The Assistant Secretary of State and State Representative Mary Keith Ballantine and Senator Ed Pierce are expected to attend.

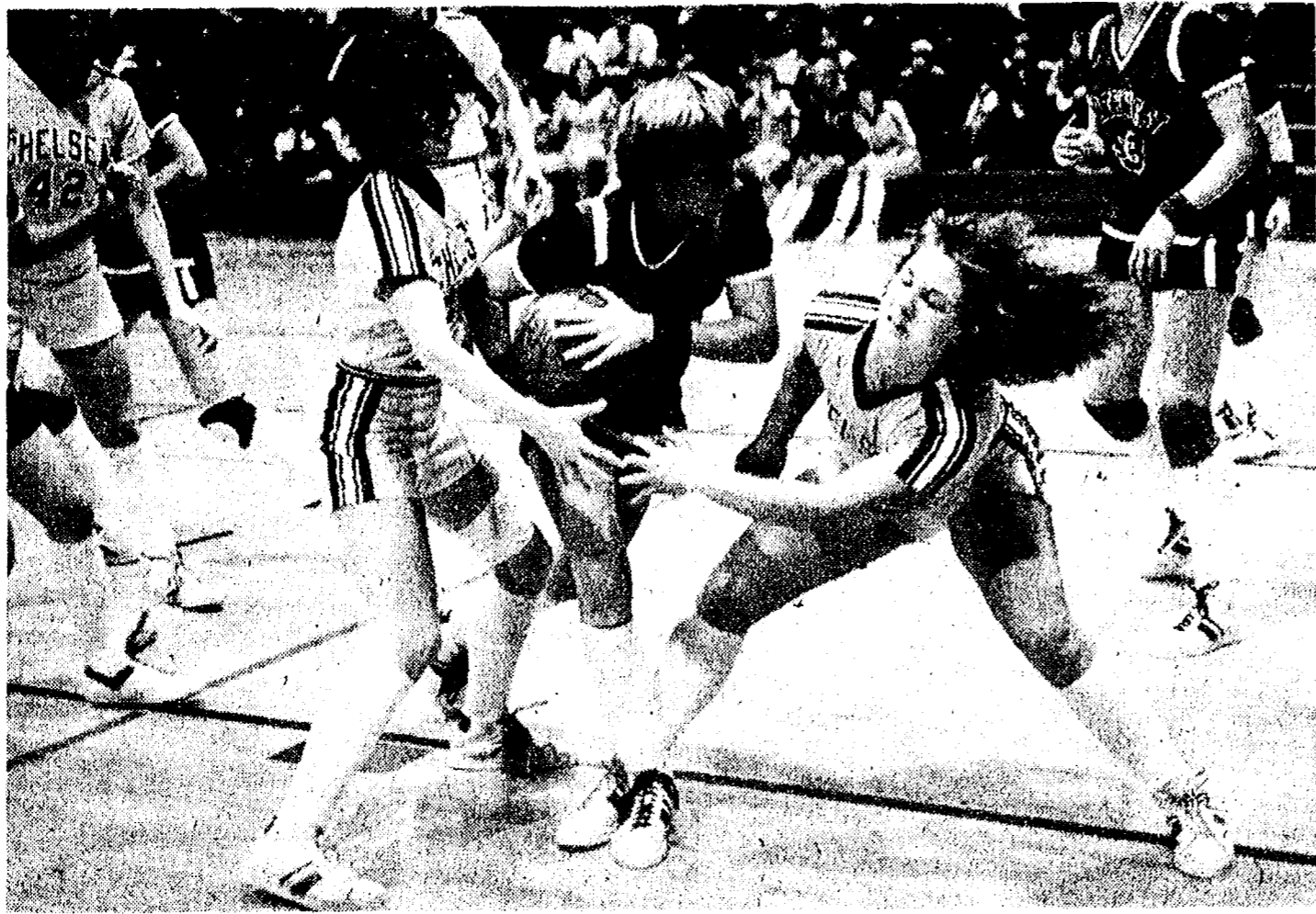

Girls Basketball Team Progresses to Finals of District Tournament

What do you do when you take on a team that has a record of 20-1 and has consecutively won its last 20 games? You work very hard. And, that's exactly what the lady Bulldogs were faced with and did on Saturday evening, Nov. 22 at Jackson Northwest. Jim Winter's ladies slid past the favored Mounties, Twin Valley Conference champions, with a 39-33 victory.

