. Yield 'Below Average'

Local wheat harvesting is in full swing following a bout with good weather and if there's no rain within the next couple of days the harvesting process should be just about done, according to Jerry Heydlauff of Honegger's and Co.

Within Washtenaw county, approximately 18,000 acres of wheat is grown annually; white and red wheat are the primary crops. White wheat is the basic type grown in the Chelsea area while south of I-94, red wheat is raised. Approximately two-thirds done with the harvest, Heydlauff explains that this year's yield ranges from a high of 58 bushels per acre to a low of 10 bushels, indicating a less than average crop. A profusion of weeds has been cited as a problem with this year's crop.

Tug/barge Program May Become Subject of Legal Battle

The completion of the controversial Great Lakes tug/barge project may become the subject of a court battle after the builder shut down construction, claiming the state failed to honor an agreement to make quicker payments. John P. Woodford, director of the Department of Transporta-

tion, announced that Upper Peninsula Shipbuilding Company (UPSCO) will be held in default of its contract with the state unless it immediately resumes construction at the company's

Ontonagon shipyard. The project was once hailed as a key to reviving the U. P.'s sagging economy as the original \$35 million construction of a tug and four barges to carry freight

Woodford said that unless constuction starts up again immediately, the company will be held in default and the state will take "such legal actions as we deem necessary."

Also, Woodford demanded UPSCO comply with its contractual obligation to allow auditors and representatives of the department access to its facilities, office and records.

Department spokesman Thomas Shawyer said the department was currently meeting with lawyers discussing what specific legal actions could be taken.

He added, however, that the department preferred not to talk about such actions because that would tend only to exacerbate the situation. Shawyer said the department would rather get an agreement from the company to reopen the shipyard and complete construction instead of going to court.

Woodford called upon the company to live up to contractual obligations by providing accurate and detailed production and financial schedules on a monthly basis dating from the signing last January of amendments to the original contract executed in July of 1979.

"Our intent and hope is not to engage in lengthy litigation with UPSCO, but to encourage the company to resume work and carry the contract to completion," Woodford said.

The state has already paid UPSCO some \$41 million on the controversial project, including \$5.5 million under an escalator olause covering the increase in the cost of labor and materials since the project began.

The project was originally to have cost \$35.5 million and the latest projected cost is \$44 million.

Besides the \$41 million already paid to the company, another \$2 million has been set aside for special administrative costs, leaving another \$1.2 million due and payable to the company between now and upon completion.

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To the Editor, The time has come for some drastic changes in our summer baseball leagues. The Chelsea Recreation Dept. has been unresponsive to the problems in the program for years. For ex-

ample, our late season guarantees forfeited games every year, yet Chelsea's season continues to run about a month later than those in other communities.

-It is obvious to anyone who has children in both the boys' and the girls' leagues, that the girls are treated like second class citizens. Why do the girls play their games on poorly maintained grass fields, while our one softball diamond usually sits idle? There are five well kept baseball diamonds, two of which aren't used regularly. Why do the same umpires work year after year at the baseball games, while the softball leagues have different, inexperienced high school kids each year? The baseball teams get better equipment than the softball teams-even to the point of bleachers for all the ball fields

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except those used by the Midget and Jr. Miss Leagues.

The big question is, why do the boys get to play in tournaments each year and the girls don't? When I asked the softball director about this, her responses were "it's too much trouble, it's too hard to schedule games, they have had too many problems in

the past with tournaments." I don't understand why the boys should get better fields, umpires, equipment, and on top of that have more games than the girls. Is the baseball director better organized than the softball director? More efficient? More intelligent to be able to figure out schedules for tournaments? Is it simply a case of sex discrimination? The director of the Rec. Dept. was on vacation when I tried to find out the answers to my questions. Is there a member of the Rec. Council out there who can tell me why the girls are treated this way? Can you believe that for the second time that I know of, the ribbons handed out at the end of the year to the girls read baseball instead of softball? The Rec. Dept. didn't even know the difference when they were ordered.

E. General Requirements.

Limitation of Uses. The specific uses assigned for common utilization under the terms of sub-Section B are to be limited to areas zoned P-5, PRIVATE SITES DEDICATED TO COMMON USE. No residential, agricultural or commercial zoned lot can be used for these common purposes.

2. Riparian Access for Non-riparian Lots. If a riparian lot or parcel is zoned P-5, giving access for common uses by non-riparian lots or parcels, the following constraints shall apply:

a. The deed to such lot or parcel shall specify the non-riparian lots or parcels which shall have rights to its use.

b. Such riparian lot or parcel shall have a minimum frontage of one hundred and fifty (150) feet, a minimum area of thirty thousand (30,000) square feet, and its design shall be subject to Site Plan Review. Frontage shall be measured by a straight line which intersects each side lot line at the water's edge.

c. Not less than thirty (30) feet of riparian frontage shall be provided for each non-riparian lot or parcel so served.

d. A non-riparian lot or parcel which is occupied by more than one dwelling unit (duplex or Multiple Residence) shall require the provision of thirty (30) feet of riparian frontage for each dwelling units occupying said lot or parcels.

e. Not more than one boat mooring for each dwelling unit served shall make use of the riparian facility.

f. The zoning of any additional riparian lots or parcels, for P-5 private sites dedicated to common use, is not permitted when the load limit factor, of the lake, is exceeded. The load limit factor is defined in Section 4.70-F.

F. Load Limit Factor.

1. The Load Limit Factor for any given lake is calculated by dividing the surface acreage of the lake by the number of "lake households" using the lake. The Load Limit Factor shall be not less than (1) acre per "lake household." The number of "lake households" using the lake is the sum of:

a. The number of riparian property owner households, plus,

b. The number of non-riparian property owner households using the lake with conforming and nonconforming status, plus,

c. The maximum number of moorings authorized in Department of Natural Resources marina permits. This is put into household units by dividing the number of 1.2, plus,

d. The average number of persons using public and private parks or camps with lake access. This is determined by taking the total number of persons using such facilities for the first and second Saturday and Sunday of the proceeding July, and dividing by four. This is put into household units by dividing by the average size household, of the township, as indicated in the last United States Census. When the lake is located in more than one township, the average household size of the townships involved will be used.
