Sheriff's race among county primaries to watch

Minzey faces two Democratic challengers

The race for Washtenaw County sheriff includes three Democrats squaring off in the primary and a lone Republican candidate.

Incumbent Sheriff Dan Minzey of Chelsea will take on Jerry Clayton of Ypsilanti and Iva Jo Bielec of Milan for the Democratic nomination. Barring a successful write-in campaign, Dwayne Taylor of Ypsilanti will challenge the winner in November's general election.

Below are profiles on those facing contests Aug. 5.

ed to sergeant and oversaw Western Operations Road Patrol and Dexter sheriff's substation (1995-2000), elected sheriff and is now serving his second term (2000-present). Minzey attended Washtenaw Community College, where he earned an associate's degree in criminal justice and later attended Eastern Michigan University, where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees.

Overview: It has been a tumultuous tenure for second-term incumbent and longtime Washtenaw County resident Dan Minzey.

Starting in 2005, Minzey found himself swept up in a lawsuit filed by three townships against county officials who wished to eliminate a police contracting subsidy and place the full cost of police services onto local municipalities.

The townships of Augusta, Ypsilanti and Salem refused to sign a multiple-year contract, with the cost of years 2008 and 2009 undetermined, prompting several threats from the county to lay off deputies in those areas. To block the layoffs, Minzey filed a lawsuit in what turned out to be just the beginning of a long and engaged legal battle between the county and those seeking to keep current levels of deputy staffing.

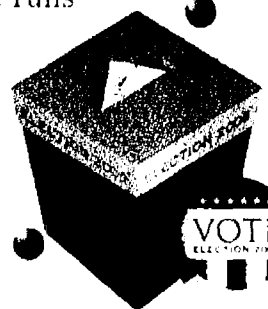

The family business



Business owners keep family foremost in tough economy

Running a business in Michigan's rough economic waters is challenging enough, but then add a family tree to the mix and see how much more difficult it can be.

Whether for financial or personal reasons, four families have saved, sought and struggled to open their own establishments.

Some are open for decades, while others are open for months, but for them all, working with their own flesh and blood makes it more worthwhile.

As industries change, dreams develop, jobs are lost and pastimes become professions, the problems are many. Yet conflicts can be evaded when someone's support staff is also their work staff.

Ryder prepares to ride into Chelsea on July 24

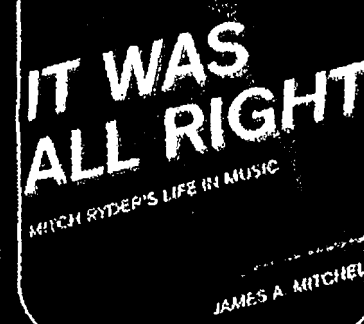
Event to raise money for local Sounds & Sights

As Sounds & Sights continues its free entertainment series each Thursday night, the event organizers are anxiously awaiting one particular Thursday, when rock 'n roll icon Mitch Ryder and The Detroit Wheels hit the stage in Chelsea. Next Thursday will not only mark the halfway point of this year's schedule, but more importantly for the future of Sounds & Sights, this night will help determine the financial success for the series.

Since its inception four years ago, Sounds & Sights financial support has come mainly in the form of donations from local businesses, sponsors, patrons and grants to help it grow and succeed. With so many cuts to state-wide arts funding, and grants seemingly drying up, the organizers had to be more creative in its efforts to solicit funding, and decided this year to hold an annual benefit concert featuring a well-known headliner act. Thus the Mitch Ryder benefit concert was booked, with the hopes of raising operating capital for the year, while also raising awareness about Sounds & Sights beyond the Chelsea borders.

"This will be an important night for us," says Craig Common, Sounds & Sights chairman. "We know with the tight economy and budget cuts for the arts that we need to be more self-sustaining for our funding. So a benefit concert seemed like the logical choice. But this endeavor comes with some

Minzey claimed in the lawsuit that county officials were usurping his authority as sheriff, and a visiting Monroe County judge eventually found that the county was within its right to lay off deputies.

