Designs on the future . . .

... with an eye on the past

Riemenschneider's vision of library unique to Chelsea

To best understand the design, it's best to understand the designer.

Walking around the sparkling new McKune Memorial Library in downtown Chelsea one is overcome with the feeling of being at home. The sections and hallways and foyers beam with light as the sunshine peers in through large windows to the right, to the left and from above.

The colors and textures and styles inside this new crowning jewel were selected for a reason: to reflect the community that the library now helps represent. And few people know "our" community better than the designer selected to turn a building into Chelsea's library.

Standing in what once was the entrance way to the home of Catherine McKune, Alyce Riemenschneider points above the door and circles around the room pointing to quotes painted along the walls of this historic Chelsea landmark. "These are quotes from the family," she says. "This used to be a home, their home, and I want people to remember that."

Their home is now Chelsea's home. And as the library's designer, Riemenschneider wanted to maintain that feeling throughout the two floors and more than 18,000 square feet. Creating a functional library that felt like a home and reflected a vast and ever-changing community wasn't going to be easy. But Riemenschneider had all the credentials - and then some.

While Riemenschneider's driver's license says she lives in Brighton, her heart still resides in Chelsea.



OT for roads plowed under

 The Washtenaw County Road Commission is hoping that Mother Nature will stick to a schedule this coming winter.

Recent adjustments and budget cuts have eliminated overtime snow plowing for local and subdivision roads throughout the county. The cut in service was approved, along with a number of other cuts, last month by road commission officials.

Road Commission Director Steve Puuri said snow plowing of local roads will take

place during the normal working hours of the road commission maintenance and repair department. But, if heavy snow descends after 5 p.m., or on a weekend day, then there will be no plowing service unless it's an emergency.

"For years we've been transferring money away from maintenance and repair of primary roads to fund the local road program," Puuri said. "What we are trying to do is shift focus to primary roads that have

Deck dispute proves costly, teaches expensive lesson

 A home-improvement project presents enough headaches even when there are no glitches, but a real nightmare can occur if a homeowner fails to get the proper approvals for the project.

Chelsea's top zoning officer said it is always best to purchase or at least study a copy of a community's ordinances and zoning regulations long before putting shovel to ground or hammer to wall.

"That's why we have people pull permits, so these things can be checked out and they don't run into trouble," said James Drolett, Chelsea zoning and permit administrator.

learned that lesson the hard way last year when Drolett ordered him to tear out a stone deck that a contractor had installed behind his house on Chantilly Lane.

A dispute over who should pay for the work led to a lawsuit between Ratliff and the contractor, Arbor Green Landscaping of Ypsilanti, which resulted in a judgment of more than \$18,000 in Ratliff's favor.

"If you follow the rules you're all right, but if you don't you get screwed up like I did," Ratliff said. "Everything turned out all right, but it took about a year."

Even so, Ratliff had no complaints about Arbor Green's stonework, which



An article in the Nov. 30 edition of The Chelsea Standard should have stated that a 2 percent cost of living increase in the city of Chelsea's employee pension fund would cost the city \$60,265 if paid into the system immediately, but \$142,890.10 if paid over a 22-year period; in either case it would add to the existing estimated \$3.1 million unfunded liability in the pension fund.

McKune opening pays tribute to those who made it all possible

The McKune Memorial Library hosted an Open House and ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the grand opening of Chelsea's new library.

"It really was a wonderful day and the speeches were great. They really summed everything up," said Shawn Personke, community relations and development coordinator.

Special guests included Chelsea Mayor Ann Feeney and State Rep. Pam Byrnes.

The following is a speech made during Saturday's celebration by Library Director Cathy Russ:

Ladies and gentlemen, welcome to your new library! I think I can speak for all of us when I say that I can't believe that this day is finally here. The McKune Memorial Library is open and it is wonderful.

As I have welcomed people over the last three weeks, I have been overwhelmed by the emotions that have been expressed. I have heard children saying "awesome" in a tone of wonder before they even reach the front door. I have heard parents tell me stories of teenagers who haven't used the library in years coming here to study. I have had adults express to me — with tears in their eyes — that that they cannot believe the care and detail shown to this library, and how

proud they are to live in this community because of that very attention to detail.

They have said, in short, that any community that values its library so much is a place where they feel honored to live.

All of these wonderful compliments illustrate to me the idea the unique role that the public library can play in a community. The library is, and I hope will always be, the place to go to check out a good book. But it is also so much more than that. The library is a place to learn, to grow, to rest (by the fireplace), to dream. It is a place to challenge old assumptions, to consider new ideas, and to open your mind to new possibilities. It is a place to meet old friends and to make new ones. With resources available in print,

media, through the Internet and through the interaction between the library staff and the library community, the public library, in some ways, really is the unique institution that can be all things to all people.

Without giving up its traditional role, the McKune Memorial Library is a community center for this vibrant area. I hope that all of you will embrace this idea, and "meet me at McKune," as our new saying goes. The remarks of (Saturday) afternoon would not be complete without acknowledging three more contributors. I would like to point out to you the two bookcases, to the right and left of these doors, which will house the Christy Gutekunst Memorial Collection, a collection of signed books by Michigan authors. Christy was a treasured member of the

library staff, and we are so pleased to have the opportunity to honor her memory in such a way in this beautiful room.

I also want to acknowledge the contributions of the library staff. I would not be able to stand in front of you today if it were not for the efforts of the library staff. Their dedication to this library and to the excellent customer service they provide shines through in every transaction. They truly care about their library and the people who use it.

Finally, while we have acknowledged the contributions of many individuals and groups here today, I would like to take a moment and acknowledge the contribution of the people of Dexter Township, Lima Township, Lyndon Township, Sylvan Township and the city of Chelsea. There are a lot of people here today listening to this speech, in this room, and in other places around the library. But many people could not be here today. This library belongs to the entire community, and I hope that everyone will use it and love it. It is YOUR library.

I will close these remarks with the words spoken to me by a 10-year-old boy yesterday. I asked him what he thought of the library and he told me "it's the best library I've ever seen." And it is.

Chelsea City Council notes

City to save money on electric power

Electricity and pools don't usually go well together, but the city of Chelsea should benefit from a pool of electric-power suppliers and buying excess power at more than 37 percent savings.

Chelsea Electric Department Superintendent Andy Johnston told the city council Nov. 14 that the

city's bulk power supplier, Michigan South Central Power Agency, is now selling surplus electric transmission for \$1,080 per megawatt, a substantial discount from the \$1,729 per megawatt the city pays the agency under its bulk purchase contract.

"We got into this pool to purchase excess electricity

at a lower price," Johnston said, and the council voted to authorize him to make the purchases.

City Manager Mike Steklac said locking in a lower price on such a volatile commodity was a sound decision and could offset future rate increases until the city signs a new bulk power contract in 2011.

Council OKs agreements

The Chelsea City Council approved employment contracts with two key department heads at its Nov. 14 meeting. Newly appointed Public Works Superintendent Craig Maier received a one-year agreement, which went into effect Nov. 6.

"The employment agree-

ment has been established for a one-year term in order to allow time to evaluate (Maier) in the position," Steklac said.

Water Superintendent Rob Jones received a three-year contract, retroactive to March 7 of this year, until March 6, 2009. Both contracts are "substantially similar" to each other, Steklac added.

was 16 feet, 19 feet deep and 2 feet high, with a chair-height wall around edges and steps off both sides.

