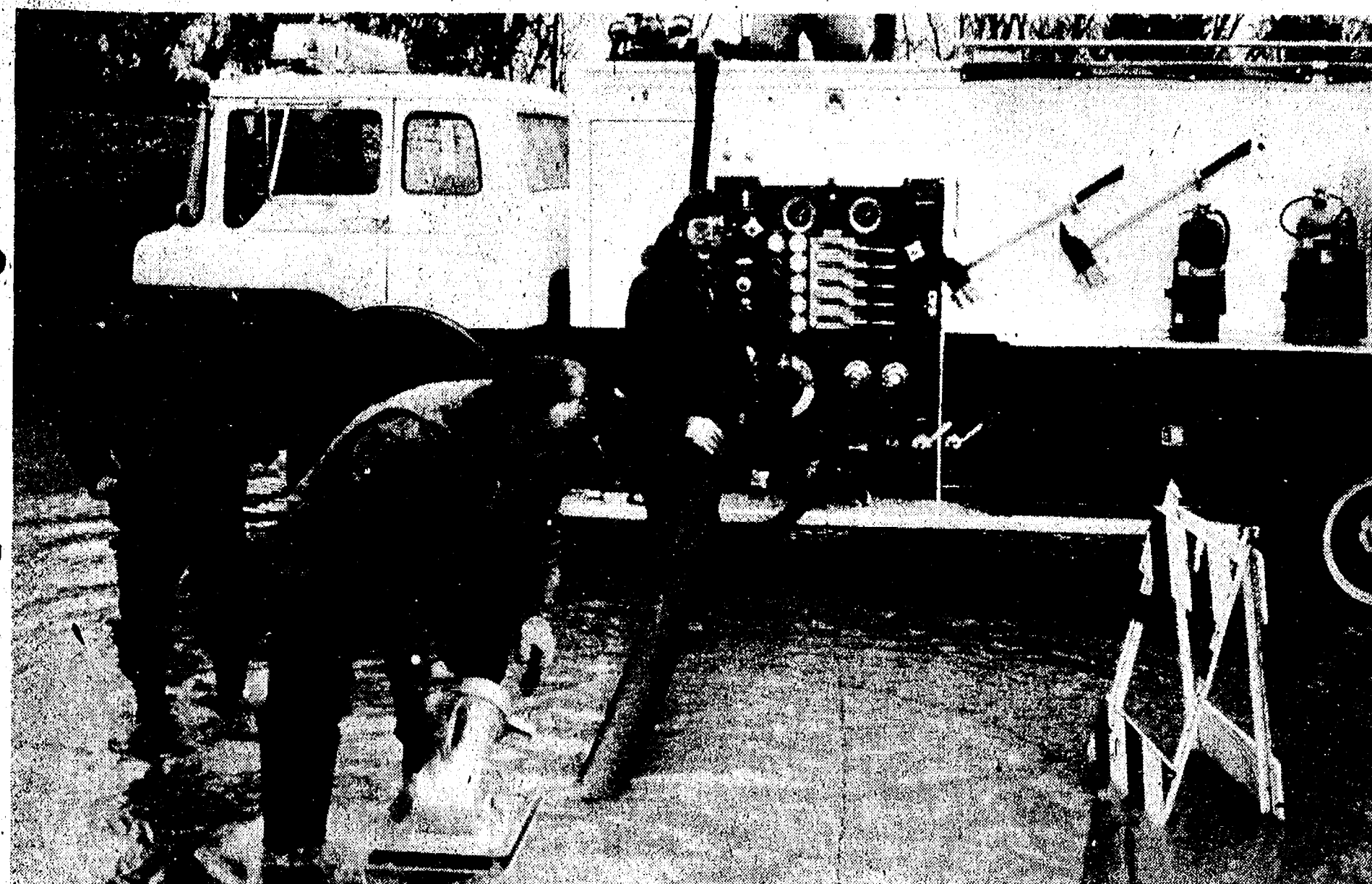

Water Main Break Repaired on Monday

A broken six-inch water main on the south side of Chelsea-Dexter Rd. between McKinley St. and Freer Rd. caused the road to be closed for several hours Monday while repairs were made.

No residents went without water at any time, Chelsea public works superintendent Charles (Bud) Hafner said, although there may have been some temporary lowering of pressure in some homes on the northeast side of town.

Village crews were able to fix the break without shutting off the water line, which would have

caused "backing up" problems.

Hafner said the rupture apparently occurred some time Sunday afternoon. Water came bubbling to the surface at the edge of the Chelsea-Dexter Rd. and eventually created a puddle too deep to drive through. At least two motorists drowned their engines when they ignored warning signs and tried to traverse the foot-deep pond.

A Chelsea fire department pumper truck eventually lowered the water enough so that village utility crews could get to the trouble spot, which looked like a flow-

ing spring, and dig a three-foot-deep hole down to the main.

The excess water was sprayed south over the Conrail tracks through a high pressure hose. The pumping operation was hampered by leaves which repeatedly clogged the pump intake until a makeshift wire screen was rigged.

Working in cold, thigh-deep water, village utility crewmen fixed a patch on the six-inch cast iron pipe. The road was reopened shortly after noon on Monday.

Hafner said the broken main was 60-70 years old.

Jeff Daniels Acclaimed for Starring Role in Hit Movie

In less than one week it seems that every film critic on every major newspaper and news magazine across the country has exulted the holiday season movie release "Terms of Endearment."

Already the film, which follows the usually turbulent, often hilarious, always loving, 30-year relationship between a mother and daughter is being talked of in terms of the number of academy award nominations it will garner. Shirley McLaine as Aurora, the mother, Deborah Winger as Emma, her daughter, and Jack Nicholson who portrays a womanizing ex-astronaut who becomes Aurora's lover, have all received accolades.

And so has former Chelsea resident Jeff Daniels.

While his name isn't yet listed in newspaper advertisements for the movie, his role as Flap Horton, the ne'er-do-well English professor husband of Emma, is a far cry from his first dramatic, non-speaking, role as a sailor in the Chelsea High school production "South Pacific."

It's hard to love Flap Horton. The man is what is known in most circles as a loser, a wimp. But through Daniels' portrayal, viewers of "Terms of Endearment" are more likely to come away from the movie understanding than disliking Flap.

"Jeff has the least sympathetic part," says his mother, Marjorie Daniels. "But you just feel for him. You realize that he does love his family and his wife—but things just didn't work out."

While local residents have been following Daniels' progress through the theatrical spectrum of high school plays, community theatre, Central Michigan University productions, off-broadway shows and television presentations, since "Terms of Endearment" was released,

Daniels has also been given widespread mass media coverage in Michigan.

Members of his family who

reside in Chelsea also say they feel special in the town where Daniels got his theatrical start.

During a special Nov. 18 sneak-

preview of the film at the Ann Arbor theatres, the seats were filled with area residents anxious to see the home town boy in a movie.

"People are so genuinely responsive," Marjorie Daniels says. "They thoroughly enjoy the fact that they know him."

Mother-in-law Daphne Hodder agrees that the reaction of local people has been heartwarming.

"It really is exciting," she says. "We're all just sort of flying high over it."

Hodder is the mother of Daniels' wife, the former Kathleen Treado, also a graduate of Chelsea High school.

Although Daniels, 28 and a 1973 graduate of the school, graduated four years before Kathleen, 24, she had always admired him while he was the star of the plays she had small roles in, her mother says.

It was when Daniels was in New York performing in the highly acclaimed off-broadway play "The Fifth of July" that the couple next had contact. Kathleen was attending Western Michigan University and kept running into a student who lived in her dorm who bore a striking resemblance to Daniels. That coincidence sparked her to write Daniels a letter. He visited her on his next trip home and the couple was married in July, 1979.

Kathleen recently graduated from New York's Fordham University with a degree in social work. But her desire to spend some time with her husband during this exciting, but unpredictable time in his career has so far prevented her from beginning her own work, her mother says.

"She is staying loose right now, waiting to see where his career takes him," Hodder says. "Eventually she'll do something, but right now she's on hold and enjoying the excitement."

Real Ale Co. Announces It Will Move from Chelsea

The Real Ale Co. at 320 N. Main St. will move out of Chelsea, probably to Lansing, by the first of the year, co-owner Ted Badgerow announced.

Badgerow said he and his partner, Gordon Averill, hope to lease a vacant bottling plant in Lansing and be in business there by the first of the year.

"We have outgrown our space here (on the second floor of the Chelsea Industries building) and have to move somewhere," Badgerow explained. "We really wanted to stay in this area, and looked around, but just couldn't

find any space suited to our needs at a price we could afford."

Among other things, the brewery needs ground-floor space for a bottling assembly line. It has been carrying on filling, capping and labelling operations by hand "and losing money on every bottle," according to Badgerow.

The Lansing plant has a bottling line in place and ready to go," he said. "That will cut our production costs by about \$5 per (24-bottle) case," he added. We will be able to wash and re-use returned bottles, something we

can't do here, and that will reduce our costs substantially."

There was no way that bottling equipment could be elevated and installed in the present location, Badgerow said.

Real Ale can lease 12-15,000 square feet of ground-floor space in Lansing for about \$1,000 a month less than it is presently paying for 2,500 square feet of second-floor space in Chelsea, a further saving for the small, struggling brewery.

