

# Main St. Roadwork Should Begin Soon

Main St. through town this week or next, according to assistant village manager Lee Fahrner.

The project, which will repair the road from the Chelsea Medical Center to Sibley Rd., will take most of the fall to complete.

The big hold-up for the project, oddly enough, indirectly involves the Chelsea landfill.

Fahrner said the state is trying to find a place to dump the several hundréd yards of concrete and asphalt that will be generated by the project. However, it cannot use the village's type III landfill for demolition because the village doesn't know for sure if it will be forced by the Department of Natural Resources to close down the area.



# Village Tries To Condemn Dils Land for Sanitary Sewer Line Easement

One of the village's most prominent citizens is locked in a battle with village government over a sanitary sewer line the village wants to run through his property.

Former school board president Art Dils, who owns vacant land between his Main St. home and Letts Creek, is likely to end up in court because he refuses to accept a \$2,500 offer from the village for the 30-foot right-of-way. Dils and the village have been talking about the easement since May.

Some village officials believe Dils is simply trying to make a lot of money on the easement. Dils said he is trying to co-operate but the village is running roughshod over him.

Last Tuesday, Sept. 6 at the end of a long meeting, village council attempted to pass a motion to begin condemnation proceedings against Dils. The motion failed when trustees Phil Boham and Dennis Hall, employees of Chelsea Community Hospital, abstained in the voting. Dils is a member of the hospital's board of directors. Gary Bentley and Stephanie Kanten were not present. Joe Merkel. Richard Steele, and village president Jerry Satterthwaite voted for the measure. A two-thirds majority of the entire board, or five votes, is needed.

Both Dils and Satterthwaite said the measure is likely to be voted on again when a full council is present. Satterthwaite said a special meeting may be called because construction on the line has to begin soon due to all the development in the southern end of

The village wants to build an 8-inch force sewer main through the Dils property and through the North Elementary school grounds because it is the most direct route to the wastewater treatment plant and will require less disruption of traffic and less construction cost than replacing. the Dewey St. line with a larger line.

The entire project, which also includes a sewer line through the fairgrounds, has been bid at \$145,000. Fahrner said the alternatives to pip-

"I'm angry about it," Dils said last ing through the Dils property are "frighteningly expensive."

However, the dispute is primarily over the value of the Dils property.

An appraisal commissioned by the village put the easement value at \$2,500.

"We hired a competent person to appraise the property," Fahrner said. "I don't know why we'd want to pay more than that. Mr. Dils has his reasons for not accepting the offer, which I respect. However, the village has to decide the best way to handle this which is in the best interests of



Officials Say Wetlands Impact Insignificant for S.S.C.

Officials of the Michigan Superconducting Super Collider Commission recently reported that only about 260 acres of wetlands would be permanently disturbed if Michigan is selected as the site for the U.S. Department of Energy project.

An environmental impact statement released by the department pointed out that 2,800 acres of wetlands were included in the 16,000 acre Michigan site, but John F. Hanieski, executive director of the commission, said only about 620 acres of the wetlands would be affected.

And of that, about 360 acres would be only temporarity disturbed and would be allowed to return to their natural state following construction. Hanieski said Michigan stands to

lose less environmentally sensitive land than any of the six other competing states. For example, at the Arizona site, some 570 acres of desert would be lost, which he said is much more difficult to restore than are the wetlands. Locating the project in Michigan

would also disturb only one natural habitat, that of the Indiana bat. Hanieski said the bat has not been found in the proposed SSC area, but federal regulations prohibit the destruction of any natural habitat.

#### "Working Hard To Keep It Simple"



precision-engineered products called power take-offs or PTO's. As you no doubt know, these are auxiliary transmissions which are coupled to the power trains of trucks. When tools are then linked to the PTO's they can perform a remarkable variety of tasks. This hard labor is done on the spot. anywhere, anytime. At the scene of a fire, it is a PTO that makes it possible to pump and

propel thousands of gallons of water per minute into a burning building. Again, it is the lifting power of a PTO that can hoist an aerial ladder 100 feet up a wall so that city firemen can save trapped people from certain death.

Uptown the crew of a truck from the utility company is using a posthole digger, connected to their truck by a PTO, to bore deep and straight into the ground. Minutes later a PTO will help the crew lift and lower a huge utility pole into the cavity. Down the street a wrecker with a PTOdriven winch pulls a vehicle free that has become mired in the mud.

Across the nation and around the world, aided by PTO's, people are using the superhuman, super horsepower of truck engines to perform labors that would defeat legions of men and animals. Imagine a team of Budweiser draft horses, four abreast and 18 deep, straining to move a massive load while alongside a truck engine rated at 72 h.p. is moving an identical load with the touch of a PTO lever.