Drolett's main objections were that the deck was too close to the lot setbacks and that the contractor had failed to apply for and obtain the proper permits before starting work.

Construction started in November 2005, but Drolett issued a demolition order in December. Legal proceedings began in late January, and the case was settled in October.

"It was all because (Arbor Green) didn't get a zoning permit or a building permit," Ratliff said.

Both Drolett and Arbor Green co-owner Craig LaFlair said interpretation of the ordinance was at the heart of the dispute. "It was all based on an inaccurate definition of what we put in," LaFlair said. "It was not a deck, it's a patio; it's not attached to the house."

"(Drolett) called it a paver deck, and that's how he could say it was a deck and it had to come out," LaFlair added. "The city's bylaws and definitions don't put it that way."

Drolett saw it differently. "The definitions are clearly stated: a structure is anything constructed and placed permanently in the ground, and needs a permit," Drolett said. "A patio is like a driveway in that sense; it doesn't need a permit."

LaFlair said this was the first time his company has encountered such opposition to a project. "We've been in business for 20 years and Chelsea is the only place this has happened," LaFlair said.

Drolett said the rules can vary in a planned unit development such as the subdivision in which Ratliff lives.

"A lot of this was a misunderstanding," Drolett said. "The city has zoning ordinances and the subdivision also has its own regulations, and sometimes city ordinances allow things the subdivision doesn't."

The case went to court because Arbor Green had to remove the stonework at its

own expense but wanted Ratliff to pay for the original installation.

"It cost us a ton of money, about \$40,000," LaFlair said. "We will not admit any wrongdoing because I feel we did nothing wrong. We've done work in Chelsea since then and we have the homeowner check everything."

That is the wisest course of action, since the homeowner ultimately is held responsible for making sure the zoning and permit process is followed correctly.

Drolett said he was doing his duty as an ordinance enforcement official.

"This is the tough part of the job, because you're dealing with private-property rights," Drolett said. "We've got ordinances and I've got to enforce them. It's a balancing act and you have to make sure you treat people fairly."

Ratliff said he is glad the situation is resolved, so he and his wife can go back to enjoying retirement.

"The moral of the story is, if everybody gets the necessary permits there's no problems," Ratliff said.

Ex-boyfriend arrested

At 1:44 a.m. on Nov. 11 Chelsea police responded to a report of a break-in in progress at a residence in the 300 block of Congdon Street.

When they arrived, the 20-year-old female resident reported that her ex-boyfriend had been outside the house banging on the doors and windows, and heard someone enter her home through a locked door and bedroom when she tried to hide.

The suspect left the residence when the woman told him to, and told police she wanted to press charges against the man. Police found the suspect, a 22-year-old Chelsea man, at his home on Grant Street and arrested him for unlawful entry.

According to a police report, the man told police he had no idea how the door to the woman's home came open and got damaged, but figured it was OK to enter because they had dated a few times.

Juvenile assault reported

A Belleville woman reported to Chelsea police at 8:13 p.m. Nov. 9 that her 14-year-old son who lives in Chelsea told her he had been assaulted at 4:15 p.m. by his uncle, a 39-year-old Chelsea man.

The boy had argued with a grandmother earlier and refused to go to work that day, so his uncle came over to get him to go. The uncle called the boy's grandfather and the boy reached for the phone several times to speak to him, but the uncle would pull it away each time.

The boy and the man argued, and according to a police report the man kicked the boy in the legs twice, grabbed him and ripped his shirt, pulled his hair and stuck him in the back of the head.

The Chelsea officer who responded to the home said the uncle could not be arrested for domestic violence because he did not live with the boy. The mother did not want to press charges for assault but wanted police to

"have a talk" with the uncle, according to a police report.

Expired license

While on patrol at 12:50 a.m. Nov. 12 a Chelsea police officer began following a black 1987 Pontiac northbound on North Main Street after radar indicated it was traveling at 52 mph in a 45-mph zone, and made a traffic stop south of Werkner Road.

The driver, a 29-year-old man from Pikeville, Ky., could not produce his vehicle registration or proof of insurance, and his driver's license had expired on Nov. 5.

The man said he and his passenger, a 24-year-old woman from Royaltown, Ky., had been in Michigan for about three weeks and planned to return to Kentucky the following week.

The officer destroyed the man's expired license after confirming that the woman had a valid driver's license, and advised the man how to settle the misdemeanor traffic citation.

Special Investigations Unit crucial to DNR

The recent case that culminated in a major bust of an illegal commercial use of the state's resources in the Upper Peninsula began simply enough. A person noticed something unusual and instead of letting it go, he reported it to the DNR's Report All Poaching hotline. A few days later, arrests were the result.

But, in between the first whisper of the illegal activity taking place on a U.P. river and the arrests, which took place at the Mackinac Bridge, the DNR's Law Enforcement Division utilized a very sophisticated and well-practiced approach to ensure the evidence was solid and all legal hurdles were successfully cleared.

Most conservation officers are those men and women in green that we often see in Michigan's woods, fields and on the water. Behind the scenes, however, is a specialized and highly trained unit of detectives who are often utilized when it comes to investigations that involve the commercial use of the state's resources.

"It is an outstanding example of one of the reasons we train as we do at the (officer) academy," said LED Captain Curt Bacon. "It works."

Officer recruits are trained diligently in how to handle a so-called takedown that occurred earlier this month in Mackinac County. Their training paid off. Lt. Dave Davis oversees the DNR's Special Investigation unit and the Commercial Fish Enforcement unit. Both focus on commercialization of fish and game.

"These special units have been around since the 1980s," Davis said, "and they are available for our field officers to access any time. We think of the officers in these units as specialists focusing on very specific natural resource law enforcement issues."

A conservation officer in Mackinac County was the first to be given information that a tip had been called in to the RAP hotline. According to the tip, a large scale harvest of salmon by unlawful means on a closed stream was taking place that also included the sale of large quantities of these fish. However, because of the area involved, local COs initially were skeptical of the information. But a couple of officers from other counties were contacted, and, in an undercover capacity, quickly infiltrated the salmon-taking operation, confirming the validity of the complaint.

The field officers contacted the Special Investigation unit. The detectives, also working undercover, were able to infiltrate the group of poachers, successfully establishing themselves with the perpetrators. There, the detectives learned how the operation was being run and what the plans were to move the illegally taken salmon to market.

Armed with the information, the detectives contacted the area officers, who planned and staged a takedown at the north end of the

Mackinac Bridge as the poachers were trying to head south with their take. Because the detectives had all the critical information and were able to pass that along to the officers, the COs were there, ready and waiting to pull over the truck carrying the salmon and its passengers, arresting the poachers on the spot and confiscating the illegally taken salmon.

The DNR's Special Investigation unit consists of a Staff Sergeant and four detectives who are trained conservation officers who have shown interest and ability to work in a more in-depth investigative capacity.

"Some officers are natural when it comes to being able to infiltrate and get information on illegal operations," Davis said. "These specially trained officers must be great actors, be able to engage people involved in illegal operations to gain their trust, and have excellent listening and communication skills."

The unit's goal is to assist the field personnel, and to bring into the mix advanced communication and technological skills. The detectives also are there to spell off local officers on long-term surveillance.