Advancing to the District 37 Championship game, the lady Bulldogs took on Columbia Central Tuesday evening, attempting to strengthen their State Championship bid.

In a total team effort, the Chelsea cagers came out in their typical fashion in the first quarter. They were slow, scoring only two points in the first four minutes of the game. The Mounties took an 8-2 lead, but by the end of the quarter, Chelsea had closed in, only down by two at 6-8.

The Bulldog defense looked good, the offense wasn't particularly glowing. But, with the second quarter finding Northwest cager Shelly Fulk being removed from the floor after her third foul, Chelsea took advantage of the situation and took the lead midway through, 12-10. The lady Bulldogs began to execute a bit better and by half-time, they held a slim 19-16 lead.

"We knew in the second quarter that we had no reason to fear them," Coach Winter explained. "We were just as good if not better than them."

As the third quarter opened, the Bulldogs came out and played as they had in the first quarter. They fell behind, but not by too much. The greatest lead by either team during the game was three points; excluding the opening period when Northwest took the lead and the closing minutes which determined the Bulldogs as the victors. Still, the Mounties took a minimal one-point 26-25 advantage into the final game quarter.

Still, Chelsea roared onto the floor in the fourth quarter. "The defense was humming and the offense was executing better," Winter commented. Though Northwest had tried to spoil the

Chelsea inside game, the Bulldogs were able to overcome it and outscored their opponents 14-7 in the final period of the contest. Chelsea took a four point lead with four minutes remaining and free throws assisted in the ultimate victory. The Bulldogs held on defensively, not allowing for the Mounties to sink any shots of consequence.

The key to the Chelsea victory was the performance of guards, Mary Jo Eisele and Jennifer Ringe. Eisele was responsible for getting her squad to roll during a sluggish second quarter. She completed seven of her nine game points then, shooting 67 percent from the floor. Ringe sunk 50 percent from the floor and successfully completed 83 percent from the foul line. The super offense outscored their opponents 28-7.

Mary Boylan also contributed to the eventual victory. In the fourth quarter, she added a three-point play-a basket and a free throw-to put her team up by two with six minutes remaining on the clock.

The lady Bulldogs held their poise very well. Leading scorers were Ringe with 19 points, Eisele with nine, Boylan with seven and Lorrie Vandegrift with four. Consequential rebounding was done by Boylan who grabbed the ball a total of 11 times while Amy Unterbrink snatched it nine times and assisted three times.

The stellar performance of the lady Bulldogs and the total team effort brought them just one step closer to a possible state girls basketball title, cake, frosting and all.

The junior varsity basketball team members were presented letters for their achievements by Coach Paul Terpstra.

Coach Gene LaFave and varsity assistants Jim Tallman and Wayne Welton presented varsity awards to 32 members from the 1980 Bulldog football squad. The coveted "Most Valuable Player" and "Outstanding Linebacker" awards were bestowed upon senior team captain Eric Headrick. Recognized as the "Most Improved Player" was

Scott Chapman while Steve Wilson earned honors as the "Outstanding Back."

The junior varsity certificates were presented to the second year Bulldogs by Coaches Jon Schaffner and Robin Raymond.

Coach Jim Ticknor recognized 23 freshman football players for their 1980 seasonal efforts.

For the first time at Chelsea High, girls tennis and girls cross country teams were organized. Tennis Coach Kerry Schreiner honored 10 girls for their first year of varsity tennis competition. Earning the "Most Valuable Player" award was the doubles duo of Ann Eisele and Amy Ziegler. Carolyn Chandler was selected as the "Most Improved Player" on the 1980 tennis team.

The girls cross country team earned recognition by qualifying two lady harriers for the State Finals this year. Varsity letters were earned by three cross country team members while four lady harriers received junior varsity recognition. Sandra Frame was the recipient of the 1980 "Most Valuable Player" award and Lisa Vandegrift was deemed the "Most Improved Player" of the season.

