## W. A. Thomas Company Purchased By Taylor Man

W. A. Thomas Co. of Chelsea, a small-parts manufacturer primarily for the automotive industry, has been purchased by a group of private out-of-state investors for an undisclosed amount of money.  
Edwin Nelms, of Taylor, is the new president and chief executive officer, and the majority shareholder. Bill Marsh, former owner, is no longer affiliated with the company. The company has been in operation in Chelsea for more than 40 years.  
Nelms, who said the company had been in financial trouble for the last several years, approached Marsh about the sale, which was completed Sept. 28. Nelms was previously employed by a competitor in Taylor.  
Nelms also brought a new management team with him, including Joe Lewis, vice-president of marketing,

John Knight, director of manufacturing, Ron Thompson, manager of operations, and Bob Eakin, director of quality control. All are from the Detroit area.  
"I've heard a lot of rumors since we bought the company," Nelms said. "The truth is, we plan to stay and we aren't going to move somewhere else. We came to bring 1990 management and manufacturing techniques to the company."  
The company, on Congdon St., has roughly 40 employees, who are not unionized. Nelms said negotiations are taking place with the United Auto Workers.  
Nelms said his reception by the company's line workers has been excellent.  
"Put yourself in their shoes," Nelms said.

"Every day for the last couple of years they came to work never knowing if they'd have a job tomorrow. Now they see someone infusing capital and making things happen."  
Nelms said he plans for the company to become more visible in the community.  
The company supplies small parts to the automotive, valve, and heating and cooling industries. Chrysler Corp. is the largest customer, and 90 percent of the business is with the auto industry. However, Nelms said he wants to increase business so that the automotive industry accounts for 60 percent of the business.  
Nelms, who worked 10 years for Aerojet General in Los Angeles, holds a degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Texas.

## Many Farmers Will Struggle Despite Excellent Corn Crop

Chelsea/Dexter area corn farmers, as well as corn farmers nation-wide, may have done their jobs almost too well this year as an excellent crop is pushing corn prices too low for many of them to make a profit, according to Klaus Bachmann of Proviso-Big H in Chelsea.  
Nation-wide, the corn crop appears to be about 7.5 billion bushels, counting the 200 million produced in Michigan, Bachmann said. Prices are

in the range of \$2 to \$2.25 per bushel. "Farmers in this area are getting 60 to 120 bushels per acre, and they're averaging about 100 bushels," Bachmann said.  
"For this area that is considered very good but a farmer with a 120-bushel yield will about break even, or might make a little. Corn prices are cheap. They need to be about 50 cents higher before most farmers will make much money."

Bachmann said that the farmers who have payments to make on equipment or land will have a hard time making any money, while those who have second or third-generation family farms "might have a little money left at the end."  
Bachmann said the corn quality is "excellent," with low moisture content and little sign of any disease. As of Friday the crop was about 40

## Huge Grass Lake Project Can Proceed as Township Has Lifted Moratorium

A standing-room-only crowd packed Grass Lake Township Hall last month to listen to the latest plans for the massive development planned for the eastern portion of the township.  
It was what is called a pre-petition conference called by the developers, Agee & Associates, of Ann Arbor, as is provided for in the township's zoning ordinance. It allows the developer to feel out the township planning commission and any county agencies that might have a hand in regulating the development.  
The public was only allowed to listen. Public hearings will be held later.  
However, many members of the Grass Lake Awareness Committee, the prime opposition group, were on hand.  
Developers of the 1,700-acre project have not yet applied for re-zoning, but township supervisor Al Mollenkopf said he has been told by the township attorney that it's likely the application will be filed this month.  
Developers are free to proceed with the project as a moratorium on zoning changes was lifted in late September. During the moratorium, the township's zoning ordinance was changed dramatically.  
"There were major changes in the ordinance, especially with planned unit developments," Mollenkopf said. "It was re-written and expanded and requirements and procedures,

and the sequence required, is very clearly defined. It's now much more specific."  
The \$400 million project is scheduled to include 4,257 living units, including 1,545 single-family homes, a 400-unit, seven-story retirement tower, a 300-unit condominium tower, and apartments and townhouses. The total number of living units was recently raised by 500.  
Total township population is about 3,800, including 1,500 residences, Mollenkopf said.  
The development will also include shopping, entertainment, and medical facilities, and room for expansion of the school district. A wastewater treatment plant is planned, although a landfill is not. The developers have hired a consultant to devise a plan for

Money raised from sales helps to give students an active role in increasing their musical experience.