But in the case of the salmon poaching ring in Mackinac County, no long-term effort was required. Because of precise coordinating, thorough training and excellent execution, two residents of North

Carolina were apprehended while en route to their home state with a load of illegally taken salmon for commercial sale.

The sting operation net-

ted 325 pounds of fish. The central figure in the scheme also was apprehended at his place of business, which was the location for the illegal fishing. The three

defendants face about 16 charges in the case. In addition to the seizure of the fish, the items taken into legal possession included a firearm, spear, net, gaff and a chest freezer used to facilitate the interstate shipment of the fish.

"Field officers always are stretched to the limit because of their workload, the large area each officer has to cover physically, and the concentration of problems that occur," Davis said. "We can provide the shoe leather to make these cases easier to bring to significant resolution."

Davis and his team also train field officers to help out with special projects and temporary investigatory needs. These temporary investigators often form the

pool for future candidates for this important special unit of the DNR.

"I am very proud of the execution of this operation," Marble said, "but I am especially proud that we take the time and effort to integrate the investigative aspect into our operations. It makes us a complete, professional operation, and something Michigan can take great pride in, knowing that we are always there, ready to protect the resource."

And no matter where she hangs her shingle, her home will always be in Chelsea.

"This was our stomping ground growing up," said Riemenschneider, pointing out the giant front window on the second floor of the McKune Memorial Library. "We would cut through the yards that used to be right over there. I was raised in a house and raised my kids in a house within walking distance of this library."

Riemenschneider talks about yesterdays as if they were yesterday, a smile growing with each thought, each memory.

"We used to walk to South School and my mom used to send me through those back yards to make a deposit at the bank," she says, still gazing out the window. We knew who lived in every house and we knew which yards we could cut through, too. I just developed such a special feeling for this town."

It was now her job to develop that feeling and somehow incorporate it into the design for the McKune Library. And while Riemenschneider has designed more than 1 million square feet of library space in her 25-plus years as a designer, it was her "local" knowledge and commitment to incorporate that into her specs that landed her this "dream" job.

"Alyce is nationally known and highly respected in Library interior design," said Lynn Fox, a former trustee and co-chair of the Building Committee. "We visited some of the libraries that she had furnished and were very impressed. She had worked with (project architect) Jim Mumby on various projects and they have worked well together. Secondly, Alyce grew up on Orchard Street and knew the McKune House inside and out. She brought the history of Chelsea into the thoughtful designs for the interiors."

Her love for designing began in her hometown, but it wasn't the Clocktower Building or one of the many old style homes or churches that sparked her interest. In fact, it was quite the opposite.

"I chose this line of work when I saw mundane, strip shopping centers popping up in Chelsea, and felt such disdain for these buildings in contrast to the rich detailing inherent in the buildings downtown," she said. "Life's experiences should be enriched, and our communities and homes should reflect a respect for the process of work, of study, of home life and in all that we do."

The historical trail to where the library now stands is a testament to the people the library has served over the years. It all started in 1932 when the Chelsea Child Study Club opened the first library with a grand total of 22 books. Since that time the library grew, moved, grew and moved again. In 2004, Chelsea residents approved a bond to expand and renovate McKune. Now more than 15,000 residents located in the library district have a special place to read, study, research, explore, learn, grow and relax.

Riemenschneider knew going into this project that it wasn't going to be easy and that it was indeed going to be

I like my job because: "Architecture is the noblest of all art forms - and I hope that my work can improve the quality of life for all that experience it."

My work's biggest challenge is: "To one day, have our concepts completed as conceptualized. So many times, through the construction process, there are great compromises to be made. One day, just one day, I would like to see a purely constructed project based upon our design concepts."

Advice to a young person interested in design: "Do not study just for this line of work. It is necessary to be well rounded...travel, mentally record images, study business as well as the arts, music, dance...the rhythmic aspect is so very important in all that we do."

a challenge on many levels. But when it's a labor of love, challenges are easier to deal with.

"Every single library is different," said

Riemenschneider, who has designed more than 60 libraries and is currently designing the 100,000 square-foot library in Bloomfield Township. "You have to understand the functions of the library as well as public access. Because mostly of technology, the traditional planning has changed. For example, we are reducing the number of books and videos in order to make room for more computers. One of our jobs as designers is to stay abreast of different trends."

In most cases, the library is a centerpiece of the community. A pillar in the town square or meeting place in the village. So it's important to make that local connection.

"Every library is a unique representation of that community," Riemenschneider said. "I design from the inside out in terms of function and have to look from the outside in to see how the two relate."

The designer and architect must also relate. In general terms, the architect designs the outside of the building as well as the basic inside structure, including leaving room for electrical, plumbing, heating, etc. Then the designer takes over and turns the space into a functioning and hopefully appealing library.

"We work closely together," said Riemenschneider, who has worked with architect Jim Mumby of Fanning-Howey on a number of other projects. "They are a national firm that has an office out of Novi. They are great to work with. You always start with a big picture and work down to the small detail and it takes about two years to complete so there is a lot of interaction."

While Mumby was figuring out how the building would sit on the property,

One area Riemenschneider is most proud of is at the top of the stairs on the second floor.

"It's a heavy pivot area that will get a lot of traffic so it didn't make financial sense to put carpet there because it would get worn out too fast," she said. "So we create a one-time cost. I always take into account that we are using public dollars and I take that very seriously."

"The floor itself is a basket weave design, and I created this to mirror the way the lives in Chelsea are so interwoven."

Creating a place for teenagers to study was another important challenge to tackle. And again, this was personal.

"I remember going to the library growing up for things like story time and I really

enjoyed it." Riemenschneider said. "But when we got to high school there was no place to study. And the collection of books was old. It just seemed like the same books were here year after year."

All this is why Riemenschneider gets a special thrill when she reaches the second floor and sees teenagers hard at work in the Chelsea public library.

"We created a room just for them," she said. "There are computers and things just for teenagers."

While Riemenschneider was figuring out where fiction books would go and how the DVDs would be stacked and where to put the computers, she always kept one eye on the front of the building.

Respecting the McKune name and the history of the

home was just as important as what color the carpet would be or how high the shelves would go.

"Every step of the way, I was mindful of honoring the McKune family and wanted to carry out their wishes," she said. "I thought adding quotes from the family on the walls would make the place feel more alive. I asked the family for some quotes so I could create a concept of whispered words on the walls. Their words will be here forever."

There is still work to be done inside the McKune Memorial Library. But overall Riemenschneider is pleased with what she's helped bring to life.

"I think we have created a building that is timeless," she said.

Just like Chelsea.



New trustees draw blanks on new MSU coach

You just knew it was too good to be true. There was the Michigan State University Board of Trustees oozing with unanimity as they joyfully praised the university president for leading MSU back to the football Promised Land.

It was out with the cowboy boots of John L. Smith and in with the championship ring of Mark Dantonio. There were green and white smiles all over the joint.

Except for two faces. Turns out this sports story quietly morphed into a political story. The newest Democratic members of the board were "frozen out" of the process, as one source put it.

Elected in November, trustees-elect George Perles and Faylene Owen never expected to vote on the new coach, but they sent clear signals to MSU President Dr. Lou Anna Simon.

They wanted to be in the loop throughout the decision making process. Even a University of Michigan graduate could figure it out; this was not an outrageous request.

After all the new trustees would have to work with the new coach during their eight years on the board — assuming the coach lasts that long.

