





## Village Selects McAuley Plan As Alternative

ge of Uncinca is oure employees a choice in their health insurance for the first time.

Village council voted at its Dec. 16 meeting to give employees the choice between Blue Cross/Blue Shield and the rapidly-expanding McAuley Health Plan.

The village administration sent a questionnaire to all employees asking their preferences among Blue Cross/Blue Shield, McAuley Health Plan, offered by Catherine McAuley Health Center, and M-Care, the health plan offered by the University of Michigan.

Village Manager Fritz Weber said that no one selected Blue Cross/Blue Shield as a first choice. He said the McAuley plan was selected as the first choice by the highest number of

employees. Council selected the McAuley planafter a lengthy discussion of rates, coverages and the ease of use of each plan. Trustee Phil Boham, a Chelsea Community Hospital employee, abstained in the voting. All other trustees voted for the McAnley plan.

## Village Will Hire Broker To Push Industrial Park

The Village of Chelson plans to take a more appressive posture in the marketing of the village's industrial park on Sibley Rd., which so far has just two tenents in 22 total available

At its Duc. 16 meeting, the village council voted to renew the village's agreement with the Washtenew Development Council at a cost of \$1,302 for 1967 and to retain a broker who specializes in the marketing of in-

distrial properties.

Council also discussed the purchase of signs that would show the way to the park from the outskirts of town, primarily from 1-84.

The action was taken based on the specific recommendations of Michael mane, executive director of the Washtenew Development Council, given in a mosting with Village Manager Fritz Weber, Assistant Village Manager Lee Fahrner, and Village President Jerry Sutterthwaite

According to a memorandum from

village council, Ammann said that other successful industrial parks in the county, such as Seline's, here hired brokers.

Based on a suggestion by Village Trustee Phil Boham, the village will seek bids from a minimum of three brekers who have experience in the marketing of industrial properties.

Assumano also said the village should develop an advertising brochure detailing facts about the community, the industrial perk and available financing. No action was taken on that suggestion.

In that regard, the Michigan Department of Transportation told Fahrner in a letter that it would allow the placement of two signs on M-52, one just north of the I-94 interchange and the other at the Sibley Rd. turnoff. Since M-52 is a state route, the department has to approve all placement of

Another sign, which does not fall under the state's jurisdiction, has been preposed for Old US-12 near the M-52 intersection.

Council, at least temporarily, rejected a bid by Huron Advertising of Ann Arbor to construct and install one 9' by 15' sign for the park at a cost of

The Washtenaw Development Council itself handles all industrial parks in the county "on an equal basis," according to the memorandum as long as the community has a contract with the council. It provides a county profile and literature about each community to prospective developers.

in addition, the memo said, all information regarding industrial parks in the county is maintained on the development council's computer and can be cross referenced in terms of lot size, acreage and other pertinent information.

The industrial park's two tenants are BookCrafters, Inc. and Roberts

## Churches Plan Special Services for Christmas

Michight, candiclight, and special Michight, spraces are examinate for the morehigants of and New Year's Eve services.

Christmus, of course, has always been a child-centered holiday focusing on the birth of the Christ child. For children's services. St. Mary's Catholic church celebrates a special children's mass: Faith Evangelical Lutheran church and St. Thomas Lutheran church both offer special services written and performed by children; Zion Lutheran, First United Methodist, and St. Paul United Church of Christ all offer family services; while Betbel United Church of Christ offers a play performed by their youth members.

Midnight of Christmas Eve is the beginning of Christmas; the end of Advent and the start of the celebration of Christ's birth. Many churches celebrate this time with services that begin or end at midnight, including St. Mary's, First United Methodist, and

To celebrate the birth of Jesus, "the light of the world" ("I am the light of the world, he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" John 8 12) many churches hold candlelight services including Che'sea Free Methodist, Zion-Lutheran, Bethel United Church of Christ, Covenant church and the Congregational Church of Chelsea.

