Hell Creek Dam Collapses



HELL BROKE LOOSE last week when the 125-year-old Hell Creek dam crumbled against the weight of floodwaters, forcing the evacuation of 15 to 20 families from their flooded trailer court. The dam, planned to be replaced later this spring, gave way at approximately 10 a.m. Friday, taking with it the walkway that crossed it and part of the shoreline.

It was a cold day when confusion broke loose in Hell on Friday morning, March 26.

It was then that the 125-year-old Hell Creek dam crumbled, flooding the town of approximately 300 residents and leaving 15 or so families, residing in a nearby trailer park, homeless.

The community-owned dam, which held back water from six area lakes (Hi-Land, Half Moon, Patterson, Blind, Watson and Bruin), burst at approximately 10 a.m. sending winter floodwaters sloshing through the tiny town, flooding trailers and roads under three feet of water. Nevertheless, no serious injuries were reported as cold bodies in soggy shoes pulled important personal belongings from their water-logged homes and maneuvered themselves in row boats through the water-covered trailer park.

The Hell Creek dam was constructed in the late 1800's and was first declared to be dangerous in the 1940s. Plans were underway to replace the age-old concrete and steel re-inforced dam later this spring in an \$800,000 cooperative project between Washtenaw and Livingston counties. There is no determination of whether or not the dam break will speed up or hinder the construction plans.

By Saturday, the worst appeared to be over and some of the evacuated families, who had been assisted by the Red Cross, returned to their homes while road crews braced the remainder of the dam with large boulders.

Nevertheless, the disaster left Hi-Land Lake nearly drained, with large quicksand-like muck holes posing a serious hazard to persons venturing near the shoreline.

K-C Tootsie Roll Drive Scheduled

The annual Michigan Knights of Columbus Tootsie Roll Drive is again underway in hopes of raising funds for the education of mentally retarded children and adults. In Chelsea, local K. of C. members, for their seventh consecutive year, will solicit funds on April 2, 3 and 4.

According to Jaye Saarinen, council chairman of the local mental retardation Tootsie Roll Drive, nearly \$757,000 was collected state-wide in last year's three-day week-end drive. Locally, more than \$2,700 was collected and donated to the St. Louis School for Exceptional Boys and to the special education programs in Chelsea and Stockbridge.

Of the tax-deductible funds collected locally, 80 percent will be retained by the Chelsea group for distribution to area programs. The remaining 20 percent is used throughout the state to assist in the support of similar projects.

The Chelsea Knights of Columbus and their helpers will be located at various businesses and street corners in town.

Area Townships Cut Unnecessary Spending At Annual Meetings

On Saturday, March 27, area township boards held their annual meetings to determine their 1983 operating budgets.

Over-all, this year's meetings seemed to indicate a "tightening of the financial belt," providing necessities and cutting out any unnecessary excess in spending.

Sylvan Township

Sylvan township adopted an operating budget of \$218,672.17 for the coming year. Included in this budget were slight increases in fire protection and landfill use. Monies allotted for these necessities totaled, \$28,047.91 and \$11,600, respectively.

Other allotments include \$2,000 for the Chelsea Recreation Council, \$1,500 toward CATS bus, and \$1,258.87 for the McKune Memorial Library.

Road maintenance accounts for \$15,241.13 of the budget, including \$20,000 from Federal Revenue Sharing.

No salaries were raised.

Lima Township

Lima township adopted an operating budget of \$154,450 and just one officer received a wage hike. Treasurer Betty Messman received a \$400 increase; she declined any additional monies during the 1981-82 year.

The township recommended that the township levy be dropped from 1.15 to 1.10 in order to save taxpayers .05 percent over the \$40 million roll.

A total of \$30,250 was put aside to be used toward the replacement of the Steinbach Bridge that has been closed since 1978.

Road improvement allotments totalled \$23,900 while \$11,200 was earmarked for the Town Hall improvements including installation of a handicapped ramp, repair walls and purchase a new furnace.

Lyndon Township

Lyndon township set an operating budget of \$104,000, up

25 percent over preceding years as determined, in part, by population increases revealed by the 1980 census. Nevertheless, no increases in property taxes are planned.

Earmarked for road maintenance was \$6,500 from the general fund and \$10,000 from Federal Revenue Sharing while \$16,000 was placed in contingency providing for the possibility of reduced State Revenue Sharing.

Increases were seen in the areas of fire protection, up to \$24,100 while landfill rental costs were upped to \$10,000.

Receiving eight percent increases in pay were clerk, supervisor and treasurer, all of whom declined pay increases during the 1981-82 year.

Pedestrian Struck By Car on M-52

Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department reports that at 1:20 a.m. Sunday, March 28, a pedestrian accident occurred on south-bound M-52, 4/10s of a mile from Bethel Church Rd.

