

Drug education week to be held

Both the Chelsea Village Council and the Chelsea Board of Education voted to proclaim the week of Oct. 23 to Oct. 31 as National Red Ribbon Week in Chelsea as part of a national effort to educate people about the dangers of drug use.

President Bill Clinton is honorary chair of the National Family Partnership, which designated the week as a time for creating a drugfree community. Lima Township resident Gary Adams brought the proclamation before the council after becoming concerned with recent news about growing drug use in the area.

"During the past few years, I have read the news accounts and viewed the current statistics and trends with growing concern," Adams said in a letter to the Council. "I ask you to support our youth ... and urge all of our citizens to join in the celebration by wearing or displaying a red ribbon throughout that week and to join together in the yearround efforts to create a drug-free community."

Halloween celebration to be held soon

The annual Chelsea Halloween celebration will be held Friday, Oct. 31. Community "trick-or-treat" time is from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Kiwanis Club of Chelsea will hold its annual party beginning at 6 p.m. at Beach Middle School and will include costume judging. Categories for the costumes are most original and best looking in six age categories. The judging will be done by local area business people and each child will receive a participant ribbon.

After the judging, the Middle School Band will lead the children in a parade around the building after which the winners will be announced. The top three prize winners will receive a gift certificate from A&W. Kiwanis Club members will serve cider and doughnuts.

Council passes **Harris Homes** pond plan

Chelsea Village Council authorized Harris Homes to continue work on an undersized detention pond at the Village Place condominium project. Harris Homes can now build the pond to the size needed to satisfy county and village codes for detaining water.

The Council placed a stop-work order on the property after nearby residents complained of too much runoff from the development. Harris Homes has 30 days from the Oct. 3 special meeting to fix the problems.

Council adopts electricity rider

With deregulation of the state's utilities in the wind. Chelsea Village Council adopted a policy change in the village's electric utility rates.

If deregulation occurs, the village will charge village residents a fee for an outside electricity provider to tap into the village distribution lines. This fee is designed to offset costs associated with keeping records of the arrangement.

At long last, village gets new home

Village Council Chelsea voted unanimously to enter into a lease with Chelsea State Bank Friday at a special meeting of the Council. The vote came just three days after the Council's regular meeting at which the Council split a vote 3-3 to accept a similar lease. meaning the motion failed.

Friday's vote was the result of several revisions agreed to by Chelsea State Bank after the lease's rejection. Bank President John Mann told the Council that the new lease would contain six changes, including the elimination of the cost for common areas and a six-month escape clause after three years of the lease.

"It's good for the bank and it's good for the town," Mann said. "The vote was so close we decided why not see what we can do to tweak it and very pleased it's done."

Trustee Steve Daut, who voted against the first lease, said the changes won him over. He said the new lease is less expensive and has more flexibility than the lease the Council considered Oct. 14.

Daut said he considered the lease a temporary solution for the problem of the village offices, however. After approving the lease, he made a motion that the village should pursue a plan for permanent space within three years.

if we were going to get involved in this lease, we need to have a game plan for a permanent solution," Daut said. "I think this (lease) allows us to do this."

Trustee Jim Myles voted for the agreement, but he said that he would expect the village to look at the feasibility and cost of renovating the current building for a more permanent solution. He also said

the bank building does not have enough space for the po lice department and that was something that needed to be addressed.

Myles said the issue of a permanent solution needed to be looked at soon.

"It doesn't get any cheaper from here." Myles said. "Every day, every year we wait, the taxpayer pays more."

The lease has yet to be signed by Council, because it has to be redrafted to contain the changes proposed by Mann. The Council will look over the new lease before it is signed.


With the changes approved Friday, the village will rent 4,651 square feet of space in the bank's 310 S. Main St. building for \$12.50 per square foot beginning Feb. 1, or whenever the village moves in. The bank will provide a \$116,275 construction allowcome to an agreement. I'm ance for building improvements. The village will not be responsible for common areas. but will have 55 percent of the costs of taxes and liability insurance.

> The term of the lease will be five years, but the village can break the lease after three years with a six-month notice. The village must make a goodfaith effort to find another tenant, and if no tenant is found, the village will pay the remainder of the building allowance on a pro-rata basis.


To cinch the deal, the "I've said from day one that Council voted Oct. 14 to put up for sale a slice of property purchased in the mid-1980s as a site for a new village hall.

The sale of the parcel, which lies adjacent to the Purple Rose Theater, is contingent upon building a parking lot on the remainder of the village property there, and the expense of \$500,000 within two years for real estate improve-

ments on the land.

Asst. manager Pindzia resigns, citing unresolved village problems

Chelsea Assistant Village Manager Bruce Pindzia submitted his letter of resignation to the Chelsea Village Council Oct. 7 and was scheduled to leave the post Tuesday.

Pindzia worked for the village for five years overseeing a wide range of engineering, planning and zoning projects.

Pindzia cited his dissatisfaction with the village's progress on a number of ongoing problems as his primary reason for leaving. Pindzia does not have another position lined up, but he hopes to continue working in Chelsea.

"I don't want to burn any bridges, and I have enjoyed working here for almost five years," Pindzia said. "I just felt I wasn't getting a great deal of support here right now."