In this breath-takingly lovely service, all the lights in the church are turned off and the worshippers each light a candle they have been given when they entered the church. The fire usually comes from a common source, such as a candle on the communion table, which the ushers take along the aisles, starting a candle on each of the aisle seats which in turn is used to light all the candles in the row. When all the candles are lit, the congregation joins together in song such as "Joy to the World" at the Chelsea Free Methodist or "Silent Night" at Zion Lutheran.

At Chelsea Free Methodist, Pastor Bradley and his wife light candles from the altar and then go along the aisle lighting the candles of their parishioners.

At Bethel United Church of Christ, the youth ushers are the candle lighters.

St. Mary's, Faith Evangelical Lutheran, Zion Lutheran, are also offering Christmas Day services, while St. Thomas, Our Savior Lutheran. Assembly of God, Chelsea Free Methodist, Zion Lutheran, North Sharon Bible church offer New Year's Eve programs or services.

Assembly of God church focuses their attention on the New Year's Eve service with fellowship, worship and prayer. Since they feel strongly about being a family church, the service starts at 7 p.m. so that the children participating can get to bed at a de-

six masses over a 24-hour seriod of mes Eve and Christmas Day. At a p.m. Dec 24 they have a children's mass. A parish mass takes . place at 6 p.m. and at midnight they celebrate the first mass of Christmas. Children sing carols before the 4 p.m. mass while the church choir sings this reason, a number of area before the 6 p.m. and midnight churches offer special Christmas Eve masses. On Christmas Day, masses are offered at 8, 10 and 12 a.m.

Chelsea Free Methodist church offers a candlelight service at 6 p.m. New Year's Eve they have a family fellowship from 8-12 p.m. at which people bring food to share, play table games, and enjoy two movies - one for children, one for the entire family ! Faith Evangelical Lutheran's

Christmas Eve celebration consists of a children's service consisting of stories and songs written and performed by the children. At 10 a.m. Christmas Day the church will have a regular Christmas service. Our Savior Lutheran church offers

a traditional Christmas Eve service complete with caroling at 7:30 p.m. On Christmas Day they greet the Christ child with a festive worship at 10 a.m. According to the Rev. Giebel, "the emphasis is on the joyous music of Christmas." They also have a New Year's Eve service at 7:30 p.m. The Rev. #### **Court Creates Confidential Group** To Probe Bronson Matter

A special working group involving officials from the Judicial Tenure Commission and the Attorney Grievance Commussion to confidentially receive information regarding the Court of Appeals has been created by Supreme Court Chief Justice G. Mennen Williams.

The group is the product of a directive three weeks ago by the court to review the bribery solicited by Court of Appeals Judge S. Jerome Bronson and procedures to protect judicial in-

Williams said the group provides a specific forum for the public to report information regarding actions by judges or attorneys, and provides better co-ordination of the investigation than if the judicial and atterney groups handled independent investi-

Grievance Commission Chairman Michael Schwarz is acheduled to meet Friday with atturney James Canham, who was the middleman in the bribe.

With this working group in place, it is envisioned that a thorough investigation of the Brunous matter can be made. By assigning staff directly to the Judicial Tenure Commission and Atturney Grievance Commission, the confidentiality requirements of these two bodies at the izvestigation stage can be maintained," Williams

The group will be assisted by attorneys from the attorney general's office, an investigator from the State Police, and an auditor from the Department of Treasury.

Marilyn Hall, speaking for court file on the case to the attorney Williams, said auditors are sometimes brought into investigations in legal matters, and said there is some interest in looking in

Bronson's financial records. She said the investigation is focussed on Mr. Bronson and the particular case involved in the bribe ia \$3.25 million damage judgment against Ford Motor Co. but the working group will take it wherever it goes. She said there is no time limit for the group to complete its investiga-

Williams said, "We are hoping that the Bronson incident was an isolated event, but, if it was not, then we want to know and take appropriate action." State Bar President Julia Derlow offered strong endersement for the

working group concept.

