'We want people to know they are not alone'

In October 2003, I went to the doctor expecting a routine prenatal exam. Instead, he informed me that my unborn baby had died. A deep grief followed unlike any I had ever experienced, despite the multiple losses in my life.

A few days later, a friend delivered a gift basket. The contents, as well as the thought behind them, brought me more comfort and healing in the weeks and months that followed than any other resources provided by the hospital.

The gift basket came from a local nonprofit ministry called "Hearts of Hope," founded early in 2002 by Michelle Bazick and Laurel "Kitty" Golding.

Bazick, of Dexter, delivered a stillborn daughter in January 2000. Golding, of Gregory, gave birth in

September 2000 to a son who died after 16 hours.

The longtime friends grieved their losses together, unprepared for the physical and emotional changes they experienced.

"We had lunch together at the Gandy Dancer (restaurant in Ann Arbor) and stayed about five hours," Golding said.

"We cried a lot; we also talked about how the Lord was leading us to do something to help others who were going through the same thing."

"We brainstormed ideas, took notes, came up with a name, and went from there."

Bazick explained the goals of Hearts of Hope.

"To acknowledge the loss with a bereavement basket and to let people know they are not alone," said Bazick. "The loss of a baby at any point is significant."

Hearts of Hope is different from

other pregnancy loss organizations because the intervention occurs very soon after the loss.

Baskets are given to the families right away, and the materials in them are immediately useful.

Another difference is that Hearts of Hope is a Christian ministry.

Bazick and Golding get together monthly to assemble the baskets and pray for the families who receive them.

The women explained that experiencing loss puts a person on a journey of faith, wherein one questions past beliefs and future plans.

The grieving person needs to come to terms with not only the death of a loved family member but also hopes and dreams for what might have been.

McKune named 'best small library' in nation

The McKune Memorial Library in Chelsea has been named the "Best Small Library in America" by Library Journal magazine.

Now in its fourth year, this annual award co-sponsored by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation encourages and showcases the exemplary work of public libraries serving populations of less than 25,000.

Each year Library Journal solicits entries for the award from libraries whose high standards, innovative services and commitment to their community mark them as extraordinary.

The McKune Library, which serves more than 14,000 residents in the city of Chelsea and Dexter, Lima, Lyndon and Sylvan

townships as the Chelsea District Library, was chosen this year for its team-oriented approach that attracts a high number of volunteers and fosters ongoing innovation.

Judges also noted the impressive use of its renovated historic facility; creative outreach programs that include book and movie discussions and monthly themed luncheons for seniors; kids and teen-oriented programs; and aggressive adoption of technology to improve patrons' experience and increase public access to computers and the Internet.

The library's research efforts have been central to its outstanding service to

The relationships and personalities that have come together at the Purple Rose Theatre for its first premiere play of the year could not be more fitting.

"Vino Veritas" is David MacGregor's second Purple Rose Theatre Company production. It is also his first Purple Rose Theatre world premiere.

MacGregor brought "The Late Great Henry Boyle" to the PRTC in the spring of 2006 with much success.

"Vino Veritas" has been built from the ground up specifically for the PRTC, according to MacGregor, who described his relationship to the company as being extraordinarily open and honest, which makes this and every other play on which they collaborate so special.

"Vino" is a smart and biting comedy about the dangers of telling the truth," says PRTC Artistic Director Guy Sanville.

"The play unapologetically confronts the ques-

tion of whether it is better to tell the truth or to hide behind the facades we create to protect ourselves."

Proof of concept

The script for "Vino Veritas" is the evolution of a concept that MacGregor unintentionally vetted from a previous short play straightforwardly titled "18 Holes."

"After 'The Late Great Henry Boyle', Guy asked me if I would write something else and I kind of had this idea circling around in my head for awhile," MacGregor said. "So I started developing the script after we were done with 'Henry Boyle'."

So impressed with the audience reaction to "18 Holes" was he that it just made sense to further examine what resonated so well with people.

"It's basically a 10 minute play that was about two men playing 18 holes of golf and talking," MacGregor said.

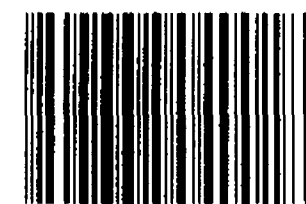

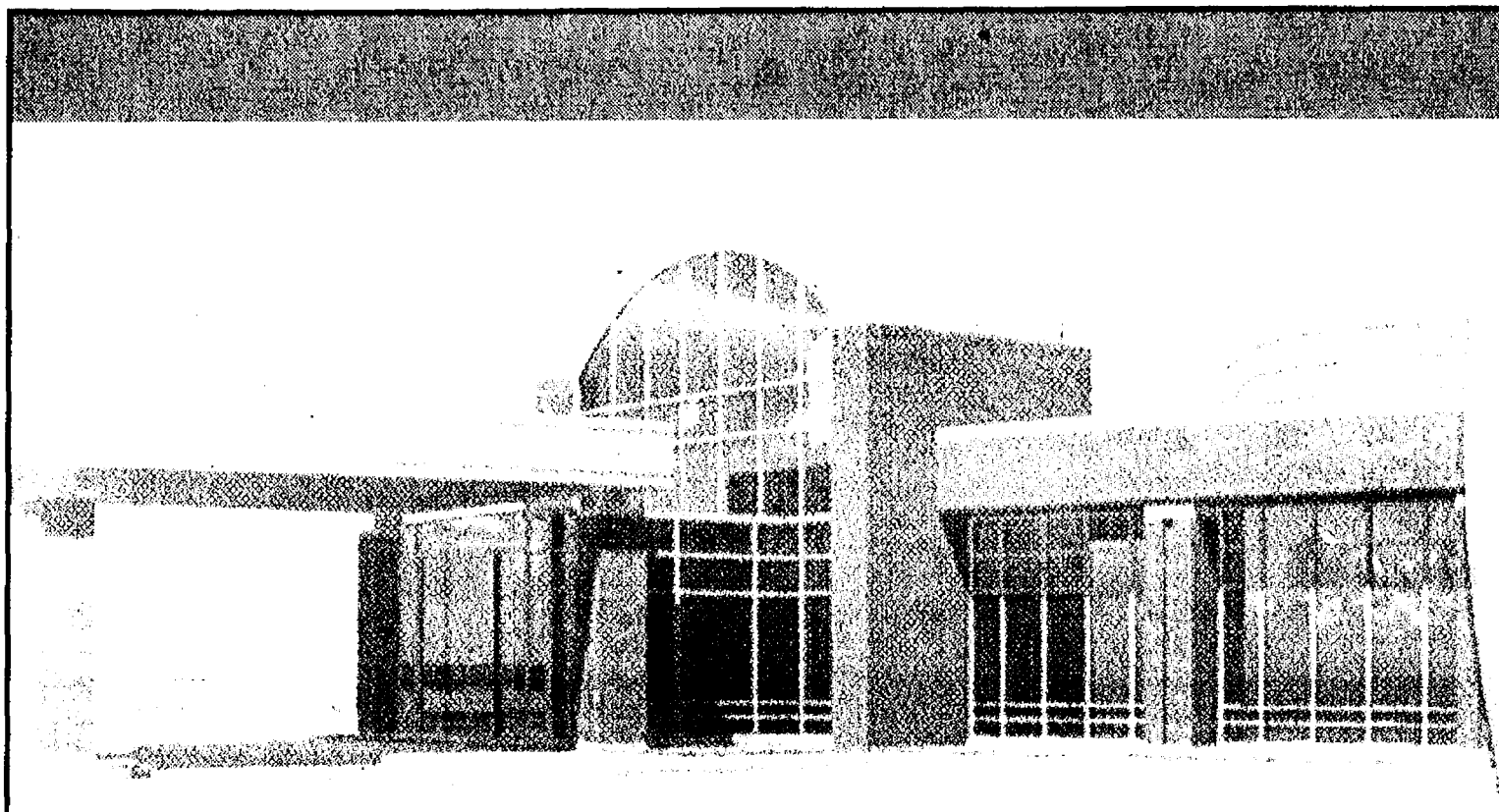

the community. By surveying patrons, the library was able to serve the community based on specific needs.

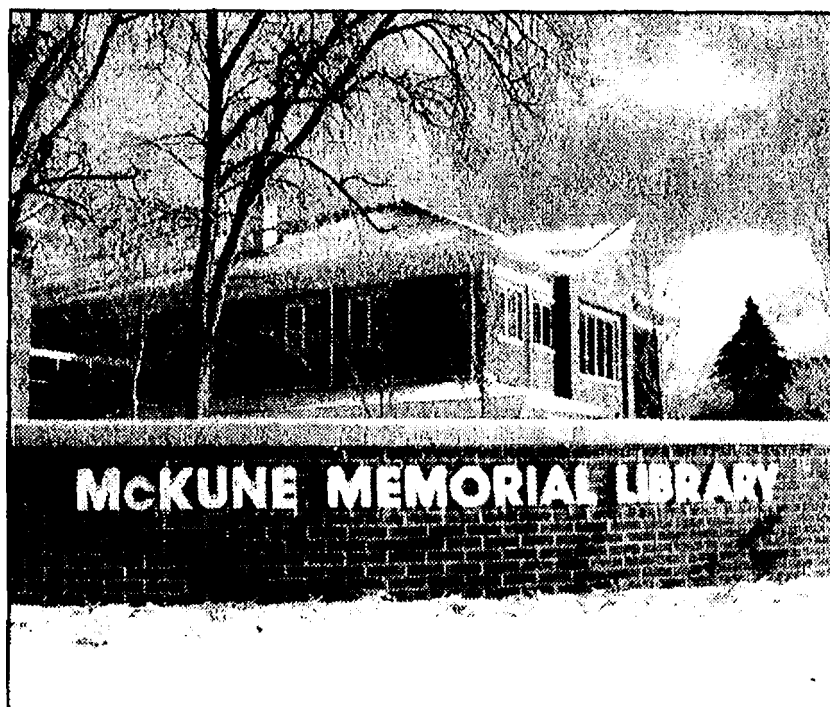
"The library conducted phenomenal surveying to see what the community wanted, and then responded," wrote Deborah Jacobs, Seattle's city librarian and a judge on the selection committee as well as a former LJ Librarian of the Year.

Bill Harmer, Head of Adult Services at the McKune Library, said the library staff is trying to reach all facets of the community.

"We realized that in order for the public library to make a difference, we had to make a conscious effort to sell our ideas, services, and programs by getting involved in the community and building those meaningful relationships," Harmer said, "whether it's the schools, a business, church, senior center, or even the model railroading club."

This responsiveness inspired great programming and has helped to garner increased community support that, at \$92.44 per library district resident, is vital to the library's success.

The library recently modernized and doubled the size of the historic former McKune home, increased the number of paid staff, ini-

tiated additional user-friendly services and installed the newest technologies.

"We are beyond thrilled to have been selected for this prestigious award," said Library Director Joan Elmouchi.

"It's a testament to the dedication and innovation of the staff, library board, and citizens served by the Chelsea District Library."

The library will receive a \$15,000 cash award from the Gates Foundation, conference costs for two library representatives to attend the 2008 Public Library Association (PLA) meeting in Minneapolis, and a gala reception at PLA.

Chelsea School Board

New special education protocol presented

A novel approach to finding and helping special education students is showing great promise, administrators involved with the program told the Chelsea School Board.

Instructional Consultation Teams, as they are known, are used to better identify students who may qualify for special education services.

"How are we targeting at-risk students, and how can we better meet their needs?" asked Lisa Nickel, the principal of South Meadows Elementary School where the Jan. 14 meeting took place.

Coordinated by the Washtenaw Intermediate School District, ICT requires a three- to five-year commitment from the local school district.

It also re-examines how students are placed in special education, known as referrals, Nickel said.

"The third year is the first (the team members) really work with students," she

said. "It leads to a decline in referrals for special education."

Other district personnel involved in ICT took turns explaining various aspects of the program to the board.

"It's a positive approach to working with kids," said Lucy Stieber, principal of Pierce Lake Elementary School. "It identifies strengths rather than weaknesses."

Stephanie Roehm and Patricia Compton explained the documentation and testing that is done, and those numbers are analyzed to determine the effectiveness of the program.

"We measure areas of concern and create strategies to improve," Compton said.

Roehm added: "The data is sent to the University of Maryland for evaluation. Over three years the number of students eligible for special education has been dropping."

Nickel said collaboration between educators who work with the individual kids is "crucial" to making the program work.

"ICT is about finding an instructional match, but that is kind of difficult to measure."

Beach Middle School Principal Patrick Little told the board his staff is adapting well to the ICT program in its second year at his school.

"The process of developing our team has taken some time," he said, "but the staff at Beach has given a warm reception to ICT."

School board members seemed pleased with the information.

"It seems like it's really helping borderline kids; there's no need to label them," said Trustee Susan Moore.

Superintendent Dave Killips noted that even though the program may result in fewer kids being placed in special education classes, the number of teachers should not be affected.

"We're not talking about reducing special ed teachers," Killips said. "We're just using them in a different way."

In other business ...

The board approved a resolution to accept \$20,400 from the state under the Michigan School Readiness Program to care for a half-dozen, 3- and 4-year-old children. The measure was five months late reaching the board for a decision.

"We typically deal with this in September, but the budget delay in Lansing really put this behind," Superintendent Killips said.

"The money is for this school year; we've anticipated this all along."

Your searcher will handle the stream work, allowing you to stay dry.

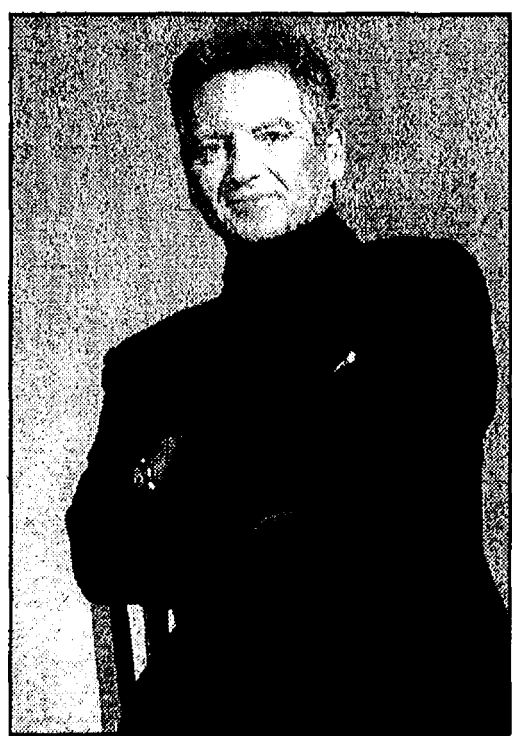

Gatlin kicks off musical theatre project

The leading third of The Gatlin Brothers, Larry Gatlin, is coming to town tomorrow to kick off the Encore Musical Theatre Project in a big way.

The Gatlin's blew off the barn doors during the '70s and '80s with a salvo of hits, including Grammy Winner "Broken Lady" and Academy of Country Music Album of the Year "All the Gold in California."

Gatlin himself has collaborated with household names like Kris Kristofferson, Willie Nelson and Johnny Mathis and legends like Johnny Cash, Frank Sinatra and, remarkably, Elvis Presley.

"I've had quite a life," Gatlin said,

recalling the days prior to the dawn of his fame, a week of which was spent with Presley.

"I remember sitting on the floor of his dressing room eating Hungarian Goulash," he said. "I had tried out for his gospel backup group, The Imperials. He recorded two of my songs."

At the time, Gatlin was waiting tables in Houston, while attending law school.

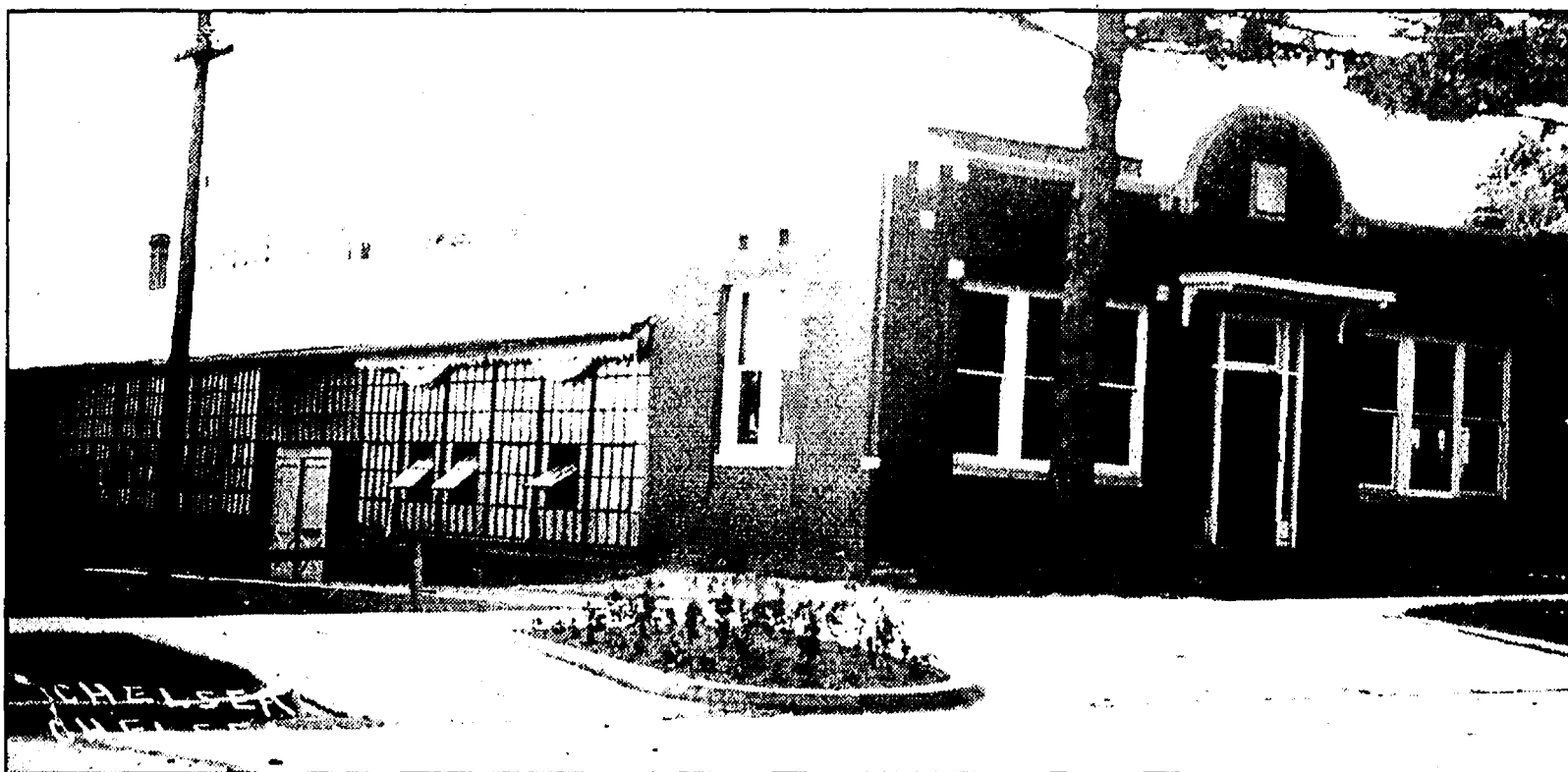
These days The Gatlin Brothers have a 50th anniversary behind them and Larry in particular has developed a passion for musical theater, saying that there is a great need to put tales of American heritage in the annals of musical theater.