Most of Pindzia's criticisms centered on what he views as the village's deteriorating infrastructure and the Council's limited steps toward solving the problems. Pindzia listed the North Street water main. sanitary sewers and fire hydrants as needing immediate. care. He also said road construction needs to be ad-

Pindzia said the village offices were also a consideration in his resignation. In his letter he stated that he felt the village was no closer to a permanent solution after 10 years of considering the problem. He said that the offices hinder effective governance and communications among departments.

Village President Richard Steele said the Village Council does not normally take formal action to accept resig-

nations and did not take action in this case. Steele said Pindzia was an excellent engineer and will be missed.

"He's helped us through a lot of growth," Steele said. "He's worked very well with us and I wish him well."

Village Manager Jack Myers said the village has begun advertising in Ann Arbor, Jackson and Chelsea, as well as the Michigan Municipal League's newsletter to replace Pindzia. The assistant village manager's job description gives the position advisory, planning and evaluation duties, and the village will look for someone experienced in village government.

Myers said Pindzia gave no warning of his impending resignation.

"Quite frankly, it was a surprise to me that he resigned," Myers said.

Chelsea School board meeting focuses on finance

Monday was a big night for finance issues at the Chelsea Board of Education meeting, as the board voted on a variety of budgetary, purchasing and debt related items.

The board added \$440,065 to the budgets for building projects around the district. The money came from interest earned on the 1995 bond and will go to pay for additional building at the elementary schools and the high school. Superintendent Ed Richardson said the district typically budgets conservatively when considering how much money is needed for building, and adds changes as the money becomes available.

The board allotted \$445,500 for the athletic budget this year, which is approximately 2.2 percent of the entire budget, Richardson said. The district expects to receive more money from local sources and transfer less from the general fund than it did

The food service budget is \$660,000 this year. Total expenditures were \$631,824 last year with revenues totaling **\$592,170**.

The board also allotted money to pay off the bonds from 1974 and 1995. The board expects to bring in \$411,056 and pay out \$346,612 on the 1974 bond. For the 1995 bond, the budget anticipates revenues of \$4,063,889 and expenditures of \$3,601,826.

In addition to debt retirement and budgetary items, the board also approved a variety of purchases. The board spent \$64,970 out

of the building bond to buy student directory and scheduling software from Midwest Educational Group. The price includes training for teachers and support and maintenance of the software.

The package also required another \$12,245 worth of software that cannot come out of the building money, and must be spent from the general fund. This expenditure was also approved by the board in a separate action item.

Council rezones land for planned senior community

Chelsea Village Council

voted unanimously Oct. 14 to accept the rezoning of Sylvan Pines senior citizen community to planned unit development (PUD). The community, to be located off of Wilkinson Street, is proposed to have 98 dwelling units and limited to senior

Among other stipulations in the proposal, Sylvan Pines will be required to relocate the county drain that crosses the property, most likely by putting in a drainage pipe under the buildings. Sylvan Pines also will have to meet water detention standards in the detention pond without hurting trees on the property.

The site plan for the development is preliminary and will have to be approved by the Council once it is finished.

The Council also voted not to allow the de-annexation from the village of a piece of property near Chelsea Community Hospital. The owner of the property owns a parcel surrounded by it and wanted to combine the parcel into one property in Lima Township.



Well, now publishers Brian Lewis and Skip DeWall have really given me something to crow about with their new nature photography book by Milford photographers Carl Sams and Jean Stoick called "Images of the Wild."

This book, much of it shot in Michigan, is a step above anything you'll see in National Geographic or other wellknown photo showcases because it has a wonderful, sometimes whimsical personality to it.

There are shots of wolves and moose and bear and whitetail deer and all kinds of common Michigan birds, which sound pretty dull described this way. But you can look into the eyes of these animals and almost see their

There are also extraordinary shots of a sunflower field and a great blue heron feeding its young. Their signature "Milkweed Buck," showing a button buck with milkweed seeds on its head, is worth the price of the book alone.

You get the sense that Sams and Stoick must have spent days or weeks in one location to get the perfect shot and the perfect exposure.



Local boy injured in dirt bike accident rarely heals, and it will be at

Beach Middle School eighth-grader Tucker Kern injured his back in a dirt motorcycle crash Oct. 5, pinching his spinal column and paralyzing him from the waist down.

An avid rider since he was five years old, Kern was riding his motorcycle at a track in Cheboygan with his father, when he hit an obstruction and fell from the bike, according to his mother, Roxanne. Kern, 13, was wearing protective gear when he crashed including a helmet, pads, gloves and goggles.

Kern's friend went to get help and an ambulance was sent to pick Kern up after the fall. He was taken to Cheboygan hospital and then transferred to Mott's Children's Hospital in the University of Michigan Medical Center via helicopter. Doctors performed surgery on Kern's back to repair and straighten his vertebrae, inserting steel rods as support.

Until Kern was transferred to Ann Arbor, Roxanne had hardly any information about his condition. She said the few hours while the helicopter went to get her son were some of the worst she has experienced.

"It was a parent's worst nightmare," Roxanne said. "Thank God we had loving friends and family to be there with us."

Roxanne said doctors were not optimistic that Kern would recover feeling in the lower half of his body. She said once the spinal column is injured it

least a month of intensive physical therapy before Kern can return home.


Yet, she still has hope he will heal fully.





Ah, autumn! Crisp, sunny days, cool nights, fall color tours — and football! The long bomb, the quick run up the middle, the kickoff return, the interception, the prevent defense.

Homeowners could take a page from the football play book, suggests Tom Ellis, Michigan State University entomologist, and take "prevent defense" approach to fall-invading insects.

