No Additional Reports of Meningitis

There have been no more reported cases of meningitis in the area, following a case which hospitalized a 15-year-old Chelsea high school girl early last week.

Dr. Mary Westhoff, a Chelsea pediatrician, said Monday that no additional cases have arisen. She declined to give information on the condition of the student, saying it would be a breach of confidence with the girl's parents.

Meningitis is a mildly contagious bacterial infection of the central nervous system, Westhoff said. The meninges are the coverings of the brain and spinal cord.

Westhoff said people with the symptoms of meningitis, fever, chills, vomiting and a stiff neck which is sometimes accompanied by a rash, should see their doctor. However, she stressed that people with those symptoms do not necessarily have meningitis.

Orchestras Plan Concert For Friday

Freak Snowstorm Hits Area Early; Four Inches Fall

Last winter was the mildest hereabouts since the U. S. Weather Bureau began keeping records back in the 1870's. This one has started out to be a blinger.

Actually, winter isn't here yet and won't be officially until Dec. 21, but last Friday's Nov. 11 blizzard was enough like the real thing to make everybody forget about the calendar.

High winds began howling through the area during the early morning hours, accompanied by a mixture of rain and sleet which changed to snow at daylight. About four inches of snow came down altogether, although it didn't pile up that high because much of it melted as it fell in close-freezing temperatures.

The storm caught everybody by surprise, coming as it did after a period of unusually balmy early November weather.

Snow shovels and blowers were brought out of storage, and salt trucks dispatched onto roads and streets. Pavements were slushy but driveable at reduced speeds.

Law enforcement agencies reported numerous instances of vehicles skidding off roads but no major accidents.

Chelsea school district buses made their normal runs on Friday morning and experienced no serious problems. Several arrived "a little late," according to Chelsea High school principal John Williams.

Chelsea administrator Frederick A. Weber acknowledged that "we were caught a little bit by surprise" but said village trucks and crews were out on the streets by 9 a.m. "We didn't get any advance warning," he added.

The Washtenaw County Road Commission likewise had equipment and drivers working by 9 a.m.

The snowfall ended at noon with clearing skies and falling temperatures, with gradual warming promised for the following days.

Weber's chief concern was that village leaf pick-up would be delayed because men and equipment were diverted to clearing

snow. "We'll get back on it (leaf pick-up) as soon as we can," he said. "In the long run the snow will help, because the moisture packs the leaves and makes them easier to load."

The storm was a freak, according to weather experts. It swept across the northern plains and Minnesota, Wisconsin and northern Michigan, dumping up to 16 inches of snow in parts of the Upper Peninsula. Instead of continuing on northeast as predicted, it unexpectedly dipped south and sideswiped southern Michigan.

"If that track becomes established as a pattern, we could have a lot of stormy weather here this winter," a spokesman for the weather bureau said. "It's too soon to forecast, but it certainly is a possibility."

Reaction of local residents was pretty much along the lines of, "We weren't ready for this yet." That was hardly surprising considering that the temperature had been in the high 50's the day before.

Local Merchants Asked To Support Downtown Study

The Ann Arbor landscape architectural firm of Johnson, Johnson & Roy has offered to prepare a plan for revitalizing Chelsea's downtown business district at a cost of \$3,850, and local merchants are being solicited to pick up the tab.

Mark Heydlauff, chairman of the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce's downtown development committee, said the response to requests for contributions "has been very good so far" and that he anticipates no problem in raising the money.

"I hope we will have \$4,000 in hand by the end of the month and can then go ahead and negotiate a contract," Heydlauff said. "That is the goal right now."

Heydlauff said that JJR will be asked to make another presentation to local business leaders before a contract is reached. Carl Johnson, a representative of the firm, spoke to an audience of 31 persons on Nov. 1 at a meeting hosted by the Ann Arbor Trust Co.

"We have some questions that need to be answered before we go ahead," Heydlauff said, "and they have agreed to come back."

One question that needs further definition is the area to be studied. The Ann Arbor firm proposed that it be bounded by the Conrail tracks on the north and Pierce St. on the south, and extend one block on both sides of Main St. between those streets.

"I think we might want to go a little farther north, perhaps to Dewey St., and maybe shorten the southern boundary to Van Buren or Lincoln St.," Heydlauff said. "Those are the kinds of details that need to be worked out."

Heydlauff added that, if a contract is signed, he expects actual work on the project will not begin until after the first of the year. "We're coming into the Christmas season, the busiest time of the year for merchants," he pointed out. "Nobody is going to have much time until that is over."

In its Nov. 1 presentation JJR accented an approach based on preserving the central business district's historic and architectural features. Also discussed were heavy Main St. traffic and a possible need for more off-street parking.

In its contract proposal the firm suggested a review of existing base maps, reports, surveys and aerial photographs, along with traffic and parking problems and opportunities. From that would come a preliminary plan to be outlined at a day-long workshop conducted for local businessmen.

"The workshop will conclude with a range of improvement projects and a consensus on priorities for phasing of these improvements over time," the proposal stated.

Any further work to be done would be subject to additional fees for consultation or design services on a project by project basis, the proposal states.

Governor Said Unresponsive On Cassidy Lake Issues

A stiffly worded letter sent to Gov. Blanchard by the chairman of the local Committee To Fence Or Close Cassidy Lake Prison accuses the governor of "not being responsive" to the 1,350-member group's concerns.

The letter was signed by Ronald D. Olmsted, chairman of the committee, and dated Nov. 14.

Olmsted cited past responses from the governor promising "to work with the community in a constructive manner" through the Cassidy Lake Community Liaison Council and give its recommendations "every possible consideration."

The council submitted its recommendations on Sept. 30, the letter points out, and "essentially every recommendation was rejected."

"The members of the Committee To Fence Or Close Cassidy Lake Prison... believe this is just a continuation of the rhetoric and broken promises that they have heard before without action from Lansing," the letter stated. "We will not tolerate this."

Olmsted, in effect, disassociated his committee from the liaison council, even though he is a member of it.

"Please realize that the liaison council does not represent the residents of the Chelsea-Cassidy Lake area or the 1,350 members of the Committee to Fence or

Close Cassidy Lake Prison," he wrote.

He urged that the governor "begin to listen" to the individuals and governmental units which support his committee's goals.

"We implore you to heed our concerns and fears," he concluded. "Please put the right kind of prisoners at Cassidy Lake Prison and take responsibility for keeping them there. Or close it."

Stoffer New President of Fair Board

William A. Stoffer has been elected president of the Chelsea Community Fair Board to fill out the unexpired term of Arthur Steinaway who resigned because he has moved out of the area.

In other business conducted at the board's annual meeting, held on Nov. 10, membership on the board was reduced from 27 to 24. Edson Whitaker was elected to the board to fill a vacancy.

Olmsted organized the committee last summer after three escapees from Cassidy Lake broke into his Ivey Rd. home, stole several items and burglarized another residence before they were recaptured following a 12-hour police chase through the woods and swamps of the Waterloo area.

They were among the 46 inmates who have walked away from the minimum security institution so far this year. The prison is unfenced. Security measures consist primarily of periodic "head counts" by unarmed guards, plus some patrolling around the perimeter.

A Sept. 12 analysis of the prison population showed that 117 of the 270 inmates were under sentence for violent assaultive crimes, including homicide. It also showed that the average stay per inmate is less than six months, even though the purpose of the institution is supposed to be rehabilitation through education and occupational skills programs.

The Liaison Council subsequently recommended that prisoners convicted of assaultive crimes be removed and that the population be screened to identify felons who would benefit from the institution's educational program. Those recommendations were rejected by the Michigan Department of Corrections, which operates Cassidy Lake.

Tighter security measures were imposed in early October, and there have been no escapes since. The escape rate normally goes down during the cold weather months.

Olmsted has previously accused state officials of "stonewalling" in the hope that his committee will eventually lose interest and give up its efforts. He promises to continue the campaign until "they do something meaningful" to correct the problems.

Jerry Picklesimer Brings First Buck to Standard

Honors for bringing the first deer taken on opening day of the firearm season to The Standard office went to Jerry Picklesimer of 16791 Winters Rd.

Picklesimer shot an eight-point buck in the Cavanaugh Lake area at 7:20 a.m. yesterday morning. He was hunting with his son, Jason, 12.

"We saw six or seven deer beginning at daylight," Picklesimer said, "and watched them. This buck went into a low spot, and I decided to sneak and jump him within shooting range."

The buck flushed, and Picklesimer fired several rounds from his slug-loaded 12-gauge semi-automatic shotgun. One went home, a perfect neck shot.

"I was shooting across a cornfield and wasn't sure I'd hit him. It was long range, at least a 100 yards. I followed up and found the buck dead not far from where I had last seen him."

Picklesimer said he was actually looking for another, larger buck, at least 10 or 12 points, which he had observed in the area before opening day. "I didn't see the big one, but I'm happy with this one," he said.

Opening day deer hunters encountered a weather situation of light rain and drizzle, conditions which discourage both deer and hunter activity. Given good hunting weather, about half the harvest for the 16-day deer season is normally recorded on opening morning. That probably didn't happen yesterday.

Judging by the numbers of vehicles parked along area roads, the hunter turn-out was at least normally big. However, few shots were heard. Deer and hunters were both trying to keep dry, and hiding from each other.

Workfare/Energy Agreement Reached

An agreement between House and Senate legislators and the Executive Office has been reached on spending the disputed \$42.6 million between workfare and energy programs.

Representative David Hollister, (D-Lansing), one of the leading legislators in the negotiations, said the agreement was reached on "good faith" between the different sides and said "there shouldn't be any major controversy" approving the legislation.

Representative Ralph Ostling (R-Roscommon), the other principal negotiator from the house side, told his Republican colleagues that while legislators got "sucked into" negotiations with the Senate on the proposal, it "is as close as we can get while keeping some personal credibility and credence."

The proposal will employ a portion of the Senate Republican "MOST" plan (Michigan Opportunity and Skills Training) which will cost approximately \$8 million in general funds. The MOST portion will include educa-

tion and job training for welfare recipients.

The proposal will also include a neighborhood works program, which House Fiscal Agency officials said will cost approximately \$13.1 million.

Participants in the program would be paid minimum wage, Hollister said, and while the program will not be punitive, persons refusing to participate will be subject to current sanctions and cut off from three months of benefits.

The program does not include an emphasis on workfare done by private firms, however, which is what House Republicans had wanted.

Ostling said a pilot private firm program will be included in the package. A bill recently approved in the House Appropriations Committee would center the workfare component largely on private firms performing home weatherization projects and hiring welfare recipients as employees.

The energy portion of the agreed upon package will provide shutoff protection for some 42,000 recipients, while permitting

"vendering" of utility grants directly to the utility companies.

