Police Seek Witness to Dog's Death

At 8:43 p.m. Wednesday, May 5, Chelsea police were given a report of a dog lying dead on Main St. According to the owner of the animal, the dog fell or jumped from the second-story roof of a building on Main St.

Since that time, Chelsea Police have questioned each and every person who was in the area at the time of the incident and made a report to the police department. Nevertheless, a number of area residents are suspicious of the animal's death, in part, because it fell into the street and not on the sidewalk.

Police have made serious attempts at locating an eyewitness to the occurrence in order to provide them with an accurate account of the actual incident. Until such time that a witness is located, it must be assumed that the dog fell or jumped from the roof. Still, should an eyewitness report be made and includes that the animal was thrown from the building, legal action will be taken. Without an eyewitness account, no charges can be filed against the dog's owner.

Court Challenge Expected Over Legislative Respportionment

Democratic members of the Legislature are exected to file a suit in federal courts to challengethe legislative reapportionment plan developed as a result of guidelines established by the state Supreme Court.

The suit is expected to be filed in the U.S. District Court in Flint after negotiations broke down between Senate Democrats and Republicans over a bipartisan plan,

The state Supreme Court is expected to approve a plan written by former state elections director Bernard Apol who developed the plan under guidelines of the court.

The Apol plan was developed without regard to any incumbents, thus making members of the current Legislature unhappy that some incumbents will face others as their residences now fall within the newly drawn districts.

Negotiations broke down in the Senate as Republicans declared they could not support the proposed bipartisan plan.

Senate Minority Leader Robert VanderLaan of Kentwood said his caucus was not too anxious to pass another plan over the Supreme Court-directed Apol plan as it would give the court a House Minority Leader mixed signal.

He said the bipartisan plan gives Republicans no more than 13 sure districts and not the 17-17 split with four swing districts as suggested by Senate Majority Leader William Faust of Westland.

The Apol plan, meanwhile, has a definite Republican flavor and could swing the majority in the Senate back to Republicans and narrow the gap of the Democratic majority in the House.

Faust said he would file a suit against the Apol plan and would expect similar suits from House Speaker Bobby Crim of Davison. Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and the Democratic party itself.

He said he would file the suit as soon as the Supreme Court takes any action on the Apol plan.

The majority leader further said his suit would be based on equal protection, the one-man, one-vote concept, weakening in black districts and incumbents not being considered when drawing the new districts.

Crim, meanwhile, indicated that a plan approved on a 67-37 vote would still be presented to the Supreme Court as a measure that had bipartisan support and met the court's guidelines on reapportionment.



'The Spinners' Flock' is a guild of handspinners, with members and chapters in three counties in Southeast Michigan. It was founded in the fall of 1960 in Howell, by a group of women who raised sheep and were spiners of their own flocks' fleece or wished to learn to be spinners.

Those members who knew how to spin taught the others. New women joined the group at every meeting, and soon the Livingston county group inspired a group in Washtenaw county to form as part of the whole group. Again, most of the women who joined were wool growers or sheep breeders, or were interested in becoming so.

An avid spinner and sheep breeder from Lenawee county, Donna Brown Davidson, met with both groups frequently, then founded an affiliate group called the Lenawee Spinners. Today the three groups together member some 80 members, and are still growing.

"The Spinners' Flock" exists for the encouragement and teaching of handspinning, and for breeding and wool growing in selling Angora rabbits





Area Students Assist With CMU Stage Production


Marcia Warren, a Central Michigan University freshman from Chelsea, was a member of the cast/crew of the University Theater's recent production, "The Robber Bridegroom."



This is the third article in a quately communicate both in and four-part series directed toward speech, language and hearing problems.

The middle and junior high students should be well on their way to mastering the speech and language skills of the adult. The caseload of the speech and language pathologist at this school level is usually smaller than at the elementary school. This is due, in part, to emphasis on early diagnosis and treatment of speech and language problems.

Some children at this level may still have persistent articulation problems (usually s, r, and 1). These children may be enrolled on a regular basis each week, or may be seen at intervals throughout the year as determined by individual need.

The child who is exhibiting signs of vocal abuse is mature enough at this level to benefit from direct voice therapy. This therapy stresses proper vocal hygiene and teaches the child to take responsibility for developing correct vocal habits.

The middle school child who is non-fluent (stuttering) can be taught any one of several different methods to achieve more fluent speech. A program is selected and developed which meets the individual needs of the

The effects of early age hearing and/or language problems may still be evident at this time. These students will often show lags in the ability to express themselves adequately. Not only are the effects noted in listening and speaking skills, but also in reading and in written language. When necessary, the child can be taught to develop strengths which will help to compensate for areas. of difficulty.

By helping the middle school students to think and to express themselves logically, and to use good problem solving skills, we hope to help prepare them to adeShirley Schaible and Village President Jack Merkel.

Open House Set for Solar Design House

Cheisea High school's Building Trades classes have arranged an open house to exhibit their work on the house at 3105 Chisholm Trail (off Old US-12 West), Sun-

day, May 23, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Building Trades instructor Dale Richards supervised construction of the house, which began last September and will be completed by the end of the school year. Richards has supervised construction of four houses by Chelsea High school students.

The house is a proven passive solar design that contains 3 bedrooms, 2 full baths, a great room, kitchen, laundry, utility room, in 1,550 square feet. The house also features an attached 2-car garage and air lock entry to minimize air infiltration.

The passive solar design takes advantage of the energy available from the sun by having double-glazed windows facing south to allow the heat of the sun to enter to be absorbed in the masonry floor and brick storage wall for later release. Insulated automatic window drapes on the south windows (R-12) will hold the heat in the winter. The roof overhang will shade the south windows with the summer sun at a higher elevation.

All north, east and west windows are triple-glazed and set in six-inch walls completely insulated (R-23). The first floor on the north, east and west is 48" in the ground to minimize the wind hitting the exterior walls. The ceiling features 15 inches of insulation with an 'R' value of approximately 42.

Auxiliary heat is provided by a McKinley St.

natural gas furnace and a wood burner in the great room. A cocling thermostat at the ceiling will energize the fan of the furnace to move the hot air that rises to the ceiling through the furnace duc work to all parts of the house.

The house will be offered for sale upon completion, and will be eligible for a tax credit of approximately \$5,000 for the extra expense of the passive solar features such as insulated drapes, added masonry, added insulation and triple-glazed windows.