Any repair you make that closes up a crack or seals up an opening closes a bug door, Ellis says.

"Though it's unlikely that you'll ever be able to seal up every potential insect entryway into your home, preventive maintenance can seal up a lot of them." he observes.

Check your house from top to bottom, he advises. Look for loose shingles on the roof, loose bricks in the chimney, flashing around the base of the chimney that needs tarring, torn screens in attic vents and rotted boards anvwhere.

Water-damaged wood will be attractive to carpenter ants. he explains. Other openings may provide elm leaf beetles, boxelder bugs, ladybird beetles and other insects access to your house as winter shel-

In the spring, such openings may invite various species of wasps to build nests in attic or walls. Larger opening may invite bats or squirrels into your attic.

Check windows and doors for cracks, holes and weatherstripping that needs replacing. Sealing these will discourage entry by cluster and house

honeybees, boxelder and leaffooted pine seed bugs, elm leaf beetles, ants and spiders, to name a few. Check the basement, foun-

dation and other masonry areas for cracks, holes, and cracked and loose mortar. Add centipedes, crickets, sowbugs and pillbugs to the list of pests above that will take advantage of easy entry through such openings. If holes are large enough, they could allow mice or even rats to come in.

Pet food and wild bird feed should be stored in metal cans with tight-fitting lids so they don't serve as food sources for rodents and pantry pests, Ellis advises.

"Most of the home-invading insects that move in with people in the fall don't do any damage indoors," he notes.

"They don't get into people's food or damage fabrics or structures. Termites are a notable exception — they can cause serious damage to the very structure of the home. And no one wants to harbor bats, squirrels, chipmunks,

rats or mice. "The best advice is to prevent their entry by closing their entryways, whether that means putting a new screen on attic vents or filling cracks in the foundation," Ellis sums up.

"Every bug door that you close means that many fewer unexpected and unappreciated houseguests."

New diet plan makes losing easy as 1-2-3

Losing weight can be as easy as 1-2-3 on Weight Watchers' new diet program, which combines healthful weightmanagement practices and POINTS — food system.

The program, called the 1-2-3 Success Plan, eliminates the guilt often associated with dieting, because no food is off limits, and puts the dieter in control, according to Florine Mark, WW Group president.

Mark unveiled the plan in the Detroit area recently during a luncheon based on the POINT concept at Sweet Lorraine's in Southfield.

The 1-2-3 Success Plan has done tremendously in Great Britain for over two years, Mark said, adding that members rave about how easily it fits into their lifestyles. Here's how it works:

 Participants determine the daily point ranges for their body weights based on the body mass index, also known as the BMI.

Members find the number of points using the Weight Watchers food lists or the Pointsfinder. The Pointsfinder, which resembles a sliding calculator, is easy to use and enables member to calculate the POINTS value using the Nutritional Facts' label on any packaged food.

Along with other materials, members receive the 1-2-3 Fast Food Companion, which contains color photographs and POINTS values for the most popular items at 26 fastfood restaurants to enable the dieter to bank points to include favorite fast foods in the plan.

Mark stressed the importance of having at least two servings of milk products and at least five servings of fruits and vegetables daily.

The menu for the luncheon, which included a mini-honey/ maple muffin and a delectable fat-free chocolate cake, totaled only 7 points.

The author wasn't namedropping. I was.

But then, how many times would a reporter have an opportunity to interview someone who actually knew Margaret Mead and Helen Keller. heard Edgar Bergen tell jokes, discussed life in general with Dag Hammarskjold and was part of the Hillary Rodham Clinton "Eleanor Roosevelt" controversy?

Jean Houston, a psychologist, teacher, speaker and writer, certainly has lived an extraordinary life.

Houston's newest book hit the stores in September, and she has been crossing the nation to sign copies, meet with her admirers and speak out on a number of subjects, including how people can explore their own genius and potential.

If you can't afford a vacation and feel as if you are on a constant treadmill, purchase "A Passion for the Possible." It will calm you right down.

"The book shows us that these are the times and we are the people, and never forget that a normal person is someone you don't know very well," she said as an opener to our interview.

So began a very practical guide to tapping into personal potential.

"Most of us agree to lives of serial monotony and the progressive dimming of our passion for life," she said.

She assured me that the book would give practical examples and exercises on how to make a change.

Houston is the author of 16 books and is a consultant to the United Nations, UNICEF and a number of other international agencies.

She and her husband, Robert Masters, founded the Foundation for Mind Research in Pomona, N.Y., and conduct non-drug research into the nature of the brain and consciousness.

She travels the world, calling herself a "global midwife." Recently, she was involved in establishing schools for females in Bangladesh.

dummy, Charlie McCarthy, life's ultimate questions in a remarkable Socratic dialogue," she recalled.

Although Bergen obviously was providing Charlie's answers, he told Houston that he had no idea where it was coming from or what he was going to say next.

The chilling experience gave her goosebumps, Houston

When she met Helen Keller, Houston was 12 years old. She asked the woman why she was so happy?

"Helen told me that she lived every day as it were her ments are so full of glory," she

All of those contacts helped Houston choose her future career.

Houston was an intellectual sparring partner for Hillary Rodham Clinton when ideas for a book — which became "It Takes A Village" — were being formulated.

Both authors were unprepared for what would occur.

Houston said she attempted to tell Clinton how to focus her ideas through routine problem-solving exercises.

