Used Motor Oil Recycling Spots Listed

The Ecology Center of Ann Arbor and the Co-Operative Extension Service have announced a list of auto service stations that are participating in a new oil recycling program. Each station will allow people who change their own motor oil to deposit used oil in the station's collection tank for recycling. From there the oil will be taken to a refinery and turned into new motor oil.

To recycle your used oil, just bring it to one of the following stations during their normal business hours in a secure container—an old milk carton will do—and ask the attendant where to put it.

Local oil collection centers include Fletcher Mobil in Chelsea and Dick's Place and Webster Church Recycling Station in Dexter.

Used oil is a valuable resource, but it often becomes an environmental pollutant when disposed of in the trash, poured down the sewers, or spread on the ground. Recycling oil saves energy and keeps toxic waste out of the environment.



ULTRALIGHT AIRCRAFT is a unique, relatively new flying method that, according to Dr. Robert Burns of Chelsea, is the closest thing to unrestricted, enjoyable free flight available. The crafts are fly.

Ultralight Aircraft Provides New Freedom In Man's Flight

"Take one crisp dawn, lace it liberally with anticipation and stir with the steady beat of a hardwood propeller. Then savor all the adventure you can handle. The secret ingredient, of course, is a microlight aircraft." According to Robert Burns, a local dentist, the above advertisement for ultralight airplanes is a pure recipe for the nearest thing to unrestricted enjoyable free flight available.

Building and flying these airplanes that are called ultralights—because they fly on wings of Dacron sail cloth and lawn chair aluminum tubing with wind and cables and a pilot's legs for landing gear—has become a modern day aviation rebirth and sport that is as old as man's desire to fly. And fly they can and do with chain saw and go-cart motors mounted on a tubular frame and turning a three- to five-foot propeller. At least one local person has been crossing the skies over Chelsea on colorful wings of Dacron with his feet hanging down.

Dr. Burns explains that he built his first aircraft from blueprints and basic components that were supplied by Weedhopper, Inc. of Utah. This craft took approximately one month to build, working week-ends and nights and taking about 50 hours construction time. "I was never thrilled with the design or with the quality of materials and thus never flew it more than a few feet off the ground before selling it," he stated.

In the spring of 1981, he pur-

chased a Quicksilver, the best that is manufactured and sold by Elpperformance, Inc. of San Marcos, Calif. This craft was originally designed as a glider in 1972 and has become a classic in its own time. The Quicksilver kit is one of the sport's most popular designs and exhibits technical advancement, articulate craftsmanship and high quality materials. "I assembled the kit in one week-end, about 25 hours. All the parts are cut to size, drilled and finished. The Dacron sail is completely formed and is generally comprised of six or seven bright and beautiful colors," he explained.

Flying an ultralight aircraft is like reducing flight to its bare essence. As the pilot, you sit suspended from the main wing in a nylon harness with only the breeze of the forward movement of the aircraft in your face. The propeller on the Quicksilver is a pusher type, so the pilot sits with the propeller, noise and propeller thrust behind him. Even the control of the craft is the essence of simplicity, as the directions and altitude of the craft is controlled by a shift of the pilot's weight.

"One hand controls the throttle, the other is for waving at people below," explained Burns. Aircraft cruise speed is about 35 miles per hour and flight duration can be as long as two hours, based on three gallons of fuel. "The specifications say that the craft can go to 9,000 feet, but I've only been about 2,000 feet off the ground," he said. "Once aloft, it's fun to shut the motor off and simply soar or glide down."

The craft can be started in air by pulling the starter cord on the Yamaha 100 cc go-cart engine

that delivers about 23 horse power.

Dr. Burns says that it is particularly enjoyable to fly slowly over the surrounding countryside and his farm just west of Chelsea, looking at the deer, geese and farm animals below.

The various ultralight manufacturers state that to fly an ultralight aircraft is quick and easy. Most of the manufacturers state that learning to fly an ultralight aircraft is quick and easy. Most of the manufacturers suggest a couple hours instruction with the dealer before a pilot goes off on his own. Currently, no FAA license is required for ultralight aircrafts. The only rules that must be observed deal with areas that a craft should not be flown such as into a controlled airport or within 1,000 feet above a highly populated area.

