
Gregory Teacher in **Auto Crash**

Students Perform Well in Michigan Assessment Tests

The Michigan Assessment tests are administered every fall to all fourth, seventh and tenth graders. They provide information on what students are learning and doing compared with what administration wants them to know and do. The tests consist of selected minimum performance objectives in the subject areas of reading and

The test was revised and the new version first used in 1980-81. Thus, the 1980-81 test results act

as a baseline for those of next answered all of the questions at year. The results are used individually and district-wide. Teachers use the results to work with the individual students and improve their areas of weakness, and the administrators and teachers used the district results for curriculum revision.

District-wide, Chelsea students did very well on the assessment tests. An average of all mathematics and reading results indicates approximately 82 percent of the Chelsea students

the highest attainment level. The following proportions reports for reading and mathematics indicate the percentage of our students who attained approximately 75 percent or more of the objectives on the test. This information is given for grades four, seven and ten and indicates results for 1980 and 1981.

In reading, grade four received 81.8 percent in 1980 compared to 82.4 percent in 1981. Seventh graders attained 89.4 percent in 1980 while 1981 saw a drop to 83.6 percent as the attained average. The only group exhibiting an over-all higher percentage rate was grade 10 which found a 1980' average of 81 percent while 1981 produced an average of 89 per-

The proportions report regarding mathematics found fourth graders dropping from 84 percent in 1980 to 82.4 percent in 1981. Seventh graders recorded an identical over-all percentage rate during the two years, holding steady at 82.5 percent. Tenth grade results improved by nearly 10 percentage points, from 63.8 percent in 1980 to 72.9 percent in

District-wide, the reading scores as indicated by the percentage of students in the top achievement category increased at grade four and grade 10 and declined slightly at grade seven.

The math scores declined at grade four, remained stable at grade seven and increased at grade 10.

The parents of Chelsea fourth, seventh and tenth graders will be receiving their individual student's results. Parents are encouraged to contact their child's teachers for further information or help for their children.

Susan Carter, testing coordinator for the Chelsea School District, indicates that the schools are pleased with student scores on a district-wide basis. In cases where a decline in scores is evident, this information is being analyzed and remediation procedures are being instituted.



Interest Rate Deregulation Dropped; Floating Rate Probable

Legislative leaders have reached an agreement to negotiate new interest rate ceilings for consumer loans and further have agreed to drop the push for near total interest deregulation.

The interest rate package has also been postponed until the first of next year when the Legislature returns for the second year of the two-year session.

Governor William G, Milliken has additionally narrowed the outlines of his positions so the Legislature will have acceptable executive office outlines in which. to work.

The effort will focus on writing a package with a floating interest. rate ceiling, except for rigid maximums for land contracts and bank credit cards.

Following a meeting with the Credit Coaliation of Michigan, a group of banking interests, and legislative leaders on the subject, Representative William Keith (D-Garden City) said the parties had also agreed in principle to legislation providing for an over-

One major area of the issue not yet resolved is whether the cap will be tied to the treasury bill discount or to the coupon rate.

The coupon rate is what a note will actually yield compared to the interest rate on a note when it

Some consumer loans would be affected differently.

First mortgages could still go up to 25 percent as they have since 1969.

Discussions now center around letting second mortgages also go to the 25 percent rate though that could prove very controversial.

Discussions on land contracts would set them at 15 percent compared to the current maximum of 11 percent.

On credit cards, Keith said he favors a maximum of 1.75 percent per month, an effective annual rate of 21 percent while retailers favor a 2 percent a . month, or 24 percent a year rate.

Before the package is agreed to, Keith said, there will be discussions between Milliken and House Speaker Bobby Crim of Davison to get a better understanding of what floating rate that they could accept.

Milliken would not be more specific, in declaring what he would accept, than to say a floating rate of 8-10 percent above the treasury bill rate.

Jeff Lantis Named All-State Gridder

Chelsea has never before had an All-State football player but this year 6-foot, 165-pound Jeff Lantis has been put at the top of the list as a first team All-State Class B player as selected by a consensus made up of The Detroit News and the Associated Press (AP) and United Press International (UPI) wire service polls of high school coaches. Being named All-State is his reward for four years of hard work and the choice is understandable.

