Schools face big cuts

State trims another \$125 per pupil from budgets

As if school officials needed something else to worry about, the state delivered another blow to their budgets this week.

Gov. Jennifer Granholm on Monday ordered a \$125-per-student cut in state aid to schools because of the state's budget deficit.

For Chelsea's 2,798 students that equates to \$349,750, according to Teresa Zigman, executive director of business and operations for the Chelsea School District, and the cut is being taken out of the 2006-07 budget year.

"We will not be making any cuts related to this year," Zigman said. "However, we have been preparing for this

news as we have been working with all of our staff with regard to purchasing only what is necessary so we can perhaps save some money to offset this loss."

Zigman added that "there are not many frills to begin with," because almost 90 percent of the district budget is related to salaries and fringe benefits.

"At this point we are also not considering shuffling classes and reducing staff for this current year - again, (it's) too late in the year and not good for kids," Zigman said.

Seven Chelsea teachers and one administrator will not be replaced next year, and the district has already trimmed its curriculum and

Local Realtors believe market is improving

By now, it would be difficult to find a Washtenaw County resident who hasn't heard about the real estate horror stories across the state.

Homes sitting on the market for years, their prices halved. Sellers losing thousands of dollars in their investments. Realtors taking a part-time job, or two, to make ends meet — if they even stick with the business. Jittery buyers helping home values slip through the floorboards.

Real estate agents across Washtenaw County won't disagree that there's some truth to this picture — that the last several months have seen the blows to Michigan's economy stagger the region's real estate market as well.

"2006 was, by far, the worst year I've had since 1981," said Jim Mann of Mann Real Estate in Manchester. "And that year, interest rates were at 15, 17 percent, so there was good reason for it. But, right now, rates are low."

Washtenaw County's Realtors disagree that the county's real estate picture is as dire as some sources or the occasional rumor have portrayed it.

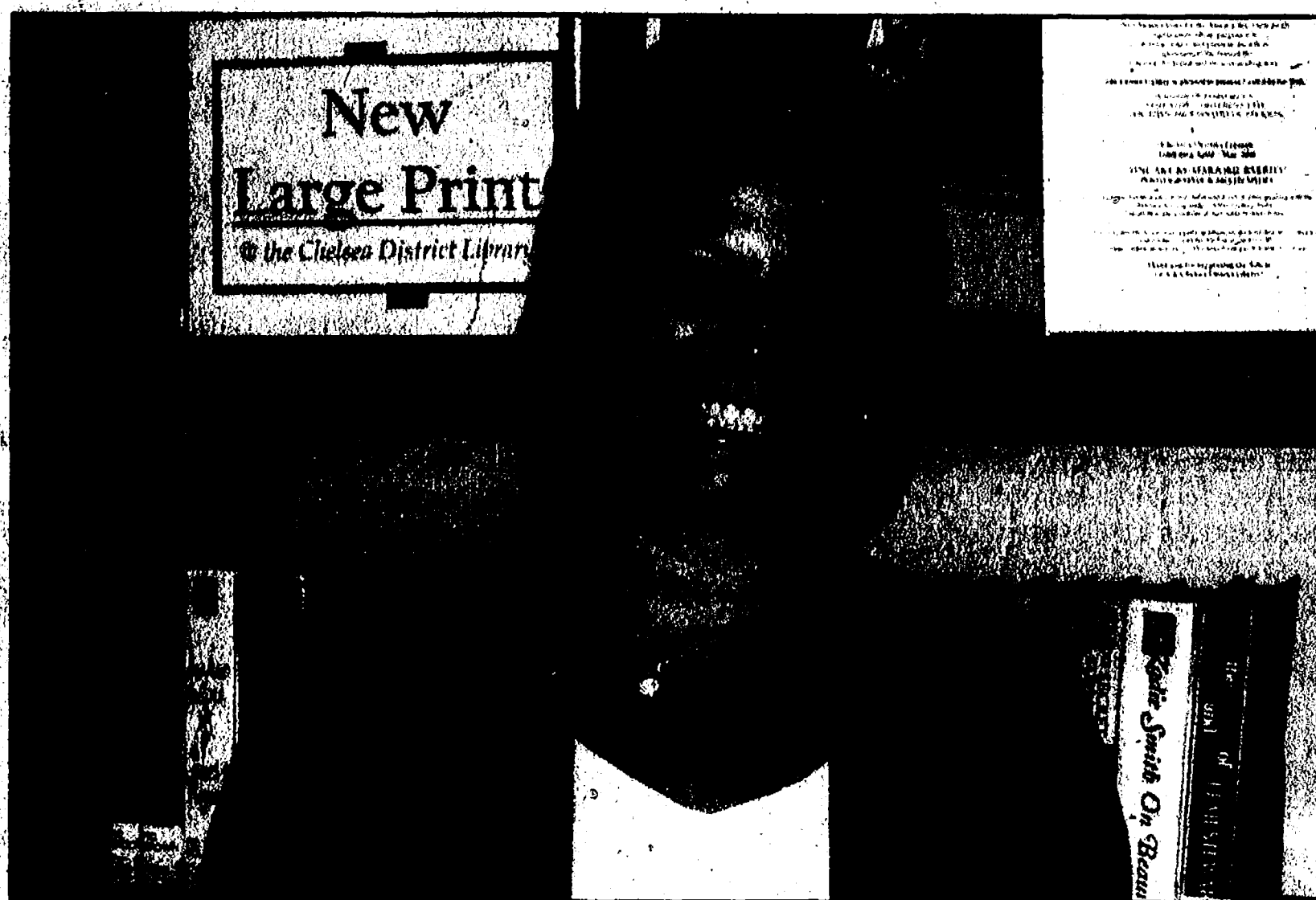
"It's not anywhere near as bad as what people have been hearing or reading," said Barb Lunarde of Real Estate One in Dexter. "This was the best February this office has had in many, many years. It has kept us

optimistic."

Though not quite a consensus, the feeling of most of Washtenaw's Realtors seems to be that despite economic

Popular library director takes new job in Troy

Cathleen Russ, director of the McKune Memorial Library, has accepted the position of assistant director of the Troy Public Library, with a promotion to director expected in December 2007.

Russ joined the McKune Memorial Library in July 2006, in the midst of the library's building project.

Gary Zenz, president of the Library Board, said that the library was fortunate to have Russ as our director during one of the most difficult transitions in the library's 75-year history.

"It was understood by the board that when we hired Cathy Russ, we were getting a high quality, up and coming director whose talent was recognized in the library community," said Zenz. "The Troy Public Library recognized that same talent and provided Cathy the opportunity to realize her personal goal of becoming the Troy library director and returning 'home' to family and friends."

While she is very excited about this new opportunity, she will miss the McKune Memorial Library family and sees an exciting future ahead for the library.

"I can't say enough nice things about Chelsea," she said. "I planned to be here for many more years. I don't know anyone who would knowingly sign on in the middle of a building project, see it through to completion, and then leave! This community has constantly amazed me by its support of the library, and the

importance of the library to the community."

"I think the library has an incredibly bright future ahead as a community center, genealogy and local history resource, and all around spot for recreation and information. 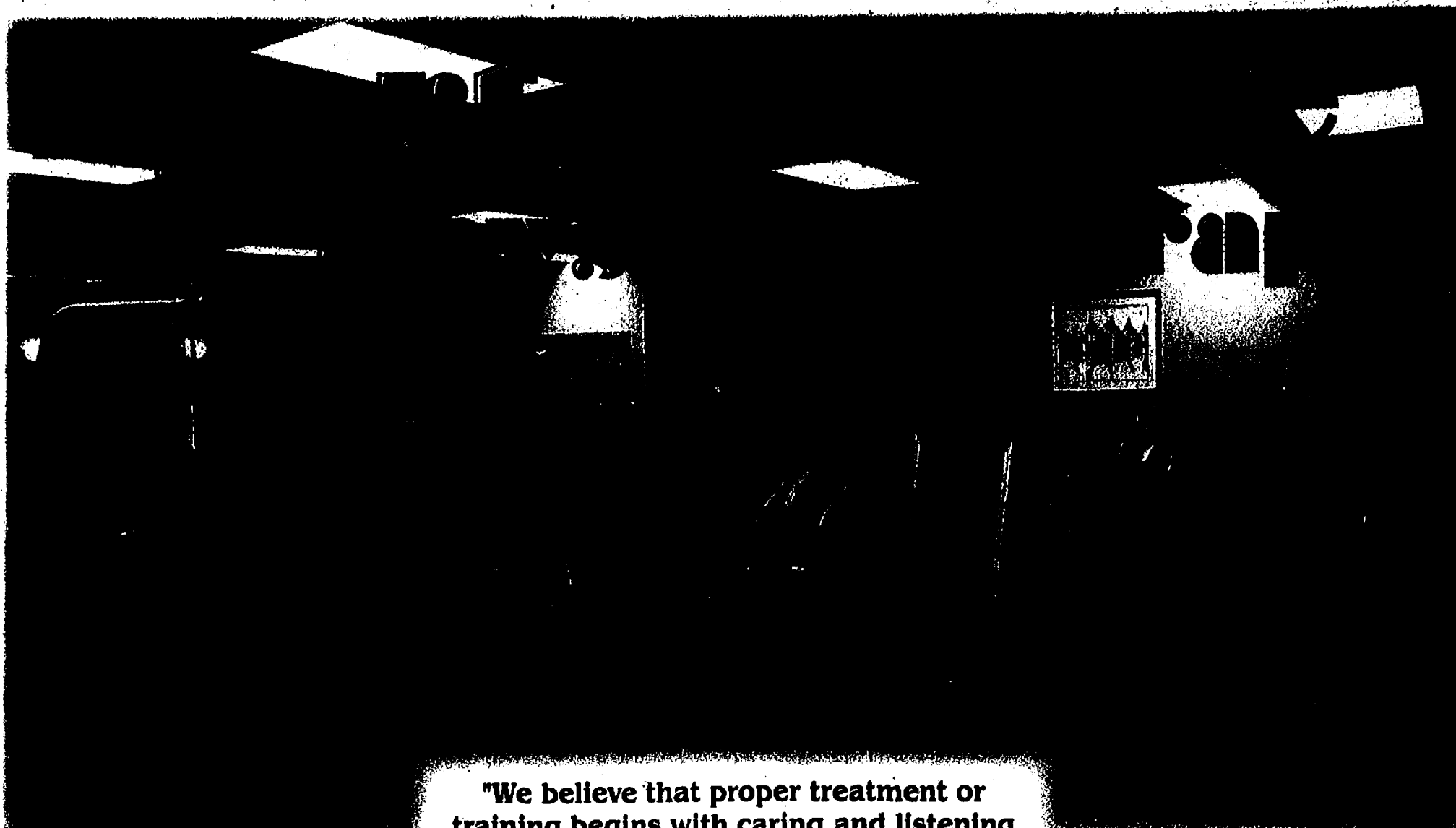

Sometimes getting in shape is as simple as gaining access to a come-and-go fitness facility and making the mental determination that, "I'm going to make this commitment to my health and follow through."

In other cases a one-size-fits-all approach isn't the right way and can even be detrimental to an individual's long-term health or could exacerbate existing physical conditions — known or otherwise.

"Some people are trying to put a square peg into a round hole with some of these general exercise programs," said Brad Skinner, a long-tenured physical therapist with a local practice and a history of working with all kinds of patients, from children to weekend warriors to the Detroit Lions to providing spine injury prevention services at the DaimlerChrysler Proving Grounds in Chelsea.

Skinner, owner of Sport and Spine Physical Therapy & Rehab Specialists, 5245 Jackson Road in Ann Arbor, which opened in May 2006, has recently launched a program that expands on what he and his staff offer to those who suffer from lower-back injuries and suffer from constant pain, shoulder impingement or rotator cuff injuries and other concerns, such as hip, neck and joint pain, tennis elbow or knee and ankle pain.

Sport and Spine Physical Therapy is for everyone from the young athlete hoping to get strong to someone coming off an injury to an older patient just looking to feel better. They provide state of the art management of orthopedic conditions and personal training with a professional that knows not just how to train healthy, but also knows what can go wrong and how to deal with that while still reaching fitness goals.

"There's a big difference if your rotator cuff is wearing thin or your muscles are just sore," Skinner said. "Knowing the signs is important. We think that teaching is important. We want our clients to leave here with at least a basic understanding of physical fitness and conditioning."

The Dexter native is no stranger to mixing physical therapy treatment and the philosophy of physical fitness. Skinner received his bachelor's degree in health science in 1991 and master's degree in physical therapy from University of Michigan in 1993. His postgraduate education has focused on the prevention and treatment of spinal disorders. In 1995, he was one of the first therapists in Michigan to become certified in the McKenzie System of Mechanical Diagnosis and Treatment. He was also awarded a diploma in Mechanical Diagnosis and Treatment in 1998 for

completing his residency program in that approach.

While working as an Orthopedic Physical Therapist in both

hospital settings and private practice, he also has been involved in the community as a football, baseball and wrestling coach. In addition he is a practitioner of Jishukan Ryu Jujitsu, which he now instructs as a Shodan black belt. He is also the parent of four active children — the most physically demanding activity in his personal life, he says.

An interest in sports and helping others reach their potential is what drove Skinner to his chosen profession. It's this background of restoring people from a state of disabling injury and pain to a state of being physically able to take on and savor all of life's challenges, coupled with a personal background of augmenting the physical condition of himself and others and caring for people that have made his business what it is today and are the basis of his new fitness and personal training program.

"It is part of the expertise that we bring to the table," Skinner said. "The niche we are filling is between formal Physical Therapy for an injury, and personal training that is generic and doesn't take into account that some of clients aches and pains everyday. If you're in good shape you can go anywhere and improve your conditioning."

We do all of that here, but it's for baby boomers that I have a concern. Sometimes there is a nagging injury, an old ACL tear, arthritic knees or shoulders, or bulging or herniated disc that needs a more specialized program to reach fitness goals. We can integrate their goals with a common sense program that won't aggravate their condition, and hopefully empower them to get back to a higher level of function.

The Sport and Spine Physical Therapy fitness training program focuses on what people want to do and not just a weight loss goal or some other arbitrary milestone. Staff members ask participants what practical things they would like to do, such as gardening, simply climbing up a flight of stairs or playing a sport, like softball, Skinner said.

"We have clients identify tasks that they want to do — functional, real-world stuff," he said. "The equipment we use is like the stuff that you have around the house. Some of our clients choose to join as members and come in the work out on their own. You can do this stuff in your basement, local fitness club or just come here and do it."

While the facilities are well equipped, it's the expertise in both physical therapy and the physical fitness coordinated within the program that provide the best results at the least long-term physical cost, to those interested in augmenting performance. Those who simply wish to rise to a state of physical normalcy will enjoy the empathy that the physical therapy aspect of Skinner's business brings to the table.

The fitness training program was launched in late April and is directed by Jeff Skrzypek, fitness coordinator at Sport and Spine Physical Therapy. He previously worked at Chelsea Community Hospital for 19 years as a fitness trainer on the hospital's physical therapy staff, which makes him the perfect partner to work with on this progressive fitness program, Skinner said.

Skrzypek would take over their programs at a turning point and individualize them to each patient's needs.

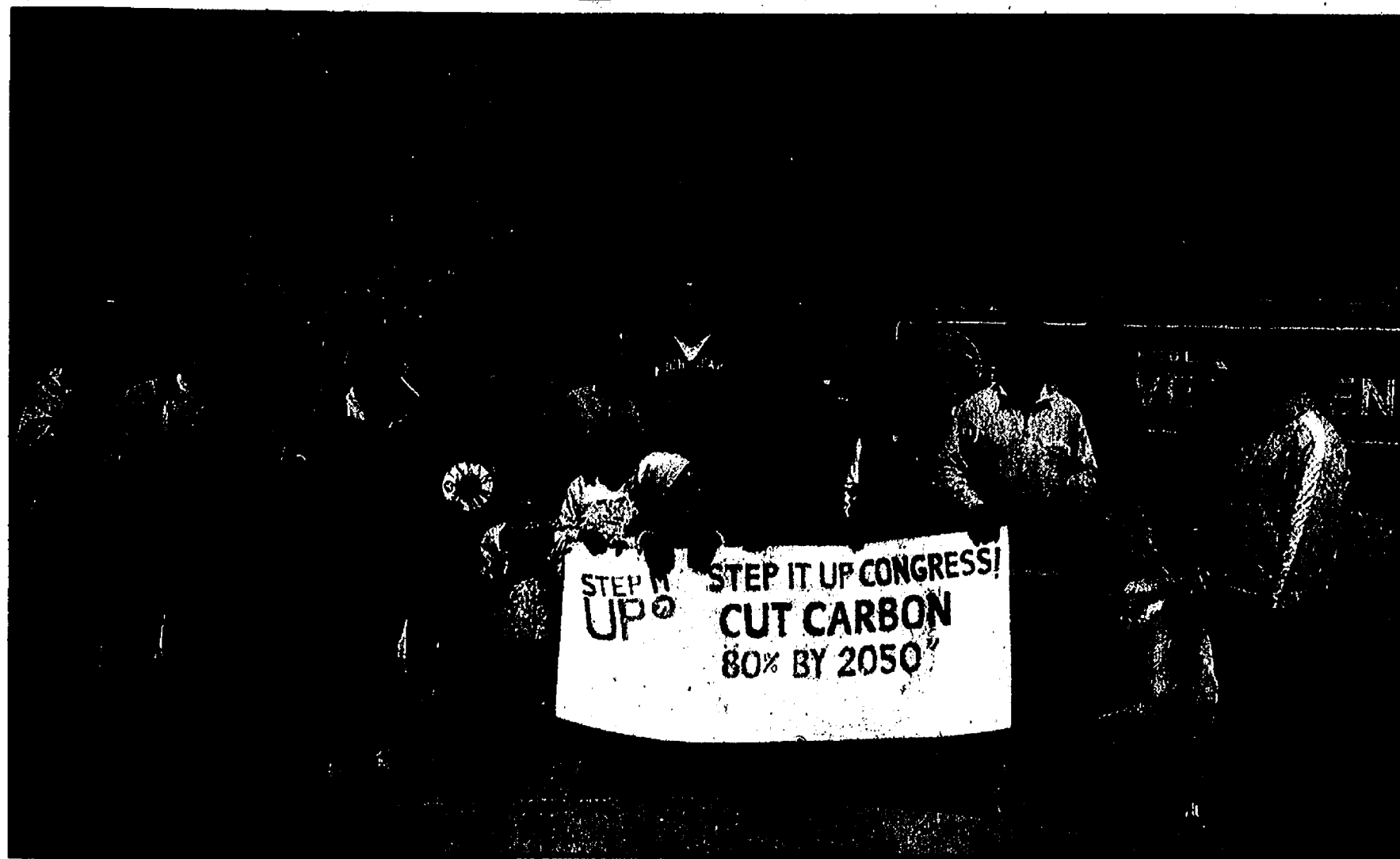

Step it up



Group hikes for the environment

April 15 was a windy day, but that didn't matter to the energetic group of people who came out to the Waterloo Recreation Area to hike the bog trail. The group had come out for more than a pleasant walk on a partly-sunny spring day - they were part of a movement called "Step It Up."

"Step It Up" was the brain-child of environmental author Bill McKibben, who has written numerous books, most notably "The End of Nature," published in 1989, and often cited as a classic work on the environmental crisis. What McKibben, and the thousands of people who came out over the weekend to support the more than 1,400 actions that took place in all 50 states, wanted was for Congress to begin addressing climate change immediately.

"What we're calling for is very doable," said Cathy Muha, organizer of Sunday's hike. "We want Congress to pledge to cut carbon emissions by 80 percent by 2050. This requires a two percent reduction per year, which can be done by educating us all - individuals and businesses - to conserve; and by finding new sources of clean energy. We have the technical ability to accomplish this, we just need the political will. Our politicians need to hear that we are serious about it."

"Michigan imports most of its energy resources from other states, even though we are the 14th windiest state in the country. If Michigan utilized its potential and created many wind turbine farms, we could reduce our dependence on others, create many new jobs, and have a cleaner environment."

