### Police: Poor economy the major factor in crime rate increase

It seems like a matter of common sense: When the economy goes bad, more people turn to crime.

But local law enforcement agencies have hard numbers to back up that assumption.

"During tough economic times, you find desperate people out there committing crimes," Washtenaw County Sheriff Dan Minzey.

### Chelsea acquires long-range thermal imager

The Chelsea Area Fire Authority has a new tool in its arsenal, thanks to our federal tax dollars at work. The department last week received a long-range thermal imaging camera that cost \$20,000 but was fully funded by a grant from a federal agency.

"We received a \$20,000 grant for a thermal imaging camera, but it didn't cost us a thing," said CAFA Chief Jim Payeur.

"We applied for the grant last summer through the Department of Homeland Security."

Payeur just returned from a four-day trip to Chicago to pick up the camera and be trained in its use, and quickly discovered he was in the minori-

"There were a large number of police officers there, because it has all kinds of uses for law enforcement," Payeur said.

"We can use it primarily for search and rescue people lost in the woods, water rescues, hazardous

grandparents than ever, as well as other relatives, are parenting, regardless of legal custody status, and often feel isolated and conflicted about parenting again. They say, 'It wasn't supposed to be like this." Our program is intended to build a sense of confidence and comfort for those moving into a parenting role anew."

Monet said nationally, some 4.5 million children are living in grandparent headed homes, a 30 percent increase from 1990, according to the 2000 U.S. Census.

"That's more than 6 percent of children in the United States," she said.





### Chelsea City Council: Roundup

### Sheridan Books nets \$7.9 million in tax breaks

Action taken at the March 25 City Council meeting will allow a Chelsea book manufacturer to reap tax benefits from a \$7.9 million expansion.

The council conducted a required public hearing on Sheridan Books' application for an industrial facilities tax exemption (IFT).

Company officials said Sheridan is expanding its production line again by adding a fifth Timson offset web press and other equipment, which will require a physical expansion of the facility at 615 E. Industrial Drive.

The 10-year tax abatements were for a \$120,000 building expansion, and for \$7,763,816 in new equipment.

"It's a reflection of the continuous growth here," said Michael Seagram, Sheridan Books' President and Chief Operating Officer.

"We addressed on bottleneck in the plant in our large books with the press we got last (October), but at the same time that we added that capacity, we saw an increase in our smaller books - that demand has gotten so heavy we needed to expand."

Seagram said some of the plant's older equipment will be retired and removed to help make room for the increased business.

"We are going to be taking two of our three black-andwhite sheet-fed presses offline." Seagram said.

"We found a buyer for them and will take those off our floor just as we take delivery of the new press, which will be some time in the middle of August."

No residents in the audience spoke either for or against the proposal, so the council immediately took action on the request.

"They have met all the criteria for a 10-year abatement for personal and real property," said City Administrative Assistant Georgia Beeman.

On separate unanimous votes, the council first approved the real property tax exemption for the buildexpansion, approved the personal property exemption for the new equipment.

Seagram noted that work force Sheridan's would be expanding as well. "We are going to be



### Chelsea contractor wins award for work at U-M's Crisler Arena

If you noticed a better picture on your TV while watching Michigan Wolverine basketball this season, your eyes were not deceiving you.

It wasn't your TV, it was new lighting at Crisler Arena that was installed by a Sylvan Township electrical contracting firm.

The work of JG Squared was so good, in fact, that it even won the 2008 Pyramid Award from the Washtenaw Contractors Association.

"The award was for the innovation we used," said Jerry Gordenier, the 45-day job by Oct. 28 with a crew owner of the company.

The WCA bestowed the award at a banquet held March 14 at Ann Arbor's Kensington Court Hotel.

Gordenier explained that because of the innovation they came up with, they were able to complete the work without having to cover and uncover the floor each time or disrupt normal operations.

The arena was used for basketball practices and other events during the day, so the work had to be done from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m.

"We came up with a support sys-

tem that hung from the rafters," Gordenier said.

"We carried it up the bleachers and slid it out on the catwalks and left it there to eliminate the timeconsuming process of moving equipment on and off the floor every day."

The goal was to have the lights installed by Nov. 1, in time for the first men's basketball game, and Other contractors had convinced the university that the job could not be completed by then, and were given an extension to Dec. 1.