## Chelsea Police In High-Speed Chase on I-94

A Chelsea policeman was involved in a high-speed chase on I-94 and was nearly run off the road by the object of pursuit last Thursday, Nov. 2.  
Officer David Dettling responded to a call for help from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department shortly before 2 a.m. He entered I-94 westbound at M-52, pulled into the left lane, turned on the flashers, and attempted to slow down a car driven by James R. Hunt, 20, of St. Clare.  
However, police said Hunt tried to ram the back of Dettling's vehicle while Dettling was driving about 65 miles per hour. Dettling pulled his vehicle into the right lane and Hunt pulled up next to Dettling. Police said Hunt then tried to force Dettling off the road. Hunt temporarily lost control of his vehicle, but eventually gained control and continued on at 90 miles per hour.  
Eventually, police were able to box Hunt's vehicle in, and Hunt pulled to a stop. However, he tried to flee on foot before police could detain him.  
Hunt was eventually taken to Chelsea Community Hospital. There he threatened to kill a policeman and the hospital staff.  
Police did not say what may have prompted Hunt's actions.

## JUST REMINISCING

Items taken from the files of The Chelsea Standard

### 4 Years Ago . . .

Wednesday, Nov. 8, 1985—  
"Roses Are Dead," the second book in area writer Loren D. Estleman's Peter Macklin suspense series, was published by the Mysterious Press and became available in hardcover locally. Estleman is a 1970 graduate of Dexter High school and a former staff writer for The Dexter Leader.

A two-year undercover investigation of illegal trapping and selling of fur-bearing animals came to a close when warrants were issued for the arrest of more than 300 people in eight states; 118 were Michigan residents. The sting operation was conducted by Wisconsin, Minnesota and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service law enforcement personnel.

As befitting Veteran's Day honors, Chelsea veteran and parade grand marshal Herman Reed was individually recognized, not only by his community but also by the Washtenaw County Council of Veterans. He was born in Kalkaska and moved to Chelsea when he was eight years old. He was a Chelsea police officer for years.

A vandal or vandals threw "three big rocks" through windows at Beach Middle school sometime over the week-end, Chelsea police reported. The broken windows were near the front entrance of the Cameron Pool. Police said a similar incident occurred over the week-end in Dexter at Dexter High school, but they do not know if the incidents are connected.

### 14 Years Ago . . .

Thursday, Nov. 8, 1975—  
A total of \$939.81 was collected by Chelsea children and youth for UNICEF through a UNICEF trick or treat, and a 12-mile Walk-a-Thon through the Village of Chelsea. According to Mrs. Paul Closson who chaired the drive, the trick or treaters collected a total of \$287.79 in their door to door effort for UNICEF.

Village Police Chief George Meranuck asked that area residents be on the look-out for suspicious activities in their neighborhoods. Meranuck said that police had received numerous complaints in the past weeks concerning breaking and entering in private homes and places of business. "We want to stop these," said Meranuck, "but often we get reports after the fact when it is too late to do a lot about it."

### 24 Years Ago . . .

Thursday, Nov. 11, 1965—  
A total of 425 persons were served "all the pancakes and sausage" they wanted at the annual Kiwanis pancake supper Monday evening. The supper took place at the Chelsea High school cafeteria. All Kiwanians worked at the supper and proceeds were used for the club's community service projects. Key club members assisted by carrying trays for the patrons and returning the trays to the cafeteria counter.

Twenty-four Chelsea high school seniors participated in the 12th annual Boys and Girls County Government Day. The seniors were among more than 400 students from 17 schools who took this opportunity to learn first hand about the operations of local government.

Furs for the season were truly fabulous. Perhaps the most popular skin was that of mink and the different houses had a variety of colors and styles from which to choose. Fur capes, short ones, were also good for the season.

**Police See Better Crime Solving With Computer Print Match**  
State and local police officials report a new computerized fingerprint system, which they hailed as just the third significant technological crime fighting tool in this century, will solve previously unsolvable crimes and more surely remove felons from the street.

The \$22 million Automated Fingerprint Identification System will enable a set of fingerprints to be checked against 730,000 on file or prints taken from scenes of similar crimes.