Lantis holds virtually every career record at Chelsea High school. He holds every CHS receiving record but one, the most receiving yardage in any one season, set by former teammate Jeff Dils. Nevertheless, Lantis holds the Chelsea record for most career yardage (1,363), most career catches (94), and most catches in any one season (51) and most touchdown receptions (16). This past season, Jeff was responsible for catching 51 passes, good for 805 yards and 10 touchdowns.

According to Coach Gene LaFave, Jeff is an outstanding worker who, many mornings during the season, worked on his pass patterns to perfect his techniques. He is a very fine leader deserving of his All-State

He has the opportunity to play football at the collegiate level though his size and speed limitations are hindrances. Still, he more than compensates with his execution of precise pass patterns. One overlooked point is Jeff's courage and concentration on the ball. He keyed the option attack on the outside, playing the positions of defensive end and outside linebacker expertly.

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LaFave explains that Lantis is an intelligent player who is capable of adapting on the field as fluctuating circumstances arise. Too, he can communicate with the other players on any given occasion.

In addition to his recent recognition. Lantis had been a unanimous" choice for the All-League and All-County first teams for two consecutive seasons. This season, Jeff was also named All-Jackson county by the Citizen Patriot and took first team honors on the All Metro-West Detroit News football squad.

Lantis, according to Gene LaFave. is a dominant player with the necessary driving force to help lead his team to a fine 1981 record. In his four years at the varsity level, Lantis exhibited dramatic improvement in every way. He was also named a co-Most Valuable Player by his teammates at the annual football banquet and awards presenta-

Teammates flanking Lantis with 1981 honors were junior David Wojcicki, whose intelligent playing and great speed and quickness brought him UPI Special Mention (equivalent to second team) honors while senior Rick Polian received UPI and AP Special Mention and first team All-League on both offense and

The U.S. Department of Agriculture says net farm income will fall this year due to a faster rise in farm expenses. Cash receipts from the sale of crops and livestock are expected to rise 4 to 6 percent from last year but an 8 to 10 percent rise in farm production expenses, led by interest and energy-based inputs, will outstrip cash receipts.

According to USDA's Economic Research Service, net

farm income, before inventory adjustment, is now projected at \$17 to \$21 billion, compared with \$21.9 billion last year. If inventory adjustment is taken into account, this year's net farm income is expected to be \$20 to \$24 billion, a slight improvement over last year's \$19,9 billion.

Net farm income before inventory adjustment is roughly the amount of money left over after paying expenses.

The tale of a Christmas plant: the lovely poinsettia

Ready or not, there's no denying the arrival of the holiday season once the poinsettia plant begins to make its appearance.

Whether it appears on the cover of a greeting card, in the windows of a local department store, or in a sea of red, pink and white flowers at a roadside nursery, the poinsettia is a sure sign that Christmas is just around the corner.

Although the poinsettia plant is not indigenous to the United States, Americans have come to associate its brilliant red, delicate pink and snowy white bracts with the Christmas sea-

This exotic flowering plant, used to decorate homes and churches in Mexico during the Christmas season, was introduced to the United States in 1828 by Dr. Joel Robert Poinsett, at that time the U.S. ambassador to Mexico. Upon returning from his term of service. in Mexico, he brought the plants home to his native South Carolina.

Poinsett propogated these plants, which he called "Painted Leaves," in his own greenhouses, and sent cuttings

to botanists throughout the country. The plant was later named "Poinsettia" in his honor.

Poinsettias grow wild in Mexico and other areas of Central America, where they are shrubs that can reach 30 feet in height. Their brilliant flowers are most profuse in mid-December.

The Spanish name for poinsettias, Flor de la Noche-buena (flower of the holy night), derives from a Mexican legend which holds that the plant originated in a miracle.

As the legend has it, a poor peasant child, ashamed at having nothing to take to a service honoring the nativity of the Christ child, sadly picked a few weeds along the road to give as an offering at the church.

As he knelt at the altar with his humble gift, the child's earnest prayer and tears of reverence transformed the weeds into the flowering plant that has become as much a part of Christmas in this country as the evergreen tree.

Today, poinsettias are still imported from Mexico, though commercial growers in Hawaii and other warm-weather states add to the supply. A careful plant-lover, however, can keep the plant from one season to the next and enjoy its brilliant flowering year after year.

The poinsettia will flourish outdoors during the summer months in most parts of the country, becoming denser with foliage as the weeks of sunshine pass. Prior to putting the plant outdoors, it should be pruned to avoid its becoming too "leg-

In order to have the plant bloom at Christmastime, poinsettias require equal amounts of daylight and darkness from the first week of October to the second week in November.