Fewer than six months later, in January 2007, Minzey sued the county again over its handling of overcrowding problems at Washtenaw County Jail, but eventually agreed to drop the action.

The townships' lawsuit remains in the court of appeals, but officials settled on a revised contract providing county-funded road patrol in 2007.

Despite his struggles with the county, Minzey says it was well worth the fight if it means maintaining the department's current level of deputies.

"One of my biggest issues that I will fight for in this county is to make sure that there are enough police officers to keep it safe," he said. "There are fewer police officers around the state and country than there were in 2001. I know that Ann Arbor city is down officers, but even now (the sheriff's department) is down only a few officers."

The struggle between Minzey and county officials has calmed down since the lawsuits have been resolved, but overcrowding problems at the jail persist. Minzey says Washtenaw County has the smallest per capita jail in the state and it is a constant battle to maintain proper inmate levels.

After initially refusing to enact a statute that allows jails to release non-violent inmates, which prompted one of the lawsuits, Minzey relented but says the across-the-board sentence reduction does little to help the long-term problems at the jail.

"We go through that cycle, and as soon as we get out of (overcrowding), it spikes right back again, so we go through

the statute again," he said.

After failed attempts to pass a jail expansion millage, the county now has plans for a \$22 million expansion in county-sponsored bonds that will increase the jail space by about 100 beds. Minzey says the \$22 million plan was reduced from an originally planned \$35 million plan, but he fears that even after the expansion the overcrowding will persist.

"The problem is once you increase the number of beds, you also need additional facilities like laundry and food services, which are things included in the renovation costs," Minzey said. "I think by the time this project is done, which all should be finalized soon, we will be overcrowded again. Then I guess we will move onto the next phase."

Minzey says his team has been heavily involved in the jail planning and they have been working closely with county officials.

"That's why my folks have worked really hard. I think the planning process is coming along," he said.

Name: Jerry Clayton
Residence: Ypsilanti Township

Professional experience: More than a 20-year career at the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, Clayton

worked as a corrections officer, deputy sheriff, shift sergeant and first lieutenant, retiring in 2006. He also is a former Special Weapons and Tactics team member and former executive team member of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office Administration. He is a part-time instructor at Washtenaw Community College and faculty member of the National Sheriff Association.

Overview: Living in

Ypsilanti Township and the Washtenaw County area for the past 20 years, retired Sheriff's Department employee Jerry Clayton has seen many changes in the area and in the police force. Some of those changes, he says, aren't for the better.

"I've seen the good things that the sheriff's office can do for the community. I've seen how it can positively impact people's lives in a number of different ways," he said. "Focusing on community partnerships, local impact and the things that are critical to law enforcement hasn't been the focus of the sheriff's department over the past eight years. I want to change that focus."

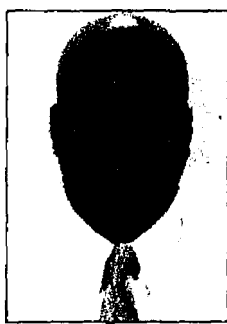
Clayton, who started as a corrections officer and then deputy sheriff until he was eventually promoted to first lieutenant, says his message is bringing back community policing and promoting the sheriff's department as a positive influence in the community at large.

He says the idea of community policing has been lost under the current sheriff, and what that comes down to is leadership.

"I think that there was a failure of leadership when the county and the townships tried to address the issue of police contracting," Clayton said. "I think that the sheriff and the sheriff's administration should have taken more of a lead in that overall process."

A lawsuit filed by the townships of Ypsilanti, Salem and Augusta over the issue of police contracting is currently in the court of appeals after several years of legal struggle. Sheriff Dan Minzey was swept into the fray after county officials threatened to lay off deputies in the three townships because of budget constraints. The suing municipalities refused to sign a multiple-year contract in which costs were undetermined for years 2008 and 2009.

Clayton says the process would have been better

Ed took over the business from another owner in July 1962. Two of the first owners sold their portions to the third, a man named William Freeman. Ed purchased the entire package from Freeman over a period of 10 years.

"I had a service station and he came to me and asked me to take over this business," he said. "It was one year old."