The trustees-elect at the front end were asked to submit candidates and

list the traits that a new coach should have. A university source says the input of former football coach Perles was "valuable." But after that, Perles and Owen were left in the locker room.

They did not get the same updates that sitting members of the board received. Suffice it to say neither one was happy.

"I was disappointed I was not contacted," concedes Perles, who might have had a thought or two about the final candidate. Perles knew Dantonio when he was an assistant coach under Nick Saban.

Owen is not commenting on any of this, but it's pretty clear she comes to her new post with, shall we say, a bad taste in her mouth.

One Democrat in town suggests that the soon-to-be ex-GOP chairman of the MSU board may be the bad guy. Not guilty, professes David Porteous. Asked if he tried to block the two Democrats from the process, he asserted, "Of course not."

As long as we are lining up suspects,

Democratic Trustee Joel Ferguson says, "I do not feel that we mistreated them at all." He points out they don't take office until January.

Which brings us to the president, who now has two disgruntled incoming bosses. One insider contends that Simon told Owen "the board did not want me to brief" the new members. One board source says those were the indirect instructions.

Given the sorted history of previous boards playing politics in the selection process, this board wisely got out of the game and directed Simon to do it and keep this search "out of politics and above reproach."

There is universal agreement that for savvy Dr. Simon gets an A-plus, as does the board for stepping back.

But rightly or wrongly some will question her political acumen in not making the incoming trustees feel more part of the team.

As for the new coach, one assumes he knew nothing about all this. He does now.

Welcome to the MSU family — which may not be as unified as some would have you believe.

To the Editor: The Dexter Leader reported in its Nov. 30 edition, that the Scio Township Board will host the Dexter Village Council at a joint meeting Dec. 19 to "share with the public where they are with the Act 425 agreement," according to Mark Ouimet.

Mr. Ouimet has encouraged private meetings between Dexter and Scio in the hope that the two groups could come up with a solution for the development of the Sloan property that would satisfy the Scio master plan's density requirements and allow both groups to share the tax revenue from the developed property. The agreement to allow that sharing is known as an "Act 425 agreement." It is an alternative to annexation. Since the public and the press have not been invited to the "private" meetings that have occurred so far, this upcoming open meeting date will give the public its first opportunity to see if Mr.

Ouimet's plan to avoid having the Washtenaw County Commission, of which he is a member, deal with Dexter's recently requested annexation of the Sloan property.

It is difficult to see how the county commission could approve Dexter's request in light of existing boundary agreements and just hand over the Sloan property now part of Scio Township, to Dexter.

It is obvious that the commissioners want the two governmental entities to exhaust every possibility before they have to deal with Dexter's request.

If the Sloan property becomes a 425 agreement, Dexter and Scio property owners will eventually be paying the shared costs of school taxes. Dexter property owners will be paying for water treatment plant expansion needs necessary to accommodate the Sloan property development known as Harvest Valley.

Have you noticed the cost of your water and

refuse bills lately? And by the way, do you know whose money they are talking about when they talk about shared tax revenue? Dexter and Scio residents will have their first opportunity to see if and how Scio and Dexter officials decide this issue. It appears the upcoming open combined meeting may air solutions that are the results of the previous closed meetings. It may also be the first and only meeting where citizens of both Scio and Dexter can have the opportunity to voice their opinion on this specific issue.

According to the Leader, the combined open meeting is to be held at the Scio Township Hall, Tues. Dec. 19th at 7 p.m. If you are concerned, it would be in your interest to attend.

Our Chelsea History

From 1907 until early 1940, two flag poles were located to fly the American flag at what two Chelsea sites?

- On the roof of the Chelsea Train Depot.
- On top of the Chelsea Clock Tower.
- In the center of Main and Middle streets.
- On the front lawn of the McKune House hotel.

Answers B and C. When Frank P. Glazier constructed the Clock Tower in 1907, counting the 15-foot flag pole placed on the roof of the seven-story Clock Tower building was officially the tallest building in Washtenaw County. Collectible postcards, some from the 1920s, show a flag pole at the intersection of Main and Middle Streets. By 1930s to 40s, automobile traffic on M-52 had steadily increased, until a serious car accident forced the pole to be relocated. Lifetime Chelsea resident attorney John Kousch remembered the flag pole and band entertainment in the center of Main Street. He said, "Saturday evenings and one more evening (Wednesday or Thursday), a portable wood band stand was set up on Main St. for the Chelsea Band to perform." In the first quarter of the 1900s, Kousch's father operated the Kousch & Faurner grocery store once located where Chelsea Village Hardware is today. Cars would come to town early in the afternoon to park along Main Street finding the best spots for listening to the evening band performance.



A winning formula

Coffee cake recipe takes first place in contest

Not many cooks consider a hammer to be a kitchen tool, but it's essential for one of Elsie Heller's old family recipes.

Her "Sour Cream Coffee Cake with Hickory Nuts" calls for Elsie and her husband, Bob, to crack the hard nuts with a hammer to get at the meat inside.

The efforts paid off. Elsie's recipe took first place in the recent Chelsea Cooks! Recipe contest, held by the Chelsea District Library as a "warm up" for its Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibit, "Key Ingredients: America by Food."

Each of six Michigan host sites were asked to provide a local recipe by the Michigan Humanities Council, the organization for which the Smithsonian sets up touring exhibitions, said Shawn Personke, the McKune Memorial Library's community relations and development coordinator.

"MHC will use these recipes statewide," Personke said. "We hope to compile a cookbook featuring these entries and perhaps other Chelsea Fair ribbon winners."

Heller grew up on a dairy farm in Saline where hickory nut trees grew. A staple in the diets of early colonists and Native Americans, the hard-shelled nuts are surrounded by a woody husk. Related to pecans, hickory nuts are smaller and more flavorful.

"Many sunny warm fall afternoons were spent picking up hickory nuts as a child," she wrote in the story that accompanied her contest entry. "In the winter, my father would crack the hickory nuts and we, as a family, would pick out the hickory nut meats in the evenings."

By a happy coincidence,

when Elsie married Bob Heller, whose family has called Chelsea home for generations, the couple's dairy farm boasted several very old hickory nut trees.

"So now for many years we as a family have been picking up hickory nuts, and the rest is history," Elsie wrote.

The family recipe - an award-winner many times over - has been enjoyed by many people, and makes a wonderful holiday gift, she says.

"It's the first thing we all made for 4-H and the Chelsea Fair and it always won honors," says Heller's daughter, Sue Rodgers of Lima Township, who - along with sisters Nancy, Beth and Laurie - inherited mom's recipe. "I can't make it anymore. It keeps flopping."

"It's something mom always makes when we get together. Everyone loves it. It always gets eaten!"

Heller almost wasn't able to make her creation for the contest. The hickory nuts were hard to come by this fall, thanks to squirrels busily picking them up - activities that Bob says indicates a hard winter ahead.

Not all hickory nuts are winners, according to Heller - some have worms. And legend has it that if all the nuts aren't picked up in the fall, next year's crop will be wormy.





the most level of traffic and most wear and tear."

The budget cuts mark another example of municipalities around the state struggling to maintain normal service levels because of a lack of state-shared revenue. Puuri said the state hasn't changed their gas tax revenue rate - the main source of funding for the road commission - since 1997. That rate is set at 19 cents per gallon.

"And that's a flat rate," Puuri said. "We don't get more funding if people are buying more gas like a percentage."