The drive-train of an automobile, truck or tractor is designed only to move the vehicle forward or backward. When a PTO with its system of gears and drive shaft is coupled to this same engine, the available energy becomes multidirectional. All or part of the automotive power can instantly be used for movement up, down, sideways or at angles. Tools may be attached to the PTO to pump, pull, push, lift, dig, grade, blow, scrape, shred, saw, cut or generate electricity.

Men and women of our village made their first PTO's as employees of the power take-off division of Chelsea's Central Fibre Products Co. This firm, famous for its clock tower, was purchased by Chelsea Products in 1945 and then sold in 1958 to Dana Corp. The new subsidiary of Dana continued under the same Chelsea management.

When the Sibley Rd. plant was completed in 1967, the manufacture of Spicer Power Take-Offs was moved to Chelsea.

The last addition to the Sibley Rd. plant was in 1974 bringing the square footage to 191,612 square feet—almost 41/2 acres under one roof. At that time Chelsea Dana had one major domestic competitor. Today it has 32 competitors and 31 of these are foreign concerns. How has all this competition affected the enterprise?

Chelsea Dana remains the world's largest maker of power take-offs with four times the production of its nearest competitor.

With world headquarters in nearby Toledo, Dana Corp. is 107th on the Fortune list of America's 500 leading industrial companies. It ranks fourth in the Fortune Motor Vehicle and Parts category, just below the automotive Big Three.

Dana Corp. has something like \$3 billion in factories, machines materials, inventories and investments. But if you talk to any of its leaders, such as Thomas "Hoot" Huetteman, plant manager at Chelsea, they will tell you that money, factories and machines are great but "Our greatest asset is our people.

In a brochure addressed to their family of employees, the company talks earnestly about Dana's philosophy and policies. Here are excerpts, some with my italics:

• We are dedicated to the belief that our people are our most important asset. Wherever possible, we encourage all Dana people within the entire world organization to become shareholders, or by some other means, own a part of their company.

We believe people respond to recognition, freedom to participate,

and the opportunity to develop. • We believe that people should be involved in setting their own goals

and judging their own performance. The people who know best how the job should be done are the ones who are doing it. • We believe Dana people should strive for total quality in all tasks

they perform. • We endorse productivity plans which allow people to share in the

rewards of productivity gains. • We believe in promoting from within. Dana people interested in

other positions are encouraged to discuss job opportunities with their supervisor.

• We believe in providing programs to support the Dana Style. We encourage professional and personal development of all Dana

The Dana Style has nothing to do with fashion. It is the lifestyle of career people working as a team in an atmosphere of personal initiative. Together they create the right climate for productivity and growth. They firmly discourage conformity and centralization, and they believe in a minimum number of management levels. (There are only five levels worldwide.) For the same reasons, they approve the policy which holds that responsibility should be pressed as deep into the organization as possible.

They are also convinced that results are best obtained through task forces rather than permanent staff functions. As soon as a task force has done its job, it is disbanded before it has a chance to take bureaucratic toot: In all company affairs there is the constant urge to keep it simple.

The company has programs to communicate regularly with shareholders, customers, Dana people, the general public and the financial community. The corporation feels strongly that it is the responsibility of all managers to keep people informed about the performance and plans of their operation. They mean it when they say, "We have no secrets at

In the ever-renewable quest for productivity, Chelsea Dana has an E.I.M. suggestion program (Excellence in Manufacturing), where an individual or a team can make suggestions at any time. The people are provided with a suggestion form which begins, "What condition do you want to improve, and why do you want to improve it?" Suggestions may be concerned with the work environment, safety, efficiency of operation, product quality or inter-relationships. All suggestions are given prompt attention and the results are reported back to the originators. As benefits are realized, innovators share in the benefits.

This kind of thinking has traditionally made sense with Dana. It was decades ago that Charlie Dana declared, "The one thing really worthwhile about an organization is its men and women. No one knows better than I the value of advice directly from the workman.'

A recent innovation, now undergoing trials at the company, is the Manufacturing Cell, introduced as a successor to assembly line production. It has taken the best part of a century to realize that using a human being to perform one simple task such as tightening a bolt is to deny the intelligence and humanity of the person on the job. Such tasks are being taken over by


Now on Sibley Rd., and elsewhere in American industry, the dawn is breaking on the day of the Cell. Instead of having eight different people performing eight separate functions to produce one PTO part, the total task is being given to one individual. One person (whom we'll call Pat) performs all six functions in the production of splined-output shaft. Pat's production in the Cell begins with an automatic screw machine, goes through four more processes; and ends with an internal shaper. Surrounded by this equipment in his or her cell, Pat is solely responsible for the production and inspection of that shaft.