Gatlin says that he is very supportive of the idea of and concept behind the Encore Musical Theatre Project. Daniel Cooney, who grew up in Westland, serves as the Artistic Director for the project and its founder.

Cooney, a graduate of the Yale School of Drama, has worked on Broadway in national tours of Evita, Fiddler on the Roof, The Civil War and Les Miserables. He has been involved in several other national theater companies, has taught as a New York University professor for 15 years and has credits as artistic director of the Music Theatre of Michigan and Broadway Advance.

A view of the 1919 office building on South Main Street.

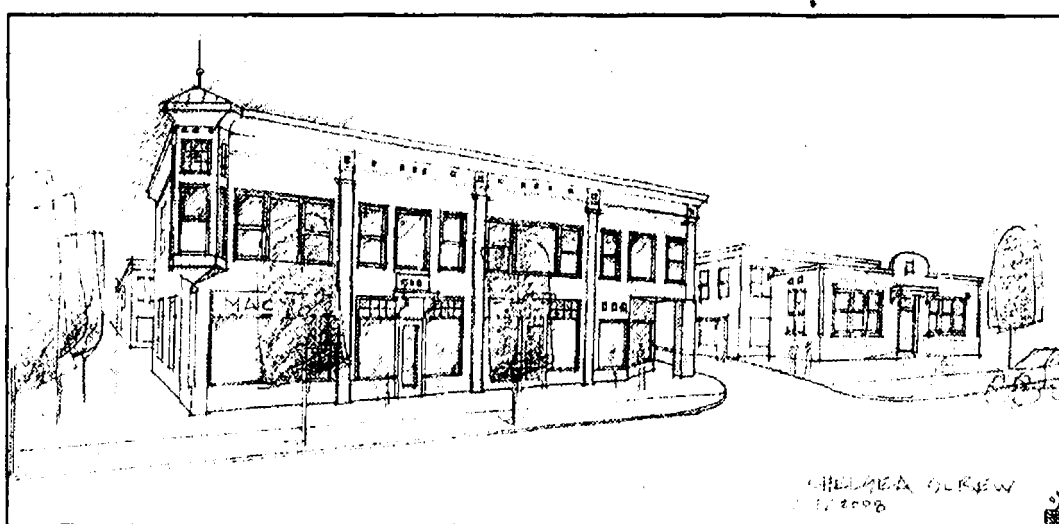

Group hopes to preserve FSW property

We represent a coalition of citizens who care about the future of the property formerly owned by the Federal Screw Works (FSW). We know that the redevelopment of this site is very important to Chelsea's economy. With that in mind, we hope Magellan Properties, the new owners of the property, consider the importance of this site to the history of our community, as well its geographic position as the "southern gateway" to the downtown business district.

A historically sensitive design on this very visible site would expand (not reduce) its commercial potential, and it would also increase the broader prosperity of downtown Chelsea—in much the way the Clocktower Complex has already done—by making our city more of a regional destination.

For almost a century, generations of Chelsea residents worked in the industries that have occupied this location, even winning awards from the U.S. Army and Navy for quality production during World War II. Instead of demolishing the entire FSW site as the new owners have proposed, rehabilitating and adaptively reusing parts of the complex would contribute to the revitalization of the neighborhood, help to maintain Chelsea's vibrancy as a "destination community", and visibly recognize the shared heritage that defines and unites us as a community.

During the past few months, the zoning of the FSW property has attracted considerable attention in Chelsea. We are pleased that at the Planning Commission's meeting on Jan. 15, Magellan Properties withdrew its request that the property be rezoned to commercial (C-2), stated the intention to request a PUD zoning designation and to "use its best efforts to have the site remediate to allow second floor residential."

Second floor residential would be in line with the 2007 Draft Comprehensive Plan that designates the FSW site as "mixed use" and meets the industry model definition of the American Planning Association: "A Mixed-use Building

means a building that contains at least one floor developed to nonresidential uses and at least one devoted to allowed residential uses."

Although the site presents environmental challenges, we believe that mixed use offers the best option for preserving neighborhood and community character, as well as quality of life. Further, a mixed use design could incorporate existing elements from the site, specifically the small and architecturally distinct office buildings that anchor the complex on the northeastern and southwestern corners. A Victorian industrial office built in 1919 occupies the northeast corner, while an Art Deco

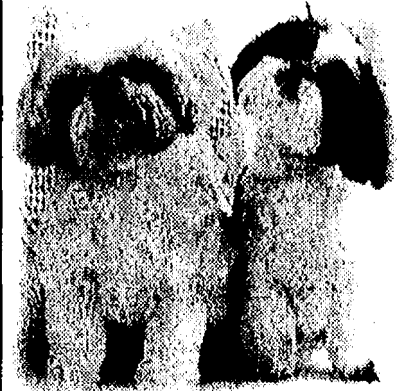

style office stands on the southwest corner.

Preserving these two office buildings could lead to tax incentives and other economic tools to aid in redeveloping the property, as well as contribute to local business activity and economic success. For instance, the unique office building on South Main Street could serve as an entryway to a larger building. As one example among many possibilities, see the sketch provided to the Planning Commission at their last meeting.

Increasingly, tourists and residents are drawn to communities that retain a distinctive character and identity. People from all over the region come to Chelsea for its intact historic architecture, charming downtown, and retail, arts, dining, and cultural offerings. The historic buildings of the FSW complex, and the important story they tell about the industrial history of the region, could easily attract additional visitors to Chelsea's downtown business district.

Given the important role that the FSW has played in the history of our community, the future of the site matters to everyone in Chelsea. Maintaining tangible contact

with the past strengthens the sense of continuity that is essential to a healthy community. If the buildings are demolished, they take with them an important part of our identity. No remnant remains of the multi-grade level school complex that once stood on East, Park and Harrison Streets. As the CHS Class of 1958, the last class to graduate from the high school, prepares to celebrate its 50th reunion, many citizens have lamented the demolition of the high school designed by well-known Jackson architect, Claire Allen.

Let's think twice before yet another piece of our history disappears.

City Council

New fire truck not part of CAFA budget

The Chelsea City Council agreed Tuesday to recommend approval of the 2008-09 budget for the Chelsea Area Fire Authority, with one major change.

No new fire truck this year.

The city is one of CAFA's five constituent municipalities. The others are Lyndon, Sylvan, Lima and Dexter townships.

Each must approve or recommend changes to the proposed budget before it is finalized by the authority's board of directors.

The CAFA budget has come under scrutiny because of a string of double-digit percentage increases in the city's share of the operational costs it is assessed.

City Manager John Hanifan recommended that the council request the purchase of a new fire truck be delayed this coming year in order to limit the city's net increase in payment to CAFA to 8 percent.

"It's not a question of service; we get great service," Hanifan said. "It's a matter of looking to keep costs down, like anything else."

The overall proposed budget is \$929,436, which is a 2.03 percent reduction

from the current budget.

Increases of 3 percent were proposed in paid on-call firefighter wages and Fire Chief Jim Payeur's salary; and the budget also reflects increases in insurance and benefit costs.

Also going up are fuel and utility bills, costs to replace radios and pagers, dispatch services and office equipment.

Reductions were seen in costs for uniforms and protective clothing, building and grounds maintenance, equipment maintenance, training sessions and conferences, capital equipment purchases and miscellaneous expenses.

"Architect services of \$20,000 was removed from the budget because we're not going to do anything with the building this year," Payeur told the council.

Council members also

debated the formula that determines the amount each municipality pays into CAFA.

Costs are billed on a five-year average of incidents, and Chelsea's costs have been nearing the 50 percent mark of CAFA's total budget.

"The five-year sliding average was an improvement over what we had before," CAFA Chairwoman Mary Ann Noah reminded the council. "We were projecting a \$430,000 contribution from Chelsea, and that has already gone down."

Noah suggested that representatives from the city meet with CAFA to discuss options.

"We would welcome any suggestions for improvement," she said.

The CAFA board will meet in February to finalize its budget.

"Part of the purpose of the holiday is a day 'on,' not a day off," she said.

The children colored and assembled large paper puzzle pieces decorated with symbols of what the holiday meant to them.

"The puzzle pieces signify how we all fit together," Mavel said. "They were also making wreaths with hands of different colors."

The 90-minute film shown in the auditorium was titled, "No More Baths," a tongue-in-cheek look at a group of children who decide to adopt the tactic of nonviolent protest by refusing to take baths.

At 5 p.m. a group of about 20 people of various ages and

County faces 2008 budget shortfall

Washtenaw County Administrator Bob Guenzel this week announced an unanticipated shortfall of 8 to 10 percent in the county's general fund based on new projections for 2008 property tax revenue, according to a news release from the county.

Property taxes make up approximately 70 percent of the county's general fund, and the new projections will mean immediate action is required to identify \$8 to \$10 million in reductions to be implemented this year.

In announcing the shortfall to his employees this week, Guenzel reiterated the message of key variables that were present when the county's 2008-2009 biennial budget was passed by the Board of Commissioners Nov. 14.

"A number of key variables could not be pinned down — some will not be known definitively until April of 2008 — far past our Dec. 31, 2007, deadline to adopt the biennial budget," he said in a written statement. "One variable that turned out to be unprecedented in scope was property tax revenue."

"Our projection at the time the budget was passed on Nov. 14 was a revenue growth rate of 3.5 percent — a very conservative estimate when compared with prior years' 5 to 6 percent. But the housing market decline, and the general economic slowdown now puts that projected growth rate closer to 0 percent, or even slightly negative. The State Equalized Value looks to be taking an even harder hit with numbers projected to be a negative 3 to 4 percent."

An important factor that has made accurate projections especially difficult this year has been the change in timing for collect-

ing property taxes in the county, Guenzel said. Due to the suspension of revenue sharing from the state, counties started collecting taxes in July, instead of December of the previous year.

"That has meant that we aren't able to plug real numbers into any revenue equation until April of 2008 for 2008 property taxes," Guenzel said.

Another variable has been the county's ongoing labor negotiations. Part of those negotiations included a structural change in the employee pension plan that was projected to save more than \$5 million. Those projections, conducted and checked by two independent actuarial firms, turned out to be incorrect.

The projected savings were much less than expected — negating a possible way to help offset the budget shortfall.

"And with those negotiations now extended, we are still unsure of how they will

affect the final numbers for the budget. We're continuing to work through these difficulties with our partners across the table, still working toward common interest," Guenzel said.

Contract talks with the county's 17 unions have been extended past the Dec. 31, 2007, deadline.

To begin to address the situation, the county has already enacted a hiring freeze as of Jan. 1, 2008, a move that Gordon Burger, director of support services for the county, says should "save \$2 to \$3 million over

the next year."

A Strategic Oversight Committee of 11 of the county's top managers has convened to help the administration in reviewing and assessing ways to cut costs — both short term and structural — to deal with the shortfall. The administrator hopes to bring his recommendations to the Board of Commissioners in early March.

"Washtenaw County has a great reputation for providing the highest quality services, and it's the board's priority to protect those direct

services to citizens. The commissioners understand that the people on the front lines know better than anyone what the possibilities are for short-term and long-term structural savings," said Board Chairman Jeff Irwin.

The county has set up a Web site for employees with mechanisms in place to take in anonymous messages that share and respond to concerns, questions and suggestions during this time of budget modifications and

organizational reassessment. The Web pages include a note from the administrative team, a page called "How did this happen?", FAQs, Feedback Forum and a Glossary of Terms.

Communication to all county employees on the budget modifications will occur at least semi-weekly. And Guenzel and Irwin will hold a series of employee town hall-style meetings in January and February.

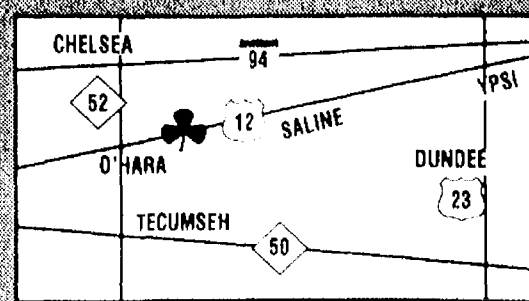

To the Editor: A Jan 17 letter about nuclear reactors and wind turbines contained a critical error of fact. The author mentions that the French recycle their nuclear fuel and claims that it can be "disposed of as non-hazardous waste," with the implication that this takes just a few decades. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. Despite the oversimplifications of politicians, the engineers tell us that it's not that easy.

The French gave up on simple breeder reactors for technical and safety reasons (liquid sodium systems are complicated), and next tried re-engineering the fuel into mixed-oxide, or MOX fuel, which

can be used in an almost conventional reactor.

About 10 percent of France's reactors use MOX fuel. That's all well and good until the MOX fuel rods are spent. Spent MOX fuel contains four to five times as much plutonium and is three times as hot as regular spent fuel, and so it is more difficult to transport, process and store.

Spent MOX has to be cooled for 150 years before it can be stored underground, and so it is stockpiled in La Hague's cooling ponds. The French deal with the problem by defining the spent MOX as a "strategic reserve" that will fuel future reactors, if they can just invent them.

See articles by the Department of Energy (<http://www.oerwm.doe.gov/factsheets/doeymp0411.sh>) and the IEEE (<http://spectrum.ieee.org/feb07/4891>) or google "french nuclear waste".

Additionally, the times I've stood underneath large wind turbines in

northern Michigan and North Dakota I found them to be almost silent, and saw no dead birds.

I think they're actually attractive and would be glad to have one in my backyard if my yard were a bit bigger.

Wind turbines could provide additional farm income for a relatively low footprint. Additional farm income has the potential to preserve the family farm; not just the rural character that we enjoy in this area. Wind tur-

bines can supply a portion of our energy budget.

Despite the number of dead birds I didn't see, the environmental impact may need further investigation. If wind turbines prove to be a mistake then they can be dismantled and the problem is gone, whereas spent nuclear fuel problems will be with us for a long time, even with the best intentions.

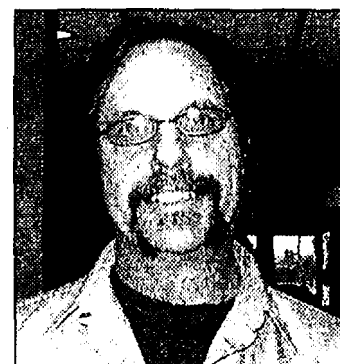

Our take: Auto Show important to economy

The sagging fortunes of the local economy are a source of chronic concern and rightly so. But each January, the North America International Auto Show rolls into town, providing the region's economy a much needed lift. This year, the show runs through Jan. 27.

Visitors from Europe and Asia grumble about having to come to Michigan in the middle of January. But the complaints are generally good-natured and the show itself continues to evolve from year to year into one of the most important, if not the most important, gathering of figures in the car business held anywhere in the world.

Our Chelsea History

What was the first church located in Chelsea?

Answer C. This pioneer church was built in 1852, two years after the first general store was built in Chelsea. Population of Chelsea was then 60. Farm families, many of them Congdons, added to the large portion of the 52 members present for the 1852 dedication. With the addition of a heated basement in 1871, it was in great demand by the townspeople for a meeting place, home talent plays, lectures by University of Michigan professors, bell-ringers and magician shows. Because of its constant use, the village council voted to erect the first lamp which was placed outside of the business district in front of the church. After the Glazier store fire consumed the church in 1894, the present First Congregational Church was built on the same location on E. Middle Street.

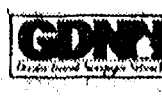

There was no overarching story, no plot and no character development.

"All there is are two people who are very close," he said.

MacGregor found that people really identified with how comfortable and open the characters were with each other.

"There was no fear or judgment," MacGregor said. "They could just let out the kind of thoughts you, I and everyone else have floating through our heads, but we always keep to ourselves."

It's in the wine

"Vino Veritas" is an apt name for a play about the truth, since those very words are a Latin phrase meaning "In wine, the truth."

Whereas the core idea behind "18 Holes" was of truth thriving between two people in an open, endearing friendship, the characters in MacGregor's latest work stand at an opposite pole.

These characters are involved in spousal relationships and, as pairs, interpersonal relationships, and the truth isn't so beautiful.