Carol Strahler, who teaches science at Beach Middle School in Chelsea, led the hike. Even though blossoms were slowed this year due to the steep fluctuations in

temperature this Spring, she still found many interesting things to point out. She showed the group how to identify different types of trees and which bushes were invasive. Strahler pointed out the flower of the skunk cabbage, which is not often seen as it is at the base of the plant.

One of the attendees had considered going to the Ann Arbor event but said, "Why would I go into the city for an event calling attention to how precious our natural environment is? What bet-

ter place for this kind of thing than the incredible Waterloo Recreation Area?"

Restore & more Timber Town project a community effort

It was a warm spring day in 2006 when Gloria Mitchell and her daughter Amy went to Timber Town to play with her grandchildren. Amy had looked forward to taking her own children to Timber Town so that they could play on "Grandma's playground."

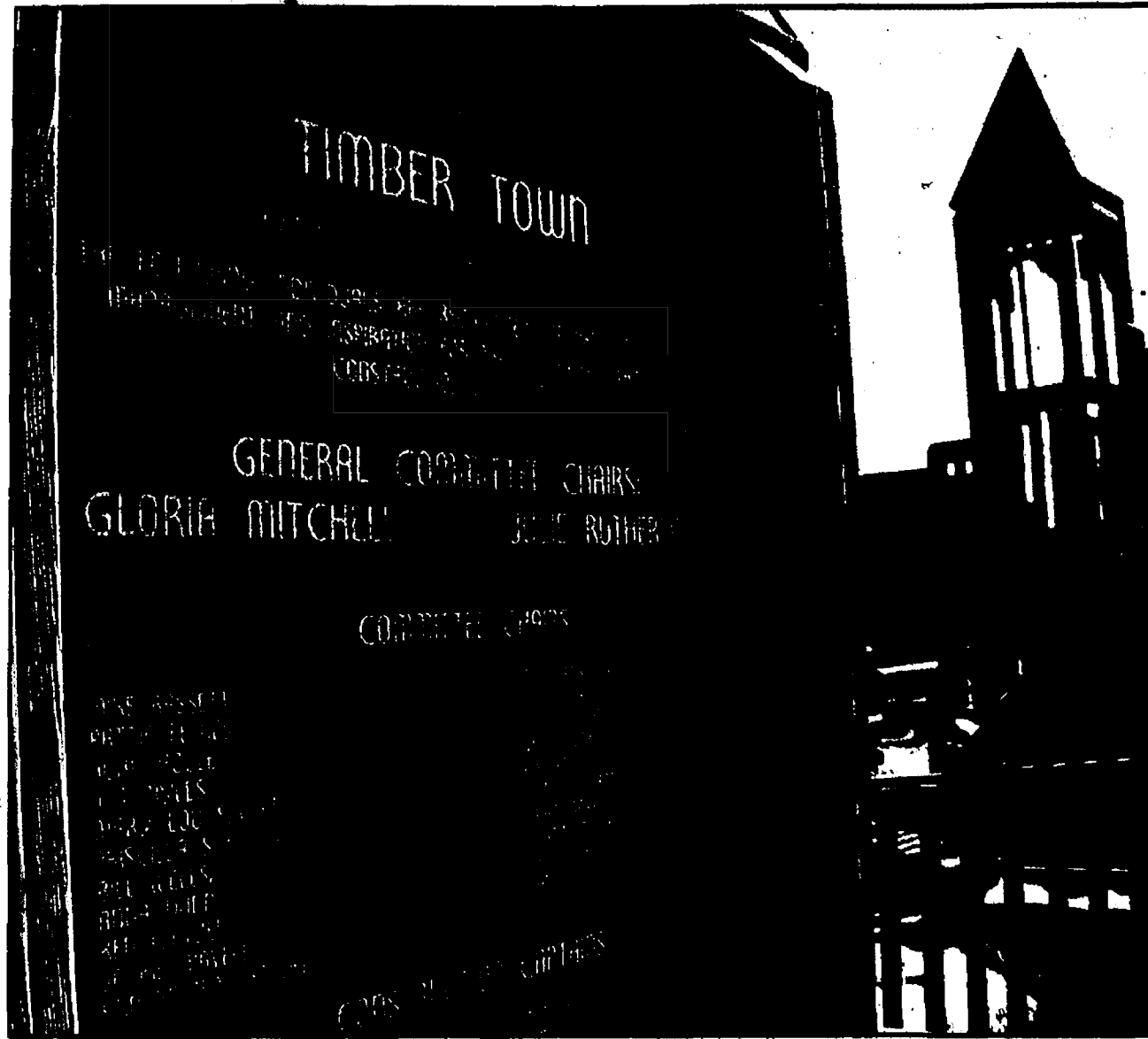
Upon arriving, Mitchell was a bit taken by the toll that time, weather and play had taken on the structure. It had been at least five years since Amy had been to Timber Town.

Although many community service organizations and the City of Chelsea did their best to manage the structure for 10 years, it was apparent that more money and time needed to be dedicated to fixing the structure.

After a series of discussions with the original structure architects Leather's and Associates, Mitchell knew that this structure was in need of a complete overhaul. Within about two months of the Timber Town visit that spring, the Chelsea Standard featured an article about the restoration effort, calling upon community volunteers and supporters to come forward and volunteer to be a part of the restoration effort. The City of Chelsea had some monies remaining earmarked for Timber Town from the original project, however it was not enough to cover the expense of the project.

After the article appeared and several people came forward and offered their support, the Friends of Timber Town was born. A group of six dedicated Chelsea citizens, including Michelle Mitchell, the Chelsea Recreation Council director, Dennis Crawley, Jeff Dehring, Jim McInnis, Amy Mitchell and Tracie Faupel began the work to organize and stage the restoration event. The Friends of Timber Town is an organization that operates under the City of Chelsea, which acts as their fiscal agent. Being that Timber Town resides on city property, it behooved FTT to continue that fiscal relationship.

First the group realized that it needed money to complete the project. Rather than turning to the local economy and Chelsea businesses that are called upon so often, Amy Mitchell, under the wings of Michelle Mitchell, set out to write a grant. The grant request was to cover the restoration costs, as well as provide for a future maintenance fund,

which would ensure the integrity of the structure for years to come.

The grant compilation process took about two months and when completed the grant was submitted in December 2006 to the Community Foundation of Southeastern Michigan. In April the Friends of Timber Town received word that the grant request had been approved from the Chelsea Community Foundation. With elation and vigor the group set out to finalize the restoration event details.

In less than 60 days, FTT set the restoration dates, recruited volunteers for the hardware restoration event, secured additional financial backers, set up T-shirt and tote bag fundraisers and reached out to service organizations to provide meals and volunteer labor for both events.

What would happen next,

is in the true spirit of Timber Town and the citizens of Chelsea.

On the one year anniversary, April 13th, 2007, of the tragic accidents of Matt Tuttle and Scott Sumner, FTT received a phone call. The call was from Jack Long, a local resident and boy scout troop leader, who wanted to do something to honor our fallen heroes. Jack had secured St. Mary Church, Knight's of Columbus and boy scout troop support to hold a benefit dinner for May 11. Jack had hoped that the effort would raise over \$5,000 and would add two additional pieces of play equipment. The play equipment is a fire engine and a police car, both made in memorial of Scott and Matt.

Additionally, Jack offered further support of the boy scouts in the May 26 hardware restoration event, the

first of two restoration events on Timber Town. From there, the dominos fell into place. Thirteen skilled or licensed builders came forward to take ownership of one of 13 zones on the Timber Town site. A zone could include the replacement and repair of all swings, the replacement and repair of the tot lot section, sand digger installation and bell chime installation.

The zone manager would provide the needed tools and labor required to complete the job. Further, Dave Marsh of My Home Town Handy Man in Chelsea offered to spearhead the painting and sealing initiative on May 26. Each rooftop and trim piece will have to be repainted after the structure is powerwashed.

Further, The Tree House, Staffan-Mitchell Funeral Home and Thompson's Pizza offered monetary donations

The June event, which will provide opportunities for all people to help restore Timber Town, continues that community spirit. Again, the boy scouts of Chelsea have offered a huge token of support as well as individual volunteers running the sanding stations, sign in and sealing stations. These stations will serve as hubs for volunteer worker flow.

Also on June 9 and 10, the Chelsea Kiwanis wagon will be on site, offering food and beverages to workers on a donation basis. All additional monies generated will be given back to the Friends

Who I admire . . .

'Miss Jackie' charms both students and parents

Storyteller "Miss Jackie" — accompanied by her puppet Rosie — is a regular and popular fixture at Chelsea's McKune Memorial Library, charming local preschoolers with fingerplays, stories and songs.

She does a fantastic job, according to Chelsea resident Rebecca Yawney, whose own two children — Ruthie, 4, and Kate, 2 — love the story sessions. Yawney has nominated Jackie Maveal for "Who I Admire."

With a master's degree in library science and experience as a children's librarian in Ypsilanti, Yawney recognizes library talent when she sees it.

"I've seen a lot of library storytellers and Jackie is just the best," Yawney said.

"She always does a great job, and is really good with the children. I love the way she greets our whole family with a big smile and is always very helpful to me, as she can see I have my hands full with two young children and a third child on the way."

Maveal started in this storytelling role while working in the Chelsea Parents As Teachers program. PAT received a literacy grant that allowed her to help the library with storytimes.

"The grant ran out and since it was working out so well, the library kept me on," Maveal said. "I will always be grateful to Parents as Teachers for giving me that opportunity."

"I absolutely love doing storytime. I could be having the worst morning ever, but as soon as those kids walk in everything changes. The kids are so fun to be with, and I have met a lot of nice moms."

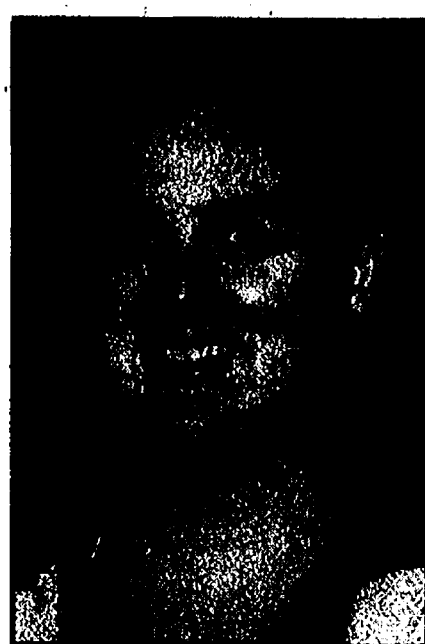
Storytimes in the library's KidSpot are set Wednesday and Thursday mornings, from 10:30 a.m. to 11: a.m. for 2-3 year olds, and 11:30 a.m. to noon for 3-5 year olds.

Maveal uses her puppet "Rosie" to introduce the theme of the day.

"I have no training in this, so I learn as I go, and just have fun with it," she said. "I like how children respond to her, and feel she is a good tool to teach. For example, if she interrupts me, I can talk about manners that day."

"I often write my own fingerplays because a lot of what I find in books don't treat kids as smart as they really are."

Maveal, who puts a great deal of planning into her sessions, says she reads about 15

books on any one topic before finding three or four really good ones to use in her sessions.

Her favorite storytime theme is "Twas the Week Before Christmas."

"My biggest challenge is to get through it without crying," she said.

Maveal has had plenty of experience reading to children. She and her husband, Gary — high school sweethearts who have been married for 32 years — are the proud parents of Jaimie 26, Trevor 24, David 17, and Kelly 15. The family has called Chelsea home for the past 14 years.

"I consider moving to Chelsea one of the best things I have done," Maveal said. "I don't know if it's the town, itself or my luck that when we moved here, we had kids in all 4 schools, making it easier to meet people — however I

have made dearer friends here than I have had all my life. I feel so at home in Chelsea."

The Maveals have been involved in the local grassroots One World One Family organization since its inception about six years ago.

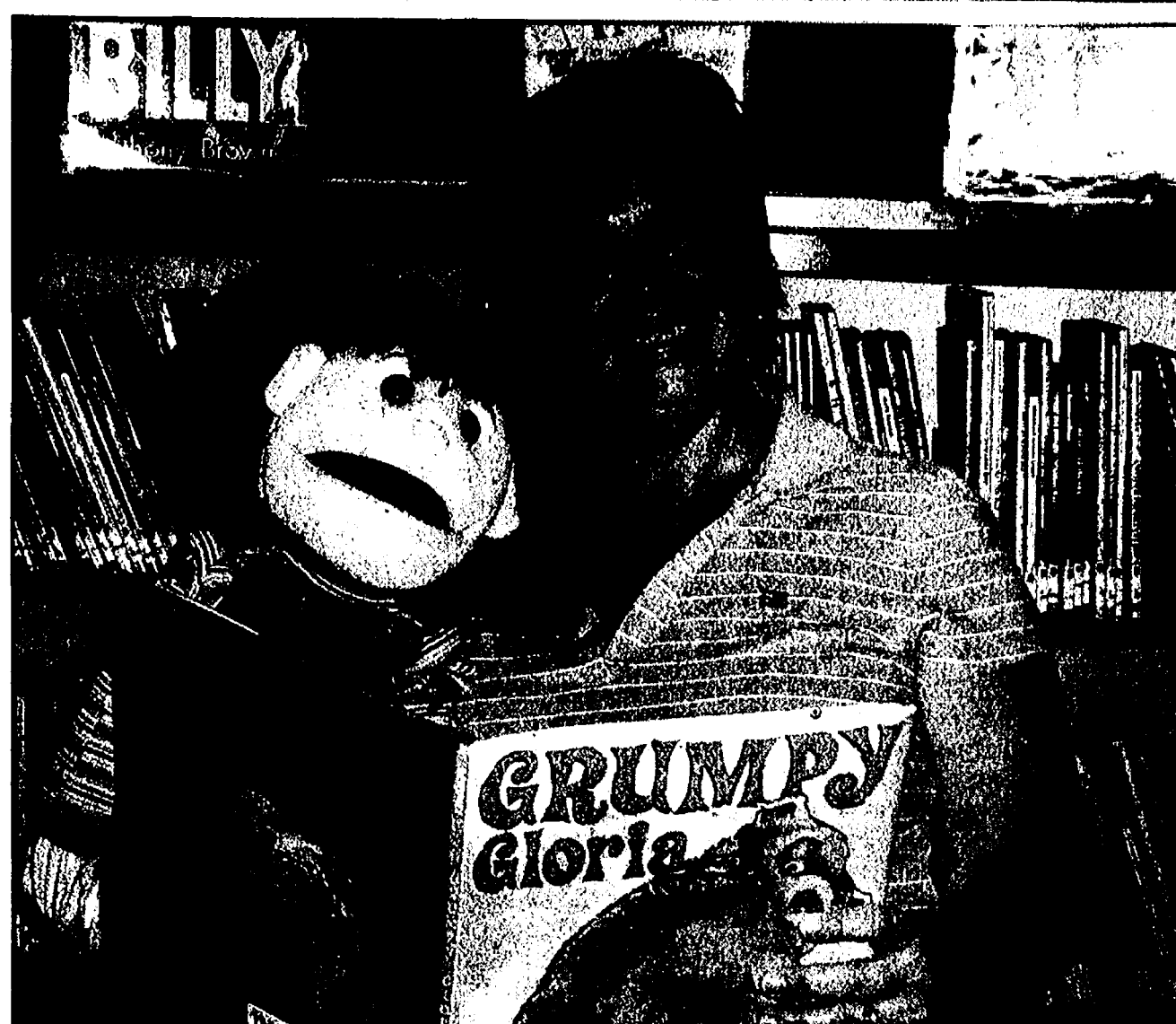
"I truly believe that peace begins at home, and that we should teach our children to accept everyone and try to understand each others differences," she said. "The differences among people are what makes life interesting."

In her spare time, Maveal is a huge fan of Bruce Springsteen.

Plant sale promises to blossom

Area garden club members are busy repotting, thinning and planting seeds so they will have hundreds of plants to sell at their 8th annual Plant Sale, 8:30 a.m. to noon on Saturday, May 19 in the Park Street parking lot adjacent to the McKune Memorial Library in downtown Chelsea.

Among the plants on sale will be melon, tomato, pepper, squash and fennel grown from seeds starting in late March by avid organic gardener Kathy Kersten who is also plant sale chairman this year.

"Rather than spend a lot of money on plants I've found that I can start seeds growing for myself and still have enough to share," she said during an interview in her bright, modern home situated on 10 acres south of Chelsea.

Kathy and her husband Don purchased the property and designed their home so that she could have room to garden, an activity she has enjoyed since she was a child helping her parents with a Victory Garden in Dearborn during World War II.

The couple became organic gardeners following some health problems many years

ago and find that their diet rich in vegetables, fruits, and herbs makes them feel vigorous and healthy.

Kersten credits her use of natural fertilizer and pest control to her successful vegetable garden. She raises enough to can and freeze for use all year.

Organic gardening isn't difficult. Instead of using the garbage disposal she has a container in her kitchen and dumps everything on a compost pile where it decomposes. She adds manure from a local horse training facility and mixes well.

"One of our garden club members put me onto the use of horse manure because unlike most farm animals these horses don't eat field grass and pass the seeds."

Another gardening tip Kersten offered is the use of nematodes to ward off Japanese Beetles whose larvae cause brown spots on lawns.

"Dawn dish soap is effective to fight off pests. Make a solution of water and liquid soap and spray it onto the plants," she said.

When people repot or put plants in the ground they should make sure the roots

are loose. Plants started in pots often are "root bound" and need to be broken apart.

Something new this year is a tip Kersten recently read about - a teabag can be placed in the bottom of a potted plant to help retain moisture and add nutrients. She doesn't know how it will work but offers it as a suggestion for her fellow plant lovers.

Herbs may be preserved by dehydrating or freezing. Usually Kersten uses a dehydrator, a basket-like layered unit, but this year intends to freeze some. "I think frozen herbs will have a fresher taste."

She also advises keeping a journal to record what was planted and how it produced. Some gardeners also take photographs to monitor plant growth in their yards.

Plant sale proceeds are used for a variety of Chelsea area education and civic beautification projects.

Garden walk

From 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 23, visitors are invited on a Garden Walk through Chelsea's historic downtown area and newer homes in the Freer Road area.

Homes on Orchard Street, E. Middle Street along with the McKune Memorial Library and Clocktower Commons on Main Street will showcase seasonal flowers, trees and shrubs all within easy walking distance of downtown.

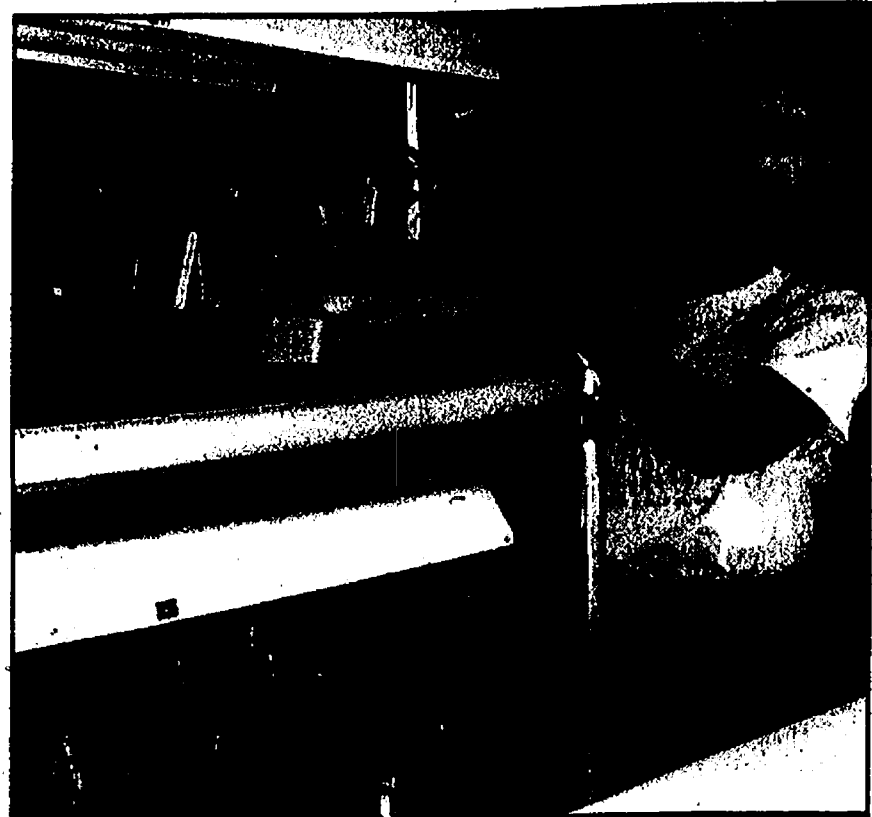
Then a short walk or drive east will take visitors to see the gardens of homes on Madison Street, Mayer Drive and N. Freer Road.