Home weatherization projects would be performed by community agencies that would hire welfare recipients, but no figure on how much the program will cost has been agreed to, Hollister reported.

Negotiations have been in progress since early summer, when the House and Senate failed to reach accord on the \$42.6 million and agreed to hold the issue over until an agreement was reached.

The \$42.6 million was initially proposed by Governor Blanchard as welfare grant level increases but the House converted the figure to utility shutoff protection while the Senate insisted it be used for workfare.

Suit Filed Against BASF Wyandotte

A promise by BASF Wyandotte to chart the movement of contaminated groundwater near its North and South Works plant failed to avoid a lawsuit filed by Attorney General Frank Kelley demanding the company clean up the pollution.

A June, 1981, sampling by the Department of Natural Resources found 16 toxic and carcinogenic chemicals in eight soil and ground water sites.

The contaminated waste flows to the Detroit River and ultimately to Lake Erie, Kelley said when he threatened on Aug. 29 to file suit in U. S. District Court in Detroit if the immediate cleanup was not begun and dumping of hazardous chemicals halted.

Kelley said the company's proposed study to chart groundwater movement "is a logical first step. I am disappointed, however, that the company won't make a firm commitment to clean up the contamination which it admits is present on these sites."

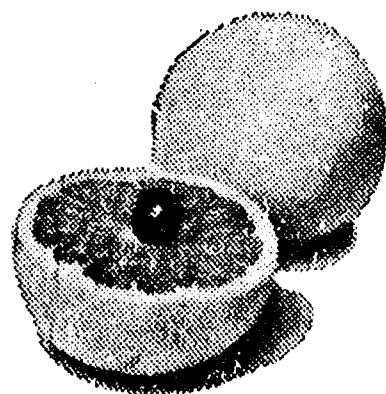
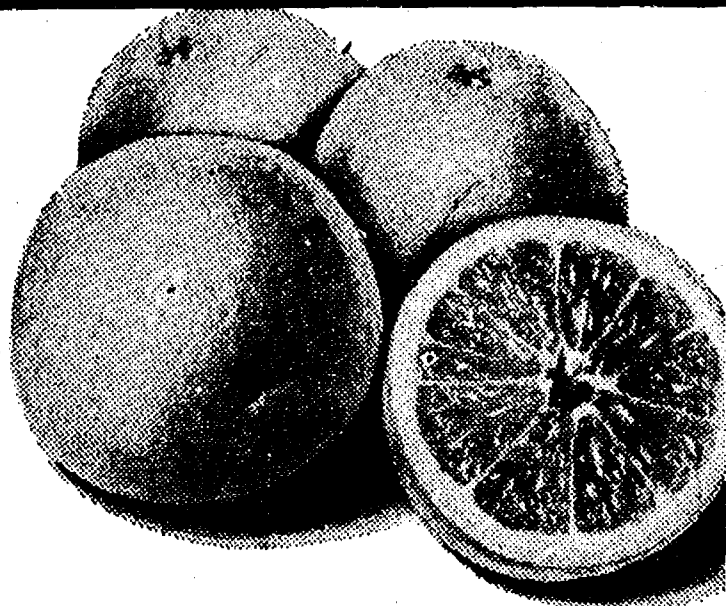

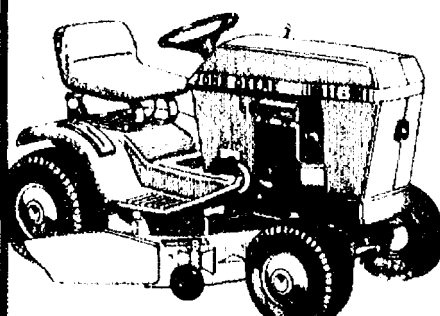

Van Meer Chosen for Education Forum

Chelsea Superintendent Ray Van Meer has been chosen as one of only 10 Michigan school superintendents to attend the National Forum on Excellence in Education to be held in Indiana next month.

Van Meer was recommended by the State Department of Education to attend the forum, which is sponsored by the U. S. Department of Education.

T. H. Bell, U. S. secretary of education, said in a recent letter to those invited to participate in the forum that the purpose of the program is to bring together people who play vital roles in ad-

vancing education to share experiences and ideas as well as problem solving techniques.

Bell said the forum should "provide a useful arena for the exchange of ideas." He added that it should also be helpful in preparing state legislation, programs, policies and in initiating programs for excellence at schools and colleges.

Van Meer will be among school superintendents, governors, legislators, board of education members and others to attend the forum which will be held Dec. 6, 7 and 8 at the Indiana Convention Center in Indianapolis.

Students Do Well in Mich. Assessment Tests

The results are in from the annual Michigan Assessment test, and, over-all, Chelsea students did well.

The test, commonly known as the MEAP test, is administered to fourth, seventh and tenth grade students across the state every fall. Students are tested on reading and math skills and graded on the number of objectives they attain. Each objective is measured by a set of three items. An objective is obtained if the student correctly answers at least two of the three items.

The only Chelsea students to show a significant decline in scores from 1982 were seventh grade students at Beach Middle school.

High school counselor Sue Carter said that while seventh grade students scores did drop, they were still relatively high when compared to other schools. In mathematics the students went from 84.5 percent in the highest level of attainment in 1982 to 78.3 percent this year. In reading students dropped from 90 percent in the top group in 1982 to 81.7 percent this year.

In math, seventh grade students achieved their highest scores in metric measurement with 73 percent attainment. In reading, they did best in vocabulary meaning with 90 percent attainment.

Carter said it is important to note that scores for the same group of students when they were in the fourth grade were also somewhat low, with only about 80 to 82 percent scoring in the top achievement level.

Fourth grade students at North Elementary school did "super" on this year's MEAP tests, Carter said.

In mathematics 83.7 percent of the students finished in the top

achievement group, up from 72.3 percent last year. In reading 86 percent finished in the top group, over last year's score of 80.9.

MEAP scores for South Elementary fourth grade students remained stable, Carter said. Math scores dropped slightly from last year's 85.3 percent in the top group to this year's 83.9. Reading scores also showed a very slight decrease. Last year 86.7 percent finished in the top level of attainment, this year that percentage dropped to 86.4.

"Chelsea High school students did an exceptional job on the tests this year," Carter said. Students improved scores in both math and reading over last year. In math 85.8 percent of students finished in the top level of attainment, compared to 72.2 percent last year. In reading 91.2 percent of the students scored in the top groups, compared to 85.6 percent last year.

Results of the assessment test are sent to the parents of students, Carter said. Each teacher also receives a classroom listing so problems in specific areas may be addressed.

Child Study Club Hears Program On Beauty Tips

She discussed hair styles and hair care as well as the return of elegance in fashion.

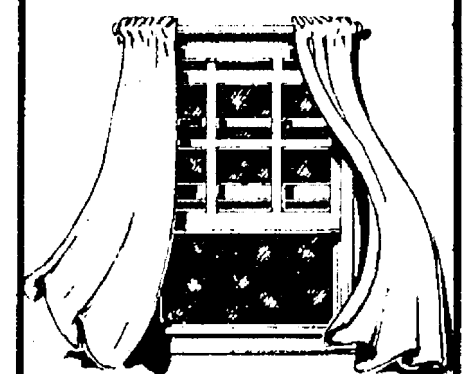

School Board Notes

Present at a regular meeting of the Chelsea Board of Education Monday, Nov. 7 were Schumann, Heller, Dils, Grau, Feeney, ComEAU, Superintendent Van Meer, Assistant Superintendent Mills, Principals Williams, Conklin, Benedict, Wojcik, Assistant Principal Vogel, Athletic Director Nemeth, and guests.

Meeting called to order at 8 p.m. by President Dale Schumann.

President Dale Schumann recognized several students and staff members for their recent accomplishments. They are as follows: Becky Schlupe, high school senior, who placed second in the U. S. Senate Leadership competition representing Washtenaw county. Becky is a member of the National Honor Society, a cheerleader, senior class representative on the Student Council, and was co-chairperson of the Homecoming Committee. Ken Larson, golf coach, and his top five players—Kurt Eisenbeiser, Doug Otto, Mike Carignan, Eric Schaffner, and Kim Ritter—were also recognized. Doug Otto has been named to the all-state golf team. Chelsea placed second in the state meet; this is the first Chelsea team ever to qualify for the state meet. Ron Nemeth, athletic director, was recognized for the many, many hours he put forth in conjunction with the renovation of the outdoor facilities. He worked many hours in the evenings and on weekends to aid the project completion.

Superintendent Van Meer reported that a communication had been received from the County Health Department, indicating that of the 152 swimming pools in the county, the Charles S. Cameron Pool is one of the 30 best operated pools.

The Board entered as official communications the following letters: a letter of appreciation to the Dexter schools for the use of their athletic facilities, a complimentary letter from a district resident concerning the Superintendent's fifth annual report, a letter from Dan Klermer complimenting Chelsea's English Department, and a letter from State Superintendent Runkel relative to the gifted and talented program.

Paul Ash, interim basketball coach, presented a brief summary of his background and briefly discussed the upcoming season.

Counselor Sue Carter presented to the board a report of the Michigan Assessment Test results, reviewing all test results for grades 4, 7 and 10. She also commented on individual aptitude scores for North, South, Beach and the High School. Sue also complimented the Board on funding for additional tests in conjunction with the California Achievement Test. These tests will be used to identify slow learners and gifted children.

The Board approved the 1983-84 Athletic Code.

Superintendent Van Meer indicated that the High School Commission's final report will

soon go to the State Board of Education. At the last writing, it appeared that the Commission will recommend that school districts seriously consider requiring students to have four years of language arts, which include reading, writing, literature and communication skills, two years of science, two years of mathematics, three years of social studies, and one-half year of computer literacy. An additional recommendation would be two years of study in the following areas: vocational education, foreign language, fine arts, health and physical education. Of the 21 credits required for graduation, 13½ would be required credits as recommended by the Commission.

Superintendent Van Meer is one of the 10 state superintendents to be selected to attend a National Forum on Excellence in Education in Indianapolis.

President Schumann indicated that the Student Leadership Forum will be held Friday at Washtenaw Community College.

Superintendent Van Meer presented a legislative update, commenting on Senate Bill 50 which would set a school bus passenger limit to no more than 10% over the manufacturer's rated capacity. He also commented on Senate Bill 181, whereby cities, townships and school districts could, by resolution, hold an election by mail, and on Senate Bill 439, which would prohibit corporal punishment in the schools.

Meeting adjourned at 9:07 p.m.

Chelsea Police Nab Man on Credit Card Theft Charge

Glen A. Harris, 20, of Dexter has been arrested and charged on two felony counts in connection with the theft of a credit card from the desk of a teacher at Chelsea High School.