Michigan is among a half dozen states to implement the system, which will have remote terminals initially at four State Police laboratories and three city police departments. Terminals will later be placed at three more State Police labs and six local police agencies, and in a second phase of the project, at county jails.

Within a week of the beginning of AFIS operations, officials said they already had leads of eight unsolved crimes, including four murders.

State Police Director Ritchie Davis said the system "will truly reduce time and solve crime." He said it would take 72 years to manually compare a set of prints with those on file, while AFIS will do the job in 24 hours.

Davis said one big advantage is that suspects who falsely identify

themselves will more quickly and more likely be linked to fingerprints and held without bail.

"If ever there was a crime fighting tool that comes close to the gadgets of Dick Tracy, this is it," he said. "Criminals will have a harder time hiding from the law in Michigan."

Governor James J. Blanchard said, "We are taking a giant step forward in guaranteeing swift and pure punishment for criminals" with AFIS.

"It can provide investigators with a whole new list of candidates and suspects," he said, adding its importance ranks with police radios and the original use of fingerprints.

Ann Arbor Police Chief William Corbett, chair of the AFIS Policy Council, said the system will improve co-operation between law enforcement agencies, and will ultimately be linked with departments nationally and internationally.

The system is designed to list 10 likely sets of prints in the files to match against the prints of a suspect, after which fingerprint experts would make a detailed comparison to make any possible identification.

The first terminals will be at the Bridgeport, East Lansing, Grand Rapids and Sterling Heights labs, to be followed by terminals at Grayling, Marquette and Northville.

The first local police with terminals are at Detroit, Livonia and Southfield, with placement in a few months at

Dearborn, Flint, Grand Rapids and Taylor, and the Oakland and Wayne County sheriff departments.

### Inspections Find 6 of 69 Island Housing Units Comply With Codes

A comprehensive inspection of 69 rooming and boarding houses on Mackinac Island found just six units in compliance with building and safety codes, and two declared unsafe for habitation.

The inspection was ordered after two workers died in a fire at apartments where one exit was blocked. A criminal investigation of that incident continues.

Attorney General Frank Kelley said no civil fines will be levied at this time against the property owners for the code violations discovered, but will if corrections are not made.

The violations included obstructed exits, inoperable smoke detection equipment, lack of fire extinguishers, combustibles stored in exit areas, inadequate floor-to-floor separation and room-to-corridor separation, faulty exit signs and lack of emergency lighting.

Kelley said property owners have been fully co-operative with the efforts to improve safety of the island housing. State Fire Marshal officials are sending letters to all owners in violation listing specific corrections that must be made before the housing may be used next year.

The attorney general added that the fact nearly all units failed the inspection is not unusual, saying violations would be found if similarly intensive inspections were made elsewhere. But he did say Mackinac Island city officials have acknowledged being "somewhat" lax in their inspections.

Kelley said the island's hotels will next undergo inspections, but that violations are not expected to be as widespread because of reviews made by insurance companies.

Montpetit helped the science teachers of Beach kick off a project to recycle plastic milk, water, and juice jugs. Students at Beach are now joining those in Chelsea's North and South grade schools in collecting the jugs for recycling.

Object of the project is to give students an opportunity to take an active role in protecting and preserving their local environment while helping to create a market for recycled products. Proceeds from the effort will be used to buy benches and other recycled products for Chelsea residents to use.

Rinsed and flattened jugs are to be brought in to classes. Caps are not usable at this time and the labels may be left on the jugs. The collected jugs will be picked up on Wednesday and Friday afternoons by members of the Beach Parent Group and delivered to local holding areas.







# Proving Grounds Facilities Man Elmer Kiel Spent 37 Years There

Elmer Kiel, who remembers punching a time clock in an old farmhouse when Chelsea's Chrysler Proving Grounds was in its early stages of development, retired Oct. 31 as the company's facilities manager.

Kiel, who has dedicated his entire professional life to the American automobile industry, spent 38 years with Chrysler Corp., and was one of the original people when the first Chrysler employees appeared at the proving grounds on Nov. 3, 1952, two years before the facility was dedicated. He eventually was one of the drivers in the 24-hour dedication run at the facility.

"There was little more than an oval track and one building when we started," Kiel says.

"The place has really changed a lot since then."

