



The staff at the McKune Memorial Library is all smiles these days.

And why shouldn't they be? It's not every day that your workplace is chosen "Best Small Library in America" by the foremost national publication in the industry.

Library Journal first announced the honor two weeks ago, opening the gates for a flood of congratulations by dignitaries ranging from Chelsea Mayor Ann Feeney to Michigan Gov. Jennifer Granholm.

The annual award is cosponsored by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and, according to the journal's Web site, "honors the public library that most profoundly demonstrates out**Best in nation**

standing service to populations of 25,000 or less.'

As a bonus, the award comes with a \$15,000 grant from the Gates Foundation.

Local school officials applaud changes made by state agency

The Center for Educational Performance and Information (CEPI) for the state of Michigan will begin reporting local dropout and graduation rates under a new system next year.

While the Chelsea and Dexter school districts scored well compared to state averages in both categories, local and state officials believe the new program will provide more accurate figures.

"This new system will follow students through their four years of high school," said Leslee Fritz. communications director for the

State Budget Office, which over-

sees the CEPI.

"It will make it easier to track students and will change how kids are counted," Fritz added. "The new calculations will be based on a four-year program."

The system will look at the number of students who are freshmen, follow them for four years and see how many earn diplomas, Fritz explained.

The CEPI, a department located within the Office of the State Budget, collects and reports performance data on Michigan's K-12 public schools and students.

Forward thinkers

Citizens. envision the Chelsea of the future during **DDA** session

They probably don't consider themselves visionaries, but looking into the future of Chelsea was exactly what about 50 people were doing last Wednesday night at the Chelsea Depot.

The night was bitterly cold and windy, but it was a bigger crowd than attended the first "visioning session" on Sept. 12.

Chelsea City Manager John Hanifan Downtown Development Authority President Mike Jackson welcomed the group and thanked them for coming out on a bitterly cold and windy night.

A large number of concerned citizens attended, along with six of seven Chelsea City Council members and seven of 10 DDA board members.

"A session like this provides direct citizen input. where you have a chance for suggestions," Hanifan told them.

"When you're planning for projects for the next 20 years, you want a lot of input from as many sources as you can."

The first step was to review suggestions generated in the September visioning session — the things people were most proud of: strengths. weaknesses. opportunities, threats; and the most popular options to develop into future DDA projects.

The two top ideas coming out of that session were the concept of a pavilion on Park Street next to the Purple Rose Theatre, and developing mass transit.

The purpose of the Jan. 30 session was to further refine those suggestions and come up with others.

"It's good to get input like this on a lot of things,"

Jackson said. "I'm thrilled so many people are here. Obviously word's getting out, and people want to attend these sessions."

Hanifan gave a short explanation of the DDA, how it's funded, and the nature of the downtown improvement projects on which it chooses to spend those funds.

One of the first things to look at in any downtown development plan is parking — for customers, visitors and employees.

The thing is, Hanifan said, parking is a "revenue negative" project: It costs money to provide, and doesn't generate any revenue directly.

"We also want revenue-

generating projects like the McKinley Clocktower redevelopment." Hanifan added.

"That one project basically doubled the valuation of the DDA district.

"It's a perfect example of a revenue enhancement project."

As the groups set to work on their lists of ideas, the phrase "a lot of potential" was heard over and over.

"I think it's helpful to get a lot of ideas out there; you never know what's going to hit," said Jane Creswell, who jotted down her group's ideas on a large sheet of paper.

Middle Street resident Rob MacLeod suggested "more lighting on Main Street," among the changes he'd like to see.

"I don't want to see any more of the town torn down. I want to see more positive things," he said.

Brian Keyes said he "loved the concept" of working in small groups to come up with ideas.

"I wanted to hear their ideas on the Longworth Building and on City Hall," Keyes said, explaining why he came to the session.

"Our table liked the idea of moving City Hall to the Post Office, if and when that moves out."

Lynn Fox, a member of the McKune Memorial Library board of trustees, indicated that the library had a keen interest in the future of the downtown

"As a member of the library board, it's important that we participate in improving the downtown and keeping it vibrant," Fox

Jackson and Hanifan also introduced three people with particular ideas they wanted to present to the group as additional food for thought.







Skywarn training is on a two-year cycle. Spotters who were trained last year are not required to attend re-training until next year.

Food drive nears 16 tons

Michigan Secretary of State Terri Lynn Land announced that the 2007 holiday Harvest Gathering food drive donations Department \mathbf{of} employees and customers totaled 31,910 pounds of food and \$1,300 in cash donations.

In addition, employees pledged \$51,538 to charitable agencies through the State Employees Charitable Campaign program.

Harvest Gathering collection boxes were set up in Secretary of State branch offices and state office buildings in Chelsea and elsewhere during the holiday season.

The Michigan Harvest Gathering supports nine regional food banks in the state through donations of food and money. In turn, the food banks support local food pantries, shelters and soup kitchens. In total, Harvest Gathering collected more than \$392,000 and 283,000 pounds of food throughout the state.

all the great suburbs out there, but we tried to discover relatively affordable communities where you'll find low crime and unemployment rates, decent schools, reasonable commutes, and good shopping and entertainment options.'