Police Chief Robert Aello said the credit card was reported missing by the teacher, who had left his wallet in a desk drawer. The wallet, minus the card, was later found in the school building.

Shortly after, a suspicious downtown merchant called police to report that someone was trying to use the card to make a purchase. When Aello and patrolman Rick Walter arrived, the suspect had moved on to another store, where he was arrested.

The county prosecutor's office authorized warrants against Harris for theft and fraudulent use of a credit card. Harris was arraigned in district court and released on \$1,000 personal bond.

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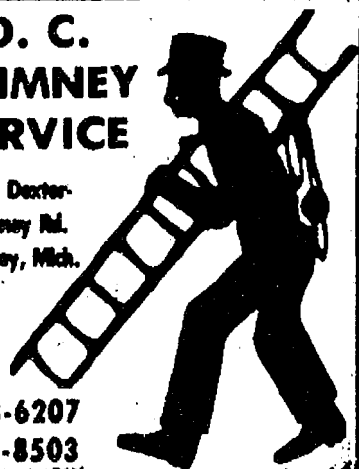
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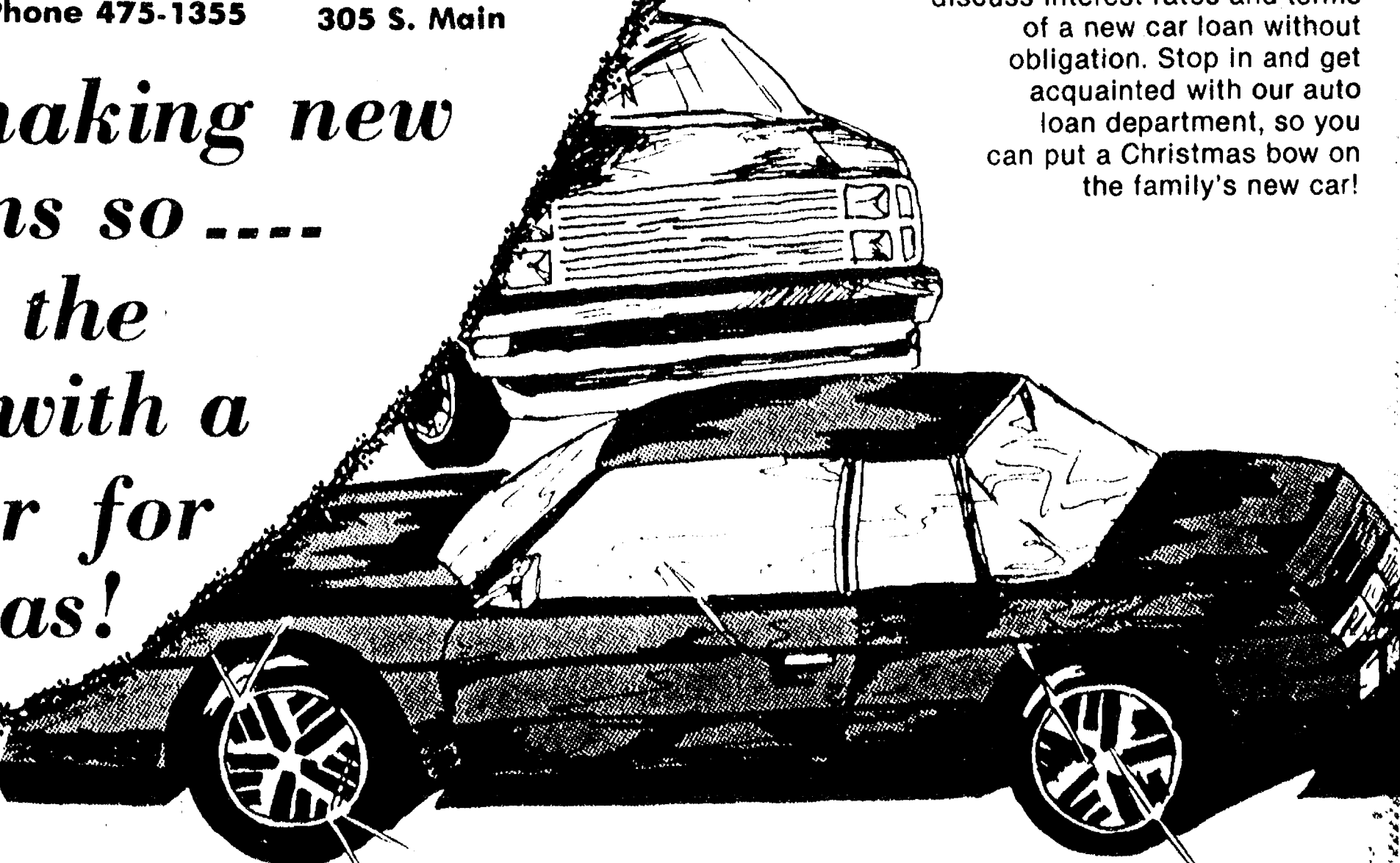
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A VIEW from the CLOCK TOWER

This is my first fall as a resident of Chelsea, and I am not only impressed but gratified by the village leaf pick-up program which has already saved me a lot of time, effort and trouble, and possibly also a little money.

You don't appreciate such services until you have lived without them and had to cope with their lack.

In the several communities that I have lived in before moving here, getting rid of the annual autumn leaf drop was my problem, and a considerable problem it was. Burning leaves was prohibited in all of those places, as it should be. The smoke is a nuisance, and the fires burn holes in streets, driveways or lawns wherever they are ignited.

Disposing of leaves is a real hassle if you have to stuff them into trash bags and put them out for pick-up. Jamming leaves into a plastic sack is like putting two pounds of you-know-what into a one pound bag. It's especially discouraging when you have to buy the empty bags and pay by the piece for the full ones to be collected.

My 82-year-old parents gather about 60 bags of leaves off their Redford township lawn every fall. They buy the bags, fill them, and pay a surcharge per bag to have them carried away. That's the way it is in most places, including all others that I have lived in.

Thus it was to my pleasant surprise when my Chelsea neighbors told me that all I had to do was get my leaves out to the street, and village crews would take them away. Lo and behold, the system works. The leaves do indeed get picked up and hauled.

Disposing of leaves never will be easy, but it's a heckuva lot easier the way Chelsea does it.

When public utilities superintendent Bud Hafner told me that the total truckloads of leaves removed by village crews number in the hundreds every fall, I was at first astonished. That is an awful lot of leaves. Then I reflected that Chelsea has an awful lot of trees which contribute immensely to the beauty of the town. What has been given needs to be taken away.

The leaf-hauling service is not free—nothing that government does ever is—but I figure it is a good use of my tax dollars. I have paid a lot more for much less.

While on the subject, let me say that I have found Chelsea's public services to be excellent during the four months that I have lived in the village. There have been no serious problems yet—and I hope there aren't—and everything has worked. The lights go on when I flip a switch, the water runs out the taps and down the drains into the sewer and goes out of sight like it is supposed to. Tree-trimmings have been taken away within a few days of being put out for pick-up. The street-cleaning machine comes around regularly. Household refuse left at the curb disappears every Tuesday and Friday.

If I have a complaint, it is that Chelsea does not put its water supply through a treatment system to remove at least part of the excessive amount of lime that comes with the liquid from village wells. Installation of a water softener solved our household problem, which was a coating of lime on all of our water-using appliances and bathroom fixtures.

I realize that not everybody likes soft water. It is pretty blah to drink, and it can cause plumbing problems by creating an excess of soapuds. There must be a happy medium somewhere. A couple of communities in which I have lived "partially softened" their water, and everybody seemed to be pleased to the extent that a large number of people can be.

All in all, I give the village of Chelsea good marks for the quality of its public services. And I'm extra happy about having the leaves picked up. It's a service that I am not used to, but have gotten to like.

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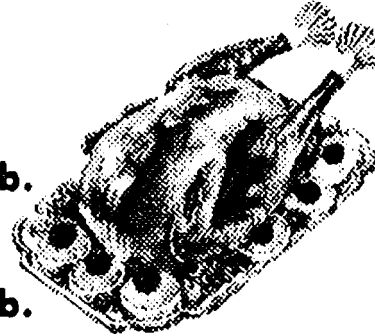

Many people are expressing the fears that they have because of our close proximity to the Cassidy Lake Prison. My Dear Governor Blanchard:

You are not being responsive to the people of the Chelsea/Cassidy Lake area regarding the Cassidy Lake Prison problem.

In your responses to my letters and to members of the Committee to Fence or Close Cassidy Lake Prison, you always make the statement that, "We stand ready to work with the community in a constructive manner through the Community Liaison Council", or you say "An institution-community liaison council, consisting of local civic leaders, is in the process of studying information on the facility's inmate population and their recommendation will be given every possible consideration here in Lansing."

The Liaison Council made their recommendations on September 30, 1983. The recommendations were not "given every possible consideration here in Lansing." Essentially every recommendation was rejected!

The members of the Committee To Fence Or Close Cassidy Lake Prison and the people in the Chelsea/Cassidy Lake area

believe this is just a continuation of the rhetoric and broken promises they have heard before without action from Lansing. We will not tolerate this.

Please realize that the Liaison Council does not represent the residents of the Chelsea/Cassidy Lake area or the 1,350 members of the Committee To Fence Or Close Cassidy Lake Prison. 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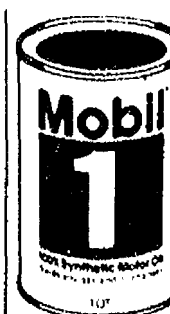

All School Buses Conduct Student Evacuation Drills

It has taken Chelsea students an average 63 seconds to exit school buses in an ongoing emergency evacuation drill program.

Ralph Brier, bus supervisor, thinks that is pretty good.

"I would say it's good," he said. "The drill which requires forward and rear evacuation has been very good."

One bus load of students has been performing the drill each morning behind the school district bus garage. Brier said the program will probably be completed by Dec. 5.

Evacuation drills are required by state law and are intended to instruct students and bus drivers in the correct behavior in an emergency situation, such as an accident. The State Department of Education recommends that drills be conducted every 60 days.

The program consists of three drills, Brier said. Students are timed first as they exit from the front of the bus, they then re-board and exit from the rear emergency exit. During the last drill students sitting in the front

of the bus exit from the front door while students in the rear of the bus exit from the emergency door.

Students are instructed to move quickly and orderly and to leave all lunch boxes and books on the bus.

The average time to complete the front door exit for the students on the first 12 Chelsea buses to complete the drill was 66

seconds, Brier said. Students completed the back door exit drill in 80 seconds and the front and back door drill in an average 45 seconds.