"With the lower rent and the savings on production costs, we (Continued on page eight)

Blanchard Unveils Food Processing Proposals
Governor James Blanchard has unveiled a series of initiatives to promote and expand Michigan's food processing industry, including establishment of a food industry institute at Michigan State University, an interdepartmental unit "to respond to the industry's concerns," and increased promotional efforts both nationally and internationally.

The food processing initiatives are the first of a series of proposals dealing with so-called "targeted industries" that the governor said have "competitive advantages and identifiable opportunity to create new jobs or to retain jobs at risk."

Targeted industries—the other two industries are forest products and auto parts supplies—were discussed last month in Blanchard's economic address to the Legislature.
Enlarging Michigan's food pro-

cessing industry could mean thousands of new jobs for Michigan and prevent existing jobs from vanishing, the governor said.

Already expansion efforts in food processing are underway in places like Detroit, Grand Rapids, Holland, Traverse City, Remus and other locations.

Blanchard added that the Department of Agriculture "has identified five companies that are considering expansions in Michigan."

Out-of-state food processors provide products for approximately 90 percent of the state's consumer market, and between 1979 and 1981, some 40 percent of all the raw commodities grown in Michigan were shipped out of state.

In addition, Michigan has a large diversity of agricultural products—more than 50 commercial food crops, second only to California—and is within "easy access to major markets within 500 miles of half the population of

the United States and Canada," the governor said.

Paul Kindinger, director of the Department of Agriculture, said part of the goal behind the proposals was to "change the concept of agriculture. It is not just farming, but a huge business that has tremendous potential for the state."

Currently the state has a "trade deficit" in food processing but almost limitless possibilities of programs that could be enacted using the state's current agricultural base.

The specific proposals include:
—Creation of a food industry institute at Michigan State University that would be a partner with the state's effort by serving as a central source of assistance to processors. The institute would have to be paid for by a "significant commitment of support" from industry along with the possibility of state monies.
—A permanent, interdepartmental unit consisting of directors of Agriculture, Commerce, Natural Resources and Transportation will be formed to help evaluate and respond to problems in the industry.
—Agribusiness projects will now be eligible for grant monies from the state research fund and from the Michigan Strategic Fund which is still going through the legislative process.
—Promotion of state agricultural business will be expanded by attending various exhibits and conventions throughout the world.
—Endorsement of a "conducive regulatory environment" to develop congeneration facilities to help cut energy costs for food processors.
—Newly appointed business ombudsman, David Haynes, will "take an immediate special interest" in the problems of food processors and a food processing executive will be named soon to the state's Agricultural Marketing and Bargaining Board to help balance competing interests in marketing.

The governor said the new budget costs of the actions will be minimal as many of the proposals were a matter of "doing more and doing better of what has been a state activity for a long time."

PODIATRIST OR CHIROPODIST
Many people are unaware that there is a special profession to administer to their foot ailments. Those that are aware of this, are often confused by the two terms—podiatrist and chiropodist. Basically, there is no difference. Both terms are used properly to designate the modern foot doctor. Chiropodist has gradually fallen into disuse, however, because it derives from the treatment of both feet AND hands, as it was once practiced. Podiatry, which literally means "healing the foot," is therefore more commonly used.
The podiatrist must pursue special courses of study before he is qualified to practice. Only after successfully completing a four-year program at a professional school is he awarded a degree in podiatry. In addition, the doctor must take a state-board licensing examination in the state where he plans to practice. As for any specialty, such as foot surgery, this requires additional training after which the podiatrist must pass a rigorous examination.

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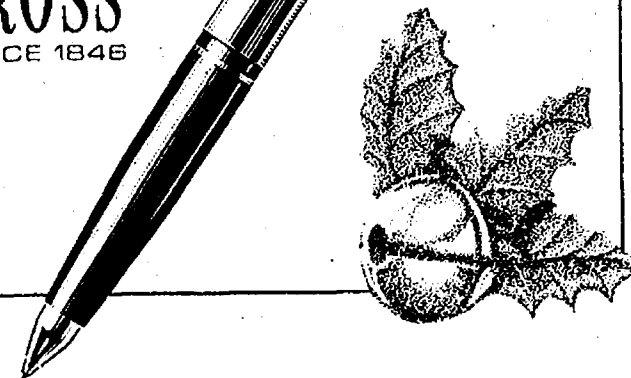

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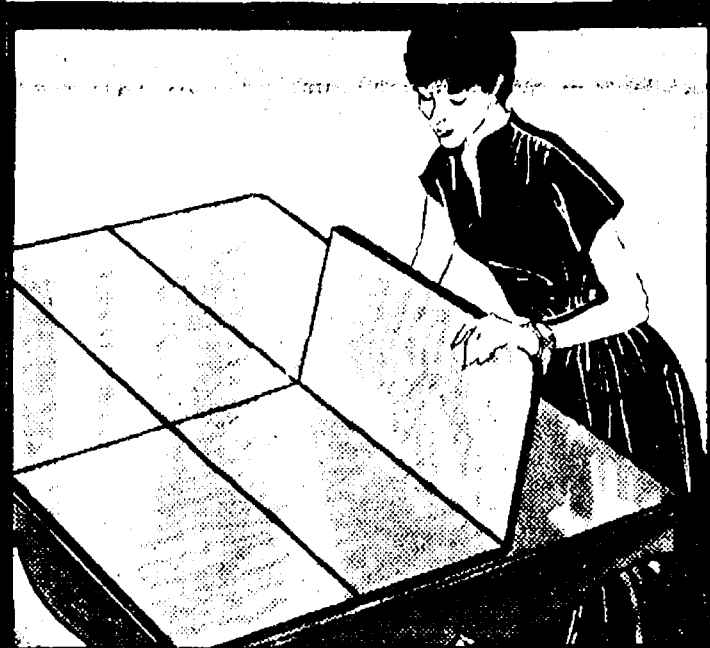

The physical examination, parent education and immunizations for the child given at regular intervals will prevent some illnesses, lead to the detection of some diseases at an early stage, and generally improve the chances for optimal, physical and emotional growth.

Physicians at the Family Practice Center can provide pediatric care for the newborn as a part of the care they provide for the en-

tire family. It is recommended that between the ages of 2 weeks and 18 months the babies are examined and given the appropriate immunizations. This usually comprises eight visits, and is available for a total price of \$130; a savings of 35%.

Dexter's loss is Chelsea's gain, and it's too bad that neighboring communities 10 miles apart have to switch an industry, but that is what is happening with the move of Hatch Stamping Co.

It's great news for Chelsea, which badly needs a boost after a decade of steady economic decline marked by a series of plant closings and job losses. It is bad news for Dexter, which is losing a factory that has been there since 1955 and presently provides 33 jobs.

Good news all around is that Hatch Stamping decided to stay in the area rather than move out of the vicinity, perhaps even to another state. Hatch had to expand, and there was no room to grow at its Dexter location. It's nice they are staying around here.

In a way the news is doubly good for Chelsea, because it means that a perfectly good plant which has been standing around for three years will be put back into production. Credit goes to Chelsea Milling Co., which has been using the former IPSCO building as a warehouse, for maintaining it in such shape that it attracted a buyer. Abandoned buildings have a way of deteriorating fast if somebody doesn't keep them up.

During my 14 months at The Standard I have seen a lot of ups and downs, hopes and dismays, bubbles that blew up and then burst on the local economic front. Now, finally, something positive and tangible has happened. A new industry is coming to town.

I am optimistic about the long term effects because there have been more pluses than minuses, and I see some more good things happening soon. Chelsea Milling definitely will start construction of its new mixing plant next spring. The site is being cleared now. The United Methodist Retirement Home also will begin its expansion program in 1984.

Both projects have taken longer than expected to get off the ground, but they are going to come about. Some increase in local employment will result from each.

Chelsea's industrial park strikes me as a sure winner, once it's ready for occupancy. That, too, has been distressingly slow to get started, as government projects almost always are, but it's moving along and should be ready for tenants some time next year.

Chelsea has so many natural advantages—those that persuaded me to move here—that I have to believe others will see them as I have. The village has a competitive edge over other communities hereabouts just because of what it is, a very pleasant place populated by nice people.

Maybe more important than any other factor is the changed attitude of local government. Under the leadership of president Jack Merkel, Chelsea is putting its best foot forward in seeking to attract new business and industrial enterprises. A selling job is being done.

In that context recognition should be given to William J. Bott, manager of the Chelsea branch of the Ann Arbor Trust Co. I've known Bill since the day he came into Ann Arbor as executive secretary of that city's chamber of commerce a lot of years ago. He was then, and still is, a natural-born promoter, a guy who has ideas and knows how to get things done. Much of Ann Arbor's economic growth can be traced directly to his work.

How Bill wound up in the banking business I'm not quite sure, but economic development and promotion still runs strong in his blood. He is one of Chelsea's most valuable "natural resources," and I hope his bosses continue to support his efforts. Simply by arranging meetings and getting people in the community to sit down and talk and listen together, Bill has performed a valuable service.

Jack Merkel and Bill Bott, of course, have axes to grind in the sense that growth in Chelsea is bound to help their businesses. If there is anything wrong with that, it escapes me.

The year 1984 has been anticipated with some dread by readers of George Orwell's doleful book, which turned out to be pure garbage. The upcoming year looks pretty good to me, and I anticipate that it is going to be a good one for Chelsea. Let's hope so.

Man Arrested in Extortion Scheme As Probe Continues

One man has been arrested, a warrant has been issued for a second, and a third is under suspicion in connection with an extortion scheme directed against a Grass Lake man who owns a business near Ann Arbor.