While civic leaders were pleased with news of the rankings, some questioned some of the individual criteria.

"It's a great honor; we're proud to be a suburb of Ann Arbor," said Mayor Ann Feeney.

"But there's no way on a scale of 1 to 10 Chelsea would rate a 4 in violent crime," she added.

That figure was derived from FBI statistics, the magazine stated, and therefore could have included all of Washtenaw County.

Feeney also took issue with the population the magazine quoted - 13,136 - which was based on the entire 48118 zip code and included portions of neighboring townships.

"Chelsea's population is 5,000," Feeney pointed out. "The entire area's population has to be closer to 14,000 or 15,000."

Nevertheless, the mayor said, "it was flattering to be designated."

"Even though the information is a little out of date, it's nice to be mentioned in a magazine with as wide a readership as Business Week," Feeney said.

"I think it's well deserved." With the quality of local schools being another criterion for the ranking, Chelsea Schools' Superintendent Dave Killips had this reaction to the news:

"I think it's wonderful; it's certainly an accolade for the community," Killips said.

Defining 'affordable'

The distinction of "best affordable" suburb is nebulous, because affordable is in the eye or wallet - of the beholder.

What's affordable to one may be far beyond the reach of anoth-

That's why Business Week and Sperling's Web site used very flexible guidelines.

In general, they found that home prices in the middle part of the country (like Michigan) rose less, than those in and around major metropolitan areas on both coasts, and salaries were generally more closely tied to home prices.

Bert Sperling, founder and president Sperling's BestPlaces, based in Portland, Ore., said his favorite affordable suburbs have a "small-town" quality of life, and that is certainly true of Chelsea.

He especially likes Coralville, Iowa, near Iowa City, the home of the University of Iowa.

And Snohomish, Wash. about 15 miles northeast of Seattle — is "separate enough from the metro area that it has its own distinct quality, with a sense of history and a real downtown," Sperling said.







Local biotech firms teaming up on bone drug

Pfizer's loss of some top talent is the gain of two area companies teaming to help speed research into drugs to fight devastating bone diseases.

Michael W. Long, Ph.D., president and CEO of Velcura Therapeutics in Ann Arbor, announced his biotechnology company would work with Lipitor pioneer Dr. Bob Sliskovic and International Discovery Sourcing Consultants, LLC (IDSC) of Chelsea on the design and sourcing of medicinal chemistry data for its second generation and new bone therapy molecules.

"IDSC brings added drug discovery leadership, experienced vendors and project managers as we begin our clinical trial this year for VEL-0230, a new drug that stimulates bone formation and inhibits bone loss," said Dr. Long.

"We offer in-depth support for scientific programs and also welcome a long-term partnership with firms like Velcura that are outsourcing," said IDSC President and CEO Mark Creswell.

"The pharmaceutical industry experts joining us from Pfizer have 17 to 30 years of experience; we have chaired multiple projects that moved drug candidates into the clinic," he added.

"Bob Sliskovic, for example, was responsible for the development of some 30 clinical candidates, including Lipitor."

Dr. Sliskovic, who was featured in the Dec. 11, 2007, Wall Street Journal, now dreams of being involved in another blockbuster like Lipitor.

The work he is doing now with IDSC could help Velcura develop a treatment to help millions of individuals suffering from bone diseases like osteoporosis, which is second to heart disease as a worldwide health



Granholm sounds like president and vice versa

Tf you closed your eyes, you would swear that Gov. LJennifer Granholm gave the State of the Union address the other night while a guy named Bush gave the State of the State. Granholm and President



Tim Skubick George W. Bush were not cut from the same political cloth, but there they were, standing in front of their respective legislative colleagues

mouthing the same agendas. He's for better education. So is she.

He's for fair trade. She's been harping on that for years. He's for reforming health care.

By golly, she is, too. He's for alternative energy. Ditto for her.

In fact, Bush argues big government is not the answer. And, lo and behold, Granholm echoes, "In these tough times, government cannot be all things to all people."

Liberal Democrats went nuts as she moved to the dark side.

Frankly, strip away all of the president's rhetoric about foreign affairs, and you could overlay most of his SOU over much of her

And that's good news for both. As they limp along in their lame duck status, both are grasping at issues that must have some chance of passing.

As they work on their legacy, wouldn't it be nice if they could actually get something done before they ride off into the sunset. And you only get things done by molding an agenda everyone can salute.

Granholm could hardly advance a bipartisan agenda last year when the top item was raising taxes. Even though she sashayed around the state last fall, claiming she cobbled together a bipartisan tax deal, while technically correct, it was woefully misleading on the GOP side of the equation. She mustered only a handful of GOP tax-hike votes.

But this year she has a chance to strut her stuff as she's picked issues that are not politically divisive.

There is nothing Republican or Democrat about diversifying the economy, curtailing high school dropouts, or keeping the state safe from crime.