For the most part students have been receptive, he said. One bus must repeat the drill because students were uncooperative.

Washtenaw County Has 26,990 Vets

Washtenaw county has a total of 26,990 veterans, of whom 21,870 are persons who have served during a war-time period, according to the Veterans Administration.

The latest statistics show that 9,690 served in Vietnam Era, and of these 9,460 had no service in Korea. There are 4,340 Korean Conflict veterans, and of these 3,810 did not see service in World War II.

The largest group of veterans is from World War II. They number 8,370. There are still 220 veterans from World War I.

Since the ending of the Vietnam War 1,590 persons from Washtenaw county have served in the armed forces and have been discharged. There are an additional 3,230 persons who were in service between the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Era. Others who served in previous periods of peace-time number 290.

More than one-fourth of all Vietnam Era veterans served in the combat area during the almost 11-year war.

In Michigan there are approximately 1,117,000 veterans of whom 913,000 served in time of war. There are 322,000 Vietnam Era veterans; 192,000 Korean Conflict veterans; 419,000 World War II veterans, and 11,000 World War I veterans. There have been 62,000 persons who have been in service since the end of the Vietnam Era, and 126,000 ex-servicemen who served in different peace-time eras.

Christian P. Koch Awarded Marines Good Conduct Medal

Marine Lance Cpl. Christian P. Koch, son of Paul C. and Rosemary Koch of 1950 Baker Rd., Dexter, was recently awarded the U. S. Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal.

The award, which signifies honest and faithful service over a three-year period, was established by the Secretary of the Navy in July 1896 to recognize good behavior and conduct in the Marine Corps.

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Herrst Suit Against Village May Be Settled

Village president Jack Merkel believes in personal diplomacy and, as a result, the 14-year-old dispute between Chelsea and farmer Bernard Herrst of 780 N. Freer Rd. appears to be on its way toward settlement.

Merkel announced that an agreement has been reached during a meeting involving himself, administrator Frederick Weber and members of the Herrst family. All that remains is for the council to ratify the accord.

It all began back in 1969 when the village bought an easement through the Herrst property in order to construct a sewage lift station along Freer Rd. During the construction process, Herrst

claimed, considerable damage was done to his property by contractors working for the village. He sued for losses of crops, trees and fencing.

The issue has been bouncing around in litigation ever since as attorneys argued back and forth over who was responsible for what. Agreement was eventually reached that the village should pay Herrst \$1,695 for crop damage, and that Herrst should drop his claim for loss of trees which were in the road right-of-way and not inside his boundary fences.

What remained was a dispute over Herrst's claim for replacement of 60 rods (330 feet) of fence

and what it should cost. That has been argued for two years.

Merkel said that, if the council backs him up, the village will buy the 60 rods of fencing and village crews will install it. The agreement calls for completing the job by Dec. 15.

"This matter has dragged on far too long, and that does no credit to the village government," Merkel said. "It just hasn't been handled very well. It should have been settled a long time ago."

"I decided to try to do something about it, and it was surprisingly easy to reach agreement once everybody concerned sat down together and talked about the problem. I probably should have done it sooner."

Merkel added that he next plans to get into the problem along Gene Dr. south of Old US-12, where residents have asked to be allowed to secede from the village because, they claim, they are not receiving adequate services.

There are four occupied houses along the street and a fifth under construction. Gene Dr. is not dedicated as a village street. The homes are not in a dedicated subdivision but are inside the village limits and were when they were built.

"It's a complicated situation, but I want to get into it and try to resolve it," Merkel said. "This could become another one of those problems that drags on forever, and I don't want that to happen."

Ann Arbor Trust Reports Sharp Growth in Income

Ann Arbor Trust Co. reported net income for the nine months ended Sept. 30 of \$763,166 or \$3.63 per share, an increase of 15 percent over the \$663,722 or \$3.16 per share earned during the same period last year. Net income for the third quarter ended Sept. 30, was \$270,623, or \$1.29 per share, an increase of 13 percent over the \$239,327, or \$1.14 per share for the same quarter in 1982.

Total assets rose 38 percent from \$105 million in September 1982 to \$144 million on Sept. 30. The sharp growth in assets was attributed to a 42 percent increase in deposits, due primarily to demand for money market type savings accounts which became available last December.

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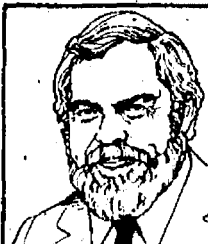
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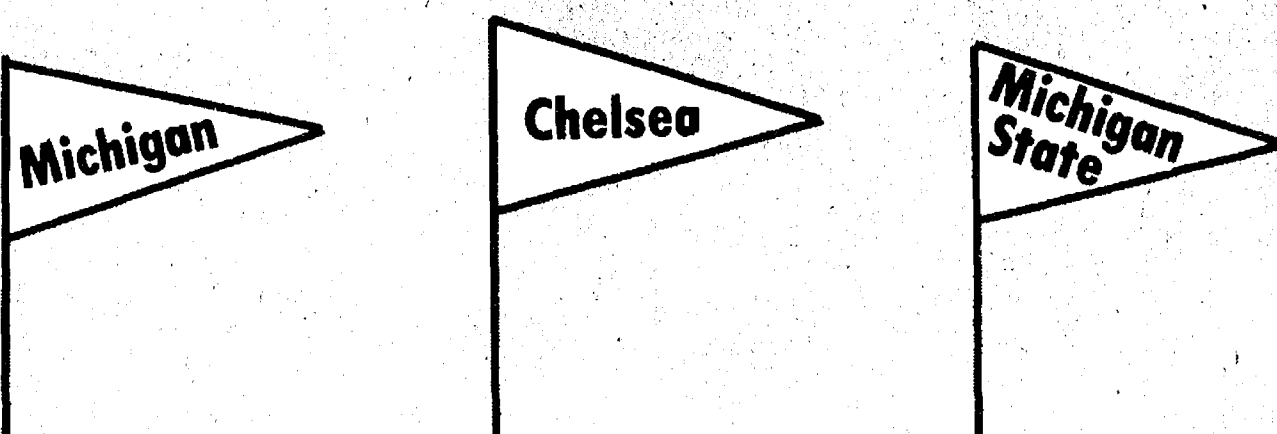

Marshall and Gallas Lead Grid Honors

It isn't often that a football player wins unanimous selection to the all-Southeastern Conference team on both offense and defense, but Jay Marshall accomplished the feat.

The 6-1, 190-pound senior was picked by everybody as a running back and as a defensive back.

Chris Gallas made the honor team as a unanimous choice at offensive tackle, and was also chosen as a linebacker on defense.

Center and captain Glenn Prinzing and wide receiver Dave Walter were picked for the offensive honor squad.

Named to the second team were quarterback Marty Steinhauer on offense and Prinzing on defense.

Marshall, Prinzing, Steinhauer and Walter were awarded first-team all-area honors on the squad selected by the Ann Arbor News. Gallas was named to the second team, and David Steinhauer, Dan Pennington and David Kiel received honorable mentions.

The Detroit Free Press honored Gallas by picking him at guard on its all-metro western team.

Gallas was announced as the Bulldogs' most valuable player. Marshall and Marty Steinhauer tied for the title of best in the backfield. Glenn Prinzing was chosen best lineman. Jerry Hammerschmidt and Mike Wynn were nominated as "most improved" players during the season.

David Steinhauer will captain the 1984 Bulldog varsity. He played this year as a tight end on offense and linebacker on defense. The knee injury he suffered in the season's final game turned out not to be so serious as first feared and did not require surgery.

Marshall set an all-time Chelsea High school career record for tackles on defense, although he was narrowly beaten

out by Gallas as the Bulldogs' leader tackler this season.

"It's hard to say enough about either one of those boys," coach Gene LaFave said. "They both played extremely well for us. They were both in every game on practically every play, and their positions meant that they had to hit or get hit, or both, every time the ball was snapped. Unless you have done it, you don't realize how tough that is."

"If we had been able to afford to let either Jay or Chris concentrate on just one phase of the game—offense or defense—they would have stood out even more. We just didn't have the depth to allow that. They are two excellent athletes and fine young men."

The Bulldogs finished the season with a 4-3 record and were 3-2 in the SEC, finishing in a three-way tie for second place in the league.

Reflecting on the season, LaFave came up with one footnote of interest to Bulldog fans.

"I've been a coach for 11 years (five in Chelsea) and in all the previous 10 put together I've never seen so many injuries as we had this season. It got to be kind of unbelievable. There is no explanation, it was just one of those things, a streak of bad luck."

I certainly hope it's behind us.

"The boys responded remarkably well to a lot of adversity. We didn't have much depth to start, and we came out as well as we did only because so many kids stepped into holes created by injuries and filled them capably. This team deserves more credit than it has received."

Lady Cagers Lose In SEC Finals

They went almost all the way. The Chelsea varsity girls basketball team made it to the Southeastern Conference tournament finals last week, defeating Tecumseh and Milan but losing in the end to Saline.

"Still, the tournament was a 'good one' according to coach Jim Winter. The team went into the tournament tied for last place in the conference. At the end of competition last Friday, Chelsea was tied for third place with Dexter, behind first place winner Saline and second place winner Milan. Rounding out the conference were Tecumseh in fifth and Lincoln in sixth place.

Things were looking very good for Chelsea when they conquered Milan, 43-40, on Tuesday, Nov. 8.

The Chelsea team started out slow in that contest and was behind by 10 points, 25-15, at half-time.

"They were playing man-to-man defense and that caused us some problems," Winter said.

But in the second half Chelsea changed its strategy, also using a man-to-man defense and adjusting its offense, to catch up to Milan.

"We caught them and then we went ahead of them," Winter said. "After we got the lead we just never gave it back."

Chelsea gave up only 15 points during the entire second half. The team also played good offense during the second half, scoring 28 of its points.

The lady Bulldogs also scored well on free throws, with 59 percent. Of 22 Chelsea free throw attempts, 13 were successful, Winter said.

High scorer for the game was

Beth Unterbrink with 19 points. Kristi Headrick had nine points.

Samantha Collinsworth was leading rebounder with six. She was followed by Headrick with five rebounds.

Anne Weber had four assists and Unterbrink had three.

Hope continued to run high going into tournament finals with Saline. But in the end Chelsea dropped the game to their opponents, 55-50.

"Close, close, the whole game was close," Winter said.

Chelsea jumped off to a quick lead, but was down by one, 11-10, at the end of the first quarter.

During second quarter play, both teams scored 16 points leaving the Bulldogs still trailing by one, 27-26, at the end of the first half.

The team tightened defense and pulled ahead 38-36 in the third quarter and saw Saline's center foul-out during the beginning moments of the fourth quarter.