Ed and his wife Kathy married in 1973, and she too came in to run the business. It was that year Chelsea Lanes expanded from 12 to 18 lanes.

With the addition of new technologies like updated lane surfaces and automatic pin setters, they kept the business going through times of high and low popularity for the game, eventually becoming the only alley of its kind in the area.

When the GreenLeaves' son Eddie returned from college, he took over the business with his mother, and Ed retired.

"He's been first and a leader in a lot of things, and that's where I've tried to transcend, follow that and be like dad," Eddie said. "The game, the industry and everything, has changed so much that the struggles I now have are different."

Eddie said he deals with matters of daily operation, while his mother handles separate responsibilities such as booking parties and youth leagues. Ed said he is still very active in other ways.

"I keep very busy even though I'm not here," he said. "Anything I can do I will do. There are many things I attend every week (rather than) something in town."

Each with different jobs, they see the benefits of working with family — even Eddie's sister Heather works there part-time.

Kathy said she has worked well with both her husband

and son.

"You learn enough of what needs to be done. What one doesn't cover the other one does," she said. "You just work together. If you're married, you're married in the business."

Eddie recalled coming back to run the business because of his family, saying that even in times of adversity it made him stronger.

"The struggles are trying to balance the family that's not here, the family at home," he said.

Eddie and his wife April are parents to twins who were born prematurely, which sometimes drew him away from business.

Among other obstacles Ed was diagnosed with cancer, and later Kathy underwent surgery for appendicitis.

Even with these challenges, the GreenLeaves say they have overcome their personal battles, and it has not made their business at Chelsea Lanes any less successful.

cessful.

Eddie continues to keep up with the changing times just as his father did.

What use to be mechanical improvements to the sport of bowling, is now an effort to pump up its entertainment value.

Eddie said that bringing in live bands and comedians to perform as entertainment is necessary.

"We're trying to create different things and off-the-wall ideas," he said. "You go with those gimmicky catch ideas versus the standard game of bowling to entertain people."

A dream fulfilled by family

Six years ago, Lynda Collins' dream of running her own restaurant came

true. She had worked for the Chelsea Police Department for almost 20 years, and had been searching for a business to purchase.

After hearing about the availability of Thompson's Pizzeria through a mutual friend of the previous owner, she began negotiations which would not finish for a year.

"I like being my own boss," Collins said. "I just thought it'd be a good opportunity."

Six of her seven daughters and one son all worked for her at one point or another.

Though many of them are engaged in other professions also, others like her son Mathew, who manages the business at night, are accustomed to the food industry.

"All the girls have always

worked with restaurants," Collins' daughter Shannon Lounge said. "(Mom) started with pretty much a full staff."

Collins said there was a lot of excitement and support from her family when she announced the good news.

"I gave them each a pizza cutter for Christmas," she said. "Then I told them I bought the pizzeria."

Collins said running her

own business and serving the community was a nice, upbeat change from the police department.

"It's been wonderful," she said. "We say it's kind of like (the TV series) 'Cheers' ... we get a lot of returns. People like to be handled personally."

Besides serving pizza in her restaurant, Collins also

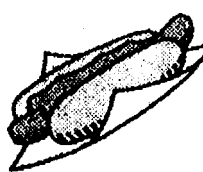

ELECTIONS 2008: Sylvan, Lyndon and Dexter townships

Candidates talk important issues

Residents of Dexter, Lima, Lyndon and Sylvan townships will find 34 candidates registered for various positions in on the ballot in the Aug. 5 primary election.

There are some interesting aspects to this election.

For example, it will be the first, last and only chance to decide who will be the Lyndon Township supervisor, because both candidates are of the same party.

Also, the entire incumbent Lima Township board is running unopposed, and Sylvan's entire board is running unopposed, although the current supervisor and two current trustees decided not to run again.

Otherwise, there is a fair amount of choice available to voters, no matter which township you live in.

As a means of introducing the incumbents and challengers to the electorate, The Chelsea Standard asked each of them to respond to these questions:

1. Biographical: age, education, family, political experience.

2. Why did you decide to run for election (or re-election)?

3. What is the single most important issue facing your township, and how do you plan to address it?

Each candidate was given the opportunity to answer either by e-mail, telephone or in writing.