"Citizens are entitled to assurance that the case will be fully investigated. Every possible effort must be made to determine wheth this was or was agt an isolated lacideat. That is sky in our discussion we have seged the court to ensure that an effective, co-ordinated approach is put in place," she said.

She said the express invitation for citizens to came forward with information is a morestary and appropriets ship to preserving confidence in the system.

Williams said the Supreme Court. the Court of Appeals and Court Administrator are reviewing the internal procedures of the Court of Appeals as

VISUAL FIELDS

Tonight, and through the Yuletide, Christians will glory in Handel's "Messiah". Choirs will has the Prince of Peace the coming of the Savior which was predicted centuries before in the Book of Isaiah. At the same time Americans of all races and religions will yawn through the final days of the International Year of Peace, unaware that 1986 was so proclaimed by the United Nations

Instead of joy to the world, it was a year of agony as millions of human beings in both hemispheres found themselves in bloodbaths of

The very first words of the United Nations Charter-yes, the beginning of the pressible—declared: "We the peoples of the United Nations (are) determined to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind." The peeamble then promised: "To practice solerance and live together in peace as good neighbors, to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security." It then added, "To ensure that armed forces shall not be used save in the common interest.

The charter was offered to the world at San Francisco in 1945. Today, 41 years later, more than one fourth of the 159 member nations are directly engaged in combat. No one knows for sure how many more UN members, including the United States, are providing weapons, military machines, training, political guidance, communications and intelligence to embartled UN nations. There are so many armed conflicts around the globe they are hard to count; but observers (including UN expens) estimate that over 100 wars are being fought right now. Burma, for instance, is engaged in eight different wars at once against Communist guerillas and assorted separatist movements. More than a million people are believed to have been killed in 16 years of internecine wat in Cambodia while another three to four million have died in other ongoing conflicts.

Why do they go to war? They do it to fight over land instead of sharing it. They send each other to the grave as a "righteous" means of resolving religious differences. There are wars over power, national vanity and polir al systems.

Spanish speaking Catholic narious are under assault by Marxist "liberation fronts" to bring atheism to El Salvadore, Colombia, Peru and the Philippines. Anni-Marxist forces are trying to recapture governments which have fallen to the Communists in Nicaragua, Angola, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Afghanistan and Cambodia,

Morocco appears to be winning a primitive 11-year war by building a fortified 1.550-mile wall in the western Sahara to restrain rebel forces from arracking populated areas. In Sudan, which is mostly Arab, a 20,000 man "libration army" is fighting to being more autonomy to black Christians in the south. Other African wars are going on between secessionists, guerillas and white minorities. Marxist Cuban forces an ocean away from home are fighting on the Dark Continent while South African military forces, equipped with \$20 million in U.S. acras aid, are fighting on other fronts. Two decades of war in Uganda have cost the lives of 500,000 humans but there is a momentary bill in that weary region while opposing forces regroup.

Farther south four wats intermeth. One, in South Africa itself, finds black nationalist guerillas using terror bombs to unseat the white minority, and the Mozambique black Marxists accuse South Africa of broken promises in the supply of weapons. There is much, much more to report about the killings in various parts of Asia as we celebrate Christmas Eve. and an endless supply of fresh horrors keep coming from the madhouse known as the Middle East. You don't need this picture; you get it every night on TV.

The hope for period on earth within the United Nations is even more forforn than the eight crusades against the infidels. We must reconstitute the United Nations because such a framework is an absolute, positive prerequisite to world peace

This we must do because, for the first time in human history, we are in a real situation where it is actually possible to turn the face of the earth into forming a new monthly Book Club. a dead wasteland of cinders. We can no longer tolerate a condition where. The Book Club is holding its first half of the civilized nations in the world are either engaged in war or are fueling the process.