"We thought we were in good shape," Winter said.

The team continued to score well but suffered a let-down on defense which Saline took advantage of to pull ahead and eventually win the game.

Unterbrink and Collinsworth led scoring with 15 points each. Joann Tobin scored 10 points.

Cole was named most valuable runner on the squad and Bradley most improved. Bradley and Steve Hunn will be co-captains of next fall's squad.

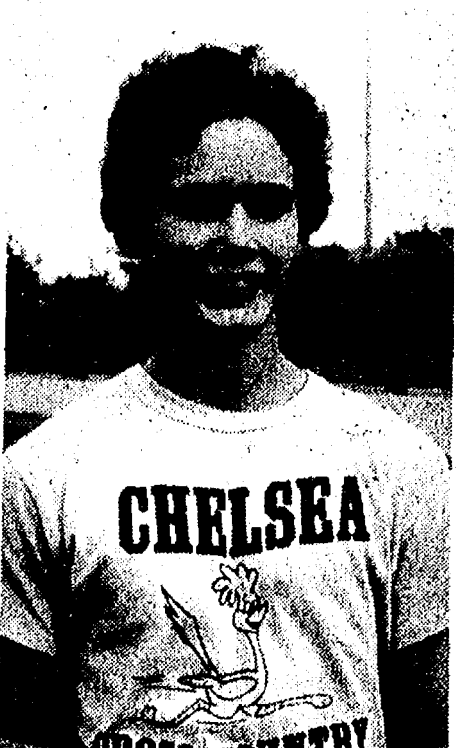

OUT IN THE OPEN

I have mixed feelings about the new law under which payers of Michigan's state income tax will have the option to earmark a portion of an anticipated refund check for the purpose of protecting so-called "non-game" wildlife and plants.

I sympathize with the idea, but honestly doubt that it is good government.

The way the new law will work is simply this:

On the 1983 state income tax form there will appear a check-off box allowing you to designate a portion of your asked-for refund for research and habitat improvement for certain birds, mammals, fish and plants which the state has declared to be in need of help.

Fine. I'm all for it, and will make my "X" when I settle up with Lansing next April.

What bothers me, as both a continuing student and former employee of government, is that the idea of earmarking chunks of general taxes is a subversion of the system under which we purport to operate. We elect representatives to the Legislature to decide how general tax money should be spent. If we make the spending decisions beforehand, why bother with electing people who are supposed to make them for us?

There already are two check-off boxes on the state income form. One gives you the option to put some of your money into a campaign fund for election candidates. The other is for contributions to prevent child abuse, certainly a worthy cause. Now there will be a third one, to protect non-game wildlife and plants, another worthy cause.

What I fear is that every special-interest group around—and there are a lot of them—is going to seek an income tax check-off to finance its objectives. The result could be a laundry-list of boxes to be marked (or not) when you send in your tax form every year.

I know for a fact that the check-off system causes a whole lot of

trouble and cost for the state treasury department, which has to examine each tax return visually and record which boxes have been marked. That problem could perhaps be solved by developing a form which could be scanned by a computer.

So much for the negatives. The big positive is that the non-game check-off is expected to raise somewhere between half a million and a million dollars a year to benefit research and protection programs for eagles, ospreys, hawks, badgers, herons, Kirtland's warblers, loons, rare orchids and other threatened plants. The money is needed, no doubt about it.

Back in 1974, at the urging of the Department of Natural Resources, the Legislature passed an act setting up a "Living Resources" program in the DNR. The law opened a way for interested persons to contribute funds toward preservation of threatened and endangered wildlife and plant species.

The response was underwhelming, to say the least. As one who worked on the program by trying to generate public interest, I can honestly say that it has been a flop. All those people who supposedly were itching to contribute to such an effort never put their money where their mouths were.

Had an honest accounting been made, I am sure it would have shown that annual revenues never matched the costs of generating them. Several of us worked long and hard with few rewards in terms of hard cash coming into the Living Resources Fund. We began to wonder after awhile just how much interest there really is out there. Frankly, I still wonder, and am going to be interested to see how many people mark the new check-off box.

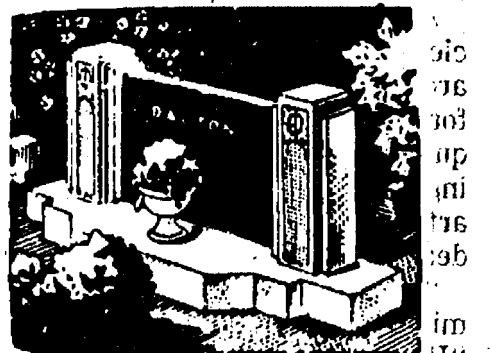
Somebody is sure to bring up the fact that money is already earmarked for management of wildlife and fish species that are legally open to harvest. That is true. Hunting and fishing license fees go into the Game and Protection Fund and

are restricted. In theory anyway, that income can't be used for any other purpose than to manage those relatively few species which are hunted and fished for.

Some of that money, incidentally, has been "diverted" into non-game purposes, and sportsmen have not complained loudly. Especially in the face of the anti-hunting movement, sportsmen have been willing to see a portion of their license dollars spent for uses that do not benefit them directly.

There is, however, a fundamental difference between special license fees and general tax revenues. When you buy a hunting or fishing license, you are paying something extra directly to support your personal outdoor recreation interests. When you check the non-game box on the income tax form, you will be, in effect, taking money away from education, health, welfare and other state services. You won't be contributing a penny. You will simply be saying, "I want this part of my tax money spent this way, but I'm not willing to kick in anything extra."

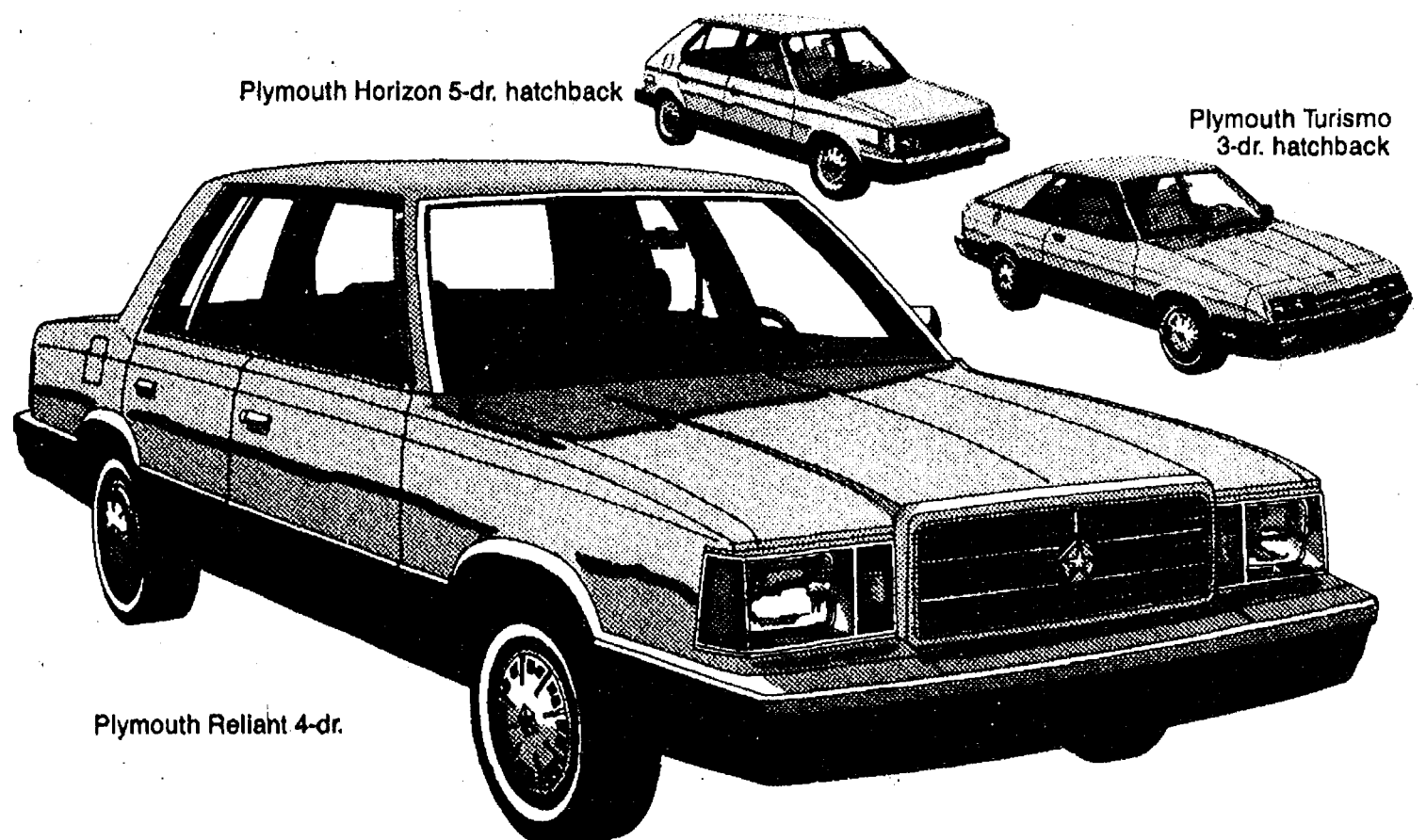
It's a complex issue, worth thinking about. My guess is that it's going to become important in times ahead as other income tax check-offs are sought by special interest groups for their particular purposes.