According to Deputy Joseph Yekulis, Shelley Tower, 23, of Manchester, was walking in the roadway when a 1978 Ford LTD, driven by Edwin Smith, 43, of Manchester, was unable to avoid her because of oncoming traffic and struck her. Tower received minor leg injuries and was checked by ambulance attendants at the scene. Smith's vehicle also received minor damage.

At 1:40 a.m., on M-52, 5/10s of a mile south of Bethel Church Rd., a car-deer collision occurred. According to reports, Carroll Martin, 49, of New Hudson, was traveling north-bound when a deer dashed in front of his 1977 GMC pick-up. Unable to avoid striking the animal, it was fatally wounded.

Webster Township

Webster township adopted an operating budget of \$136,108 plus an estimated Federal Revenue Sharing of \$11,296, earmarked for road improvements as was a total of \$20,000 placed in the contingency fund.

Other allotments included \$32,000 for fire protection and \$16,600 for police protection (the township is under contract with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department), \$1,800 was set aside for the Dexter Library, \$5,000 was added to the building fund (now at \$45,000) and \$250 was earmarked for use by the Historical Society.

Two Arrested For Break-in of Pop Machine

On Sunday, March 21, Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department received a call from a witness of a pop machine break-in at a gas station located at I-94 and Zeeb Rd.

The witness followed two suspects to a location in Dexter and notified the sheriff's department of their whereabouts. Deputies Cook and Strong apprehended the suspects in the Village of Dexter and, when questioned, the suspects, students at Ann Arbor Pioneer High school, provided additional information which led to the issuance of two warrants, one for the breaking and entering of a coin machine and one for the possession of stolen property. In addition, two juveniles have been petitioned regarding possession of stolen property and breaking and entering of coin machines.

Apparently, a number of pop machines from throughout Washtenaw county have been stolen and two were recovered in Manchester.

Jerry Ashby Moves State Farm Office

Chelsea's State Farm Insurance agent Jerry Ashby, in the village for one year, has changed his location from S. Main St. to the corner of S. Main St. and E. Middle (the former Al Nalli Music shop).

According to Ashby, the change of locations will provide three times the additional work space and will afford more privacy to policyholders. His decision to stay in the downtown area as opposed to moving to the village outskirts was based on his belief that "Chelsea's future is tied to a vital downtown area." His former location will not stand vacant for long either. According to Ashby, plans are in the works for

the creation of an arts and crafts type store.

Ashby has been a State Farm agent for 20 years, serving as an Ann Arbor agent for nine years and then taking his business out west for an additional 10 years. Since returning to Michigan and Chelsea in particular, he explains that he has sought out a larger, more modern facilities in which to house his business. Those facilities were discovered approximately eight weeks ago and, since that time, Andy Fletcher has done the remodeling. Merkel's has decorated and Chelsea Greenhouse has filled the office with green plants just in time for its opening this week.

Two Positions Opening on School Board

Persons interested in seeking office on the Chelsea Board of Education are notified that nominating petitions must be filed at the Administration Building by 4 p.m. Monday, April 12.

Two terms will expire, those of incumbent board members Dan Snyder and Dale Schumann, both of whom have indicated an interest in seeking re-election, by obtaining nominating petitions. Schumann affirmed his intentions to seek re-election Friday while Snyder confirmed his candidacy Monday morning.

Three Petition Drives Begin On Property Taxes

Only one day after Governor William G. Milliken called for massive budget cuts and an increase in the state's personal income tax rate, three separate property tax cut petition drives got underway.

The three different proposals will be headed by Shlawasee County Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch, who has been unsuccessful the past two elections, a group called Tax Relief in Michigan (T.R.I.M.), and Rep. Claude Trim (D-Davisburg).

All three groups indicated the recent call for budget reductions and tax increases by Milliken will do nothing but aid in their efforts to gain the necessary signatures to get the questions on the November general election ballot.

Tisch's new proposal provides that the 1980 equalized value used on property will be the 1983 valuation with property taxes calculated on the assessed value of 50 percent of the property's true cash value.

The ratio of assessed value to true cash value would then be reduced by 15 percent each year until 1987.

Beginning in that year, an autonomous county tax commission would set ad valorem tax rates and all property tax matters would be the exclusive province of the counties.

The Tisch plan would also cut in half the property taxes of any household with incomes between \$8,000 and \$12,000 and exempt from property taxes households with incomes less than \$8,000.

Senior citizens earning less than \$15,000 annually would be exempt from school operating millages.

The proposal also prohibits any current tax credits from being eliminated except by three-fourths vote of the Legislature, limits assessment increases and requires 100 percent reimbursement to local governments by the state.

No cost estimate to the state was offered by Tisch.