The result is higher productivity, lower unit cost, personal accounta-


bility and entrepreneurial pride.

Dana people are aware of goals that are tantalizingly beyond reach. Zero set-up time. Zero waste. Zero scrap. Zero tolerance. Zero down-time. Okay. Maybe they are impossible but a guy or a gal can try. Dana Style.

# Errors, Power Failures Mar Conference Opener As Dogs Lose to Saline

In a game that will probably be remembered more for two blackouts than the play on the field, three interceptions and two dropped passes were essentially the difference as Chelsea lost 14-7 to the Saline Hornets at home last Friday night.

One pick-off led directly to Saline's first touchdown, another halted a drive deep in Hornet territory.

One dropped pass inside the Saline five yard line was a sure touchdown, another could easily have been a score considering how wide open the receiver was in the middle of the field. "We just didn't play very well," said Chelsea head coach Gene

LaFave. "We had a lot of opportunities. We were inside their 30 five times but couldn't get the job done. We made too many errors. When you look at the tapes you realize it wasn't so much what Saline did to us as what we did to ourselves."

Down 14-0 with about four minutes to go, quarterback Larry Nix ran the two-minute offense to perfection and Bulldogs scored with a little more than two minutes remaining. The subsequent on-sides kick failed, however, ending the Bulldogs' chances.

The game featured two onedimensional offenses. Chelsea had problems running the ball, picking up just 84 yards on the night, 42 by Junior Morseau. However, Nix passed for 181 yards and one touchdown, completing 13 of 27 passes. Morseau caught six passes for 97 yards and the only touchdown. Kerry Plank had two catches for 51 yards.

"Nix had another solid game," said assistant coach Wayne Welton. "He could easily have been 18 or 19

of 27. This is the second week in a row that we haven't caught the ball very well."

The Hornets, on the other hand, had almost no passing game as they completed two of nine tries for 18 yards. However, Brian Bozo, one of the top backs in the Southeastern Conference. ran for 143 yards and one touchdown. And teammate Branco Vulicevic gained 92 yards and the other score.

In the end, most statistics were about even. Chelsea had 265 yards, Saline 270. Chelsea had 10 first downs

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
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# SPORTS NOTES



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

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

# Youth Group Volunteers for Church Work Session in Mexico

Some Chelsea teen-agers ended their summer with a big "Ole!" as they traveled to Santa Ana, Mexico, to participate in Project H.E.L.P. Sponsored by the Free Methodist Church of North America, Project H.E.L.P. is a cross cultural work project for the Mexican Conference.

The Chelsea group, with each person paying his own expenses, was assigned to work at Rancho Betania which is 800 acres of high desert ranch land being developed as a conference/retreat center for the Mexican people.

Located 70 miles south of Nogales, Ariz., the teens spent 10 days at Rancho Betania in a great adventure of living in primitive desert conditions. No cabins, no electricity, no gas, no running water, no McDonald's, no TV. But while they learned to endure the desert heat they worked at various projects to begin developing the land into a functional conference area.

Some kids built dams for the backwash areas. This consisted of going out into the desert and picking up rocks, mixing mortar by hand and then cementing the rocks together to form the dam.

Others assisted in the construction of both a dining hall and a chapel as well as installing the plumbing.

Building wooden playground equipment for the younger children was also a project.

Each participant, in addition, had his or her turn working in the "kitchen" with the crew preparing meals. Bobby Pratt, who spent the entire summer at Rancho Betania, served as the foreman for many of the projects.

Each day a different part of the group would go into the town of Santa Ana to hold a Bible school for the children. The first day they went into the center of town with a very colorful parachute which they all held and played various games with. This attracted many people and children who were then invited to Bible school. There the teens helped by doing puppet shows, Bible stories, songs and



In spite of the long days with temperatures reaching 120°, sleeping on the hard desert ground, killing tarantulas, scorpions and rattlesnakes, the teens are already looking forward to returning to Rancho Betania next summer. Two workcamps are planned for the summer of 1989 through Project H.E.L.P. in the months of June and July.





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

# Dexter Township Board Names Sewer Authority Representatives

Dexter township board at its Sept. 6 meeting appointed James Drolett and Doug Smith to serve on the Sewer Authority Board which will oversee construction of the new sewer system to serve Portage, Base, and parts of Tamarack lakes.