She begins the journey with the Senate GOP leader firmly on her side. She hugged Republican Michael Bishop several times to underscore the point.

In conciliatory tones, he offered to work with this gover-

"I want to thank Governor Granholm for her leadership and her thoughtful presentation," he began his remarks on her speech.

He fostered the buddy-buddy stuff by concluding, "The many challenges facing our state ... are not partisan issues. These are all of our issues."

Now he was sounding like her. Even House GOP leader Craig DeRoche, whose strong suit is not bipartisanship, applauded the governor but not because he has changed his tune.

Instead, he contends most of what she advanced in her speech came from Republicans in the first place.

The typical drill in an SOS speech is that the Democrats stand to applaud every sentence, while Republicans sit in their seats.

But this time, the governor masterfully crafted a speech that forced everyone to stand and applaud time and time again. The two sides may bicker about the details, as they should, but the governor wanted a picture of togetherness and she got it, or to borrow another phrase from President Bush: mission accomplished.





2008 is a year of great opportunity

established in an agreement between Senators Debbie Stabenow and Carl Levin in 2006 with Canadian officials to phase out municipally managed waste from Ontario being dumped in Michigan. While the DEQ report does not make con-

clusions regarding the reasons for the reduction in waste, the report references "Ontario's commitment to phase out its exports of municipally managed solid waste to Michigan," as a factor in the reduction of waste.

"For the first time this decade, trash imports from Canada have finally gone down," said Stabenow. "I'm encouraged by this progress and will continue to work with Ontario officials to ensure the terms of our agreement with Canada are met and all municipallymanaged waste from Canada stops in 2010."

Under the terms of the Stabenow-Levin agreement, Ontario committed to a 20 percent reduction of Canadian municipally managed solid waste by the end of 2007. The agreement calls for a total reduction of 40 percent by the end of 2008 and a complete stop to all municipally managed trash by the end of 2010.

Initiatives in data collection and reporting facilitate school districts' compliance with the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and the Michigan Department of Education's accreditation plan, Education YES!

The new program was created by the National Governors Association and will be implemented throughout the country.

Michigan will be the first to introduce it, starting with this year's senior class. The class of 2008 will be the first to have had its graduation and dropout rate tracked for four years.

Every student who enters ninth grade in a public school in Michigan will now be given a Unique Identification Code. This code will help the CEPI track students through their high school years, even if they change districts within the state.

The system will not only monitor which students are on track to graduate, but also those who may require another year or even two to earn their diploma.

Fritz says one of the goals of the new program is to identify potential student dropouts before the figure becomes final.

"There is a whole group of students lost long before their senior year," she said, "There wasn't a long-term view. This new approach will track all four years."

So what was wrong with the way graduation and dropout rates were tracked in the past?

"We only looked at a single year," Fritz said. "We only looked at a school's total number of students who were starting their senior year."

"The focus of the class is on the development of skills essential for academic success. The class is open to any student who qualifies, is administratively approved and meets the standards for performing each semester in the class."

The ALL is staffed with a certified teacher and a paraprofessional. There are approximately 10 students in the class each hour, which enables the staff to work closely with students and their teachers to monitor their success.

Deppner said another factor in Chelsea's high retention rate is the number of extracurricular opportunities for students, which allow them to feel "connected" at school.

"Our special education staff also works closely with students and parents to help them choose appropriate classes and programs in order to assist them with their academic challenges," Deppner added.

By Terry Jacoby Heritage Newspapers n advertisement that appeared in the Dexter newspaper in June 1941 stated this about the Dexter Cooperative Company: "We haven't been here a hundred years, but we can serve you in more than a hundred ways."

A lot has changed since 1941. The Dexter Cooperative Company ended a 60-year run in 1980 and the Dexter Mill took over the building. Even though the name has changed and many of the items on the shelves are different, that same ad could still run today. Just like the Dexter Cooperative Company, the Dexter Mill "can serve you in more than a hundred ways."

The Dexter Mill opened for business in December 1979 as a full-service supply store.


"Some of the things we sell today were sold by the original Co-op," said General Manager Keri Romine. "We still sell seed potatoes, oats, fertilizers, gates and fenc-

And the same things that made the Co-op so successful all those years ago remain the blueprint for success with the Dexter Mill.

"We are still committed to great customer service and maintaining a hometown feel," Romine said. "Dexter Mill has the feel of a general store of the past.' Dexter Mill is a feed store, but they offer customers a lot more than that - hundreds more, in fact.

'We sell hand carved canes, local honey, bird seed we make here in the feed

garden seeds and supplies," Romine said. "Customers enjoy checking out our Carhartt clothing and boots and our made in Michigan pet beds and made in USA pet toys.

"We sell ice melter salt, by the pallet or the bag, calcium chloride and pet friendly ice melter. In comparison to the larger stores moving into the area we offer unique options as far as seeds and quality plants in the spring, organic as well as conventional fertilizers."

