



District works with limited funding to help deliver services

The Chelsea School District has selected four main goals which guide the decision-making process for the board of education and the school administration.

Those involve academics, financial management, communication and school safety. "Each year the Chelsea School District board of education sets goals for the school year," said Andrew Ingall, Executive Director of

discusses district goals at their meetings to determine what they will be."

Services.

One of this year's goals is to "maintain fiscal responsibility," no small task in the face of ever-expanding expenses for staff retirement and health care and ever-present of per-pupil state aid the district will receive.

"While you do see small per-student increases, when you compare that with expenses, we've actually had stagnant and even negative that I've been on the board," said school board president Laurel McDevitt.

"It's required some pretty creative and innovative thinking to provide things to our students."

Ingall described some of those innovative strategies -much, taken in the aggregate the district is using to meet it can add up to several thouthat goal:

Goal 2 - Maintain Fiscal Responsibility

Utilize grant funding:

The district will make every attempt to access available grants and use all available funds to support our programs, Ingall said, which requires a sharp eye on the availability of grant funding from a wide variety of sources.

"I think our board of education and all our employees have taken this very seriously and have done everything they can to help," said Chelsea Schools Superintendent David Killips.

"We watch what we spend, but we still have an obligation to give kids the best education possible."

Develop a "site utilization" plan for WSEC:

The district is evaluating better use of the Washington

Street Educational Center. WSEC, the former Chelsea High School campus, has been a valuable community asset.

It is currently used for the district's administrative offices, adult and community education classes, recreational activities, school board meetings, city council meetings, the Chelsea Senior Activities Center, and a host of other community-oriented

It may be as simple as makgrowth in the past four years ing sure lights and computers are turned off in rooms that are not being used, or it may be as involved as replacing old equipment and fixtures with newer, more energy-efficient ones.

While the individual items may not seem to contribute sands of dollars over time.

Tracking state funding: The district's budget relies

primarily on the state foundation grant, the amount the state provides per pupil.

For the past several years, that has been a moving target, with the state Legislature struggling to balance the state budget while trying to provide money to schools.

Proposed increases are almost constantly presented and then withdrawn, and last year the promised number was changed mid-year, resulting in an unanticipated cut in funding and catching many districts across the state unprepared.

"The thinking is to keep (the cuts) away from the classroom as much as possible and not cut something that will hurt students," McDevitt said.

The Chelsea district is in better shape than many, with a very healthy fund balance, the options available to make or cash reserve, built up over the past few years by using very conservative budgeting practices.

"We budgeted for a zero increase, and we used the same number (for per-pupil funding) as last year," said Teresa Zigman, assistant superintendent for finance.

That number is \$7,458; and it varies by district.

"It's an ongoing concern over the last 10 years or more, ever since the school took over financing the schools,"

said Killips.

"When we were in our heyday, when Michigan's economy was strong, it wasn't a problem."

Killips said over the past six years there has been a six percent decrease in revenue to the district, but that is partially offset by a 3 percent drop in expenses.

What is needed to restore some consistency to state funding, Killips said, is a new version of "The Three Rs": revenues, reforms and reduc-

"There really needs to be structural changes to the tax system, because everything we're doing right now is truly a guesstimate," Killips said.

"As of Sept. 28, we have operated 90 days into a new budget without knowing what our revenues are going to be, and that's the difficulty."

Some funding that can be controlled locally involves a vote of district taxpayers for bonds and sinking funds to finance improvements to infrastructure and equip-

"I think we're very fortunate, with our community and our teachers and administration within our schools. that they've been so supportive of the changes we've asked for," McDevitt said.

"To oversee the money we receive from the community and wisely spend what little money we get from the state. that's our responsibility."



McKune hosts day-long event next Thursday

By Sheila Pursglove Special Writer magine being able to only reach the first few shelves at the library. finding a doorway is too tight for your wheelchair, or that carpet nap impedes your progress.

Those - and umpteen other inconveniences that don't readily occur to people without physical challenges - are a way of life for Susan Odgers of Traverse City, a guest speaker at McKune Memorial Library in Chelsea Oct. 18.

Odgers, who was paralyzed by a spinal stroke at 18, will speak on "Accommodating Persons with Disabilities: **How Does Your Library Stack** Up?"

The talk is part of "Libraries On the Move," a one-day event from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at McKune. This "Linking" event by Friends of Michigan Libraries is hosted by Friends of McKune Memorial Library.

Odgers, who has been in a wheelchair for over 30 years and who also has a trained helper dog, is an expert in many areas of concern to pe sons with disabilities.

Past president of the statewide Michigan **Protection and Advocacy** Service (MPAS), Odgers is an accomplished speaker, writer and workshop leader, private practice therapist, college instructor and college academic advisor at Grand Valley State University in Traverse City, and community

Odgers, who grew up outside of the Detroit area and attended Oakland and Wayne State Universities, still has family in those areas and is looking forward coming down from Traverse City.