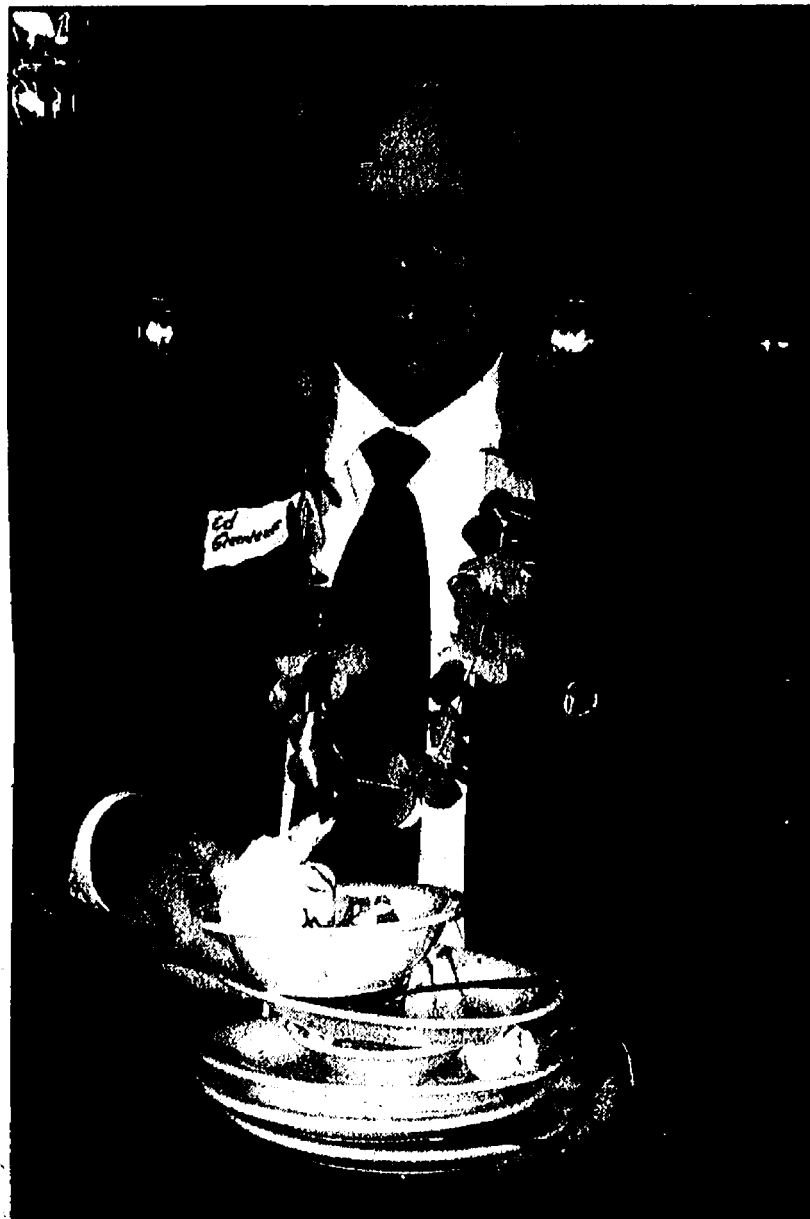

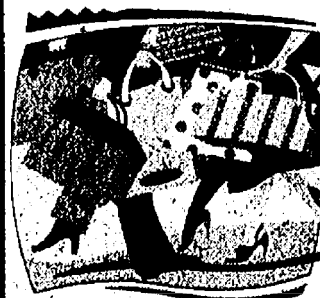



Recognizing good hearts more important now than ever

It's times such as these when my mother and I can get into volatile go-arounds on the state of the world. She is inclined to believe the world is going to hell in a handbasket and events such as the shootings at Virginia Tech last week only reinforce her position.

The world used to be a better place, she says. Humans were gentler and kinder; they looked out for one another more. There was less fear and less to be fearful of.

"No one used to have to lock their doors" is one of her favorite phrases. To her, I think, that pretty much sums it all up. The state of the world can be measured in the sales figures for Solage deadbolts.

I feel comfortable being a contrarian with my mother, which isn't always fair to her, of course, but what else is a child supposed to do with years of accumulated knowledge of which buttons to push to send their parents over the edge?

When my mother asserts with a shake of her head that she doesn't know what this world is coming to, I have been known to counter with the argument that rather than going to hell in a handbasket, the world is actually getting better.

Perhaps the first time I made the argument, I did so simply because I knew it would raise my mother's hackles. But after advocating the point numerous times over the years, while I have not changed her mind in the slightest, I believe I have actually persuaded myself that even if it isn't necessarily true that the world is evolving toward goodness, it may be possible.

Perhaps it is only a matter of perspective. And hope.

It's understandable that my mother has concluded the world is caught in a downward spiral of violence and moral decay. Evil gets a lot of media play. Its public-relations department must work overtime. We are inundated with its appearances. It could lead anyone to believe that evil has the upper hand and is gaining ground in battle after battle.

But I have seen the other side of the war. I have written some of those dispatches:

The teacher who donated bone marrow in hopes of saving a stranger's life.

The students who collected band instruments for Gulf Coast middle schools crippled by Hurricane Katrina.

The scores of ordinary citizens who traveled to the Gulf Coast to help rebuild homes.

The hundreds who attended a fund-raiser for a local soldier terribly wounded in Iraq.

The families who gather at the American Legion to assemble care packages for our troops overseas.

Relay for Life and Circle of Art. Car drives and shoe drives and book drives.

It's important, especially at times like this, to remember there are many good people out there, and I like to think there are more good people than not. I believe the good guys have a larger army.

It's a tug of war and the yellow ribbon moves back and forth, but it is incrementally making its way to the good.

When I was about 12, I belonged to a youth group that gathered every summer for three days of competition against similar youth groups from across the state. I remember watching a tug of war contest decided by an observer.

It was the final match to determine the tug-of-war champion and my youth group wanted the team that knocked us out in the semi-finals to lose. The team we cheered had an enormous lad as its anchor. He must have weighed 250 pounds. He was a mountain of a kid. Slowly, the ribbon knotted on the rope crept toward our favored team's side, but despite its greatest effort the kids could not pull that ribbon the last few inches for victory.

My youth leader, Mr. Johnson, could stand the tension no more. He leaned over and shouted in the anchor's ear, "Sit down, big boy, sit down!"

All 250 pounds of that kid dropped to the ground and the ribbon darted across the line. We cheered madly.

It's the only time, however, that I have known an observer to affect the outcome of a tug-of-war. It's a much better strategy to stop watching and decrying the state of the war and to find a place in the line to get a grip on the rope and give it a good pull.

Letters to the Editor

To the Editor: I am writing in response to Jeff Hardcastle's letter on April 19.

In this letter, he stated his respect for the commitment and dedication with which the CANOPAS group has stood vigil for peace for the last four years. He also stated that his perspective dramatically changed, when he happened to notice the altered American flag in which the stars had been replaced with the logos of major corporations.

In the same spirit of respect for his opinion, I would like to offer the following for consideration.

When the flag was created, the idea of small, independent states unifying or federating for a common larger purpose was novel, to say the least. Each star represented a state, and it was the collection of sovereign states that were to make up the nation, being controlled by individual citizens (white males at that time).

One of the major concerns of the founding fathers was the protection of citizens from exploitation by corporations as they had experienced it in companies like the Hudson Bay Trading Company, the Wal-Mart of that era.

Citizens could control the states, which in turn would assume — with a very short leash — control of the corporations. Corporations were forbidden from attempting to influence elections, public policy and other realms of civic society.

It is little known that a 180-degree shift occurred after the Fourteenth Amendment was passed in the late 1800s.

A whole series of Supreme Court cases were brought to determine "who is a person" under the new amendment. Only 19 of these cases involved African Americans; 288 involved corporations, argued by highly paid corporate lawyers of the era.

By 1910, corporations had gained the rights of "national personhood," essentially reversing the nation's first century of citizen protections.

A corporation, a "thing," now enjoyed all the same protections originally given to a citizen, a "person." Ironically the principles that were originally created to specifically protect the citizen from the corporate entities had been appropriated to make the corporations their equals under the law!

In our ongoing vigil for peace, the CANOPAS group is primarily interested in presenting ideas for observers to think about, counteracting the group-think which mushroomed after 9/11.

The use of slogans or symbols which can be quickly grasped is our primary technique. A well-known slogan could be altered — e.g., "What Would Jesus Do?" changed to "Who Would Jesus Bomb?"

In the case of the flag, this universal symbol has been altered to reflect our concerns. Among these is that corporations that are driven by profit motives — not patriotism or ideals of liberty, justice or equality — have replaced individual citizens or states as major shapers of national policy.

Ask yourself, which likely has had more influence on national policy or laws: the state (and citizens) of Arkansas, or Wal-Mart? The state of Texas, or ExxonMobil? Who are the major contributors to presidential campaigns? Who gains more from the current war — the Halliburton Corporation, or individual citizens in Iraq or America?

In our view, the current war (and many other wars as well) is being fought to further corporate profits, not for the ever-shifting idealistic reasons given in the sound-bite interviews of our public officials. While you may still disagree with CANOPAS perspective about this war, please know that the use of the corporate logo flag is not intended to desecrate, but rather is used to illustrate our deep concerns for the erosion of individual citizen voice.

Current polls show that American citizens, at a rate of almost 2 to 1,

believe the Iraq war was a mistake and want our country to disengage. Iraqi citizens, at a rate of 4 to 1, want the U.S. to leave their country. However, the war continues. Why?

When multinational corporations have the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," individuals will lose nearly every time.

Our great national heritage of individual freedom and justice for all, a heritage that will lead to peace for all people who experience it, is what we wish to protect. That is an idea which I believe we can all agree on.

Let me recap with a few of Coulter's perverse quotes.

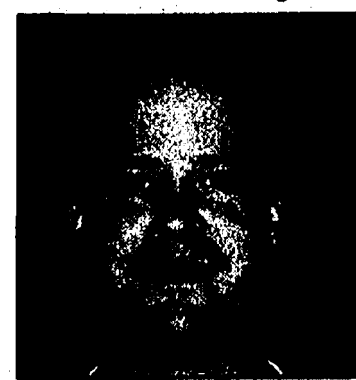
Two days after 9/11 this is what she said in her column with respect to Muslim countries: "We should invade their countries, kill their leaders and convert them to Christianity."

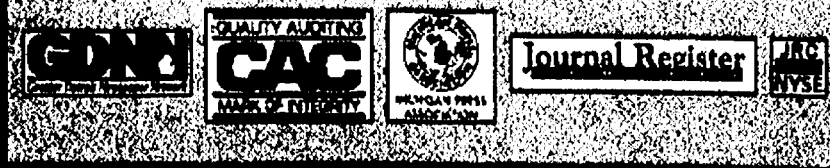
Our Chelsea History

Tragedy reminds us 'with freedom comes responsibility'

It is not surprising that the recent tragedy in Virginia has had somewhat of a leveling effect on our nation. Young and old, black and white, rich and poor, religious and secular, red state and blue - we are all profoundly shocked and saddened by the brutal, senseless events at Virginia Tech. And yet, while we are united in our grief and incredulity, we are at once divided as to how we might deter such incidents.

One camp calls for a prohibition on the production and sale of guns - while their neighbors simultaneously point to the Constitution and the undeniable fact that the vast majority of gun owners are law-abiding citizens who never use their weapons in

a dangerous or reckless manner. Why should the conscientious majority be forced to abdicate their right to personal weapons because of the abhorrent behavior of a statistically insignificant number of unbalanced individuals?

Perhaps they have a point. But if there has ever been an axiom in our lexicon that is universally valid, it is "with freedom comes responsibility." Along with the freedom to make firearms readily available for purchase, the gun industry and their customers also bear the responsibility of ensuring that such weapons do not end up in the hands of those who might use them to harm. And there's the rub.

Despite such safeguards

as background checks, waiting periods, and gun safety exams, efforts to prevent the mentally unstable from possessing weapons fall woefully short. In part, they fail because it is clearly impossible to accurately determine an individual's emotional and psychological well-being through a self-report questionnaire. And also, they fail because (like it or not) many among us will enjoy only temporary stability. While we may be rational and responsible when we purchase a weapon, illness, substance abuse, personal tragedy, and circumstance may rob us of those same faculties tomorrow. Then what?

I've heard it argued, "The problem really isn't guns. If someone is intent on doing

others harm they will find a way to do it. Automobiles, clothesline, and even potato peelers have all been used to kill people, too. Does that mean they should also be banned?"

While it is true that such mundane items can kill if misused, it is reasonable to conclude that they do not carry the same inherent potential to create such deadly, indiscriminate, and nearly instantaneous carnage on a large scale, while in the hands of a single deranged individual. You can't conceal a car in your coat pocket. Once the first person in a crowded room is under attack by someone carrying a knife, the others have a reasonably good opportunity to subdue the attacker, or to escape. You

might be able to dodge a switchblade, but you'll never outrun a bullet.

The uncomfortable reality is that until the gun industry devises a mechanism to insure that their products never land in the hands of the unstable, we will continue to be visited periodically by such horrors. You can count on it. Not even the most serene and seemingly secure environments will be immune (a certain one-room Amish schoolhouse comes to mind). The attitude of many appears to be that while such events are despicable, fortunately, they are also quite rare. And therefore, on balance, the benefits of purchasing and bearing arms by the responsible majority far outweigh the admittedly terrible costs

incurred by the few, when guns occasionally fall into the wrong hands.

But the truth is that neither you nor I can make that evaluation. Ethically, only those who endure the cost are in a position to judge if the attendant benefits yield a worthwhile endeavor. So we should turn to those who have actually shouldered that burden, the parents, relatives, and friends of those whose lives have been cut short by gun violence and ask them...is it worth it?

Are the benefits to society worth the cost? I'll bet I know how most of them would answer. I'll bet you do too.

Technology

Gadgets for the whole family

On the surface, it may seem that technological gadgets and activities would hinder family interaction. Aren't the kids locking themselves in their rooms to log onto MySpace or battle real-time on video games?

But a study conducted last year determined that high-tech gadgets and new media services actually may be bringing families closer together - provided they're not fighting over the gadgets.

The survey, conducted by Yahoo!, spanned 16 countries and 4,500 families with Internet access, asking questions about time spent together as a family and the number of gadgets in the household. The results showed that gadget-friendly households were just as concerned about family interaction and the importance of the nuclear family.

So what is it about being

"wired" that promotes family interaction?

The main reason may be time saved. Gadgets and technology in general have transformed multi-tasking. It's possible to do homework or complete a work report while watching streaming news stories online and keeping tabs on family and friends through instant messages. Being able to fit more of the necessities into a smaller window of time frees up quality time for the family to spend together.

Here are ways families can embrace technology to improve family interaction even more:

• Family calendar: The calendar scheduling features of business software are not exclusive to the boardroom. They can be used to keep a family organized and on time for all of the events, from doctor appointments to

sporting events.

Simply set up a computer in a central location, like the kitchen or family room, and type in the appointment dates as they are received. Some software also can be programmed to give reminders days or hours in advance of an appointment. Many mobile phones and PDAs also feature a calendar/scheduling option. It sure beats scrambling around looking for those appointment cards.

• Talking translator: In this multi-cultural world the ability to communicate in multiple languages is beneficial, but not everyone has the time to learn several languages. The Lingo Voyager 12-Language Talking Translator can be an asset for any family. This portable, pocket-size talking interpreter translates,

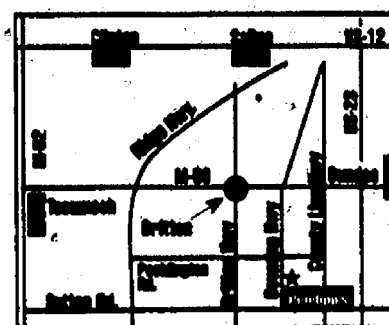

operational budgets, Zigman said.

"It's not a pretty picture," she added.

The cutbacks would take effect in 30 days unless the state comes up with money to avert them.

"I don't think the Legislature wants to cut schools, either, frankly, but they have no choice - we don't have the money," Granholm said Monday.

Dexter's Executive Director of Finance & Business, Sharon Raschke, explained that the reduction, also known as a proration, would be retroactive to July 1, 2006.

"We still have May, June, July and August state aid payments due from the state for the 2006-07 fiscal year, which ends June 30," she said. "The state would equally reduce our funding over the remaining payments."

Chelsea Superintendent David Killips said this has happened three out of the last five years, and may finally force the Legislature to rethink how public schools are financed.

"Our legislators have cut so much in the last 12 years since the inception of Proposal A, they need to look

at that whole process," he said. "Just maybe, state financing of school systems isn't working and we have to go back to local control."

Killips absolved local lawmakers from culpability, however.

"Local legislators have always been supportive of our schools, but I'm not sure the state feels the same way," he said.

In Dexter, the \$125 cut will result in the loss of approximately \$451,000 for its 3,608 students, according to Superintendent Evelyn Shirk, which will be tough to replace at this point in the year.

"We're just about finished with the school year, and there are not many places we can take this money from other than our reserves," Shirk said.

The Dexter district has about \$4 million in cash reserves, and dipping into that is likely the least objectionable among several unpleasant choices.

"One of the options we could do is to end school early, but that's not a good idea," she said. "The reserve is the only reasonable place to cut."

"We're fortunate that many people who were here before me have planned for this."

Gaines said the large number of homes available has in some cases led to buyers proffering "ridiculous offers. (Some buyers) are trying to

walk off with a house for next to nothing."

Sellers' frustrations have reached the point that multiple area homeowners with properties either on the market or recently sold or taken off declined to comment on their experiences for this story.

On the brighter side, Lunarde also stated firmly that even in the midst of the "glut," if homeowners prepared and presented their properties properly, their odds of seeing their homes sell in a reasonable time frame remains high.

"There is still buyer activity," she said. "What the high number of available homes translates into is that homes must be competitively priced and in great condition. If you have those two things going for you, you'll have a good chance of getting your home sold."

Picknell echoed those comments, citing that properties where owners had done their homework had continued to sell while those who didn't face an uphill climb in this market.

"The olive (colored) even in the kitchen isn't going to cut it anymore," she said. "Buyers are less forgiving. If the home has dated curtains, stains on the carpet, or the walls need painting, those problems have to be fixed, before it even hits the market. You don't want to mess around."

One advantage area Realtors have is the ability not only to sell a buyer on an individual home, but on the entire community in Washtenaw County, this means touting first the county's well-respected school systems (Saline, Milan, Dexter, Chelsea and Manchester all have high schools built within the last few years and the tight-knit nature of the communities.

Mann said that while the addition of new regional industries such as Pierce Pastorens likely would help continue the positive signs from early 2007, the small town atmosphere of Manchester and "personal attention" available in the town's smaller school district mean that even in the toughest of times market-wise, some Manchester homes will continue to sell.

"We don't have the bubbles like in California or Florida, where it drops up and down

like crazy," he said. "We're a nice little bedroom community for Ann Arbor. We don't have a slough, and they like that. It's our little corner of the county."

The relationship of Saline to Ann Arbor also helps stabilize the Saline market, Picknell said, adding that Michigan's loss of manufacturing jobs might not have the impact in the Saline market some might think.