JG Squared was able to complete of six to 10 workers.

Gordenier said U-M was pleased with the company's performance on the \$850,000 contract.

"They were thrilled with the job," he said, noting that about 70 percent of his company's work is for the uni-

Although this is the first Pyramid Award that JG Squared has earned in its 10-year history, it has twice won the "Fast Track" award for business growth from the Washtenaw

Business Development Council. The award-winning innovations

consisted of the creation of special brackets to fit to the existing 90-foot high I-beams that would support perpendicular scaffolding. These were necessary to overcome the problem of the new lights being installed 10 feet away from any exist-

Another technique was created to install six-light sets in each of the arena's four corners, because the weight of the new lights prevented them from being mounted in the previous manner.

With help from the Musco lighting company, a design was created using a combination of aviation wire, shackles, turnbuckles and chokers to suspend the fixture mounting bars 10 feet from an existing catwalk and 60 feet above the basketball court.

This setup was installed by straddling a ladder from the catwalk to the mounting bar.

The new lighting now meets NCAA standards, and Gordenier said people immediately noticed the upgrade.

"The difference between then and now is like the Stone Age vs. the Space Age," he said.

### **New law** aimed to protect homeowners


Bipartisan legislation that will allow Michigan homeowners to refinance their home loans at lower interest rates to avoid foreclosure was signed last week by the governor.

"Many homeowners in Michigan are facing economic challenges and are fearful of losing their homes," state Sen. Randy Richardville, R-17th District, said in a news release. "This legislation will help them refinance their home loans with lower interest rates. It should help reduce the number of foreclosures in Michigan and strengthen the state's struggling housing market."

Senate Bill 1133, sponsored by Richardville, will expand the total family income cap threshold to \$108,000 for those seeking a loan offered by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. It also will allow state residents to have increased access to MSHDA programs.

"As chair of the Senate Banking and Financial Institutions Committee, issues related to Michigan's housing and mortgage industries are very important to me," Richardville

"Throughout the past several months, I have worked closely with the members of the mortgage community, state representatives and the administration to develop this legislative package. I am pleased that it is now state law so that homeowners can begin taking advantage of these new programs."



stolen property, vandalism, weapons violations, prostitution, gambling, sex offenses, narcotics violations, family and children offenses, driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, liquor law violations, disorderly conduct and more.

The reports for 1997 through 2006 can be viewed on the State Police Web site (www.michigan.gov/msp) under "Publications, Forms and Statistics."

Although Chelsea's 2007 numbers are available now, county and state statistics for 2007 are not yet available.

"We can't release them to the public until they are all compiled, which probably won't be until September or October, said CJIC spokeswoman Wendy Easterbrook.

Chelsea tracked 14 categories of offenses from 2005 to 2007.

Minor increases were reported in criminal sexual conduct and robbery from '06 to '07, but significant increases were seen during that time for domestic assault (from 8 to 18), assault and battery (from 10 18), closed-account possession (0 to 4) and driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (28 to 34).

"I'm pretty confident in the 2007 numbers - they are accurate," Toth explaining that the department was adopting a new incident reporting system.

"Crime is up and down; sometimes you have a year that you have an increase for whatever reason," he added.

The 2005 and 2006 statistics for Michigan State Police and the Sheriff's Department point out some serious crime being comtroubling trends.

MSP responded to one **2**005.





### AN EAGLE EYE VIEW EMU women's golf team on a roll Eagles set school record with four tournament wins

The Eastern Michigan University women's golf team is on a roll and head coach Sandy Wagner is hoping it continues right through to the Mid-American Conference championship, April 25-27, at the Brickyard in Indianapolis,

The Eagles' latest tournament proved to be the record breaker as the Green and



White not only made history at the Eastern Kentucky Invitational (April 5), but it did so in resounding fashion by blowing away the rest of the seven-team field in the process.

Eastern Michigan continued its outstanding 2007-08 campaign by dominating the field at the par-72, 5,817-yard course Arlington Golf Club at EKU with a 20-shot victory - its record-setting fourth overall title during the 2007-08 season. The Eagles improved to 44-13 in four spring tournaments. The four tournament wins overall are the most in a school year.

