Also, the date and approximate time. of the problem are important. Occassionally, weather is a factor; let us know if it was windy or raining.

NO. 79-00 AMENDMENT TO THE LONING ORDINANCE OF THE

VILLAGE OF CHELSEA IMENDING SECTION 5.3, D-5 The Village of Cheises Ordnins: AN AMENDMENT TO THE CHELSEA VILLAGE ZONING ORDINANCE, ORDINANCE NO.

79 OF THE VILLAGE OF CHELSEA, AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 1. Amend Article V

Section 5.3, D-5 All off-street parking areas in all zoning districts shall be drain-

In such areas, crushed, compacted limestone, or approva equal, may be substituted for pavement. Pavement, including base construction, and crushed limestone, or approved equal, shall meet the minimum stand-

ards of the Village of Chelsea. All driveways, vehicle storage areas, and parking spaces, not permit when trailer is placed paved, shall be maintained in a

dust free condition SECTION 2. All other provisions of Ordinance No. 79 and any amendments thereto be and the same are hereby reaffirmed and ratified.
