Kozminski Lawyers **Petition for Reversal Of Slavery Verdicts**

Kozminski and their son, John Kozminski, all of South Lima township, have filed petitions asking that federal district Judge Charles W. Joiner either set aside Jury verdicts against them on slavery charges or at least grant new trials.

Chances that the pro forma requests will be granted are slim. What the Kozminskis' lawyers are asking is that Judge Joiner acknowledge errors in conducting the two-week trial. Judges rarely admit they might have been wrong about anything.

Attorneys for Mr. and Mrs. Ike attorney team asked a reversal of the jury's rulings, or new trials, on the basis that:

1. Judge Joiner's definition of slavery, included in his final instructions to the jury, was too broad and vague, reaching back into the 19th century.

2. Judge Joiner erred by admitting into the trial record testimony about the living conditions of the two alleged "slaves," Robert Fulmer and Louis Molitoris, then later instructing the jury to disregard it as irrelevant to the central issue of involuntary servitude. Relevant or

jury, the Kozminski lawyers claimed.

3. Judge Joiner should not have allowed testimony by a prosecution witness, Dr. Harley Stock, who said that Fulmer and Molitoris were "psychological hostages" of the Kozminski family. Dr. Stock, who admitted that he was paid to testify, was accused of using unproven psychological theories to reach his conclusions.


"already done everything we could possibly do, we have taken every suggestion, to sell the tug and barge" and only a couple of parties were even remotely interested, in part because of its narrow design which makes it usable only for the purpose of cross-lake rail service.

The other option, Mitchell said. would be to invest another \$1.5-\$2.5 million into the barge so it could be floated and then mothball the vessels until the world economy improves to create a demand for them.

He said department officials are completing the process of gathering the information on costs of scrapping the vessels or mothballing them and presenting it and a recommendation to the commission by the end of February for a final decision.

UPSCO did not exist prior to 1979 when the state awarded it, without bids, a \$33 million contract with escalator clauses to build the tug-barge system to replace ferries.

Just last week, federal indictments charged Robert D. Fischl, UPSCO vice-president, and Charles A. Kerkman, co-founder of the firm, with defrauding the state by taking kickbacks from the engine contractor.

vitge People keep asking me what is the "real 30scoop" on the investigation into the Chelsea, bipolice department's handling of traffic and Esparking fine money, which culminated in the ¹⁰ Affest of chief Robert Aeillo on a felony charge of embezzlement.

1476. My answer is that I don't have any special information. All I know for sure has been printed in the paper, and I'm not going to get into the game of writing rumors and speculation.

no noi-The case is in the courts, where it belongs, and I have faith in the judicial system. The truth will come out eventually, although it may take awhile.

News reporters are commonly considered to have access to "inside dope" not available to the public. In some instances that is true, but not nearly as often as you might think. For the most part we sort through the mess of garbage that piles up around any controversy, and try to find some kernels of fact that we are legally entitled and ethically responsible to print.

The honest truth is that I have no idea whether Bob Aeillo has done anything wrong or not. That is for the courts to decide, and I do not intend to make any premature, anticipatory judgments.

Meanwhile, I suggest that we all sit back and wait for the legal process to run its course before making up our minds. In the end there will be a verdict of guilty or not guilty, and that should be decisive whichever way it goes. Does anybody know a better way? For the record I will say that Bob Aeillo and I have had our dif-"ferences. His interpretation of the Freedom of Information Act is not the same as mine. That is a not uncommon bone of contention between police officials and news reporters. I have been denied access to police department documents that I believed I had the right to see.

However, I have never had any reason to suspect that Aeillo might be dishonest and, in fact, was surprised when the investigation was launched and the embezzlement charge made. He has impressed me as an "honest cop" who ran a tight ship, maybe too tight, and insisted on keeping everything in his own hands rather than delegating responsibility to subordinates.

I've heard the argument that much more money was spent in tracking down the alleged embezzlement than the amount said to be missing. That is probably true. Auditors and police investigators don't work cheap.

What we are looking at is a charge of embezzlement of less Ann Harden, *Martin Heller, than \$1,000. Educated guesses put the total at somewhere around \$600. It could be slightly more or less. The fact is that the loss of as much as a dime of public funds should be tracked down, no matter what it costs. Stealing is stealing, regardless of the amount. It's like being "a little bit pregnant." You either are or you aren't. What bothers me is that people in the village are choosing up sides, for or against Aeillo. That kind of impulsiveness will serve no useful purpose and could, in fact, lead to polarization of the community. Something of the sort is happening down in Milan in a controversy involving a police chief.



Sugar-making, a skill taught by the Indians, was one of many crafts important to pioneer life. Traveling to the frontier with a minimum of supplies, backwoodsmen were forced to become self-sufficent or perish. White sugar and molasses were practically unobtainable, and maple became the "long sweet'nin" of pioneer familes. Sugaring is a basically simple process. It involves the gathering

of sap and the evaporation of excess water. However, it should not be regarded as easy work. One only has to carry two full sap buckets, weighing 35 pounds each through the knee deep snow of spring in order to appreciate the labor involved. Cobblestone Farm will

recreate this special time of the year at a Maple Sugar Harvest, March 10-11 from 12 noon to 5 p.m. Costumed interpreters will demonstrate the evaporation process as well as sugar making. 