No matter how much revenue the commission is getting back in gas tax, township residents are going to have a problem when they see such a significant drop in service said Ypsilanti Township Supervisor Ruth Ann Jamnick. "And they're going to be calling us," she said.

"People living in subdivisions are going to be very concerned I think. The service that residents have seen in the past hasn't even been on the same day of a snowfall; unless it's a really bad storm. So now, that level of service is going to be even lower which means our phone is going to ringing." Jamnick wants to make it clear to residents that township roads are the road commission's responsibility. The township doesn't do any snow plowing of local roads or residential neighborhoods whatsoever.

"But (residents) are going to think that we're passing the buck when we tell them that it's the road commission's responsibility," Jamnick said. "In those situations, there's never an easy answer."

Puuri said he was aware that townships around the county are taking issue with this recent cut in service. But he is sure that there will be no dan-

ger to public safety as snowplow crews will respond to local streets if the conditions warrant an emergency such as:

- Over three-inches of snow.
- Icy road conditions.
- Snow drifting that blocks local roads.

"But we're not going to come in on a Saturday if it's just routine maintenance," Puuri said. "I would be hard pressed to find somebody who has trouble driving a sedan through three inches, or less."

Jamnick said this is going to be a challenging winter for the township.

"A lot of people moving into the township are coming from smaller areas, places that have DPW's so they're going to be very surprised to see this level of service," she said.

The local road snow plowing was just one of a number of areas road commission officials approved for reductions. In a recent press release, the road commission announced the following adjustments:

- Eliminating free, private-road sign maintenance.
- Requiring 50 percent participation from townships on all local bridge projects effective Jan. 1, 2007.
- Reassigning the tree crew qualified drivers to snow routes.
- Reducing road equipment purchases by 50 percent to approximately \$400,000 per year.
- Reducing the pavement resurfacing program to approximately \$400,000 per year.
- Reducing the Road Commission's reliance on engineering and other consultant contracts.
- Utilizing federal aid for construction engineering wherever possible.
- Imposing a hiring freeze, provided essential services are not compromised.
- Implementing health insurance co-pay adjustments consistent with agreement

Washtenaw County

Officials will pursue agreement

After narrowly avoiding layoffs that would have crippled local police coverage, Ypsilanti Township officials got back to business at their Nov. 21 meeting.

But of course, most of the business was focused on police services.

Board members granted permission to Township Attorney Doug Winters to continue negotiations with the county in the hopes of reaching an interim agreement with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department. Township officials are making efforts to reach a compromise with the county while at the same time being allowed to continue their lawsuit.

Winters said for the first time since the suit was filed almost a year ago, an offer was extended that would allow the township to maintain regular staffing levels, thereby averting layoffs, and keep their legal action against the county at the same time.

"I received that offer for the very first time from the county attorney (Edward Hood) on Nov. 15 which was the deadline day for the layoffs," Winters said.

Winters took issue with a recent statement from County Administrator Bob Guenzel where he said that allowing the townships to continue their legal action "was never an issue with (Guenzel) or the board."

"That was an absolute

untruth," Winters said. "(Guenzel) stated that the township could have signed the contracts at any time. It has to be stated emphatically tonight that is absolutely not true."

As evidence of that, Winters referenced a proposal that was offered to the suing townships of Ypsilanti, Augusta and Salem in July, 2006 that presented two options allowing the townships to sign the 4-year contracts and drop all legal action against the county or continue the lawsuit and sign a month-to-month agreement at a nearly 50 percent increase to cost.

That resolution was approved by the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners after visiting Monroe County Judge Joseph Costello dismissed one part of the townships' lawsuit claiming that the county was in breach of a 2003 master contract that promised six percent rate hikes every year for 10 years. Costello dismissed that claim in April 2006.

Winters and the board also took issue with a recent editorial ran by the Ann Arbor News that chastised the township for pursuing the lawsuit and risking public safety needs. Winters said he has asked for a meeting with the editor and wanted to make it very clear that the editorial was based on misrepresented facts and untruths promoted by the county.

Several audience members also aired complaints about the editorial. Recently elected County Commissioner and former supervisor of Ypsilanti Township Karen Lovejoy-Roe said the Ann Arbor News was trying to make the township board "look like fools."

During the Clerk's Report, Township Clerk Brenda Stumbo requested that the board approve a newsletter that would inform all township residents about the status of police services. She said there has been a lot of inaccurate information in the news and she felt it would serve a great need to the public in order to set the record straight.

Trustee Jean Hall-Currie took issue with Stumbo's request for newsletter. She said the township shouldn't be spending money on letters containing information that has been steadily covered by local newspapers.

"We're trying to save money here," Currie said.

Stumbo said there are funds left over from another budget item that are readily available for use. She also made the point that not everybody in the township reads the paper and they need to be informed as to what's going on with public safety.

"This is a big issue," Stumbo said.

Supervisor Ruth Ann Jamnick suggested tabling the

newsletter so they can all get together on the language of the letter. She said they should bring it back to the next board meeting.

Stumbo said they will be bringing the issue back to the next meeting anyway, board members still need a chance

to review the letter. Stumbo added that Public Safety Director Mike Radzik will be writing up the information for print.

After some further discussion, the board approved the newsletter in a 4-3 vote.



Helmuth area's top offensive player

Coming into this season, Saline running back and future Michigan Wolverine Vince Helmuth was seen as one of the most talented players in the area and a key to Saline's 2006 success.

During this season, Helmuth did nothing to change that viewpoint. The senior rushed for 1,536 yards and 21 touchdowns, averaging 6.6 yards a carry and 128 yards a game, in leading Saline to its deepest playoff run in school history and a 9-3 record.

Which is why, after the season, Helmuth has been named Heritage Newspapers-West 2006 Offensive Player of the Year.


According to Helmuth, however, his success was as much — if not more — a result of the Hornet offense clicking as a whole than his own individual talent.

"It's just a product of the team getting better," he said. "We weren't a one-dimensional team. Our line blocked great and I benefitted from all our other threats."

Many opposing coaches would argue, though, that Helmuth was the Hornets' biggest threat of all. The 6-foot-2, 240-pound back started the season with a bang by rushing for 111 yards and a touchdown on 24 carries in a 31-21 win over Flint Carman-Ainsworth.

He rarely let up after that, carrying 20 or more times or gaining 100 or more yards in five more regular season games. Those included a 119-yard performance against Tecumseh on only nine carries and a 23-carry, 279-yard, four-touchdown explosion against Dexter.

But Helmuth saved his best for last, rushing for a combined 392 yards in playoff wins over Battle Creek Central and rival Ann Arbor Pioneer, the latter giving Saline its first ever district championship. Helmuth finished the postseason having scored eight touchdowns and

averaged 6.9 yards on 59 carries.

"I had a really good off-season, worked out and got faster and stronger," Helmuth said of his end-of-season push. "I was in better shape. And, as the season went on, we were able to get better week by week."

Still, Helmuth said his postseason scoring success was a product of simply having his number called in the

red zone and gave his senior-dominated offensive line all the credit.

Helmuth's season carrying the ball was even more impressive considering he played full-time as the team's starting outside linebacker, totaling 65 tackles, five sacks and two interceptions on the season.

For his efforts, the Associated Press named Helmuth first-team All-State

in Class A.