We must arrive at a world organization of such unity and determination that if two nations are stupid enough to start a war, all of the temaining nations in the body will lower the boom.

The central stumbling block in these aspirations is the Soviet Union which intends to turn all 159 countries (or whatever) into the United Soviet Nations. They have to start wars for a reason which one of the authors of the 1956 Encyclopedia Brittanica explained this way: "A state that seeks to coordinate all the activities of its citizens to comprehensive ends, admitting little local, functional or individual resentments by focusing them upon an external enemy. It is doubtful whether a highly centralized totalitatian dictatorship can exist without such a scapegoat.'

Russia is the most successful revolution in world political history, far exceeding the achievements of Napoleon or Hitler. Communism has successfully introduced stability in the process of Marxist-Leninist conquest and made it work by turning each victim nation into a police state. But, at long last, the USSR has gorged too greatly and is beginning to choke.

There is no way that the Soviet Union can seal its borders or its people from knowledge of the comforts, abundance and freedoms of the free world. Soviets populations will not forever deny themselves the joys of democracy simply to build greater war machines for additional Soviet conquests. We have already seen a crack in the dike with the extension of private-profit trade to Russian cottage industries. These cracks can never be sealed and will constantly widen until the fissures reach the Kremlin.

It is safe to say that at least half of the international wars, revolutions and civil uprisings now going on are of Communist origin. Such efforts to form patchwork Communist empires in Africa, Central America and Southeast Asia are doomed to failure because Marxist-Leninist dogma is etched too thin on these native populations. The communication lines are far too long and fragile. What is more, the cost-to-benefit ratio is simply not. there in countries with per capita incomes of less than \$800 a year.

Cuba is one exception only because of the brilliant, profane leadership

of the Leninist Fidel Castro. In the interest of the true world peace we should do everything we can to encourage the downfall of Communism and transition into a free Soviet. Union. We should foster the development of a fair-for-all system of government for people everywhere.

This is true because there is one priority on earth which is more immediate than the future, and that is survival-





I don't even think we should be too harsh on a player who tries to BE number one, even if his suddiment temporarily goes a little haywire. Certainly we don't have to condone fighting during a game and some disciplinary action is in order. At the same time, I don't think we should be too surprised when fighting occurs.



Used in moderation and in controlled situations, alcohol can enhance a holiday social gathering. It's best to remember, however, that parties will be more successful if alcoholic beverages are not the main attrac-

When alcohol is served, invariably there will be those who drunk too much. Concerned hosts and hostesses should plan in advance for such events. Insist that the intoxicated person not drive until you are convinced. he or she is sober enough to be on the road. Sometimes it's even necessary to make overnight accommodations or alternative transportation arrangements. To avoid any disagreements with a guest, make your wiskes known in advance. Often an intoxscated persons will be less insistent if ground rules have been explained.

Make sure you limit the alcohol. available at your party and serve a choice of tasty non-alcoholic beverages. Quite often drink mixes directions, alcohol omitted, and are delictous. Encourage your guests who are drinking to limit their consumption to one drink per hour. And at the time of your choice, substitute coffee or soft drink for the alcohol and remove it from your guest's access.

Serve a variety of foods continuously during the entire party. A buffet with high protein snacks is a good idea. because they tend to slow the absorption of alcohol into the blood stream. Avoid excessively salty foods which make people thirstier.

## Jim Hoeft Downs First Elk With Bow, Arrow

The first elk to be shot by a how and arrow in recent history was shot by Jun. Hoeft 30, of Ann Arbor, son of Joan and Calvin Hoeft of Dexter.

According to Joan Roeft, Jim first tried shooting with a bow and arrow. when he was eight. He has been seriously hunting since he was a teenager, using both rifles and bows and arrows, and has shot a number of deer with both weapons.

This year, Jim applied for an elkbeense, competing with 36,348 applicants. When the drawing for 95 slots took place. Jim was one of the lucky ones.