Below are the responses from those who responded to our requests.

Dexter Township

Clerk:

Harley Rider, Republican: Age 59, lifelong resident of Washtenaw County, resident of the Dexter area since 1978. Vietnam veteran. Married, two grown children and two grandchildren.

Bachelor of Science from Eastern Michigan University (police administration) with some graduate work at EMU in Public Administration. Graduate of Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command.

Retired command officer with Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department. Currently second in command of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority Police Department.

Dexter Township Trustee 1992-2000, Township Clerk 2000-Present. Served on Township Planning Commission 1993-1998 and 2000-2006.

I am running for a third term as Township Clerk to continue to serve the community that I love and continue with the many improvements I have implemented to make the clerk's office more responsive to the public.

Dexter Township, like all other municipalities, faces many critical issues, but none more important to our citizens than the constantly increasing mandates from Lansing for services, with continually decreasing revenue sharing.

As the longest-serving member of the current township board, I will continue to do my best to provide the services needed by our residents within the constraints of our budget.

Trustees:

Libby Brushaber, Republican: Age 53, graduated from college with an Associate's Degree, have four grown children, Jennifer, Bill, Jason and Michelle; and have five grandkids.

I was a Dexter Township Trustee from 1996 to 2004, served on the Dexter Fire Board, Chelsea Area Fire Board, Dexter Township Planning Commission and Chelsea Area Construction Agency; currently serving on the Board of Review and as a township election official.

I enjoy serving the community and have missed it in the past four years.

Most important is repayment of the bonds for the Multi Lakes Sewer System. The township needs to do something now before it is unable to make the bond payments, which might be the building of a septage receiving facility at Multi Lakes.

Bill Gajewski, Republican: Age 63. Wife, Linda; daughter, Sherri, age 26, resident of Dexter Township for 33 years.

Registered Pharmacist with BS in Pharmacy from Ferris State University. Also an Associate of Science degree from Schoolcraft College.

I hold professional licenses in construction and real estate, and have been very involved in township government, especially with the Planning Commission, for the past 16 years. I am currently the vice-chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals and have served on the ZBA for several years, past chairman of the Friends of Stinchfield Woods.

In these difficult times of depressed home values, we need leaders who will preserve and significantly enhance the quality of life and the value of our community while still being fiscally responsible.

I decided to run because, depending on the direction we take, we can either enhance or further destroy home property values.

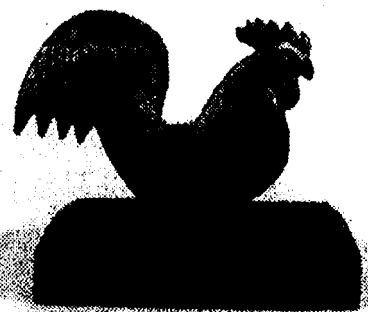





County Democrat endorses Republican commissioner

County Commissioner Mark Ouimet, District 1, received a surprise honor earlier this month – the support of prominent county Democrat Jean King.

King is a member of the Western Washtenaw County Democratic Party.

She is also a Scio Township Board Trustee and was formerly chairperson of the county democrats in 1992 for a two-year term.

She made the endorsement of Ouimet, a Republican, at a recent gathering of the WWD at the historic Chelsea Depot.

"I have been in politics for many decades and Ouimet is the most responsible public servant I have

had a chance to observe," she said.

Ouimet's two-year term expires this year. He is running against Democratic challenger Eric Borregard, of Dexter.

He was elected in 2004 after Chelsea Republican Joseph Yekulis vacated the seat to unsuccessfully run against Pam Byrnes for the 52nd District state House seat.

His grandfather was also a Washtenaw County commissioner in the 1930s and Ouimet himself is a fourth generation county resident.

King says that of the five commissioners that represent Scio Township, which is divided between districts 1, 2, 3, 9 and 10, Ouimet is by far the most visible.