Romine says product knowledge and the staff's "expert" advise helps make Dexter Mill a unique place.

"We offer advice to our customers on our products," she said. "Same goes with our animal feeds, and the fact that we are able to mix custom batches for our customers, from our recipe or theirs. Dogs are welcome to visit our store. We even get a few cats who visit us.

"Our staff can offer advice on many subjects from gardening to what to feed your 4-H fair project so they look great come show time."

The Dexter Co-op Co. was born in the old Dexter Opera House in November 1919, when approximately 50 area farmers banded to eliminate the "middle men" whom they charged with demanding exorbitant rates for farm necessities and underpaying them for livestock and produce.

"They were at the mercy of drovers who would go down the road and buy their livestock," said Robert Gilbert in a March 1980 newspaper article. Gilbert was a director for the organization during the 1950s. "They also had to buy what was called 'thresher coal,' which was coal to run their steam equipment, along with regular heating coal," Gilbert said. "The merchants were making a lot off farmers."



The co-op sold items such as seed potatoes, oats, barley seed, fertilizers, lime, gates and fencing supplies.

The boom was not to be repeated. As Dexter's economy shifted from agricultural into other areas, the need for a farmers' co-op declined during the 1950s and 1960s. In 1969, Ray McCalla bought the Central St. business and changed its name to the Washtenaw Farm & Garden Center. But the organization continued until March 1980 when it officially disbanded.



Where is your retirement?

t's 2008. There are a few things that are certain for this year. You will get older. A new trend will break out that makes everyone think, "How did we ever live without such and such?" You will pay taxes. There will be financial stresses in the markets. Your financial statements will change, some for the better and some for

As most successful business managers will say, we should start focusing on that which we can influence, and leave the rest to someone else. Here is a list of things you can influence in the coming year: your taxes, your financial statement, when you retire, what school your child attends, your career, your happiness, the success of your personal life. I assure you, this list is non-inclusive.

Remember when you were 25 and saving for retirement was as likely as you winning the lottery? Your recipe for success involved a great job, having a million dollars by 30, and quitting work at 40 to travel the world and see distant places. Then you ended up married, and there were kids, and that plan was, um, delayed.

As Yogi Berra said, "You got to be very careful if you don't know where you're going, because you might not get there." Well, now you're here. The reality is that things didn't quite work out to plan. Somehow, the objectives changed, the variables were switched up, and the recipe for success turned out more like a stew than a filet mignon. That's ok, because people

It's time to check your priorities. Your child's education should not be your main financial concern. I'm sure your children are wonderful people, but they probably won't be taking out a home equity loan to pay for your next cruise. Help them get a loan. They will be ok, too.

First, start contributing to your 401(k). Stop making excuses about how you are unimpressed with the performance. As of right now, you should be excited about a 6% annual return, because half of your 401(k) should be invested in steady, predictable funds. As a rule, your age should be the percent you invest in "fixed" assets: a 60 year old should have about 60% of their assets invested in bond funds or CD's. And for goodness sakes, figure out what a rollover is.

Secondly, you need to seriously consider what your retirement looks like. I wish I had a dollar for every time a retiree told me that he or she is busier in post-retirement than they ever imagined possible. There are grandchildren, vacations, that other career, the annual golf outing, that volunteer work you always wished you had time for. What are you going to do with all that "free time"? What will that cost?

Next is the skeleton in the closet, and I say that figuratively. Your health will be the largest cost of your retirement. Everyone knows someone who went through a horrible, long, expensive long term care treatment. Get long term care insurance. You need it. Insurance will make you, and those you care about, feel better about the aging process. It's coming whether you plan for it or not.

The last food for thought I have is your taxes. You may notice that everything I have mentioned revolves around your taxes; there are tax benefits to your 401(k); you would love to pay fewer taxes in retirement; long term care insurance may be deductible as a medical expense on your tax return. Find someone who understands taxes to help you plan your retirement.

A large portion of retirees switch financial advisors during the first few years of retirement. Remember when your growing children weren't allowed to go see their pediatrician any more? They had to find a more appropriate expert for their situation. I cannot stress enough the importance of your financial advisor intimately understanding your tax situation. Your money (and future) depends on it.

The best financial plan uses all eight wealth management principles. Every one of these revolves around your taxes. If you're wondering what those principles are, or if you're ready to find out what happens next, or if you just don't know what the heck to do. call someone who does!

My father started in this business 20 years ago with one idea in mind. He wanted to help people. Now, I'm proud to follow in those footsteps. Every time one of our clients recommends us to a friend, we greet them with the same phrase, "Come on down!"

Repair your credit rating

hese days, more and more people are finding themselves in the unenviable position of having bad credit. Repairing a credit standing is often a test of will and discipline.

For those with bad credit it may be reassuring to know that many people before you have blazed the trail from dreadful credit to good financial standing. In most cases, bad eredit is the result of poor decision making. While it can be tough to change your ways, the silver lining is that if your credit is bad as a result of decisions you've made, reversing that credit rating is entirely within the realm of possibility if you simply change your approach to credit. To begin the process of restoring credit, consider the following tips.