"Since we're dealing with truths that the characters don't necessarily want to share, I needed something to help propel that forward," MacGregor said.

"I didn't want my characters to be close in the same kind of way (as '18 Holes'), but there had to be some kind of agency that comes in and facilitates the truth."

The obvious answer was "this frog-wine," he said, with a wry smile and a chuckle.

One of the couples vacation in Peru and while exploring some Incan ruins, go off on a side adventure with their tour guide.

They witness a wedding ceremony in which a couple must drink blue wine made from various ingredients, with the skin of the Blue Dart Tree Frog being chief among them for purposes of the plot.

The skin, which in reality is poisonous, acts as a reagent that induces telling the truth against the imbibers' will.

"In the morning they know everything there is to know when they emerge from their hut," MacGregor said.

"Before the couple return from the trip, the woman brings back a small, illicit sample of this wine and that's how this whole thing gets started."

Something for everyone

The alternating volatility and necessity of addressing "universal truths" is where the meat of "Vino" lies.

"My thinking in writing the play is, it just seems to me that some people lead the happiest, most fulfilling lives possible if they can just avoid the truth as much as possible," MacGregor said. "And there's other people that need it and can suffer and wither without it."

One of the couples in the play is going to be better off if the truth can somehow be avoided or they can separate themselves from it, MacGregor explained.

The other couple needs it, they've lost it and they discover it during the course of the play.

"It's not that it's easy, by any means. The catch with the 'wine' that keeps cropping up in the play is that it hurts," MacGregor said.

"The trick is not minding that it hurts, and that's the nature of truth and the relationships that people have. Some people need that openness and some people, quite frankly, don't."

Sanville urged people to watch "Vino Veritas" without feeling the need to know a particular character personally to understand what is happening.

"I think there are larger issues at play here that everybody is going to recognize to some extent," Sanville said.

"That is the goal here: You particularize it with specific incidents, but they speak to larger issues that are things that everyone experiences at some point in their lives."

In honestly dealing with the broader issues, such as religion, conflict arises.

A rare vintage these days

Modern pop culture is too focused on what the individual wants, in an effort to make everything palatable (read: salable), so part of what drives "Vino Veritas" is the idea that sometimes you have to go beyond pandering.

"So much of it is about, 'What do you want?' 'What kind of music do you want?' 'What kind of movie do you want, and I'll make it,'" MacGregor said.

"I wanted to go for something that is really genuine and true, which is so rare."

"I think when people see it, it is really appealing. People are starved for that. It's kind of like a nutrient that popular culture-wise we seem to be lacking these days. In this case, I'd rather throw together a little broccoli salad and give it to people."

Sanville says "Vino" is more about humor than jokes. "You have to find the humor in the situation, because humor is a person's personal trait — it's how we deal with problems. Comedy is about pain," he

noted.

"The play is very humorous and very funny, but it's smart-funny. It's physical; things happen and you may think they're funny and you may not, but the comedy in this play comes from the trouble that these people get into, the pain that they're in, and I think, too, some of the heroism."

Some of the things that the couples say under the influence of the frog wine is shocking, Sanville said.

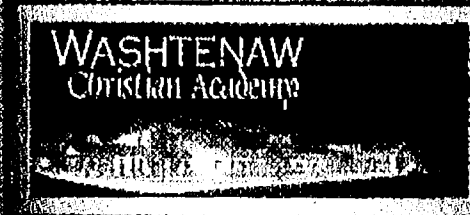
"They will shock people and some people may find that funny and some people won't," he said.

"It will depend on your sense of truth, because everybody, I guarantee, somebody in the play will

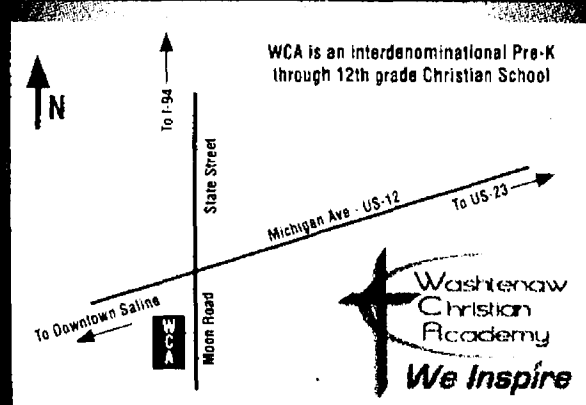
say or do something you agree with and somebody will say or do something you don't agree with, and I think that's true for everybody who sees the play."

Sanville called "Vino" a "comedy for grownups," but invited all to see it; possibly gain some deeper insight into the truth and, perhaps, themselves.

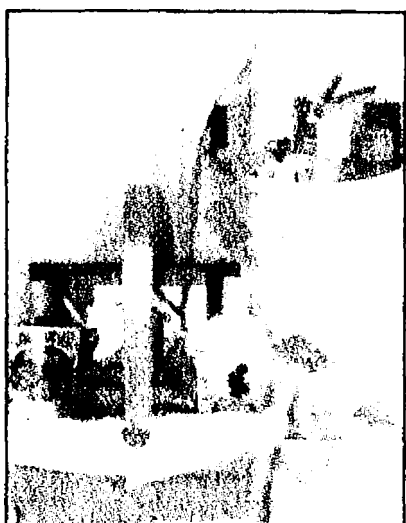

Mercy Hospital in Ypsilanti; Mercy Memorial Hospital in Monroe; Foote Hospital in Jackson; Zeeland Community Hospital in Zeeland; and the OB/GYN offices of Saginaw.

Baskets are also provided by personal request, and as a result have been shipped all over the United States, according to Golding.

Bereavement baskets are given free to the families that receive them. The cost is covered by donations from churches, hospitals, memorial gifts or contributions from interested parties.

Allison Zehnder is an Ann Arbor resident who received a Hearts of Hope basket in 2002. Zehnder found out early in her pregnancy that her baby had a condition that would either end in stillbirth or a live birth with a very short life expectancy.

"We were blessed to have our little girl born alive at full-term and we shared her life for three hours," Zehnder said.

"Having the basket was like receiving a gift for this baby. It was traumatic and very painful leaving the hospital without her. But knowing that Michelle and Kitty put so much love into the basket was very meaningful. They can understand because they've been through it."

Zehnder appreciated that the basket was pretty and contained practical items like Kleenex and a blank journal, along with items to pamper her, like scented candles, tea and chocolate. "The small grief books that were in the basket were very manageable to read," she said.

In 2003, Zehnder began crafting bracelets to include in the baskets as a tangible remembrance of the baby who died. She said it means so much to her to see other women wearing one of her bracelets, for example, at a hospital memorial service.

Bazick summarized her loss and decision to create Hearts of Hope with Golding.

"This experience has made me a richer person," Bazick said.

"Our response is a choice. Am I going to stay bitter and sad, or walk the journey and become closer to God and use the experience to serve and minister to other people?"

"We share a mutual love for Broadway stage and everything theatrical," Gatlin said. He is no stranger to performing in Michigan and knows about the character of its people and the challenges that they face.

"(Cooney) has shared his vision with me on several occasions ... we were in a sports bar in New York when he told me," Gatlin said.

The benefits to a community and its revitalization, either economically or culturally, depending on the circumstances are readily apparent, he said.

"I'm currently working on a production to do down in North Carolina down in Raleigh and you need people," Gatlin said. "You get people involved and the creates jobs and it also changes the community. You need

guys and gals to come along and make things happen. They don't come out of the blue sky. You need local talent, dancers, singers and playwrights.

"There's more to running a theater, running a theatrical company, than the folks who sing and dance. You need lights and wardrobe people. It's more than just for the theatrical community. It can so revitalize an area. We have seen it time and time again. Most downtowns are open from nine to five. We want to bring the people back down at 6:30."

Cooney said that he was looking for the right area with a community that was seeking something like what the Encore Musical Theatre Project offers, and Dexter Village seemed like "the perfect place."

"I just love that little village," Cooney said. "It feels like a wonderful place that has a wonderful town life."

He describes the project's goal as providing musical

theater geared mainly towards the family, with only a few musicals "here and there" on the edge.

The project functions as a non-profit and currently has 10 people teamed up to make it happen, according to Cooney, who along with the rest are using everything, including personal credit cards, to make this take off in the community.

"We've got the first big step in place, with the company name and web site set, Larry Gatlin has donated his time to us and the community, and Broadway talent is coming in."

Establishment of the theater as a permanent fixture will ultimately be up to the community.

"Once the support is there, my physical vision of what the theater is going to be is a block box theater, right in downtown Dexter," Cooney said. "We're just presenting the product first and asking the community to show us how much

they're interested."

Cooney promises to continue to bring a high caliber of performance and people to the area for quality shows.

He envisions something that not only fits into Dexter, but also compliments what Chelsea has in the Purple Rose Theater, which he admits initially intimidated him.

"The reason I first shied away from it early on was the Purple Rose," Cooney admitted. "I didn't know that they're not musical, but straight plays. It is very complimentary."

Tomorrow's performance will be the test, Cooney says.

The 7:30 p.m. performance at the Dexter Center for Performing Arts consists of four Broadway performers performing the first act of the show.

"What's really special is that 4 local professionals will get to work with our Broadway talent," Cooney said. "It's amazing how many fantastic people are in the

area."

He said the goal is to merge professionals with local talent from the community to create the highest level of professional theatre.

From that point, The Ninth Avenue Band will open for Gatlin, who will be introduced by W4 Country 102.9 FM.

Gatlin would like eventually to bring his own musical to Dexter. He has been working on "The Texas Flier" for quite some time now. It might even premier here, since he has asked Cooney to get aboard as its producer.

It's a tale about a father-son relationship that takes place in a dried up Texas oil town. The relationship dries up too, as the son wants to strike out on his own - a whisper from Gatlin's transition to adulthood.

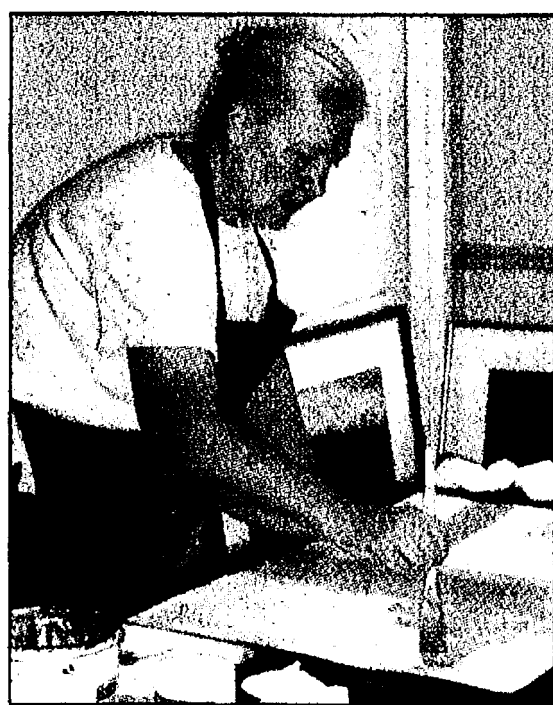
Chelsea is well known for its abundance of art, and residents at local senior residences are reaping the benefit, enjoying a wide variety of art programs and visits from local artists.

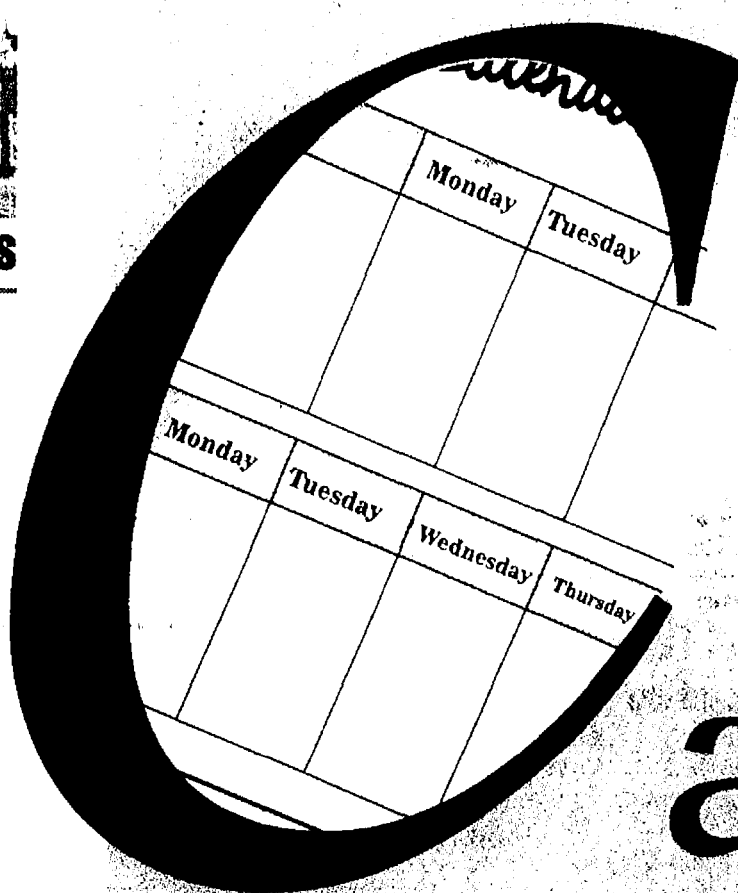

Cancer Declassified

How to help a friend, loved one with cancer

Every person's preferences are unique, but for me, there were specific actions that people took that meant a great deal to me during my breast cancer treatment and recovery.

The support and interaction of others brought me such great rewards, pulling me out of a dark place and providing hope to someone who never before had trouble being an optimist.

Having cancer is an isolating experience. I suddenly felt like a foreigner, out of my element, in a strange land. Familiar places and common activities no longer felt ordinary; it felt as though I had never seen or done these simple things before. The eyes of others seemed to linger on me as if I wore a garment bearing a scarlet letter "C."

Often, I was so exhausted or in so much pain that I would lie on the couch for days or weeks at a time. For the first time, I was missing the daily contact of other people. The hustle and bustle of a crowded store now seemed like a far-off vacation destination. This isolation only enlarged my sadness and feelings of hopelessness.

The cards, gifts and flowers that arrived almost daily were of huge importance. They may sound like such insignificant trinkets, but, in fact, they were the opposite. My table was so packed with a variety of blooms in vases and spring bulbs in baskets that we had to place some of the arrangements in other rooms.

I kept the greeting cards in a stack, wrapped up in the extra piece of yarn that accompanied my prayer shawl that I received from a friend and pastor at Chelsea Community Hospital. The envelopes were in bright colors of greens, blues and purples. Sometimes I would count the cards, noting how many people cared about me and dreaming of when I would see them next.

My husband set me up with a laptop, arranged carefully next to the couch so

that I could reach it and still maneuver around my medical equipment. E-mail allowed me another opportunity to communicate with the outside world.

Most of the people who I would e-mail had full-time jobs, were full-time students or were the typical busy individuals with plenty to do. I typed, often with one hand, in short sentences, which led to longer and more coherent sentences as time went on. My friends thoughtfully took the time to read my garbled and most-likely bleak e-mails and chose to write me back.

Like a puppy, I wanted to go on car rides. My husband drove me around Chelsea and with amazement I stared out the windows at the landmarks I had not seen in weeks. There was my son's school, there was a pair of cranes standing in a field and there was Cottage Inn, the best pizza in the world for post-surgery binges.

One set of friends bought me and my husband concert tickets scheduled for several months in the future. The alluring evening of a double date with close friends, people-watching in the pavilion, and the energetic music of the Barenaked Ladies beckoned me to work toward getting off that couch. The concert was far enough in the future that ideally I would be well enough to attend at that point, and indeed I was.

Those people who focused their efforts on my children put me at peace during a time when I was unable to do many things myself. The little gifts in the mail from Nain (the Welsh name for grandmother), the trips to restaurants and shops and the fun evenings at their friends' houses went a long way in keeping their spirits up. Knowing that my kids were able to continue with normal activities and have some well-deserved attention gave me one less thing to stress about.

There were a few things that I don't recommend anyone do for the cancer patient in your life. If you are uncomfortable with the idea of cancer, find a way to communicate that won't reveal your uneasiness.

In December, artist and retired Beach Middle School art teacher Bev Yelsik showed residents how to make unique greeting cards using a variety of materials.

Leslie Greeneisen, program director at the Chelsea Center for the Arts, visited in January. A long-time potter and a member of the Plymouth Pottery Guild, Greeneisen showed different ways to create pottery, including "slam animals," which attendees were able to try their hand at.

Maureen Perdomo will be February's guest, to roll art, history, science and culture into one by talking about amber.

"Many of our Silver Maples residents have wonderful art collections themselves," Personke says. "Some are artists, while others have collected artwork."

"We'll be holding an Art Crawl in March — an open house where those who have art will open their homes to others who want to see art. In November, we'll be holding a mini Art Fair. We'll welcome local artisans to come in, set up a table or booth, and sell and talk about their wares."

"I'm also exploring ways to mount community

art exhibits in our Maples Hall Gallery."

In addition to guest artists, residents also enjoy hands-on arts and crafts projects, creating snowflakes, mini-boxes made out of recycled greeting cards, and Chinese lanterns.

Artist and therapist Lorin Kummer, MSW, of Artquest Studio in Chelsea, has been working with seniors at Towsley Village in the Chelsea Retirement Community.

Kummer was approached by Lee Ann Soto from Towsley Village, who had seen her work at a local church and at the Spiral Pathway mosaic at Timbertown in Chelsea.

"We collaborated to come up with ideas for a mosaic glass memory pole, created by the seniors of each wing of the residential center for Alzheimer patients," Kummer says. "The theme is of the seasons and the special events the residents participate in, through out the year. The work is incredible."

In a series of workshops, residents made drawings of items and events from their memories based on presented themes. Kummer designed the mosaic work and cut the drawings into stained glass.