"Three of (the commissioners) I have never seen at our meetings and Ken Schwartz (District 2) has only been there once," she said. "We have in the three-and-a-half years I have been on the board had several

hearings and protest meetings in which our board room was packed with people, and so far as I can recall Ouimet was always there observing and listening."

Generally he is usually at meetings listening to township issues and filling township officials and meeting attendees in on county happenings, in kind.

One instance in which Ouimet was available to the township and its citizens was for a comment period to discuss how the commissioners had saved the county money through the county's pension system, according to King, who also said that was the time she saw Schwartz visit the township.

"The county before (they) went to work on it had two pension systems – one which ended for employees who retired after 1985 ... at least employees who retired after 1985, and the second one instituted from 1985 on."

They worked to combine the two pension boards,

which nobody else had thought to do in 22 years, according to King.

Ultimately the county board adopted their recommendation. King said that she was impressed by the effort, which was a bipartisan one. Schwartz is a democrat.

Pension savings for the first year are projected at \$5 million and could go as high as \$12 million over the short term, according to Ouimet. He said the savings over the entire 20 process will be "substantial."

Upon reflection on how the endorsement was delivered at the WWD's meeting, Ouimet said he was floored and flattered.

"She got up at the meeting with all of the Democrats in the room and strongly endorsed me," he said. "I was sitting in the back of the

room and someone commented on me at the meeting, about me being 'absolutely everywhere.' Everybody kind of laughed and then Jean got up.

"To have a former chair of the Democratic Party come out and endorse me is pretty strong."

Ouimet says there's no real secret to what he does, stating that you just have to be available and listen to constituents.

"I've always focused on what the constituents I represent need, for example the East Delhi Bridge ... I worked very hard to get the preservation of that bridge."

Ouimet also said that another key position he has taken is maintaining the sovereignty of governmental units.

"When there's a discussion of annexation, I've

always felt that it's up to the individual governmental units to come up with the agreement," Ouimet said. "If one unit doesn't want to relinquish jurisdiction over an area they shouldn't be made to."

He has been on the record as maintaining this position, particularly during the Sloan-Kingsley proposed 575-unit development on Baker Road, in which Dexter Village and Scio Township could not find enough common ground on a 425 agreement, after the annexation request was sent to the county board.

Ultimately the village council decided to rescind the annexation petition from the state and the development hasn't been publicly heard of since.

Chelsea Cooperative introduces new programs

Chelsea Children's Cooperative Preschool is introducing two new programs, a Young 5's program and a 2's program, for the 2008-2009 school year. For the first time in its 36 year history, the Co-op will be able to offer classes for 2 year olds, 3 year olds, 4 year olds and Kindergarten age 5 year olds. The Co-op is able to expand its offerings this year because of the willingness of The Chelsea Center for the Arts to lease the Co-op an additional room.

As an organization run by parent volunteers, the Co-op has historically employed only one or two paid staff members. The Co-op will boast a record high number of four staff members this year. Courtney Aldrich, director and teacher of 3's and 4's, Deb Hubbard, teacher's aide, Janie Brooks, 2's teacher, and Michelle Hochrein, young 5's teacher.

The Young 5's program will run three hours a day, four mornings a week, with an optional art/music enrichment class offered through the CCA. The Young 5's is a preschool program designed to meet the educational and developmental needs of children who meet the age cutoff for Kindergarten (5 years old by December 1st of the school year), but whose parents have chosen not to send them to Kindergarten. The program bridges the gap between 4 year old preschool and Kindergarten.

The Young 5's will be limited to 12 families, allowing for more one-on-one interaction between the teacher and the students.

The second program now being offered this fall is a 2 year old Parent and Child program. The class will be a 1 1/2 hour session led by Brooks, a retired Chelsea Co-op teacher and director. This class will be offered on Thursday evenings and Friday mornings. The 2 year old program will provide families with a parent-child activity for the child who is not quite old enough to attend traditional preschool. It will also give parents a means to connect with other parents as

well as provide some "pre-school experience" to both parent and child so that the transition to 3 year old preschool will be seamless.