The name of the victim is being withheld at the request of the sheriff's department, which has the case under continuing investigation.

Arrested, arraigned in district court and free on \$1,000 personal bond is Theron D. Garner, 34, of Jackson, a twice-convicted felon who was recently released from Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson. Garner is also known as "Cave Man."

A warrant is out for a 34-year-old Grass Lake man, and detective Paul Wade of Chelsea of the sheriff's department said he hoped to make the arrest late yesterday, after The Standard's news deadline.

A third person, who lives in Waterloo township, Jackson county, is listed as a suspect in the case, but no warrant had been issued as of noon yesterday.

Wade and fellow sheriff's detective Dave Combs of Ann Arbor are jointly conducting the investigation into the bizarre case. "It's a complicated matter and we still have some important unanswered questions," Wade said. "It involves extortion of money, but we don't know why. It could be a drug deal, it could be something else. We just don't know for sure at this point, but we intend to get to the bottom of it."

As Wade described it, the case developed this way, starting about two weeks ago:

The victim received a tele-

phone call demanding payment of \$1,500 for an "unpaid bill" of some sort and threatening harm to his wife and young daughter if the money was not paid. Otherwise, the caller said, the bill would be turned over to a collection agency.

A few days later members of the Avengers Motorcycle Club, based in Jackson, showed up at the victim's home. The front door of the house was "rattled" several times and a shot was fired through a picture window.

The victim got the message and arranged for a friend to make two payments of \$1,000 and \$500 to a man "in colors" of the Avenger Motorcycle Club. The money was delivered at a restaurant-bar southeast of Chelsea.

A day later the victim received a phone call demanding another \$1,000 as a "collection fee." At that point he called the sheriff's department and asked for help.

SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

★ Beach and North School Principalships ...

At the conclusion of the school year, Al Conklin will be retiring as principal of the Beach Middle school after 21 years in that position. Syl Wojciecki also will be retiring after 19 years at South Elementary school.

Bob Benedict, the present principal at North school in which post he has served for 16 years, will assume the principalship at South school.

I would like to take this opportunity to keep the community apprised of how the administration is viewing possible replacements prior to the end of the school year. When I announced that these retirements would be effective in June, 1984, I indicated that candidates from inside the system would be welcome to apply. Prior to the conclusion of the 1982-83 school year, 17 candidates from within the system made application for those principalships—seven candidates for the Beach school principalship and 10 candidates for North school.

We wanted to look at internal candidates early because we wanted to set up meaningful internships to further evaluate them. On Aug. 29, 30 and 31 an interview team, consisting of three administrators, a board member, one teacher and one parent, interviewed the candidates. The number of candidates for internships was reduced to three for each school. The candidates for Beach Middle school were Barbara Brown, Sam Vogel and Bill Wescott. The candidates for North Elementary school are Bob Bullock, Sally Burchfield and Bill Wescott. Barbara Brown since has withdrawn as a candidate because she felt she was not ready to leave the classroom.

The internal candidates for each position are being given additional opportunities by which we can further evaluate them. They have made presentations to the school board and to the faculties at North and Beach schools. They have been introduced to and questioned by members of the Superintendent's Dialogue and ACATS. Additionally, they have met with all district administrators.

I have posted these two positions with major universities and will be soliciting interested candidates from outside the school system. This would enable us to make further judgments. We have had very capable leadership at these schools and want to continue with exemplary leadership. It is our hope to have the replacements named by approximately April 15.

Stockbridge Man Injured in Crash

A 19-year-old Stockbridge man, Dale Allen, was extricated from his wrecked car early last Wednesday morning and flown by helicopter to University Hospital where he was reported to be in fair condition.

Sheriff's deputies said the accident occurred at M-52 and North Territorial Rd. at 1:15 a.m. Allen's car, northbound on M-52, left the highway, hit a culvert, struck a tree and rolled over.

Allen was pinned in the vehicle and was freed by sheriff's deputies and Huron Valley Ambulance Co. paramedics.

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Senior Citizens Organize Walking Club for Exercise

The senior citizens were stepping briskly around the North Elementary school cafeteria.

"Walking with groups is so much more interesting than walking alone," Viola Gary said. Gary is one of several Chelsea people which have joined a weekly walking club sponsored by the Chelsea Senior Citizens Club.

Chelsea physician Jonathan Henry, of the Family Practice Center, told the seniors during their first meeting of the new club that frequent walking offers numerous benefits.

"Walking will improve your own well being," he said. "Walking is also one of the best exercises. You don't have to have fancy equipment, like a bicycle or jogging shoes."

Members of the new club plan to meet at the senior citizen center at North Elementary school at 2 p.m. every Thursday and walk for about an hour. During the winter months the group will walk inside various buildings in town, including the schools and Chelsea Community Hospital.

Henry, who specializes in gerontology and the care of the elderly, said walking is particularly important for senior citizens.

"Older adults sometimes don't feel as active, not necessarily just because of their age, but because they are not as physically active as they were when they were younger," he said. "Walking helps the general sense of well being, helps control weight and can make people with specific medical conditions, such as arthritis, actually feel better."

Senior citizens should not be afraid to exercise, but should check with their physician before beginning any exercise program, he said.

Members of the new walking club take their pulse before, during and after walking. Henry said the walking should be brisk enough to provide good exercise, but not be overly strenuous.

"We're not even talking about really rigorous walking," he said. "We're not going to make marathoners out of anyone—probably."

Because the club is so new members are still being recruited. Jackie Rogers, Chelsea Community Education

director, said that the walking club also needs someone who would like to assume a leadership role.

"What we need is a spark plug," Rogers said. "It could be anyone who is interested in walking or running who would like to act as group leader."

"And they both love Chelsea—they'll always regard Chelsea as home."

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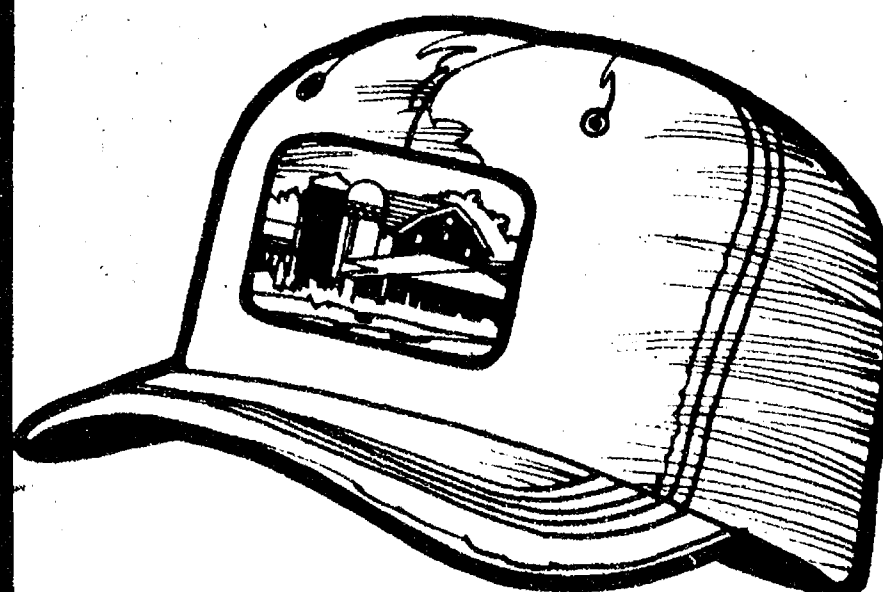
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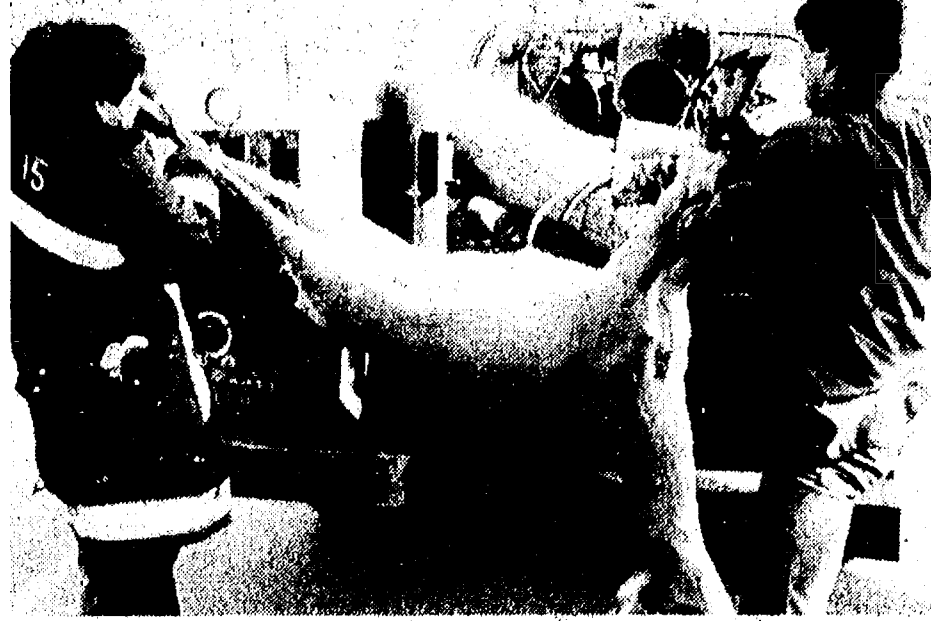

Cycle-Deer Collision Causes Injury to Driver

Vehicle-deer accidents are not uncommon in west Washtenaw county, especially at this time of year, but a collision between a motorcycle and a deer at high noon definitely is unusual.