With guidance, the residents cut tile, fixed design elements in place and created the panels.

"I've had such a positive and enriching experi-

ence working with these lovely seniors," Kummer says. "Their humor, their willingness to try new things, their patience as they deal with this speed talking artist! We've learned from each other."

At times family members work side by side with their loved ones during a visit.

"One son, spending a Saturday visit laughing and joking with his mother while working on the mosaic, shared with me, with tears in his eyes, that this art experience gave him back his mother for that little while," Kummer says. "Another family group watched their child working with her 90-year-old grandfather, creating tiles for the background of a panel."

"As an art therapist, I often smile through my tears at the wonders of art as a positive and effective therapeutic tool. I'm happy to share my skills with these wonderful folks."

Personke says she would love to bring an art therapy project to Silver Maples.

"Lorin's Peace Pole project is incredible," Personke says. "Leslie and I also discussed a mosaic or tile project."

"We're so fortunate to have such a wealth of art in Chelsea."

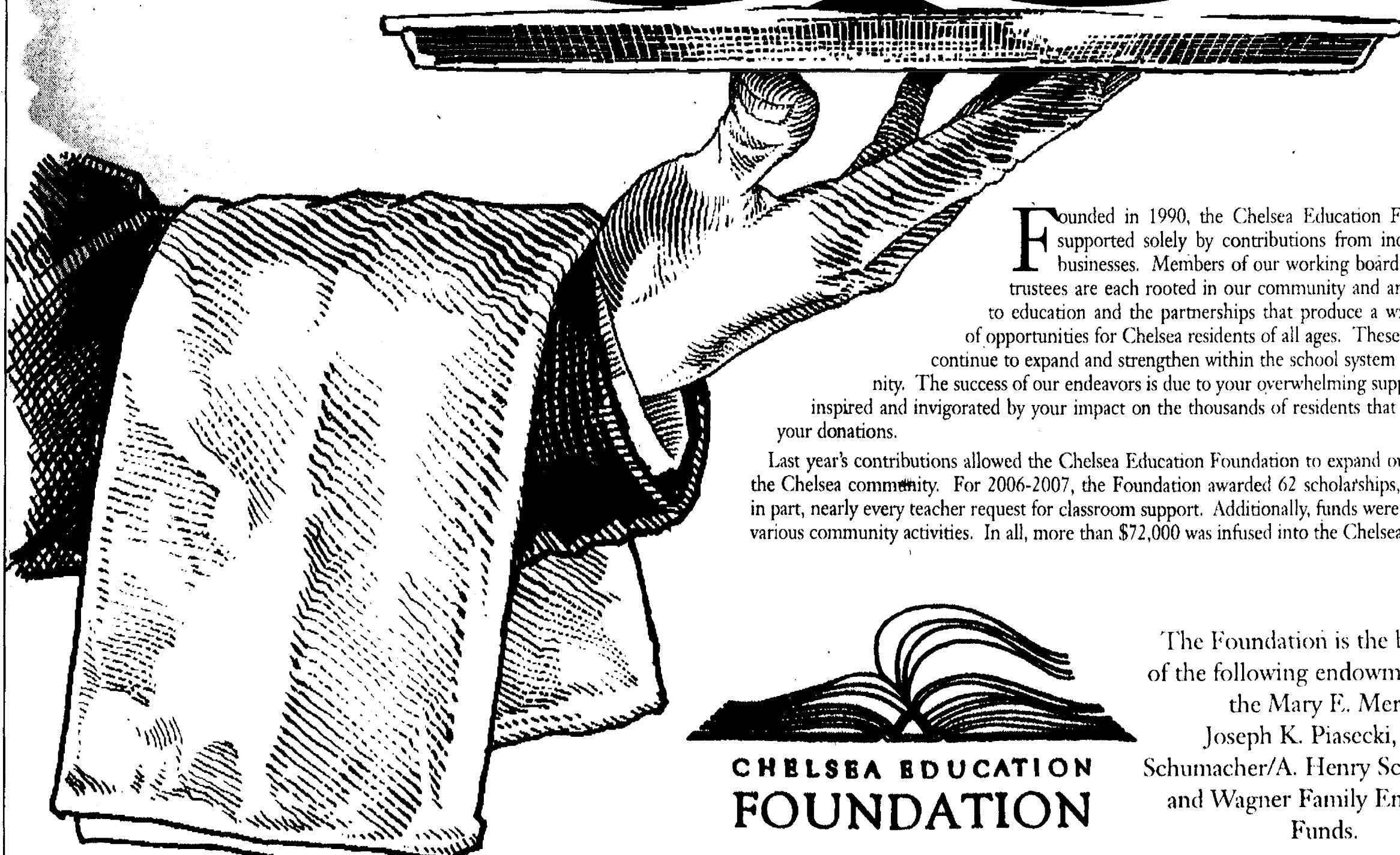

There were a couple of people who either were unable to mention the word cancer or thought that I wanted to pretend nothing was going on, so they ignored the elephant in the room. This actually made me feel awkward and out of place. On the other hand, I adored hearing stories about my friends' lives, so don't feel that all we can talk about is cancer.

This might be a good opportunity for an individual to face something frightening and grow as a person, or perhaps it's better to back off and leave the patient in the hands of those who can deal with the disease.

Often I was asked if it was alright to hug me. I welcomed hugs and often that show of affection indicated that I was not "untouchable." As a cancer patient, the last thing I wanted was to be transformed into an oddity.

There were a few times that I wanted to be left alone and the thought of talking on the phone or answering the door was unimaginable. Please understand that cancer takes an emotional toll on a person. I know that a couple of people felt insulted, but please believe me when I say that I value your effort, but another time is better.

A good idea is to call and ask what the family of a cancer patient needs. Maybe it's a meal for the family, an errand that desperately needs running or the kids need a ride to an activity. Your help is needed and appreciated, but providing the right thing at the right time is more meaningful than guessing.

One woman whom I barely knew showed up as we arrived home from the hospital with a gigantic, piping-

hot dish of aromatic macaroni and cheese. For anyone who has ever experienced post-anesthesia nausea, you might understand that food was not on my mind. In addition, there was no room in the refrigerator for the dish and I was on a strict diet that prohibited dairy products that weren't organic.

There are occasions that warrant telling another person that I was diagnosed with breast cancer. However, spreading the word for the mere sake of needing a topic of conversation is not acceptable. You might think that we won't find out, but we usually do.

Some of the people who learned of my disease called me right up or e-mailed me to let me know they were thinking of me. That felt like the right response, as opposed to the ones who suddenly avoided us, stared or acted awkwardly at our next interaction. Children are acutely aware of unspoken messages and your actions or what you tell your own children can impact the children of a cancer patient.

So many people helped out the four of us during my breast cancer that there is simply not enough room and no adequate way to thank everyone for their contributions. My hope is that by sharing which activities brightened my day and which actions were not as positive, that I might inspire friends and family members with ideas to assist the cancer patient in their lives.

Locals excel at next level

Chelsea and Dexter athletes rise above the crowd on the hardwood, the links and the gridiron in this week's edition of catching up with former Bulldog and Dreadnaught athletic standouts.

At Eastern Michigan University, former Chelsea All-Stater Courtney Aili has helped lead the Eagles' women's golf team to its highest national ranking in school history. After competing in four events during the fall season, in which EMU placed in the top 10 in each tournament, the Eagles enter the spring season ranked 52nd in the country.

To close out the fall season, EMU won the Shootout at the Legends in Franklin, Ind. Oct. 9 through 10. The Eagles 54-hole score of 888 set a school record.

Individually, Aili, a junior, finished fourth overall in the tournament finishing with a three-day score of 223 (73-77-73).

Eastern begins the spring season Feb. 26 at the Islander Spring Classic in Corpus Christi, Texas.

At Hope College, Dexter sophomore Jenny Cowen has sparked the Flying Dutchmen women's basketball team to a perfect 15-0 overall record. Hope is 7-0 in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Last Saturday, Cowen scored 11 points as the Dutch defeated Albion College 64-62.

A 5-foot-9 forward, Cowen averages six points and three rebounds per game for Hope. She's third on the team with 10 three-pointers. Her 80 percent free throw shooting (16-of-20) is second best on the Flying Dutchmen squad.

At Kalamazoo College, former Dexter standout Kelsea Howell leads the Hornets' women's basketball team in scoring averaging 14.1 points per game. She also pulls down 4.7 rebounds per contest. She has 20 steals this season and has scored a total of 211 points. At the free throw line, Howell is 30-of-35 for a team second-best 85 percent.

Last Saturday, Kalamazoo (4-11, 1-6) lost to Calvin College 79-40 in MIAA action. Howell, a 5-10 guard, had four points and one rebound.

On Jan. 16, the Hornets lost to St. Mary's 72-69.

Looking ahead

Carr settles into new role at Michigan

No regrets. None.

In looking back at his 13 years as the University of Michigan's head football coach, Lloyd Carr said Thursday that he wouldn't have done anything differently.

Carr announced his retirement from coaching Nov. 19, two days after his Wolverines ended their regular season.

Late on the afternoon of Jan. 1, after U of M beat Florida 41-35 in the Capital One Bowl in Orlando, Fla. — and after he got a Gatorade shower from his players on the sideline — he handed the reins of the win-

ningest program in college football history to Rich Rodriguez.

Carr, 62, spent 13 seasons as Michigan's head football coach, and 15 years before that as an assistant coach for the Wolverines. All told, the 1963 Riverview Community High School graduate spent 40 years coaching high school and college football.

"It was time," he said. "I had a great time. It was great fun. It was time to do something else. Essentially, that's what it comes down to. I was ready to do something else."

"It's something that I really began to think seriously about a

year ago. That's when I knew it wasn't going to be long. I wasn't sure how long."

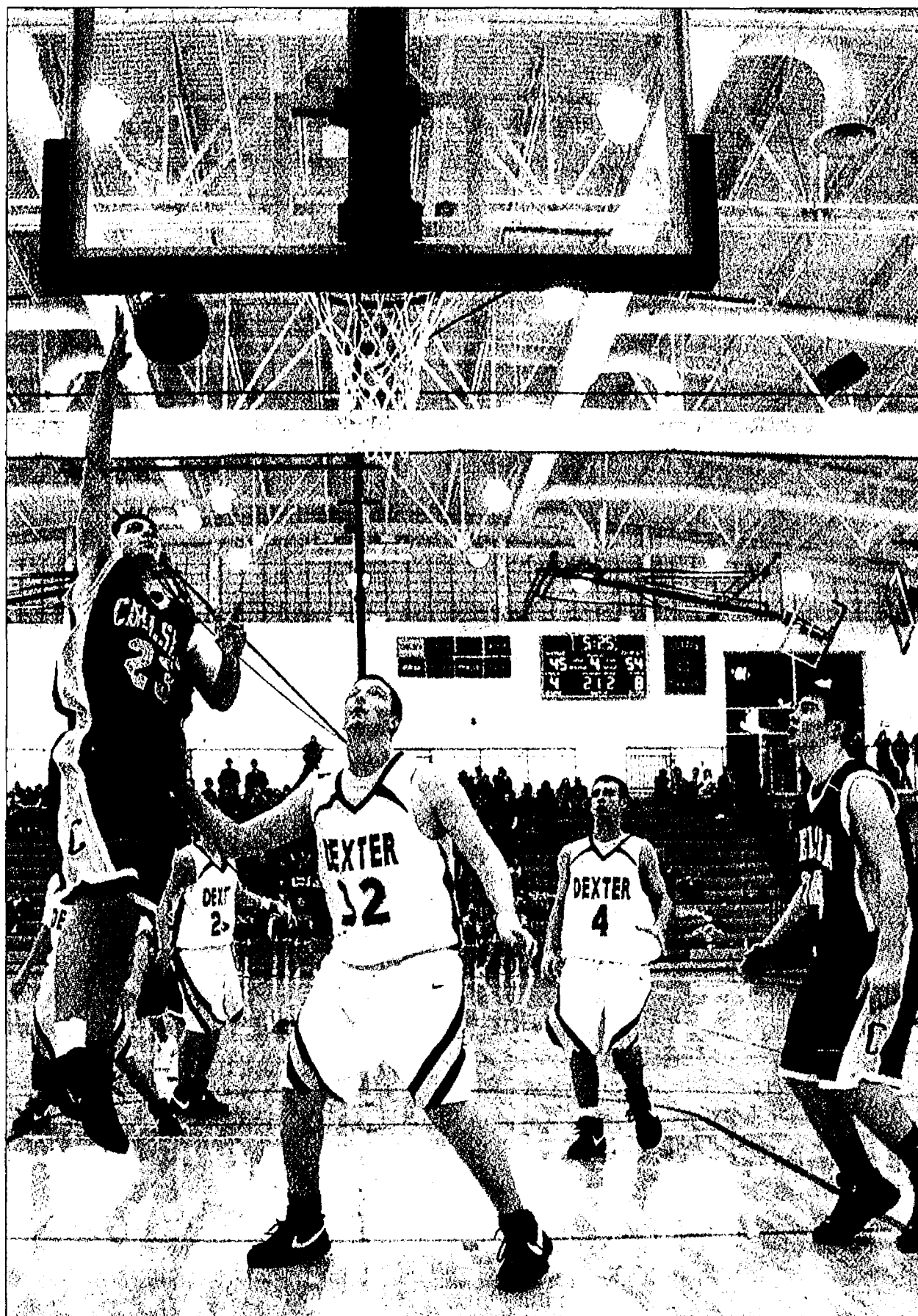
Per his football contract, Carr became an associate athletic director upon his retirement from coaching. His exact duties still are to be determined, and he has moved from a spacious office at Schembechler Hall on the U of M campus to more modest digs at the athletic administration building, Weidenbach Hall.

He's been spending plenty of time on the telephone giving recommendation interviews for his assistant coaches.

Bulldogs race to win over Indians

Chelsea's girls' basketball team couldn't have asked for a better beginning last Friday against host Tecumseh.

The Bulldogs (5-8, 5-4 Southeastern Conference) raced out to an 18-0 first quarter lead against the Indians, who are in first place, a half game ahead of Chelsea, in the SEC White Division.

"Tecumseh has a 6-4 record in the SEC White Division," said Chelsea coach Todd Blomquist. "We are two of those losses."

Chelsea has definitely had Tecumseh's number this season. Last Friday was no exception as the Bulldogs opened the game clicking on all cylinders.

In the second quarter, the Indians regrouped, outscoring Chelsea 12-6 and trimming the Bulldogs' lead to 24-12 at halftime.

was too little, too late for the Indians.

Senior post player Brogan Darwin (6-foot) led Chelsea with 13 points, seven rebounds, three assists and two steals.

Senior guard Annie Hollandsworth added 10 points, including two three-pointers, three steals and two assists, while junior guard Krystin Schwarze had nine points and two rebounds for the Bulldogs.

Senior forward Emily Rabbitt finished with seven points, a team-high five assists and two steals, while senior guard Lizzy Bentley had four points and two boards and junior guards Megan Dunn and Erin Benjamin each ended up with two points. Benjamin also hauled down four rebounds for Chelsea.

The Bulldogs shot well, finishing 19-of-36 from the field for 52 percent. In contrast, Tecumseh was 15-of-37 for 40 percent.

At the free throw line, Chelsea was 6-of-12 for 50 percent, while the Indians were 11-of-21 for 52 percent.

Tecumseh out-rebounded the Bulldogs 22-17, including 10-4 on the offensive

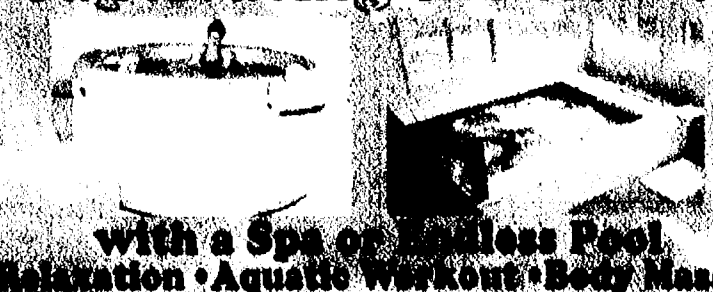

Chelsea on win streak

Limiting opponents' chances and taking advantage of opportunities has keyed Chelsea's current four-game winning streak as the Bulldogs skate toward the regular season's final month.

The Bulldogs (9-4-2, 3-0-1 Southeastern Conference) defeated visiting Ann Arbor Pioneer 4-2 last Saturday. The Pioneers, who two weeks ago defeated Livonia Churchill, ranked No. 2 in the state in Division 1, entered last Saturday's game playing their best hockey of the season.

"They (Pioneer) started slow, but they're playing much better now," said Chelsea coach Don Wright. "It was a tough game."

At 3:16 of the third period, Brown scored upping Chelsea's margin to 3-1. Senior Drew Dehring and George recorded an assist on the goal for the Bulldogs.

Two minutes later, Pioneer answered as Jeff Weintraub scored a power play goal closing the gap to 3-2.

At 9:24 of the third period, Brown notched his second goal of the contest, this time scoring on a power play for the night's final tally. Senior Matt Prince and Cox picked up assists on the play for Chelsea.

The Bulldogs out-shot Ann Arbor 22-16 for the game.

Earning the victory in net for Chelsea was junior goaltender Joey Hume.

Wright said he was pleased with his squad's resolve against the talented Pioneers.