The Co-op is currently enrolling for all of its pro-

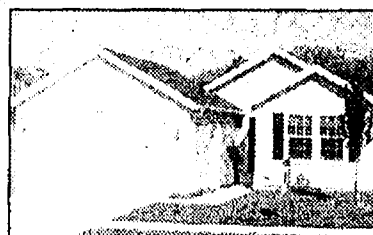

more than two dozen albums and has performed upward of 8,000 concerts since bursting onto the music scene in the 1960s. Author James A. Mitchell has collected an impressive array of anecdotes from Ryder's extraordinary life in music, including Ryder's stories of his first gigs in Greenwich Village clubs, jamming with Jimi Hendrix, and attending private parties thrown by the Beatles.

Mitchell also chronicles Ryder's more recent career, as he struggled to regain his popularity among American audiences after the 1970s and returned home to the Detroit music scene in the 1980s. Copies of Ryder's book are available at Cranesbill Books in Chelsea. Patrons

A declining economy

Jason Povlich was 19 when he started his own collectable toy business. Within four years he had expanded it into a \$500,000-per-year production.

However, after his success began to fluctuate, he said he grew tired of self-employment and decided to seek income elsewhere.

"A buddy of mine was opening a Jet's Pizza, so I gave him a call, sat with him and was hired as an assistant manager," Jason said.

After three years he climbed the promotion ladder to become an area manager. He ran stores in Allen Park, Lincoln Park and Taylor.

Jason's father Joe had worked in a factory for more than 30 years yet lost his job at the age of 56. He feared for his father's financial security in retirement, and proposed they become partners to open up their own Jet's Pizza franchise.

"He was hesitant at first," Jason said. "But when he started working with Jet's, he saw how busy it was. Jet's is like a religion."

The duo took the idea to "corporate," and after about six months of talking, Jason left his position downriver to open a new Jet's location with his dad.

"I was literally out of work for a year and went through all my savings to get this place running," he said. "It's pretty amazing that we had a family that was struggling in this economy to get work."

After also looking at stores in Dexter, Adrian and Tecumseh, Jason said working in Chelsea was a "no-brainer" because of the traffic flow and the number of surrounding communities they could serve.

Jason works with his father and many family members at the establishment and have tasted success through their 14 months of business.

"We've hit numbers that I didn't hit in Allen Park for three years," he said.

While David Povlich is a full-time delivery driver, his daughter Julia Zaddack works three days a week.

She also studies nursing Henry Ford Community College.

"It's more important for me to work here," Julia said. "It makes you care about the restaurant more when it's family."

Joe Zaddack, Julia's husband, is the general manager of the Chelsea Jet's Pizza, and he agrees with his wife regarding family.

"It's just like you're at home," Joe said. "If there's a disagreement, it can be worked out."

Though there was a time of financial sacrifice, Jason said their booming business has given them a vision of opening another store.

"My ultimate goal is that my dad will be able to retire and have an income coming out of the store as (the business) continues to grow," he said.

A hobby with an income

Phil and Jen Tolliver had always enjoyed making jerky at home. The hobby even spread to their three children, with an imaginary jerky stand becoming a part of their playtime.

Their kids' excitement only grew when Phil left his previous business, Turf and

Timber, to purchase Backwoods Beef Jerky right next door in the Oak Tree Plaza on Old US-12, near the Fletcher Road/I-94 interchange.

"I love making jerky. I did it at home for 10 years," Phil said. "This was a really natural transition. My wife and I are 'foodies.' We love to cook, that's what we do for fun together."

From homestyle to habanero, the Tollivers have about 24 jerky recipes. Jen said they have expanded their menu into sausages and sauces as well, among other things.

Many people from the community and travelers straight of the freeway repeatedly return to the store, where the Tolliver youngsters are frequently seen with their parents.

"Not only do we love what we do, but we can all be together," Jen said. "We haven't stopped smiling."