 Get your credit report. You cannot truly grasp your credit situation without first seeing your credit report. There are three main credit reporting agencies: Experian, TransUnion and Equifax. These agencies often pool their information, so you may only need to request a copy from one of them. Experian can be visited at www.experian.com, Equifax at www.equifax. com and TransUnion at www.transunion.com

Once you've received your credit report, examine it for any discrepancies and ensure that all personal details are cor-

rect. If something isn't right, report it immediately to the agency.

Knowing your credit score will help you grasp just how bad (or good) your situation is. In addition, seeing the report for yourself will give you a tangible account of the mistakes you've made in the past, which should help you avoid those same


mistakes in the future. Use credit to your advantage. As much as they can damage your credit rating, credit cards are also able to help restore it. If you're attempting to rebuild your credit (meaning your debt has already been erased), it's time to begin using your credit card(s) again. However, be careful. A good way to go about this is to use your credit card in situations where you would normally use cash. For instance, if you're buying \$100 worth of groceries, use your credit card instead of paying in cash. But make sure you pay off the purchases in full when the bill is due. If the balance isn't paid in full when it is due, you're just digging yourself a bigger hole. But if you do pay it off in full when it is due, your rating slowly becomes restored, as you're essentially letting prospective creditors know that you're now capable of paying off debts on time.

 Look for deals. It's certainly wise to be wary of deals that seem too good

to be true. But there are deals that seem to work well for retailers, creditors and consumers.

Perhaps the most glaring example is the "Buy now, Pay later" offers provided by many stores that sell products that are considered big purchases. such as home-theater systems, washing machines, furniture, etc. Many times, such stores will offer consumers the chance to put merchandise on a company credit card and allow them to make no payments for a certain number of months. During those months, interest doesn't build. This is a great way to restore credit, as long as the balance is paid in full before the interest begins to accrue. If the balance isn't paid, the fine print of such agreements will likely state that interest will be charged on the months that were advertised as "interest-free." They're only interest-free if the balance is paid in full before the first payment is due. If you manage to pay the balance in full before or on the day the first payment is due, this is an excellent boost to your credit rating.

When it comes to restoring credit, the golden rule is to always pay a balance or at least the minimum payment in full when the bill is due. If you don't, your credit rating will not improve, and will most likely get worse.



Wildlife use different strategies to survive winter

Wild animals endure many hardships in order to survive, but the most challenging of these is winter. Cold temperatures, wind, lack of cover and little food make life during the winter difficult, but months Michigan's wildlife species have adapted different strategies to survive and sometimes make winter almost seem bearable.

To escape winter's bite, many summer resident birds migrate, but this is a costly strategy. It requires a large amount of energy to make the journey. Migratory birds also are more vulnerable to predation during long migratory flights.

Although several species of bats travel south to hibernate, some bats actually travel north. Many of the abandoned mines in the Upper Peninsula provide stable. moist climates for bat hibernation. Millions of bats save themselves a long trip by adapting to these man-made structures. Bats also are infamous for crawling into heated buildings and hiding, waking up once each month.

Perhaps the most interesting migratory flight is conducted by the Monarch butterfly, which travels to Southern California or highlands in northern Mexico. This is a one-way trip for the adults. After over-wintering these butterflies will mate and lay eggs, ensuring the return to Michigan is made by the next generation.

Migration, however, is not always a long-distance affair. When deep snows pile up in the Lake Superior watershed, white-tailed deer travel south to wintering yards. These low-lying areas have a dense cover of white cedar.

Give a present with a future on Valentine's Day

Any Valentine's Day gift is thoughtful. Still, most of these presents have fairly short shelf lives - flowers fade, chocolates get eaten and those little candy hearts that say "Be Mine" get stale. This year, why not give your special valentine a gift that keeps on

giving for years to come? Give stocks. You might want to give shares of stock in a company that makes products favored by your loved one. As an alternative to buying stocks, you could give some shares of your own. You'll need to know what you originally paid for the stock (its tax basis), how long you've held it and its fair market value at the date of the gift. The recipient will need this information to determine gains or losses when he or she sells the stock. (You'll also need to determine if you have to pay gift taxes. You can give up to \$12,000 per year, free of gift taxes, to as many people as you want.)

Contribute to an IRA. The IRA contribution limit for 2008 is \$5,000. Investors who are 50 or older can also make a "catch-up" contribution of an additional \$1,000. So, if your valentine hasn't fully funded his or hers IRA for this year, you can help. Because of their tax advantages, IRAs are great retirement-savings vehicles. (Traditional IRAs have the potential to grow tax-deferred; Roth IRAs potentially grow tax-free, provided the investor has had the account for at least five years and is 59-1/2 or older.)

Make a charitable gift in your valentine's name. Your loved one, like most people, probably supports a variety of social and charitable organizations. By making a donation to one of these groups in your valentine's name, you can add a special meaning to this Valentine's Day. At the same time, you'll be giving yourself a little valentine, because you may be able to claim a tax deduction for your charitable gift.