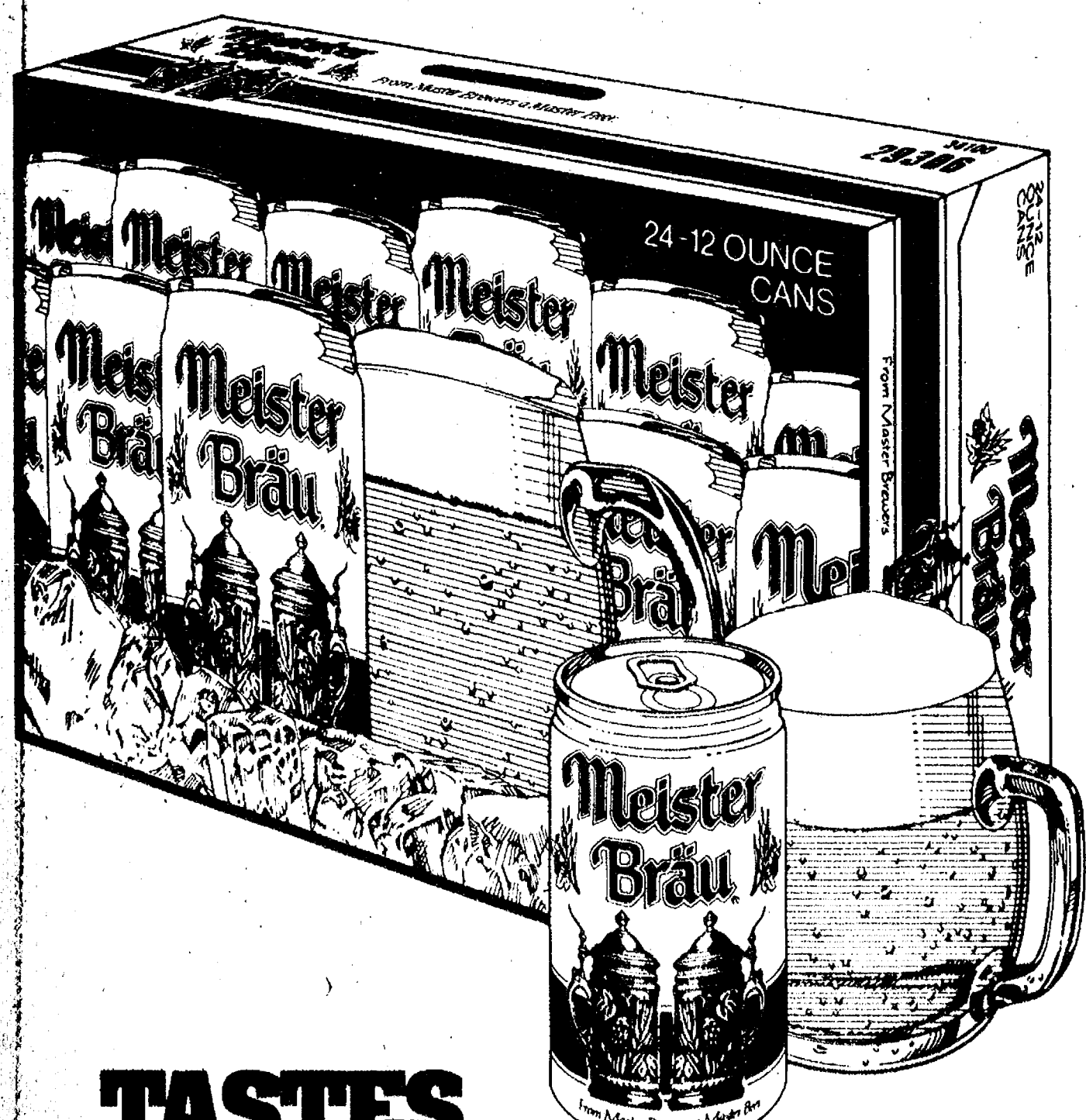

Archer Confirms Killing Two Deer with Arrow

The archer who killed two deer with one arrow from his 70-pound compound bow has come forward and identified himself, but asked that his name not be published for fear that he will lose his job.

"Let's face it, I was playing hockey, and the guy who was supposed to be covering for me didn't," the man told The Standard. "If my name comes out in this paper, I'll be fired, and I can't afford that."

The Sumpter township sportsman was hunting in Roscommon county near St. Helen on Sunday, Oct. 23. A large doe crossed the runway he was watching, and he released an arrow at close range. "I saw another deer behind the doe, but it never occurred to me that I might hit it too," he said. "I knew I had the doe because it was a close shot that I couldn't possibly miss."

As it turned out, the arrow went cleanly through the heart-lung area of the doe and had enough force left to penetrate the hind quarters of a button buck standing beyond. The blade cut an artery, and the buck bled to death.

"It was one of those one in a million things," the hunter said. "I'm sure it will never happen to me again. The amazing thing is that the arrow never hit a bone on either deer. It was a lightning strike, pure chance."

"I had a choice to make, and put my tag on the little buck. I still have venison left from last year, and don't really like the meat all that well. A buddy-tagged the doe. I know that's illegal, but what are you supposed to do when you have killed two deer with one shot? I wasn't about to waste either one."

The accomplishment of killing two deer with one arrow probably has been achieved before somewhere, but it is so rare as to be a "first" in the experience of this

reporter in 38 years of covering the Michigan hunting scene.

The hope is that his boss will relent, forgive the man for being absent without leave, and let his name be published.

Proper Care Is Key To Good Venison

Many people have a prejudice against certain foods because of a bad first experience with them. Rarely can these people be convinced to try the offending foods again.

People who say they don't like venison, probably had venison that was improperly butchered or prepared, says Glenn Dudderar, extension specialist in wildlife management. In Michigan, most deer produce excellent venison if they are properly handled.

Preparing and eating venison will be a more enjoyable experience for all—hunter, cook and consumers—if they follow some simple guidelines, he advises.

If you're the cook, but not the hunter, you can start the process by encouraging the hunter in your family to bring back a quality product.

Hunters should know their firearms and be reasonably proficient in their use so that they can kill "the deer" cleanly. Nothing spoils meat more than having a bruised and bloody deer from an improperly placed shot or multiple shots.

The cook should refuse to accept and prepare bruised, blood-shot meat, Dudderar says. Because the quality is so poor to start with, cooking can't possibly improve the meat.

Assuming the cook and hunter are different persons, the cook should always find out how meat was treated after the kill. The cook should ask:

—Was the deer gutted immediately (within minutes) after it was killed?

—Was the meat cooled below 40 degrees F within 12 hours of the kill?

—Was the meat kept at 40 degrees or below continually thereafter, even during transport?

—Was the meat wrapped to protect it from road fumes,

Commissioners, Legislators Tour Saline Project Farms

Saline area farms were visited by elected public officials during a Saline Valley Project tour sponsored by the Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District and the Co-operative Extension Service.

Highlighting soil and water

conservation accomplishments of the Saline Valley Project, the tour was attended by Washtenaw County Commissioners George Merkel and Larry Minick, Washtenaw County Drain Commissioner Jim Murray, State Senator Lana Pollack and representatives from the offices of U. S. Representative William Ford and U. S. Senator Donald Riegle.

The Saline Valley Project is one of 21 projects sponsored nationwide under USDA's Rural Clean Water Program. The project offers landowners with technical and financial assistance to correct agricultural runoff problems which are polluting surface water.

Tour stops included conservation tillage demonstration plots on Ernie Girsch's farm, Kirk and Marilyn Gordon's hog waste management system and Marvin and Robert Marion's dairy waste storage pit. All farms are located south of Saline.

A luncheon at St. John's Lutheran church, Bridgewater, followed the tour, where tour guests met and interacted with representatives of Washtenaw County agriculture. Dairy, hog, beef and cash-crop industries were represented along with agricultural business and the Farm Bureau.

According to Ron Struss, Extension Agricultural Agent, the main result of the tour and luncheon was improved understanding between government and agriculture. "Before government can be responsive to the needs of agriculture, it first needs to know what those needs are," Struss explained. "Events like these help government and agriculture become better acquainted so a stronger working relationship can be developed."

Jackson Area Hunter Bags Rare Trophy, An Atlantic Brant

An Atlantic brant was shot in the Jackson area on Nov. 1, a very rare occurrence according to Jerry Martz, Department of Natural Resources waterfowl specialist.

Brant—small geese which weigh 3-5 pounds—are saltwater birds and are normally found along the Atlantic coastal shorelines. They seldom venture as far inland as Michigan and, when they do, generally stick to the Great Lakes.

About one or two per year are harvested in Michigan during the waterfowl season.

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TILLAGE METHODS YIELD CHECKED: Ernie Girsch, Saline dairy farmer, and Reno Feldkamp of Pioneer Seeds, go over yield weights during harvest of the Saline Valley Project's Tillage Demonstration Plot on the Girsch farm. The Girschs are one of three farm families who assisted the Saline Valley Project in evaluating conventional and conservation tillage methods in side-by-side comparison.

Yield Results Checked on Tillage Demonstration Plots

Crop yields results are in from the second season of Saline Valley Project Tillage Demonstration Plots, studies which pit moldboard plowing, the old standard of tillage, against newcomers to the tillage scene, chisel plowing and no-till planting.

"We know chisel plowing and no-till will control erosion better than moldboard plowing," explained Rod Struss, Extension Agricultural Agent, "what these tillage demonstrations are exploring is whether these types of conservation tillage can compare yield-wise to moldboard plowing."

Results of the 1983 Tillage Demonstration Plots indicate that all three types of tillage will produce comparable yields when managed properly, results which back-up findings from 1982 Tillage Demonstration Plots. Struss commented that care is to be used in interpreting yield results from the tillage demonstrations since soil variation can account for 5 bu./acre difference in soybean yields and 10 bu./acre difference in corn yields. "Don't sort through the results with a fine-tooth comb," he warns, "what we are looking at are ball park comparisons."

No one tillage type yielded consistently better or worse than another, leading Struss to conclude that matching tillage systems to specific field conditions is the key to success.

Land and field operations for the tillage demonstrations were

donated by Saline Valley Project area farmers, Elmer Dibble of Ann Arbor, Ernie Girsch of Saline and Stan Poet of Bridgewater. Contributions of seed and herbicides were made by area agricultural businesses.

The Saline Valley Project is one of 21 projects funded nationwide under the USDA's Rural Clean Water Program. It is promoting the use of conservation tillage in order to reduce pollution of streams and lakes by silt and fertilizer eroding off of cropland.

Moldboard plowing, often known as "clean" tillage, completely turns the soil, burying any stalks, stubble or vegetation found on the soil surface. Following moldboard tillage, soil is completely exposed to the erosive forces of rain and wind. Chisel plows only partially turn the soil, leaving 30-60 percent of field surfaces covered with protective mulch. As its name implies, no-till planting involves no tillage, rather it depends on herbicides to control weeds at planting and special planters to place seed correctly through heavy surface mulch. No-till planting results in fields almost completely covered with protective mulch, and provides dramatic reductions in soil erosion.

Saline Valley Project Tillage Demonstrations will continue in 1984. "Every year that we run these studies," Struss explained, "we learn more on how to fit conservation tillage into Michigan agriculture."