One of those exercises suggested by Houston was to take an admired figure and imagine what he or she would say to the first lady about the issues she was dealing with in

Clinton chose Eleanor Roosevelt, and, according to Houston, only imagined the kinds of ideas they would discuss about helping children.

"There were no seances, nothing spooky," she said, "just a standard focusing ex-

The press pounced on the idea of the first lady talking to another first lady long deceased.

When Houston arrived back at her home in Manhattan, the

lawn was covered with reporters and TV cameras. It is an experience she still finds painful to discuss.

Had she been a lesser individual, she believes that the damage done by the press might had been even more destructive to her reputation and her career.

Houston has an interesting way of presenting energizing inspiration to her readers.

She talks of a real-life experience she recently had when she had to renew and update the access codes on the receiver of her home satellite dish.

"If I had not installed new codes, hundreds of television stations moving through the airwaves would be blocked, and I would only see seven channels," she said.

"Each of us has access codes last, and life in all its mo-- to the many stations of our being, but our tendency is to forget to update them and to tune ourselves day after day to the same old programs."

Houston urges people to renew their access codes, and when the static clears, to be coded for the life they were meant to live.

Naturally, she urges people to buy her book. She also asks them not to put it away on a



WASHINGTON - Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Oct. 3. **HOUSE VOTES** —

Census Sampling - Voting 197 for and 228 against, the House rejected a Census Bureau plan to use statistical sampling for tallying hard-tocount populations such as those in inner cities. The vote preserved GOP language in a pending appropriations bill (HR 2267) to ban census sampling unless it clears the U.S. Supreme Court.

The bureau says sampling, as a supplement to direct counting, would produce more realistic population figures. Critics note that the Constitution requires "actual enumeration" of the populace, and argue sampling could lead to manipulation of population numbers that determine the makeup of federal and state legislative districts.


Alan Mollohan (D-W.Va.) said population undercounts leave out "a lot of poor folks" from inner cities and rural areas. He added that foes of sampling "fear that using (it) will affect the political makeup of the House of Representatives."

Harold Rogers (R-Ky.) said, "Serious doubts have been raised about whether the administration is planning a fair ... legal ... constitutional cen-

sus." He added, "We have a duty to ensure that the 2000 census is above reproach." A "yes" vote backed an ad-







Question: My mother was recently rushed to the hospital with pneumonia. Her tempera-

ture was over 104, her pulse larly when the pneumonia ocrate was 180, her blood pressure was very low, and her magnesium level was almost zero. in addition to the pneumonia, she was diagnosed with a blood infection.

This all came on very suddenly. Is it common for pneumonia to be an emergency condition like this — almost like a heart attack?

Answer: As you probably know, pneumonia is an infection that involves the lungs. There are at least 4 million individuals with what we doctors call "community-acquired pneumonia" every year. This cumbersome name is used to identify infections contracted outside the hospital (i.e., in "the community") from those that are acquired during hospitalization for another illness. This distinction is imporbecause hospitalacquired infections tend to be more serious.

I don't intend to imply that community-acquired pneumonia isn't serious. Of the 4 million who come down with this disease each year, about 800,000 — representing all age groups — need hospitalization as your mother did. Those who are in their first year of life or those over 65 are at greatest risk from the infection, how-

Members of these age groups who are hospitalized have a 13 to 25 percent risk of death from pneumonia. Those who have underlying heart problems, lung conditions, kidney failure, diabetes or other serious conditions have been greater risks. This is a serious illness.

on suddenly, as often occurs in pneumonia. Fever, shortness of breath, a fast breathing rate, general body aches, and cough are often present. Unfortunately, these symptoms may be very mild or even absent in the elderly, particucurs suddenly. Often the person only complains of being weak.

Elevated fever, pulse rate, breathing rate and low blood pressure are signs of a very serious infection. Prompt hospitalization to receive intravenous antibiotics, oxygen perhaps utilizing a ventilator to assist breathing — and other medications is necessary, and in your mother's case, saved her life.

The "infection in the blood" you reported is not unusual in this type of overwhelming pneumonia. The organism in the blood is the same one causing the pneumonia, and its presence in the blood is a consequence of the overwhelming nature of the infec-

Magnesium is a salt in the blood that must be present and in balance with sodium, calcium and others. Your mother's low magnesium level occurred as part of the complex biochemical response to the overwhelming infection and ensuing cardiovascular system collapse. This abnormality is a sign that her illness was quite serious. Obviously, she received prompt, highquality care because she recovered from this illness.

There are many types of bacterial and viral infections that cause pneumonia. Pneumococcal pneumonia is one type that often strikes rapidly and may become fatal without prompt treatment. Fortunately, there is an immunization that provides protection against the most common strains of this disease.

If you are over 65 or have a chronic condition such as diabetes, heart disease, kidney Your mother's illness came disease, or lung problems, be sure to see your doctor for this immunization.



Ice rink takes step toward reality at Council meeting

Getting an ice rink in Chelsea came one step closer to reality Oct. 3 when the Chelsea Village Council voted to allow a piece of land near Dana Park to be used for the facility.

Lisa Molina, whose son skates for Chelsea Hockey Club, is leading the effort to get the rink, which has been dubbed the "Chelsea Area Recreation Facility at Dana Park." In the last three months, Molina has had several meetings with village officials to find out the particulars of what needs to be done to move the rink forward.

"A lot of people have come up and asked 'How can we help you," Molina said. "The community wants this and the kids want this to happen."