"I'm very much looking forward to being in Chelsea, seeing the new library and meeting people from all over the state," she says. "I see the Ann Arbor and Chelsea areas as very progressive places and I'm honored to get to spend time with people who care so much about libraries and the patrons.

" If I can put a face on these issues for people, I'm glad to do it."

The day's events will also include a talk by Stan Staffeld, a longtime Friend, former used book sale coordinator, and retired engineer, who developed a movable book cart to address the issue of how to hold book sales when library space is at a premium. Guest speaker more concerned with attitude than she is accessibility

Susan Odgers, guest speaker on "Accommodating Persons with Disabilities: How Does Your Library Stack Up?" was paralyzed by a spinal stroke at 18 and has used a wheelchair for over three decades.

Past president of the statewide Michigan Protection and Advocacy Service (MPAS), and a college instructor at Grand Valley State University in Traverse City, Odgers spends a great deal of time doing research in libraries of all shapes and sizes - small, large, community, college and university, those currently in trailers, those in the process of rebuilding or expanding, and those under

"My concern is not so much the physical space though the buildings need to be as accessible as possible law or not," she says. "I'm much more concerned

"Sometimes the nonverbal message and attitude that is communicated is 'Don't bother us — we didn't think of you—we don't care — the library is not for you — you must ask for help," she says.

Library entrances - often with many steps - can be daunting, and accessible entrances often not marked or easy to find, she says. Ramps may be too steep, carpetnap can be a huge problem, and many restrooms aren't really ADA clear.

Many books are either on shelves too high to reach from a wheelchair, or too low to bend down and reach. Brochure racks can also be inaccessible, especially at library counters.

- Libraries like to offer computer and technology services for persons with disabilities (pwd's), almost to the exclusion of other services, yet some libraries don't allow the use of flash drives, or copying of files, and many library Web pages don't have written instructions on the use and non use of the library technology, Odgers says. "It's difficult for a pwd to reach behind a processor to insert a flash drive, and equipment is not mounted where it can easily be used."

People use libraries for many reasons, and all the services need to be created from the point of view of the pwd, she says.

"When this is done, the message to all patrons is softer, one of caring for everyone. And the things that are done to help a pwd, help others - parents with strollers, shorter people, and so on."

Odgers would like to see better pwd representation at libraries.

"The adage in the disability community is 'nothing about us, without us," she says. "Yet I see few libraries that have an advisory board with pwd's on it, or even have one of these boards.

"If a library doesn't employ - or have as volunteers pwd's, it shows, and it's not representative of the community the library resides in. More pwd's should be encouraged to volunteer at the library, in very visible ways."


Libraries should utilize the services and advice of the statewide Disability Networks and Michigan Protection and Advocacy-Services, and any consultants to advise the library on the issue should have disabilities, she says.

And Nick Hill can control quite a bit out on the football field.

The scoreboard shows Chelsea leading 21-16 with 5:10 left to play in the game. What it doesn't show is that this is Nick Hill's time. The Bulldogs know it. The hot dog vendor knows it. Heck, Dexter knows it. The problem is doing something about it.

Chelsea doesn't need to score. The Bulldogs just need to move the ball and move the chains and move this game into the win column. No heroics needed here. Just some hard running.

Chelsea has the ball on its own 20-yard line with a first down. Hill picks up four yards on first and another four on second. It's third-andtwo with 4:15 to play - plenty of time for Dexter. But first the Dreadnaughts must get the ball back.

Hill blasts his way up the middle and the 5-foot-8, 170pound running back needs all his will and strength to get the necessary yards. down Chelsea.

It's Hill again on first down. He darts right and back to the left, dragging a few Dreadnaughts with him for a four-yard gain. Chris Schmelz then gets the ball and gets the first down. Schmelz, a senior, has some pretty impressive moves of his own, a few of which he shows on this nine-yard run.

It's back to Hill on first down and he picks up another nine yards. The clock is quickly running out on Dexter as Hill and company continue to move the ball and the chains. On another third down play, Hill gets the pitch and easily picks up the first

The donation also will help pay for distribution of educational material, such as a brochure to be sent to physicians advising them of the signs of-elder abuse and how to report it.

Executive Director Helen Hicks said the group aims to see more training programs in nursing homes and other facilities in which the elderly are cared for.

Elder abuse educators provided by the organization work with long-term care staff, residents and their families to recognize and combat sexual, physical, emotional. financial abuse, neglect, exploitation and abandonment.





Council discusses pact with Sylvan Twp. for water, sewer

A 16-acre parcel of city property off Cavanaugh Lake Road would be served by Sylvan Township water and approved by both municipali- said. ties.