Helmuth was the first player in his recruiting class to sign with U of M, where he is expected to line up as a full-back. He has chosen to pursue early enrollment at Michigan so he could go through spring drills and get a head-start on learning his new position.

"The biggest thing will be adjusting to the speed of the game," he said.

TODD ELLIOT
CHELSEA

DL-6-3, 215 - A first-team All-Southeastern Conference White Division selection, Elliott, who runs a 4.9 40-yard dash, bench presses 285 pounds and squats 460 pounds, was one of the area's fiercest pass rushers from his defensive end position this season. The senior finished the year with 27.5 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. "He's a tough, physical player," said Chelsea coach Brad Bush. "With his size, he's difficult to block. He pressured and rushed the passer all season. He's the complete package."

BRIAN FLAHIE
MANCHESTER

DL-6-1, 245 - Despite being double-teamed most of the season, Flahie, a first-team Division 6 All-State pick by the Detroit Free Press and an Associated Press Class C All-State selection, still managed 58 tackles and five sacks this year. "He is a super young man," said Manchester coach Wes Gall. "He's done a tremendous job for us. He's an excellent technician. He's a vocal leader who plays with great intensity." A bull-rusher from his defensive tackle position, Flahie overpowered opponents with his strength and quickness. Bench pressing 360 pounds and squatting 495 pounds, Flahie, a three-year varsity player, is being recruited by Western Michigan University and Grand Valley State University.

JUSTIN FUGATE
MILAN

DL-6-5, 245 - An imposing figure on the defensive line, Fugate spent a lot of his time in the backfield of opponents this season. The senior first-team Division 4 All-State selection and first-team All-Huron League pick ended the year with 52 tackles, seven tackles for losses, three quarterback sacks and five passes batted down. Fugate's numbers could have been higher, but most teams ran away from the aggressive and physical lineman. "He was a force out there," said Milan coach Steve Robb.

Hard-hitting Von Broda seeks out runners

Most high school football players dream of scoring touchdowns. They yearn to make the big catch or the flashy interception return for a score.


While all of those scenarios are fine and dandy, Manchester's Derrick Von Broda, however, has other ideas when he tightens his chin strap and digs in at his linebacker position.

"I love knocking people around," said Von Broda, a 6-foot, 200-pound sledge hammer on the football field. "I like getting one good, clean, solid hit. I love taking a guy's legs out from under him."

This past season Von Broda hit opposing players better and with more frequency than any other defender in the area. For that reason and more, he was selected Heritage Newspapers-West football Defensive Player of the Year.

"He could play on Saturdays," said Manchester coach Wes Gall about Von Broda, who said he was still undecided upon a college, but that he'd like to play for Western Michigan University, Eastern Michigan University or Grand Valley State University. "He has a tremendous work ethic. He has prepared himself in the weight room. It will be hard to replace him."

Von Broda led the Flying

Dutchmen this season with 78 tackles, four sacks, seven tackles for loss, three fumble recoveries, three fumbles caused and one interception. He was the linchpin of a stingy defense that surrendered only 128 points in 10 games this year. Forty-three of those points occurred in the fourth quarter when Manchester, 8-2 overall this year and ranked as high as No. 3 in the state in Division 6, emptied its bench during blowout victories.

Von Broda, who runs a 4.8 40-yard dash, bench presses 275 pounds and squats 450 pounds, said the keys to playing linebacker are being athletic and having strong football instincts.

"You have to have a nose for the ball," he said. "You have to be aggressive and able to take a hit. You have to drive your feet, move your feet. You have to use your quickness. I love blitzing."

Von Broda, who was selected Class C All-State honorable mention by the Associated Press and first-team All-Cascade Conference, played his best against top competition. In fact, his most memorable moment as a Manchester griddier came against Cascade Conference rival Grass Lake, the eventual Division 7 state runner-up.

"That was a fun game," Von Broda said of the Flying Dutchmen's 28-21 win. "I had

the most tackles for losses in that game and I had two sacks and a fumble recovery."

It should come as no surprise that a player who dreams of de-cleating an opposing ball carrier, says Green Bay Packer first round draft pick and former Ohio State All-American linebacker A.J. Hawk is his favorite player.

"He's a caveman-looking beast," Von Broda said of Hawk. "He's so aggressive. He gives 110-percent every play."

As a defensive back, Benjamin, a first-team All-Southeastern Conference White Division pick who runs a 4.7 40-yard dash, was just as much of a game-changer, leading the Dreadnaughts with three interceptions and 18 tackles. He also returned a fumble 97 yards for a score this year. The return yardage is a Dexter school record. Eastern Michigan University, Central Michigan University and Grand Valley State University are among the schools recruiting Benjamin.







Dawgs face Dreads, Rocks

Chelsea hockey split its games last week, defeating Salem and losing to county rival Dexter.

Against the host Rocks last Friday, the Bulldogs skated out to an early 3-1 lead enroute to a 4-2 win.

To begin the contest, Chelsea junior Garrett Nickels scored at 1:40 of the first period. Picking up an assist on the play for the Bulldogs was senior Schyler Williams and junior Kyle George.

Salem answered 16 seconds later tying the game at 1-1 as Steve Hisler hit the back of the net.

At the 8:13 mark of the opening period, George scored giving the Bulldogs a 2-1 advantage. Recording an assist on the goal for Chelsea was Williams and Nickels.

To end the first period, senior Travis Amburgey scored off an assist from senior David Maveal and junior Matt Heinen increasing the Bulldogs' lead to 3-1.

In the second period, the Rocks' Aaron Markwell scored at the 1:54 mark cutting Chelsea's lead to 3-2.

In the third period, however, Heinen put the game away scoring off an assist from Maveal for the night's final margin.

Earning the win in net for the Bulldogs (4-2) was senior Josh Cottrell.

Chelsea out-shot Salem 33-19 for the game.

"Last year Salem was a little down," said Chelsea coach Don Wright. "They've improved this year. They're a good skating team. They played a good game. Their shots on goal were the most anybody's had on us all season."

On Nov. 29, host Chelsea lost to the Dreadnaughts 4-2.

Despite out-shooting Dexter by a wide margin 41-14, the Bulldogs could not find the back of the net.

"We carried the play the whole game," Wright said. "We had a lot of opportunities to score, but we were unable to connect. In contrast, they (Dexter) were able to score when they had the chance. It (loss) was frustrating."

In the first period, the Dreadnaughts opened the scoring with a goal at the 4:42 mark taking a 1-0 lead into the second stanza.

Ten seconds into the second period Chelsea tied the game at 1-1 as Williams scored a power play goal.

At 8:09 of the second period, the Bulldogs took the lead 2-1 as senior Jake Vaughan scored a power play goal off an assist from Williams and Heinen.

Dexter, however, would score the next three goals to

Bush Coach of Year

Successful coaches prepare for every situation during a game. Before each contest, football coaches pour over statistics, watch film, check line-ups, figure out match-ups and determine ways to efficiently attack an opponent offensively and defensively.

One area in which coaches try to prepare for, but never really control, is player injury. Losing one starting player to injury can be a setback for a team. Losing two players to injury can threaten a squad's chance at victory. Having three starting players go down with injuries can devastate a team.

Try losing four starting players to injury, including the squad's star quarterback and all-conference center and one begins to realize why Chelsea's Brad Bush was selected as Heritage Newspapers-West football Coach of the Year.