"We're not a suburb of Detroit," she said. "We're tied to Ann Arbor. We lost Pfizer, but Google is still coming. There's still U of M. We've got developments like the Oaks coming in (on US 12). Life keeps moving. This is still one of the best places you can live. We're going to continue selling homes in Saline."

Gaines said that in Milan, the resolution of the city's recent financial crisis means that optimism in the community is on the rise again, a good

sign for Milan real estate.

"They've found a way to work things out. People feel that this is a good community," she said. "There's a general attitude that we're OK. We're going to make things work."

Like the other Washtenaw Realtors, Lunarde cited the Dexter school system as one of her market's best selling points. Even with that advantage and even with the relative stability of the Dexter market, however, she admitted that recent months have not been kind to Realtors, and that several she knows have either left the business or taken second jobs. But, she added, many also have continued to do well in the current climate.

"The agents that are really committed to this business, that are digging in and doing the work they have to do, they're fine," she said.

Kim Roberts, an associate broker with Keller-Williams

Realty in Dexter, said that her agency recently added four new agents.

"Seeing something like that is a good thing," she said. "As many benefits as the region offers, whether new agents in Dexter or anywhere across Washtenaw, success will be determined, in many ways, by the market, the economy, and if they can convince buyers that what positives have been seen so far in 2007 will be sustained."

It's part of the reality business to be optimistic about those factors, and to believe that optimism in Washtenaw County will not prove to be unfounded.

"Let's hope so," Gaines said. "What I see is a good summer a good year. And I think next year could be even better."

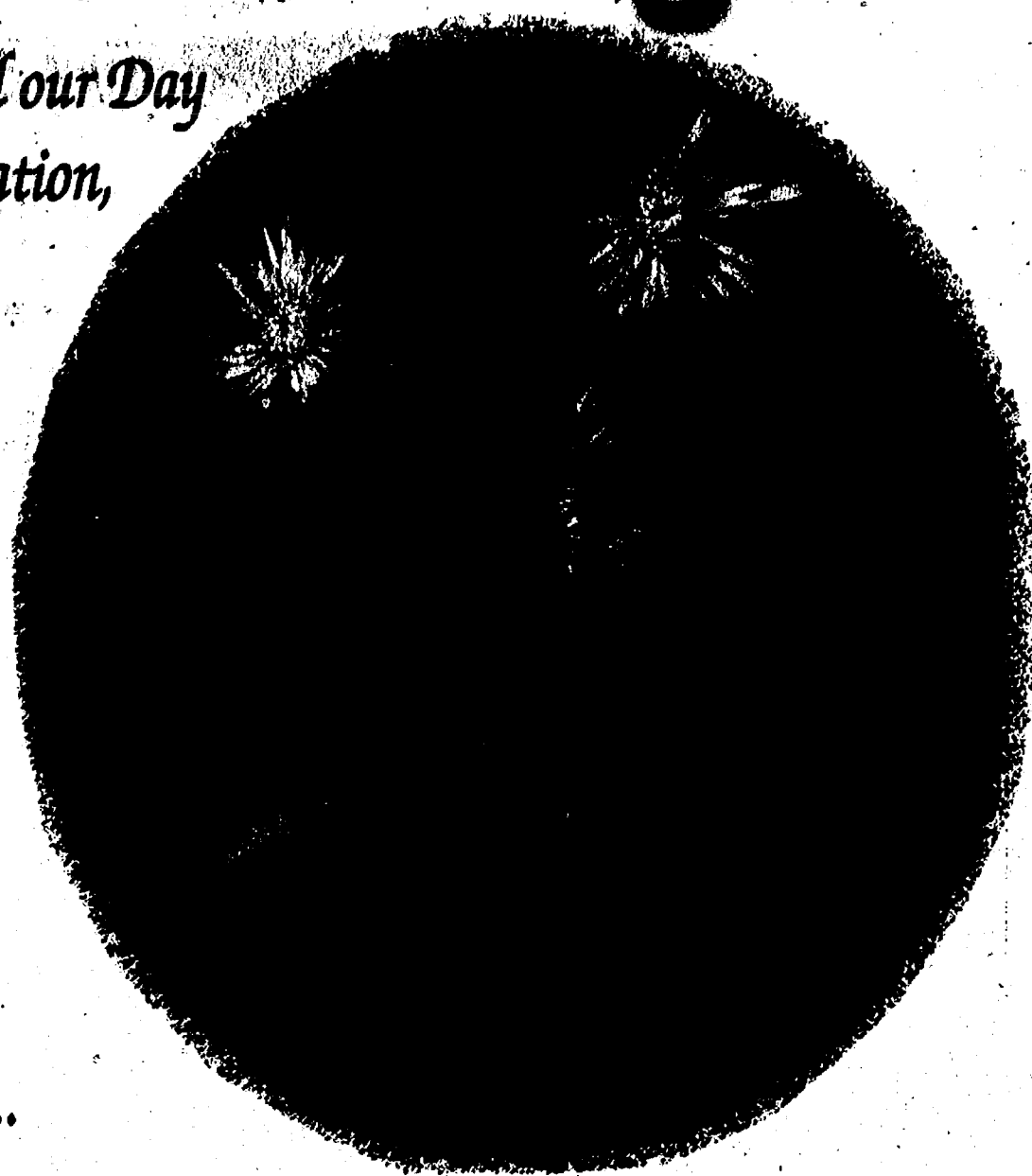

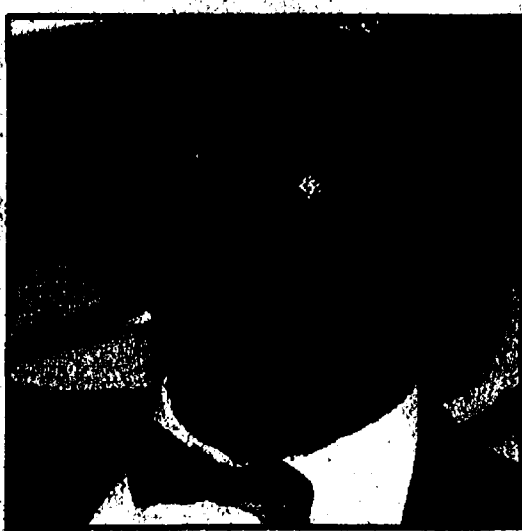

"I've read that these are the best cookbooks because all the recipes are tried and true," she said "It's

also one of the most authentic parts of the Key Ingredients program."

Key Ingredients, Michigan Foodways, and Chelsea Foodways are a celebration of national, state, and local food traditions, and cookbooks are one of the most authentic parts of the program," Russ said. "And family recipes are probably the greatest tradition of all."

The Chelsea community is currently running third in a "Recipe and Story" contest sponsored by the Michigan Humanities Council. Recipes had to contain at least one Michigan food or product and be accompanied by a story or history related to the dish.

"You may recall that Else Heller won our 'Chelsea Cooks' contest last fall," said Shawn Personke, the library's community relations and development coordinator. "Each of the Michigan host sites for Key Ingredients and the Michigan Foodways supplied a winning recipe from their community."

"Now they are pitted against each other! Everyone in Chelsea needs to vote for Else's sour cream coffee cake with hickory nuts by going to michiganfoodways.org."

Heller's recipe is in third place behind first-place contender pasties from Calumet and second-place asparagus and red pepper tart from Whitehall. Other contestants are cranberry apple pie from Cheboygan; Michigan mom's favorite caramel apple pie from Dundee; and pretzels from Frankenmuth.

Votes will be accepted through May 24. The winner will be announced at the Chelsea Faire, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. May 26 at the library, the Kickoff of the 2007 Key Ingredients Michigan Foodways exhibit.

"So we've got to get the vote out," Personke said. "A vote for Else is a vote for Chelsea!"

He was born Nov. 14, 1918 in Barking, Essex County, England, the son of William J. and Rosanna (Warrillow) Mansfield.

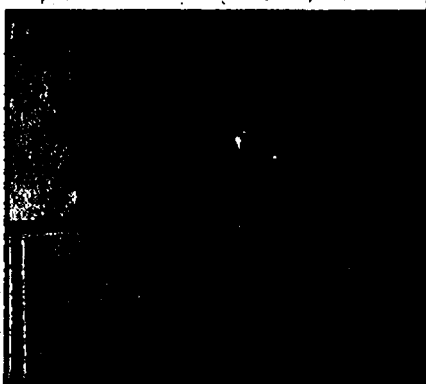

be included, too.

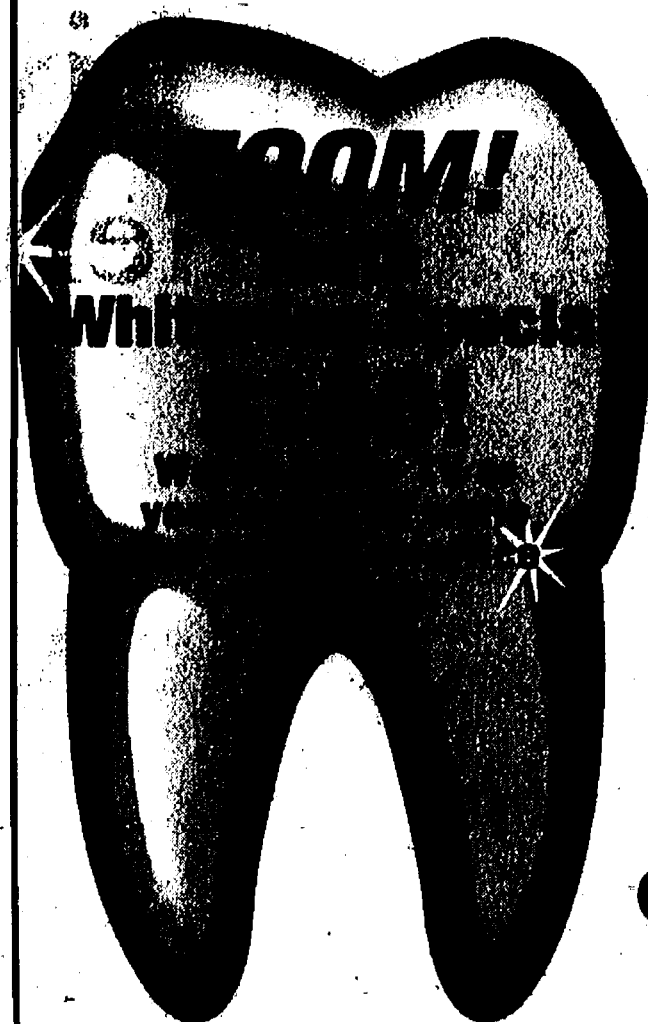
There will also be child identification kits available through the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

Samaritan it is our duty to minister to our community."

Other things that are being addressed at DUMC through this program include monthly blood pressure checks (and some have found that they did indeed need to see their physicians for follow-up) in an effort to improve awareness of heart attack and stroke prevention, flu vaccine administration, a Healthy Hearts for Christ walking program and increasing awareness of domestic violence occurrence and prevention. This Health Fair is one more step in the direction toward addressing these goals.

The Western Washtenaw Healthy Communities pro-

gram will also have a booth. Lisa Klinkman will have information about her program with materials directly related to the Dexter community. Washtenaw United Way will be present with information about the 211 program which is a direct contact for county social service resources.

"We are excited to be able to offer this first, hopefully annual Health Fair to our community," said Steve Bringardner, Pastor of Discipleship at Dexter United Methodist Church. "When asked the other day why a church would be interested in doing a 'health' fair, I replied that it makes good sense when you consider there's really a very thin line between the physical, social, mental and spiritual sides of

Road test

Teens prove their driving skills at Chelsea Proving Grounds

It's been a long time since I felt the urge to drive like a 16-year-old — especially in a car I didn't own.

But when the folks at DaimlerChrysler's Chelsea Scientific Labs & Proving Grounds invited me to come out and report on their Teen Driving Experience program, I figured there were a lot worse ways to spend a Saturday.

Developed by Chrysler Group engineers, the program is meant to give young drivers the opportunity to experience critical driving situations and conditions, as well as practice safe vehicle handling in the controlled environment of the company's proving grounds facility.

Students had the opportunity to get behind the wheel of various vehicles with different handling characteristics.

Each got to drive with a personal vehicle dynamics specialist, or driving coach, all of whom were engineers with years of professional driving school credentials.

They knew I was coming, yet it still took about 10 minutes for me to clear security at the front gate.

Once inside, I met up with Kristin Tyll, manager of Safety Public Relations with Corporate Communications, who was to be my guide for the day.

I'd heard about the Proving Grounds for many years, and I finally got the chance to see what actually goes on inside the facility.

Here's the thing: References to Area 51 or the Manhattan Project are not that far off the mark.

The car business is extraordinarily competitive, and these folks rightly treat what goes on here as a matter of their own national security.

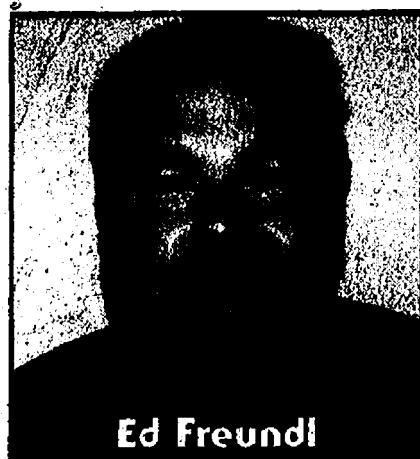
I was seriously limited in what I could photograph, and even which direction I could face when snapping pictures.

You'll see some of my photos here; the others were taken by the Proving Grounds' official photographer, Jim Howe.

They even took everybody's cell phones, because so many of them now contain cameras.

Two groups of about a dozen local high school students participated in Saturday's event; Chelsea students began at 8:45 a.m., and Manchester students followed about three hours later.

The Chelsea group included Erin Alber, Samantha Buss, Ben Christie, Nicholas Dyerly, George Falk, Andria Fitch, Ben Ganger, Lucas Kizer, Aurora Knopper, Sean

Murphy, Jeremy Richardson, Danielle Williams and Austin Feeney.

The adult chaperones were Sandy & Aaron Inman. Sandy Inman is a physics and science teacher at the high school.

First up was a short quiz by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) on proper tire inflation and condition.

"This is not going to be a repeat of driver's training, you've all been through that in the last year or two," said Bill Cornish, senior manager of Core Vehicle Dynamics at the Proving Grounds, and one of the driving coaches.

Cornish cited sobering statistics about teen drivers, trying to convey the message that most people don't use anywhere near a vehicle's designed steering and braking capacity in trying to avoid an accident.

The Teen Driving Experience was the idea of Jeff Zybert director of the entire facility.

"I have a 16-year-old daughter myself, and most of these guys have kids this age," he said. "It seemed like a great thing to do to help show them better driving skills."

Everybody grabbed a crash helmet (Crash helmets? Just how fast will we be going, anyway?) and split up into three groups to take turns at each of the test track areas: the Skid Traction Facility, the Vehicle Dynamics Facility and the Evaluation and Handling Road.

The latter is a 1.7-mile course containing curves of different radii, normal stops, full anti-lock brake (ABS) stops, simulated rainy or icy conditions and a road-cone slalom.

The cars used were the Dodge Charger Hemi, an ordinary sedan with an extraordinarily powerful engine; a four-wheel-drive Jeep Patriot; and the Chrysler Crossfire, a little two-seat rocket sled that seems to be based on DaimlerChrysler's Mercedes-Benz connection.

The driving coaches took each student around the course once then changed positions, and got to drive

each different vehicle.

Junior Samantha Buss looked a little timid before climbing into a Charger.

"I brought this (permission slip) home to my mom, and she said I need to do this," she said.

After her trips around the track, she was the picture of self-confidence.

"It was pretty fun," she said. "The wet part (where water was sprayed on the road to simulate rainy or icy conditions) was the worst — I didn't realize it would slide like that."

To get the full effect, I felt it was my duty as a reporter

to buckle myself in the back seat — and quickly understood the need for the crash helmet.

After the fourth time around, I (or rather, my stomach) came to the conclusion that I'd better sit out the next dance.

Over at the Vehicle Dynamics Facility, students had the chance to open things up on a straightaway slalom course, try the "Pick a Lane" challenge or the "Start in a Box-Stop in a Box."

To "pick a lane," drivers

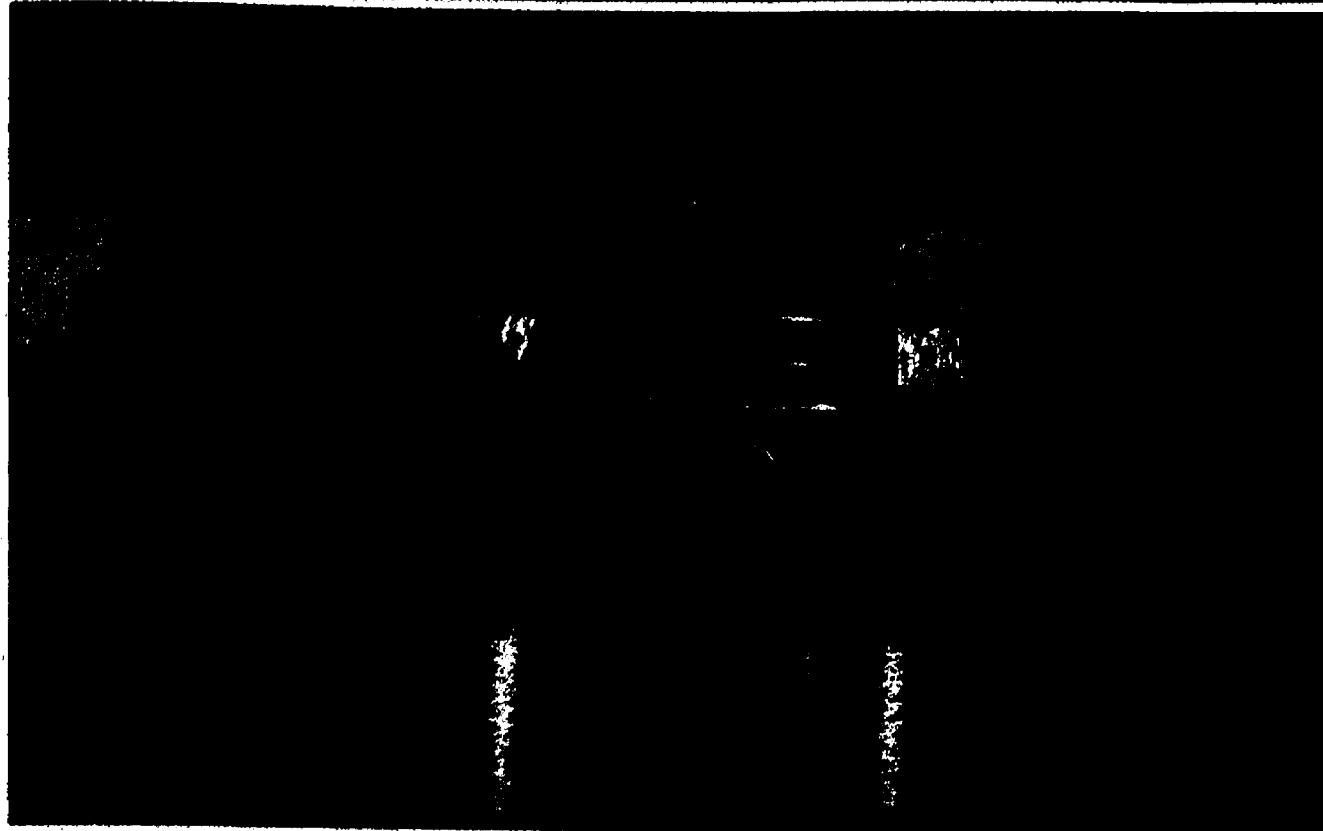

went from a standing start to 25 mph in about 100 yards, entered a center lane marked with cones past a sensor that activated a lighted arrow that indicated a sudden swerve left or right to avoid an obstruction straight ahead.

Let me say this, and we are never to speak of it again:

It became undeniably clear that I no longer have the reflexes and reaction time that I did 30 years ago.