Under the terms of the document presented to the Chelsea City Council on Tuesday night, Sylvan would and would pay the city 3 percent of the monthly water and sewer charges.

"This is the end result, but from my experience it certainly looks like a fair franchise agreement," the council.

The matter was brought before the council Tuesday for discussion; it next goes to the Sylvan Township Board continued. for a vote before coming back to the council for final approval. "It would be extremely prohibitive (for the city) to move water and sewer tomer's billing history. out there, and the township has a developer interested in the area to add it," said Councilman Frank Hammer.

"Everything's been ironed out and it's been through lawyers on both sides."

Cheri Albertson raised a number of concerns over the draft agreement.

Kilkenny's latest adventure, "The Secret Cardinal," deals with papal succession in the Catholic Church.


The plot involves a dying pope's request that Kilkenny save the titular Secret Cardinal, who is being held as a religious prisoner by China's communist government.

items that are separate from the general fund budget, such as at-risk funding.

"If we do get a 1 percent increase this year that's great. but it doesn't even cover the cost of living; and then the question has to be, are we going to see midyear cuts?" Killips added.

"We're anxiously awaiting an answer."

Sharon Raschke, Executive Director for Business and Dexter for Finances Community Schools, said she had hoped that a proposed \$100 increase in aid for each of the district's 3,664 students would be approved.

"(One percent) would be a \$70 increase in last year's foundation grant," she said.

"We budgeted for a \$100 increase, so that would mean \$108,000 less than we budgeted

Proposal A: Pass or fail?

One topic that the legislative compromise did not address are Lincoln Consolidated, was the ongoing disparity among districts in that foundation allowance.

In 1994 Proposal A was sold to voters as a way to eliminate the wide gaps in school funding between wealthy and poor areas by no longer relying on local property taxes.

While there is a mechanism in place to "eventually" eliminate that gap, the process has been glacial.

"The two promises of Proposal A were to provide a stable, reliable source of funding, which hasn't happened: and eliminating the equity gap," Lewis-Lakin said. "It's narrowed, but by no means is it close to being closed."

According to Byrnes, the intent of Proposal A has been accomplished, by and large, but not without "various unin-

tended consequences." "There has been legislation proposed, but that requires a constitutional amendment." Byrnes said.

"In the meantime we have A new "Three Rs" tried other things to bring equity to the districts."

A quick look around Washtenaw County shows Ann Arbor Public Schools at the top of the funding heap, with a foundation allowance of \$9,619 per pupil for 2006-07.

On the other end of the scale enues, reforms and reductions. Milan and Whitmore Lake schools at the state minimum of \$7,108 per student - a difference of more than \$2,500 just within this county.

Statewide the differences there enough of a structural

are even more glaring.

While several districts in suburban Detroit receive \$10,000 to \$12,000 per pupil, the highest in the state is \$15.772 for the Bois Blanc Pines School District in Mackinac County. more than double the state minimum.

"For me, looking for equity among districts is as important as what we get per student," Lewis-Lakin, said described himself as a proponent of equity.

"The fact that Ann Arbor schools receive more than \$2,000 more per student than Manchester is a point of concern. A student in Manchester ought to be worth as much to the state as a student in Ann Arbor."

Killips has been a regular critic of legislative inaction on the school funding crisis during meetings of the Chelsea Board of Education.

He has even come up with a modern substitute for the "Three Rs of education": rev-

"There really needs to be structural changes to the tax system, because everything we're doing right now is truly a guesstimate," Killips said.

Library staff and volunteers often have very little training or information about pwd, she says. Equipment such as wheelchairs should be on hand, and publicized as available, and staff and volunteers trained on how to use it and how to have a great attitude about getting it out for some-

"I think people are afraid of pwd's, they don't know how to help, so they do noth-

'A'simple question – how can I be of help to you? And then listening to the pwd, is usually all that's needed. If the pwd is angry to be asked, that's their problem, and they're being rude."

Graphics depicting pwd's should be active and current, and show people as they really are, she says. "Many of the ones I saw in a variety of libraries were sad, and continue to show pwd's as dependent, needy, depressing, and sometimes downright scary.

"Graphics are used to show everything from posters and brochures depicting services for pwd to outreach and so on."

Odgers encourages libraries to invite story submissions about how the library makes a difference n in people's lives - including pwd, whether physical, emotional or learning disabilities. The information would also provide the library with valuable feedback.

"MPAS has a current essay contest for self-advocacy - I would encourage libraries to publicize these contests and co-support them," she says.

A great deal has changed in society for pwd's -"though these changes did not happen because pwd asked nicely, they were fought for, like many other civil rights movements," she says. "Attitude takes a long time to change. People need to be with each other and get to know each other. Isolation and the lack of access is the antithesis of

this goal."