What makes the aircraft even more fun is its portability, as it can be folded up to be carried on a car top or in the back of a pickup truck to transport it to the beach or to one's garage. Set up time takes approximately 15 minutes and for the hearty, this type of craft can be launched by picking it up and running a short distance. It can be landed on the pilot's feet at little more than a walking speed or by using the landing gear or wheels.

The cost of ultralight flying? Very similar to the cost of a nice motorcycle and perhaps safer. The aircraft kits generally cost in the \$3,000 range and cost approximately \$1 per hour to fly.

"For me, building and flying an ultralight aircraft is the closest

I'll ever come to growing wings of my own. It's an exhilarating experience of freedom that is difficult to compare with anything else," explained Dr. Burns.



Idling Car Wastes Gas

The amount of time a car can idle without wasting gasoline probably is a lot less than most motorists think, according to the Michigan Department of Commerce's Energy Administration. "An idling car can waste up to a gallon of gas an hour," said Joann Neuroth, acting director of the Administration. "By limiting idling time to 30 seconds, drivers can obtain maximum efficiency."

"Many motorists believe that starting a car uses as much gas as idling for 10 or 15 minutes," she said. "But studies show that starting a warm engine uses only the fuel it would take to idle for 30-seconds."

The Energy Administration has several free publications dealing with fuel efficiency, including gas mileage guides for new cars, car-pooling guides and tips on alternative fuels. Also available are more than 200 publications concerning energy conservation and renewable energy resources.



Task Force on Small Communities Submits Report

The Michigan Task Force on Small and Rural Communities, whose 19 members addressed the concerns and problems of small and rural communities, including transportation, regulation and growth, has submitted their final report to Gov. Milliken.

Their recommendations included: establishment of a rural regulation review board, development of an agricultural preservation strategy, increased funding for forestry, active state promotion of rural economic development, establishment of a rail use plan for rural areas, and expansion of rural extension services.

The task force held five public forums to surface the special problems and needs of communities of fewer than 50,000 people, before submitting their recommendations.

Ask the Governor

Question: You've said in the past that you would like to see agriculture take up some of the economic slack caused by recession in the auto industry. What steps do you plan to take in this direction?

Governor: Agriculture is a stabilizing factor in Michigan's economy and its expansion will be a critical factor in the state's economic development. It generates \$16 billion annually and has been expanding at a rate of 10 to 15 percent each year. To further that expansion, I have set several goals for Michigan agriculture drawn from recommendations made to me by the Governor's Conference on Agriculture which met in April.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture will give immediate priority to expanding agribusiness production and marketing, especially in soybean processing; increased pork and hard cheese production; reestablishing poultry breeding; establishing a regional beef processing plant, and encouraging alternative energy source production from agricultural products, such as gasohol.

As an example of why we need increased processing capacity, Michigan has dramatically increased its soybean production, yet nearly all soybeans grown in Michigan are shipped to other states for processing into meal. Michigan's

swine and poultry producers are large consumers of this meal. We export the raw material, then turn around and buy it back at a higher price because of transportation costs. We need to attract soybean processing facilities with all the intensity and interdepartmental co-operation that we exhibited in attracting the Volkswagen plant to Michigan, because it will not only provide jobs but also help us to expand our hog and poultry production.

Michigan State University's extensive agricultural research, veterinary medicine and cooperative extension programs will receive increased budget support. Included in that support is a call for Michigan State University to begin construction of a plant and soil science building as a means of attracting scientific talent and improving research capabilities.

Greater emphasis will be placed on Michigan farm products in our over-all effort to increase the sale of Michigan products abroad.

In addition, I signed into law in July the "Michigan Right To Farm Act," which will protect farms and farmers from increased commercial and residential development, and also from restrictive ordinances and lawsuits related to odor and noise.







John Miller Is First 'Small' Race Male Pilot

The first male pilot was accepted as a contestant in the 26th Annual Michigan "Small" Race, which started and finished at the W. K. Kellogg Regional Airport in Battle Creek on Saturday, Aug. 15, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

The race is sponsored by the four Michigan Chapters of the Ninety-Nines, an International Organization of Women Pilots formed in 1929 by Amelia Earhart, and the Michigan Aeronautics Commission. Traditionally, women pilots only have been permitted to race but men have served in the cockpit as co-pilots.