Over at the Skid Traction Facility, road surfaces of various materials are used to represent road conditions found in countries all over the world.

The driving coach can activate or deactivate the ABS brakes from inside the car, which makes for an additional challenge.

With the ABS, the students were able to maintain traction and come to a safe stop; without it, not so much.

Many went into spins of 180 degrees and there were even a few 360s.

"This will definitely help me in driving," said senior Jeremy Richardson. "On regular roads you don't really have the chance to test the capabili-



ties of a vehicle."

The two student groups overlapped at the crash test tunnel, where we witnessed a head-on crash into a solid barrier at 40 mph.

Having seen the aftermath of more crashes than I care to count in my years in the news business, I concentrated on the crash test dummies: one was wearing a seat belt, the other was not.

In the milliseconds following the impact my eyes recorded the image of the dummies being tossed around like, well, lifeless dolls.

"Crazy!" "Loud!"

"Awesome!" were the comments I heard from the kids, but when we went over to inspect the wreck they took on

hushed, somber tones.

Not only was the front half of the sedan utterly destroyed, the back seat actually broke loose from its mountings, and I imagined the bags of groceries or the dog or the 2-year-old child riding back there that would have become deadly projectiles.

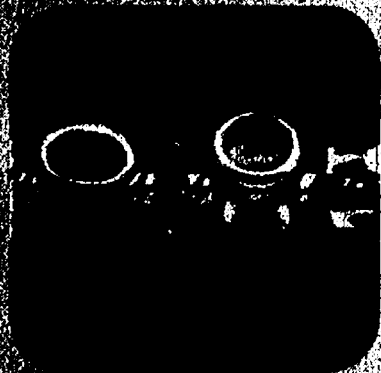
At the end, each student also took home a tire gauge to reinforce the importance of properly inflated tires, a T-shirt, and hopefully, a new respect for driving.

"This should be an essential part of driver's training," said George Falk, a senior. "I'll definitely apply this to all my driving."

"This saves lives - and it's fun, too."

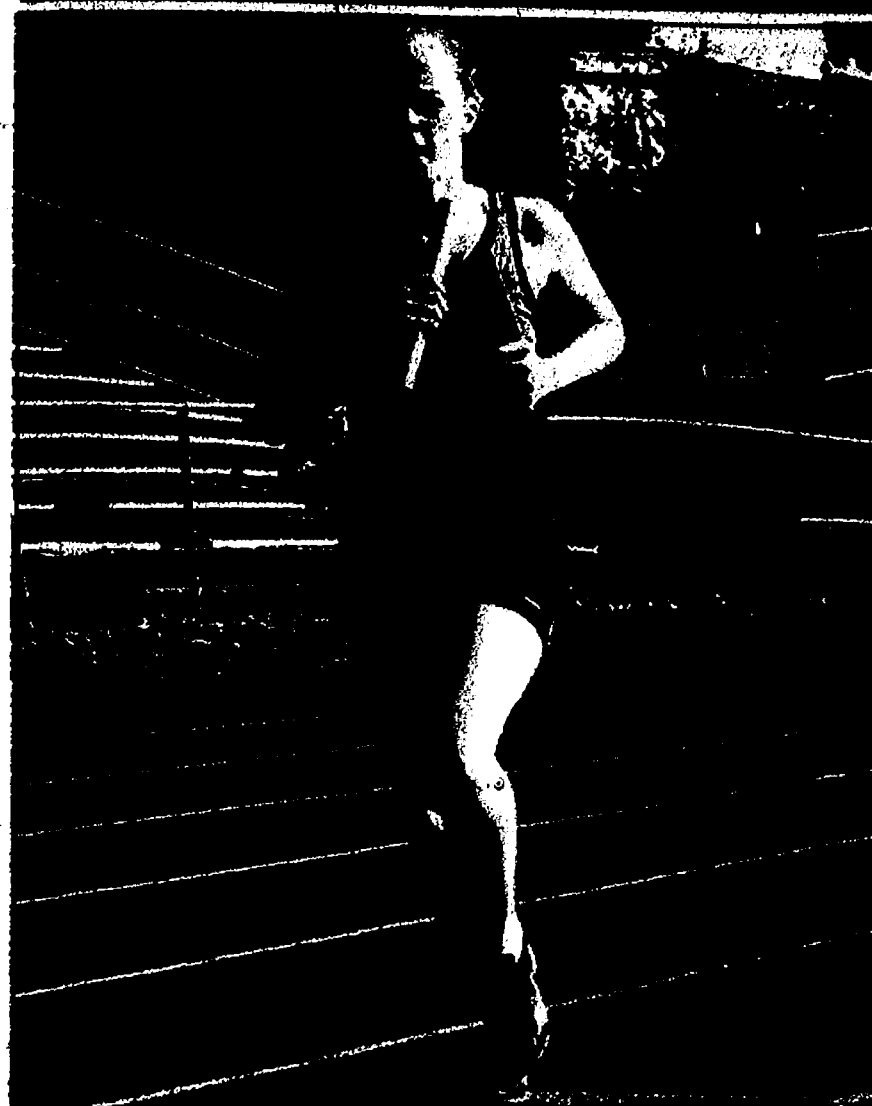

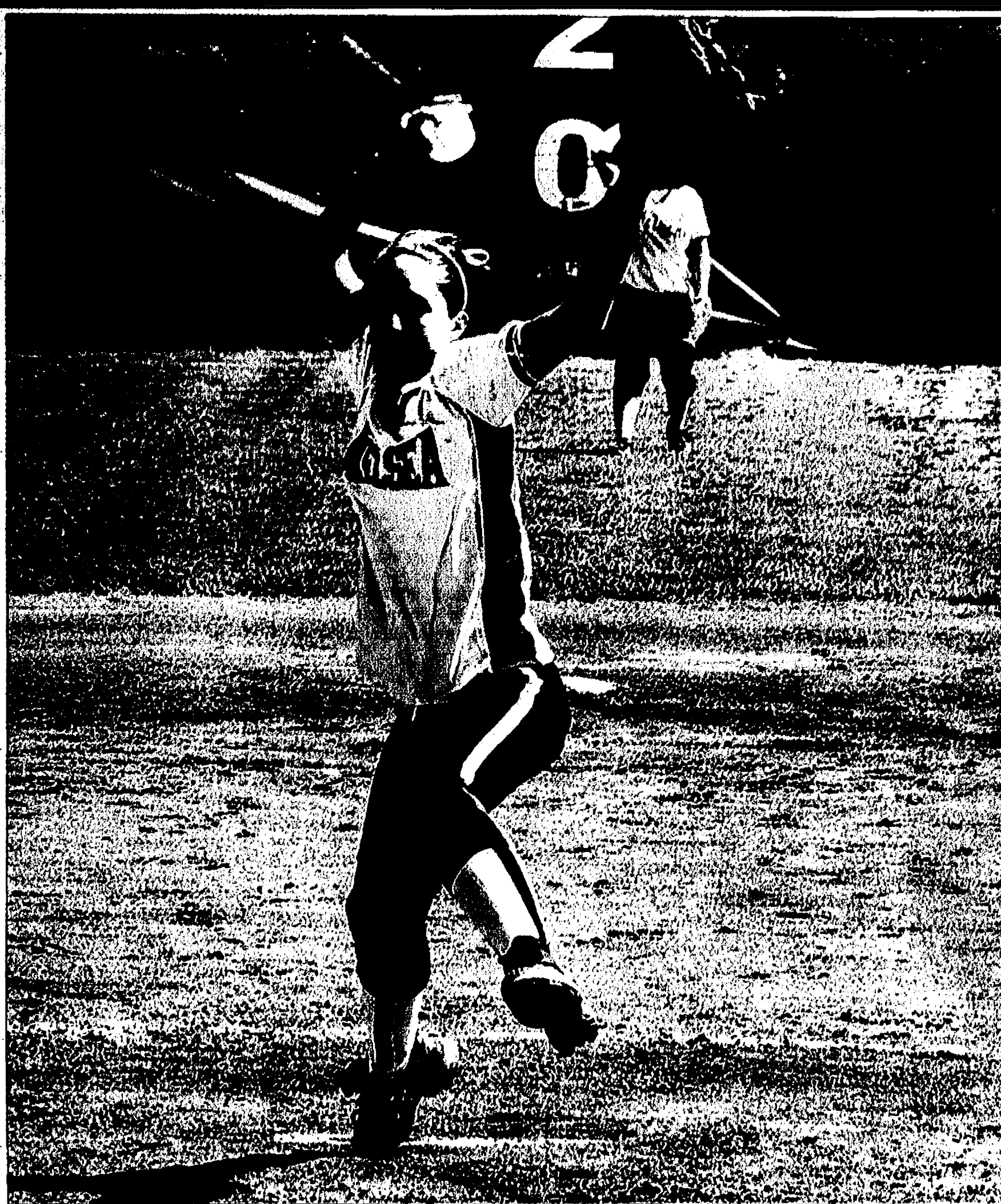

pound weight bracket, while also competing in the 55-pound weight class and performing well for the local club was Mason Trinkle.

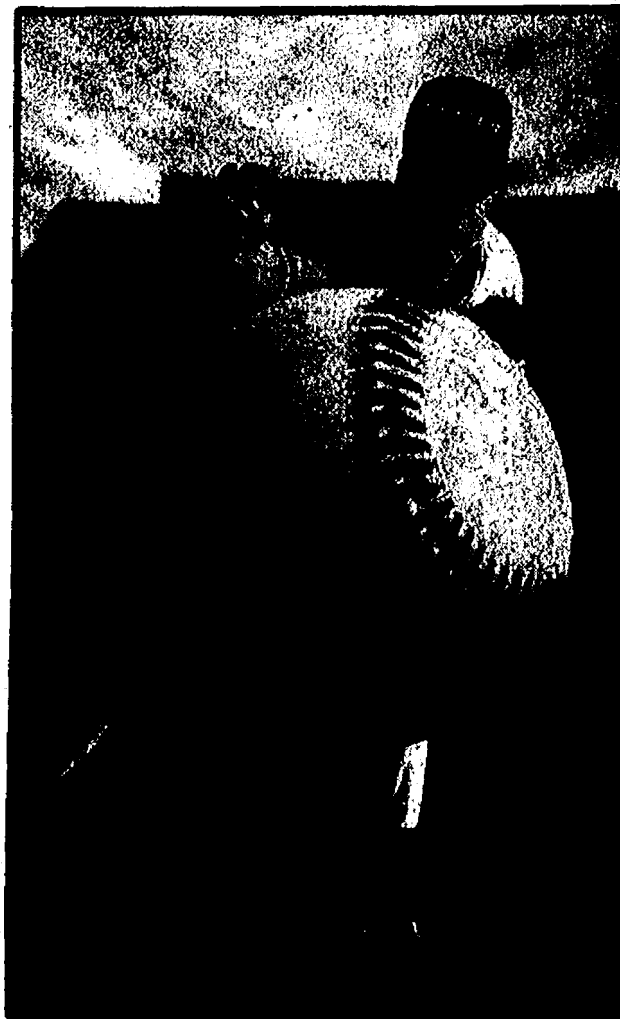

Kevin Rosentreter crossed the line second in the 400-meter run with a clocking of 53.4. McClendon was fourth in 54.2.

Brendan Smith finished second in the 800-meter run in 2:04. Riley Feeney was seventh in 2:13 for the Bulldogs.

Smith was second in the 1,600-meter run with a time of 4:38. Feeney was seventh in 4:53, while Nick Hewitt was eighth in 4:54.

The Chelsea foursome of Brad Ratliff, Jason Ratliff, Nick Hill and Ngo placed third in the 400-meter relay with a clocking of 45.1.

The 800-meter relay group of Jason Ratliff, Ngo, Carpenter and McClendon finished first in a season-best 1:32.8.

In the 1,600-meter relay,

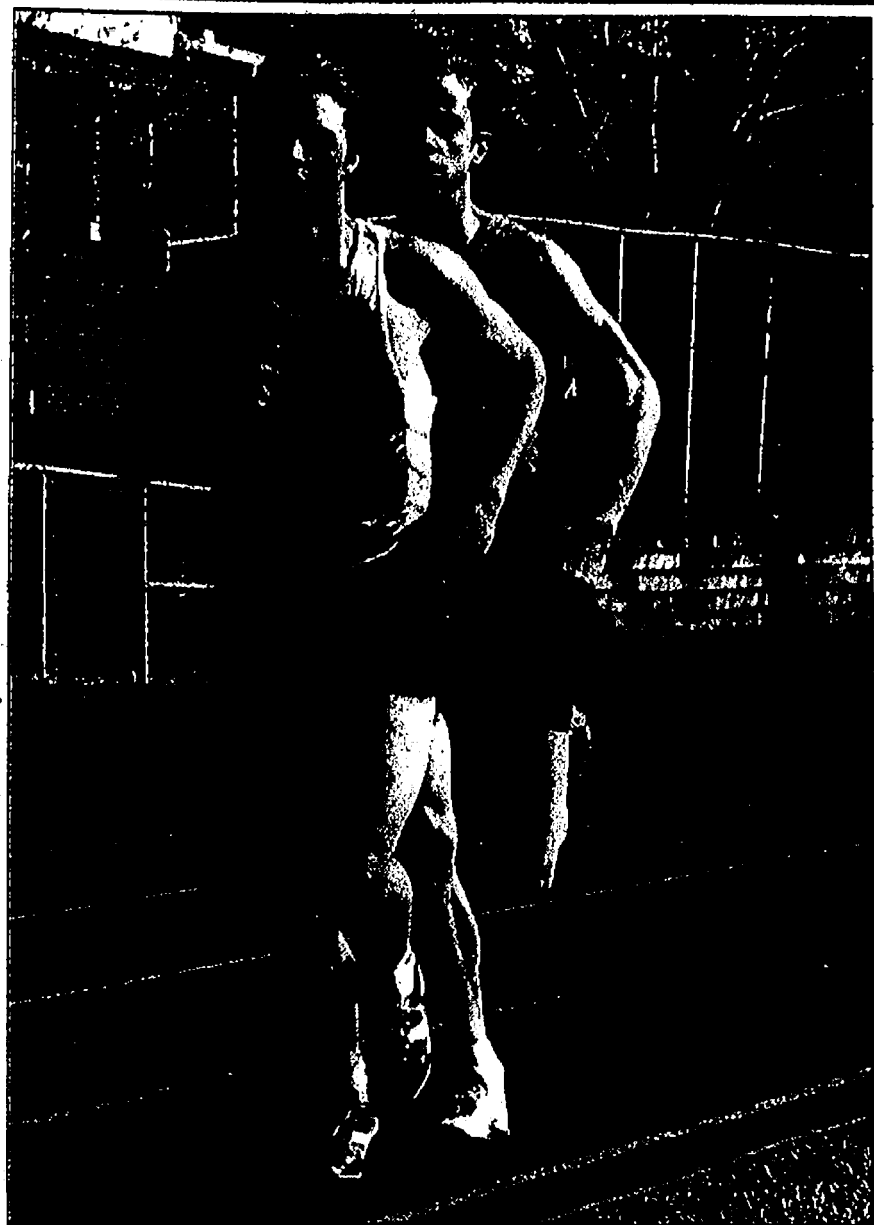

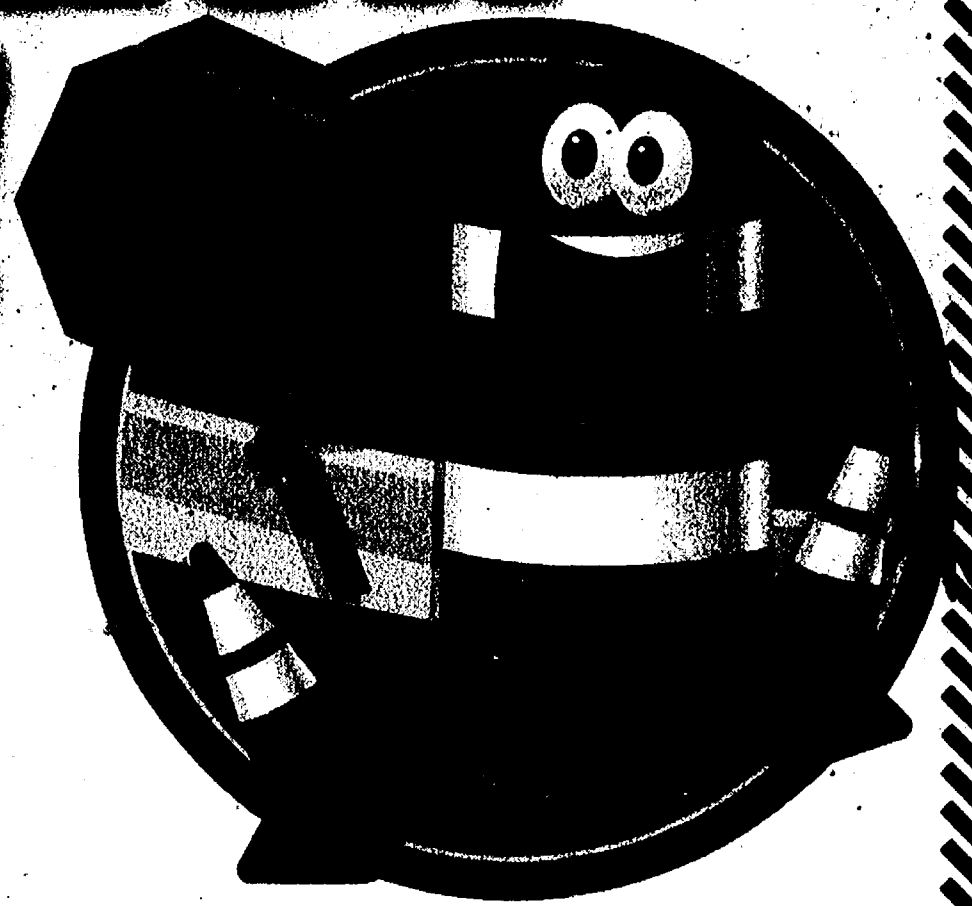

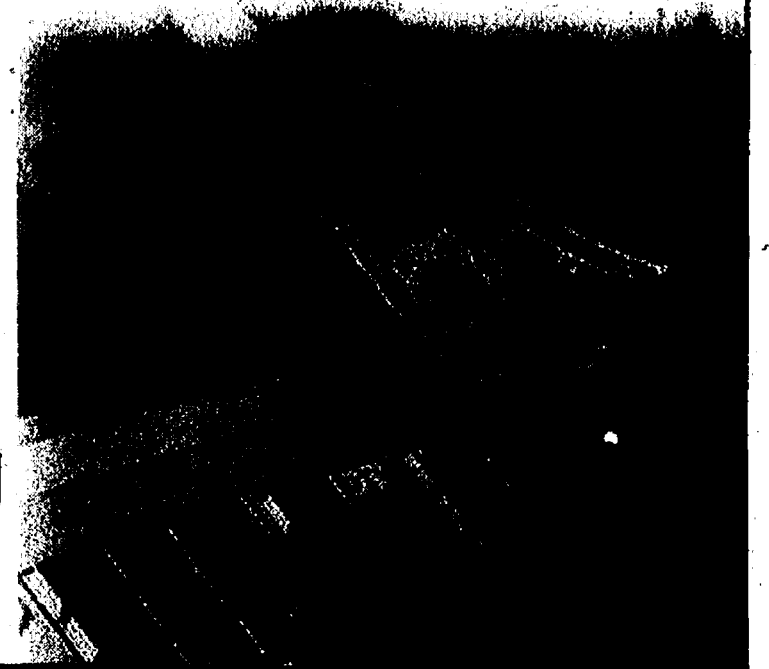

The Bulldogs next travel to Ann Arbor Pioneer for a game Thursday at 5:30 p.m.

