defense gave up more than they should have, especially against the long run. This was due in part to the lack of size at the defensive ends and defensive backs."

"There was only one game that we were out of, and that was Willow Run. Even in that game, though, we moved the ball well."

"The other loss," Coach Clarke added, "we felt should have been avoided, but several costly mistakes let the victory slip away."

Statistically, the offense was led by Tim Blough, tailback, who carried the ball 91 times for 779 yards, 15 touchdowns, and nine extra points, for a total of 108 points. Fullback John Preston carried the ball 50 times for 246 yards and three touchdowns.

John Welton was the leading passer, completing 8 out of 15, including one touchdown, while Tobin Boyd was the leading pass receiver, grabbing six for 136 yards and one touchdown.

On defense, Ray Williams was the leading tackler with 45, followed by John Preston with 42, Tim Blough, 27, Jeff Klink, 23, and Jeff Lantis, David Peterson, and Bob Richards, 17 each. Williams also topped the pass interception category with two, and Tim Blough recovered five fumbles. Tobin Boyd averaged 32.5 yards on four punts.

Starting at various times during the season on offense were Tobin Boyd, Darrow Keizer, Brad Roe and Jeff Lantis at the ends; Jeff Sprague and Bob Richards at the tackles; David Harrison, Duane Robbins, Doug Henson and Jeff Klink at the guards; and Doug Inglis at center.

"This year's squad was extremely coachable, we had very few problems, and many of our athletes made up for the lack of size with lots of heart," the coach concluded.

Said parcel being a part of the East 1/2 of Section 7, Town 2 South, Range 4 East, Lima Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan (East side of Freer Road across from A. D. Mayer Drive).

SCOTT STAFFORD (40), senior halfback for Chelsea's varsity grid squad, is not only a first-year member of the team, but also new in the halfback position this season. The 5'11", 165-lb. gridder began football as an end, but said his new position gives him an opportunity to "carry the ball a lot." He added that his new assignment requires that he "know all plays and to call them." Stafford named Chelsea's game with Milan as his best this season because he "ran the ball a lot, and the team had lots of touchdowns." Most of the year, Stafford did not see much action because he was out with an injury. In explaining his choice of Chelsea's game with Jackson Northwest last Friday as the team's best, Stafford said, "we really stomped them, and lots of people got to play." With the Bulldog season now over, he had the following words to say about the team's performance: "If we started all over now, we would probably be undefeated. Our biggest problem this season was getting it together." Stafford cited "the ability of the players to do their assignments and do them well" as the most improved quality of the team during the course of the season. He added the team got a real boost from its end-of-the-season winning streak. "We really got fired up when we started winning—we had three consecutive wins, and we didn't let injuries get us down." Stafford said Chelsea's toughest encounters this year were against Milan, Saline and Brighton. "They were all undefeated teams, but we didn't let it get to us or let them run over us; I'm real proud of the way we handled ourselves." Stafford, who also runs track for Chelsea High, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stafford of 14320 Stoffer Ct.

RAY SABO (44) began the 1977 varsity grid season as a fullback, but was transferred to flanker after Chelsea's first few games. The 5'9", 140-lb. junior said playing as a flanker was "like being an end, only the flanker lines up in the backfield." He added that his new position "requires speed," and he liked it "because I enjoy catching passes." A newcomer to the varsity squad, Sabo's best game was against Jackson Northwest. "In the game," he said, "I got to play more than in any other, had two tackles and a near interception, and played better on defense than in any

other game." Sabo chose Chelsea's game with Saline as the team's best this season. "We entered the game as underdogs," he explained, "and came from behind, 21-0, to win." In re-examining the season, Sabo said he thought the team could have done better than its 4-5 record. "We had the potential to win more, but we just fooled around during practice at first and weren't very serious." He said the team got stronger all around as the season progressed, and said the Bulldogs' game with South Lyon marked a real turning point for the squad. "That first win against South Lyon changed the tide, showing us we could win if we wanted to." Along with football, Sabo wrestles for Chelsea High. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Sabo of 165 E. Middle St.

ROBERT OSTRANDER (72), junior tackle for the varsity Bulldogs, joins Stafford and Sabo as a first-year member of the team. The 6'2", 210-lb. gridder said the position he really coveted was playing center, but added: "It's really hard to go to center when Don Harris is there." (Harris was selected for the second all-league team this season.) As a tackle, Ostrander lists his assignment as "blocking out other tackles and creating a hole so other running backs can go up the field." Ostrander said his best game this season was against Jackson Northwest because "I got a chance to play and make some tackles in the second half." He selected Chelsea's game with Saline as the team's best, giving the Bulldogs' come-from-behind win as the reason for his choice. In summarizing the 1977 grid season, Ostrander said: "Our first three games were our worst, but we did alright in the second part of the season. At the end, we started coming out to play good football." He noted that Chelsea's toughest games this year were against South Lyon and Saline, yet the team won them both. "Our defensive line was the real standout," Ostrander said. "The line made a lot of good plays." The gridder also pointed out a series of incidents which he said contributed to an advantage for the team. "The people that didn't want to play quit and stayed out," he said. In addition to football, Ostrander runs track for Chelsea High. He is the son of Mrs. Barbara Ostrander of 13150 Trist Rd.