Eastern's other tournament wins this season came at the NIU Brickyard Invitational (Sept. 10-11), the Shootout at the Legends (Oct. 8-9) and at the Red Rocks Invitational (March 1-2).

Overall the EKU win marks the 12th overall title in the program's 14-year history and the eighth during Wagner's three-year tenure as coach. Additionally, the victory is the second consecutive EKU Spring Invitational championship for the Eagles, as the squad won the weather-shortened 2007 EKU Spring Invitational trophy with a 646 (324-322).

The Eagles have been led all year by junior Stephany Fleet and senior Catherine Fortin.

Fleet captured low medalist honors at the EKU Invitational with a two-over 146 (73-73) for the tworound event. Fleet's victory was the third of her career and her second this season. During the fall, Fleet won the Wolverine Invitational, Sept. 29-30, 2007, when she notched a 219 (72-70-77) to claim the prestigious title. Additionally, her first-place finish is her fourth top five finish of the year and the ninth of her stellar career.

Fortin also continued her exceptional play with a third-place finish. Fortin shot four-over 148 (73-75) for the tournament and notched her 17th career top 10 finish as well as her 14th top five showing.

Wagner will also count on Courtney Aili, Darby Peters, Stephanie Bevington, Marjorie Thuot and Melissa Spalding to give the Eagles a run at the MAC title.



Funny thing happened on the way to interrupting his remarks.

On Feb 19, Democratic Party candidate Barack Obama said. "He says that he is willing to send our troops into another 100 years of war in Iraq.

On March 17, Hillary Clinton. the other Democratic frontrunner, said: "He's willing to keep this war going for 100 years.'

And the news media has perpetuated the same conclusion. CNN anchor Rich Sanchez is quoted saying, "McCain is telling us ... that we need to win even if it takes 100 years."

It was McCain's fault for uttering his comments in the first place without making sure his comments were clear. Had he said, American troops will not be fighting this war for the next 100 years, but we might need some ground forces there just as we have them in South Korea and Japan, his stance would have been clearer.

But he didn't and now he has to try to undo what he did. And he has company.

Michigan House Speaker Andy Dillon has the same footin-mouth disease and the state GOP is exploiting it.

GOP state chair Saul Anuzis, in a fund-raising letter, notes that Dillon recently told a group, "He can't rule out another tax increase to balance Michigan's budget this year."

For the anti-tax crowd, those are fighting words - but Dillon didn't say that.

He did discuss a possible gas tax vote after the fall elections, but that was never in the context of balancing the budget, nor did he ever reference a general tax increase, as

Anuzis' statement suggests. Anuzis, trying to spin his way out of his original misleading statement, sought to clarify his

remarks. He noted that Gov. Jennifer Granholm has projected a \$300 million to \$500 million revenue shortfall and, his twisted logic continues, she has not talked about cutting back services to fill in the gap.

Therefore, "How can the speaker claim there will not be a plea for additional funds? It's not honest and a little more than political posturing."

Well, if Dillon is not honest, neither is the chairman, but the chair will never be guilty of letting the facts get in the way of good fund-raising letter.

The communications department for the state GOP then got into the act. After taking a half-baked swing at deflecting the criticism, he finally conceded that he did not mind taking a hit if the column linked the words "Democrats" and "tax

The governor has feverishly asserted there won't be any tax hikes this year. After all, no one in this town wants a redo of the fiscal fiasco that dominated





Monet said reasons for the growing trend include parents unable to raise their children because of drugs, alcohol and mental health problems, incarceration, divorce, child abuse and neglect, teen pregnancy, poverty, HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, military deployment and death.

"It's so sad," Monet said. "Some of these grandparents are dealt a double blow by finding themselves in the middle of a family crisis and then all of a sudden taking on the responsibility of raising a grandchild at home."

Founded in 1992, the Catholic Social Services Grandparents as Parents program, whose headquarters are based at St. Joseph Hospital Ypsilanti, has seen a gradual rise in county clients seeking out their services in recent years.

"I think if more people knew where we were and what we did, we would have a lot more grandparents seeking us out." Monet said.

According agency's adult older servicmanager, Joshua Hartman, the program currently services 120 clients from Ann Arbor, Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Saline and Ypsilanti. However, in a study released by the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging, in 2006, there were 3.573 households with the grandparent as listed as the primary caregiver.