The Council gave Molina, and others she is working with, three years to show significant progress in getting the rink funded and built. During those years, the village will reserve a five-acre portion of land donated by Ann Arbor Machine Co. that was designated as recreational-use land.

Now that Molina has the land available for the rink, her next step is to begin raising funds. She did not have an estimate of the rink's cost, but she plans to set up a bank account in the facility's name that will accept all donations to the fund.

Molina is pursuing grant money from Department of Natural Resources and Chelsea Community Foundation. She also plans to do several fund raisers and to approach local organizations, such as Kiwanis and Lions Club.

Molina said the biggest hurdle in getting the land designated was convincing everyone this was a serious effort to bring a skating rink to Chelsea. She said the village is in dire need of this type of facility because the hockey club has to rent time from the rink in Ann Arbor, which is be very difficult becase time is in high-demand there.

In talking with people around Chelsea, Molina has found that many residents have ideas about what should be included in the recreational center. She has heard ideas ranging from indoor tennis courts to indoor tracks.

"Everyone has their own ideas," Molina said. "We almost have to decide what's the most popular. I say let's go ahead and put the ice rink down and add on from there."

Beauchamp, a University of Michigan performing arts graduate, along with composer-musician Patrick Penta, have turned Behen's novel into a stage musical.



A Case of Puppy "Acne

Acne is a common affliction of human adolescents, but of puppies? Well, not exactly. A bacterial infection of a puppy's skin known as pyoderma is sometimes referred to as acne, due to its similar appearance. Pyoderma, however, is actually caused by microorganisms that burrow deep into the skin, often on the abdomen, inner thighs, face, and between the toes. In superficial cases, successful treatment may involve antibiotics and gentle bathing with antiseptic soaps. Care must be taken to avoid letting the condition spread. In deep, more serious cases of pyoderma, lymph nodes may swell, and skin ulcers and deep abscesses may form. EARLY ATTENTION TO THIS CONDITION IS HIGHLY RECOM-


Chelsea continued to move the ball later in the game with the power running of Ryan Houle, allowing Chelsea to dominate the offensive playing time in the game.

"Kiss the Girls"

Movie Review

When it comes to excellence in acting, Morgan Freeman has to be high on any list. He again turns in a superb performance in the tense psychological thriller "Kiss the Girls."

Freeman plays Dr. Alex Cross, a Washington, D.C., police detective and forensic psychologist who becomes embroiled in what appears to be a case involving a potential serial killer.

When Cross' niece appears to be a victim, the crime takes a decidedly personal turn. He travels out of his jurisdiction to Durham, N.C., and encounters the territorial and prejudicial rivalries of the Old South.

After many dead ends and blind alleys, Cross meets Dr. Kate McTiernan, played superbly by Ashley Judd. McTiernan is the only one who escaped the clutches of "Casanova." She can identify his voice and mannerisms and could add valuable clues.

Cross also comes across FBI agent Kyle Craig, played wonderfully by Jay O. Sanders, and realizes that the case is not just a local phenomena. Cross and McTiernan follow the trail of clues from the Deep South to the West Coast and back, racing against time to find Cross' niece and solve the crime.

"Kiss the Girls" is a taught psychological thriller that goes against the norm in a number of areas. The character of Alex Cross is that of a cop who uses his brains, especially during the climactic conclusion, over his brawn to solve the case.

The character was wellwritten by James Patterson in the original novel and he is well-played by Freeman. The acting of Judd matches Freeman step for step and makes for an engaging association.

We do get the typical red herrings and false leads, including the resolution which, while tied together neatly, creeps up on the audience and then gives the last great thrill of the film.

"Kiss the Girls" director Gary Fleder follows the recent Hollywood dictum that less is more in terms of gratuitous violence and creates a much more terrifying scenario when transferred to the mind of the viewer as opposed to the screen.

The last powerful plus is the tremendous scenery provided by the North Carolina pine forests and the panoramic manner in which its shot. It has beautiful visuals that greatly enhance the story. Grade: B+ Rated: R

Each day a violation of this Ordinance continues to exist constitutes a separate violation.





LAND DIVISION ORDINANCE **ORDINANCE NO. 23**

Adopted: October 14, 1997 - Effective: October 14, 1997

An Ordinance to regulate partitioning or division of parcels or tracts of land, enacted pursuant but not limited to Michigan Public Act 288 of 1967, as amended, Subdivision Control Act. Act 591 of 1996 as amended by Act 87 of 1997, Land Division Acts, and Act 246 of 1945, as amended, the Township General Ordinance statute: to provide a procedure therefore: to repeal any ordinance or provision thereof in conflict herewith; and to prescribe penalties and enforcement remedies for the violation of this ordinance.

TOWNSHIP OF LYNDON COUNTY OF WASHTENAW, STATE OF MICHIGAN **ORDAINS:** SECTION I

TITLE This ordinance shall be known and cited as the Lyndon Township Land Division

PURPOSE The purpose of this ordinance is to carry out the provisions of the State Land Division Act (1967 PA 288, as amended, formerly known as the Subdivision Control Act and Act 591 of 1996 as amended by Act 87 of 1997) to prevent the creation of parcels of property which do not comply with applicable ordinances and said Act, to minimize potential boundary disputes, to maintain orderly development of the community, and otherwise provide for the health, safety and welfare of the residents and property owners of the Township by establishing reasonable standards for prior review and approval of land divisions within the Township.

