The Assistant Secretary of State and State Representative ary Keith Ballantine and Senator Ed Pierce are expected to attend.



Jim Winter's ladies slid past the favored Mounties, Twin Valley Conference champions, with a 39-33 victory.

Advancing to the District 37 Championship game, the lady Bulldogs took on Columbia Central Tuesday evening, attempting to strengthen their State Championship bid.

In a total team effort, the Chelsea cagers came out in their typical fashion in the first quarter. They were slow, scoring only two points in the first four minutes of the game. The Mounties took an 8-2 lead, but by the end of the quarter, Chelsea had closed in, only down by two at 6-8.

The Bulldog defense looked good, the offense wasn't particularly glowing. But, with the second quarter finding Northwest cager Shelly Fulk being removed from the floor after her third foul, Chelsea took advantage of the situation and took the lead mid-'way through, 12-10. The lady Bulldogs began to execute a bit better and by half-time, they held a slim 19-16 lead.

"We knew in the second quarter that we had no reason to fear them," Coach Winter explained. "We were just as good if not better than them."

As the third quarter opened, the Bulldogs came out and played as they had in the first quarter. They fell behind, but not by too much. The greatest lead by either team during the game was three points; excluding the opening period when Northwest took the lead and the closing minutes which determined the Bulldogs as the victors. Still, the Mounties took a minimal one-point 26-25 advantage into the final game quarter.

Still, Chelsea roared onto the floor in the fourth quarter. "The defense was humming and the offense was executing better," Winter commented. Though Northwest had tried to spoil the Chelsea inside game, the Bulldogs were able to overcome it and outscored their opponents 14-7 in the final period of the contest. Chelsea took a four point lead with four minutes remaining and free throws assisted in the ultimate victory. The Bulldogs held on defensively, not allowing for the Mounties to sink any shots of consequence.

The key to the Chelsea victory was the performance of guards, Mary Jo Eisele and Jennifer Ringe. Eisele was responsible for getting her squad to roll during a sluggish second quarter. She completed seven of her nine game points then, shooting 67 percent from the floor. Ringe sunk 50 percent from the floor and successfully completed 83 percent from the foul line. 

Agreement Reached on Pigeon River Drilling

Oil and gas drilling in the Pigeon River Forest Country could begin as early as January as a result of a compromise agreement reached between environmental groups and oil companies holding leases in the area.

The agreement could solve a 12-year struggle between the groups. The battle has been in and out of the courts for the duration of the period which saw the state Supreme Court invalidate a previous consent agreement.

Webb Smith, attorney for the principal oil companies involved, said all parties in the controversy still believe in the 1976 consent order but the companies have agreed to more stringent controls to resolve the impasse.

Smith represented Amoco Production Co., Shell Oil Co., and the Northern Michigan Exploration

The consent order was approv-

Commission providing environmental requirements for the extraction of oil and gas from the environmentally sensitive area.

The order provided for the oil companies holding leases to drill on 10 sites in the least sensitive area in the southern one-third of the 96,000-acre forest area.

Ken Sikkema, executive director of the West Michigan Environmental Action Council which has been waging a court battle to stop the drilling, said the issue is still the forest and its protection.

He said the protection issue is maintained in the proposed compromise. He also defended a shift from a previous "no drill" stance by stating that environmentalists have to be flexible to make any environmental progress.

Sikkema said the state's economic condition was a major factor in the compromise position taken by the environmental groups.

vironmental case to a person who is unemployed," he said.

To carry out the terms of the agreement, legislative, judicial, and administrative action must be carried out.

The legislature would have to complete action on a bill (SB 1119) by including within the language provisions of the new agreement.

The courts would have to, upon the request of the plaintiffs, vacate injunctions which halted drilling at the 10 test sites and other parts of the forest.

The Natural Resources Commission also must amend its original consent order to include additional provisions of the agreement.

Specifics of the agreement include sequential drilling moving from the most sensitive area to another area only after compliance with a variety of protections.

The oil companies also would fund studies on general improvements to forest management techniques while time and production limits would be imposed and marginal wells would be closed.

A public advisory panel to oversee activity in the forest would be created and the Department of Natural Resources would be charged with increased surveillance duties at all well sites.

Additionally, the parties have agreed that the director of the Department of Natural Resources should develop stringent gate and lock requirement for all access roads, restrictions of off-road vehicle usage; stricter brine and sour gas disposal procedures and update all contingency plans associated with the original 1976 consent order.


# Debate Teams Host Tourney

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