Despite the inordinate amount of injuries to key players during the season, Bush still led the Bulldogs, who were ranked as high as No. 2 in the state in Division 3, to a 10-2 overall record. The Bulldogs qualified for the state playoffs, losing to Fowlerville in the regional final on a last second TD.

"We had a great group of seniors," said Bush, who recently concluded his 10th season on the Chelsea sideline. "We had tremendous

leadership. The record we had is a reflection of our senior leadership."

Bush, who also was offensive coordinator for four years at East Kentwood and assistant coach at Ypsilanti for two years before coming to Chelsea, said despite the injuries throughout the season his team never dwelled on its personnel losses.

"We knew we had good players backing them up," he said. "We were fortunate that guys were ready to play when others went down."

Key injuries for the Bulldogs this season occurred at quarterback, linebacker, long snapper,

center and fullback. Bush said in spite of injuries his team grew closer as the season went along. "They were a cohesive group of guys," he said. "They were a pleasure to be around."

Bush, who prepped at Ypsilanti High School and played quarterback at Cornell, has guided Chelsea to eight consecutive state playoff appearances. Bush-led squads have captured seven of the last eight Southeastern Conference White Division titles.







What can my kid's game system really do?

System price, availability, Internet access, parental controls.

Nintendo Wii: \$250; launched Sunday; built-in Wi-Fi connection to access the Internet, as well as ability to wirelessly connect to nearby Nintendo DS systems; a four-digit PIN code restricts Internet access, messaging and purchase of Wii Points (used to download classic Nintendo games).

Nintendo DS Lite: \$139; on market; local wireless connection lets players within 90 to 100 feet of each other play games and chat together. Can connect to Nintendo's wireless gaming service — a closed network — over a Wi-Fi connection. Kids' games?

Newer game systems allow players to surf the Internet, play games with strangers or both

This is part two of a two-part series on the new gaming systems that are available for purchase this holiday season. Last week we previewed the Sony PlayStation 3 and Nintendo Wii gaming systems.

The new Nintendo Wii and Sony PlayStation 3 are expected to be hot holiday items this year, but some consumer advocates are urging parents to take a closer look at their gift lists. They say many are unaware that most of the newer game consoles allow players to surf the Internet, play games with strangers or do both.

"Parents think of risks in terms of technology, and not in terms of the use of technology," said Parry Aftab, an attorney who specializes in Internet privacy and security law and is executive director of the nonprofit Web site WiredSafety.org.

When Paige Solomon, 10, of Coronado, Calif., bought a Nintendo DS hand-held, her mother, Irene Castaldo, never realized that the small game player was capable of connecting — via short-range wireless technology — to other Nintendo DS players across a room, at a park or in a shopping mall.

"I had no idea," Castaldo said. "I didn't even know you could do that."

And, Castaldo said, her daughter didn't realize it either. Nintendo DS users also can connect to Nintendo's gaming site — and thus other Nintendo DS owners — at no charge through Wi-Fi hotspots available at McDonald's restaurants.

The \$249 Nintendo Wii and the \$599 PlayStation 3, both of which hit stores in the past week, offer Internet access through a wireless Wi-Fi connection or a hard-wired connection.

Among existing game devices, the Sony PlayStation 2, Microsoft Xbox 360, Sony PlayStation Portable and Nintendo DS all offer some form of online access, either to the Internet wholesale or to closed networks for playing games with others.

The Xbox 360, for instance, comes with free Xbox Live service that allows users to send and receive text and voice messages. For \$49.99 for a year, the service allows users to play games against one another.

The Sony PSP can surf the Web over Wi-Fi connections — now commonly found in coffee shops, restaurants and even in some city downtowns — as well as connect to other Sony PSPs within a short distance, no more than a tennis-court length away.

"Somebody can reach out to a child in a mall or on the playground, and parents wouldn't even know their

child was interacting with a stranger," Aftab said.

She said that while many parents watch, and even restrict, where their children go online on a computer, they don't necessarily realize they should pay the same amount of attention to their children's activities on video-game systems.

"The problem is, parents are buying these technologies blindly," Aftab said. "We need to make sure somebody clues parents in on it. Parents need to know if they're buying a game device that allows them to play against the computer, against their best friend or against anyone, anywhere in the world."

She said the concern began emerging in the last couple of years.

"Parents saw their kids with a headset, screaming at their Xbox, and it didn't occur to them that maybe there's somebody on the other end listening to them scream," Aftab said.

In January, Santa Rosa, Calif., police arrested Ronnie Brendan Watts, 26, on suspicion of molesting a 14-year-old boy he met on Microsoft's Xbox Live online service in the fall of 2005. The two eventually contacted each other via e-mail and instant messaging, police said.

Police said Watts met the boy in a park in the Northern California city where the alleged molestation took place. A spokeswoman for the Sonoma County district attorney's office said the case is pending.

Game system makers have included controls that allow parents to limit online access, restrict what games a child can play and whom a child is playing with online, noted David Cole, president of DFC Intelligence, a video-game market research firm based in San Diego.

All three of the major video-game system makers — Microsoft, Sony and Nintendo — have such controls.

"Almost from the start, they have put a huge emphasis on parental controls," he said.

Cole said that children can get into more trouble with cell phones and computers than with video-game systems.

"I think the thing about video-game systems is they have so many controls and are so protective," Cole said. "You've got cell phones and computers, where there are obviously fewer parental controls. Children are going to be much safer on the controlled video system, as opposed to wide-open mobile phones and computers."

Aftab said many parents, especially those unaware of the online connections contained in their children's gaming devices, aren't always cognizant of the parental controls.

Mitch McKay of Coronado, Calif., admits that he didn't realize his 15-year-old son's Xbox had parental controls. But he said he makes it a point to be there when his son is playing online.

McKay said he has talked with Jonathan, a high school sophomore, about not giving out personal information and also about the fact that other players may not be who they say they are.

"I've told him that Joe, who says he's 27, married, has two kids and lives in Boston could be a 45-year-old in Los Angeles," McKay said. "We've had those discussions."

Jonathan said he got a subscription to Xbox Live about a month ago, primarily so he could play the game Halo 2 against his friends from school.

Still, when playing with anonymous players, Jonathan cautions that the lan-

guage can be crude. He said playing online might not be appropriate for younger children, such as preteens, because of the swearing.

WiredSafety.org's ad campaign, which begins next month on its Web site, will urge parents to read about what their children's game consoles can do before buying them. The campaign will tell parents to pay attention to the three Cs: content, contact and commercial risks.

For content, parents must ask what types of videos, photos or information can children see and share, Aftab

said. Contact means, "Can someone reach out and communicate with my kid or can my kid communicate with someone else?" she said.

To determine commercial risks, parents should ask whether the device could require a service that ends up costing them money, Aftab said.

"Soon, everything is going to be Internet-accessible," she said. "Parents have been totally clueless about what the technology they buy for their children can do."

Fairlane Ford

Family owned Dearborn dealership has long, rich history

DEARBORN — Fairlane Ford is located in the heart of the Ford Country at 14585 Michigan Ave. and has established a trusted relationship with its customers throughout its rich history as one of the oldest continually operating Ford dealerships in the nation.

But the family owned dealership isn't resting on its laurels, but rather constantly reinventing itself while reaching out to the community.