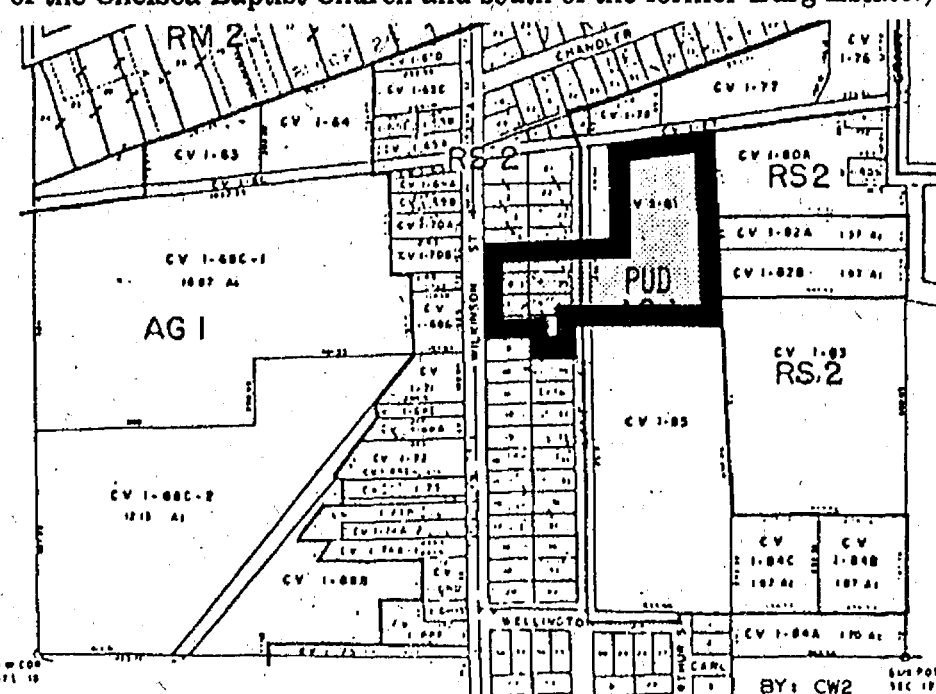

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, this Village Council held a public hearing on proposed Ordinance No. 79-AA, "AN AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 79 TO REZONE A CERTAIN PROPERTY FROM AG-1 AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT AND RS-2 SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT TO PUD PLANNED UNIT RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT—PART OF THE SOUTHWEST QUARTER OF SECTION 12, T2S, R3E" and Area Plan of the Planned Unit Development (PUD); and

WHEREAS, concerns were expressed regarding the impact of storm drainage; and

WHEREAS, this Village Council reviewed the findings and recommendations of the Chelsea Planning Commission; now,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that this Village Council concurs with respect to the standards set forth in Section 15.554 as follows:

1. The proposed development conforms to the adopted General Development Plan (GDP), as described in the Village Planner's report, dated 8/5/83 (Section 1 of Factors to Consider, and Section 5 of the Rezoning Petition Report). The revised area plan now complies with the two policies of the General Development Plan cited in Section 2 of the above Factors to Consider, namely:

a) The area plan proposes that the street through the site be dedicated to the Village as a public street, for future extension east to Grant Street. This will provide the interconnection called for in the GDP. While the proposed street will be a local residential street, rather than a major street as proposed in the GDP, and will not necessarily be an extension of Lincoln Street, the change in function is a logical and acceptable change in the GDP.

b) The site will be integrated into the Chelsea community by the public street and its future extension to the east, and by the sidewalks that will be located in the street right-of-way.

(Section 15.554D3-a)

2. The proposed development conforms to the intent and regulations of the PUD zoning district and the zoning ordinance (Section 15.554D3-b)

3. The proposed development will be adequately served by public facilities and services, as follows.

a) Wilkinson Street has sufficient capacity to handle the additional traffic that will be generated by the proposed development. The existing capacity of Wilkinson Street is 9,000 vehicle trips per day, whereas current traffic volume is estimated as 2,000 vehicle trips per day. The site, when fully developed as proposed, will generate 216 vehicle trips per day.

b) Police protection will be adequate, as evidenced by the Police Chief's letter of August 24, 1983.

c) Fire protection will be adequate, with the addition of the emergency fire lane from the southeast corner of the site, addition of a fire hydrant opposite the southwest corner of the building in the southeast part of the site, and provision of an 8 inch water line through the site.

d) Storm drainage will be adequate. The site will have on-site storm water detention areas capable of temporarily storing a 100 year storm of 24 hour duration. The storm water will be released under controlled conditions into Village storm sewers, after the storm conditions have passed. The site will discharge by sheet flow no more storm water runoff, and probably less, than it presently discharges.

e) The eight inch water line through the site will provide adequate water service. The line's future extension to the east to the 8 inch line in Grant Street will provide a loop in the system. In the meantime, the line will be connected to the two four inch water lines in Wilkinson and Dale Streets. While the four inch lines provide minimal service, the service will be adequate. (See Engineer's letter dated 9/6/83.)

f) Sanitary sewer service is adequate for the proposed development. The site has two options for service: 1) connect with the 24 inch sanitary sewer west of Wilkinson Street; or 2) connect with the 10 inch sewer in Wilkinson Street. The latter will require a lift station on-site; the former will require an easement through the Consumers Power property but will eliminate the need for a lift station. Consequently, the first option is preferred, but either will adequately serve the site. (See Engineer's letter dated August 23, 1983.)

g) Refuse pick-up and disposal will be provided by the Village. (Section 15.554D3-c)

4. The area plan provides a unified open space system. The open space areas are based on existing natural features and topography, and flow without interruption throughout the site. The plan also permits future open space connections to the southeast and east. (Section 15.554D3-d)

5. The street right-of-way, including the sidewalk and utilities in it, is to be dedicated to the Village. This will assure the public's right to use these facilities. The open space and other common facilities will be owned and maintained by the condominium association. The condominium association will also be responsible for maintaining the drainage system and the permanent pond. (Section 15.554D3-e)

6. Traffic to and from the site will not be inconvenient for, or hazardous to, the proposed development or the neighborhood. Wilkinson Street has ample capacity to carry the increased traffic that will

be generated by the development. The 28 peak hour vehicle trips will be able to turn between Wilkinson Street and the project street without causing congestion or hazard. The intersection of the proposed street with Wilkinson Street is well-spaced in relation to other streets, being approximately 600 feet south of Chandler Street and 1000 feet north of Wellington Street. The plan provides for pedestrian circulation across the site, in an east-west direction, and for future extension of this walk east to Grant Street. The dwelling units will be single-family attached units, owner occupied, and will be built at a density of 3.94 units per acre. Therefore, these units will be compatible with the character and density of the existing neighborhood. (Section 15.554D3-f)

7. Section 15.5543-g does not apply to this petition; the proposed development does not propose a mix of housing unit types or non-residential uses.

8. The proposed development will not produce noise, odors, or other external effects that are not common to low density (single-family) residential areas. Adjacent properties will be protected from vehicular lights by landscape screening. (Section 15.554D3-h)

9. The area plan is based upon the existing natural features - the existing pond and stand of trees are the focal point of the plan and will be preserved. The plan is also laid out to utilize the existing land form and will therefore minimize the amount of grading required. (Section 15.554D3-i)

10. The proposed street follows the natural topography of the site and is designed as a local residential street - its intended function. This street provides adequate access to the site and the plan provides for its extension east to Grant Street at a future time. (Section 15.554D3-j)

11. The sidewalk in the public street will provide for major pedestrian circulation through the site. This walk can be extended in the future to Grant Street, thereby providing pedestrian access to the center of the Village and to South Elementary School. A sidewalk across the site's Wilkinson Street frontage can be provided as part of a future special assessment district for a sidewalk between Chandler and Wellington Streets. (Section 15.554D3-k)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon the recommendation of the Chelsea Planning Commission, proposed Ordinance No. 79-AA, "AN AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 79 TO REZONE A CERTAIN PROPERTY FROM AG-1 AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT AND RS-2 SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT TO PUD PLANNED UNIT RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT—PART OF THE SOUTHWEST QUARTER OF SECTION 12, T2S, R3E" be adopted and the Area Plan consisting of two (2) sheets prepared by Beckett and Raeder and dated September 6, 1983 be approved in accordance with Section 4.4.8.D.1.1 (C.O.Z.C. 15.554 D.1.1.), subject to the following conditions:

1. The street and the lateral sanitary sewer and water main and appurtenances be constructed to Village standards and, together with a 60 foot right-of-way, shall be dedicated to the Village of Chelsea, between Wilkinson Street and the east property line. The 8 inch water line shall be constructed to the east property line, and shall be properly terminated so that the line can be extended, at some future time, to the 8 inch water line in Grant Street. The 8 inch lateral sanitary sewer and the 8 inch water main shall be located in the 60 foot future street right-of-way in accordance with Village standards.

2. The sanitary sewer lateral should be extended west to the 24 inch sanitary trunk sewer, and the lift station eliminated, if an easement can be obtained across the Consumers Power Company property, and if the intended connection is feasible.

3. Storm water detention shall be provided on site, and shall have adequate capacity, based on the following design criteria:

a) The detention system shall be designed to hold a 100 year storm of 24 hour duration.

b) Discharge rates shall not exceed current discharge rates under undeveloped conditions.

c) Discharge from the detention ponds may be required to be delayed until after the design storm event has passed, and until capacity will become available in existing storm sewers, if such delay is determined to be necessary to prevent overloading of storm sewers and downstream flooding.

Acceptable design of the detention system might require changes in the layout of the approved area plan, and/or deletion of one or more dwelling units. The detention system shall be regularly and properly maintained by the condominium association, so that the ponds will function as designed and the ponds will not become nuisances.

4. Conversion of the development to a rental complex shall constitute a change in the type of dwelling and shall require prior amendment to the area plan as provided in Section 15.558 of the Zoning Ordinance.

5. The water in the pond shall be augmented as necessary to maintain a minimum level, and shall be maintained in a fresh condition to prevent stagnation, and to prevent the pond from becoming a nuisance. Details shall be provided in the final site plan. Maintenance of the pond shall be the continuing responsibility of the condominium association.

6. A fire hydrant shall be provided along the emergency fire lane, opposite the southwest corner of the building in the southeast corner of the site.

7. Details of development phasing shall be provided in each final site plan. The Village Planning Commission may require construction of the street, and water, sanitary sewer, and storm drainage facilities beyond the phase boundaries, if such construction is necessary for proper and safe access and the proper functioning of utilities.

8. The Planning Commission may require, if public safety so indicates, at the time of final site plan review, placement of the proposed sidewalk on the north side of the street right-of-way.