Girls swimming Coach Dave Johnson presented varsity letters to 13 Chelsea tankers. Presently, his team is still in competition. Therefore, individual team honors will be determined at a later date.

John Welton and Troy Schiller were honored as the "Most Valuable" and "Most Improved" members, respectively, of Coach Ken Larson's 1980 golf team.

Coach Helen Bareis honored her varsity cheerleaders for their excellent support and work this fall. Five seniors and two juniors earned varsity letters.

Freshman and junior varsity cheerleading awards were presented by Coach Sue Starkey. These girls spent many hours preparing signs as well as cheering at football games.

The 12-member Chelsea boys cross country team finished its 1980 season ranking 20th in the state; not a bad year's work for the dozen harriers. Nine of them earned varsity letters and the re-

Featured musicians for the production are Sandy Rucker, piano, Ellen Sudia, oboe, and Rochelle Martinez-Mouilleseaux, harp.

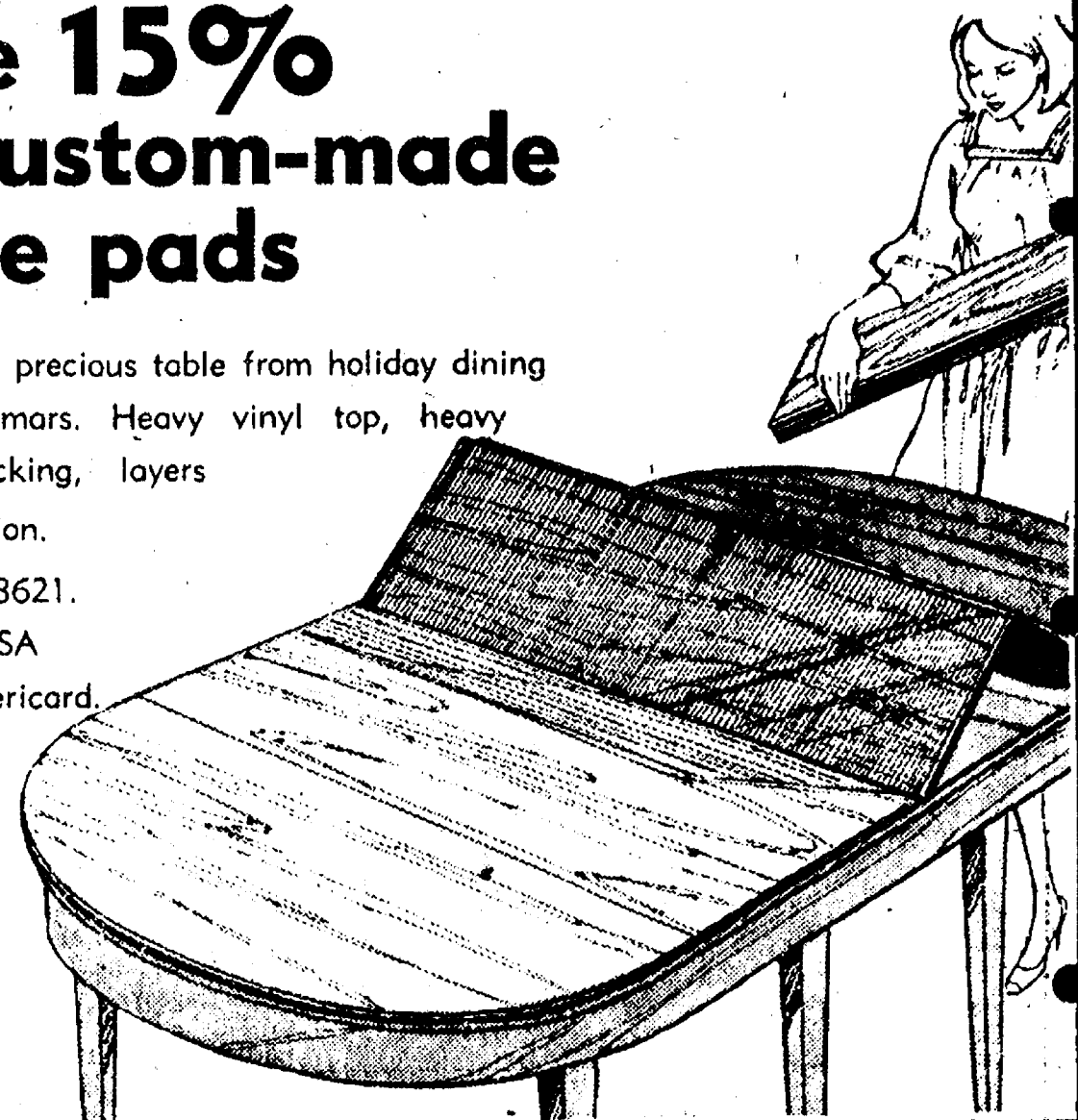

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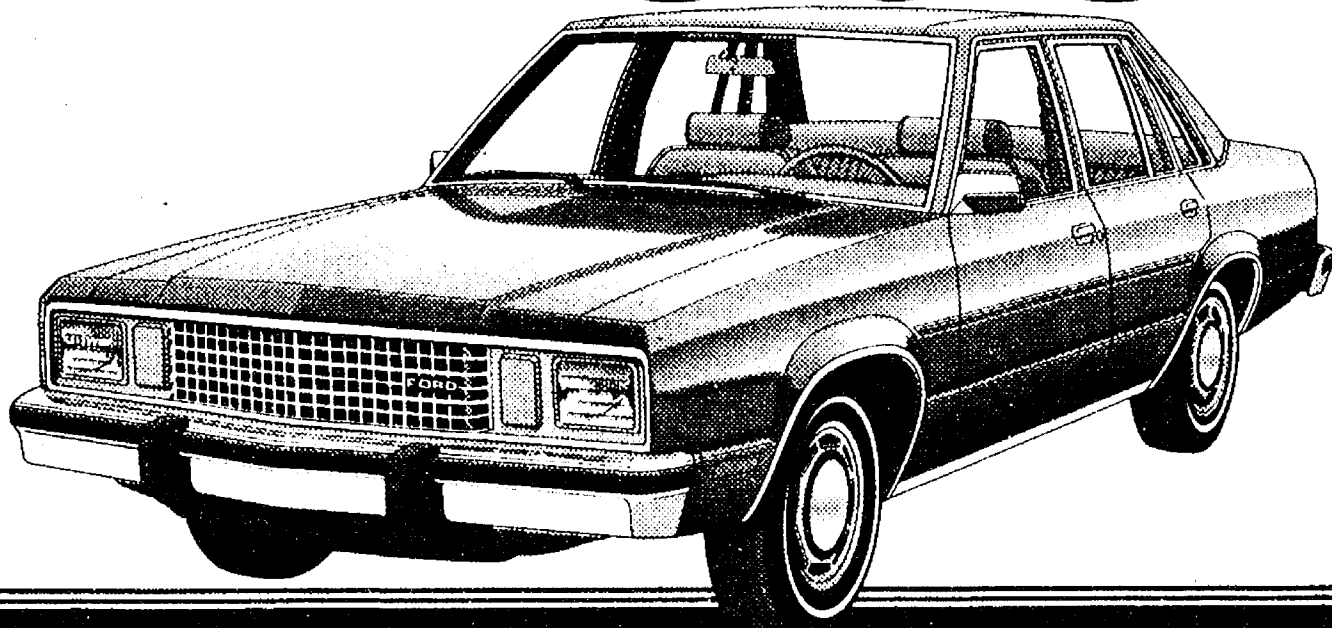

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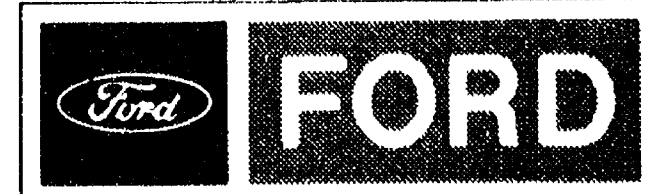

Lodi Township Man Charged With Illegal Shooting Six Deer

Following the anonymous tip and subsequent seizure of six illegally shot deer from a Lodi township garage, the residents of St. Louis Boy's School will be dining heartily on venison for the next few weeks.