The male entry is John Miller, an air transport pilot who lives at 3747 McKinley Rd. who has ASMEI, CONVAIR 580, G-1159, Rotocraft and flight instructor ratings. He has logged a total of 8,500 hours in flight time.

Small only in comparison to the Powder Puff Derby, inception of the Small Race was in 1956 when the All Women's Transcontinental Air Race terminated in Flint. The Small Race was flown from Flint to Harbor Springs where the International Convention of the Ninety-Nines was taking place. Twenty-two cities in Michigan have hosted the race which became a round-robin event in 1960 starting and finishing in Muskegon.

The race was a test of skill, proficiency and safety in flying. It is a three-legged round robin cross-country flight of not more than 250 statute miles for stock model, fixed wing, single or multi-engine aircraft not exceeding 420 total horse power. Each aircraft flies the assigned route. Official timers at each of three locations recorded the time as each aircraft passes. The pilot finishing with an over-all speed score closest to the handicap speed for his/her airplane is given winner's honors.





EVEN A LITTLE KID CAN DO IT: This youngster is learning how easy it is to get up-to-the-minute weather information from a new electronic radio system the Michigan Department of Transportation is installing in all 76 rest areas along Michigan freeways. By merely pushing a button on a board mounted in the lobby of the restroom facility, travelers will hear a recorded message describing weather conditions in the area. In cases of severe weather, such as tornadoes or blizzards, the system will automatically switch on and broadcast emergency bulletins. This is the first system installed at a rest area east of Lansing on I-96, and plans call for having them in all rest areas by the fall of 1982. Federal funds are paying 90 percent of the cost.

SYLVAN TOWNSHIP BOARD

The Sylvan Township Board at their regular meeting held Tuesday, August 4, 1981, unanimously adopted the following:

- 1. Delete definition of "Trailer Coach" in Article 2.
2. Delete existing Section 3.14 and replace with the following:

"SECTION 3.14 - MOBILE HOMES

A. Purpose - This section of the zoning ordinance is designed to establish regulations under which mobile homes may be used as single-family dwellings on lots outside of mobile home parks. It is hereby recognized that other forms of manufactured housing, commonly referred as prefabricated, modular, or sectional housing, among other names, are and have been permitted in Sylvan Township, on individual lots, in any zoning district in which single-family dwellings are permitted, provided such units comply with the adopted building code and zoning requirements. This section intends to treat mobile homes in a similar fashion, while recognizing the unique features of their construction. The regulations contained in this section are specifically designed to:

- 1. Insure compliance of mobile homes on individual lots with zoning regulations applicable to all other single-family dwellings permitted in Sylvan Township.
2. Insure compliance with the Michigan State Construction Code and all Township codes, in addition to the zoning ordinance, for the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare.
3. To be aesthetically compatible with other single-family dwellings in the community.

B. Standards and Requirements - A mobile home may be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot outside a mobile home park, if the following standards and requirements are met. These standards and requirements shall not apply to a mobile home located in a licensed mobile home park.

- 1. The lot shall be located in a zoning district which permits single-family dwellings.
2. The lot and the mobile home shall comply with all regulations of the zoning district in which located.
3. The mobile home shall meet all requirements for residential mobile units, as provided in the Michigan State Construction Code.
4. The mobile home shall be placed on and anchored to a permanent foundation wall. The wall shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction Code and shall completely enclose the area under the mobile home. The area so enclosed shall not be less than the ground floor area of the mobile home. The method of anchoring the mobile home to the foundation wall shall meet all State of Michigan requirements.
5. The wheels, tongue and hitch, or other towing appurtenances, shall be removed before attaching the mobile home to the foundation wall.
6. The mobile home shall be connected to public water and sanitary sewer lines, where available, according to Township standards and specifications, or to a well and septic tank, on the same lot as the mobile home, approved by the County Health Department.
7. The mobile home shall be aesthetically compatible in design and appearance with conventional on-site constructed housing, and other types of approved manufactured housing. Compatibility shall be determined by the following standards.