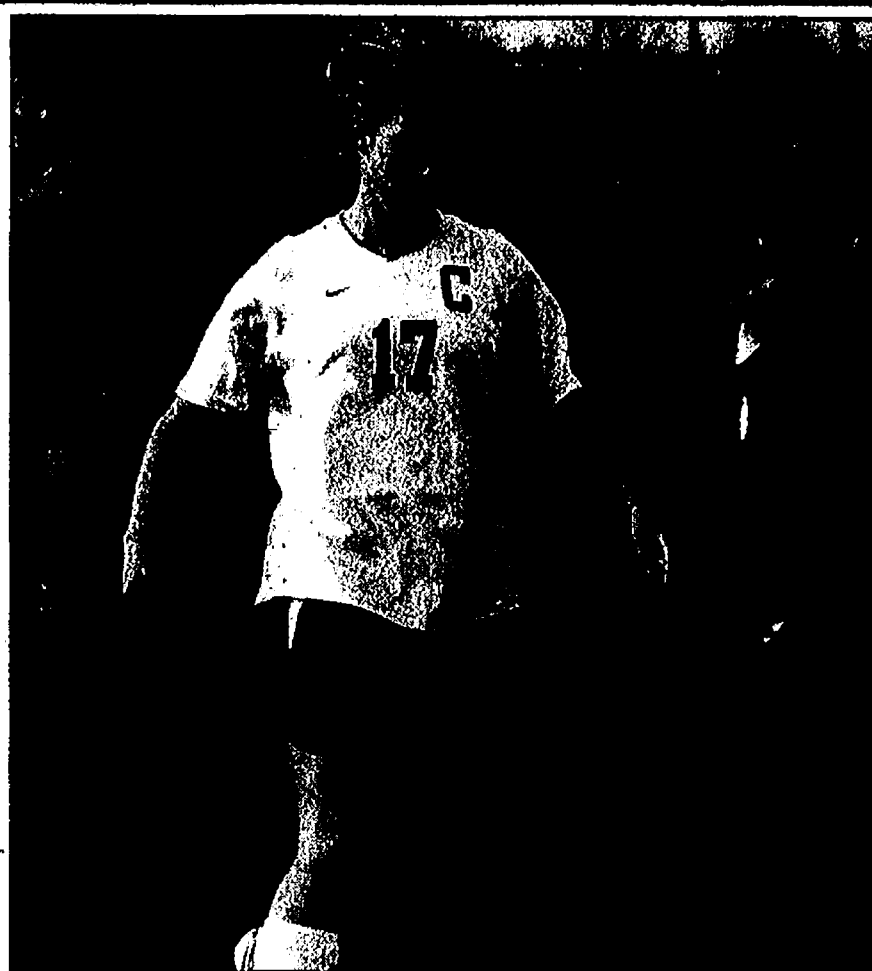

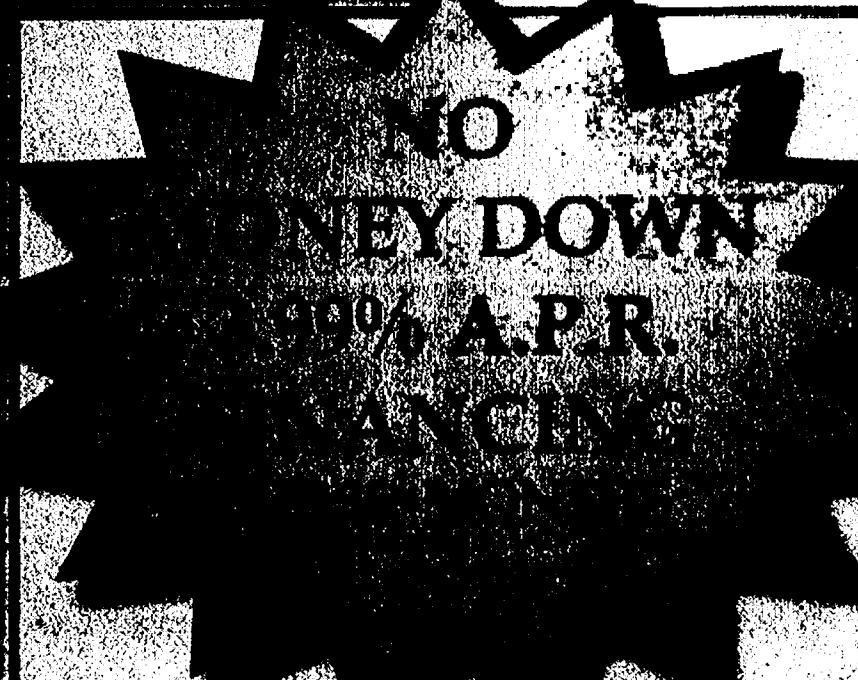

Last week, the Big Day Prep Showdown III announced its schedule for this season's prep football kickoff at Eastern Michigan University's Rynearson Stadium. The Detroit Metro Sports Commission organizes the event. Comcast Local will televise the games.

For the third year in a row, Chelsea will open its season in the prep football extravaganza. The first two years of the Showdown, the Bulldogs squared off against Novi splitting the series 1-1. This season, Chelsea (10-2 last year) will kickoff the year against Ypsilanti (8-2) 11:45 a.m. Aug. 25.

Advance one-day tickets to the Aug. 25 games are \$9 for adults and \$7 for students and provide admission for all contests. Children under 5-years-old are free. The Bulldogs-Braves contest is the first of four games Aug. 25. After Chelsea's match-up, Belleville (2-7) and Plymouth (3-6) will play at 2:30 p.m., followed by Canton (12-1) against Ohio power Toledo Central Catholic (9-1) at 5 p.m. and Milford (10-2) versus Walled Lake Central (9-3) at 8 p.m.

On Aug. 24, to open the Showdown, Fraser (1-8) will take on Warren Cousino (11-2) at 2 p.m., followed by Allen Park (10-2) versus Detroit Finney (7-3) and Livonia Franklin (5-4) against Westland John Glenn (3-6).

"Our goal for the Big Day Prep Showdown has always been to expand the event to a blend of not only exciting high school football, but also a celebration of the school communities," said Detroit Metro Sports Commission Executive Director Dave Beauchau in a press release. "The growth in 2007 to seven games on two days along with the new scholarship program continues the evolution to our long-range vision for the event."

Besides the gridiron contests, the Showdown will have game week activities including a V.I.P. preview

and player visits to local hospital pediatric centers.

"The 2007 Big Day Prep Showdown will again feature an exciting blend of traditional high school powers and emerging programs including seven MHSAA (Michigan High School Athletic Association) playoff teams from teams in four local counties and Ohio," Beauchau said. "We are also very pleased to have several schools who very much wanted to return to the event, including Allen Park and Chelsea who have been a part of the event from its inception."

The Showdown will include a student scholarship award program in partnership with Detroit Lions Charities. Awards in the amount of \$500 will be provided to one student from each school based on a blend of academic, civic and extra curricular activity.

Another element of this year's Showdown will be a Comcast Local contest for students from the 14 participating schools to win an opportunity to be a sideline reporter during the Aug. 25 slate of games.

What to do with 401(k) when you're on the move

If you contribute to your employer's 401(k) plan and leave your job, one of the biggest decisions you will make is what to do with the money in your plan.

Since the federal tax code was changed in 1978 to create 401(k) plans, many individuals have used this type of employer-sponsored defined-contribution plan to save money for retirement in a tax-deferred account. At the end of 2003, these plans had an estimated \$1.9 trillion in assets, according to the Employee Benefit Research Institute.

But in our increasingly mobile society, changing jobs is a real possibility. What should you do with the funds you've accumulated in your 401(k)? If you are going to a new job, you may be able to roll the money into your new employer's plan, but three other options may work better for the long term: withdraw some or all of it, leave it where it is, or roll the money over to an individual retirement account (IRA).

Although it might be tempting to withdraw your savings to have more cash on hand, you will owe income tax on the distribution.

Getting hit with taxes

Most employers are required to withhold 20 percent of the account's value when issuing you a check (if your tax rate is higher than 20 percent, you will owe the balance at tax time). And while there are some exceptions, if you are under age 59½, you will probably have to pay a 10 percent early distribution penalty as well.

If your employer sends you a check (and most will do this automatically if funds in your account are less than \$5,000), you'll have 60 days to deposit the check into an IRA and contribute the 20 percent that was withheld for income taxes to the account to qualify for a tax credit. Otherwise, the money is taxed as a lump-sum distribution, which could result in paying more taxes than necessary.

Depending on your age, it might be worthwhile for you to leave some, or all, of your money in your former employer's plan, provided the employer allows it. If you were 55 or older the year you left the company, and plan to tap into your 401(k) savings, you can avoid the 10 percent early-withdrawal penalty if the money is in your company plan.

Similarly, if you work past age 70½ and the money is in your former employer's plan, you can delay taking required minimum distributions as long as you are still working.

Rolling the money into an IRA

For many people, the best option is to roll the money into an IRA. When you leave your job and roll your 401(k) savings into an IRA, you can save money in a tax-deferred account that offers you greater investment and estate planning options. Benefits include:

- More investment options. In a 401(k) plan, the plan administrator chooses the investment options. With an IRA, you have the freedom to select from a range of investments, including mutual funds and individual stocks,

Dexter native helps create Constructive Eating utensils

One night not too long ago Jackie Malcolm couldn't sleep. So instead of dreaming with her eyes closed, she began dreaming with them open. And by the time the sun rose, Malcolm's dream was about to shine a whole new light on her life.

"The idea for the product was literally one of those middle of the night moments of clarity," said Malcolm, who graduated from Dexter High School in 1990 as Jackie Bohl. "I couldn't sleep having been woken too many times from kids who were not all sleeping through the night yet. Our older son, who was 2 and a half at the time, loved anything construction. I thought how he would love a spoon shaped like a front loader that actually incorporated the blade of the machine into the scoop of the spoon."

"We actually came up with the name Constructive Eating right then and there and thought we might be on to a cute idea."

Malcolm and her husband Carter have three kids, ages 2, 4 and 7. The couple has been active in the Dexter Co-op Nursery School with their two oldest. Neither one has a background in designing eating utensils. Jackie is a speech-language pathologist for Ann Arbor schools and Carter is an engineer at Sensicore in Ann Arbor.

But a good idea is just that — a good idea.

"Carter thought quickly of a fork-lift fork," Jackie said. "The bulldozer lent itself perfectly for a pusher. Both Carter and I separately sketched how we envisioned these machines and compared images, made changes and came up with a consensus."

Jackie said integrating the functional portions of the machines into the functional portion of the utensil was a must. "Our true personality differences were evident when I took as a next step cutting flora-foam into the shapes we'd drawn on paper," she said. "And Carter, being the engineer, visited local construction sites and measured various machines to be sure we had accurate scale models. He also discovered the 'boom' fork lift which lent itself better than a smaller lift to our designs."

Jackie kept her models in a

Tupperware container above the refrigerator for months while Carter pulled them out occasionally to help while designing on the computer. After nearly a year of design work, the Malcolms had enough to get prototypes made. There was a period of design changes and re-ordering of prototypes until the couple was happy with how they looked.

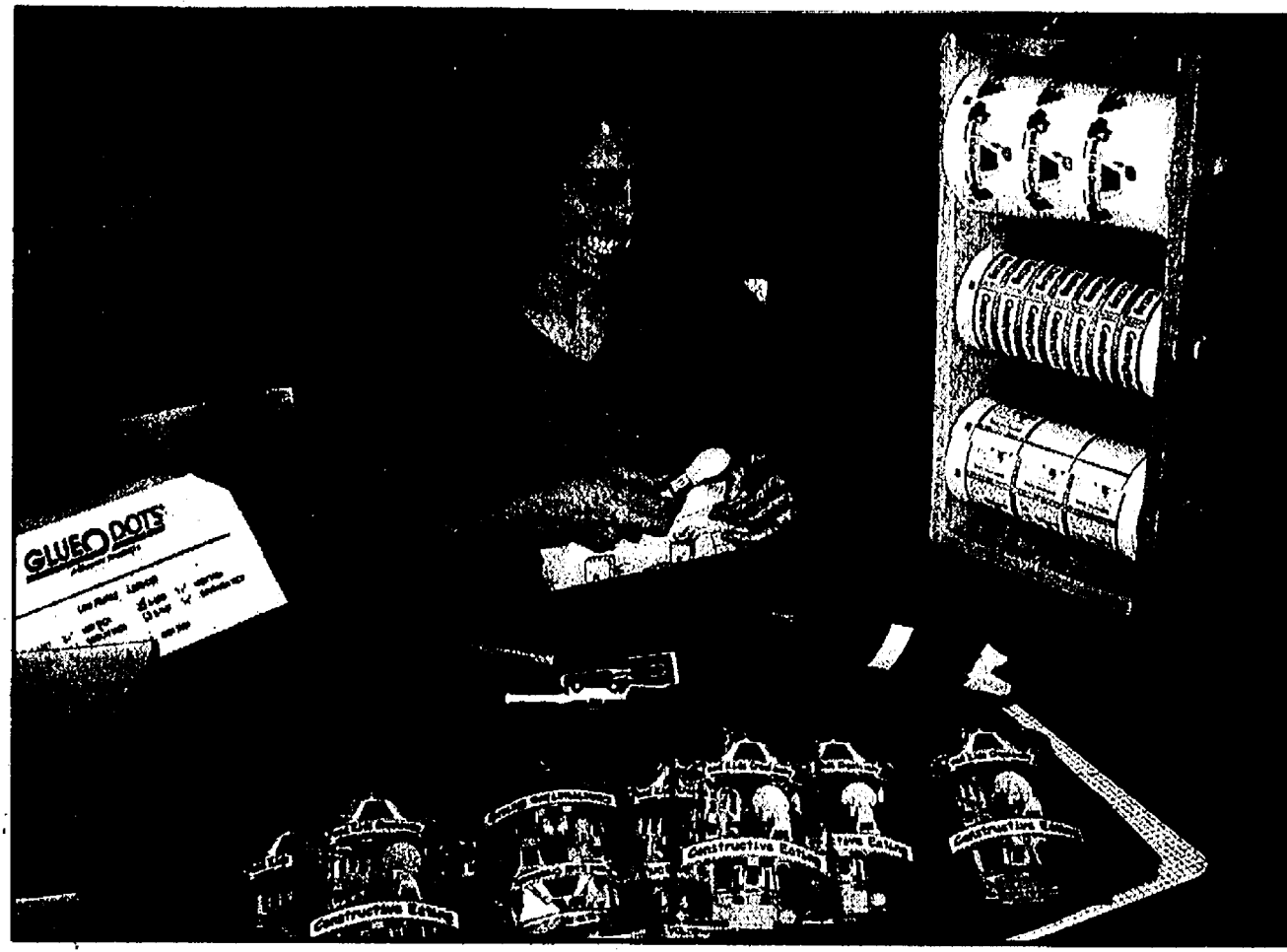
"Once we liked the designs we took them around to a select group of local shops (Christine's being one of them) to get feedback and to judge if there'd be an interest from retailers," Jackie said. "Our response was remarkably positive and we decided to pursue our idea further. It was at that point that we turned our efforts to writing patents, and reading Web site design books."

The Malcolms got quotes last August from possible tooling companies, chose materials and colors and ordered the tools and samples to be made.

"We had one set back when our Michigan-based company informed us that they had recently acquired shares in a China based facility and wanted our project to be the first they shipped out to this facility," Jackie said. "Several time set backs occurred and our original hope for a November launch, changed to December and then every month after until finally we received our first approved shipment in early February 2007."

The Malcolms have experienced plenty of positive responses to their products.

"They are very tactile and people love them once they pick them up," Jackie said. "One struggle is how to convey that effectively to out-of-town retailers. For being just



over a month into the sales side of things during a non-gift buying time of year, we are happy with how the business is progressing."

The company has supportive local retailers including Christine's (Dexter), John Leidy and Learning Express (Ann Arbor) and Quinn's Essentials (Depot Town). Other non-local outlets include The Wishing Well Gift Shop (Grand Rapids), The Fuscia Frog (Birmingham) and E.A.T. Gifts (Madison Ave, NY).

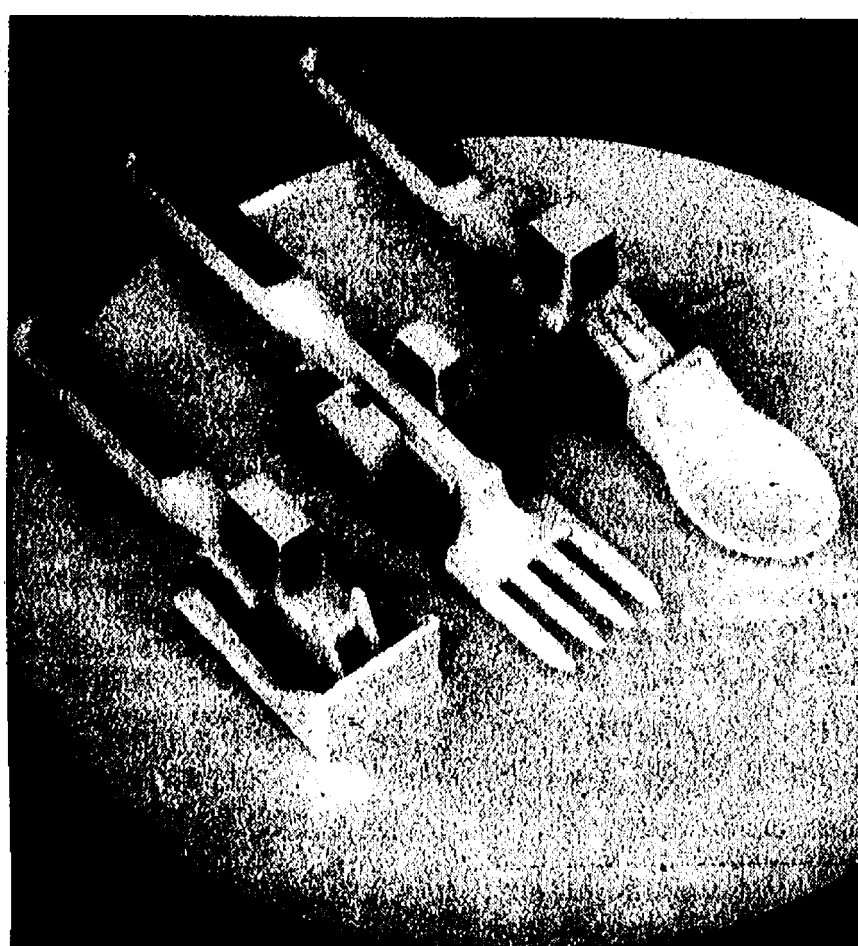
Jackie says the goal is to have fun with the business.

"For two years it was just something to do while we watched TV at night," she said. "Now that we're trying to share our 'little soldiers' as Carter calls them, with the outside, it's very important that we keep perspective that it's something fun we're introducing. We want our company to have a fun feel as we market a fun product."

"Sometimes it's hard not to feel rejected when the person on the other end isn't interested. But when they are, they really are. And it's very exciting to have someone share our enthusiasm."

The Malcolms don't pretend to be salespeople, even if they believe in what they're selling.

"Now that we're trying to market, it means going outside of my comfort zone," she said. "Convincing other people how cool your product is can be difficult. There's much more we know now, and much more we still need to learn as we go. Right now we are trying to learn the art of sales and how to convey to a shop that these are really different and will go over well if they have any adults with children in their lives walk in their door."

Communication is effective

Communication in business is perceived to be effective, based on a new survey.

Almost all (97 percent) senior executives and managers say their verbal communication to subordinates is effective, according to the worldwide survey of 188 senior executives and managers conducted by NFI Research.

However, when it comes to how well their bosses communicate to them, only 84 percent say that the communication from their bosses is effective.

More than a third (37 percent) of executives and managers say that their communication to subordinates is extremely effective, while 60 percent say it is somewhat effective.

Fewer than a tenth of executives and managers say that communication to subordinates is somewhat ineffective while no respondents say it is extremely ineffective.

"Being clear, consistent

and direct in communication is critical in business today, so that strategy is better tied to execution," said Chuck Martin, chief executive officer of NFI Research.

A little more than a quarter (27 percent) of executives and managers say that the communication from their bosses is extremely effective, while 57 percent say it is somewhat effective.

Roughly a tenth of executives and managers say that the communication from their bosses is somewhat

ineffective while 4 percent say that it is extremely ineffective.