The proposal backed by Trim and other legislators, estimated

to save property taxpayers \$520 million but recouped by income tax increases, would exempt 75 percent of residential and agricultural property taxes from school operating costs, permit agricultural and forest property to be assessed according to use rather than cash value, require state reimbursement to education, prevent any educational units from budget cuts because of the exemptions, protect business and industry from any additional taxes to cover the lost revenue and increase the sales tax to 5 percent.

Rep. Roy Smith (R-Saline), one of the sponsors of the proposal with Trim, said the plan would make education the ultimate priority in the state for the first time in Michigan history.

Trim added, with the Milliken income tax hike proposal, it is now even more imperative to enact property tax relief.

The T.R.I.M. proposal is basically a revision of a proposal developed and then withdrawn earlier this year.

It would eliminate the property tax from school millages, raise the sales tax to 5 percent and dedicate royalties from oil and natural gas to education.

Unless the proposals can get a 3/4th majority in both houses of the Legislature, sponsors must start the long trek in circulating petitions state-wide to get the questions on the ballot by referendum.

If they are successful, then the ultimate decision will again be made by the people of the State of Michigan through their voting franchise.

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




Mike Benzinger also led in rebounds with 11.



World Peace Marchers Will Stop in Chelsea

According to a public opinion poll recently undertaken and published in the March 29 issue of Newsweek (p. 19), the following comments and question have been posed:

"The advocates of a nuclear freeze say that both the United States and the Soviet Union already have enough nuclear weapons to destroy each other and want both sides to ban all testing, production and development of nuclear weapons. What is your view?" Strongly favor: 20 percent; Favor: 36 percent; Strongly oppose: 9 percent; Oppose: 20 percent; and, Don't know: 11 percent.

The 60 percent opinion in favor of the ban of nuclear testing, production and development is in accord with the current trend toward anti-nuclear sentiment, involving persons from various social, economic and national strata, is indicated with the recent ground swell of public sentiment and the prevalence of

seminars, legal action and marches in opposition to the nuclear race.

On Thursday, April 1, a group of World Peace Marchers, who originated their trek in San Francisco on Oct. 24, will pass through Chelsea enroute to Ann Arbor and, by June 1, New York, where they will greet others having left from various locations across the United States and Canada. There, the groups, dedicated to world disarmament, will converge on the United Nations second special session on nuclear weapons.

Those persons passing through Chelsea will gather at St. Paul United Church of Christ upon their arrival. Thereafter, host families will arrive to pick up their overnight visitors, providing one night's lodging, dinner, breakfast and lunch for the following day.

At the request of several local church groups, Jim Hoffmeyer is acting as local co-ordinator for the one-night stay. He explains that no special programs are planned for the group. Nevertheless, persons interested in greeting the group as they enter the village are welcome as are additional host families. Persons able to provide one day's food and lodging to the World Peace Marchers are welcome to contact Hoffmeyer at 475-8014.

Human Medicines Toxic to Cats

Cat owners who use non-aspirin pain relievers should never give these medicines to their pets, according to Dr. Robert Schirmer, chairperson of the Department of Small Animal Surgery and Medicine at Michigan State University.

"These are excellent medications for people, but they contain a chemical compound called acetaminophen, which can quickly kill a cat," he says.

Acetaminophen is contained in products such as Tylenol, Excedrin, Vanquish and NyQuil. The drug attacks the red blood cells, impairing its ability to carry oxygen from the lungs to the rest of the body. The symptoms are swelling around the cat's face, pale gums, and sudden collapse.

Cats with acetaminophen poisoning can be treated successfully.

Fire Dept. Reports 23 Runs for Month

During February, the Chelsea Fire Department made a total of 23 runs, placing the number of runs made this year at 47. Of these calls, 12 involved rescue attempts while the remaining 11 were fire-related.

By townships, five calls were made in the village (3 rescue, 2 automatic alarm) and five were made in Sylvania township (4 rescue, 1 chimney fire). Three runs were made in Lima township (1 rescue, 1 washdown, 1 fuel oil spill) while six runs were made in Lyndon township (4 chimney fires, 1 rescue, 1 house fire). One run each was made to Dexter, Waterloo and Sharon townships (rescue runs) and Chelsea Fire Department assisted Mutual Aid on a single house fire.

Of these calls, a total of 376 manhours was spent.

Other activities by the fire fighting personnel included a Mutual Aid meeting in Northfield township, attended by three members for a total of 12 hours. Two firemen attended a Scott Air Pac School for a total of 10 hours. Also, several firemen and one auxiliary fireman spent nearly 48 hours mounting a new pump on the Jeep. When completed, the Jeep will have nozzles mounted on both sides of the bumper and will be capable of operating together or singly. Fifty feet of hosing will complete the job.