It happened a week ago Tuesday noon on Cavanaugh Lake Rd., about 100 feet inside the Washtenaw county line, where a cycle driven by Steve Motts, 20, of Grass Lake hit a large doe broadside.

Mott was thrown to the pavement and suffered a broken collarbone. His motorcycle sustained considerable front-end damage. The deer was killed, and

was salvaged by the Chelsea fire department.

Most vehicle-deer accidents occur during darkness, with dusk and dawn being the most hazardous hours.

Village Fire Department Saves Home

Chelsea firemen made "a good save" on a house fire at 13784 Bramble Brae on the south shore of North Lake last Wednesday evening.

A pile of lumber caught fire in the basement of the dwelling, village fire chief Bud Hanker said, but the blaze was put out before it could spread.

should be able to get into the black," Badgerow said. "We're losing money here, even though our products have been well received and our sales have increased steadily. The way things are, the more we sell the more we lose."

With a work force of four full-time and six part-time employees, Real Ale produces about 900 cases per month of English-style brews—porter, ale and stout. The company plans to add a "pale" ale to its product line and get into private-label brewing after moving.

"We probably will employ fewer people after we move because we will be more mechanized," said Badgerow, adding that he personally plans to continue living in Chelsea and commute to work.

The move to Lansing is contingent on approval of a rezoning request to allow brewing of alcoholic beverages in what formerly was a soft-drink bottling plant. Also required are transfers of various permits from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and the state Health Department.

Real Ale began operations here in November of 1981 and started marketing its products locally in September of 1982. Considering that the national trend in the brewing industry has been toward fewer and bigger breweries, the local firm's success in establishing a market is unusual. Real Ale is one of just six breweries in Michigan today.

Badgerow said his company will continue to use the name "Chelsea" on its labels, noting that it has strong English connotations and thus reflects the character of the firm's products.

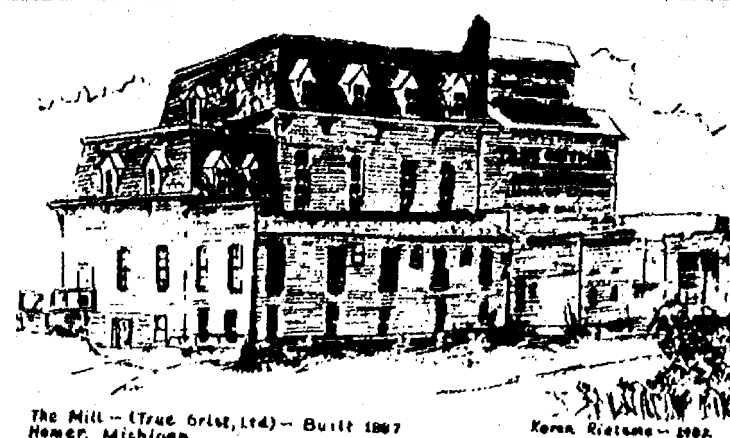
However, a tentative plan to call a new product "Wolverine ale" has been dropped. "I don't think that would go over very well in Lansing," Badgerow said with a chuckle.

firemen for assistance on the blaze. "It was a total loss," said Chelsea fire chief Bud Hanker, whose men hauled two tank trucks of water to the scene.



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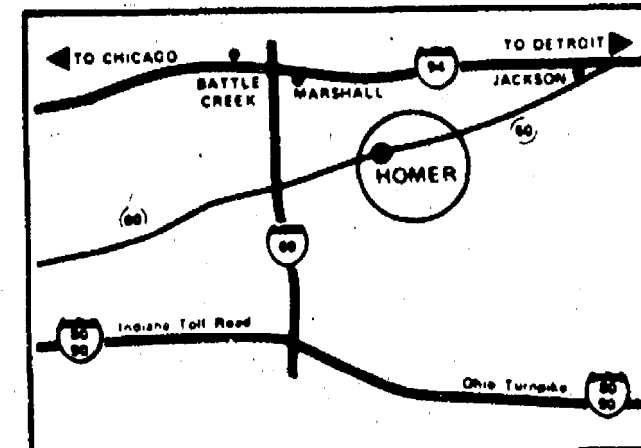

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Three Arrested On Drug Charge

Two Pinckney area men and a Brighton resident were arrested last week on charges of attempting to sell 2.5 pounds of cocaine valued at about \$500,000.

The three men, who are considered suspects in a ring of narcotics dealers, are James Mezamoto, 34, of Pinckney; James Barkley, 27, of Portage Lake; and Randall Fink, 30, of Howell.

According to Frank Del Vero, Livingston county prosecuting attorney, the trio were monitored by undercover police officers from three counties.

They were arrested in a Pinckney house by about 12 policemen

of the Livingston and Washtenaw Narcotics Team and plainclothes officers from Oakland county after an undercover officer had purchased cocaine from the suspects.

The investigation is continuing in the area and further arrests are expected according to Del Vero.

Mezamoto, Barkley and Fink are in the Livingston County Jail awaiting examination. They were unable to post a \$40,000 bond.

They could receive life sentences in prison if found guilty because of the amount of narcotics involved.

Don Blair is the new manager of the Dana Corp. plant here, replacing Tom Green who has been promoted and transferred to Reading, Pa., as head of its Parish Frame division.

Blair, 46, was the manager of Dana's distribution center in Hagerstown, Ind., before coming to Chelsea. A native of Butler, Ind., and a graduate of Tri-State University, he has been a Dana employee for 21 years.

He and his wife have moved to the Chelsea area and are living on Stoffer Ct. off Stoffer Rd. south of North Lake in Dexter township. They have a son living in Texas and a daughter in California.

Blair started with Dana as a plant controller at Churubusco, Ind., and rose through the ranks at that location until going to Hagerstown.

He was out of town and unavailable for an interview or photograph at The Standard's press time this week.

A Dana spokesman, Genevieve Baczynski, said the Chelsea plant has been working full months plus some overtime during the fall, and that a full month is scheduled for December. Earlier, the plant had been shut down one week a month.

The plant manufactures power take-off and drive-train components. Assembly and warehousing operations formerly done here are being transferred to a new plant in Memphis, Tenn., but Dana insists that there are no plans to shut down the facility here.

Before he left, Green predicted a substantial increase in employment at the Chelsea plant by the middle of next year.

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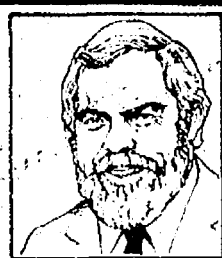
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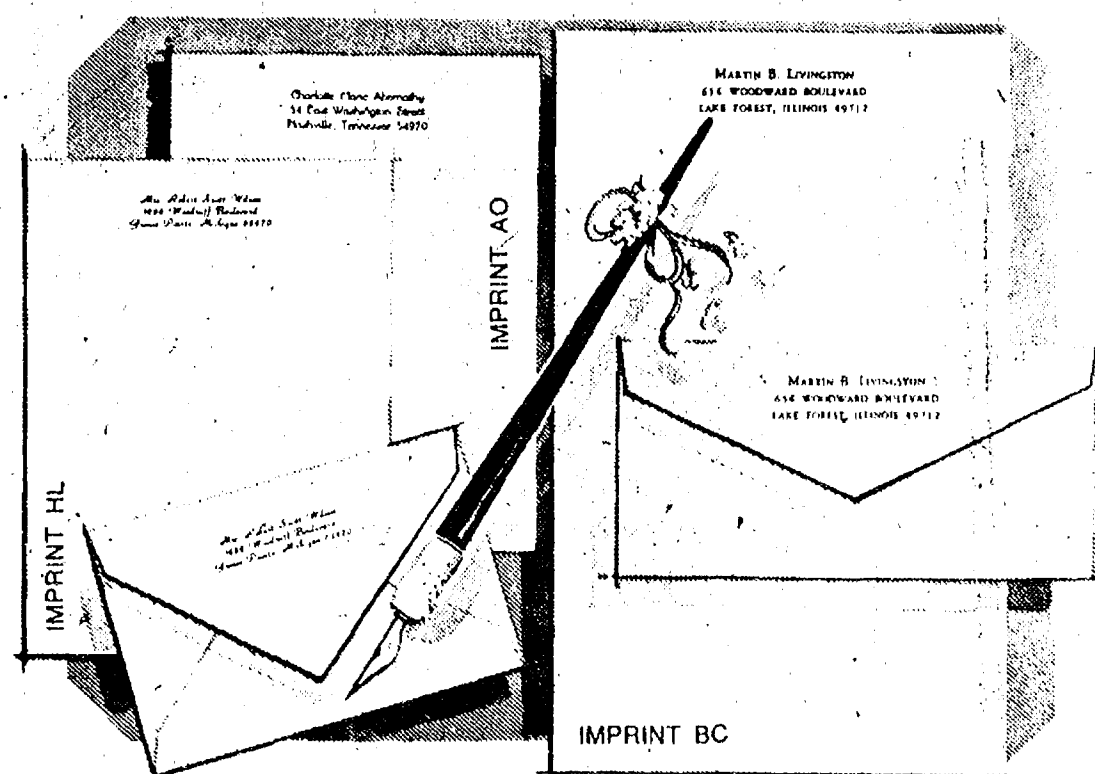
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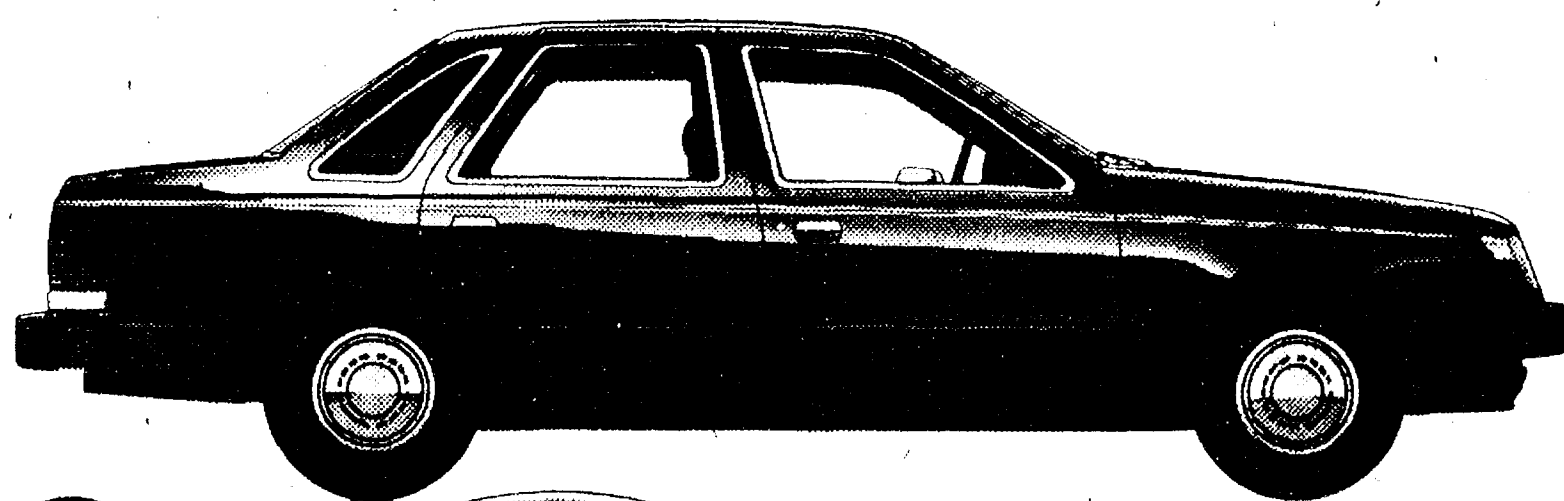