It'used to be that children behaved in public as they did at home because they knew

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



Six years ago the band was selected to perform for the Music Educators National Conference in Chicago. In 1976 the band was chosen to appear at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Washington, D.C., as the official Illinois representative for the U. S. Bicentennial observance.



The conductor is Marcellus B. Brown, who joined the Augustana faculty in 1981 as director of bands and instructor in brass instruments. A native of Detroit, he earned the bachelor and master of music degrees from the University of Michigan where he studied under William Revelli. He is a candidate for a doctor of musical arts degree, at the University of Illinois.

Brown is a former member of the music faculty at Chicago State University. An accomplished performer on the trumpet, he is a member of the Tri-City Symphony Orchestra and is often guest soloist with high school and college bands in the area. He has been guest conductor and clinician at band festivals and workshops in the Midwest, and has been guest conductor in the all-state music program at Interlochen National Music Camp in Michigan.





Odds and ends from the sports desk:

I stand corrected, and apologize. When I wrote a couple of weeks ago about the athletic rivalry between Chelsea and Saline, I was only about half right. Chelsea has, in fact, held its own very well in the competition in recent years, as several people were quick to point out.

I still think-and some other knowledgeable people agree—that Sallne has an edge simply by virtue of the fact of being a bigger school than the others in the Southeastern Conference. Other things equal, a larger student body will yield a larger number of quality athletes year in and year out. That's the way the numbers game works. We'll watch and see.

Congratulations to David Kiel on winning a four-year football scholarship to Michigan State University. It's an excellent honor for a fine young man.

Unless you know a whole lot more about the fine points of football than I do, it's extremely difficult to evaluate the performance of offensive linemen. They are the unsung heroes of the game.


How many times do you hear a public address announcer say that soand-so made a tremendous block to spring halfback Joe Speed for a big gain? How many times do you read any such thing in the paper? Or listen to a TV commentator say it? How many times do you hear that quarterback John Strongarm would have been flat on his back if somebody hadn't held off the rush so he had time to complete a pass?

All of us who watch and report sports are at fault in failing to recognize the role that offensive linemen play. We follow the ball. We know who made the carries, who threw and caught the passes, who was in on the tackles. What we don't know in most instances is who made the successful plays possible, the guys who do the blocking.

I've made a promise to myself that, next fall, i'm deliberately going to take my eyes off the ball and watch what's happening up front where the action starts. I hope maybe Gene LaFave will give me some tips on what to look for.

I'm told that David Kiel is a devastating blocker, and I have to believe it. MSU wouldn't waste a scholarship worth about \$20,000 on someone who doesn't have the size and skills to play Big Ten football. I do know Dave is big. I'm not small, but have to look up when I talk to him.

Back when I was growing up, there was a role model called the All-American boy. This mythical young man combined athletic skills with intelligence, and performed well both on the field and in the classroom. Kiel fits the description very well.



# Huron River **Paddlers Challenged**

Brave canoe paddlers are challenged to make the first trip of 1984 on the Huron River from Portage Lake to Ypsilanti.

Prizes for the first and for the fastest canoeists may be earned any time from March 2 through 18. As soon as ice has left the route, paddlers can put their canoes into the water at the state access on McGregor Rd., Portage Lake, for the 30-mile run to Riverside Park in central Ypsilanti.

Canoeists can earn \$50 for being first to finish or \$50 for making the trip in the fastest total time by midnight March 18. Additional prizes, including two \$50 dinner gift certificates from Haab's Restaurant, will be awarded by Canoesport of Ann Arbor, originator and sponsor of the annual event.

Entrants may obtain entry forms at Canoesport, 1325 Hutchins Ave., Ann Arbor, on or after March 2. There is no entry fee and no limitations about canoes or paddles. Life vests should be worn and a change of clothes carried in a waterproof container.

Portages are permitted only at customary summer sites, and no more than two paddlers are allowed per canoe. Paddlers should scout the river and six portages beforehand.

Times of start and finish must be validated at time clocks at the Portage Inn and at Haab's. Current record time is 5 hours 37 minutes set by solo paddler John Adams last year. Most canoeists spent 7 to 10 hours on the river. Last year the first canoe left at midnight and finished shortly after noon.


I think it is possible and worth a try.

The conventional wildlife management wisdom is that elk can't live in the presence of people, and that there is no place other than the Pigeon River Country where they can survive and thrive in Michigan.

Maybe so, and maybe also not

The fact is that elk were native to Michigan until they were wiped out by concentrated hunting during the late 19th century. They are big animals which provide a lot of meat, and the pioneer settlers were quick to catch on to the fact. They sought out and slaughtered elk without regard for the future well-being of the species, and eventually killed them all.

Given the protection and management of modern game laws and practices, I have a hunch that elk just might make it in places like the



Elk can be captured with the aid of a dart aun which shoots a dose of tranguilizer into the animal, inf mobilizing it for crating and ship ping. There is some mortality in the operation, but the rate isn'f high.

Given the fact that only a few elk need to be removed from the Pigeon River Country herd, I think that the trap-and-transfer method is worth a try. If it doesn't work there will be no harm done. If it does work, the DNR will earn a very large feather in its cap for having tried to do something and succeeded.