SECTION III **DEFINITIONS**

For purposes of this ordinance certain terms and words used herein shall have the following meaning:

A. "Applicant" - a natural person, firm, association, partnership, corporation, or combination of any of them that holds an ownership Interest in land whether record-

B. "Divided" or "Division" the partitioning or splitting of a parcel or tract of land by the proprietor thereof or by his or her heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, successors or assigns, for the purpose of sale or lease of more than one year, or of building development that results in one or more parcels of less than 40 acres or the equivalent, and that satisfies the requirements of Sections 108 and 109 of the State Land Division Act.

C. " Exempt split" or " exempt division" the partitioning or splitting of a parcel or tract of land by the proprietor thereof, or by his or her heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, successors or assigns, that does not result in one or more parcels of less than 40 acres or the equivalent; provided all resulting parcels are accessible for vehicular travel and utilities from existing public roads through existing adequate roads or easements, or through areas owned by the owner of the parcel that can provide such access.

D. "Forty acres or the equivalent" - either 40 acres, a quarter-quarter section containing not less than 30 acres, or a government lot containing not less than 30 acres.

E. "Governing body" - the Lyndon Township Board.

F. "Designated official" the Lyndon Township Supervisor. G. "Wetlands" - Lands characterized by the presence of water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and that under normal circumstances support wetland vegetation or aquatic life and are commonly referred to as bogs, swamps, marshes,

and wet meadows: H. "Regulated Wetlands Activities" regulated activities in any wetland area within the Township without a permit from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) and/or Washtenaw County for regulated wetlands or a review and approval by the Township at the time of issuing a land division permit under this Ordinance for non-regulated wetlands. A wetland is a "regulated wetland" if it is regulated by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and/or Washtenaw

County. Regulated activities in a wetland include, but are not limited to: H.1 Depositing or permitting the depositing of any material including but not limited to hazardous chemicals, non-biodegradable aquatic pesticides and herbicides,

H. 2 Dredging, removing, or permitting the dredging or removal of material or min-H. 3 Erecting or building any structure including but not limited to buildings, road-

ways, bridges of any type, tennis courts, paving, utility, or private poles, or towers. H. 4 Constructing, operating or maintaining any land use or development. H. 5 Constructing, placing, enlarging, extending, or removing any temporary, seasonal, or permanent operation or structure upon wetlands, except seasonal

docks, rafts, diving platforms, and other water recreational devices. H. 6 Constructing, extending, enlarging, or connecting any conduit, pipe, culvert, or open or closed drainage facility carrying storm water runoff from any site, within a wetlands area, or any other land use permitting discharge of silt, sediment, organic or inorganic material, chemicals, fertilizers, flammable liquids, or other polluting substances except in accordance with requirements of County, State, Federal agen-

cies, and the Township. G. "Flood plain" - the area of lands designated by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, the Department of Housing and Urban Affairs, and/or the United States Geodesic Survey datum as being within a 100-year flood plain. SECTION IV

PRIOR APPROVAL REQUIREMENT FOR LAND DIVISIONS

Land in the Township shall not be divided without the prior review and approval of the official designated by the governing body, in accordance with this ordinance and the State Land Division Act; provided that the following shall be exempted from this

A. An parcel proposed for subdivision through a recorded plat pursuant to the Township's Subdivision Control Ordinance and the State Land Division Act. B. A lot in a recorded plat proposed to be divided in accordance with the Township's Subdivision Control Ordinance and the State Land Division Act. C. An exempt spllt as defined in this Ordinance.

SECTION V APPLICATION FOR LAND DIVISION APPROVAL

An applicant shall file all of the following with the designated official for review and approval of a proposed land division before making any division either by deed, land contract, lease for more than one year, or for building development: A. A completed application form on such form as may be provided by the

B. Proof of fee ownership of the land proposed to be divided

C. Four copies of an original survey map, with original stamp and signature, of the land proposed to be divided, prepared pursuant to the survey map requirements of 1970 Public Act 132, as amended, (MCL 54.211) by a land surveyor licensed by the State of Michigan, and showing the dimensions and legal descriptions of the existing parcel and the parcels proposed to be created by the division(s), the location of all existing structures and other land improvements, the accessibility of the parcels for vehicular traffic and utilities from existing public roads, wetlands, any existing or proposed regulated wetland activities, and flood plains.

In lieu of such survey map, at the applicant 's option, the applicant may waive the 45 day statutory requirement for a decision on the application until such survey map and legal description are filed with the Township, and submit four copies, a tentative preliminary parcel map drawn to scale of not less than that provided for on the application from including an accurate legal description of the parent parcel or parent tract, and showing the boundary lines, dimensions area and the accessibility of each division from existing or proposed public roads for automobile traffic and public utilities, for preliminary review, approval, and/or denial by the locally designated official prior to a final application under Section V.

D. Proof that all standards of the State Land Division Act and this Ordinance have been met. (See checklist accompanying this ordinance).

E. The history and specifications of any previous divisions of land of which the proposed division was a part sufficient to establish the parcel to be divided was lawfully in existence as of March 31, 1997, January 22, 1997, or whichever is the earliest effective date of the State Land Division Act. F. Proof that all due and payable taxes or installments of special assessments per-

taining to the land proposed to be divided are paid in full. G. If transfer of division rights are proposed in the land transfer, detailed informa-

tion about the terms and availability of the proposed division rights transfer. H. All divisions shall result in "buildable" parcels containing sufficient " buildable" area outside of unbuildable wetlands, flood plains and other areas where buildings are prohibited therefrom, and with sufficient area to comply with all required setback provisions, minimum floor areas, off-street parking spaces, on-site sewage disposal and water well locations (where public water and sewer service is not available), and maximum allowed area coverage of buildings and structures on the site.