Fairlane Ford enjoys the status and recognition of being the only Ford dealership in all of metro Detroit that has the distinct honor of being "Blue Oval Certified," a "Top 100 Ford Dealer" eight times in the last nine years, a "President's Award" winner, and the winner of the company's prestigious "Metro Cup Product Knowledge Award" for seven out of the last nine years.

Fairlane Ford Sales Inc. was originally founded in 1923 as the Robert W. Ford Agency.

Robert W. Ford was the first cousin of Henry Ford. The original dealership was actually built across the parking lot of where the new dealership sits today.

Robert W. Ford's son, John

general manager. "Both of us have been working here for well over 20 years," Joe Walker said. "We're here in the shadow of everything Ford," he said. "I think it helps and, right now, I know I'd rather be in my position here in Dearborn than a lot of other people's position, that's for

sure. Things are tough all over, but we have an advantage thanks to the proximity of the Ford manufacturing facilities as well as the white-collar workers that are left. "Everything in Dearborn is kind of on pins and needles right now with the changes in the company and

the restructuring. But Ford is a tough old bird and this isn't going to be the end of Ford Motor Co. by any means. This is very tough, very resilient, very proud long-history company and they will come out of this just fine." Because of the store's location in "the shadow of

everything Ford," 100 percent of the dealership's new vehicle business is via employee purchasing plans. "There's no guesswork in what we are going to sell a car for; the price is the price," Walker said. "We have to sell ourselves, our







service and the dealership with its location and amenities as opposed to selling your prices on the cars.

Walker said the Internet has changed the way dealerships do business and has played a key role in educating the consumer not only on the product and its features, but the price they can expect to pay.

"Our customers have become the most savvy customers in the world," he said. "They know before they walk in the door what their monthly payments should be and how much the car's sticker price is and how much they should be paying for the car, tax and title. They tell you what they want and it has reduced the role of the salesperson to almost an order taker. The fine art of selling the automobile and the haggling that went along with it is a dying art right now."

"Our industry has changed greatly and the Internet has made it change even more," he added. "We're heavily involved with the Internet now and you have to be to roll with the punches and keep up with the future."

Despite keeping up with the future, the dealership, like many in southeast Michigan, has been hurt by the economy and the downsizing of the Big Three automakers.

In the late 1980s and early 1990s, the dealership sold upwards of 3,300 new cars and trucks per year and had as many as 140 employees, according to Walker. While sales have dipped to about 1,600 new vehicles per year and between 700 and 800 used vehicle sales per year, Walker said the dealership, which now has about 100 employees, is still going strong and reinventing itself every year.

"We're using the Internet more and reaching out to the various ethnicities in the Dearborn area and the Hispanic market in southwest Detroit," he said. "It's a real mixing bowl and we're very conscious of all the different cultures in the area. We're constantly modifying our approach and trying to keep everybody happy."

Two new programs the dealership has introduced is an employee purchase plan for Henry Ford Health System doctors, caregivers and support staff as well as a Buyer Advantage Program for all city of Dearborn business owners and employees. Some of the benefits of the programs include employee pricing, free shuttle services, discounted rates on parts and service and up to three free oil changes with the purchase or lease of any new vehicle.

"We give them a lot of advantages that they can only get here at Fairlane Ford," Walker said. "We're trying to not only increase new business, but to raise awareness of all of the services we can offer and the fact that we're willing to go the extra mile for the customer."

Fairlane Ford typically carries up to 100 pre-owned vehicles and anywhere from 300 to 600 new cars and trucks on its 4.5-acre site.

Overall, the dealership's top seller is the Ford Explorer.

"That really has been the main vehicle in southeast Michigan for all dealers," Walker said. "If I had to survive on selling just three vehicles, I would pick the Explorer, the F-150 and the Escape."

"People like the Explorer because they like the roominess, they like to sit up higher than they do in an automobile and because there are so many SUVs on the road today, and people think that is a safety issue, to sit up higher in a bigger vehicle than an automobile, I lot of moms like the space for the kids and the room for the groceries without having to bend over in a trunk to

We asked Fairlane Ford co-owner Joe Walker how he would advise the winner of Heritage Newspapers' \$10,000 Cash For A Car Giveaway:

"Ten thousand dollars would get you, with change left over, a pre-paid two-year lease on a lot of different vehicles. If leasing is something that suits your driving because you're not a high-mile driver and you're not looking to get into a \$38,000 Ford Expedition with leather seats and TV players and all that kind of stuff, then leasing is a great thing."

"If you are a high-mileage driver or you're looking for a work vehicle or just somebody that likes to hang onto a vehicle for six or seven years and drive free and clear for awhile, then \$10,000 would make a heck of nice down payment and probably leave you with a less than \$300 a month car payment on pretty much anything on our lot."

"Also, you could probably get a nice pre-owned vehicle. Ford Motor Co. started this past year a program that cars that go through a very vigorous background and maintenance check are then marked as Ford certified pre-owned vehicles that come with up to 60,000 miles of warranty coverage from Ford Motor Co. It also gives you peace of mind of having roadside service that is one of the perks usually reserved for those just buying new cars. So you could get a lot of very nice Ford-certified pre-owned cars in that \$10,000 price range."

unload everything. With the engine technology we have today, a lot of SUVs get about as good of fuel mileage as many sedans do. So people aren't afraid, especially after gas prices have leveled off a little bit, of buying SUVs. They like their SUVs, they love their SUVs."

Although SUVs and trucks remain the dealership's bread and butter, Walker said he's excited about the new cars Ford is bring to the market.

"The Fusion is a great product," he said. "It was probably one of the most successful launches that Ford has had in many, many years in terms of having a fresh, totally brand-new product that came out of the gate with no problems or issues. The Fusion has been very well received and has very high demand and it has wonderful attributes about it from its safety rating to its trunk space to its fuel economy to the way it drives. It simply is a wonderful vehicle."


Walker said the Ford Edge, which is expected in showrooms this month, is also a highly anticipated vehicle.

"We're very excited about the Edge," he said. "It's another example of a product that there is nothing like on the market. It's a little bit station wagon, it's a little bit SUV, it's a little bit crossover vehicle and it's very sporty looking. It comes in a lot of configurations in terms of front-wheel-drive, all-wheel-drive and it has this panoramic roof, which very few vehicles offer."

Walker said Fairlane Ford will participate in the launch of the Edge with a Detroit-area party on Dec. 18 and 19.

"Everybody in metro Detroit should have an Edge or two in their showroom by that day," Walker said. "It's sort of like when we had the paper over the windows and we made a big production of the new car intros — that was a big thing in this town and Ford is trying to recapture a little bit of that excitement and flair with the Edge."

And that's the kind of excitement and flair that can be found at Fairlane Ford year round because of its proximity to Ford's world headquarters and the customer relations the dealership has built over the decades.

"We've got longevity on our side here at Fairlane Ford," Walker added. "A company that has 80-plus years of business in the same location has definitely done something right."

"Second of all, I think people will find our service at Fairlane Ford is second to none. We have won many accolades and awards from the company for our very high-quality service department."

"And finally, we have a lower turnover of salespeople at this particular store than any other store of any make in the entire city. The average tenure of the people on our showroom floor is over 10 years and we have a lot of 20-year-plus guys."

"The reason is we have a great store and a great location and the Ford customer is a wonderful customer and a loyal customer," Walker said. "If you treat people right and do the right things for them and follow up with them the right way and help them out with their service problems, they are going to keep coming back. Not only does that keep your customers, it keeps your salespeople."