Incredible as it seems. many people still equate disability with low IQ, Odgers says. "Why would a pwd be in a library anyway? It's hard to believe that anyone still believes this, but some do. So the idea that pwd's would want or need to use a library is overlooked by some policy makers, they only know what they have experienced."

Odgers is very passionate


about libraries, and some of best friends work or volunteer in them.

Kindergarten Study

The Chelsea Board of Education continues to study the concept of all-day, everyday kindergarten. They began looking into the possibility in October of 2004. A Kindergarten Task Force was assembled that included a Board member, parents, teachers and assembled that included a Board member, parents, teachers and administrators. The task force began meeting in the winter of 2005. The task force surveyed the previous year's kindergarten parents and met with kindergarten teachers on numerous occasions. They gathered and read available research on kindergarten delivery models. In addition, task force members visited other school districts that deliver kindergarten instruction in formats other than the all-day, alternate-day format, which is our current kindergarten format. During these visits, task force members observed students in the kindergarten classrooms and had the opportunity for significant conversations with kindergarten teachers and building principals. and building principals.

Throughout the study, updates on the work of the task force were provided to the District Curriculum Council, the District School Improvement Team, and the Board of Education. Based on its work, the Kindergarten Task Force believed that an all-day, everyday format (full time) was the most effective format for the delivery of instruction to kindergarten students.

Unfortunately, the Board of education did not believe it was financially feasible to implement all-day, everyday kindergarten at that time. However, the Board is now reconsidering its position on this matter.

To help parents and the community better understand the issue, three forums will be held. Community members are encouraged to attend any of the meetings to help familiarize them with full-time kindergarten. Staff will share similar information at each

While Chelsea-Dexter is one of the area's best rivalries in most sports, with last year's classic overtime boys' basketball game won by the Dreadnaughts on Johnny Benjamin's floating jumper in the lane as time expired, setting off the loudest crowd ovation I've ever heard at a high school event, the Chelsea-Dexter sports rivalry is definitely alive and well.









Jesus drew circles to include people normally excluded

I suppose you could blame my denomination the United Church of Christ, for the issue Pastor Dawson brought up about women preachers. You see, in 1853 we ordained Antoinette Brown as the first Christian minister since New Testament times.

In our denomination we prize an educated clergy, so it is that she not only was elected to serve a Christian congregation as pastor, but she was also trained as a pastor. Interestingly, at her ordination service a Methodist minister defended a "woman's right to preach the Gospel" by quoting Paul when he wrote, "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. (Gal 3:28-29, NRSV, emphasis mine)."

Concerning women preachers, I personally like to look at who was first entrusted with the Good News of Jesus' resurrection. normally excluded. The

Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome had gone to Jesus' tomb to anoint his body with spices, as was the cusatom of that time. It is there that they learn that Jesus has been raised from the dead, and they are told to go tell Jesus' male disciples.

So, the first ones ever to share the Good News were women.

As I read the Gospels, I am struck by how often Jesus drew circles to include people that were

poor, the sick, the insane and even prostitutes were included in Jesus' ministry. In New Testament times children were not held in as high esteem as they are now, yet Jesus drew a circle that included them in his ministry. Also in New Testament times women were, at best, second class citizens, but Jesus drew

Sometimes people of faith will draw circles that exclude people. I believe this unfortunately happens way too often in churches.

then into his circle.

However, as you can see from the letters to the editor following Pastor Dawson's latest article, not all Christians do this.

I was especially encouraged by the letter from the pastoral team of St. Mary's Church. Even though they, too, do not believe in the ordination of women, they drew a circle that included those of us who do believe in ordaining women. Years ago I had the chance

to hold an original one of Edwin Markham's poems. I will never forget what he wrote: "He drew a circle that shut me out Heretic. rebel, a thing to flout. But love and I had the wit to win; we drew a circle that took him in."

If you are not a follower of Jesus, please be assured that many of us draw circles to include others, even fellow followers of Jesus with whom we do not theologically agree.

Health Report: Spinal Healthcare Month

The back is a complicated structure of bones, joints, ligaments, and muscles. Sometimes, even the simplest, everyday tasks, such as picking something up from the floor, can cause

back pain. Dr. Kramer, the Michigan Association of Chiropractors and the American Chiropractic Association suggest these tips to reduce the risk of spinal injury: On't lift by bending over Instead, bend your hips and knees and then squat to pick up the object. Keep your back straight,

and field the object close to your body. Don't twist your body when lifting.

 Push, rather than pull, when you must move heavy objects. • If you must sit for long periods, such as in front of a computer monitor, take frequent breaks and stretch.

 Wear flat shoes or shoes with low heels. Exercise regularly. An inactive lifestyle contributes to lower. back pain.

"The key to spinal health is prevention," said Dr. Kramer "These simple tips can make all the difference if the world in stopping low-back pain before it happens. However, when patients require chiropractic care, they will want to visit their MAC chiropractor as soon as possible."