Department of Natural Resources conservation officers and a sheriff's deputy were responsible for the confiscation which took place last Monday, Nov. 17. Upon attaining a search warrant, the officers entered the garage to find six untagged deer hanging from the rafters. In addition, they discovered a skinning knife, gun and meat cleaver. Entering the house, two more guns were located.

All of the hunting, skinning and cleaning paraphernalia, as well as the white-tailed sxtet were removed to the Pinckney Recreation Area headquarters to be used as evidence.

The homeowner, in whose garage the deer were discovered, was served with a notice to appear in court for an arraignment on charges of having untagged deer in his possession.

The conservation and sheriff's officers responsible for the confiscation credit the Department of Natural Resources Report All Poachers program (RAP), a new addition to the department. The program has been widely publicized across the state and urges citizens to contact local law enforcement officers or a toll free DNR number in Lansing (1-800-292-7800) to report what they believe to be incidents of poaching or other violations of the state's fish and game laws.

In the long run, though many of these situations are based on greed, in this instance, the St. Louis School will enjoy venison in every way, shape and form throughout the coming weeks.

Apparently following the arraignment of the Lodi township poacher, the six deer will be delivered to the Chelsea area school.

Four Lady Bulldogs Win All-SEC Honors

Chelsea's four lady Bulldogs honored by being named to the 1980 Southeastern Conference's All-League teams or given honorable mention include first team cager Jennifer Ringe, second team choice Mary Boylan and honorable mention cagers Amy Unterbrink and Lorie Vandegrift.

Ringe, a 5'5" senior guard who sports jersey number 24, had a total of 159 SEC points, an average of 13.3 per league contest. During the regular season, she made 20 rebounds, 31 assists and had a team high of 38 steals. She completed 60 field goals, an average of five per game with 35 percent accuracy. Too, Ringe was responsible for 39 free throws, shooting with 68 percent accuracy for a game average of 3.6 free throws completed. In playing all 48 league game quarters, she received 28 fouls or 2.3 per contest.

Boylan, a 6' senior forward and center, wears Ringe's jersey number in reverse. As number 42, Boylan contributed 104 league points, 8.7 per game. She was responsible for an average of 11.6 rebounds per contest and had a league total of 139. She made 12 assists, 25 steals and blocked nine opponent shots. Shooting with 41 percent accuracy, Boylan made 43 field goals or approximately 3.6 per contest. Her free throw percentage of 49 was determined by her completion of 18 free throws or 1.5 per league battle. She surpassed her teammates in fouls. With a total of 36, she averaged three in each game. Like Ringe, Boylan competed in all 48 game quarters, seeing some action in each period of the Bulldogs' 12-game league season.

Unterbrink, the Bulldogs' 6' junior forward/center wears jersey number 31. In her 12 league games, she netted a total of 90 points or 7.5 per game. With 116 rebounds to her credit, Unterbrink made an average of 9.7 grabs in each contest. In addition, she made 24 assists, 12 steals and blocked 16 shots. With 46 percent accuracy, Unterbrink made an average of 3 field goals in every game for a season total of 36. She sunk 18 free throws and shooting with 44 percent accuracy, she averaged 1.5 per contest. Following 48 game quarters played, she had a game average of 2.2 fouls and a season total of 26.

Vandegrift, number 33, stands 5'8" tall and serves as a forward for the lady Bulldogs. As a senior, she added 60 points to Bulldog scoreboards this season and averaged 5 points per game. With 78 rebounds, Vandegrift averaged 6.5 a night. She assisted twice, stole the ball six times and blocked three shots during the 12-game league season. With a season total of 23 field goal completions, she shot with 43 percent accuracy and successfully sunk 1.9 per contest. Free throws totalled 16 or 1.3 per game and Vandegrift completed them with a 33 percent accuracy level. She was called on 32 fouls, an average of 2.7 in each game and played approximately 3.7 quarters per contest for a season tally of 44 game quarters in which she participated.