"They (Pioneer) kept coming back, but we kept answering and kept a two goal lead," he said. "We had some pretty good scoring chances. We were able to capitalize on our chances. We did a good job of elimi-

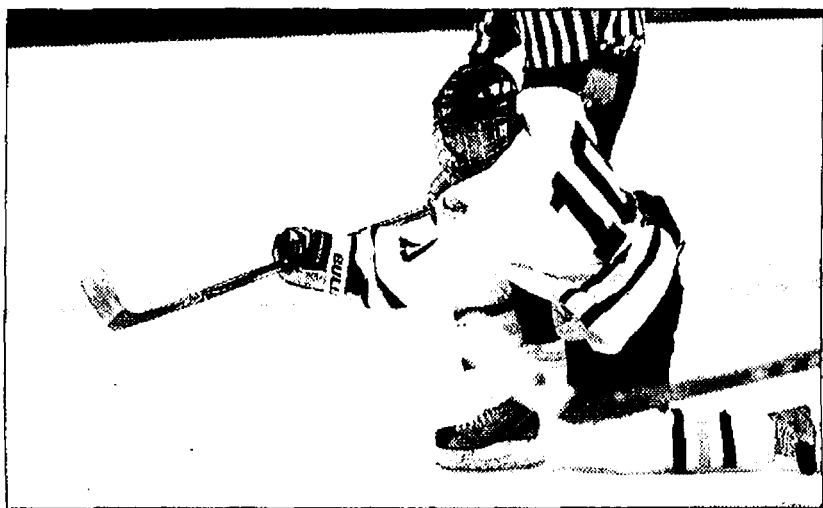

"He was on first that day,"

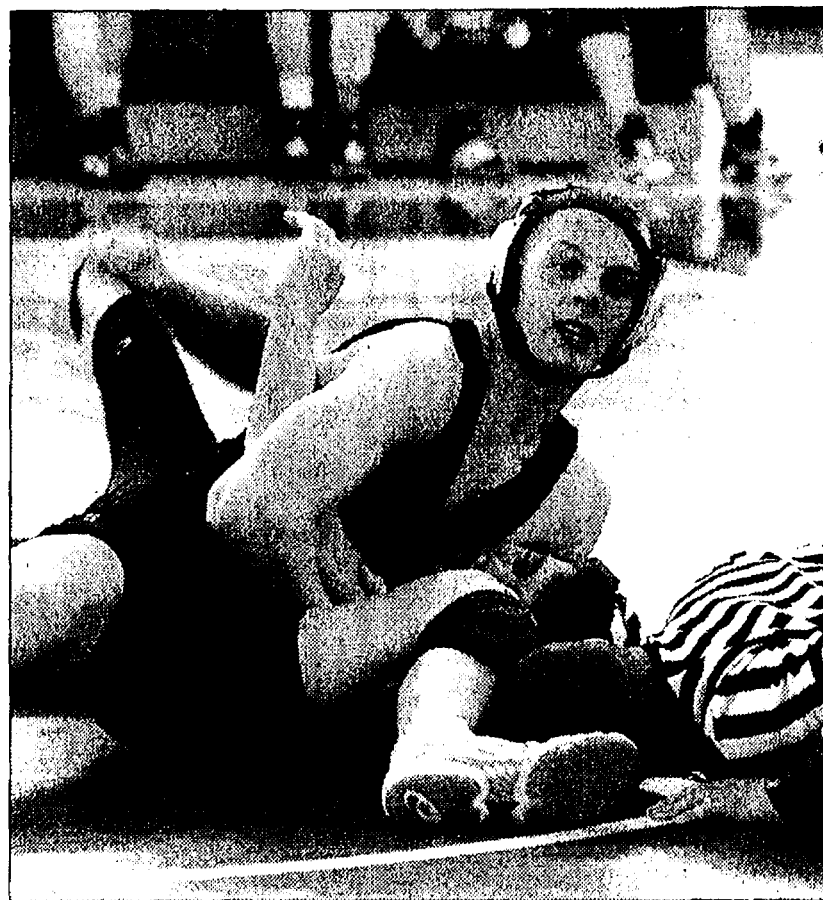

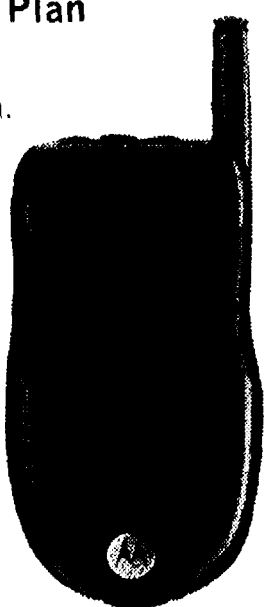

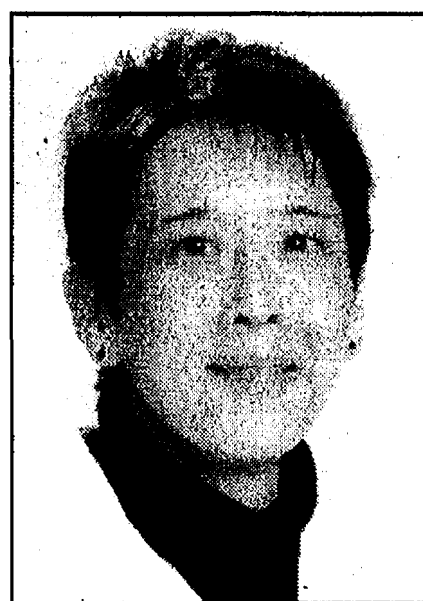

Senior Matt Schwarze had four points, seven assists and five steals, while sophomore Tyler Zegarzewski had four points and four assists and junior Michael Roberts two points and two rebounds for the Bulldogs.

Worker finished with 12 points for Tecumseh, scoring 10 in the first half. In the second half, he had two points in the third quarter and zero in the fourth stanza.

"We tried to keep the ball out of his hands in the second half," Raymond said. "Matt (Schwarze) did a nice job defensively on him."

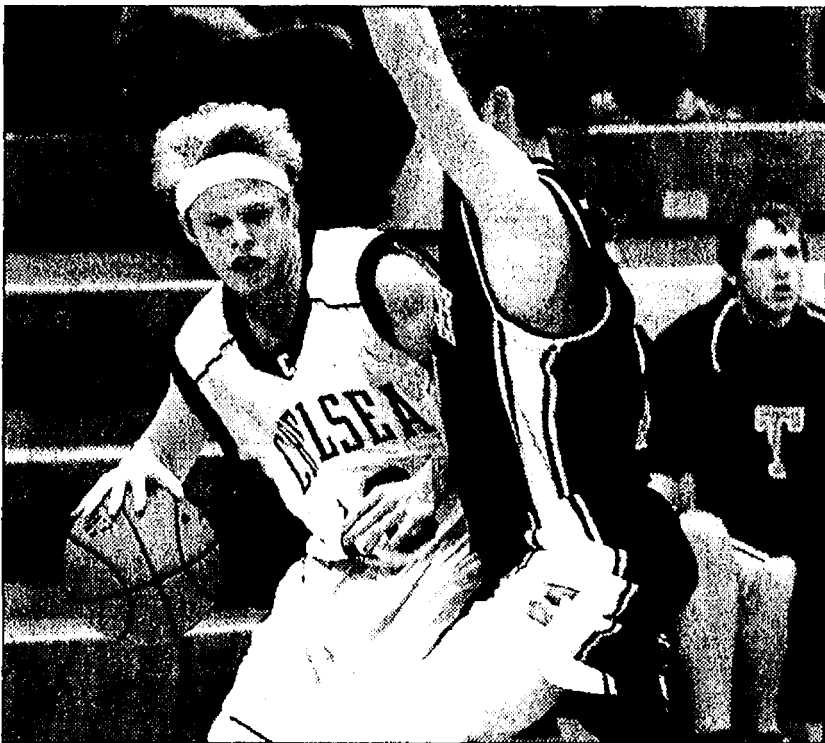

As a team, Chelsea was 12-of-16 from the free throw line for 75 percent. The Bulldogs also had only 13 turnovers for the game.

"I was pleased with that," Raymond said of the Bulldogs' free throw shooting and ball control.

On Jan. 15, visiting Chelsea beat rival Dexter 67-56.

The Bulldogs silenced the rabid Dreadnaught crowd taking a 13-8 first quarter lead.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs played lights out, outscoring Dexter 19-8 taking a commanding 32-16 advantage into the locker room.

In the second quarter, Chelsea shot 8-of-10 from the floor, gave up zero offensive rebounds and committed only one turnover.

"We wanted to set the tone in the first half," Raymond said. "We played very well on the offensive end in the first half. We were able to get the ball to the open man. That made a big difference. We were able to get the ball inside to the cutters."

In the third quarter, the Dreadnaughts responded, outscoring the Bulldogs 23-

18 cutting Chelsea's lead to 50-39.

Early in the fourth quarter, with the Dexter crowd at a fever pitch and with momentum on its side, the Dreadnaughts cut the Bulldog lead to six points. With Chelsea staggering just a bit, Raymond called a timeout to calm his squad.

It worked.

Out of the timeout, the Bulldogs caught their second wind, scoring three straight baskets and regaining control of the contest.

"That was big," Raymond said. "We weathered their second half run."

In the fourth quarter, both clubs netted 17 points for the night's final outcome.

As it has all season, Chelsea received contributions from a number of players. Against the Dreadnaughts, the Bulldogs had five players score in double figures.

"It seems that every night somebody else steps up," Raymond said. "Greg Rebuldela played his best game of the year."

Rebuldela paced Chelsea with 15 points, nine rebounds, five assists and four steals.

Stratan finished with 12

points, nine rebounds and three blocked shots, while Schwarze had 11 points and three steals and Zegarzewski 11 points and five boards.

Mantel ended up with 10 points and four rebounds, while Mann and Roberts each had four points for the Bulldogs.

Chelsea was 28-of-58 from the field for 52 percent. Dexter was 21-of-50 for 42 percent.

At the line, the Bulldogs were 10-of-14 for 71 percent. The Dreadnaughts ended up 10-of-15 for 67 percent.

Chelsea out-rebounded Dexter 39-26, including 16-6 on the offensive glass.

"Our inside defense and rebounding did a great job against Dexter," Raymond said. "We focused on that. Our bench also played an important role. And shooting 52 percent against Dexter is quite an accomplishment."

Chelsea next hosts Ann Arbor Huron Thursday at 7:15 p.m.

On Saturday, the Bulldogs travel to Ann Arbor Pioneer for a contest at 7:15 p.m. The Pioneers are ranked in the state's top 10 in Class A.

An interesting side note to Thursday's and Saturday's games is that it will be a girls and boys varsity doubleheader. The Chelsea varsity girls' squad will take on Huron at 5:30 p.m. Thursday and Pioneer at 5:30 p.m. Saturday.

Freshman Basketball Chelsea's freshman boys' basketball team defeated visiting Tecumseh 51-41 Jan. 17.

The Bulldogs (6-3, 4-3 SEC) used an 18-4 second quarter run to take a 25-12 lead into the break.

On Jan. 15, visiting Chelsea defeated rival Dexter 66-41.

Brian Paulsen led the Bulldogs with 19 points. Mason Border added 15 points for Chelsea.

The Bulldogs next host Ann Arbor Huron Thursday at 4 p.m.

On Saturday, Chelsea hosts Ann Arbor Pioneer at 1 p.m.

Howell, a senior captain, led Kalamazoo with 22 points, three steals and one block. From the line, she was a perfect 4-of-4.

Chelsea's Tony Scheffler recently completed his second season with the NFL's Denver Broncos. The 6-5, 250-pound tight end started seven games this season for Denver, which finished 7-9 overall this season.

This past year, Scheffler ended up with 49 catches for 549 yards and five touchdowns. His 49 catches were second best on the squad. He also had a blocked punt this season on special teams. Scheffler's 49 catches were 10th best in the league among tight ends.

His receiving yardage was 11th among NFL tight ends.

In two seasons, Scheffler has 67 receptions for 835 yards and nine TDs. He's played in 29 games, with 12 starts.

A two-time All-Mid-American selection while at Western Michigan

University, Scheffler finished his career second all-time in receptions (117) and yards (1,345) for a tight end in WMU history. "That's a responsibility that's very important, and it will be until they're all placed," Carr said.

One assistant, Fred Jackson, was kept by Rodriguez, and another, Ron English, was hired by the University of Louisville. The rest still are looking, but still will be paid through 2008.

Carr said he has talked with Rodriguez, who was hired away from the same job at West Virginia University, but didn't want to go into details. He also declined to comment on the coaching search.

Carr said his responsibilities won't include football.

"I'm going to be a fan," he said.

"Obviously, he's a young guy who has had great experience and a lot of success. I think he's a great choice."

Life after football

Now that he has retired from coaching and has left the 18-hour workdays behind, Carr said he's going to take time to decide what he wants to do with his free time, aside from spending time with his wife, Laurie, six children and 11 grandchildren — nine of whom live in the area.

"My life has been filled with football," Carr said. "I've not spent a lot of time thinking about the future."

"There aren't many jobs that are as time-consuming as coaching. There will be an adjustment there."

Carr plans to spend some time watching NFL games on television — which he hasn't been able to do because Sundays are busy days for college coaches — and maybe attending some, because so many of his players are in the league. He attended Super Bowl XL at Ford Field in Detroit in 2006. Among the players were Michigan All-Americans Steve Hutchinson of the Seattle Seahawks and Larry Foote and Jerame Tuman of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

His most famous ex-player, though, is New England Patriots quarterback Tom Brady, who will make his fourth trip to the Super Bowl next month. Brady — who lettered at Michigan from 1997 to '99 — is 3-0 in Super Bowls, and twice was named as the game's most valuable player.

"Tom Brady is an incredible human being," Carr said. "He was a great leader

here. We all have great respect (for him). The thing (about) his teammates and friends from Michigan, they all admire the fact all the success he has hasn't changed him.

"He's had incredible success and still is establishing a legend as one of the greatest quarterbacks in the game."

On a personal note

Another quarterback who wasn't a starter means even more to Carr — his son, Jason, who lettered from 1993 to '95 (Carr's first as head coach).

"The great news was that I got to see him every day," Carr said. "That's something most college coaches don't get to do. I'm extremely proud of who he is and what he is. He's a wonderful father. He graduated from Michigan. It was a wonderful experience to watch him grow up and mature. That's unusual."

Jason Carr followed his father's footsteps into coaching football, spending two seasons as an assistant coach at Central Michigan University. He's now a sales representative for Reebok.

The early years

Lloyd Carr decided that he wanted to be a teacher

and coach when he was a college junior, but his passion for sports started well before that.

He was born in Hawkins County, Tenn., on July 30, 1945, and his family moved to a house on Brinson Street in sports-crazy Riverview when he was 10. Carr lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Riverview Community High School, and was an All-State quarterback as a senior in 1962.

"I had some incredibly dedicated people who were just great role models," Carr said. "I grew up at a time when it was very common to play three sports. You just played whatever was in season. There wasn't really anything else to do. It was a great time to grow up. We had people dedicated in the community to Little League sports. It was a great time."

Among his role models were high school coaches Bud McCourt, Pat Ankney and Jim Martin.

His first teaching job after graduating from Northern Michigan University was at Butzel Junior High School while serving as an assistant football coach at Nativity High School, both in Detroit. He then was a teacher and assistant coach at Belleville High School, and then a teacher and head coach at John Glenn High School in

the University of Illinois, where he coached under Gary Moeller — something he later did at Michigan — spent part of an off-season coaching at West Virginia University, then got the call from Michigan Coach Bo Schembechler, who named Carr as his defensive backs coach.

Schembechler promoted Carr to defensive coordinator in 1987. After the 1988 season, Schembechler retired, Moeller was promoted to head coach and Carr added "assistant head coach" to his defensive coordinator title.

When Schembechler named Carr as his defensive coordinator, it got him thinking about someday becoming a head coach.

"That was a wonderful opportunity in terms of a leadership role," Carr said. "I knew when I got that opportunity, it would prepare me to be a head coach. I didn't know what was ahead, but certainly that was one of my goals."

Becoming the boss

Carr became the Wolverines' interim head coach when Moeller resigned after an altercation with police in May 1995.

"It was a difficult time for everyone," Carr said. "I had a son on that team. When

they asked me to be the coach for the 1995 season. I just made up my mind I was going to approach the season, when it was over, (that) hopefully all of these guys could say they had a great experience during that season."

His Wolverines were 9-4 that year. Ten weeks into the season, with Michigan at 8-2, the interim tag was removed.

Carr's first game was nothing short of memorable. The Wolverines, who fell behind Virginia 17-0, won 18-17 on a Scott Dreisbach-to-Mercury Hayes touchdown pass on the last play of the game.

On the mountaintop

In Carr's third season, 1997, the Wolverines hit pay dirt, going 12-0 and winning three of the four national championships that were awarded.

"It was a very hard fight," Carr said. "I remember going to the (preseason) Big Ten meeting, and the media picked us to finish fifth. We had some great football players on that '97 team and we had some great leadership. There was a real dedication and determination to win the championship. They were a very focused group."

The Wolverines came from behind to beat Notre Dame and Iowa, and Carr really knew he had something special when his team beat Penn State, 34-8, on the road. The Nittany Lions were ranked third and Michigan was fourth in that week's Associated Press poll.

Michigan then scored a 26-16 win at Wisconsin, setting the stage for the regular season-ending showdown with No. 4 Ohio State, which the No. 1-ranked Wolverines won 20-14 at Michigan Stadium.

"No one who was ever in that stadium will ever forget that day," Carr said. "It was really special."

"There was so much at stake. It was a great ballgame. We got out ahead 20-0. Ohio State came back and made it 20-14. We were a banged-up football team. We struggled, but defensively, we played incredibly well. Ohio State had a chance to win the game. Our defense held, and all hell broke loose."

A couple of weeks later, cornerback/wide receiver Charles Woodson became

the third Wolverine to win the Heisman Trophy as college football's best player.

"It was an incredible achievement," Carr said. "Winning the Heisman as a defensive player, that may never happen again. He was very deserving of the Heisman Trophy."

The Wolverines capped their perfect season by beating Washington State 21-16 in the Rose Bowl.

Days later, there was a parade through the streets of Ann Arbor and a rally at Crisler Arena.