Jim's family owns property in Curran, near the elk hunting area-the Pigeon River Country State Forest. Jim, his father, Calvin, and his best friend, Randy Walker of Pinckney, stayed in Curran when they went hunting this year. A mandatory seminar at Atlanta, given Dec. 8, the day before the elk season opened, was only a 45-minute drive away.

Jim chose the Black River Ranch as a site to go hunting. The ranch manager dropped Jim, Calvin, and Randy off about noon in a rye field where they set up a blind. At about 3:30 a herd of 20 or 25 elk came to the edge of the woods. Jim picked out a big cow and aimed, getting a good broadside shot at about 15 yards. The wounded elk took off with the herd, ran about 40 yards, then stopped alone on top of a hill.

The three hunters waited, not absolutely sure that the stopped elk was

the one Jim shot. Finally Jim got close enough to see the arrow and was able to make another shot which finished the elk.

Jim was surprised he was able to get as close to the elk as he was. He said, "I had a real good experience wat hing the buils and cows. They definitely aren't as spooky as the whitefail is. It was just great to be out there and have the opportunity to hunt something so hig."

Four others in Jim's seminar told him they were also trying to shoot an elk with a bow and arrow but none of them connected. In past years there have been numerous failed attempts, so Jim's feat is a real landmark.



## Holiday Lore Answers

It is generally acknowledged that the Christmas tree originated in Germany, and one lovely legend attributes the idea of decorating an evergineen to Martin Luther, who, gazing upon the startst evening sky through a curtain of tree branches, admired the scene's beauty so greatly that he decided to recreate it in his home, where he adorned a tree with a multitude of flickering can-

It was the mul-19th century before the idea of a Christmas tree was popularized in England, thanks to Prince Albert. Queen Victoria's German consuit, who decorated a tree in 1844.

Only a few years later, the idea recesed the Atlantic but it was not till 1856 that an American president, Franklin Pierce, first set up a Christmas tree in the White House, beginning a tradition. which continues to the present day,

2. Boxing Day, which is significant enough to be a Bank Holiday to the Britshiftee, has nething to do with professional contact sports. Rather, it is the day when, by custom, the airis busies, which have been filled during the weeks preceding Christmas, are opened and their contents distributed to the needy.

3 St. Nicholas, Santa Claus' prototype, was not originally a figure of fun-and joliny, but a Bishop from Asia Minor, an historical personage who dates from the third century AD, and to whom, after his death, various good deeds, some muraculous, were ascribed.

The most famous of the tales of his acts recounts how St. Nicholas bestowed downes on three sisters who were desfined, because of their tather's poverty, to a life of privation.

On three successive nights, St. Nichohas secretly toosed a bag of gold down the chimney of the girls' home, providing them with the means that otherwise they would have lacked to wed.

St. Nicholas Day, December 6th, is celebrated particularly in the Nether-

lands, and it was the Dutch who brought num to the New World, when they settled Nieuw Amsterdam (New York, today).

It was Washington trying, a 19th century writer from New York who was steeped in the Dutch legends of the area in which he had grown up, who brought St. Nick to life on the written page, as a giver of girts and figure of merriment

4. Ebenezer Schooge, in Charles Dickens' table. 4 Christmas Carol, is visited by the Spirit of Christmas Past who Firnly warns him of the consequences of the miserly life he has led. He is reformed, thanks not only to the

efforts of the Spirit of Christmas Past, but to those of the ghost of his dead partner, Jacob Marley, and to the offices of Tiny Tim, the crippled young son of Scrooge's office clerk Bob Cratchit.