Kiel has seen the facility grow from that one building to a huge plant with its own water tower, and several tracks. In addition, security, which used to consist mainly of hiding new cars under tarps at night, is now extremely tight.

The proving grounds, which has been one of the Chelsea-area's great success stories, has also had its valleys. Kiel remembers when the plant had nearly 1,200 employees, only to drop to less than half that number in 1974 during the energy crisis. He said there are about 620 employees there now.

"We all thought we'd be out of jobs then."

Kiel began at the Highland Park Engineering facility in 1951. Previously, he had worked for Hudson Motor Car Co., a division of American Motors, for seven years.

Kiel was initially involved in acceleration and fuel economy tests. He also handled most of the high-speed testing, which involved driving at 100 miles per hour and faster.

"We had cars then that could run 145 miles per hour," Kiel says.

"Back then I'd drive one lap at 20 miles per hour, one lap at 80 miles per hour, one lap at 100 miles per hour and two laps with it wide open. I was

very lucky that I never had an accident."

Accidents, in fact, used to be a relatively frequent occurrence before a fence was installed around its 3,800 acres and deer could wander wherever they pleased. Kiel says there used to be about 19 or 20 accidents per year, but they are rare now.

Kiel was eventually promoted to supervisor in the performance department, a job which he held nearly 15 years. His next promotion was to plant superintendent, essentially the job he retired from.

He was in charge of automotive facilities, garage assignments, and rental of the proving grounds by outside companies, such as Car & Driver Magazine.

The retirement came a little earlier than Kiel expected as Chrysler offered him and many other employees an early retirement deal. "I couldn't refuse it," he says.

Kiel retired, along with 38 other workers, including his brother, Ron.

Kiel hasn't quite figured out what retirement will hold for him, although he plans to stay active in the Kiwanis Club of Chelsea and the Chelsea Depot Association. He also plans to hunt.



## Veterans Day Established By Congressional Action

How Veterans Day Was Named In 1921, an American soldier—his name "known but to God"—was buried on a Virginia hillside overlooking the Potomac River and the city of Washington.

The Arlington National Cemetery burial site of the unknown World War I soldier became the personification of dignity and reverence for America's veterans.

Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an

"unknown soldier" was buried in each nation's highest place of honor.

In England, it was Westminster Abbey, and in France, the Arc de Triomphe.

The memorial gestures all took place on Nov. 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I hostilities at 11 a.m., Nov. 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month).

The day was known as Armistice Day.

Armistice Day officially received its name in America during 1926, through a Congressional resolution.

It was designated a national holiday, 12 years later, by similar Congressional action.

If the idealistic hope had been realized that World War I was "the war to end all wars," Nov. 11 might still be called Armistice Day.

However, shortly after the holiday was proclaimed, World War II broke out in Europe and shattered the dream.

Sixteen and one-half million Americans took part, 408,000 died.

Families and friends of these dead men and women longed for a way to honor their memory.

"To Honor Veterans of All Wars"

An answer to the dilemma of how to pay tribute to those who had served in this latest war came in a proposal made by Representative Edwin K. Rees of Kansas: Change Armistice Day to Veterans Day, and make it an occasion to honor those who have served America in all wars.

In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the bill proclaiming Nov. 11, Veterans Day.

At the same time, he called for Americans everywhere to re-dedicate themselves to the cause of peace.

On May 30, 1958, two more unidentified American war dead were brought to Arlington Cemetery from overseas, and interred in the plaza beside their comrade of World War I.

One was killed in World War II, the other in Korea.

A law passed in 1973 provided for the interment of an unknown American who lost his life in southeast Asia during the Vietnam era.

For several years, no qualifying remains were discovered, so a memorial plaque was placed in the Amphitheater's Memorial Display Room.

On Memorial Day, 1984, however, the Unknown Serviceman from that conflict was placed "In Honored Glory" alongside his fellow countrymen.

To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, the 3rd

United States Infantry, The Old Guard, keeps day and night vigil.

Too Significant to Change

A law passed during 1968 changed national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October, but it soon became apparent that Nov. 11 was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of the nation's citizens.

Congress enacted legislation (Public Law 94-97), which returned the observance of the special day to its traditional date, beginning in 1978.

It Once Belonged to Robert E. Lee The focal point for ceremonies conducted by the Veterans Day National Committee continues to be the Arlington Memorial Amphitheater, built around the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery.