"That was another absolutely incredible experience," Carr said. "Crisler Arena was packed. They introduced all the players and coaches. It was an experience none of us will forget."

Carr spent the next 10 seasons trying to reach the mountaintop again.

"I knew after we won it, that changed things," he said. "I think it was a wonderful challenge. In 2006, we had a great chance to do it. We had a couple other great teams in there."

"It proves how difficult it is. It just highlights what a tremendous achievement that '97 team was able to accomplish. They raised the bar. It's been fun to try to do it again."

Ultimate season

Carr's next-to-last season, 2006, saw Michigan win its first 11 games. Hours before the No. 2-ranked Wolverines boarded their buses for the trip to Columbus, Ohio, to play the No. 1 Buckeyes, Schembechler died.

"It was extremely hard and it was extremely distracting to the game itself," Carr said. "There's no other way to put it. Plus, we were playing a great team in Columbus. That's what it was."

"Part of being a great team is being able to deal with distractions. Bo's loss was much bigger than a distraction. It was an incredible loss for our university. It was part of that team, part of that season none of us will ever forget. It was a hard time."

Ohio State University won that game 42-39 on the way to winning the national championship. Michigan went on to lose to Southern California in the Rose Bowl 32-18.

The upset

The Wolverines opened the 2007 season with two losses — the first a 34-32 decision to defending

Division I-AA national champion Appalachian State in what many experts called the biggest upset in college football history.

"We knew the caliber of athletes they had," Carr said. "We knew the quarterback (Armanti Edwards) was a phenomenal athlete. I don't think there's any way we took Appalachian State lightly. We struggled greatly on defense because we were replacing some great players. We missed some opportunities on special teams."

After losing 39-7 to Oregon, the Wolverines won eight straight — despite quarterback Chad Henne and tailback Mike Hart coming in and out of the lineup with injuries — then lost their final two regular-season games.

The season ended with the win over Florida.

"It ranks up there with some of my greatest memories because of everything involved," Carr said. "There were so many things that

made it special, especially with how this team started with the struggles."

"They beat an outstanding Florida team, essentially as a road team, as big underdogs. It speaks to the quality and character of our team."

Carr said he and his wife plan to stay involved with some of their numerous charitable endeavors, and he plans to continue his annual summer football camp at Riverview Community High School.

He looked back on his 40-year career with satisfaction, saying that the disappointments make the successes more meaningful.

"I had a great time," Carr said. "I loved every minute of it. I can't say I enjoyed every minute. That's the difficult challenge because you're so focused on what it takes 18 hours a day. I will, in the days ahead, be able to revisit with a lot of those players."

"That'll be fun to do."

Section 46-79. Notification and fines.

(a) Notification and fines under this division shall be as follows:

(1) *Initial notice.* No fine with explanation explaining ramifications if sidewalk is not cleared within 48 hours. An initial notice will only be given once per winter season.

(2) *First Violation.* \$50.00 and sidewalk must be cleared within 24 hours or the village causes the removal of snow and bills the property owner.

(3) *Second Violation (First Repeat Violation).* \$100.00 and sidewalk must be cleared within 24 hours or the village causes the removal of snow and bills the property owner.

(4) *Subsequent Violation.* \$250.00 and sidewalk must be cleared within 24 hours or the village causes the removal of snow and bills the property owner.

(5) *Contract for snow removal.* Actual cost, plus \$25.00, to be paid within 30 days. Contract costs are in addition to civil fines.

(b) Failure to pay fines and/or invoices within required period will result in the placement of a lien against a property.

VILLAGE OF DEXTER VILLAGE COUNCIL NOTICE OF ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

Pursuant to Michigan Public Act 110 of 2006, as amended, notice is hereby given that the Village of Dexter Village Council has adopted amendments to Article 6, Landscaping Standards, of the Village of Dexter Zoning Ordinance. The amendments will be effective on February 13, 2008. The Village Council approved the ordinance amendments at the January 14, 2008 meeting.

Article 6, Landscaping Standards, Section 6.14 Replacement Standards, Section 6.14F is being amended to the following:

Where it is not feasible and/or desirable to replace or relocate trees on site, according to the above listed schedule, the Planning Commission may require greater size for replacement trees, require replacement trees at another location on public property in the Village, or require contributions to the Village's Tree Replacement Program.

Where the applicant demonstrates that it is not possible to mitigate all replacements on site, the Planning Commission may also consider the planting of two ornamental trees per one required replacement tree.

On site replacement and/or relocation shall be required for permitted activities in accordance with the replacement schedule of this section. Every effort should be made to relocate or mitigate trees on site. Off site mitigation or contribution to the Village's Tree Replacement Program shall only be allowed after the applicant has demonstrated that on site mitigation is not practical or feasible. The requirement for onsite mitigation may be altered or waived by the Planning Commission if the proposal meets the following criteria:

1. The proposal meets all other ordinance requirements.
2. The applicant can clearly demonstrate that there is inadequate planting area for the healthy installation of the required trees on site and that maximum effort has been put into locating as many of the required trees as possible.
3. The applicant has made every reasonable effort to preserve as many of the existing on site trees as possible.
4. The proposal demonstrates environmental sensitive design in terms of topography, stormwater management, soil erosion management, etc.

Should the proposal meet the above criteria, the Planning Commission may reduce the requirement for onsite mitigation of replacement trees and permit mitigation off site at an approved location or by contribution to the Village's Tree Replacement Program. Off site mitigation or financial contribution shall only apply if the Planning Commission should determine that no practical or feasible alternative exists for onsite mitigation. Payment to the program per tree removed shall be in accordance with replacement fee schedule as established by Village Council resolution. Contributions placed in the Tree Replacement Program shall be used in accordance with the Tree Replacement Program Policy Statement.

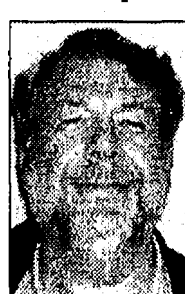

WWRA reiterates validity of check-signing policy

The Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority board of directors revisited an agenda item that still ranks officials of one member township.

Discussion at the Jan. 9 meeting returned to the WWRA's check-signing policy, which does not require the signatures of two

board members.

Lyndon Township Supervisor Mary Ann Noah has in the past objected to the policy, because a two-signature rule is traditionally used in business to safeguard against fraud.

The WWRA board discussed the policy at its December meeting, and decided it withstood legal review.

"We reconfirmed that we are staying with one signa-

ture," said board Chairman Frank Hammer.

"Katie Francis (Lyndon's WWRA representative) presented our discussion to the Lyndon Township board at their meeting; Mary Ann became very upset and said the issue is not resolved."

Hammer said the policy is valid because no board member or WWRA employee has access to checks in the first place, and they are written only by the WWRA's accounting firm, Hesse & Co. in Chelsea.

Checks are released only

on invoices and only after the board approves paying those invoices, Hammer said, and it has never been an issue in an audit.

He even contacted an accountant retired from one of the "Big Three" national accounting firms for advice on the policy, who saw no reasons to believe there is fraud in the system, Hammer said.

"Our safeguards are superior," Hammer said.

"The WWRA board has a very protective system and

Driver's license includes U.S. status requirement

First-time applicants for a Michigan driver's license or identification card must prove that they have established a permanent legal presence in the United States, under a requirement taking effect Tuesday, Jan. 22, Secretary of State Terri Lynn Land announced Monday.

Land's push to enhance driver's license security can now move forward due to a recent attorney general's opinion. The opinion says that under current law the state cannot issue a driver's license to anyone who is not in the country legally and permanently. Today's announcement only deals with original applications. Updated procedures for

renewals will be released soon.

"This is one more tool in our initiative to bolster Michigan's border and document security," Land said. "It also puts Michigan's procedure in line with those of most other states. The department will maintain its highest standards of customer service by sharing information with the public and working with applicants so that they understand the requirements. We all share the goal of a safer Michigan and America."

As of Tuesday, applicants for an original driver's license or state-issued ID card must meet four standards in addition to Michigan's driving and phys-

ical health requirements by providing documentation of:

- A valid Social Security number or ineligibility for one. Applicants will have to bring their Social Security card or other acceptable document to a Secretary of State office, or a letter of ineligibility from the U.S. Social Security Administration.

- Legal and permanent presence in the United States.

- Their identity (legal name and date of birth).

- Michigan residency.

A list of acceptable documents is at www.Michigan.gov/sos. The Web site includes information on obtaining a Social Security card from the fed-

eral government.

Land encouraged customers to make sure they have the documents necessary to complete their applications before going to a branch office.

She added that the new policy actually complements the department's commitment to speeding up branch office service. Because fewer foreign identity documents will be accepted from applicants, employees at the counter won't be confronted with as many time-consuming transactions and can serve other customers. Documents that need additional verification will be reviewed in Lansing rather than in branch offices. In those instances a customer may be asked to visit the branch again.

Land also pointed out that the number of original applications processed in branch offices is relatively small, accounting for less than 4 percent of all branch transactions.

A state lawmaker recently asked Michigan's attorney general to revisit a 1995 opinion that has guided Michigan's policy to this point. The 1995 opinion said the department could not refuse to issue a license simply because the applicant was not legally in the country. The most recent opinion takes precedence over the earlier opinion.

Land already has been working to enhance driver's license security. In December 2007 she proposed the creation of an upgraded "standard" driver's license and an optional "enhanced" version that can be used in place of a passport at the Canadian border. The plan is being considered by the Legislature.

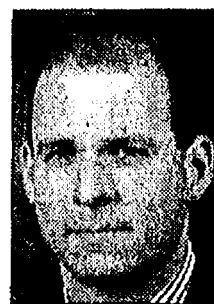

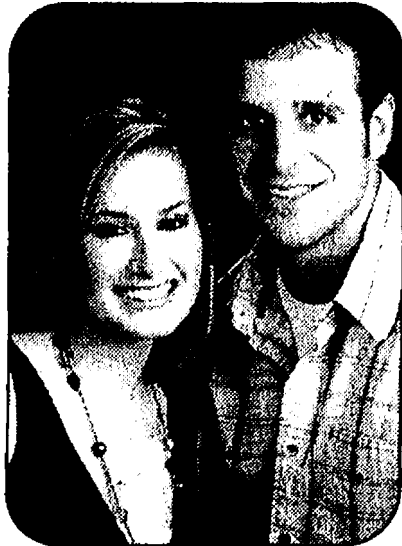

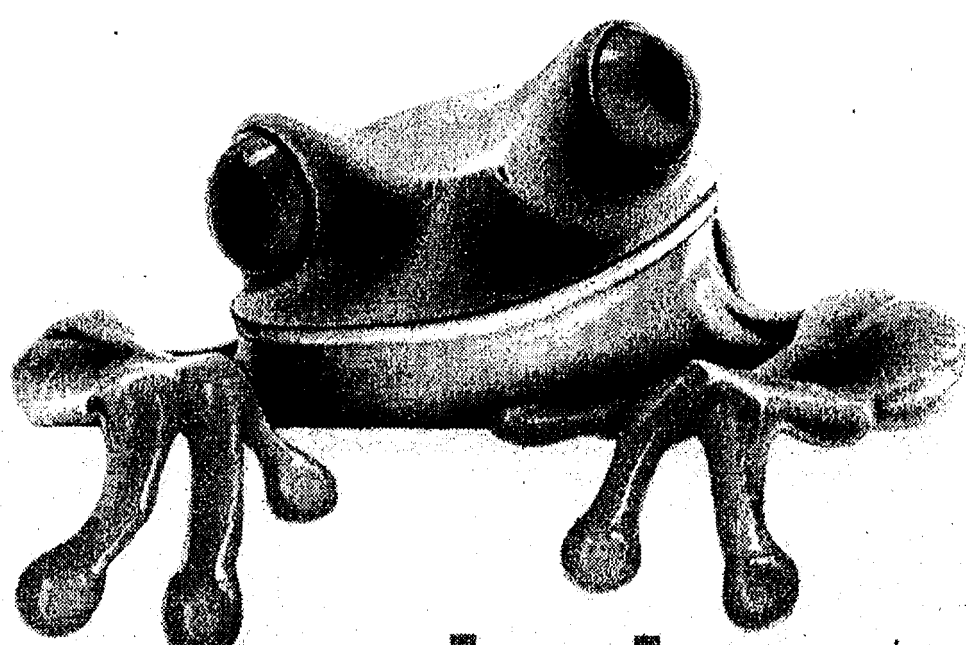

Putting away childish things

I know I'm a pastor, but it's not like God just drops huge spiritual insights on me all the time. Last year, though, God gave me a spiritual insight that sort of blew me away. And I want to live throughout this year.

I couldn't figure out why I was in this cycle. I don't even like conflict! I'm a terrible arguer! And then God showed me: when the people I care about are under-reacting, blowing off what's important to me; or when they are over-reacting, to me or to one another, like my kids might, I realized they are simply operating out of their wounded ness.

Jesus called me to be patient and kind in my love. And when the people around me make that difficult, it could be because there's a part of their past when they were little that I don't know about: one in which they were wounded, that is still living in them in the present. The inner

child of our wounded past often causes us to overreact to the actual reality of our present situation.

When I discovered that, it was like God gave me eyes to see that person's wounded, hidden child. And my love for them was restored; even when tempers and situations weren't yet! Even when I felt people were overreacting and driving me crazy, I wanted to help free them. I wanted to see them restored. I wanted them to be able to put those old hurts, those damaged emotions away.

This year, I want to do away with childish things. Special note to husbands: In the midst of an argument with your wife, in the heat of the moment, if

you have the chance to tell your wife that the only reason she's acting this way is because she's operating out of her woundedness, don't. In the midst of the "discussion," she just won't dig it.

If this sounds like pop psychology, it isn't. In the middle of 1 Corinthians 13, the very famous "love chapter" which is often read at church weddings ("Love is patient, love is kind..."), listen to these words: "For we know in part, and we prophesy in part, but when the perfect comes, the partial will be done away. When I was

a child, I used to speak as a child, think as a child, reason as a child. When I became an adult, I did away with childish things." 1 Corinthians 13:9-11.

Dr. David Seamands writes, "Somewhere, sometime, you were a child. And although you don't remember all the details, the child and teenager you once were is still important to you today, because it continues to exist within you. The hidden child of your past is very much alive and affects everything that you do, for good or bad."

William Wordsworth was right — he wrote "The child is father of the man." For good or bad, you can't cut yourself off from your own history. Many of your most important pathways began in your childhood.

In some people, the child thrives as a bawling, brawling, sprawling character. In other people, the inner child is so timid, fearful, and defeated

that no matter how much you want to, you just can't force yourself to make friends, speak up, or handle responsibility. Many of us struggle with both. The great tragedy is that it keeps us from being free. Life's hard enough when you're fully equipped, mature, and growing! But following our childish ways binds us to our past, and chains us to our childish reactions. We're not free to love or bring newness to our homes and into our relationships with people. We never really act, we just react. And it's important to know this part of yourself, not so that you can find excuses, but so you can be free! And grow into the person God created you to be!

God must have known this, because He led the Apostle Paul to set his words about putting away childish things at the very heart of the great love chapter, 1 Corinthians 13. This perfect love, which leads to maturity, casts out fear and

brings creativity and newness. But you can't find this kind of love until there is katargeo, until the childish junk is dealt with and put away.

Imagine what would happen in our homes and in our relationships if we begin to live free of childish ways?

This year, 2008, is an election year. And it is very important for us to be fully engaged in our political process. But what do you think will change our community more? The election of a new president, or a strong body of Christ followers who have put away childish ways in order to live today: freely sharing the powerful amazing perfect love of Christ with our closest relations? There's plenty of life to be lived today without having to live out all the junk you've already been through! Let's make 2008 the year we elect—to grow up in the faith, freed from childish ways we've clung to for so long.

'Just looking around'

Auto show offers plenty to the casual observer

DETROIT — Have you ever been with a spouse, a significant other or even a friend and been dragged around a mall, going from store to store and seemingly looking at everything available?

At some point, when the frustration level hits maximum, the patience is at a minimum and the feet start to shuffle rather than step, you build up the nerve to ask, "So, what exactly are you looking for?"

"Oh, nothing in particular. I'm just looking around."

Welcome to the North American International Auto Show.

Starting yesterday and continuing through Jan. 27, Detroit's Cobo Center will be given over to the latest and greatest from auto manufacturers around the world.

The show is as much about the sizzle as it is the steak. The annual event gives manufacturers, suppliers and anyone even remotely connected to the car business a chance to preen a little, to show off latest innovations ... and to get a peek at what the competitor next door is working on, as well.

And when the show opens to the public today, automakers will go into full-pitch mode for the consumer, or at least the would-be consumer.

Problem is, not many people go to the auto show to actually buy an auto. Or a truck. Or a sport utility vehicle.

For the majority of people, the show is about looking and seeing what's new. And, as always, there's plenty.

Along with the throngs of media, I got a chance to preview the show Monday and Tuesday. There's a lot to see, but if you're headed down, here are a few things to keep an eye on.

Fuel me once ...