The course was conducted at the Service School Command, Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Ill. Students received introductory instruction on elec-

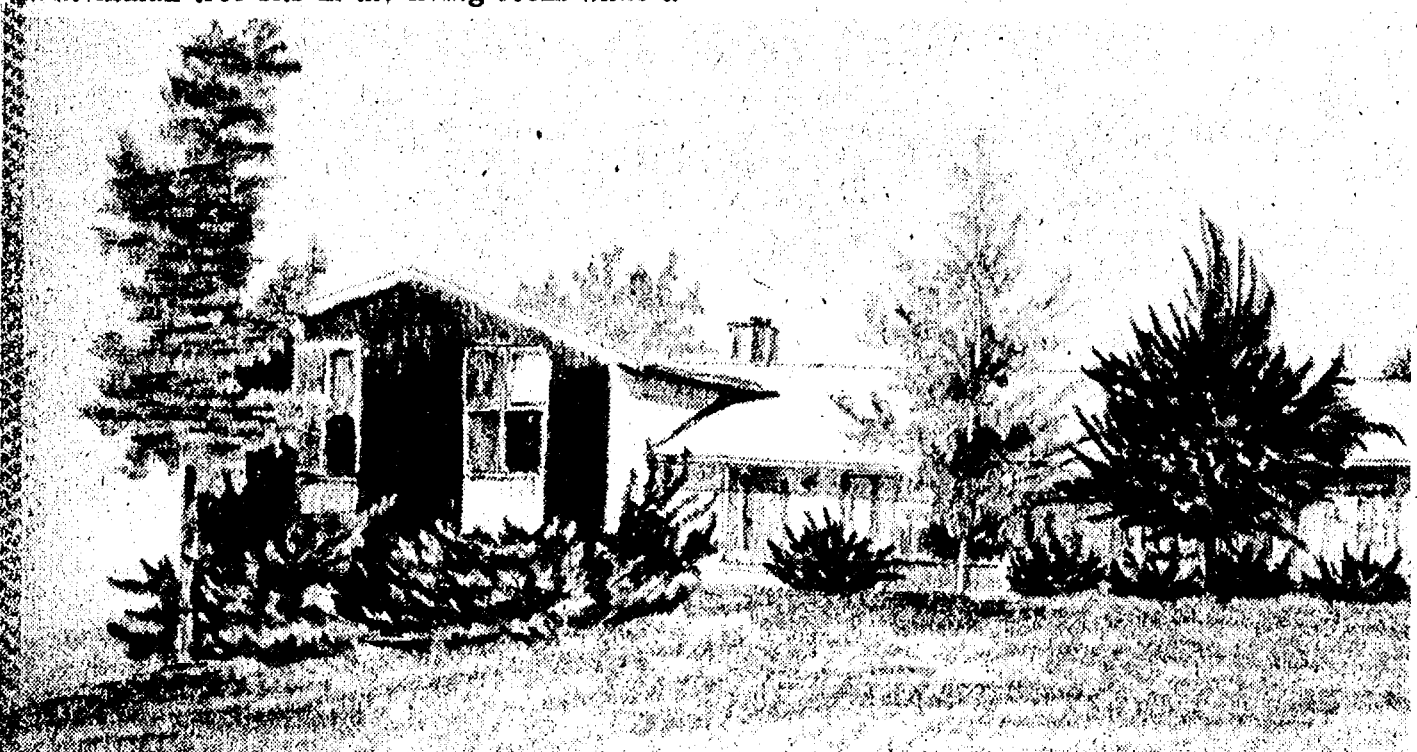

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First Grader Returns to Class 2 Weeks After Heart Surgery

At 6, Rebecca Vanderbilt loves to run and play just like any of her contemporaries in her first grade class at South Elementary school.

But Rebecca is different. She will never be able to compete in strenuous sports, like softball, and her life expectancy is almost 20 years shorter than that of her classmates. Still, for the first time in her short life she can get through the day without a headache, walk short distances without becoming fatigued and when she looks in the mirror her creamy skin shows none of the various shades of blue coloring it had always displayed until a few weeks ago.

And best of all, Rebecca can now do all of that running, jumping and playing she loves.

On Oct. 26 Rebecca underwent lengthy open heart surgery at Boston Children's Hospital. She was back in JoAnne Thornton's first grade class exactly two weeks later.

Rebecca, the daughter of Jackie and Keith Vanderbilt, a pharmaceutical sales representative, of Chelsea, has often been called "remarkable, unbelievable and unexplainable," since she was diagnosed as having tetralogy of Fallot, a congenital heart disease, when she was six months old.

Tetralogy of Fallot is a disease in which blood does not receive enough oxygen because of pulmonic stenosis, a valvular blockage between the right ventricle of the heart and the lungs and a ventricular septal defect, which is an abnormal opening between the right and left ventricles of the heart.

"Doctors said she should have died at birth," Jackie Vanderbilt said.

Rebecca was born cyanotic, or "blue." Until her recent surgery her fingertips and lips were always varying hues of purple. Because she was only receiving an estimated 45 percent of the oxygen her body needed, she had other symptoms as well, her mother said.

"She had a headache every day of her life, she really knew no other way of life," she said. "She really thought life was a bummer."

Rebecca would get tired after a short period of exertion and had to be driven the two blocks to school. She has also always been very thin, her mother said.

But surprisingly, Rebecca did not have many of the symptoms of tetralogy of Fallot that physicians thought she would suffer.

Children with similar heart problems are usually small in stature since their hearts are not functioning normally. Some also exhibit a tendency to squat on their heels close to the ground when they become fatigued. But, although she is thin, Rebecca, at over four feet, is easily the tallest child in her class, her mother says. She has never exhibited the "squatting" tendency and her activity level has always been higher than her physicians said was normal for a child with tetralogy of Fallot.

"I've seen children with this who don't lead one half of the life she did and they weren't as severely ill," her mother said.

"She should not have wanted to go out and play and ride her bike, even for the short periods of time she did. But, she is a very determined person."

Jackie Vanderbilt believes that it was her daughter's steely determination that helped her recover so rapidly from her recent surgery.

During the procedure, which took several hours, doctors broke Rebecca's sternum, hooked her up to a heart-lung machine and did a total heart repair. She was in the intensive care unit for 48

hours and in the hospital only four additional days.

"It was phenomenal," her mother says.

"She certainly had great results," said McDonald Dick, III, Rebecca's pediatric cardiologist at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor. "She certainly had a serious and life limiting disease which looks to have been corrected."

While she was in the hospital her classmates sent Rebecca many cards and letters and even Halloween napkins to use with her dinner on Oct. 31, knowing that she would be homesick for the local trick-or-treating and costume party.

Since she has been back in school, Rebecca has described her operation to her classmates with the aid of a special cloth demonstration doll given to her at the hospital following her surgery.

On her first day back at school she received a big hug from Thornton and a standing ovation from her young classmates.

