The university is headed by Dr. Richard Schneider, the first director of Spaulding for Children. Pielemeier was also one of the original organizers of Spaulding.

**Dorothea Pielemeier Wins Award from World Peace U.**

A scholarship fund in the name of Chelsea resident Dorothea Pielemeier has been set up at World Peace University in Eugene, Ore. The fund was established to recognize her as the annual winner of the Planetary Citizen Humanitarian Award given by the university.

The university, founded in 1980, is headed by former Chelsea resident Dr. Richard Schneider. The organization is an international education and telecommunications group that promotes world peace, the protection and preservation of the ecology, social justice, and food sufficiency.

According to Schneider, Pielemeier was honored for her faithful, generous and dedicated support of the World Peace University and for her unceasing and unconditional prayers and

support for "her fellow planetary travelers." Pielemeier has supported Schneider's work for 35 years.

Pielemeier was a founding member of Spaulding for Children, the Chelsea-headquartered national adoption agency for hard-to-place children. Schneider was its first director. She has also been a devoted member of the St. Paul United Church of Christ, has cared for the needy, less fortunate, and has made it possible for many young people and adults to attend church camp through the years.

The Rev. Erwin Koch of St. Paul United Church of Christ presented the award to Pielemeier last Sunday during church service. He was assisted by Diane Reed and Lloyd Schneider, sister and brother of Richard Schneider.

## High School Changes Grade Point System

Due to changes in the computer program, grade point averages at Chelsea High school will now be figured on a traditional 4.0-scale rather than the 11.0 scale of the past. The change will show up on report cards for the first semester.

According to principal John Williams, the new system will put CHS more in step with the rest of the academic world.

"In the past, our counselors have had to convert our grade points to a 4.0 system for college applications anyway," Williams said.

"The 11.0 scale has also created some difficulties for students transferring into the district and when our students transfer to other districts around the state and country."

However, one of the advantages of the 11.0 point system is the ability to differentiate between a plus grade and a minus grade, Williams said.

"In many schools a grade of 'B' is worth 3.0 points whether it is a B-plus

or B-minus or a straight B," Williams said.

"After consultation with the guidance office, our new system will be based upon the 4.0 for a straight A, but we will differentiate between pluses and minuses."

The following is a list of points for each grade:

A+/A	4.0
A+	3.7
A	3.3
B+	3.0
B	2.7
C+	2.3
C	2.0
D+	1.7
D	1.3
F	0.7
F	0

Each report card will also show the grade point average for a student's high school career. Past records have been updated to reflect the new system.

Rosanne C. Bloomer and John P. Hansen, Ph.D., were elected at the November meeting.