## Island paradise



### Drummond Island is a special vacation spot

Heritage Newspapers s the stocky young man with hair falling out his baseball Lap approaches the driver's side window, the car is suddenly rocked back and forth. While the passengers in the car are a little surprised by the jolt, the young man doesn't skip a beat.

"That's \$12, sir," he says, barely making eye contact.

And so the journey to Drummond Island begins - with a jolt, 12 bucks and a 10-minute ferry ride across the St. Mary's river. Because there are no roads or bridges to the island, visitors with automobiles must take the ferry, making the final leg of the trip not only a little different, but special - a very fitting introduction to this little gem sparkling along the edge of Lake Huron.

If you look at a map of the boundary line between Canada and the United States, you will see that the more straight line would have given Drummond Island to the Canadians. But for some reason the boundary breaks off and goes around Drummond Island, leaving this northern paradise on the American side. If trading the Upper Peninsula for Toledo was Michigan's greatest steal, procuring Drummond Island was a nice little heist.

Up North means many things to many people. For example, some people never head north without the



golf clubs in the trunk. If golf is your game. The Rock is your place. This 18-hole gem can play with any of Northern Michigan's top courses and that's saying something.

Others head north with the fishing poles and tackle boxes banging around in the back. Drummond Island boasts some of the best fishing places around - even in the so-called slow years. Salmon, pike, walleye and perch are among the biggest catches.

Of course hunting also is a popular sport on the island. Hunters visit the island from all over the country and many make a week of it, staying in one of the local cabins or campgrounds. The DNR estimates as many as 6,000 deer call Drummond Island

If kayaking is your thing then Tiny Harbor Island and its nature preserve is a must destination. This hot spot offers plenty of ecological wonders of the area.

Hiking and mountain biking also are on many visitor's to-do list. With 150 miles of rugged scenic shoreline. 133 square miles of forested landscape and 76 miles of paved roads, there are plenty of options available. The many trails provide some beautiful scenery and offer that up-north feeling of peace and tranquility.

Drummond Island is the largest American island in the Great Lakes with 133 square miles. It's an ecological paradise. In fact, 61 percent of the island is state forest land and is home to uncountable migratory birds. deer and other animals. It's also home to the alvar plains, a rare geological feature left over from the ice

Maxton Plains is one of the largest and least disturbed alvars in the world. Alvars are broad, flat areas of limestone bedrock on which the topsoil was scraped away, in this case by Ice Age glaciers. While Drummond Island certainly offers some magnificent scenery, Maxton Plains must be appreciated because of its uniqueness and subtle beauty – and the best way to see that is up close and per-

It was August and school was about to start. We moved from a small little town called Black River, Mich., which is about 20 miles south of Alpena. Ron was a logger and the opportunity looked good.


Q. What is it like living on **Drummond Island?**

Q. You build almost everything by hand, including the kitchen tables. lamps, decks, etc. How long have you and Ron been builders?





The city of Chelsea and the Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority will host a Clean-Up Day from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 3 at the WWRA station at 8025 Werkner Road in Lyndon Township.

A second Clean-Up Day for the Saline area will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 17 at the Patrick J. Little Public Works Facility, 1234 Tefft Court in Saline.

These collections are an opportunity for Washtenaw County residents and businesses to dispose of unwanted household waste materials in a safe and sustainable man-

Numerous household materials can be brought to these environmental clean-up events to be recycled.

There will be bins for traditional materials, such as plastic, glass and tin containers, cardboard, paper, scrap metal, and Freon-containing appliances (air conditioners and refrigerators).

A suggested donation of \$10 per car will be accepted to help decrease disposal costs and support this community collection.


People may dispose of up to four tires for free, but will be asked to pay \$5 for each additional tire.

## 'Growing Pretty' will grow on you

By Sean Dalton Staff Writer reshman playwright Carey Crim is off to a great start with her Purple Rose Theatre Company writing debut "Growing Pretty," thanks to tailor-made dialogue and a cast of believable actors to pull it off.

The thing that really stands out about this production and makes it come alive is the quality of the performances, thanks to the fact that everyone on stage has completely bought into what Crim presents in her script.

Lucy Keen, played wonderfully by PRTC professional newcomer Stacie Hadgikosti, is such an interesting lead character, and real, too.