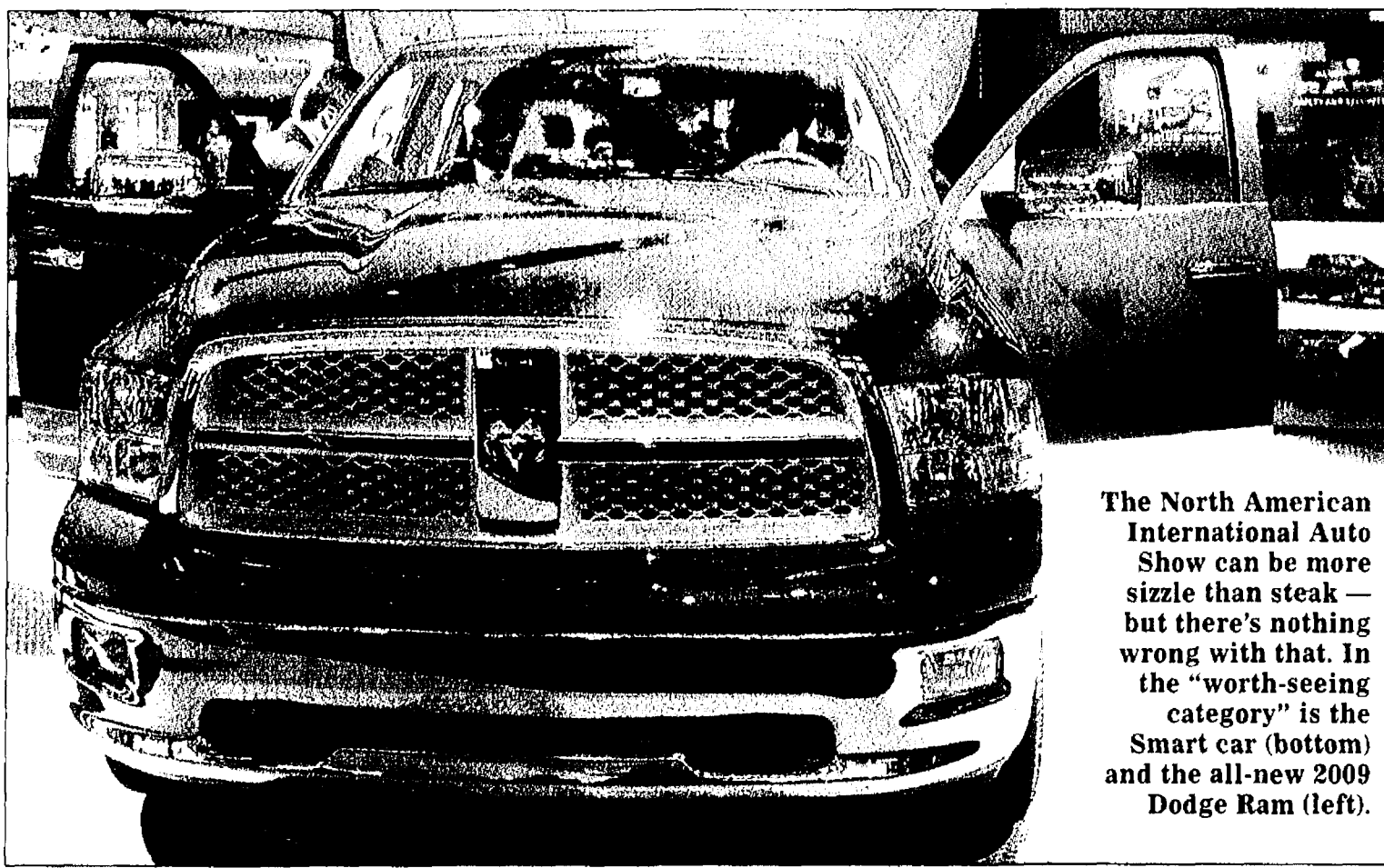
Flex fuel. Hybrids. Plug-in hybrids. Biodiesel. Fuel cells.

If there's one overriding theme to this year's show, it has to be about what goes in the car as much as the car itself.

Nearly every manufacturer ... and I mean every manufacturer ... is touting the gas-saving, planet-preserving products they have to offer.

It wasn't that long ago, less than a decade, anyway, that Honda and Toyota were the only manufacturers offering hybrids.

Today, you can get a hybrid Chevy Malibu, a hybrid Dodge Ram pickup, a hybrid Ford Explorer — even a hybrid Cadillac Escalade.

Plenty of new faces dominate this year's lineup

New cars are the heart of the North American International Auto Show — and the 2008 event includes everything from new pickup trucks to concept vehicles with the latest experimental, alternative powertrains.

General Motors Corp. plans to unveil several vehicles this week — including the open-air Hummer HX, which is clearly designed to steal some thunder from the Jeep Wrangler; the Saturn Flextrane, which is described as an example of what a plug-in hybrid vehicle might look like in the future; and the Saab 9-4X Biopower, which illustrates the company's commitment to using multiple fuels.

GM also is showing off the 600-horsepower Chevrolet Corvette ZR1, which has been described as an inexpensive supercar.

The next edition of the popular and ever-dependable F-150 pickup truck is at the center of Ford Motor Co.'s display this year. But Ford also is rolling out a concept vehicle that is very likely to turn into the next Ford Explorer, which is moving off the truck architecture for the first time, and the Verve concept, which is a forerunner of the new small cars the company has in the pipeline.

The fabled Dodge Ram pickup truck will be the highlight of the Chrysler display this year. The 2009 Ram is due out in the fall and Chrysler executives want to remind everyone the truck is on its way. Chrysler also plans to unveil its full array of concept cars — such as the ecoVoyager, the Dodge Zero and the two-seat Jeep Renegade — which will underscore the company's ability to deploy new technology such as lithium-ion batteries, hybrid powertrains and advanced diesel engines.

Toyota Motor Corp. has been a major factor in turning the NAIAS into a truly international show, and this year the Japanese automaker is bringing a concept hybrid pickup truck, dubbed the A-BAT.

The A-BAT offers improved fuel economy and lower emissions and, like the Prius, the A-BAT has a distinctive profile.

"This concept is the next evolution of the compact truck," said Kevin Hunter, president of Toyota's Caltex Design Research Inc.

It features a 4-foot bed, a translucent roof panel, which slides open to allow for tall cargo inside the cab, and a bed-extender, reaching beyond the tailgate.

Solar panels are parked on top of the A-BAT's instrument panel to capture sunlight and convert it to energy to charge the navigation. The Toyota concept truck also has a center console, housing a portable battery pack.

How's that for a contradiction in terms? But then, GM was the same company that, on Monday morning, unveiled a zero-petroleum concept vehicle and a sedan that produces 550 horsepower. GM calls it being green mean.

The push is way beyond hybrids, though. Most major manufacturers have different vehicles touting their advances in hydrogen fuel cells, in cleaner-burning diesel engines and in lithium ion batteries that are promised before long to use zero gasoline for short trips.

Even Ferrari got into the act, with one ground-hugging model decked out to promote the Italian automaker's use of biofuel.

What does that mean to the average consumer? More than you might think.

Consider high-definition TVs. A decade ago, people were talking about high-def, but the general consensus was it was many, many years away; and, even when it did arrive, who would pay for it?

If you don't have high-def already, how many people do you know who do? And I'm betting it's more and more every year.

There are a ton of advances on the way when it comes to alternate fuels and more environmentally friendly vehicles. If you're headed to the show, take a few minutes to get familiar with what's on the way. It will be here before you know it.

A 'Smart' idea

I'm a pretty big guy. I'm about 6 feet 3 inches tall, and a bit bigger around the middle than I would like these days.

So when I saw the Smart car at the show, I had to take the opportunity to sit in it ... or to see if I could sit in it.

Well, I fit with no problem. And I walked away pretty impressed with the Smart.

The tiny two-seater will make a big push into the United States this year, with 74 Smart dealerships, including one in Bloomfield Hills, set to open.

Clearly, the Smart isn't for everyone. If you have to haul four kids and their gear to hockey or softball practice, look elsewhere.

But how many times have you seen the subdivision-size SUV on the road with one person in it? Plenty, I'm betting.

While folks who simply zip around town may find the Smart, well, smart, the best market I thought of was for young drivers.

The Smart has a four-star crash rating, and with only two seats, there isn't room for a car full of friends to distract the driver.

There's also no back seat. Enough said.

Pickup lines

Of course, this is Detroit, and for a lot of automakers, the pickup truck is the bread and butter when it comes to a presence with the consumer and profit margins.

Last Sunday, both Ford and Chrysler rolled out the latest versions of their full-size trucks.

And while the consumer might say he or she is interested in fuel efficiency and helping the environment, many aren't going to give up the ride and size of a pickup.

At Chrysler, the new Ram sports an even larger grille, a spoiler-enhanced tailgate and storage units built into the wells on each side of the bed. The Ram is available with a 4.7-liter V-8 that generates 310 horsepower or, for those who want even more power, a 5.7-liter Hemi that kicks out 380 horsepower.

At Ford, the full-size F-150 is worth all the attention it's been getting. Several years ago, Ford really made a lot of improvements to the F-150, and those improvements have been expanded on the latest version.

According to Ford, the F-150 will be available in 35 different configurations, including the all-new luxury Platinum platform.

Thirty-five different configurations, from the same company that once gave buyers a Model T in any color they wanted ... as long as it was black. Henry Ford must be rolling over in his grave.

What a concept

Of course, for a lot of people, the auto show is all about the concept vehicles, those futuristic cars and trucks that may someday be built and may not.

Even when an entire vehicle isn't put into production, one internal feature or one design element may be used.

In other instances, a vehicle designed to be a concept — such as the PT Cruiser several years ago — gets such a reaction that it gets put into production earlier than planned.

Once again this year, just about every manufacturer has at least one concept car,

and many are pretty interesting.

GM, for instance, has the youth-inspired trio of the Beat, the Trax and the Groove, three cars clearly designed to go after first-time buyers currently looking at Toyota's Scion.

Speaking of Toyota, keep an eye out for the A-BAT, a compact pickup that reminded me a lot of an El Camino that got zapped into the future. Subaru tried a similar platform a few years ago with the Baja, so I'll be curious to see how much of the A-BAT ever sees the light of day.

For my money, though, the concept car of the show could be the Nissan Forum. To call the Forum a van wouldn't really be accurate, but it's more like a van than anything else.

There are other stand-out elements, though. For one, the seats in the Forum are nicer than the furniture most people have in their houses.

The second-row bucket seats are separated by a console that drops into the floor when not in use. Once that console is in place, the entire second row — two seats and the console — can rotate on a turntable to face the third row of seats.

Like having a sunroof? The Forum has an entirely glass roof over the passenger compartment.

And as a parent, I loved the steering wheel-mounted "time out" button that kills the radio and video player when the little ones aren't on their best behavior.

Out of dozens of concept vehicles, the Forum had the most "why didn't I think of that" elements I hope actually make it to the road.

How to Choose a Fitness Center

Getting the most out of a fitness center depends in large part on picking the right center in the first place. And that means the one right for you. Do you need an experienced personal trainer to help you exercise safely and effectively? Are you looking for a bodybuilder's gym where you can get inspiration and support to keep pumping iron? Or do you prefer a relaxed atmosphere where you can socialize after a class with other members? Choices abound, from chain outlets to locally owned centers, from small centers to mammoth ones, from upscale operations to more family-friendly places, from single gender to co-educational facilities. Before joining a fitness facility, so you don't regret it in a month, consider the following:

Location, Location, Location

Convenience counts a great deal, fitness experts say. Just like real estate, the location of your prospective fitness center should be convenient, either to your workplace or to home. The easier it is for you to get to a center, the more likely you are to use it. Finding a fitness center close to your place of employment can afford you the opportunity to exercise before or after work, or during lunch if time permits. If you hope to get the whole family active, choose a center near your home.

Affordability

The cost of working out varies with amenities, popularity and sometimes by franchise. Some also might require joining fees or extra charge for specialty classes. Compare centers' fees and what you're getting for your money. Pick a place that's within your budget. Otherwise, if the membership fee puts a strain on your finances, you'll soon have an excuse to drop out.

Personal Interests

Perhaps you have favorite fitness activities you enjoy or want to try, such as swimming, cycling, or yoga — a set of exercises focusing on strengthening and stretching the body. Maybe you are interested in hiring a personal trainer. An exercise program that works for one person may not work for another. A personal trainer will develop the most effective program for you based on your fitness evaluation results and personal goals. Find out if the center has the necessary services, facilities or equipment.

Facilities

Check out the exercise equipment, locker rooms and showers. Are they clean, or do they look like they need sanitized? This goes for the steam room or whirlpool, as well. Cleanliness defines the ownership and the membership. Is the equipment up-to-date and well maintained, or are the benches ripped and taped back together? Are there enough machines to accommodate fitness center members even during peak training hours, or does circuit training include 20-minute breaks between each exercise while you wait in line?

Staffing

Fitness centers tend to be better staffed with people who can help you use equipment properly and answer your questions nowadays. Personal trainers may be on hand to give you individualized instruction and guidance. They are also a major source of motivation and encouragement. Ask about staffing. What kinds of help and how much one-on-one attention do staff members provide? What credentials and certifications do they have? Qualified staff and trainers can help you do more than work out efficiently. They can also help you reach goals specific to you and your needs.

Classes

Fitness clubs and gyms offer a number of aerobic classes, including spinning, step, high- and low-impact aerobics, or kick-boxing. 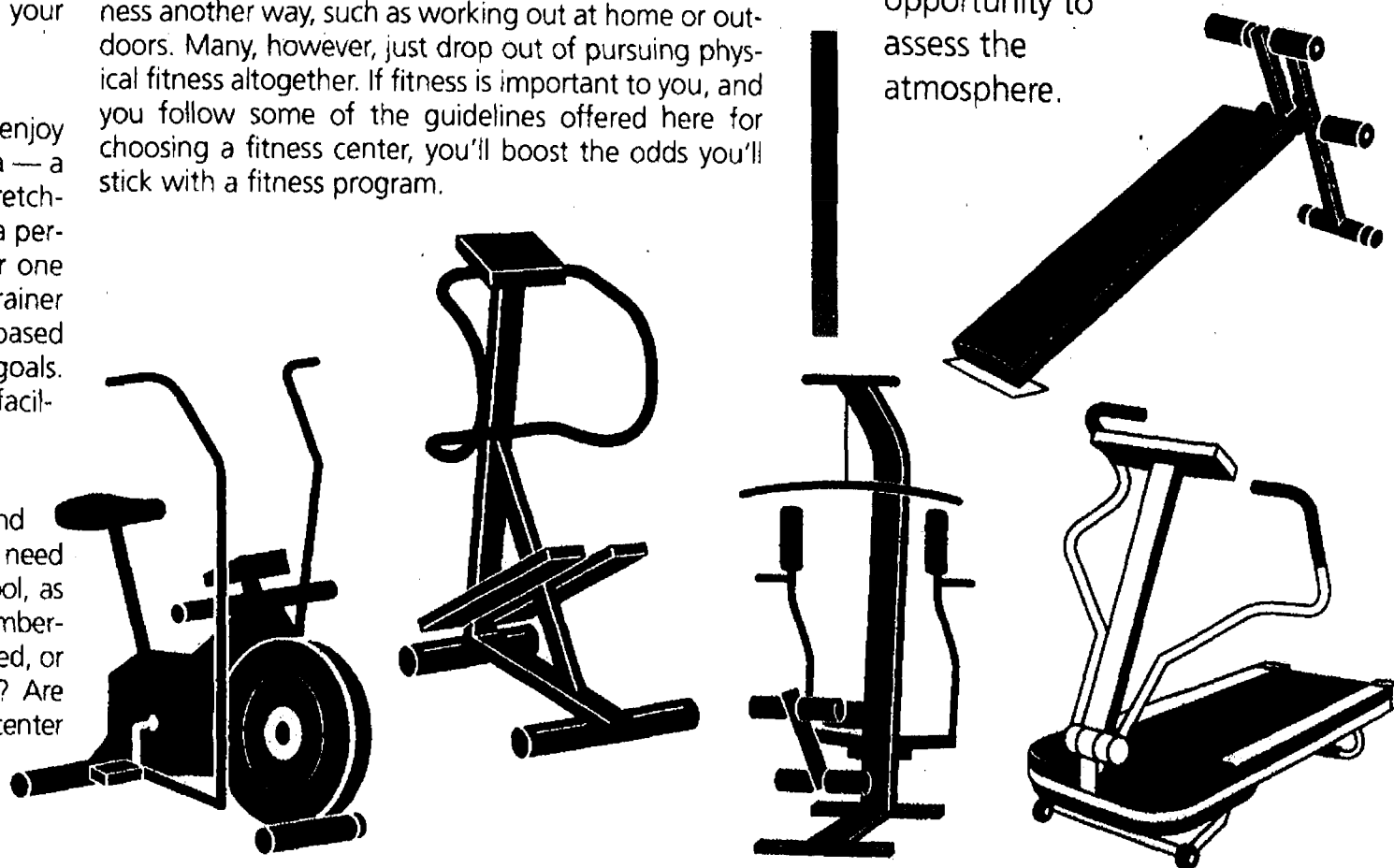