I. The fee as may from time to time be established by resolution of the governing body of the Township for land division reviews pursuant to this ordinance to cover the costs of review of the application and administration of this Ordinance and the State Land Division Act.

J. Designate the existing zoning district of the parcels in the application and of each adjoining parcel.

> PROCEDURE FOR REVIEW OF APPLICATIONS FOR LAND DIVISION APPROVAL

A. Upon receipt of a land division application package, the designated official shall approve, approve with reasonable conditions to assure compliance with applicable ordinances and the Protection of public health, safety and general welfare, or disapprove the land division applied for within 45 days after receipt of the application package conforming to this Ordinance's requirements, and shall promptly notify the applicant of the decisions and the reasons for any denial. If the application package does not conform to this Ordinance requirements and the State Land Division Act, the designated official shall return the same to the applicant for completion and refiling in accordance with this Ordinance and the State Land Division Act. The designated official shall provide the applicant written notice whether the application is approved, conditional approved, or disapproved, and, if disapproved

or conditionally approved, all the reasons for the disapproval or conditional approval. B. Any person or entity aggrieved by the decision of the designated official may, within 30 days of said decision appeal the decision to the Township Zoning Board of Appeals which shall consider and resolve such appeal by a majority vote of said Board at its next meeting or session affording sufficient time for a 20 day written notice to the applicant (and appellant where other than the applicant) of the time and date of said meeting and appellate hearing. The Zoning Board of Appeals shall obtain written reports from the Township Engineer and Township Planner and others if they deem appropriate for its use in deciding the appeal. The decision of the designated official is final, unless appealed to the Zoning Board of Appeals. The Zoning Board of Appeals shall review the decision and grant relief if it finds that the decision is arbitrary or capricious, an erroneous application of law, or an unreason-

able exercise of discretion. The Zoning Board of Appeals shall have the power and duty to waive or relax the provisions of this Ordinance in specific cases. To this end, the Board of Appeals may grant appeals, which will not be contrary to the public interest where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance would result in unnecessary hardship or practical difficulty. A appeal shall not be granted unless all the following standards are met: 1. Special conditions and circumstances exist which are unique to the land, struc-

tures or buildings involved, and are not applicable to other lands, structures or build-

2. The special circumstances and conditions on which the appeal is based do not result from the actions of the applicant:

3. Literal interpretation of this Ordinance would deprive the applicant of rights commonly enjoyed by other property owners under the terms of this Ordinance; 4. Granting the appeal will not confer upon the applicant any special privilege that

is denied by this Ordinance to other lands: 5. The existence of nonconforming parcels or nonconforming uses of parcels. structures, or buildings under the Township's Zoning Ordinances or other regulato-

ry ordinances shall not be considered grounds for the issuance of a appeal. 6. A appeal granting a waiver or variance of the ordinance shall be the minimum variance that will make possible a reasonable division of land in accordance with law and not otherwise detrimental to the public interest.

C. A decision approving a land division is effective for 180 days, from date of approval by the designated official, or if appealed to the Zoning Board of Appeals 180 days from the Zoning Board of Appeals decision.

D. The designated official or township clerk shall maintain an official record of all approved and accomplished land divisions or transfers.

E. All deeds and other instruments of conveyance and surveys for all approved land divisions must be submitted to the designated official for review prior to recording. The designated official shall mark the date of approval of the land division on the deeds, instruments, and surveys, attesting to their conformity to the approved divisions. Copies of the approved documents shall be retained by the designated

SECTION VII

STANDARDS FOR APPROVAL OF LAND DIVISIONS

A proposed land division shall be approved if the following criteria are met: A. All the parcels to be created by the proposed land division(s) fully comply with the applicable lot (parcel), yard and area requirements of the applicable zoning ordinance, including, but not limited to, minimum lot (parcel) frontage/width, minimum road frontage, minimum lot (parcel) area, minimum lot width to depth ration, and maximum lot (parcel) coverage and minimum setbacks for existing buildings/ struc-

B. The proposed land division(s) comply with all requirements of the State Land

Division Act and this Ordinance. C. Proof of approval by the Washtenaw County Road Commission of a driveway permit for each lot to be created by the proposed land division.

D. Proof of a wetland permit issued by MDEQ or Washtenaw County shall be provided for any proposed land division that involves, uses, includes, or impacts a regulated wetland or for any regulated wetlands activity.

E. The required minimum lot area of each parcel to be created, such area to be contiguous and equivalent to the applicable zoning ordinance, shall be outside the boundary of any wetland, whether or not regulated. The boundaries of wetlands shall be determined by reference to the Lyndon Township Wetland survey. F. The ratio of depth to width of any parcel created by the division does not exceed

a four to one ratio exclusive of access roads, easements, or non-buildable parcels created under Section VIII of this ordinance and parcels added to contiguous parcels that result in all involved parcels complying with said ratio. G. All parcels created by a land division shall comply with a minimum road frontage, approvals, design, length, and construction standards of the Township Road

Ordinance.