The site established in 1864 is now operated by the Department of Defense, and lies on property which once belonged to General Robert E. Lee.

At 11 a.m. on Veterans Day, a combined color guard representing all military services honored the Unknowns by executing "Present Arms" at the Tomb.

The nation's tribute to its war dead was symbolized by the laying of a presidential wreath.

The bugler sounded "Taps."

The balance of the ceremony, which included a brief address, took place at the Amphitheater.

Ceremonies Co-ordinated Veterans Day ceremonies at Arlington and elsewhere in the nation were co-ordinated by the President's Veterans Day National Committee.





# Automobile Theft Ends Up as Rare Case of Mistaken Identity

It was a classic case of mistaken identity, only automobiles were involved, not people.

It all began Monday afternoon when Jacqueline McGinn, of Whitmore Lake, parked her car in front of Dancer's Department Store to do a little shopping. Twenty minutes later, when she tried to go home, she discovered her car was missing. She promptly reported the theft to Chelsea police.

"We made all the usual inquiries," said police chief Lenard McDougall.

"At first we thought it might be a prison escapee, since one was reported gone the night before. It

wouldn't have been normal to have a car stolen from right in the middle of town, but anything's possible."

McGinn waited nearly two hours for a ride home. When her husband showed up, they walked toward his car to leave town. However, parked in front of Johnson's How-To Store was their stolen vehicle, and a woman was sitting inside of it.

McGinn approached the car and asked the woman what she was doing in McGinn's car. The woman, Monica Merkel Gauthier, of Oregon, had no idea what McGinn was talking about. She said the vehicle belonged to her

brother, George Merkel, whom she was visiting.

Chelsea police were summoned to the scene, and after a few questions police were able to piece together the events of the afternoon.

What happened, McDougall said, is that McGinn parked her 1984 Chevrolet, and George Gauthier parked their borrowed 1983 Oldsmobile either immediately in front or immediately behind. The cars were the identical color, inside and out.

When the Gauthiers finished their business, they happened to get in the wrong car, and weren't tipped off because their key worked. They drove away without a clue that they were in the wrong vehicle. It was only by chance that they were in town when the McGinns walked by.

"I don't know what the odds are that a key would fit two different vehicles, let alone two different vehicles of the same color," McDougall said.

## Police Seek Escaped Prisoner

The five included the Chelsea Area Historical Society, Chelsea Chamber of Commerce, Civic Foundation of Chelsea, Chelsea Milling Co., and the Kiwanis Club of Chelsea. Will Connelly was also honored for spearheading the development of the Chelsea Depot Association (Connelly was its first chairman in 1985), and finalizing the \$15,000 negotiated price for purchase of the depot and grounds from the AMTRAK passenger line in 1985.

President Lee Fahrner reported that to date \$110,000 plus a \$30,000 State Equity Grant has been raised by the community, businesses, civic organizations and private individuals since 1985.

Veretta Whitaker, chairman of the sidewalk brick sale said, "We installed 100 new engraved bricks one week ago, bringing the total brick sales to 500."

"Anyone may still purchase a brick for engraving, and they are available for Christmas gifts."

Treasurer Gloria Mitchell said, "When renovation is complete, including the large meeting room, we will have spent \$125,000 for the purchase and restoration of the building."

The 1880 structure's floor space is 3,100 sq. ft. That comes to approximately \$40 per sq. ft. spent on preservation of this historic landmark of Chelsea's.

## State Champs! Fancy Footworks Give Dogs Girls Cross Country Title

Chelsea Bulldogs, ranked in the top 10 all year long but never as high as fourth, edged Fremont last Saturday for the girls class B state cross country title.

Chelsea freshman sensation Lisa Monti sprinted to take the early lead and eventually won with the best time of her young career, 19:07.39. In the process, she was named all-state.

Freshman Valerie Bullock (23rd, 20:22.46), and seniors Kim Roberts (35th, 20:47.45), Sarah Grau (37th, 20:53.65), and Vicki Bullock (45th, 21:02.75) all either set personal records or ran within a second or two of their best. Chelsea edged Fremont 141-145.

"It was quite a thrill," said Chelsea coach Pat Clarke, whose team missed a state title by one point in 1986. The Bulldogs had also been third twice and eighth once since Clarke began the program in 1980.