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New Rehabilitation Program Started at Chelsea Hospital



INPATIENT REHABILITATION UNIT: Dr. Larry Handelsman, a board certified specialist in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, is the head of a new Inpatient Rehabilitation Unit opened at Chelsea Community Hospital this week. Physicians, nurses, physical, occupational, recreational and speech therapists and social workers will be included in the program that is intended to deliver co-ordinated services to patients with physical disabilities following illnesses such as strokes or head injuries.

This week Chelsea Community Hospital opened an inpatient rehabilitation unit. Objective of the program is to deliver co-ordinated rehabilitation services to patients with physical disabilities following illnesses such as strokes or head injuries.

The new program will be under the direction of Dr. Larry Handelsman, a board certified specialist in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, and will include physicians, nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech therapists, and social workers. Involvement of the patient and family in planning and evaluating their care will be a major component of the program.

Will Johnson, administrator, stated that though the hospital has treated such patients in the past, the program offers a more co-ordinated, comprehensive approach which allows for treatment of a larger number of patients.

Commenting on the expanded program, Dr. Handelsman said "Chelsea Community Hospital provides an ideal atmosphere for the rehabilitation of patients with chronic disabilities. In this country setting we will be able to concentrate not only on patient centered programs, but involve the entire family.

Norman Brehob Associated With Taxpayers Union

George Snyder, president of the National Taxpayers Union has announced that Norman M. Brehob of Chelsea, has been appointed a volunteer Field Associate for NTU's People Power Plan. This program is a new organizing effort designed to bring local taxpayer activism into the national taxpayer's movement.

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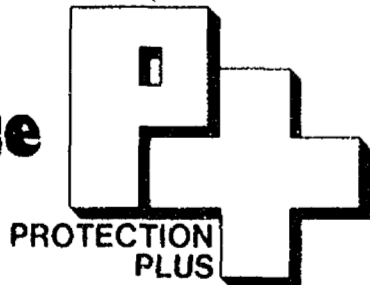
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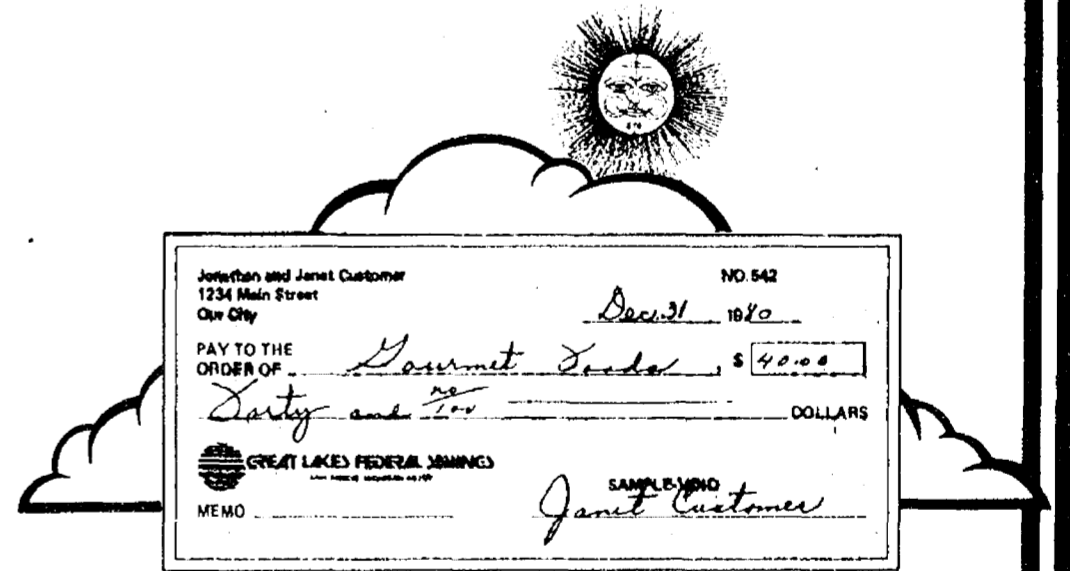

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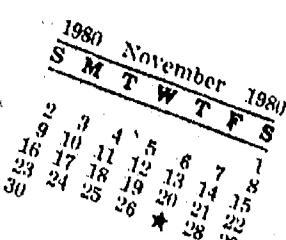