Funds Available To Help Develop **Energy Systems**

Saving energy and creating new industry are the goals for a new Energy Technology Development Program announced today by Michigan Energy Administration Director Joann Neuroth. The program will provide financial assistance for development and demonstration of innovative energy devices or systems.

2. Demonstration of a prototype which illustrates a renewable resource or energy conservation technology.


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
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Bulldog Cagers Down Milan But Lose to Rival Dexter, 55-54

Chelsea's varsity Bulldog basketball team got back on the right track Tuesday, defeating the Milan Big Reds, 77-65, in a high-scoring, offense-oriented game.

Offensively, Chelsea played a strong game, shooting 48 percent from the floor and completing 29 of 61 attempts. Milan, on the other hand, shot 35 percent and completed 23 of 65 attempted

At the free throw line, Chelsea hit an exceptional 76 percent, completing 19 of its 25 tries while the Big Reds hit 17 of their 27 attempts for a percentage of 63.

The game was close; the most decisive lead came at the end of the game with Chelsea's 12-point win margin. Nevertheless, from the second quarter on, Chelsea held the lead.

Milan, playing with the home court advantage, held a slim 17-15 lead at the end of one quarter and then Chelsea came on to control the tempo throughout the final three stanzas. At the half, Chelsea was up, 39-32, and after three, the Bulldogs were ahead, **54-48**.

With 45 seconds left in the final period, Chelsea was up, 71-65, and a scoring attack held Milan scoreless while the Bulldogs sunk an additional six points.

On the scoring end, Chelsea had five players hit double figures while an additional two were just three points shy. Pacing the team was David Wojcicki who had 19 points, 11 of which came in the fourth quarter. David Kiel added 12 points, being four for five from the floor and four for four at the line. David Mann. coming off the bench, also added a dozen points, hitting five out of seven from the floor and two free throws. He also contributed five

John Welton got 10 points while Carl Pate was Chelsea's fifth

double-figure player with 10 points as well. Coming off the bench, eight of Pate's points were scored in one and one-half minutes at the tail end of the second quarter. Adding seven points each were Mike Barels and

Marty Steinhauer. Chelsea outrebounded the Big Reds, 37-34, and turned over just one less ball during the game, 21-22. In assists, David Wojcicki led with four of Chelsea's 13 as compared to Milan's nine.

Chelsea's varsity Bulldogs lost a close game to arch rival Dexter Friday night at Chelsea. Final score in the contest was 55-54.

According to Coach Robin Raymond, the game was close throughout and the Bulldogs led by one point, 11-10, at the end of the first period. But, Chelsea's usual "second quarter letdown" found the Dreadnaughts outscoring the Bulldogs, 17-10, to take a 27-21 half-time lead.

Chelsea scored the first five out of six points in the third quarter and, at the end of the stanza, the Bulldogs were behind by just one point, 41-40.

The Bulldogs were unable to get the lead. The Dreadnaughts played a very effective 1-3-1 zone that the Chelsea cagers found difficult to penetrate.

In the final quarter heroics, David Kiel scored a basket with one minute left to up the Chelsea score to 55-50. Matt Villemure came back to add two with 30 seconds on the clock and finally, David Wojcicki sunk a lay-up with one second on the clock.

A time out was called with the final second on the clock in hopes of being fouled with a chance at getting two free throws and the win. The hopes were futile and the Bulldogs lost the game and dropped to 2-2 in the conference while the Dreadnaughts upped

their record to 3-1. According to Raymond, "Our

biggest weakness so far is our handling of late game pressure. What is needed is more leadership on the floor and from the coaching staff."

Despite the loss, Chelsea's statistics over-all and during the Dexter game are impressive. The Bulldogs shot 49 percent from the floor Friday, hitting 25 of 51 shots. The Dreadnaughts, on the other hand, were 24 for 59 for a percentage of 41. From the line, the Bulldogs were four of nine for 44 percent while Dexter was seven of 11 for 64 percent. The Dreadnaughts had 39 rebounds as compared to Chelsea's 32 and a total of 18 Bulldog turnovers were made while Dexter committed 17.

The dominant force was Dexter's Rob Ianni, who makes the big play when a basket is needed. Chelsea, on the other hand, does not have the dominant "star" player.