- a. Exterior walls shall be finished with natural or simulated natural materials, common to single-family dwellings such as, but not limited to, beveled siding, vertical siding, board and batten siding, or brick.
b. Front and rear or front and side exterior doors.
c. A roof drainage system which will collect, and condense off, roof drainage, and will avoid roof drainage along the sides of the dwellings.
8. A building permit shall be required for construction of the foundation wall, for placement of the mobile home on the lot, and for any addition to the mobile home. A building permit shall not be issued until a health permit has been issued by the County Health Department, where applicable and until a certificate of zoning compliance has been issued in accordance with Article 58, herein, and is in effect. The mobile home shall not be occupied until a certificate of occupancy has been issued as provided in Article 58, herein, and is in effect. Any addition to a mobile home shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction Code.
9. The mobile home, prior to any additions, shall have a minimum floor area of 1,000 square feet, a minimum exterior width of 24 feet for at least one side elevation, and a minimum floor-to-ceiling height of 7.5 feet.
10. Not more than one mobile home shall be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot, nor shall a mobile home be placed on any lot on which another single-family dwelling is located. A mobile home shall not be used as an accessory building in any residential district.
11. A mobile home shall not be removed from a foundation until a permit therefore has been issued in accordance with the Michigan State Construction Code.

SECTION 2. All remaining provisions of the Sylvan Township Zoning Ordinance and all prior amendments not inconsistent herewith and be the same are hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

Hospital Urges Use of Children's Car Seats

The Catherine McAuley Health Center, three local Jaycee auxiliaries, and the University of Michigan Highway Safety Research Institute are working together to help ensure that the thousands of babies born each year at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital ride home in the safety of an infant car seat.

"Averaging about 300 deliveries each month, St. Joseph's is the leading birthing center in the greater Washtenaw area, and thus has a special responsibility to help inform expectant parents about the urgent need for infant car seats," said pediatrician Daniel Chapman, M.D., associate medical director of the hospital's Newborn Nursery.

Chapman pointed out that automobile accidents are the number one killer of children in the U. S.

"This situation is especially tragic when you consider that numerous studies clearly show that using car seats could reduce these fatalities by 90 percent," he emphasized.

Chapman noted that the Michigan legislature has cleared a "child car seat" law that, upon Governor Milliken's approval, will become effective in the spring of 1982, making Michigan the 8th state to enact such legislation.

The law in essence will require that all children under the age of 4 must be restrained by a car seat when in front. In back, only children under 1 year must be in a seat; those between 1 and 4 may

use either car seats or lap belts, Chapman said.

In many situations, the law permits those receiving citations to eliminate the \$10 fine by obtaining a car seat prior to appearance in court.

Chapman said parents "ought to accept car seat usage as ready-

Michigan Cattle Brucellosis-Free For First Time

For the first time in Michigan history, no state cattle are under quarantine for brucellosis, reports the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Only 11 other states are currently listed as being brucellosis-free. Last year, Michigan had two herds under quarantine; during the early 1950s, there were nearly 7,000.

According to Dr. Charles Cole, chief of the MDA Animal Health and Meat Inspection Division, brucellosis is one of the most infectious and at one time was the most widespread of cattle diseases. Although it can attack other farm animals, its major threat is to cattle and swine. There is no known cure and infected animals frequently show no symptoms. Such animals become the source of infection for other animals, Dr. Cole said.

BADMOUTH OR SWEETMOUTH?

I know it's not a pleasant subject, but halitosis is a fact of human life. It is not a disease, but a sign that something is happening in your mouth. It might be as simple as the natural action of saliva on bits of food or as serious as tooth decay, gum disease or even the symptom of a more serious disease.

Bits of food left in the mouth, is by far, the most common cause. Food debris gets caught in any number of places in the mouth, mixes with bacteria and the product is "bad breath." Onion, garlic, alcohol and tobacco, by their nature, can also cause foul breath. Cavities (which are food traps for bacteria), tartar buildup, and poorly-fitting dentures are also common causes of halitosis.

What can you do about halitosis? It's a simple, two-pronged approach: dental appointments on a regular basis and regular home care for your teeth. The dentist will fill the cavities, remove the tartar, and make sure the bridges and dentures fit. A proper brushing and flossing regimen is the key to your personal dental hygiene. Between brushings, rinse your mouth to dislodge food particles. Be a sweetmouth!