"After I saw the mood they were in that morning I was confident they would all run well, although just before it started they were a little tense. The cold wasn't affecting them at all and that was a good sign."

It was a chilly day, made cold by a strong wind, but the ground was dry. The 175 girls began the race by running straight into the wind. The course, at Tyrone Hills Golf Course near Linden, was similar to Chelsea's home course at Inverness Golf Course.

"I told them they would run well because it was cold," Clarke said.

"The problem is, you have to get them to believe it."

And believe it, they did.

Roberts had to fight leg cramps in the early going, but managed to run one of her best times.

Grau dropped 20 seconds from her best time, Vicki Bullock shaved a minute off her region meet time, and Val Bullock ran her best race of the season.

"Valerie was exceptional," Clarke said.

"And she'll get a lot better."

Monti surpassed even Clarke's expectations.

"Lisa beat a lot of girls who beat her during the season," Clarke said.

"She has a good kick and she really showed it Saturday."

Monti and Corunna's Michelle Radcliffe ran virtually stride for stride over most of the course. However, Monti broke away down the final straight-away to win by nearly six seconds.

Monti's time was the second fastest girls time of the day. Tecumseh freshman Nicole Randolph, who beat Monti at the regional race the previous week, won the girls individual race and shattered the 19 minute mark.

"I knew after the second meet of the season that Lisa was potentially an all-stater," Clarke said.

## Bulldog Cagers Make It Two Straight SEC Titles

It may have been a little anticlimactic, but the Chelsea Bulldogs wrapped up their second straight undisputed Southeastern Conference championship last Thursday with an 80-44 victory over the Saline Hornets in Saline.

The Bulldogs essentially had the title in their grasp on Tuesday after they defeated the Pinckney Pirates, 44-22, and the Dexter Dreadnaughts knocked off the Tecumseh Indians at home. Chelsea finished 11-1 in the league and Tecumseh closed at 10-2.

"To me, this title was a little more gratifying because last year we expected to win it and this year we thought maybe we can, maybe we can't," said Chelsea coach Rahn Rosentreter.

"Also, we lost six girls from last year's team and we had a lot of holes to fill."

It took a couple of minutes for the Bulldogs to get untracked against the Hornets, who were ahead 10-8 early in the first quarter. Chelsea had five steals in the closing minutes of the period and led 22-10 going into the second quarter. From there on the Bulldogs gave up their lead, although they increased it to 17 points in the final period as Chelsea began throwing the ball away. However, most of Chelsea's shots were in the lane.

"It was a lot easier win than we thought it would be," Rosentreter said.

"A lot of credit goes to the kids. They played to win, rather than playing not to lose."

A different girl seemed to dominate each period after the first for Chelsea. Mercedes Hammer scored 10 of her 13 points in the second quarter, Colleen Scharphorn scored 15 of her 22 points in the third quarter, and Tiffany Moore scored all eight of her points in the final quarter.

Other Chelsea scorers included Allison Brown and Scharme Petty,

with 10 points each, Carrie Flintoff with seven, Shawn Losey and Kristin Bohlender with four each, and Kate Dilworth with one.

Flintoff had a team-high seven rebounds, and Brown had six.

"Carrie had an excellent week for us," Rosentreter said.

"She scored some points, but she also rebounded and passed the ball well. She and Allison played well in both games. And that's exactly what you want from your team captains this time of year."

In Tuesday's home contest with the Pinckney Pirates, the Bulldogs were able to get the ball inside to Brown, who usually either scored the field goal or went to the free throw line. She finished 5-8 from the field and 9-11 from the line for 19 points.

"When they were able to give Allison trouble, Mercedes seemed to hold up her end," Rosentreter said.

"Although we didn't play exceptionally well, our defense was strong enough for us to win."

Rounding out the scoring for Chelsea were Hammer with seven, Flintoff with six, Bohlender with four, and Losey, Petty, Moore, and Scharphorn with two each.

Chelsea finishes the regular season this Friday at Jackson Northwest. On Monday district tournament play begins at Chelsea. The district includes Northwest, Brooklyn Columbia Central, Jackson Lumen Christi, and SEC rivals Dexter and Tecumseh.

Zangara, battling a bad back, took 40th place in 17:23 while Harris finished 46th in 17:28.