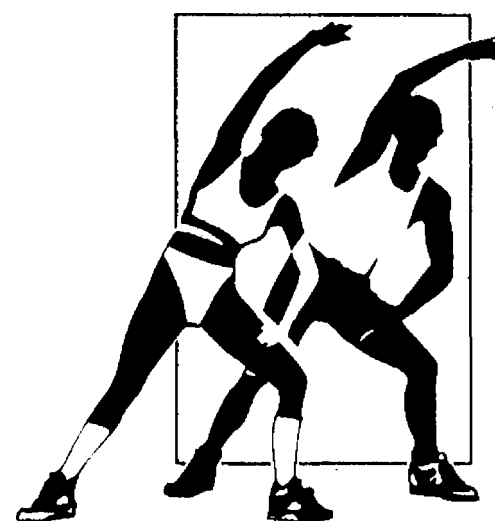

How to Detect Hearing Loss and What to Do About It

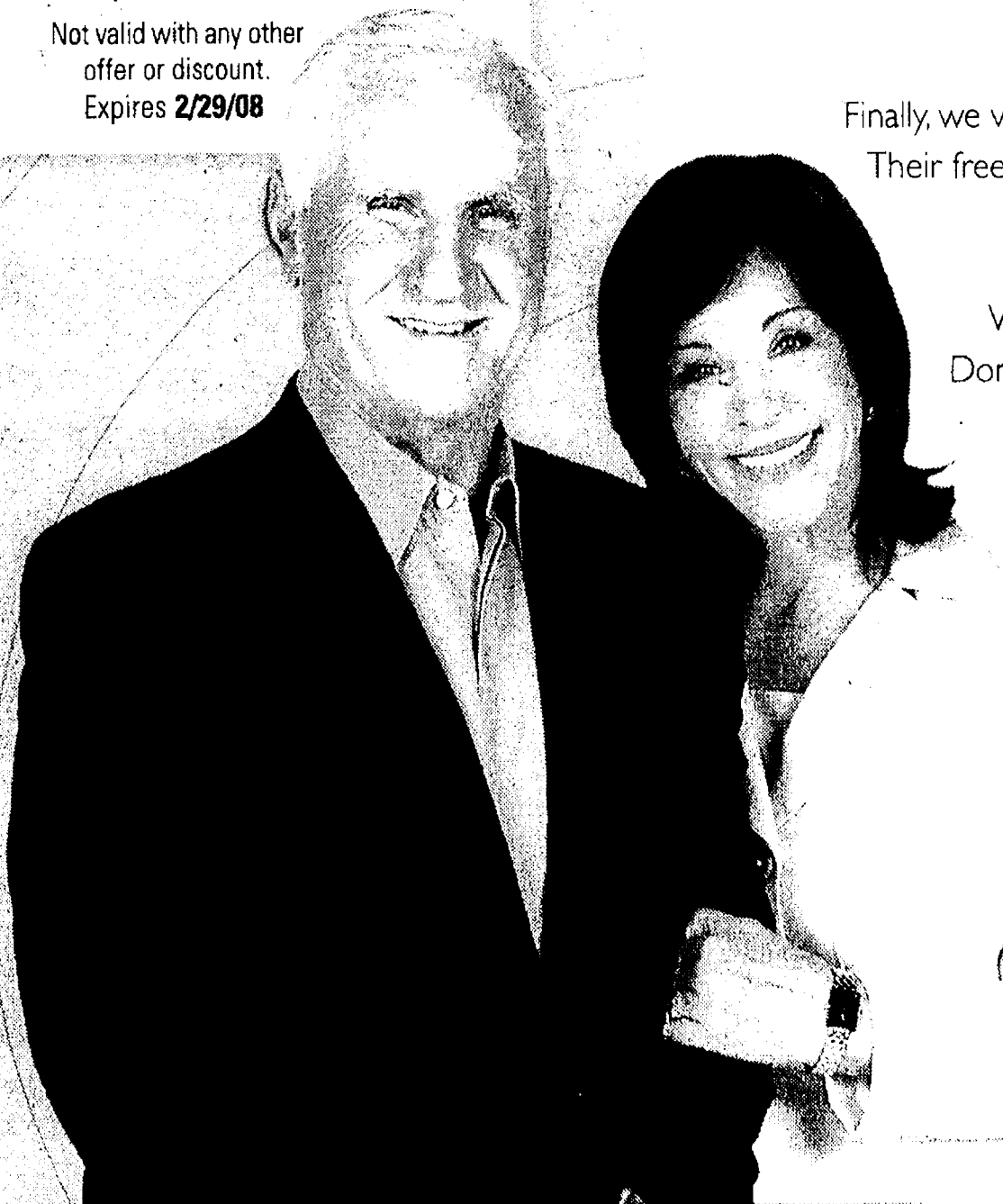

How to Choose a Retirement Community

The first thing to find out is what retirement communities are located in the area where you or your relative(s) prefer to live. Proximity to hospitals, doctors, pharmacies, malls/stores is important.

It is a good idea to ride around to the various retirement communities to get your first impression of the appearance, architecture and location. It is also good to check the Web site of each area retirement community. The Web site will provide key information about the services that are offered and the accommodations.

Other pertinent information may be obtained from the state Department of Community Health licensing and survey reports. This information may be obtained via the Internet, at the state Department of Community Health or at any retirement community that has a licensed nursing wing or assisted living unit. The Dunn and Bradstreet Financial rating, the State Nursing Home Association, the Better Business Bureau and Long-Term-Care Ombudsman are four additional agencies where retirement community stability and historical information may be obtained.

Interview with key staff

Call for an appointment and meet the staff. Each retirement community is run by an executive director and managers of multiple departments. These include nursing, marketing, dietary, housekeeping, laundry, social services, recreational activities, maintenance of the physical plant and the grounds, security, business and transportation.

Make an appointment with the director of marketing or the admissions coordinator.

The marketing director will show you around the property and introduce you to the staff and management who will answer any questions you may have. It is important to assess the length of employment of the executive director and key managers, their educational credentials, experience and licenses.

Tour property, accommodations

A tour of the retirement community is imperative to assess the types and sizes of apartments and rooms associated with each level of care. Safety features, emergency response equipment and handicap accessibility are important features of the tour. The tour allows a potential resident to evaluate the size or space needed for their furnishings, the closets and storage space.

The cleanliness may also be assessed on the tour. Staff-resident interaction, social activities and residents' appearances may also be observed.

Become informed about services, etc.

During the initial and follow-up interviews and tour, it is vital to be informed about the amenities, services and levels of care that are provided and included in the admission contract. It is imperative that a potential resident be advised about whether the retirement community is a buy-in or lease arrangement, the price, refund policy, pet policy, etc. All amenities such as meals, housekeeping and laundry/linen service, telephone, cable television, internet access, transportation and social activities should be explained.

A full service, multi-level continuum-of-care retirement community offers levels of care that range from independent living in villas and apartments, to assisted living or personal care to skilled nursing care. It is preferable to move into a retirement community where a resident may "age in place" and not have to relocate to another property or facility if they should have changes in their condition or require personal assistance or nursing care.

The social or recreational activity program should be assessed when making the decision about your future lifestyle. An activities or social calendar should be available for you to study. A varied program of activities offering mental or sensory stimulating activities, physical activities and cultural entertainment should be included so that a resident has multiple daily options and may be as active as they choose to be.

Examples of popular activities include bridge and other card games, movies, bingo, aerobic exercise classes, exercise equipment for individual or group use, birthday parties, special theme parties and seasonal or holiday celebrations.

Also, outings with provided transportation that include tours of the area, lunches at local restaurants and trips to cultural events should be included in the social calendar. Arts and crafts classes should be available for those who enjoy creative pursuits.

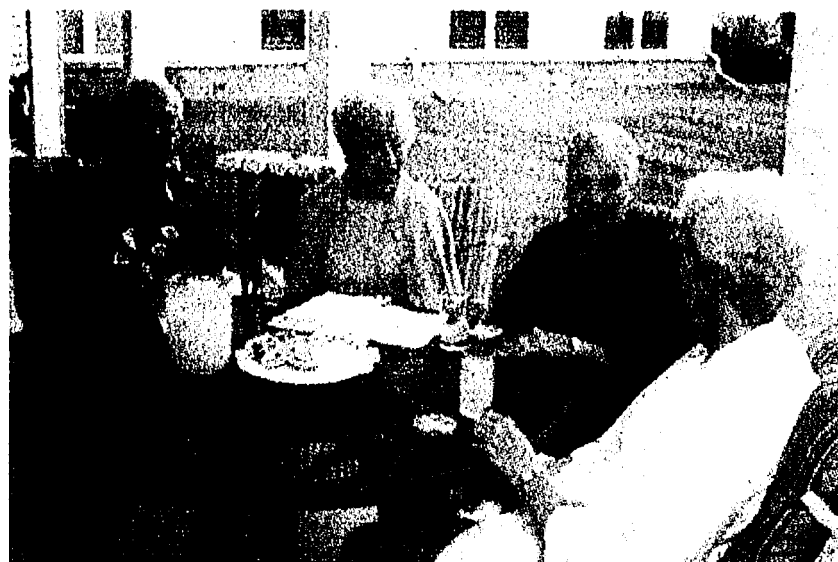
A transportation program should be provided to ensure transportation to doctor's appointments and other essential pickups, deliveries or personal transportation to shop, obtain medications and other essentials, since many senior citizens choose to stop driving.

How to Choose a Physical Therapist

You have just been involved in a motor vehicle accident, rear end collision, and a few hours later your entire low back and neck are aching, along with horrible headaches. Or, you are a weekend warrior and decide to run that spring 10K race without proper training, which at the end leaves you with a swollen knee and a sore heel. None of us are immune to injury whether by trauma, overuse or simply age related problems. Eventually you will need to see a physical therapist. How do you choose one that meets your needs, and is it important that you yourself make that choice? The answer to the latter part is a resounding "yes." Here are some helpful hints that you may want to consider when choosing a physical therapy (PT) provider.

Many people choose a PT facility based on location and convenience, and although these are important considerations, I would suggest that other factors can be included, such as availability of emergency visits, scheduling flexibility and most of all, waiting time before being seen by a facility. Some medical conditions need immediate physical therapy attention. If you have to wait more than a few days, you may want to keep searching. A flexible, newer facility location might be able to get you started quicker than a more established center with an existing case-load.

Most of you already seek out a facility based on the above criteria so the above are not a revelation, but let's examine some other factors that real physical therapy patients felt were important in selecting a Physical Therapist.

Make sure your therapist is licensed in Michigan

Michigan is one of 5 remaining states that still require a medical doctor's prescription for physical therapy. Once you have a prescription in hand, you want to make sure your therapist is licensed in Michigan. Once in treatment, do ask the specific credentials of who you are working with. It is important that your therapy plan is being overseen and managed by a licensed physical therapist. The physical therapist orchestrates your therapy plan of care. He or she won't necessarily play all the instruments, but should organize and coordinate, and is ultimately responsible for the treatment course of any patient.

Check Credentials

Physical therapy is evolving into a doctoring profession, which means that, as of 2008, all PT students will graduate with a DPT or a Doctor of Physical Therapy degree. This is bound to cause some confusion in both public and clinical communities however, the benefits of a DPT should become more clear in time. During the next few years (transition phase) there will be PTs practicing in our community with anything from a certificate/diploma, to bachelors, masters and finally doctoral degrees. The degree conferred is not the ultimate determinant of the proficiency of the therapist. There will be excellent clinician therapists practicing regardless of entry level education. The advantage that doctoral prepared PTs will have in outpatient private practice, is that the extra training in pharmacology, radiology and pathology, will strengthen those skills required to communicate more effectively with medical doctors, and to help identify patients who need to be referred back to their primary physicians because of underlying or emerging pathology. The DPT trained therapist will be a strong and invaluable clinical partner to physicians in the outpatient sector.

Seek professionalism

Professionalism is an attitude and a behavior set that brings together knowledge, skills and personal traits such as compassion, caring and empathy. You have to be comfortable with the clinical demeanor of your therapist. How a therapist "carries" him/herself is very important and reflective of how much "pas-

sion" one has for their patient care activities and profession in general. Hold a high standard for your therapist, you deserve to be treated in a manner that respects your values and is reflective of evidence based practice guidelines. When we hire therapists for our facilities, professionalism ranks very high on the criteria list. We hire for personality and train for skill. Ultimately, if a clinician has mediocre interpersonal skills, all the clinical certifications in the world will not compensate for poor interpersonal skills.

Pick the right facility

Facility is an important factor to consider when selecting a provider. Physical therapists are some of the most creative people you will meet and may not need a lot of equipment in their facility. Having said that, would you hire a contractor to build your dream home if he told you all he needed was a saw to fully construct your home? There are many more tools required to build a home than a saw. In the same way, therapists too need tools to perform their trade. Beware those practices that proclaim to specialize in a particular therapy method all in the name of quality of care—they tend to be the same ones who have a limited tool set and adhere to a single method. There is no one "best" method or technique in physical therapy practice. Physical therapy is in most cases about the utilization of many methods and forms of treatment, all integrated into an organized treatment session with a very clear rationale that addresses specific treatment goals. Remember, when all you have is a hammer, everything looks like a nail. Your chosen facility should be clean, have many different treatment options available, and be responsive to your needs. Most of all, you the patient should make the decision as to which facility to choose. Always exercise your freedom of choice (within the limits of your insurance plan)—it is a fundamental right in this country and one that many have sacrificed to preserve.

Pick the right PT for your needs

Do inquire if the therapist has any special competencies or areas of clinical interest, not so much to make a judgment about proficiency, but rather so you can fit your therapist selection to your condition. If you have torn a knee ligament recently and as a result have had to have surgery, you will want to see a therapist who has experience in knee rehabilitation. If you have fibromyalgia, perhaps a sports medicine clinic is not the right choice, but rather a practice that has experience and training in pain management would be a better choice. Some other questions might be: How much experience do you have treating a certain condition? How many years have you been practicing? Tell me about your mentorships (who have you worked with)? Will I be seen regularly by my physical therapist and will reports to my referral agent be generated on a timely basis? How often will you communicate with my doctor and could I see a sample of your documentation or reports? Why is this important? The reports communicate the important details of your rehabilitation to physicians, insurance carriers, case managers, and attorneys in cases of litigation. Good documentation (record keeping and clinical notes) serve many purposes, not the least of which, it informs your doctor of clinical progress and/or problems if any. You will want to know the quality of the information generated at a facility. And don't forget, good documentation is part of what your insurance dollars pay for.

By now you have already figured out that you should really invest some time and visit or contact several facilities before deciding. It will not be wasted time. Find the right therapist for you, and in doing so, you will find an invaluable health care partner for many years to come.

Annie and Daddy Warbucks sang, "You're never fully dressed without a smile." Indeed, a beautiful smile has a positive impact your health as well as your appearance. That's why it's important to use care when choosing a dentist.

You might want to call or visit more than one dentist before making your decision. Dental care is a very personalized service that requires a good relationship between the dentist and the patient. The relationship between you and your dentist is a shared responsibility. For many oral health problems, your American Dental Association member dentist can offer multiple treatment options for dental care. These options may vary in complexity, durability and cost. Working together, you and your dentist can choose the treatment options that best meet your needs. Your dentist can explain each treatment option, including its benefits and drawbacks. You should tell your dentist about yourself and your needs, and ask your dentist and office staff as many questions as needed to help you understand the treatment recommendations.

Here, compliments of the ADA, are some guidelines to help you choose a dentist:

Before going for a visit, do your homework. Ask friends, family, neighbors or colleagues

for recommendations. Your family physician or local pharmacist might also make referrals. If you're moving, ask your current dentist to make a suggestion. You also can go online to search the ADA's Web site, www.ada.org, or contact your local or state dental society to find a dentist in your area.

During your first visit, ask yourself these questions:

- Is the dentist's appointment schedule convenient for you? Is the office easy to get to from your home or job?
- Is the office clean, neat and orderly? What is the appearance of the dentist and the staff?
- What is the atmosphere of the office? Does the dentist take continuing education classes and is he or she a member of the Academy of General Dentistry?
- Does the dentist seem interested in your health? Were your medical and dental histories recorded and placed in a permanent file?
- Does the dentist explain techniques that will help you prevent dental health problems? Is dental health instruction provided?
- What arrangements does the dentist have for handling emergencies outside office hours? Is the dentist on call 24 hours a day? Does the dentist have an answering service or pager?

• Does the dentist accept your insurance plan? Is information provided about fees, payment plans and co-plans?

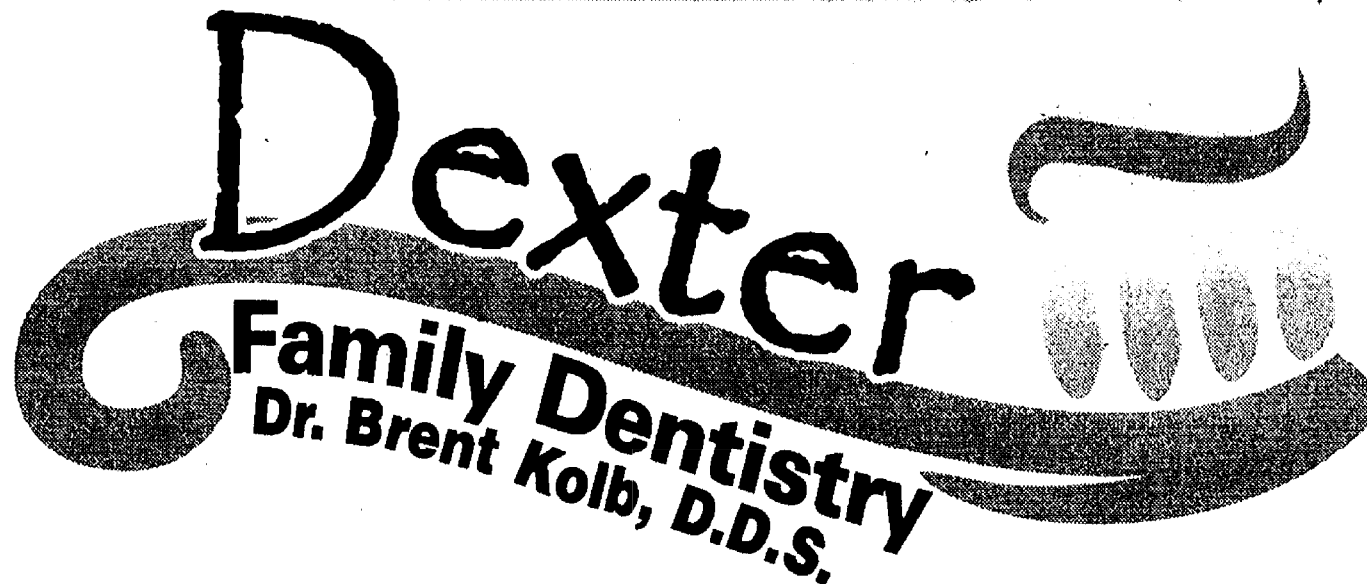
• Do you like the dentist? How does the dentist treat his or her staff? Will you consistently have the same dental hygienist? Is the dentist involved in his or her community?