The other participating townships of Hamburg, Putnam and Webster are in the process of appointing their representatives. After that is completed, there will be a 60-day wait before the board can meet, elect officers and review information to determine which areas will be included in the special assessment districts. Township rules stipulate the 60-day wait, which is really a formality, to allow citizens to voice possible opposition to the township's appointments.

Assessment districts will be created within a month or so after the sewer board meets, Drolett said. All residents in the assessment district, even those who said they don't want the sewer hook-up, will be given the service and required to pay for it. The townships have voted to have the engineering firm, Porter Seeley & McNamee, prepare the special assessment roll, which means decide which areas will be in the assessment

Drolett said the board may vote to have assessment districts in areas

"We have to take into consideration which areas need it. Maybe 10 out of 30 people in an area are opposed to it, but five years from now those 10 people will be gone and the new people there will say, 'why didn't you hook us up to this sewer?" 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

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

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# Back-To-School Time Means Immunizations

By Gail Finch, R.N.

A common question on school forms is "Dates of Immunizations." This article will explain what the initials used to describe immunizations mean (these are also on forms) as well as which immunizations are required by the state of Michigan for entrance to

Immunizations are required by the state of Michigan, not the schools. The state health department checks records of school children to make sure they are immunized. Requirements may differ from state to state. Colleges may or may not require certain immunizations. Requirements will probably vary with outbreaks of preventable diseases.

Now About Immunizations: \*DPT: D-Diphtheria

P-Pertussis (also known as whooping cough; not given after age six. T-Tetanus Toxoid

Recommended dates for this vaccine are 2, 4, 6 and 15 or 18 months. A booster is necessary at 4 to 5 years of

\*TD—Tetanus Diphtheria, Toxoid \*TT—Tetanus Toxoid

Boosters of TD or TT are recommended every 10 years.

At least four of the above (DPT, TD, or TT) immunizations are required for entrance to school. \*OPV-Oral Polio Vaccine. Given

at 2, 4, 15 or 18 months and 4 to 5 years. At present no other booster required. \*MMR: M-Measles (known as hard or red measles)

M---Mumps R-Rubella (known as three day measles or german measles)

Given at 15 months with no booster required.

The above vaccines are required by the state for entrance to school. Other initials on forms are PPD or Tine. This is a tuberculosis skin test to see if you have been exposed to this

disease. It may be required. \*HIB: Haemophilus B Polysaccharide vaccines. Given at age 18 months to two years and helps protect against one type of spinal meningitis.

The World Health Organization monitors preventable diseases and as outbreaks occur may recommend changes in immunization schedules.

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

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# Inza Bristle Wins State Fair **Husband Calling Contest Again**

Inza Bristle says she's just a soft-spoken country gal. But when she gets in front of the State Fair crowd and lets out a long, bellowing, "Cla-a-a-ar-r-r-e-e-nce" TV cameramen have been known to put their hands over their ears and turn down the "sound waves" on their equipment.

Since she first won the Michigan State Fair championship for husband calling in 1976, bouyed by her firstplace win at the Dexter Bicentennial the same year, the call has echoed over TV and radio channels, bringing the long-time Dexter resident and grandmother of five a taste of fame that has suited her as well as the gingham colonial-style dress and white eyelet trimmed bonnet that she wears each time she performs in the contest.

This summer marked Bristle's 12th first-place win out of 13 years in competition. Last year, she snagged only second place because she was sick when she competed. But this year she regained the title. "I just went out and I got it back," she said.

Bristle has appeared a number of times on Duane X. Rileys' Channel 4 news segments and the Kelly and Co. TV program. "Marilyn tries to do the call, then members of the audience try. Of course, none compare," Bristle says a bit smugly.

Bristle made the commercials for the state fair in 1981. "First I did the call, then I told everyone to come out to the fair," she explained.

In 1982, she was hosted by radio station KDKA of Pittsburgh who called on her expertise to get their own husband calling contest started.

The station paid for her flight, Hilton Hotel accomodation, took her on sight-seeing tours and to some of the city's nicest restaurants. She also had a seat behind home plate at a Pittsburgh Pirate's game, all for giving the station a sampling of her powerful lungs.

Bristle has eight scrapbooks full of newspaper clippings, photos and letters of appreciation. "Doris Biscoe was so sweet," she says, flipping through one of the books.

One of her clippings is from a Paris magazine that wrote about her and published a picture of her when a French journalist visited the State

But one of her favorite mementoes is the picnic basket her granddaughter painted with a profile of her in her blue gingham dress doing the

What makes Bristle out-shout the other contenders? "Determination," she says, "to have fun and make other people happy."