During the month of February, a total of 480 hours were spent by local firemen including 108 donated hours for a total of 378 paid manhours.

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
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



Question: With so many people out of work, how can you justify trade shows and other junkets like the recent one the state sponsored to Mexico City?

Governor: International sales represent a whole new market for Michigan industry, and a gain in Michigan jobs, not a loss. For example, at a trade show in Mexico last May, 14 Michigan companies returned with orders for more than \$3.8 million worth of Michigan-made products. The cost of participation in foreign trade activities is paid by participating companies—not by the state. Michigan's Office of Economic Development (OED) makes arrangements for exhibit space, clearing customs and providing interpreters where language may be a problem.

There is an enormous market for Michigan products throughout the world and state government should do everything it can to get Michigan manufacturers involved in international trade. The state has promoted international trade since 1973 when trade offices were established in Tokyo and Brussels. These offices assist Michigan industry in selling those markets and they encourage foreign manufacturers to build production facilities in Michigan.

Michigan exports nearly \$15 billion in goods annually, the second highest of any state. Our challenge is to interest Michigan's smaller companies in considering foreign markets. Often they need only the technical assistance of the OED and the opportunity to display their products in foreign markets. Currently, OED is organizing four trade missions, five trade shows and several catalog shows in Europe, Asia and Africa in addition to the recent trade mission to Mexico City.

The other side of international trade is the attraction of foreign investment to Michigan. I recently took part in ceremonies marking the expansion of a German firm in Michigan. The company came to our state two years ago and set up a small office and work bay employing 35 people. Now the firm operates a \$10 million processing and service center which employs 195 Michigan workers. Since the opening of our trade offices in Brussels and Tokyo, 140 international firms have come to Michigan. They make everything from chewing gum to musical instruments to robotics, and they employ about 7,000 Michigan workers.

Rural Carrier Exams Slated

By Postal Service

Detroit MSC Manager/Postmaster Gene Cole has announced the opening of the Rural Carrier Examination for the Ann Arbor Area Post Office on April 12, through April 16.

The Register of eligibles established through the written test will be used to fill approximately 20 vacancies within the next two years in the offices served by this register: Brighton, Chelsea, Dexter, Gregory, Manchester, New Hudson, Northville, Pluckney, Saline, South Lyon, Ann Arbor, Whitmore Lake and Ypsilanti.

Eligibles selected for appointment must have a valid state driver's license and a safe driving record, and they must pass the Postal Service Road Test to show they can safely drive a vehicle of the type used on the job.

Duties are delivery of mail to residents in rural areas.

All rural carriers must furnish and maintain at their own expense vehicle equipment necessary for the prompt handling of the mails, but they are given an equipment maintenance allowance based on the daily mileage scheduled, or a minimum allowance per day, whichever is greater.

Applicants must have reached their 18th birthday on the date of filing application. This age limit does not apply to persons entitled to veteran preference. There is no maximum age limit.

Rural carriers starting salaries range from \$5,276 to \$22,778 annually (includes COLA) depending on the length and character of the route.

Applicants should submit application card, PS Form 2479AB, to the Ann Arbor Postmaster at the address below during regular business hours. U. S. Postal Service, 2075 Stadium W., Ann Arbor 48106.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, political affiliations, or any non-merit factor.

All applications must be received or bear a postmark no later than closing date April 16.

No-Till Benefits

Outlined at Conference

About 250 farmers attended a "No-Till" conference in Lansing on March 10 and heard the message: "Go No-Till." According to Dwight Quisenberry of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, no-till is a growing practice in Michigan, with 83,000 acres planted with corn using the no-till system last year.

In addition to corn, crops planted by no-till in Michigan include soybeans, hay, wheat, barley, oats and sunflowers.

The benefits of no-till, echoed by many of the conference speakers, include wind and water erosion control, fuel savings, labor savings and less wear and tear on farm machinery. Quisenberry said that yields can be increased up to 15 bushels an acre and that, in the long run, herbicide needs can be reduced.

Information is available, Quisenberry said, from other no-till farmers, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Co-Operative Extension Service.

Safety Precautions Urged for Spring's Eager Kite Flyers

March winds have swept away winter's ice and cold and have made for perfect kite-flying weather as young and old alike send their colorful objects skyward in celebration of spring.

Nevertheless, a number of important pointers should be brought to the attention of kite flyers eager to send their kites aloft.

Kites should be flown in an open field, away from electric power wires and transmission lines and only dry kite string should be used—never wire. If a kite gets caught on an electrical power wire or a high pole, don't try to remove it and never use any metal in the construction of your kite.

Kites should not be flown on or near a public highway and they should never be sent soaring in wet or stormy weather.

Compliance with such simple suggestions could save the spring celebrant and kite-flyer from possible injury or even death.