# SPORTS NOTES

We all stood or sat there in the chilling winds outside the Tyrone Hills Golf Course clubhouse as the race official posted the girls cross country team scores ever so meticulously. He walked to the sign "Marine City" and with his marker carefully drew a "7", then a "0", then a "2". Then he stepped to the sign "Clawson" and repeated the process with the numerals 7, 0, and 0.

It took the man what seemed like an eternity to get to the last two teams among the 26, Fremont, and Chelsea. He walked back and forth, and turned to the crowd and smiled, as though he was about to crown a homecoming queen. He walked back and forth again and someone yelled, "C'mon!" He turned and smiled again, then walked to the sign marked "Fremont," and drew in 146. And the numerous Chelsea supporters raised their fists and cheered, and many smiled and wiped away the tears. The Bulldogs had won their first state championship.

And it took about five seconds before someone said, "we want a sign," referring to a sign to be placed at the village limits, along with the two softball signs, proclaiming the Bulldogs the best in the state.

"They want that sign so bad," said Chelsea coach Pat Clarke. "Every day in practice they run by the village limits sign." It would be a constant reminder of their spectacular accomplishment this season.

It was truly a remarkable performance. Freshman Lisa Monti, who sprinted out to the lead after the first hundred yards, was neck and neck with Carunna's Michelle Radcliffe through much of the course. But somewhere in the last half-mile or so, like the Roadrunner, keeping pace with Wile E. Coyote, she said "beep-beep" and showed a devastating kick, which gave her first place by nearly six seconds.

Monti hit the finish line and smiled briefly. The tall, gangly, 14-year-old, with a mouthful of braces, barely out of junior high school, was a state champ, an all-state runner. The only runner she didn't beat that day was Tecumseh freshman Nicole Randolph, who won the individual race about 10 seconds faster. (Imagine that: two freshmen from the same conference are the two best runners in the state. Clarke and the Tecumseh coach slapped hands and yelled "S. E. C.")

Freshman Val Bullock was next in for Chelsea in 23rd place. Like Monti, she had run her best race of the season. But Valerie is just a little wisp of a girl who must have found the head-on, gale-force wind at the start quite a challenge and somewhat of a handicap.

Senior Kim Roberts was the third Bulldog finisher, in 35th place. She had started to cramp up in the first mile, but just decided she wouldn't let it get the best of her. She was within a couple of seconds of her best time.

Senior Sarah Grau was just behind in 37th place, and dropped 20 seconds off her best time.

The final scorer, in 45th place, was senior Vicki Bullock. She cut a minute off her region meet time. Clarke gave her a big hug, probably knowing that her performance was the key to the meet.

"I call her my state meet runner," Clarke said.

"Every time she runs in a state meet, she drops a lot of time and it seems to bring out the best in her."

Maybe there was a little added motivation. How often do two sisters have the chance to run for a state championship in the same year?


Junior Christine Mignano and freshman Teddi Hauck finished 106th and 129th, respectively. They'll be big contributors to the team next year.

It was a great victory for Clarke, too, who managed to get the girls to believe in themselves, which is probably the greatest challenge for any coach.

In addition, until this year, Clarke's girls teams probably had the best state record of any team that hadn't won the title, and maybe better than any, period. They've been so close to a title—second place by a point, and third twice, ~~not to mention one eighth place finish.~~ It was great to see him win it all and I left as happy for him as I was for the girls.

Clarke has been Chelsea's only cross country coach, having started both the boys and girls programs. And coaches know it is one of the premier programs in the state. Saturday's title simply gives him and the girls the recognition they deserve, kind of a seal of approval.







## DENTAL ANXIETY: DIFFERENCES IN PERSPECTIVE BETWEEN DENTIST & PATIENT







# Washtenaw County Continues To Grow

Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission has released planning estimates for 1989. According to the estimates, the current population of Washtenaw county is 286,585 an increase of just over 8% since 1980.

Households, estimated to number 104,551, have increased by 13% since 1980. Households continue to grow at a faster rate than the population due to decreasing household sizes. The Commission estimates the average household size at 2.5 persons, per household, a 0.12 decrease since 1980. According to Denise Flynn, program supervisor, the county continues to grow even as household size decreases due to the strong pace of residential construction.

"Almost 2,700 building permits were issued in 1988. This translates into more households and more people. So even though household size is decreasing, with this much new construction the county continues to grow."