It helps that Hadgikosti is a newer actor and has a freshness to her, since her performance was more raw than that of co-star Grant Krause, who is generally more polished due to the sheer length of his resume.

That rawness lent a great deal of authenticity to the vulnerability and pain that Lucy feels throughout the play.

Michael Brian Ogden also needs to be recognized for his intense and often spastic performance as

Lucy's childhood best friend Hami,

His character is best summed up as the ultimate conflicted best friend with romantic ambitions that are constantly at odds with a friendship that is too valuable to chance.

It doesn't help that both Lucy and Hami have a number of crises at home that distract them from each other and push their platonic relationship to the forefront - much to Hami's chagrin.

He is essentially "in the friend zone" when it comes to the love of his life, and Ogden not only gets that across with his great delivery, but facial expressions, body language and the entire kit and caboodle. He conveys pain, frustration and introversion masterfully.

"Growing Pretty" opens with Lucy and Hami taking photos for a Redbook magazine mail-in amateur model competition.

At the start, Lucy is trying to be acknowledged by her mother (played by Rhiannon Ragland) - a task that leads her to seek general acceptance from everyone and Krause's Jack, who at first comes into the Keen household as a boarder, but is quickly driven out of the home and

Lucy's life after an incident her - the true plot thread involving his camera and Lucy's mother.

As always, Krause is great at playing the experienced, worldly anchor to the rest of the cast. He has a penchant for playing a philanderer, which is part of who Jack becomes in the

After Redbook editors render their verdict on Lucy's supermodel ambitions, the focus quickly shifts to Jack, and Lucy's childhood infatuation with

Lucy seeks out Jack for reasons both personal and professional, but the relationship ends up being extremely volatile and the source of one of the biggest twists in the story.

Let's just say that Lucy and Jack, who become pupil and mentor, are on different trajectories of success and desperation rears its ugly head.

These three relationships take a lot of twists and turns over the course of the story's 18-year span, which sees Lucy grow from age 12 to 30.

Once the kids are out of college and Lucy's true journey to become a photographer like Jack - her love and one of the few people who acknowledge

begins and doesn't stop making heads and hearts ache until the final scene, where the resolution is dropped in the audience's lap with little warning.

Over the course of the play, Lucy will grow into adulthood and realize her ambition of becoming an artist. Along the way she develops into a more complete human being in general, but whether or not that is the result of her growth into an artist or one of the keys that allowed it to happen is up to the audience's interpretation.

At first it seems like Crim and "Growing Pretty" director Michelle Mountain

cast aside the supermodel ambitions and childhood portion of Lucy's life prematurely.

These are mined thoroughly for comedic effect early on, but the production doesn't really hit its stride until Lucy, Hami and Jack grow up (or grow older, in Jack's case).

From there on, it is a very touching, emotional story that had men in the audience at last Saturday's media performance crying during the curtain call.

Hugh Maguire, playing Lucy's father, doesn't get much stage time, but what little he has is touching and his performance during one of two funeral scenes

drops an emotional bomb so poignant the resolution of Crim's tale would not be the same without it.

Even though the play is titled and promoted in such a way that one might think it's just for the ladies. Lucy's story is definitely one to which we can all relate.

Whether you've had a childhood friendship that had romantic love at its core but was too valuable to chance, or the strained relationship between Lucy and her mother, there's at least one thing here for everyone to chew on.

Unless, of course, you've led a "charmed life," as Mountain put it.





### Raptor rehabilitation is a stimulating experience

By James Orr Guest Writer I went inside the owl cage to give my recuperating barred owl his chicken thigh dinner and he startled me by suddenly flying from one side of the cage to the other

right over my shoulder. The cage was actually a 6foot by 10-foot kennel about 10 feet tall, so a large owl with a three-foot wing span, sharp talons and a flesh tearing beak flying over your shoulder is what I call highly stimulating.

This was the first time he had flown since I had rescued him from the highway several weeks earlier.

I found him on a dark rainy night sitting on the center stripe of a highway.

He was in shock and had a large wound on his wing where he had apparently been hit by a car.

He was in a daze, seemingly unaware of the vehicles barely missing him at 50

I did not have my animal rescue tools with me and the thought of picking up a wild raptor capable of removing a finger was cause for hesita-

I removed my coat and used it to capture him, figuring I'd rather be cold than risk loosing a digit.