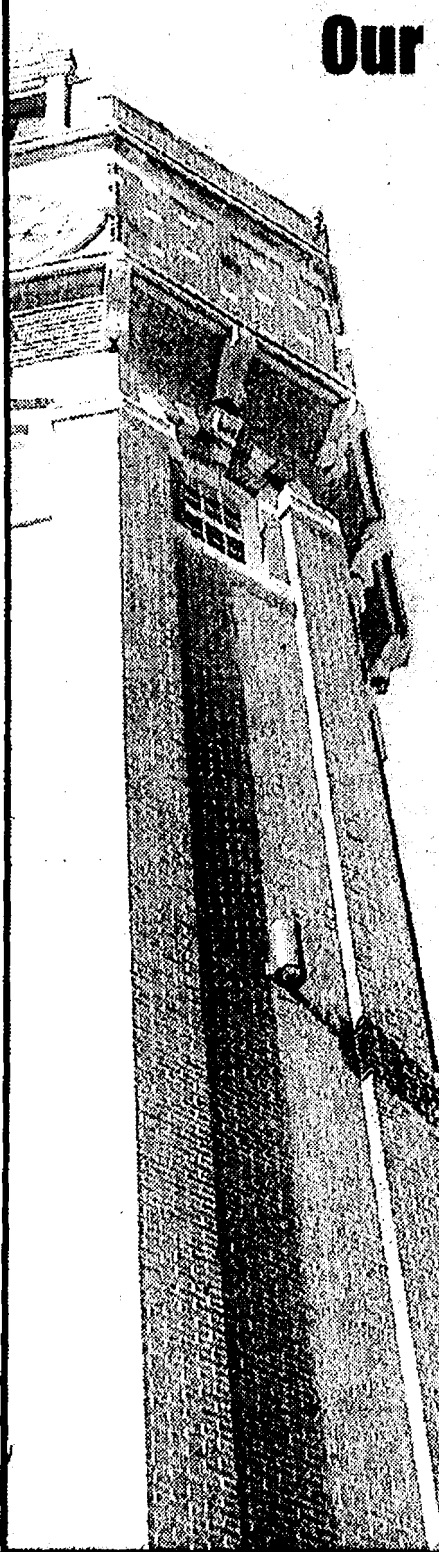

Answer B. William P. Schenk's first business was a general store in Sylvan Center. In 1877 he worked at H. S. Holmes' store (Vogel's & Foster's) and in 1885 went into partnership with George Kempf. By 1889 he was sole proprietor and in 1893 built the building now housing the Common Grill. Schenk sold merchandise ranging from groceries, clothing and carpets for 50 years. He served positions on the Village Council, Board of Education and Chelsea State Bank board. He was the village's first automobile dealer selling from what is now the location of the Purple Rose Theater building. The Schenk family farm was located just west of St. Louis School on Old US-12. The family credited bountiful wheat harvests for its financial prosperity.

Three Democrats run for drain commissioner

Barring a successful write-in campaign, the race for Washtenaw County drain commissioner will be decided during the Aug. 5 primary, when three Democrats, incumbent Janis Bobrin and opponents Richard Deitering and Douglas Egeler, face off on the local ballot.

If elected, each of the candidates has plans for a slightly different approach as drain commissioner, but all of them can agree that environmental protection is an important priority for Washtenaw County.

Name: Janis Bobrin (incumbent)
Occupation: Washtenaw County drain commissioner
Residence: Ann Arbor

Q: Why are you running for Washtenaw County Drain Commissioner?

A: I have served as county drain commissioner since 1989. I have established an office that is recognized as a leader, both in construction, operation and maintenance of county drains and storm water systems, and in protection and restoration of our vital water resources.

My 19 years as Washtenaw County drain commissioner have been the most gratifying of my career because I believe my work has made a real and lasting positive contribution to our quality of life.

By working in partnership with local governments, watershed councils, businesses, citizen groups and individuals, we are making real progress in protecting and restoring our critical water resources. But there is much more work to be done.

Mackie runs unopposed for County prosecutor

With just one name on the Aug. 5 ballot for Washtenaw County prosecutor, Brian Mackie doesn't have much to worry about.

Mackie has been county prosecutor since 1993 and, barring a successful write-in campaign, the Ann Arbor native said he has some new plans for his long-held post.