"I couldn't help it," her mother said, "I cried."

Although doctors don't anticipate further surgery in the near future, Rebecca still has a slight narrowing of the pulmonary artery. But her mother feels the worst is over.

"The first time she was in the hospital I was feeling sorry for myself, then I met a mother whose child had a life expectancy of three, and I realized we didn't have it so bad."

"It's hard on us, but it was even harder on her."

Tetralogy of Fallot is not a hereditary disease. The Vanderbilts have another daughter, Victoria, 2, who was born without any heart problems.

"But it doesn't make any difference," Vanderbilt said. "If I would have known ahead of time (about Rebecca) I would never have said 'no thanks, I don't want this child.'"

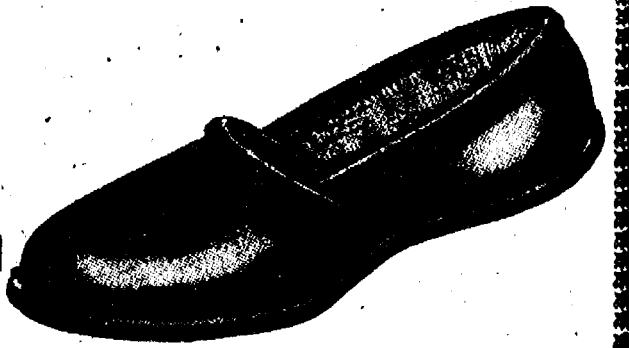

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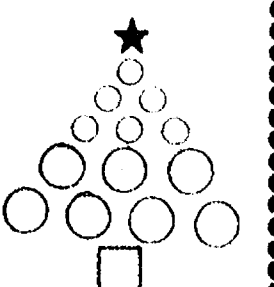

Chelsea High School's basketball season will open at home against Napoleon Friday night, instead of at East Jackson, athletic director Ron Nemeth announced yesterday.

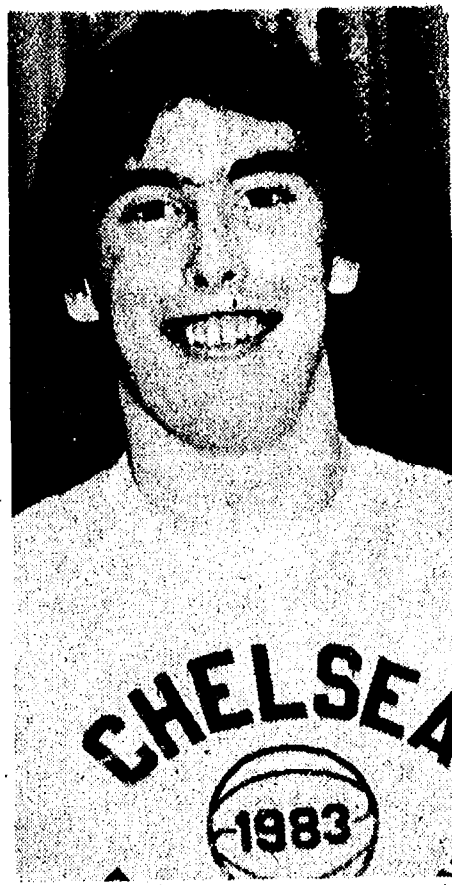

Ed Blissick Records Rare Double on Deer

Michigan's deer hunting laws were changed a few years ago so that a hunter could take two deer

during the season, one with a bow and another with a gun.

Not too many sportsmen have accomplished that feat during the seasons since, but Ed Blissick of 10 Cavanaugh Lake Rd. did it this fall.

He brought down an eight-point buck with an arrow on Nov. 3, and shot a six-pointer with a gun on Nov. 15. Despite having the bigger rack, the archery kill was the smaller of the two. It dressed out at 142 pounds. His firearm buck weighed in at 173.

A couple of gun hunters were disappointed to learn, upon calling The Standard, that Jerry Picklesimer had beaten them for the honor of reporting the first buck shot on opening day. Picklesimer scored at 7:20 a.m.

Dan Whitesall of 245 Adams St. downed a 160-pound eight-pointer at 7:30 a.m. on opening morning while hunting in the Grass Lake area.

Harold Polzin, Jr., of 1620 N. Fletcher Rd. killed an eight-point buck at 8 a.m. on the first morning, hunting near his home.

OUT IN THE OPEN

By this time there are several million pounds of venison—maybe as many as 10 million—stored in refrigerators and freezers throughout the state. That's a lot of meat, and you can figure its value roughly at \$2 per pound, which is the average going price for beef and pork these days.

Most articles on preparation of venison for the table stress the need for careful field care—prompt dressing-out and cooling, good butchering—and well they should. A distressing amount of deer meat is ruined before it ever gets to the point of cooking, and no amount of kitchen magic will make it fit to eat.

Let's assume, however, that a deer has been brought down with one shot into the heart-lung rib cage, has been cleaned within minutes, and taken to a cooler within an hour, has been properly hung and aged, and has been butchered by someone who knows how. If the animal was a typical southern Michigan buck, it yielded something over 100 pounds of "eating meat"—chops, steaks, roasts, stew chunks, hamburger.

If you are the cook, what do you do to make the eating a pleasure instead of something to gag on?

First of all, don't expect venison to taste like beef, pork, lamb or any other meat. It has a distinctive flavor of its own. That flavor is not "strong" or gamey if the meat has been handled right, but it's definitely different from that of any domestic meat.

The conscientious cook will trim every speck of visible fat off a piece of venison before putting it into the pan. That takes some time and careful work with a sharp-bladed knife, but it's well worth the trouble. Any off-tastes that the meat might have are concentrated in the fat.

That means substitute fat must be added before the meat is cooked. In the case of hamburger, for example, beef or pork fat should have been ground into the mixture.

Jeffrey Market adds beef suet to lean

deer meat in about a 30-70 ratio, and the result is excellent.

When roasting venison, put in some fat. The easiest way is to lay bacon or salt pork strips over the roast. Or you can skewer on chunks of suet. If you want to get fancy, try the all-but-forgotten process of "larding," which involves making shallow cuts in the meat, inserting dollops of lard, and sewing up the incisions with a special needle and thread.

By and large, you can substitute venison in any beef recipe. The one exception in my experience is dry roasting. Cooking a venison roast in an uncovered pan with no water added resulted in a dry, tough piece of meat both times that I tried it years ago, and I gave up the idea. You might get away with it using a standing rib-roast, but that portion of a deer is normally sliced into chops which are excellent if properly broiled.

I prefer venison over beef for chili, spaghetti sauce and most stews. The meat adds a different—and, to me, better—flavor to those recipes. The taste comes through the spices and seasonings, which is more than I can say for beef. Beef is really kind of bland.

To prepare venison chops and slices of loin, I prefer pan-broiling to broiling in the oven or on an outdoor grill. The meat should be cooked quickly over high heat, and a heavy frying pan is the best tool to achieve the required smoking-hot temperature. A couple of minutes on each side for inch-thick cuts is plenty. Cook them one per person at a time, and eat them quickly. Broiled venison that has been allowed to cool even a little bit is pretty bad. It sticks to the roof of the mouth and gets to be like trying to chew and swallow wads of cotton.

Venison roasts should be pot-roasted, which means putting them in a large pan with a tight cover, adding some water, and cooking for several hours under low heat. A dutch oven works very well. Don't drown the roast in onions, garlic or

any other seasoning. A light sprinkling of garlic salt and a couple of onions put in with other vegetables such as potatoes, carrots, parsnips and celery will produce a flavorful result. The gravy made from the pot is excellent. Whisk in some flour, and add a little sherry if you like the taste of sherry, which I do.

I don't know of any meat better than good venison properly cooked. Nor do I know of anything less edible than deer meat that has been poorly taken care of and then further mangled in the kitchen. If you have a bunch of butchered-out venison in your freezer or if somebody has given you a couple of packages, follow my tips and you will have some excellent eating, provided the meat was handled properly in the field.