Review your estate plans. All right, it doesn't sound all that romantic - but if your sweetheart is also your spouse, you'll certainly be looking out for his or her best interests when you review your estate plans. If you were to die without a will, for example, you would cause considerable anguish to your survivors. And in many cases, a simple will isn't enough you may need to establish a living trust or other estate-planning tool. You'll also want to go through your financial assets including your IRA, 401(k), annuities and life insurance contracts - to make sure your beneficiary designations are still accurate.

By making any of these gifts, you'll show your loved one that you really care - and the results of your generosity will be felt long after Valentine's Day

"Carpet, signage, guest rooms, furniture, the breakfast bar area, all-new furniture, and we redid the pool," her said.


"There are new shades, blinds, curtains, wall paint in the guest rooms."


Alsdurf noted that new landscaping outside will be done this spring.





Enjoying nature and tinkering in the arts are essential to the human spirit. It's the adult version of "play," something that many people leave behind at an age when they probably need it the most.

Signs that are worth losing sleep over

You wake feeling exhausted every day, even though you thought you got enough sleep last night. Your spouse mentions that you gasp for air in the middle of the night. Each night, as you're drifting off, you are jolted awake by an urge to move your legs.

What do these things have in common? They're all signs of a possible sleep disorder and a good indication that you need to talk with your doctor.

"Sleep is just as important to your health as good nutrition and exercise, which makes a sleep disorder a genuine health concern," says Mark Garwood,

The Big Four: Common Sleep Disorders

Insomnia — Characterized by regular, long-term trouble falling asleep or staying asleep, insomniacs often feel fatigued day and night because of their inability to get a decent quantity of rest.

Sleep apnea — Most commonly thought of as "snoring," sleep apnea can take on different forms. Obstructive sleep apnea is snoring caused by a partial blockage of your airways as you sleep. Central sleep apnea is a neurological condition in which the brain "forgets" to tell you to breathe temporarily, so you wake up and gasp for air. Both can inadvertently wake you up several hundred times a night, leaving you feeling exhausted - even though you don't realize you're waking up.

Restless legs syndrome — A creepy-crawly feeling or uncontrollable urge to twitch or move your legs, this often misunderstood disorder interferes with many people's ability to relax and go to sleep each night. It can be brought on by hormonal changes such as pregnancy, as well as many other factors.

Narcolepsy — The most obvious characteristic of this brain disorder is the sudden, uncontrollable attack of sleep that can occur at any time of day, even during physical activity such as walking. Most narcoleptics will suddenly nod off at inappropriate times and may have very restless nights of sleep.

Some insects survive by spending the winter as larvae, while others over-winter as adults in large, tightly clustered colonies. Other insects have the ability to produce glycol in their blood, which acts as an anti-freeze. They then enter a state of suspended animation.

But most animals can't migrate or sleep through winter, so, to help them adapt, most mammals increase the length of guard hairs and the amount of underfur to increase the insulating value of their

The winter hairs of the white-tailed deer are hollow providing an extra layer of insulating air. Aquatic mammals, such as otter and mink, grow thick layers of insulating fat and have specialized glands that produce a water proofing oil they comb into their fur. Beavers, in addition to using their water resistant oil, store fat in their tails and cache food under the water.

fringes on the edges of their toes that act like snowshoes. Staying on top reduces the amount of energy needed to move around.

Ruffed grouse also practice snow-roosting. When the snow gets deep, grouse burrow, or more dramatically plunge into snow from flight. Once down inside, the grouse creates a cave. The bird's body heat is trapped inside making the cave a cozy place to stay. If snow cover is lacking grouse will roost in thick conifers to stay warm.

Ducks, geese and swans have feathers and oil glands that keep water away from the skin. The blood vessels in their feet are so close together that warm arterial blood flowing from the body heats the cold blood in veins of their feet. Song birds adjust their internal temperature to reduce heat loss. They also fluff their feathers to increase the air space for insulation and they shiver to create body

The letter from the Birmingham Jail and what it means

"Thanks to Dr. King's letter, Birmingham" had become a clarion call for action ... Archbishop Desmond Tutu quoted the letter in his sermons, Jamaican reggae singer Bob Marley kept the text with him for good luck, and Ghana's Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah's children chanted from it as though Dr. King's text were a holy writ.

As we continue in the season of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday commemoration, many of us continue to hear the most memorable speeches ringing in our ears, the "I have a dream speech," the "I've been to the mountaintop speech" and per-

The ad called King an outside agitator. King retorted in the letter that "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." He reminded them that the Southern Christian Leadership Conference had offices in Birmingham and invited him there.

They commended the police department for maintaining law and order. King reminded them that the police had beaten old black men and women, sent dogs to bite young children and used United Church of Christ.

In hindsight it seems evident into what would end up being a the force of fire hoses to intimidate the marchers.