Once I had him loaded in

the backseat it was hard to concentrate on the dark winding mountain road trying not to think about what could happen if a kidnapped owl got out of my coat and decided to fly inside my

vehicle. Since I was no longer wearing a coat I was particularly vulnerable to his?-inch talons, which I knew were capable of exerting hundreds of pounds of pressure per square inch.

Every time I heard a rustle from the back seat I envisioned him attacking my ears with his powerful beak.

This is a good point to mention you can go to jail or be fined if caught in the possession of an owl or migratory bird.

Federal laws protect them and even helping one requires a licensed bird rehabilitator. Rather than use an assumed name and secret hideaway to help my feathered friend I reported the rescue and got the required authorization and supervision to proceed.

I made it home without incident and treated his wounds keeping his head covered as I administered injections, carefully avoiding the talons that kept grasping at his unseen benefactor.

He had no visible broken bones but was pretty much

You grasp his upper beak with your fingers and lift, tilting his head back until he opens his mouth.

Next you maneuver a piece of raw chicken about the size of a finger into his mouth pulling out your finger before reflex action causes him to snap shut his razor sharp beak.




The data is the basis for the development of regional hydraulic geometry reference curves - a fancy name for a tool that allows biologists to predict characteristics of streams based on the size of their watershed or drainage area.

"By using the regional curves on streams for which we have little or no information, we hope to save time and allow for better



restoration project design,"

Reznick said. Staff from the DNR Fisheries Division will use the regional curves for projects such as dam removal or stream restoration.

According Chris to Freiburger, who coordinates the state's role with the federal government in the regulation of hydroelectric dams and the licensing of hydropower plants in Michigan, completion of the curves will aid efforts underway as well as new projects.

"We currently help fisheries managers throughout the state by reviewing projects involving dams, fish passage and stream channel improvement," he said. "The regional curves will provide another resource to help us provide better

advice and guidance." Although all members of the Stream Team pitch in to help, the primary responsibility of data collection for the regional curves falls upon Cyndi Rachol and Kristine Boley-Morse.

Much of the financial assistance for the regional curves is provided by members of the Stream Team, including the Department

Since both top and bottom bill are pointed to facilitate tearing flesh there is not a lot of room for error.

By the third day he regained enough of his senses to take food out of my hand voluntarily. This is not to say he was tame.

An animal in shock can appear quite calm giving the illusion he is tame but this can change at any second.

After three weeks he had recovered from the concussion and all I had to do was leave a couple chicken thighs in the cage each night.

He would eat everything to the bare bone.

The first attempt to release him was unsuccessful. He was only able to fly a few yards to the ground, so I returned him to the kennel to recuperate further and build up strength in his injured wing.

In rehabilitation class they instruct you that the animals will tell you when they are ready to go.

Seeing him fly around his cage buzzing my ears after staying immobile for almost four weeks was a pretty clear message: Mr. Owl was ready to leave.

The trick was to capture a now fully healthy owl without getting either of us hurt. It would be terrible to injure him if he panicked in the confines of the cage.

This time I was protected with Kevlar gloves and heavy leather arm guards. As I entered the kennel and closed the door behind me I started thinking about ear snacks again.

I covered his head with a towel, which caused him to remain fairly still and I was able to pick him up pinning his wings from behind to avoid talons and beak, either of which could cause significant injury.

Owls can hiss, snap their beak and make a very loud clicking sound when threatened which I can say from personal experience is most intimidating.

As if the sound effects were not enough they can turn their heads 180 degrees. which causes additional problems because you can-

not tell the front from back with a towel over their head, and when you take the towel off they can turn their head around behind them and snap at your hands.

It takes a lot of confidence in your training to not panic when they pull this exorcist routine on you.

I successfully carried my patient out of the cage and uncovered him. He hopped from my gloved hand to my leather-sleeved arm. He calmly looked me over one last time making direct eye contact as if to say "What now?"

I began to fear he was sizing up my ears again.

Looking into his magnificent eyes I was reminded owls have incredible night vision. A person with comparable sight could read a newspaper by candlelight from the opposite end of a football stadium.

He flew to the ground and I began to wonder if this would be a repeat of the last release attempt.