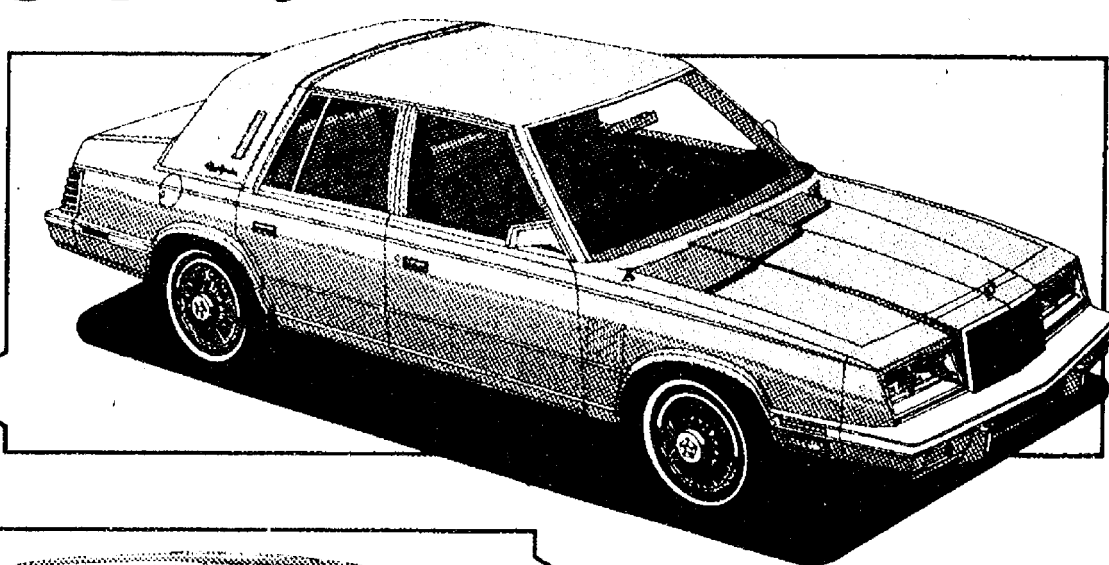

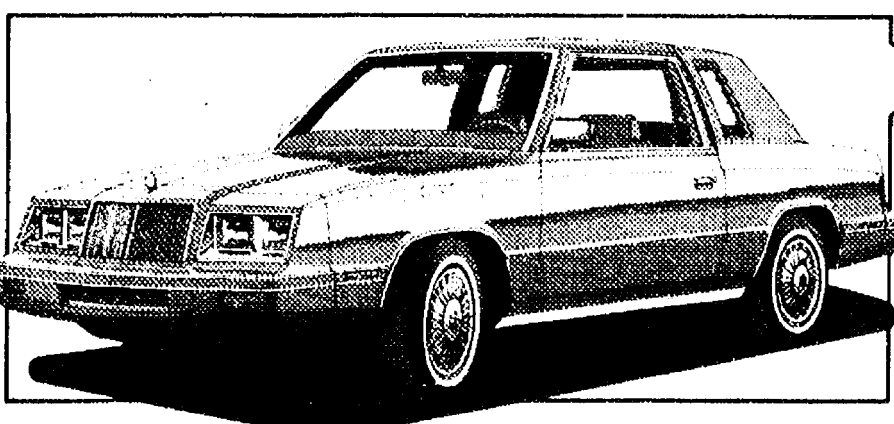

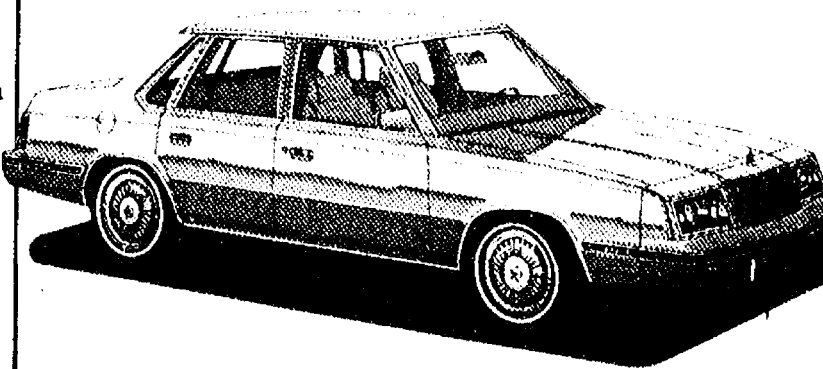

Kenneth Bauer Bags Big Buck

One of the better trophy buck deer taken in the Chelsea-Dexter area this year was shot by Kenneth A. Bauer, II, of 991 S. Lima Center Rd. at 10 a.m. on Nov. 22. Bauer scored on private land north of Chelsea, he said.

His buck, an obviously older deer, was at least 4½ years old according to an unofficial estimate by a reporter who has had some experience in aging deer. But not enough to be certain of his

judgments.

The buck was a 10-pointer with a wide beam and heavily knurled antler bases, both signs of a buck that has lived for several years. Its back teeth were heavily worn. It dressed out at 175 pounds. It was a big buck.

Unfortunately, one of Bauer's shots clipped off an antler point, and another point had been broken off earlier. Otherwise, it would have been a 12-point rack.

Bauer said he first spotted the buck early in the morning, fired a shot, and missed. He watched the animal, saw it lie down in a fence row, and followed up. He jumped the deer, unloaded a charge of buckshot at close range, and brought it down so that he could finish it with a slug.

It was his first deer taken with a gun, Bauer said.

Despite occasional success stories like Bauer's, the local deer hunting story is still "down" as poor hunting weather continues on key days. In a weather sense this has been the poorest season perhaps since 1965, which was the worst on modern record. It rained on 12 of 16 days that year.

This fall's bad news could turn into next November's good news. A lot of bucks will escape to be bigger a year from now.

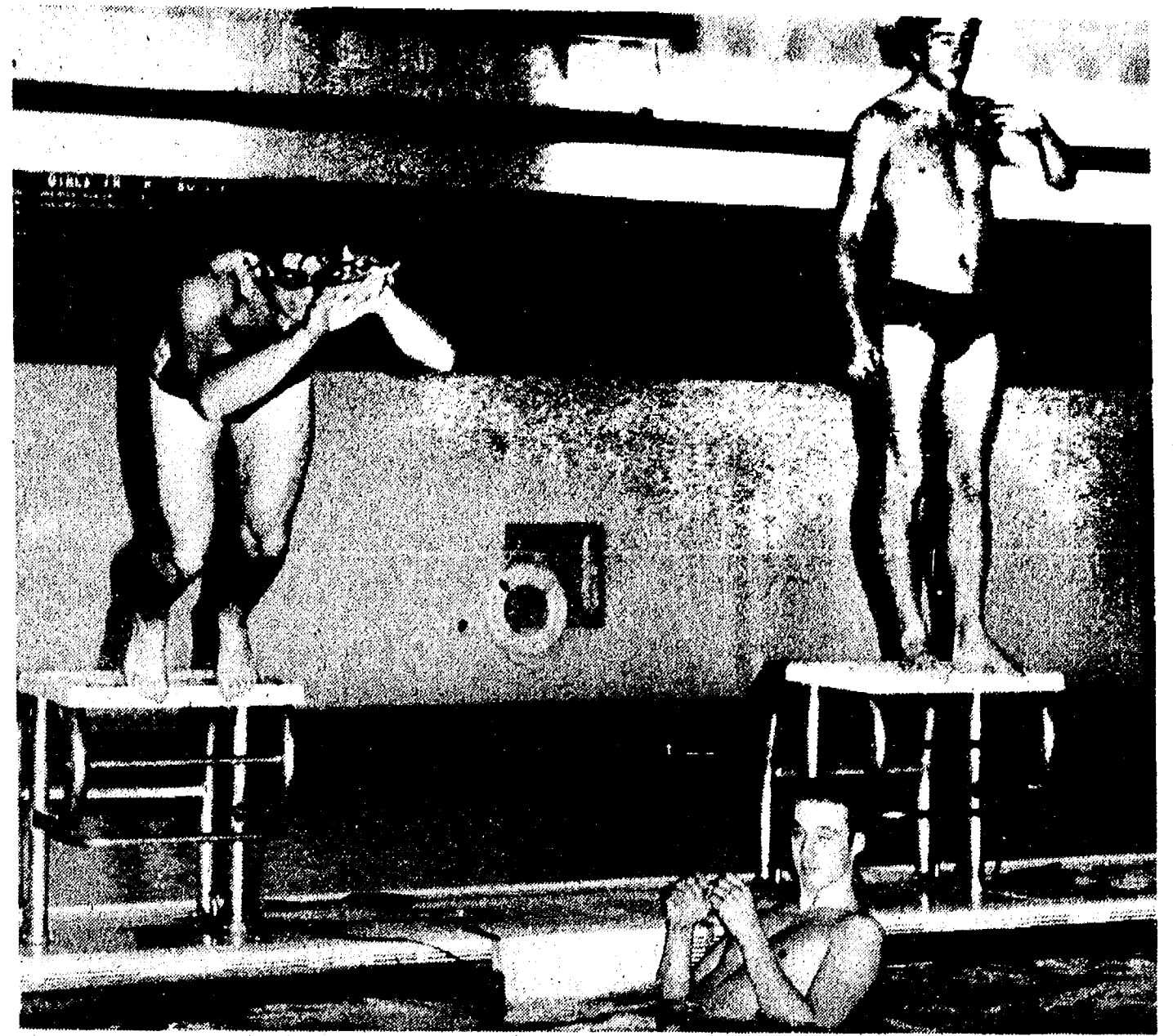
The idea behind the second annual meet between Bulldog swimmers and swimming alumni is to have a good time and see old friends, Reed said.