Once in the rat and roach infested jail people were still being beaten, and deprived of water and food. They criticized him for not negotiating with city leaders. King reminded them that they had attempted unsuccessfully on many occasions to negotiate with the leaders of Birmingham but that the leaders had reneged on their promises.

With modern technology as it is, it is possible for anyone to goggle a copy of this letter and the full-page ad that inspired it. As we enter into the Lenten season in our community and our churches, it might be a wonderful way to come together as a community by reading this letter and asking some hard questions about our commitment to transformational religion.





One of a Kind

Uwe Kind promotes foreign language learning in Dexter

Uwe Kind has come a long way from his roots as a Berliner, a child and student prior to Germany's separation into West and Communist East and his hometown's division with the erection of the Berlin Wall.

In the following years he has fused his love of music, teaching and language into an art form that is

Kind, whose name means "child" in his native tongue, visited Dexter last week to encourage language learning

via his method of movement and participation.


The Dexter Education Foundation sponsored the performance, in which more than 100 Dexter High School and Mill Creek Middle School students participated along with DHS principal Kit Moran and Superintendent Evelynn Shirk.

Dexter was just one stop on an international circuit of concerts and events that took Kind to Kenya, Egypt, Israel and all over Europe and the Americas.

In Dexter his purpose was to teach colloquial German not usually found in textbooks, and do the same for other languages in his repertoire, including French, Spanish, Japanese, English as a Second Language and a little bit of Italian and Arabic.

"I remember in East Germany we had very bad teachers," Kind recalled, telling of his experiences before coming to the United States in 1970.

"I hated it because they didn't really enjoy teaching. I grew up learning Russian as a second lan-

guage in those conditions and I didn't learn much."

To this day, Russian isn't one of

Kind's strong suits.

Characterizing himself as a slow learner with a poor memory, Kind said he began what would evolve into the core of his language teaching concerts as a personal device to help him learn and memorize mate-

"I used to make up little raps and songs, remembering grammar tables and chemical tables by putting them to rhythm. I still, to this day, have problems remember material without such a great mnemonic device."

Kind's method brought him great success and took him all the way to a teaching position at the New School for Social Research, which is now known as New School Village within New York City.

Introducing the guitar into his classroom was a great success and stemmed from a chance encounter that Kind will never forget.

"I had a blind student from New Zealand, whom I would take to my classes after being asked to by his parents, since he had nothing to do," he said. "He learned German and in exchange he taught me how to play the guitar."

produced "Big Blue Marble," which was turned into a motion picture.

His passion has infused his teaching ever since, and brought him great luck and success.

A former student made him the subject of an NBC news broadcast, which in turn led to an invite to "The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson" in 1990.

From there Kind signed a publishing contract and wrote two books on German language instruction, and branched out into other projects, such as "Tune into Espanol." His career in teaching language through music has spanned three decades.

Collaborating with Mark Shuffle, a musician behind The Back Street Boys and Eminem, transformed Kind's style from simple guitar to a more contemporary musical style.

"People weren't just listening to my tunes to learn German, but to dance," Kind said. "We had a No. 4 title on the Danish Hit Parade called "Ich bin Cool," which is a rap song that teaches German."

Kind says that while there are many facets to what he does, the simple fact is that he is trying to demystify language learning for everyone by making it more accessible and bringing an element of dance and rap into it.

"It's become a cool thing where kids make their own videos on YouTube," he said, "It's fascinating to see so much enthusiasm for a school subject."

Kind promotes language learning around the world, but spoke specifically to American students.

"I think Americans think that the University. It is based in Greenwich whole world speaks English," Kind said. "That's not true."

In his experience, speaking more than one language is a great advantage and opens up many doors and leads to opportunities.

It's also a great way to build relationships that might not be possible otherwise.

"People in other countries appreciate it, even if you just say a simple phrase," Kind said. "It shows them that you're trying and, in doing so, Kind started studying songs while will widen your whole outlook and

In Review: 'Vino Veritas' at the Purple Rose

Finding truth within 'Vino Veritas'

By Sean Dalton Staff Writer There is an element of theater that no other storytelling

medium can match. An audience viewing a live performance can either watch it or experience it. and "Vino Veritas" definitely falls into the latter category.

The moment the four characters in the current Purple Rose Theatre production drink the wine of the blue dart tree frog and are forced to be truthful with each other, the audience is put into a similar situation.

As writer David MacGregor promised, his fictional characters become all too real when they tackle real issues, from religion to sex to the sometimes selfdelusional expectations that parents build around children.

It is doubtful that any two audiences will receive "Vino" in quite the same

MacGregor made no attempt to hide the fact that his production would elicit myriad reactions in audiences, not all of which would be positive.

That "Vino" gets so personal and often hits so close to home, that is noteworthy in and of itself.

The plot boils down to one couple meeting another couple at their residence prior to a Halloween party. They are introduced prior to consuming the "truth wine" and are thrown into the mix from there.

As the characters delve deeper into each other's true feelings, beliefs and motivations, onlookers at Thursday's performance transcended the collectivist psychological behavior typical of an audience, where a few claps and laughs cue the rest of the crowd to follow.