He sat there for a few minutes watching me and then flew away into the late afternoon sky. Owls fly silently, no wing flutter like other birds due to very soft downy feath-

It is an eerie sight to see such a large bird fly silently.

I felt really fulfilled and as I walked into the house and I felt my ears noticeably relax.

"We expect former
Dewey students to be a part

Patterson, director of the
Chelsea Senior Center.

"I took a tour of the Dewey School and I'm so impressed with how it has been authentically restored. I can't wait to see the faces of our project participants as they are transported back to yester-year.

"It's still hard for me to believe that up to 1959 this is how rural Washtenaw was educated."

The first school in that area was a log building, located where M-106 intersects with Mt. Hope and Territorial Roads.

As attendance grew, in the mid-19th century the Solomon Dewey family donated land east of the old site for a brick school building, to be called the Dewey School. Ida Kassel was its first teacher.

During a meeting in 1883, the floor collapsed, fortunately with no injuries. A new school was built with salvaged bricks and new

bricks from the Waterloo brickyard.

Dewey School did duty beyond educating local children in the 3 "Rs" – Reading, 'Riting, 'Rithmatic – it also served as a community center and for meetings, church services and funerals.

Children in grades 1-8 learned in the same room, girls on one side, boys on the other – and the youngest at the front of the class. Boys brought daily supplies of wood provided by their families for the woodstove.

Children drank from a dipper in a bucket of water, and lunches were stored in metal pails with lids, in the cloakroom.

Dewey School, with Berta Matthews as its last teacher, closed in 1956 when all the country schools consolidated to form Stockbridge

Community Schools.

A group of former pupils and friends – encouraged by George May and Solan Weeks from the State Historical Commission – spearheaded the task of preserving the school as a museum. The school, its land, two outhouses and a woodshed were purchased for one dollar, and authentic historic furniture and teaching materials were sought from donors.

The Waterloo Area
Historical Society has
owned and operated Dewey
School for over 40 years,
providing the experience of
19th century rural schooling for children and teachers each year from May

through September.
The Chelsea Senior
Center luncheon and tour
are part of an ongoing project spearheaded by
Patterson, to preserve the
legacy of local one-room
schoolhouses.

Last year, Patterson teamed with Bill Harmer, head of adult services at McKune Memorial Library, and Elizabeth Goldman, adult services librarian,

and obtained a grant from the Chelsea Community Foundation.

With the support of the library and the Chelsea Historical Society. Patterson developed an outline of activities, questions, and a variety of programs to bring together local people with a story to

Arlene Dobberstein Harvey, 82, was a pupil at Jerusalem School, which was located on the corner of Fletcher and Sager roads. Harvey, who remembers the flip-top desks and pot-bellied stove, had the same teacher for all eight years there, and about 20 students attended the

school. A favorite game at recess was a form of softball called "work-up," with no teams but each player had his or her own record.

## Chelsea Area Players Fuse sight and sound in latest production

Staff Writer ne of the most popular and widely performed classics from Shakespeare's repertoire is getting a fresh coat of paint this year.

The Chelsea Area Players completed auditions last month and will be polishing their "neo-production" of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," complete with contemporary visual cues and music from all points of the spectrum.

"In putting together my vision for (our) production of this Shakespearean classic, I knew that I wanted to incorporate music as underscoring and to establish character themes," said director Ty Jacobs.

Music by 19thth-century German composer Felix Mendelssohn will be interwoven throughout the production with contemporary beats by French electronic music duo Daft Punk, as the tale of four young Athenian lovers, a group of amateur actors and fairies who inhabit a moonlit forest plays out before the audience.

Mendelssohn was born in 1809 in Germany and was a composer, a pianist, and one of the very first conductors in what is known as the Romantic period in classical music.

At the age of 17, he composed his first well-known work, his "Overture to Shakespeare's 'A Midsummer

Nights Dream." "I knew that I wanted to incorporate music as underscoring and to establish character themes," Jacobs


"You can imagine my immense treat in discovering that music had already been composed for the



At left midfield, senior captain Ellen Stewart returns, while sophomore Cara Johnson and junior captain Audrey Ruikka will also







Despite early concerns defensively, Forrester said Dexter's play in scrimmage games has been encouraging. The Dreads have been solid against tough foes.