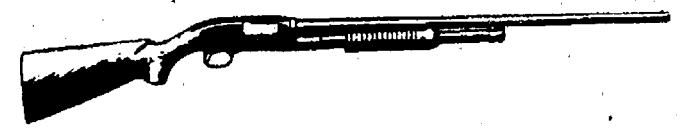

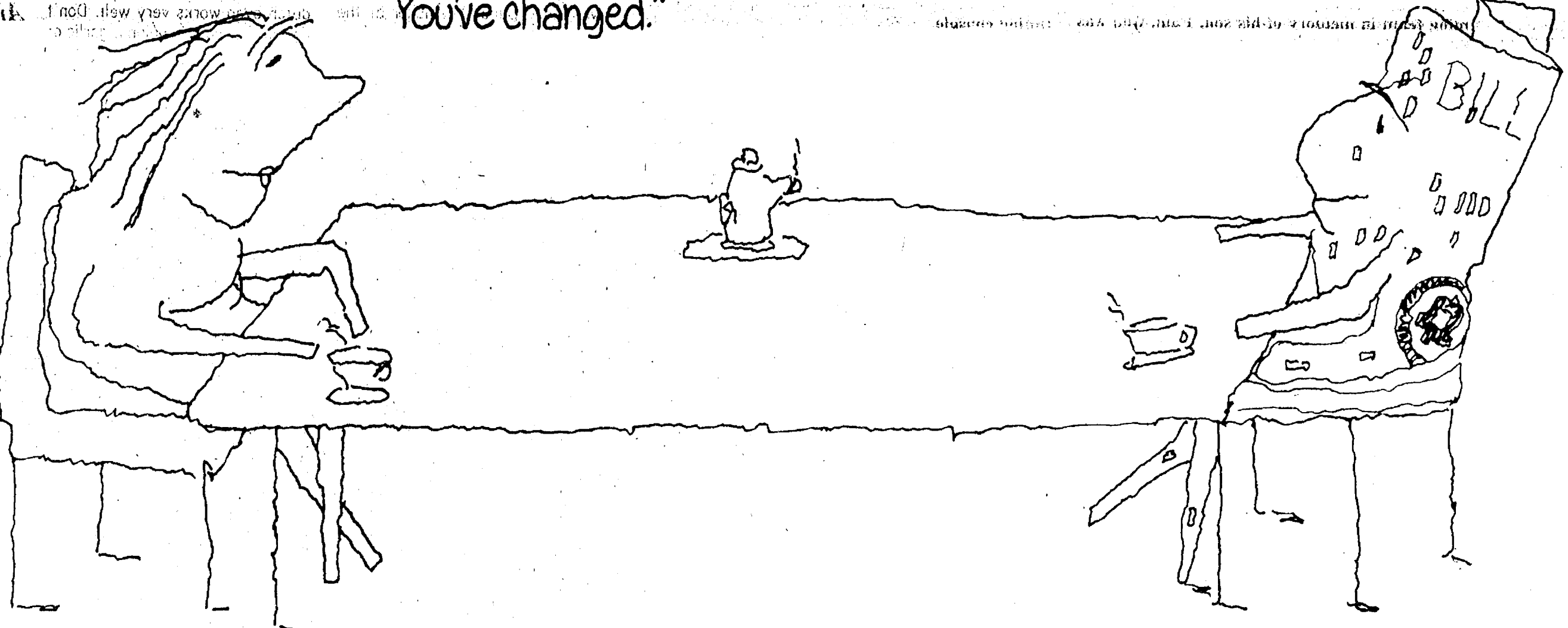

Present at a regular meeting of the Chelsea Board of Education Monday, Nov. 21, were Schumann, Heller, Dils, Grau, Feeney, Cameau, Redding, Superintendent Van Meer, Assistant Superintendent Mills, Principals Williams, Benedict, Wojcicki, Assistant Principal Vogel, Athletic Director Nemeth, guests.

Meeting called to order at 8 p.m. by President Dale Schumann.

Board approved the minutes of the Nov. 7 meeting.

President Schumann honored Larry and Barbara Vosters, parents of three North school students. The board acknowledged, in appreciation, the organization and project fulfillment of the school beautification plan at North school. Larry and Barbara were instrumental in the planning, purchasing and planting of

shrubby and trees at North school.

President Schumann also acknowledged, in appreciation, the efforts of teachers Peggy Moore and Mary Hafer for their continuing care in designing and planting the courtyards at North school.

Lana Leisinger, band parent, presented the board with a check for \$43.06 for the special purchase of the drum major's hat. The money was collected by solicitation.

Superintendent Van Meer informed the board that after the first of the year he will organize a school improvement committee. The committee will involve all segments of the school community. The committee charge will include, but not be limited to, the information and concerns contained in the several state and national reports recently released concerning education. Superintendent Van Meer sees the school improvement committee as an ongoing process for the school district, and the activities should include a reassessment of current practices and a review of community goals and expectations. The Michigan Association of School Administrators is currently urging the State Department and the Legislature to provide human and financial resources for local districts to assist in the school improvement efforts.

Superintendent Van Meer updated the board on the teacher/administrators instructional skills workshop which has completed its first five sessions. He indicated that teachers and administrators have spoken most highly about the program, and urged the school district to continue sending teachers and administrators to workshops. Van Meer indicated that 10 teachers and administrators will attend the next instructional skills workshop session beginning Jan. 20, 1984. There will also be a spring workshop beginning in May.

Superintendent Van Meer presented a legislative update in which he reviewed the complexity of the latest Lobby Registration Act, and Senate Bill 4878 dealing with corporal punishment.

President Schumann reported that 300 senior citizens attended the Thanksgiving dinner on Nov. 18.

The board accepted the low bid of \$13,707.70 for a 1984 15-passenger van as submitted by Village Motor Sales. The van will be used to transport special education students and students involved in extra-curricular activities.

The board approved 1984 graduation dates as follows: high school, June 10, 1984, 3 p.m.; adult education, June 14, 8 p.m.

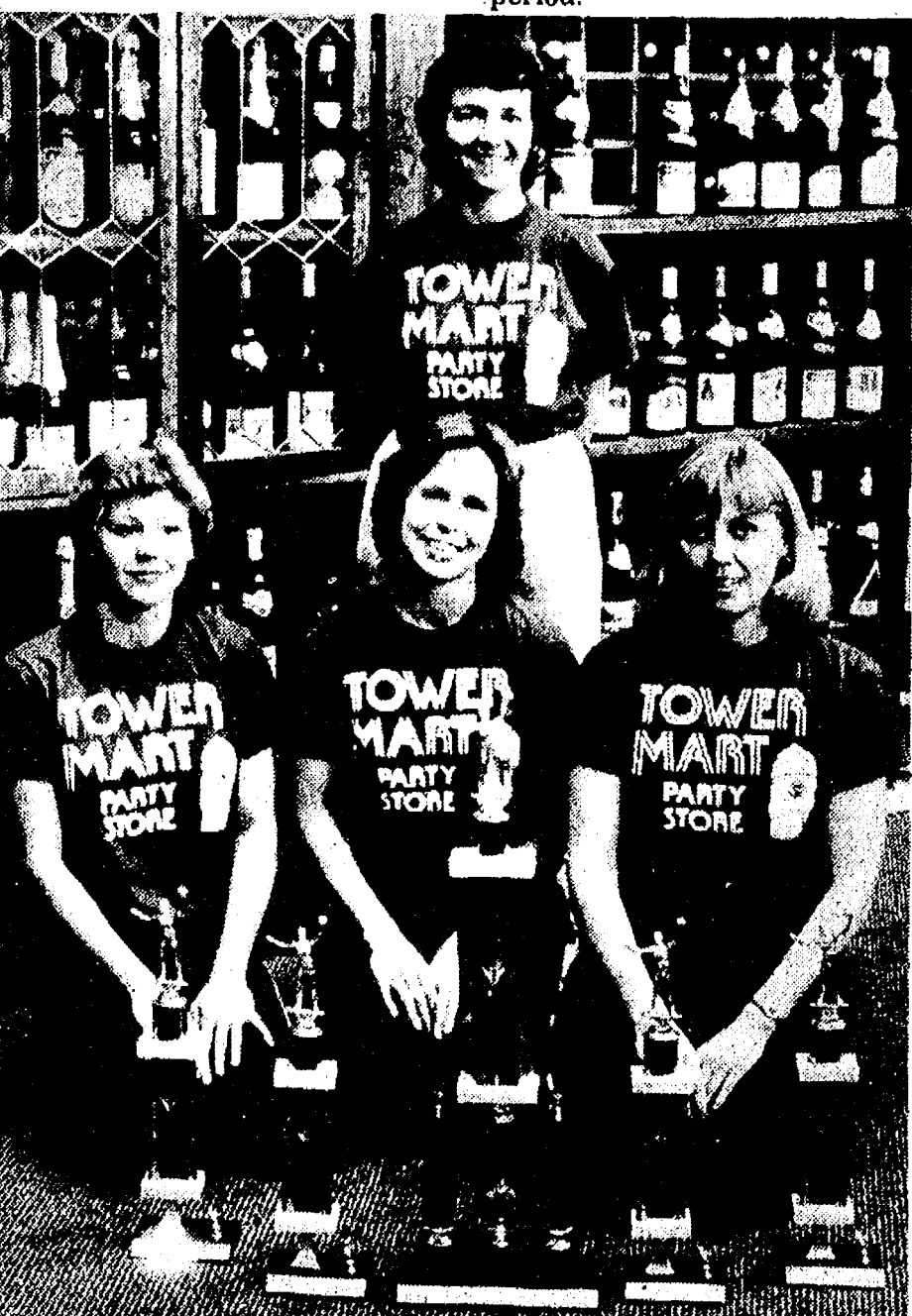

Dairymen May Apply Now For Assessment Refund

If dairy producers reduced their September commercial milk sales by 8.4% from their sales in September 1981 and 1982, they can qualify for a refund of the second 50-cent assessment that was levied Sept. 1 of this year, according to Michigan Farm Bureau's dairy specialist, Michael Kovacic.

"There are two separate refund periods a dairyman can apply for," Kovacic said. "The base period for the first refund would be Sept. 1981 and Sept. 1982. For the second refund, it would be fiscal years 1981 and 1982. To qualify for the 50-cent assessment refund, the producer would have to reduce, by a total of 8.4%, his commercial sales for those base periods."

Producers may establish their base marketings at their county ASCS office by presenting such documentation as payment receipts or statements from their milk handlers that show the amount sold monthly during the base period and the refund period.