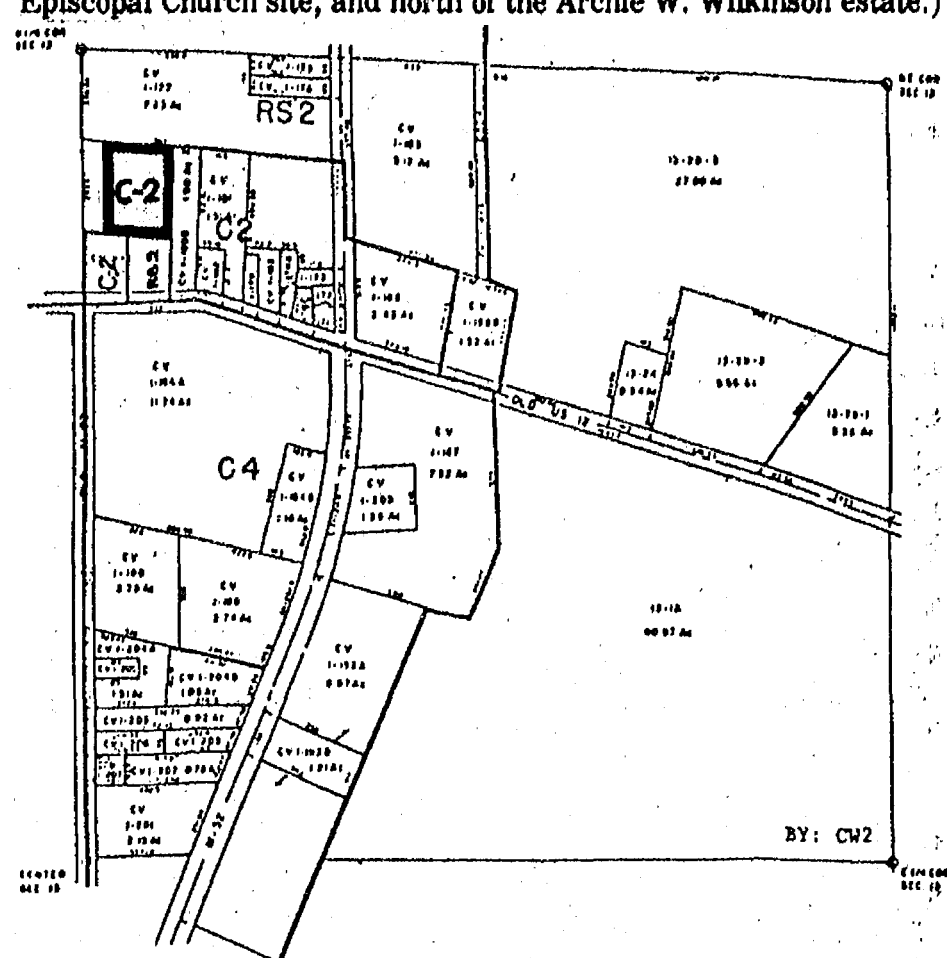

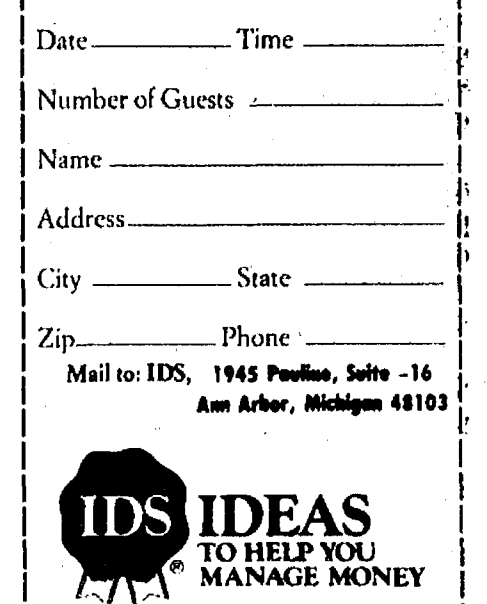

Stiffer Drinking, Driving Law Brings More Court Cases

Seven months after new drinking and driving laws were instituted, local law enforcement agents say that, while the measures may be working to a degree, more needs to be done to keep drunk drivers off Michigan roads.

"The bottom line is, people are dying," said Mark Ptazek, a sergeant with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

The new laws, which took effect March 30, are more stringent than former laws. Mandatory substance abuse screenings and community service requirements have been added for drivers charged with operating under the influence of liquor (OUIL) or operating while impaired (OWI). Drivers convicted for the second or third OUIL offense now have their license revoked. Drivers convicted of a second OWI offense (a lesser charge than OUIL) have their license suspended and cannot receive a restricted license for 60 days. Third time OWI offenders have their license revoked.

Penalties have also been stiffened for people who refuse to take preliminary breath tests and traditional chemical tests.

"It (the new law) makes it easier to go through the process of making an OUIL arrest," Ptazek said. "It has made the

minimum penalties more stringent."

He added that the \$100 civil fine which has been instituted for refusing to take a preliminary breath test will probably decrease the number of refusals and may eventually lower the average blood alcohol content of persons arrested on a drinking and driving charge.

Judge Karl Fink, 14th District Court, said that since the initiation of the new laws he has seen an increase in drinking and driving cases.

"I believe I'm getting cases with lower breath scores," he said.

The majority of the sentences Fink hands down in Chelsea District Court, Number 3, are for drinking and driving offenses. Of the 37 sentences at the Chelsea courthouse in October, 22 were for OWI or OUIL offenses.

Fink said it will probably be some time before the full effects of the new law are known.

"I don't think we really know how this will affect things yet," he said. "There hasn't yet been a decision handed down by the court of appeals."

Chelsea Police Chief Robert Aeillo said he thinks the new laws could be harsher, with the time period for suspended licenses increased and restricted licenses

(for the purpose of driving to and from work and to alcohol education classes) more difficult to obtain.

Aeillo said drinking and driving remains a problem. Within a recent 30 day period, the Chelsea Police Department had seven OUIL arrests. While evenings and weekends are the most common times arrests are made, they are not the only times, he said.

"I've had some pretty drunk drunks at three in the afternoon," he said. "You get businessmen returning from a six martini lunch and you've got some pretty buzzed people heading back to work."

Ptazek agrees that drinking and driving remains a serious problem. In Washtenaw county an average 80 to 90 drunk driving arrests are made each month.

In recent years the public consensus has been raised somewhat by citizen groups such as Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, he said. But he added that there is more to be done.

"Approximately 25,000 people are killed each year in alcohol related accidents," he said. "Enough people die in two years to total the death toll of the entire Vietnam war. We had people marching on Washington for that."

Local Road Tax Shares Increase This Year

Local government shares of state revenues derived from gasoline and weight (license plate) taxes rose during the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, the Michigan Department of Transportation reports.

Gross receipts from state fuel and weight taxes were \$715.4 million in 1982-83, compared to \$664.3 million in 1981-82. Higher tax rates accounted for the increase, state transportation director James P. Pitz said.

The total was \$55 million under the record amount of \$760.8 million collected in 1978-79. Pitz attributed the decline to the growth in number of smaller, more fuel-efficient vehicles and an upsurge in the sale of gasoline, which is taxed at a lower rate than gasoline.

By the time the revenue increase was divided up and apportioned, local units did not receive a bonanza. They got a little more money, but not a lot more.

This year's local shares, with last year's figures in parentheses, follow:

Washtenaw county, \$5,022,344 (4,708,290); Jackson county, \$4,161,487 (\$3,896,551); Chelsea, \$79,972 (\$75,722); Dexter, \$36,744

(\$34,813); Manchester, \$45,118 (\$42,746); Pinckney, \$34,867 (\$33,025).

Fire Department Records 25 Runs During October

Chelsea's fire department made 25 runs during October, the same number as a year ago, chief Paul Hankerd reported. For the year to date, the department is 12 runs behind 1982.

Of the 25 calls, eight were in the village and six in Sylvan township. There were five in Lyndon township, four in Lima and one in Dexter. The other was a mutual assistance call.

Eleven of the alarms were for rescue runs, and two for traffic accidents. The rest were spread out over building fires (2), car fires (1), grass fires (2), and other miscellaneous causes.

The department presented several programs at local schools during Fire Prevention Week and also gave tours of the fire hall. Donated man-hours during the month totalled 138.5.

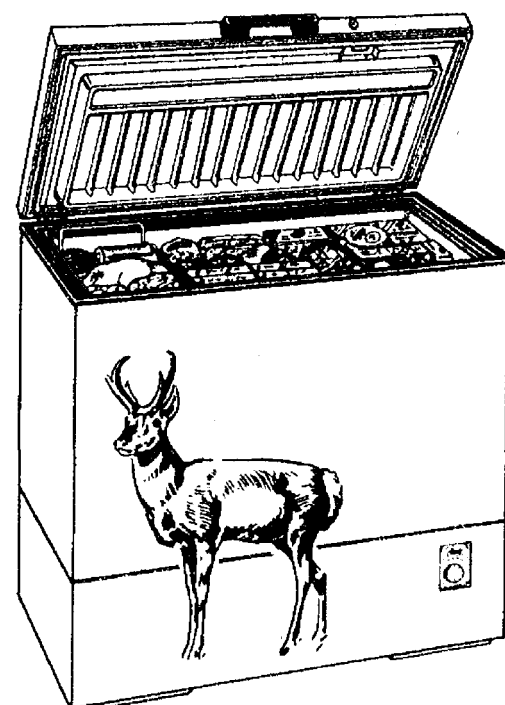

During the six-week course he received classroom instruction and participated in field exercises involving infantry tactics; the construction and camouflage of fighting positions.

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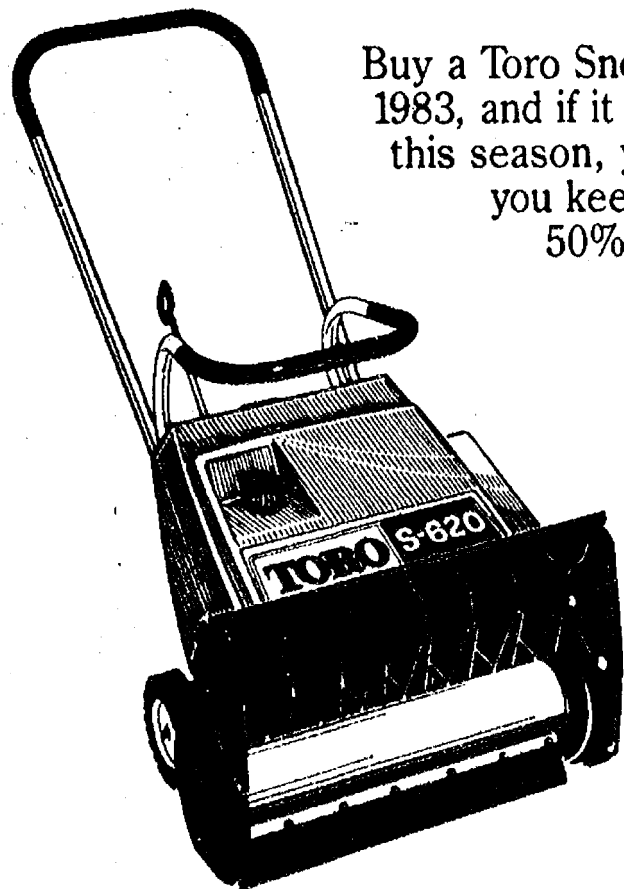
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