"My direction can only be as clear as the direction provided to me in instances where I am directing information from a superior," said one survey respondent.

There were no great differences in responses between senior executives and managers.

Volunteers give and gain

Helping out at Chelsea Retirement Community is a win-win situation

When Debbie Thompson says her volunteer service involves a two-way street, she doesn't mean driving down West Middle Street to reach Chelsea Retirement Communities (CRC).

"It's so rewarding to help others that I really get as much as I give," says Thompson, who began volunteering at the CRC four years ago. "It brings a lot of joy to brighten someone's day."

Thompson, a mother of three, conducts interpretive tours of CRC's Heritage Room museum for staff members, visitors and residents. She is part of a brigade that enlisted to share time, talents and thoughtfulness in countless ways. About 275 volunteers help professional staff provide entertainment, trips, classes, activities, library services, an ice cream parlor, a general merchandise store, a resale shop and reception desk assistance.

Trained volunteers include relatives of residents and staff, retired CRC employees and Washtenaw County retirees who want to become acquainted with a community that may become their home. Help isn't just contributed by outsiders, either. About 100 residents perform assigned duties in the campus stores, library, lobby desk and other areas, says Hazel Barr, an 11-year administrative staff member who serves as volunteer coordinator.

"Our volunteers contribute much more than hours and helping hands," Barr says. "They reinforce the personal attention each resident receives. Time is a precious gift, and these men and women give generously."

Volunteers Week event

John Thorhauer, president and CEO of United Methodist Retirement Communities (UMRC), was among the administrators who honored Thompson and more than 150 others at a Volunteers Tea on April 19 in the main dining room at Dancey House.

"These dedicated individuals perform vital roles in upholding our mission of compassionate care and enhancing the daily quality of life for residents," Thorhauer said. "Some have

helped for several decades and all of them are important members of our communities."

Local support is as lasting and sturdy as UMRC, which operates CRC and Boulevard Temple Rehabilitation and Nursing Center in Detroit. The tradition began with a gift of \$10,000 and 33 acres in 1906 by Chelsea stove manufacturer Frank Porter Glazier and his mother, Emily, for the campus that has expanded dramatically during its first century.

In a similar spirit, Methodist congregations around the state brought fresh produce and home-canned fruits, vegetables and jams to UMRC each fall from 1942-54 for a Harvest Home Ingathering. This generous spirit continues today with monetary donations by individuals, churches and organizations to the UMRC Heritage Foundation. These gifts support the Benevolent Care Fund which provides financial assistance to UMRC residents who have exhausted their resources.

For their part, these hundreds of volunteers bring friendship, music, computer skills and even household pets to CRC. Every Thursday morning before lunch, an audience gathers at the Dancey House living room for music by the Golden Years Band, made up of two Ann Arbor volunteers and singer Edythe Scovill, a CRC resident. Another resident, Ruth Curnow, works at the main reception desk and at age 95 continues to lead a daily exercise class.

Four-legged "volunteers"

A few volunteers bring friendly visitors on a leash—"therapy dogs" that provide a cherished touchstone for animal lovers. Thompson previously brought her family's dog for chair-side visits with residents eager to stroke its coat and earn a wagging tail in return.

"I never could tell who benefited more," she said.

Volunteers also accompany group outings, escort guests on campus, present bingo, Jeopardy and Wheel of Fortune competitions and operate a resale shop where residents and the public can find gently used clothes or household items from local donors. Proceeds from that store and a volunteer-staffed Variety Shop selling snacks, cards, stamps, toiletries and handmade crafts go to the

Resident Council for purchases of library books and other items.

"Volunteers do fun things and can switch between assignments to learn new skills and make new

friends," explains Barr, the coordinator. "Everyone in the program has direct contact with residents." Each applicant is interviewed,

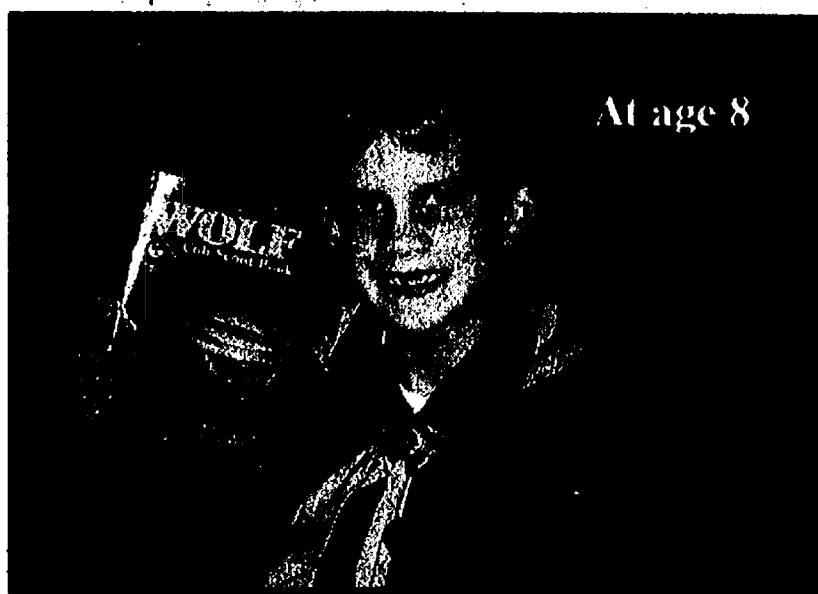
Climbing the ranks

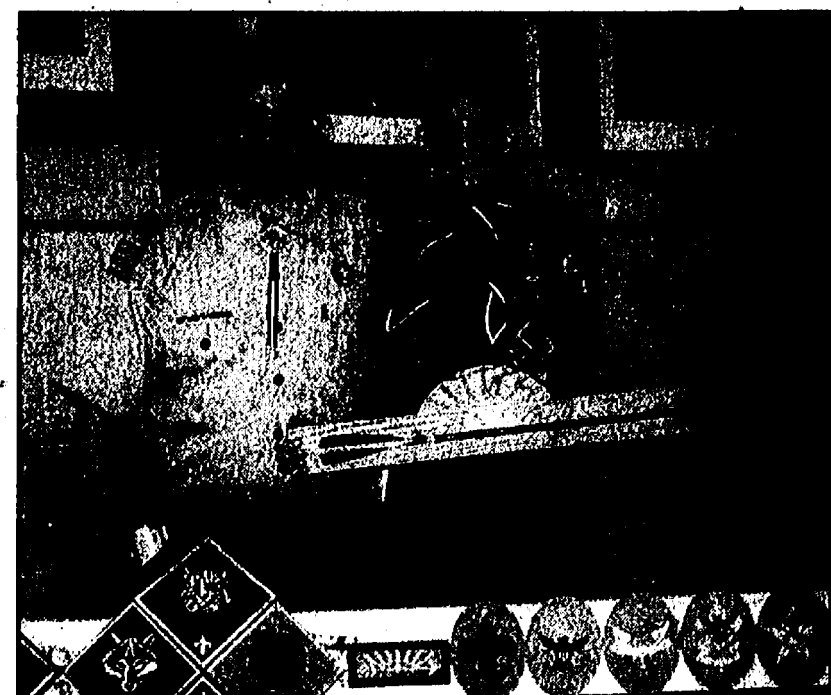

which can help with proper portfolio diversification. You can also easily change how your money is invested, and you may have the option — depending on your income — of converting a Traditional IRA to a Roth IRA.

Flexibility in estate planning. With an IRA, you can name more than one beneficiary, have contingent beneficiaries, and in most cases, name someone who isn't your spouse as a beneficiary — estate planning techniques that some 401(k) plans don't allow. In addition, beneficiaries of an IRA aren't required to take a lump-sum distribution and pay taxes at that time, so the money can continue to grow tax-deferred as an inherited IRA or a "Stretch" IRA.

Immediate access to your money. There are no restrictions on when you can take money out of your IRA; the only drawback is that you will pay federal and state income taxes on the withdrawal, as well as (in most cases) a 10 percent early-distribution penalty if you are under age 59.

Penalty-free withdrawals. In certain circumstances, you may be exempt from the 10 percent early distribution penalty. For example, if withdrawals are used for higher education expenses for yourself, your spouse, or your children or grandchildren. You can also make penalty-free withdrawals (\$10,000 lifetime maximum) from your IRA to put toward a principal residence that is a first-time home purchase for you or your spouse, child, grandchild or ancestor.

If your 401(k) assets are invested in your employer's highly appreciated stock, you might consider taking a distribution of all or part of the stock and transferring the

remainder of your account to a rollover IRA. With this approach, you would only pay income taxes on the cost basis of the stock when it was acquired in the plan. Taxes on the amount that the stock has appreciated are due when the stock is sold, and that appreciation could be taxed at the long-term capital-gains rate — which might be lower than your income-tax rate.

If you roll money from your 401(k) over to an IRA, make sure it's a direct trustee-to-trustee rollover from your employer's plan to the IRA account you have opened at a financial institution. This way, you won't be required to pay federal and state income taxes on the transfer; taxes will be due only when you withdraw the money.

If you open a new IRA

when you roll the money over, you may be eligible to transfer the money to another IRA or to your new employer's 401(k) plan.

Weighing these options can be complicated, and your financial advisor can be an invaluable resource as you consider the advantages and disadvantages of each approach.

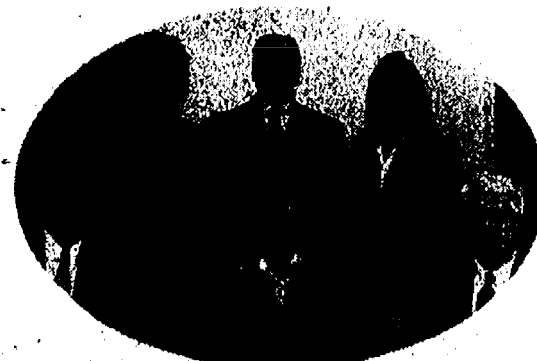



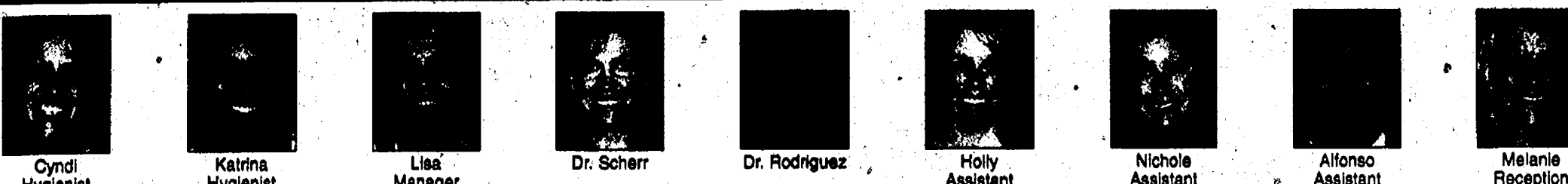

Students participate in Project Red

Most adults know food and material for clothing don't magically appear pre-packaged at the store, but are grown or raised exclusively on farms.

But do their children? Michigan State University extension agents and Washtenaw County Farm Bureau officials want to ensure students make that connection. So 15 years ago, they began Project Rural Education Days, a farming workshop that introduces Washtenaw County third-graders to the products of local agriculture and natural resources.

About 1,800 third-graders from 21 elementary schools in the county attended farming workshops last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the Washtenaw County Farm Council Grounds near Saline. There, they learned that food and many other commodities come from farms.

"Children are so far removed from the food chain, that they don't know where food comes from. I hope this will help them understand," said Bill Ames, who dressed as President Abraham Lincoln during the event.

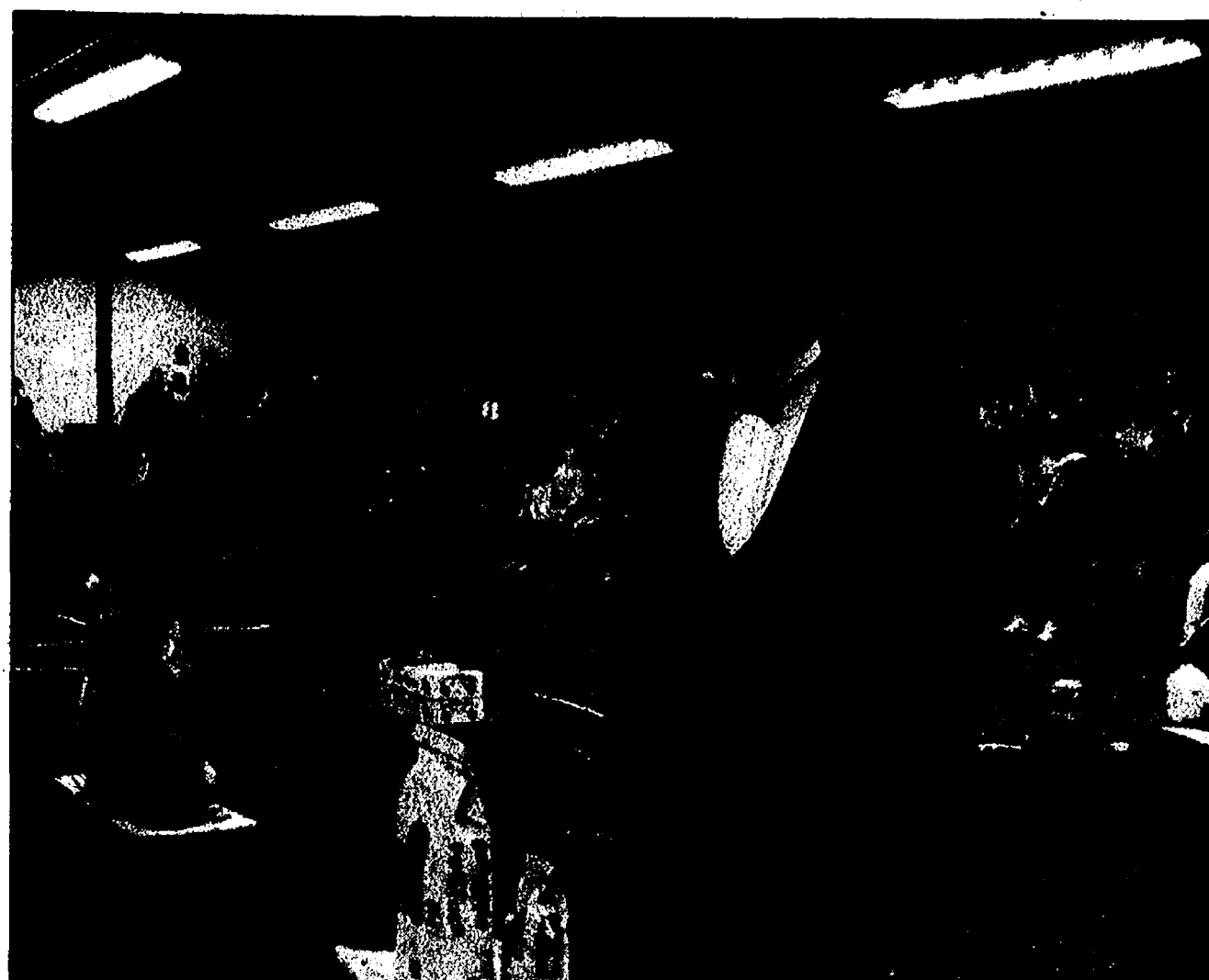
Nancy Thelen, county extension director, said the program provides educational materials about the farming industry to the teachers, so the students have a chance to continue learning when they return to their classrooms.

Each student also gets a white pine seedling to take home and plant, she said.

As the children from various school districts gathered in bleachers, they saw a group of products arranged in the center of a painted outline of the state of Michigan, each of which represented items produced by farming.

Ames, wearing the characteristic beard, black stove pipe hat and a black suit, told the students that when a glacier carved out the Great Lakes that surround Michigan, it created a unique environment that was ideal for farming.

He also told them that the farming industry in Michigan produces 200 different kinds of commodities, and brings in \$5.3 billion a year. There are 53,000 farms in the state that provide everything from vegetables, livestock, wool and dairy to corn for biodiesel. "There is only one state with more commodities - California," said Ames, who

added that the 3,288 miles of shoreline also help make Michigan a beautiful place to visit.

Ames also stressed the important role played by bees in pollinating farm crops.

"If we lose those, we lose the rest of our commodities," he said.

Becky Mann, a third-grade teacher at Wylie Elementary School in Dexter, took her students to listen to a discussion on planting corn by Mike Score, an MSU extension agent.

Some of her students later said they liked the tractors best.

"All of it was cool, but I liked the tractors," said Mike Bradshaw of Dexter.

As rain beat on the tin roof overhead, making it difficult to hear at times, Score demonstrated in the dirt floor how to plant corn.

"You dig a trench every 6 inches with a trowel, plant the corn, and then the seed gets wet and swells, and the sun comes out and makes it grow," Score said.

He also showed the students how a tall tractor, worth \$85,000, and a corn planter, valued at \$23,000, on loan from the Horning and Huehl farms in Freedom Township and Chelsea, respectively, could help farmers plant many acres faster and more efficiently, but with greater expense.

"When you plant a big farm,

you have to have help," Score said.

At harvest time, he pointed out that the combine, at a cost of \$150,000 on loan from George and Jan Schnierle, also proved invaluable, but expensive.

"That's really how we raise corn," Score said.

He gave the students a pop quiz on corn commodities in which every answer was corn. As the students caught on, they yelled, "Corn," louder and louder.

"Not everything is made of corn, but a lot of things are," Score said.

At the end of the lecture, students asked questions, such as why tractors were so expensive, and what size the tires were, learning that the tractor's eight tires were 5-foot-10-inches tall each, and the tractor was made of many moving parts.

At the next stop, Jennie Breuninger of Dexter told the students about her dairy farm, which milks 200 cattle. Each

cow gives about 10 gallons of milk per day, she said.

"The only way for a cow to give milk is for her to calf and become a mommy," Breuninger said.

Calves weigh 80 pounds at birth. They are separated from their mothers early, and are raised with other calves of their age. Cows are fed on a balanced nutrition mixture of haylage, which contains alfalfa, silage, corn, cotton and soybean.

Conor VanDusen of Dexter said he liked learning about the cows best.

"And how they have four stomachs. I'm getting hungry just thinking about that," he said.

Elaine Feldcamp of Manchester said that every year they have a special presentation on a particular type of farming. This year, they

chose to teach about dairy production.

Students next visited the commodities building, where they could learn about and get samples of popcorn, apples, ice cream, honey, potato chips, dried blueberries and cherries, milk and wool, all created within the state.

"Nothing is wasted, with biodiesel. Everything gets used ... And it's renewable," said Courtney Henry, who gave information about the product, which has been sold through her company, Wacker Oil and Propane, since 2000.

Henry said the fuel could be used in any vehicle that uses regular diesel.

Students later learned about soil types, and also got a chance to see up close various livestock from local farms, which had been brought to stables at the grounds.

VILLAGE OF DEXTER NOTICE OF VOLUNTARY SUMMER WATER RESTRICTIONS

Dear Valued Water Consumer:

In an effort to reduce instances of low water pressure, conserve water resources, ease peak hour water demands, and improve the operation of the overall water system, the Village of Dexter is implementing voluntary outdoor water use restrictions starting Friday, May 6, 2007.

The Village of Dexter is asking residents to voluntarily limit outdoor water usage to odd/even days. Residents and businesses with odd numbered addresses (i.e. ending in 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9) are asked to do outdoor watering only on odd numbered dates. Likewise, those with even numbered addresses (i.e. 0, 2, 4, 6, or 8) should water lawns on even numbered dates.

In addition, we are asking that village residents voluntarily limit outdoor water use between the hours of 5 a.m. to 9 a.m. Water consumption is often at its peak during this time and observing water use restrictions enables customers to continue receiving an even distribution of water with minimal low-pressure problems. A simple adjustment of the start time of your irrigation system control can achieve this.

Following voluntary restrictions is a good way to help conserve water resources. By following the odd/even day water cycle the Village of Dexter can level out high water demand and maintain adequate pressure during high use.