SECTION VIII

EFFECT OF APPROVAL OF LAND DIVISIONS The designated official shall maintain a record of all land divisions approved in the Township. An approval of a land division shall be in effect for not more than 180 days after such approval by the designated official or, if approved on appeal, by the Zoning Board of Appeals, unless within such 180 day period, a deed, other instrument of conveyance, or survey, with the designated official's mark of approval affixed thereto, accurately describing the resulting parcel(s) other than the parent parcel or tract retained by the applicant, is recorded in the office of the Washtenaw County Register of Deeds and a true copy thereof, showing proof of such recording, filed with the designated official 10 days thereafter. Such survey shall comply with the requirements of Public Act 132 of 1970, as amended, if the above recording is not done, within the 180 day period, such land division approval is void and revoked without further notice.

VIOLATIONS

SECTION IX

Any parcel created in noncompliance with this ordinance shall not be eligible for any building permits, or zoning approvals, such as special land use approval or site plan approval, and shall not be recognized as a separate parcel on the assessment roll. In addition, violation of this ordinance shall subject the violator to the penalties and enforcement actions set forth in Section X of this ordinance, and as may otherwise be provided by law.

SECTION X

PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed quilty of a civil infraction. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall also be sub-

ject to a civil action seeking invalidation of the land division and appropriate injunc-A. For violation of the provisions of this Ordinance governing the division of land,

including the failure to obtain a permit \$1,000.00 for each parcel sold. B. For violation of all provisions of this Ordinance, the violator shall pay costs, which shall include all direct or indirect expenses, including attorney fees reasonably and actually incurred, engineering fees and costs, Board members', assessor's, and other administrative salaries and costs, to which the Township has been put in connection with the violation. A violator of this Ordinance shall also be subject to such additional sanctions, remedies, and judicial orders as are authorized under Michigan law. Each day a violation of this Ordinance continues to exist constitutes a separate

> SECTION XI. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and if any clause, sentence, word, section or provision is declared void or unenforceable for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any portion of this ordinance other than said part or portion thereof.

SECTION XII REPEAL

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed, including the prior Township Land Division Ordinance, Lyndon Township Ordinance No. 20, except that this Ordinance shall not be construed to repeal any provision in the Township Zoning Ordinance, the Township Subdivision Control Ordinance, or the Township Building Code.
SECTION XIII

FEES AND DEPOSITS FOR COSTS

The Township Board from time to time shall by resolution set fees and deposits for costs to be paid by land owners and applicants for land divisions, review and permits under this Ordinance. The applicant shall pay all review costs incurred by the Township, including planning consultants, engineers and attorneys, according to schedules determined by the Township Board, by deposit made at the time of application for a permit. The Clerk shall pay from the deposit all costs incurred by the Township to review the application, including all legal, engineering, planning and other Township consultants, whose services and charges are reasonable and necessary to the review and any appeal. If the amount on deposit is less than the required minimum deposit at any time, the applicant shall promptly deposit additional sums to increase the deposit to the minimum at the request of the Clerk. After a decision on an application for the permit is made and any final appeal decided, the Clerk shall refund the balance of the deposit to the applicant. The deposits herein provided shall be in addition to other costs provided by law, and may be modified from time to time by resolution of the Lyndon Township Board.

SECTION XIV EFFECTIVE DATE This ordinance shall have immediate effect.

They say you can't get something for nothing, and I believe that to be true, for the most part.

However, once we got on the Internet, I found out that you can get things for free. Most of it is fun stuff, too.

The first thing I "took" from a website was a wallpaper for my computer's background. These are innumerable, and creators of Web sites encourage you to take them. It seems that, for the most part, the Internet is filled with people who are generous with their creations and very friendly with their responses to e-mails you write to thank them.

Other things we've gotten and enjoyed are screensavers, desktop themes, games, and even software.

The screensavers range from simple to complex, including 3-D — and from silly (Holyear vs. Teethson, a takeoff on the Holyfield/Tyson fight) to serene (waterfalls or tropical fish). Some have proven to be mildly amusing but soon wore out their welcome on my screen. They are easily deleted and replaced.

The best screensaver we've gotten, to date, is the Kaleidoscope. However, this one is considered shareware instead of freeware. In case you don't know the difference, like I didn't at first, freeware is exactly what the name implies it's free, with no strings attached.

Shareware is usually available with some sort of limitation; either being incomplete, or on a timer which renders the program unusable after a certain date. (Only after you have registered and made payment to the creator are you able to get the full version.)

The desktop themes are a little more complex, but vary from creator to creator. Some run the entire gamut of items included: wallpaper, screen-saver, icons, cursors (for right-handed and left-handed users), sounds and Web site-bookmarks, all pertaining to a common theme (ie: the movie, Braveheart.

Others have only selected components. Most don't require too many bytes of space, so it's possible to download several of these, depending on vour computer's hardware.

Downloadable games also can be simple or complex and usually require quite a bit more space. Many are demos; some are online only (downloading only the necessary tools to allow you to participate online), and you will find shareware mixed in with freeware.

My favorite software obtained from the Internet is Paint Shop Pro. This program lets you apply filters and manipulate photos you've scanned into your computer. It also allows you to save the changed photo into different formats (bmp, jpg, gif, etc.). I was referred to the site for obtaining Paint Shop Pro by a guy who was trying to help me upload photos to my Web site (See what I mean by "friendly?)" I was even able to enhance a photo to make it more viewable — taking out the shadows and brightening

the colors.

Of course, there are dangers in downloading things from the Internet, and I'll have an entire column devoted to. my horrible experience to share with you.