Pacing the Bulldogs in scoring was John Welton with 14 points while Wolcicki turned in a 12point performance. David Kiel had nine points, Marty Steinhauer had eight, Mike Bareis had six and Matt Villemure had five, as well as three steals and two assists.

In rebounds, Kiel and Steinhauer led with seven while Bareis pulled down five.

The team is playing good basketball as evidenced by their season stats. From the floor,



RESOLUTION ADOPTING ORDINANCE NO. 90

HEREBY RESOLVED, that the Village Council of the Village of Chelsea does hereby adopt, approve and promulgate Ordinance No. 90. "VILLAGE OF CHELSEA NOISE ORDI-NANCE," a copy of which is attached hereto, and the Clerk of said Village be and is hereby directed to cause the same to be published in the Village of Chelsea, in The Chelsea Standard, or any other paper of general circulation, and otherwise record said instrument within the book of ordinances.

NOTICE OF RIGHT TO REFERENDUM ON BECOMING A CHARTER TOWNSHIP

Official certification has been received from the Michigan Secretary of State indicating that the township of Sylvan has a population of 5,000 or more and the township board has the right to exercise one of three options concerning status as a charter township under the provisions of Act 359, Public Acts of 1947, as amended:

- 1. Adopt by majority vote a resolution opposed to incorporation as a charter township.
- 2. Adopt by majority vote a resolution of intent to approve incorporation as a charter township.
- 3. Adopt by majority vote a resolution to place before the electorate at the next regular or special township election the question of incorporation as a charter township.

In the event option 2 is adopted by the township board, the citizens of the township have the right to file a "Right to Referendum Petition." This petition must be filed within the 60 days which must lapse between passage of a resolution of intent to incorporate and final passage of the resolution to incorporate as a charter township.

The petition will follow, in general form, the nominating petition form as prescribed in the Michigan Election Law, and in the heading will indicate "disagreement to intent to incorporate as a charter township." The petition must be signed by not less than 10% of the registered voters of the township based on the vote cast for all candidates for supervisor at the last election at which a supervisor was elected.

'If the petition is successful, the question of incorporation will be placed on the ballot at the next general township or special township election.

Police Report Busy Month of November

reports that a total of 230 radio runs were made during November. This is compared to 237 during the preceding month. Types of radio runs taking place in November included 29 incidents of suspicious vehicles. two driving under the influence of liquor, 12 property damage accidents, three malicious destruction of property, two check forgery, one prowler, eight disturbances and two runaways apprehended.

A total of 10 arrests were made including five felony arrests, one misdemeanor apprehension and two each of warrant and iuvenile arrests. This is compared to a total of nine arrests in October.

The November felony arrests involved one malicious destruction of property over \$100. one larceny from a building (Polly's), one possession of marijuana (180 lbs.), one forgery and one uttering and publishing (both occurring at Chelsea State Bank).

The misdemeanor arrest involved an incident of assault and battery while the two juveniles apprehended were connected with an incident of a stolen motor vehicle. The warrant arrests involved one incident of failure to comply with sentence and one Gratiot county warrant.

Eleven case reports were written last month as compared with 20 during October. November's case reports included recovered stolen traffic signs, malicious destruction of property/slashed tires at Mark IV Lanes/vehicle windshield/Beach school lawn. check forgery at the Methodist Home, larceny of tools from an auto on W. Middle St., possession of 180 pounds of marijuana, one stolen and recovered motor vehicle, on check forgery for \$500/Chelsea State Bank, found motorcycle/Rockwell lot.

A total of 47 traffic violations were issued in November as com-

Chelsea Police Department pared to 20 the preceding month. Also, the Chelsea Police Department assisted motorists on 27 occasions as opposed to 20 occasions in October. Three hundred property checks were made during November while 127 were made in October.

In addition, Chelsea police assisted Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department on a total of five occasions as opposed to nine occasions in October. Assistance on county runs occurred during two instances of gun fire, one armed robbery, three arrests for carrying concealed weapons and one incident of breaking and entering. A total of two hours and five minutes was spent in assisting the Sheriff's Depart-

A combined total of 5,170 miles were driven in Chelsea's police cars while 6.560 miles were logged during October.





The number reached to date is small compared to the total number known to have been POWs during one or more periods of declared war or armed conflict. We are asking former POWs to call their county Red Cross office, 971-5300, by early January, for further information.

Legislation mandates that a special advisory committee will be established to address the concerns of the affected group and the Congress has asked for a report to both Houses of the number of POWs reached.





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