It wasn't uncommon to see laughter erupting from one member of the audience, while the person next to them held a hand to their face in embarrassment or shock.

"Vino" pre-empts those subconscious urgings and challenges real-world beliefs so smartly that it's a wonder anyone had the wherewithal to blink without making a conscious effort.

In that way, MacGregor's writing forces each audiVino Veritas

The story: This world premiere comedy takes its title from the Latin proverb, which literally translated: "in wine, the truth," suggests that people reveal their truest feelings under the influence of alcohol. On Hallowetn night, two middle-aged couples prepare to attend a friend's annual party. Though the evening begins as usual, familiar traditions slowly unravel when the foursome shares a bottle of South American ceremonial wine made from the skin of blue dart tree frogs. Under the influence of this tribal truth serum, they share an unpredictable and hilarious night of unbridled honesty that stretches the bounds of their friendship forever.

ence member to reflect from within what is happening on stage.

As one of that collective watching "Vino," it felt like each person in the audience was sort of a background character. That's certainly how I felt.

The first act was fairly tame, beginning with a minor spat between the main couple that I personally found funny, but someone a row over was probably tugging at their collar and laughing nervously.

I found the frenetic drama of the second act to cause a personal feeling of anxiety.

I imagine others in the audience grappled with the implications of what characters were saying about religion or the perception of how 9/11 affected everyone's lives.

While we're going to leave the plot and character details as surprises, let's talk about the actors' performances, which were uniformly outstanding. Each role fit its respective actor like a tailored glove.

Suzi Regan continues to exude intelligence and strength in her performances, which is perfect for the role of Lauren — the adventurous and ambitious photographer turned frustrated housewife and mother.

She is the one who brings out the catalytic blue brew from Peru that will shove her husband and their neighborhood pal couple down the rabbit hole.

The Purple Rose's program says that Phil Powers "was born to play this role," and there can be no disagreement. It's no wonder that the character shares the actor's real name — not the only real thing he brings.

Powers is also recently married, according to the program, so one has to wonder if getting settled into that situation didn't help

him bring authenticity to a role that is equal parts comedic, tragic and vulnerable.

Powers shows the greatest range of emotion as the truth peels back layer after layer of a goofball that is much deeper than he has let on for years.

Quetta Carpenter made her Purple Rose debut in "Vino" as Claire, and she is certainly welcome back anytime.

Claire and husband Ridley (Tommy Gomez) start out as the "perfect couple" that are the envy of friends and neighbors, as well as favorites at the Halloween party that the two couples plan to attend after eating some hors d'oeuvres at Phil and Lauren's house.

Carpenter's performance reaches a crescendo in the second act as Claire proves highly combustible under the circumstances into which she has been forced, since the couples sequester themselves inside the house for the duration of their involuntary truthful-

Gomez does a fantastic job playing the only one of the four who doesn't consume the wine. His character has to react to this unnatural occurrence and face the situation without the benefit of a plot device.

His honest moments have to be delivered convincingly, because when his character tells the truth, it is the result of bravery or necessi-

"Vino Veritas" is a potion that everyone should taste. It's entertaining and you just might walk out of the theater a more developed character yourself.

Color trends banish kitchen boredom

very homeowner knows that the kitchen is the perfect place to please the palate. But it can also be the perfect place to add character with the color palette. When remodeling the hub of your home, choosing the right colors is an important part of the decision making process. But how do you choose colors that are compatible with your space and your taste?

Connie Edwards, director of design for American Woodmark, offers some helpful tips for guiding your color choices to banish kitchen boredom.

Cabinetry Color vs. Wall Color

Painting your kitchen walls is an easy way to add color and personality to your space. Soft blue wall paints, which are calming and easy to live with, are also versatile as they work well with both light and dark cabinetry.

The color can balance cabinetry with a darker finish, such as cherry spice, or accent cabinetry with a lighter finish like maple butterscotch.

Go Bold

If you prefer the colors in your home to be trendy, consider using dramatic hues to brighten up your kitchen walls. "Bold, ethnic colors such as red and gold, the colors of China, are expected to gain interest because of the upcoming Olympics, while botanical greens are strong partly because of the environmental movement," says Edwards. If you are not quite ready to make such a bold commitment, buy a small container of paint and test it on an inconspicuous area of the wall to see how it works with your kitchen and your style.

How to Avoid a Color Trap Another simple solution for taking a kitchen from drab to dazzling is to mix cabinetry finishes and/or countertop colors. Mixing finishes and countertops is a surefire way to avoid the common color mistake of matching everything. When everything in a room is the same color, it becomes either too intense or too bland.

To avoid this color trap, choose two finishes that balance one another. Combining a maple cream or natural maple finish on the main cabinetry with a cherry chocolate finish on the island adds depth and pulls the entire room together. Or, keep the finish the same on both and use contrasting countertops for the main kitchen and the island to achieve the same balance.

If you do not want to transform your entire kitchen into a colorful oasis, but still want to show