5. The Three Magi, the wise men who

journeyed to Beth lehem guided by the light of a single stall, are not named in the New Testament, nor are they identified as kings, nor is their number limited to

Art and literature, however, have had a profound effect on their identification; thus Balthazar, Melchior and Gasper are known around the world today as the adoring kings who brought the valuable gifts of gold, frankingense and myrrh to the newly born Christ child in His man-

6. Thomas Nast, whose drawing originally appeared in the popular American newspaper, Harper's Weekly, has done much to influence modern-day image of Santa, including locating his home in the

Nast, whose drawings began to appear in the early 1860s, made an effort to place Santa in a contemporary setting. visiting the Union soldiers, for instance. in their army camp during the American Civil War.

7. The Christmas season is traditionally associated with hot, alcohol-faced punches, often served to carolers after they have finished a performance. In England, these punches were known collectively as "wassail," a word which comes from the Anglo-Saxon phrase for "he

Lamb's Mool, nicknamed that because of the pieces of toust which garnish it and bear a striking resemblance to fleece. was a kind of wassail, which included also more customary ingredients - ale. apples, eggs, sugar and such spices as cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves.

8. Generally, early Christmas tree ornaments included lit candles, cookies outin unusual shapes and festively decorated, gold foil patterns, sweetmeats and fragrant red apples.

9. In the Soviet Louon, where the observance of religious holidays as such is not encouraged. Grandfather Frost has replaced Father Christmas as the central figure of the winter holiday season, bringing gifts to commemorate New Year's Day, a secular occasion

10. The "visions of sugarplums" dancing in the heads of the children dreaming in "A Visit from St. Nicholas" were almost certainly stimulating the dreamers' taste buds as well. Sugarplums, often crystallized truits (not only plums), were gaily wrapped in silver foil. Though they originated earlier, they were popularized in Victorian England







## Characteristics of Michigan Wetland Described in Detail

What is a wetland? In simplest one identifying exception. Fens have enjoy wetlands for hunting, birding terms, a wetland is land where water slow drainage and slightly richer soil, and hiking. is found, either on the surface or underground, near the surface.

Water may be present all year or for only a limited period of time. Poorly drained soils and waterloving vegetation also identify

Wetlands provide important values, and in Michigan, these values have become increasingly significant as the state continues to lose thousands of wetlend acres annually.

Michigan has begun to pay the cost for what wetlands used to provide for

These costs will continue to increase as more of the state's wetlands are destroyed.

#### Four Major Wetland Types The four major types of wetlands in

Michigan include marshes, swamps, bogs and fens. Each has its own unique set of characteristics, plants and wildlife.

Marshes are wetlands with standing or slow-moving water. Rushes, reeds and cattails are the primary plants found in a marsh.

Swamps Swarnps are basically wooded wet-

The most common swamp in the northern portion of the state is the cedar swamp.

Bogs are areas with peat soils, a high water table and surface carpet of mosses, especially sphagnum

Unique vegetation, such as blueberries, cranberries and orchids can be found in bogs.

whereas bogs have no surface outlet. Water Quality

Michigan wetlands improve the water quality of lakes and streams by retaining polluting nutrients, such as phosphorus and nitrogen, that stim-

ulate algae and plant growth. Toxic heavy metals and complex organic chemicals are stored or degraded in wetlands

Wetlands also retain sediments, slowing the rate at which lakes and streams are filled, thus helping to keep them clear and clean.

#### Groundwater

Wetland sites are closely associated with high groundwater tables, and they often serve as sites of groundwater discharge or recharge.

Recharge sites are important for resupplying Michigan's valuable groundwater.

Discharge sites provide high quality water for the state's lakes and

Wetlands support a healthy segment of Michigan wildlife. Fish spawn, feed and hide in Michigan marshes and aquatic plant beds.

#### Shoreline Protection

Wetland plants along shorelines dampen wave action, slow current. speed. With their roots, the plants

hold valuable shoreline in place. Wetlands temporarily store flood waters, thereby reducing both flood peaks and flood damage

Aesthetic, Commercial Aspects

Wetlands support cash crops, including marsh hay, wild rice, blueberries, cranberries, peat moss, timber and minnows.