Flynn added that 1988 has been the busiest year for new residential construction since 1973.

In fact only the city of Ypsilanti is

estimated to have a lower population today than it did in 1980. However, that may be changing. In 1988 year both the number of households and population had decreased since 1980. This year the number of households is up by 1.0% and small increases in new household formation are expected to continue, according to Flynn.

The city of Ann Arbor with a 1988 population of 112,371, Ypsilanti township (45,440), and Ypsilanti city (23,750) top the list as the largest communities in the county. Completing the top five are Pittsfield township (16,260) and Scio township (10,504).

Scio is also among the fastest growing. With a 62% increase in population since 1980 it heads the list of fastest growing communities. Ann Arbor and Northfield townships are tied for second place with population increases of 48%. Lodi township is close behind with a 43% increase in population since 1980.





# Washtenaw County Continues To Grow

Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission has released population estimates for 1989. According to the estimates, the current population of Washtenaw county is 289,885 an increase of just over 8% since 1980.

Households, estimated to number 104,551, have increased by 13% since 1980. Households continue to grow at a faster rate than the population due to decreasing household sizes. The Commission estimates the average household size at 2.5 persons per household, a 0.12 decrease since 1980. According to Denise Flynn, program supervisor, the county continues to grow even as household size decreases due to the strong pace of residential construction.

"Almost 2,700 building permits were issued in 1988. This translates into more households and more people. So even though household size is decreasing, with this much new construction the county continues to grow."

Flynn added that 1988 has been the busiest year for new residential construction since 1973.

In fact only the city of Ypsilanti is

estimated to have a lower population today than it did in 1980. However, that may be changing. In 1988 year both the number of households and population had decreased since 1980. This year the number of households is up by 1.0% and small increases in new household formation are expected to continue, according to Flynn.

The city of Ann Arbor with a 1989 population of 112,371, Ypsilanti township (49,440), and Ypsilanti city (23,750) top the list as the largest communities in the county. Completing the top five are Pittsfield township (16,260) and Scio township (10,504).

Scio is also among the fastest growing. With a 62% increase in population since 1980 it heads the list of fastest growing communities. Ann Arbor and Northfield townships are tied for second place with population increases of 48%. Lodi township is close behind with a 43% increase in population since 1980.

## Information Break Set For Northbound Hunters

Deer hunters heading north this year for the Nov. 15 firearm deer season opener can stop and take an information break at two "Deer Hunter Information Stations" located along US-27 at Clare and I-75 near St. Ignace, from Nov. 11-14.

Department of Natural Resources (DNR) conservation officers and wildlife biologists will staff the special stations to provide hunters with deer hunting literature and answer questions on deer concentrations, hunting prospects, regulations, and places to hunt and camp.

The stations will be located at the John C. Mackie Welcome Center on US-27 at Clare, and at the I-75 St. Ignace Welcome Center, situated 200 yards north of the Mackinac Bridge. Hours of operation will be 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Nov. 11-13, and 9 a.m. to noon, Nov. 14.

"Last year, more than 4,000 deer hunters stopped at the two stations," remarked DNR director David Hales. "Now in our third year, this continues to be a fine opportunity for us to talk one-on-one with the hunters, and to exchange a great deal of valuable information."

Department of Transportation director James Fitz added, "We're pleased to offer the highway centers as a permanent location for the DNR and hunters to meet each November. "Again our staff will assist in having tourist and lodging information on hand at these sites."

An estimated 700,000 hunters are expected to harvest 354,000 deer during the Nov. 15-30 firearm deer season, according to DNR wildlife biologists. Michigan's deer population is estimated at two million.

## Minimum Wage Compromise Opposed By Farm Bureau

Michigan Farm Bureau is opposing the minimum wage compromise recently worked out by Congress and the White House. Public affairs director Al Almy said farmers don't think it's fair that they are prohibited from offering a sub-minimum training wage to seasonal workers.

"I think the concern here is that a first-time worker is a first-time worker," he said. "These people do not have the skills to be as productive on the job as an experienced person. And whether that person is working in agriculture, in a hardware store or on a construction crew, the employer should be able to be compensated somewhat for that inexperience by paying the subminimum wage."

The U. S. House was expected to vote on the minimum wage increase on Thursday, Nov. 2.