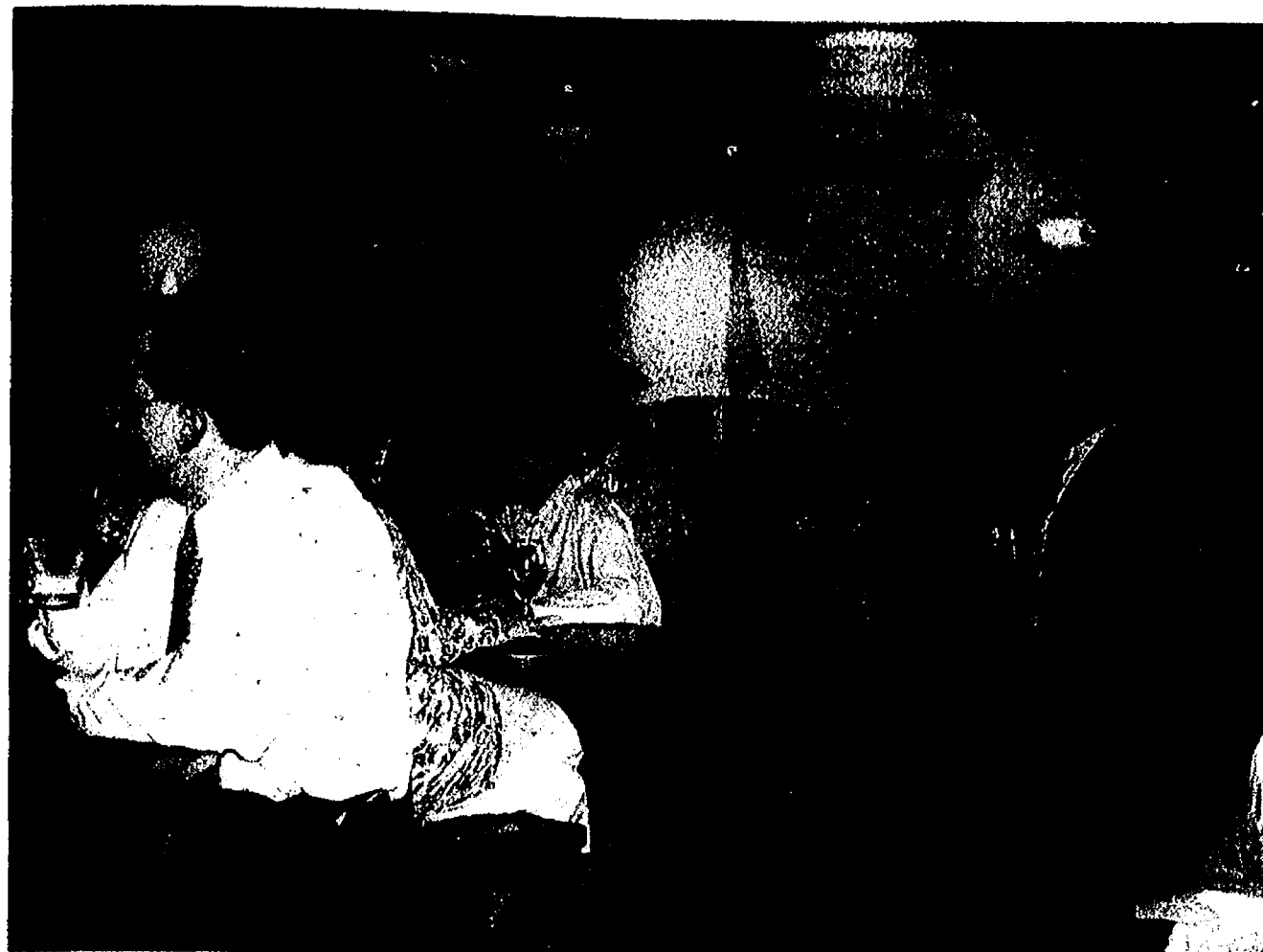

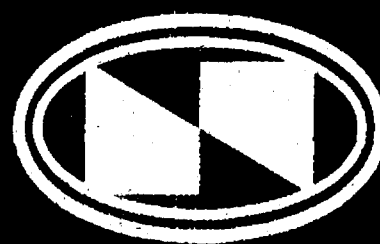

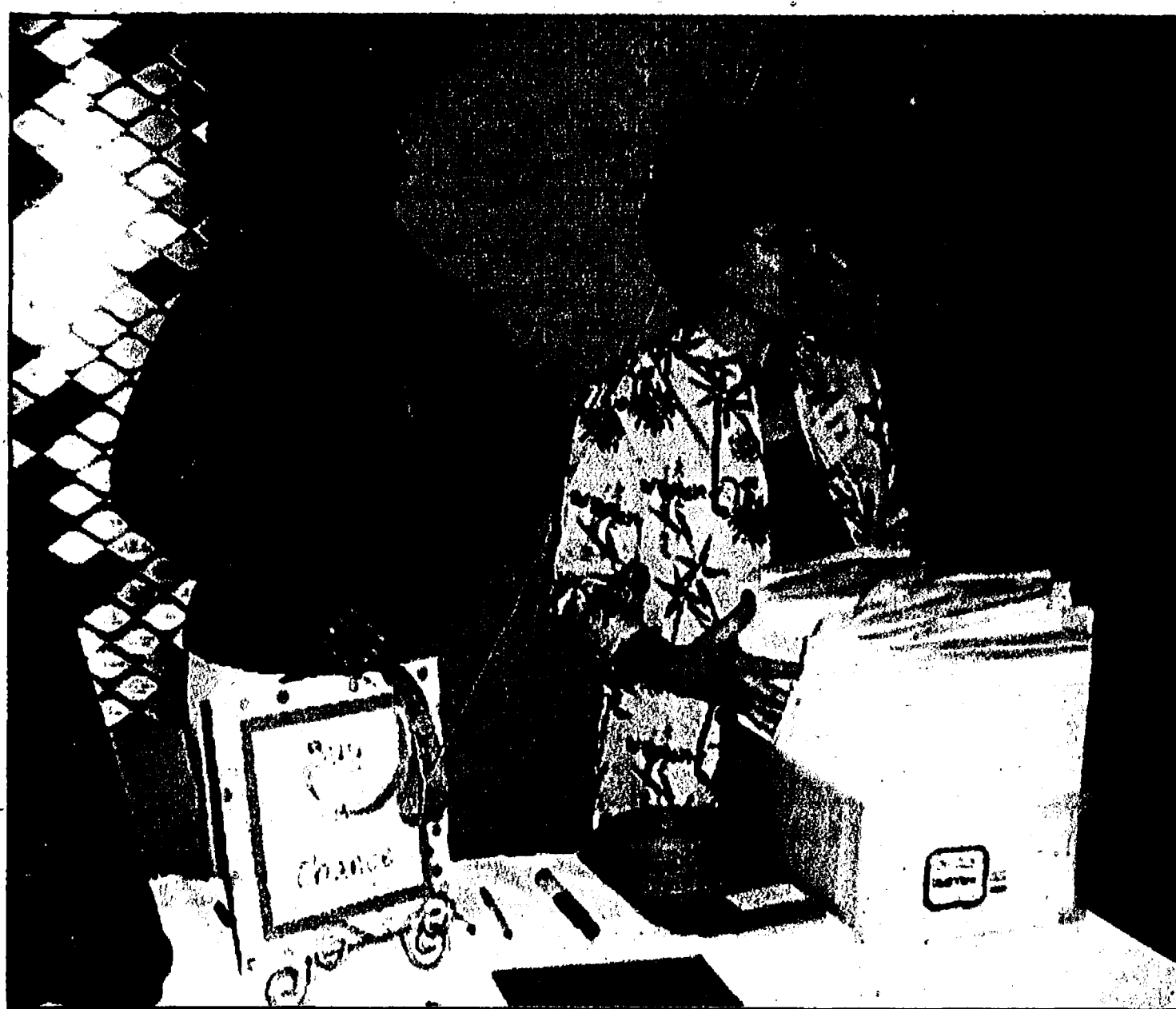
Brian Braun from Braun and Helmer did the live auction for the evening.

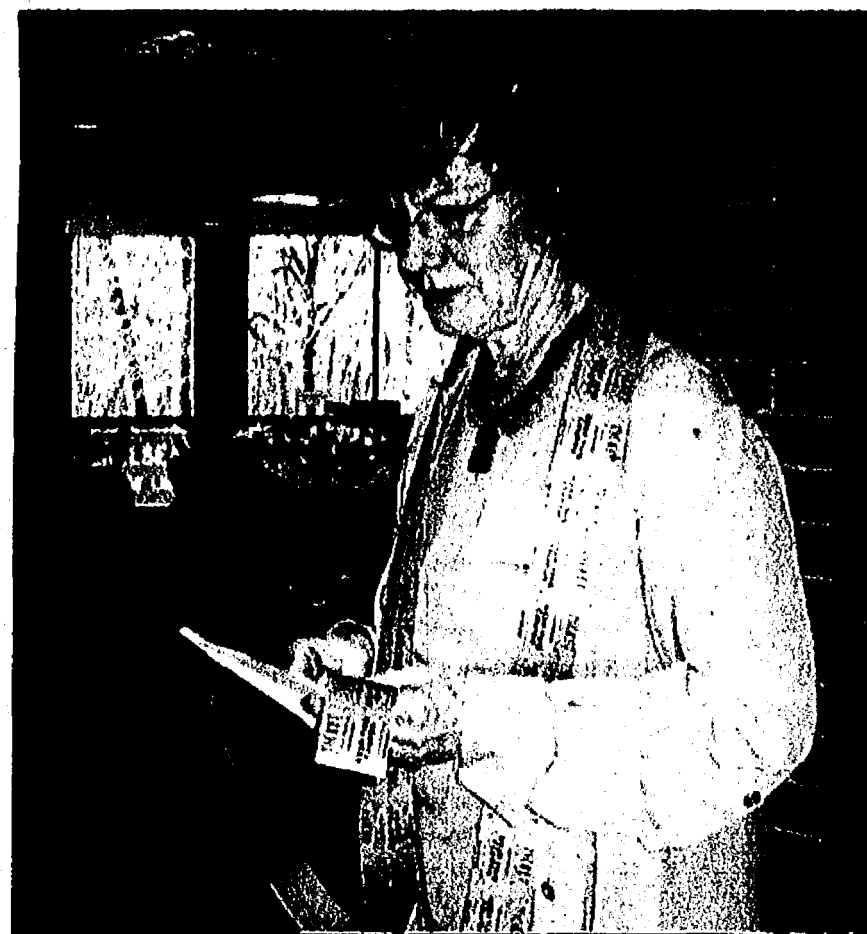

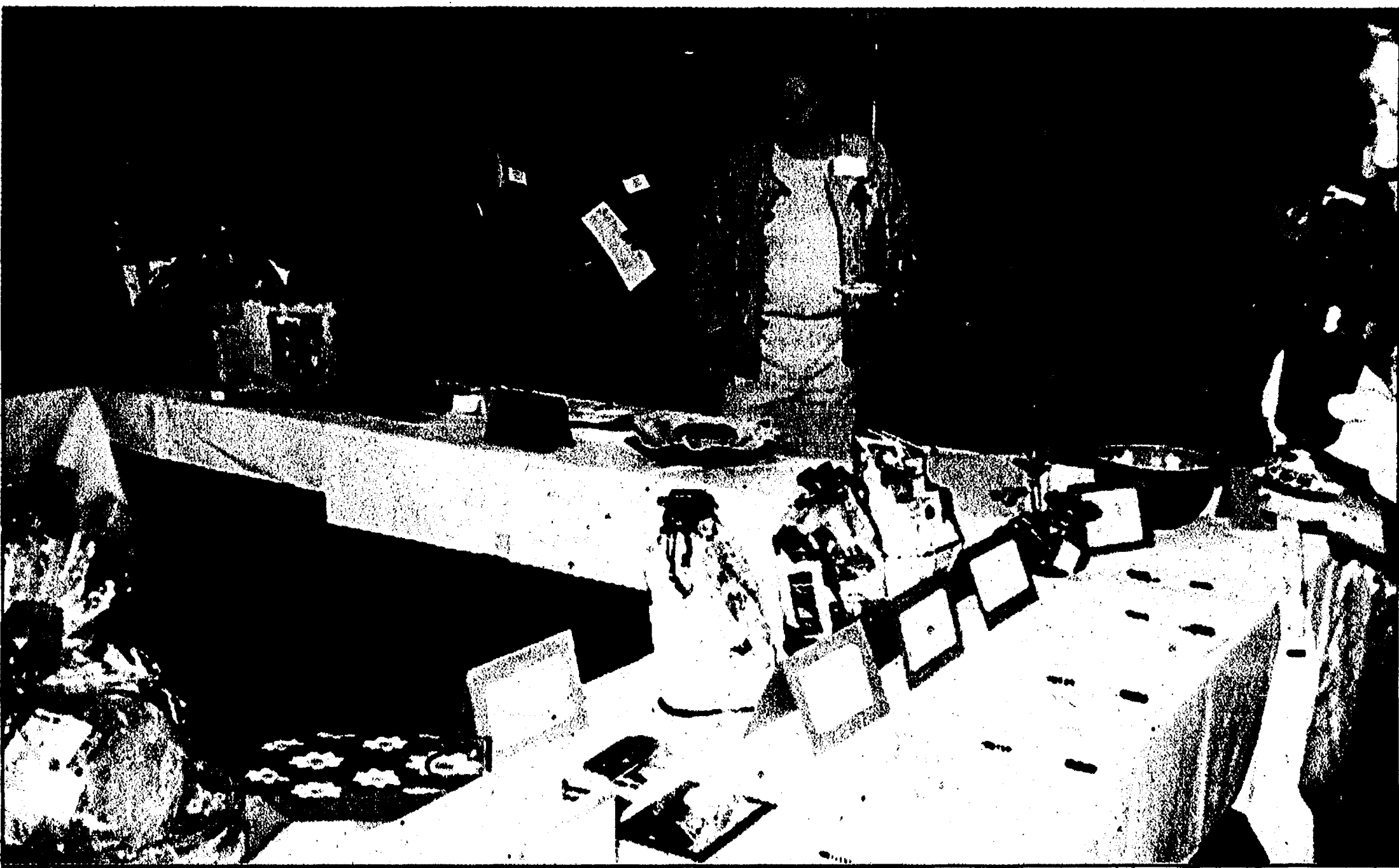

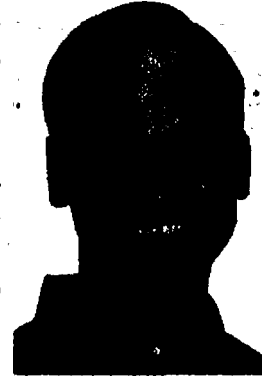
Virginia Tech tragedy is a call to Christ-followers everywhere

How sad last month was, and thus this month is. My prayers are with all the students, parents, faculty and victims at Virginia Tech.

As awful as it is, it's pretty amazing it doesn't happen more often. Look at what we feed ourselves and our young adults. Listen to the violent, nihilistic, (and tragic) lyrics of an awful lot of million-seller songs espoused by the recording industry and purchased by the public. There is obvious-

ly something kids are relating to in those lyrics, and casting of vision going on. And it ends with death.

When such a great amount of TV and internet media today shows people as objects, life as nothing more than the canvas on which our carnal pleasures are met, and feelings as the sadistic rulers of our lives, it's no wonder life itself gets eclipsed.

After the Columbine shootings, I wondered how many good, kind, and healthy contacts would it have taken to prevent such a heartbreaking tragedy. I realized then even the "good" kids only talk to other good kids. Who (besides the electronic media and Madison Avenue) will rise above the pre-established cliques, trends, and prejudice to reach out to the isolated, disconnected, and lonely people? How many of us are willing to talk with, let alone relate to, the social out-

casts among us? Consider this a call to Christ-followers everywhere. We worship a God who did this for us, and demonstrated it through His Son, Jesus, who reached out to the least, the lost, and the lonely.

You may be doing more good than you know.

Coupons

Hundreds of dollars worth of coupons are available in newspapers every week

There's a bargain to be had at every turn in grocery stores, from in-store weekly sales to the \$3.6 billion consumers in the United States use in coupons every year.

Hundreds of dollars in coupons come with the newspaper every week, and there are growing availability to customize coupon packages through the Internet.

In fact, there are more than \$300 billion in coupons offered to consumers, which come out to just over 1 percent of coupons used.

"There is a lot of skepticism and cynicism, 'Here's the coupon, now how much did they raise the price?' That's a question you don't want to have to ask," said Michael Bernacchi, marketing professor at University of Detroit Mercy. "But if you can get somebody to use a coupon and somehow keep them buying, and do this three or four successive times, then you might have a consumer forever."

"But, how much is a coupon worth (for the manufacturer) if they're not using the product regularly? It's good for the consumer, but maybe not so good for the company."

Bernacchi said the coupons people get in newspapers and in the mail need to be sorted and categorized, a task that many aren't willing to undertake, unless the savings are big enough. It's just an activity that many seem to avoid.

"At one time, it was the only big incentive, but coupons are now viewed as old world," he said. "Do they fit in the Internet age? Can you get them on the Internet, yeah, but the theory is that grandma and grandpa use coupons."

John Morgan, executive director of the Association of Coupon Professionals, said studies have found that coupon use doesn't seem to be age related. There is use among all age groups.

"The fact that it's out there on Sunday, and it's a product you use, you get a bargain, and the marketers get enough of a bounce of people who buy the product, they win, and there's also the advertising value. People are looking at them," Morgan said. "I have three kids, and I sit for 20 minutes and get five to 10 coupons, and I save maybe \$5 a week. There are others that save \$20 to \$30 out there too. But it's fun to go through the Sunday paper and the ads, and that's just part of the Sunday morning ritual. It's not drudgery."

Bernacchi pointed out that may be true, but some age groups might use coupons infrequently but still be counted as coupon users. The studies don't identify those people as just occasional users.

But, many companies are making it easier than ever to receive discounts on their merchandise. They're listing toll-free numbers on the packaging and as many as 35 percent will send coupons upon request, according to the Coupon Council of the Promotion Marketing Association, the trade association representing the promotion and integrated marketing industry.

"The 800 number is the important thing, because these are the products that you're going to buy," Bernacchi said. "You're already buying them — no searching, no buying things you don't need."

And as a nod to younger consumers, Internet sites also are popping up all over, and most retailers have coupons and coupon mailing list features on their Web sites.

The Coupon Council also says coupon-clipping can be a family affair, and serve as a math and savings lesson for children. You can involve them in the process and let them "earn" the coupon savings in lieu of an allowance.

"It's never too early to start teaching children about the value of money and importance of saving," said Charles Brown, co-chair of the PMA Coupon Council. "I've used coupons to turn everyday shopping trips with my twins into great learning experiences and quality time spent together."

They point to budgeting, goal setting, math skills, memory training and organizational skills children can learn.

Teachers looking to incorporate coupons in the classroom can find an interactive lesson plan that can be modified for a variety of age groups at www.couponmonth.com.

Lesson-planning tips include forming breakout groups of students to simulate a supermarket shopping experience and simple ways to increase the level of difficulty for each assignment.

Plus, points out PMA Coupon Council Co-Chair Matthew Tilley, people report saving 11.5 percent on their grocery bills with coupons.

Some quick suggestions by the Coupon Council to make the most of your coupon experience:

- Use a coupon organizer to sort coupons and keep it with you at all times (for those "unplanned" shopping trips).
- Organize your coupons in the order that you shop the store for quicker savings trips.
- Shop on double or triple coupon days and use manufacturers' rebates to realize additional savings.

according to Watkins. He said the Mazda3 has a wide appeal because of its price and fuel mileage while the Mazda6 is larger, has a longer wheelbase and a better ride.

And, of course, it doesn't hurt that the Mazda6 is made right at the AutoAlliance plant in Flat Rock.

"The Mazda6 is one of our better selling vehicles and it is built right here Downriver," Watkins said. "There are a lot of employ-

ees that work at AutoAlliance making that vehicle and I think it also helps that Ford owns a percentage of Mazda. We do a lot of Ford employee business and those customers get the employee plan price on Mazdas."