Mackie said crime-prevention efforts, including Head Start and after-school programs throughout Washtenaw County, would continue to be one of his most important priorities.

In the upcoming year, Mackie said he also hoped to focus on financial and physical elder abuse issues, as well as more sophisticated criminal activity, including identity theft and other Internet-related crimes.

A longtime resident of Washtenaw County, Mackie earned a bachelor's degree in history and political science from Eastern Michigan University and added a degree in law from Wayne

State University.

After graduation, he took his first job at a free legal-aid clinic in Detroit and eventually went on to open his own practice, where he specialized in criminal defense law.

Mackie returned to the public sector in 1978 as an assistant prosecutor for Washtenaw County and has remained in the office ever since.

He lives with in northeast Ann Arbor and is the father of two children and two stepchildren. His wife runs a local nonprofit organization that is targeted toward adolescent education programs and adult eviction prevention, an interest that Mackie said helped bring the couple together.

A commitment to the Washtenaw County community has been an important priority for Mackie and his family over the years and, as prosecutor, he said those efforts would continue well into his next term.

"It's all about helping the least powerful people in the community," Mackie said.

facilitated if Minzey and his administration would have taken a more collaborative role.

"(The sheriff's office) has been asking how can we work through this process and deliver a solution that is best for all county residents?" Clayton said. "They had to go through litigation and that is not in the best interest in sheriff's office or the community."

If elected, Clayton said that he would immediately start the process rebuilding relationships around the county and with residents with an emphasis on neighborhood organizations and faith-based groups.

"I think successful law enforcement is predicated on having a mutual respect between the officers and the community members," Clayton said.

"Right now, I believe we have a lot of fractured relationships and I think that is counter-productive to properly serving the residents of Washtenaw County. There needs to be that willingness to sit down and talk, and I have to question whether those residents are being fully served by the sheriff's office."

Editor's Note: Democratic candidate Iva Jo Bielec could not be reached for this article despite repeated attempts and the reporter chose not to interview Taylor since he doesn't face opposition in the primary.

Historic judge prepares for fourth term

Washtenaw County Probate Judge Nancy Francis is nearing the end of her 6-year term.

It is the third term served by the county's first African-American judiciary member and she is unopposed, so the expiration of her term in

January 2009 will not be the end of her tenure.

Francis hasn't been opposed since coming to the bench, which she says is very gratifying, but she has always understood the nature of judicial elections and speaks about them freely.

"I've been told that you would have to commit a criminal act or be a real embarrassment to the county to be taken on," she said. "If you have 'incumbent' next to your name you're usually unopposed."

She says that most people aren't familiar with the good judicial candidates at the ballot box without doing some analysis.

"They vote because they know you, have heard of you

or you have incumbent next to your name."

But she welcomes voters to borrow some of her pointers. She also says she likes to think that she embodies the qualities that she would look for in judicial candidates

from a voter's perspective.

"I think (a candidate) needs to be able to listen and you need to see how deeply they think about things when they are asked a question," Francis said. "That person needs to answer thoughtfully and not just give a routine answer or steer into some political embellishment. They need to recite knowledge of the law."

She also recommends looking into a candidate's past record and seeing what kind of work they've done and decisions they have made, as judges serve in their roles much longer than many other elected officials.

"To the extent that we can assess it, honesty is very important," Francis said. "The ability to treat people fairly and knowledge of what kind of resources there are in the community that you can steer people towards are also important."

"I care about people - I care that when they leave my courtroom that they've been dealt with fairly, that I've listened to them and have tried to come up with the best solution while following the requirements of the law."

Francis previously practiced law for 17 years, at the end of which she ran for a position on the Washtenaw

County Circuit Court bench.

She was unsuccessful in her bid for that position, but was appointed by former Michigan Governor James Blanchard to the bench, after the juvenile court judge resigned in 1990.

She served as judge in the juvenile court for 12 years, before the county courts

were reorganized. Juvenile proceedings were placed within the jurisdiction of the circuit court, where referees currently handle them.

From there Francis was moved to the probate bench, where she handles divorce and custody proceedings, adoptions, conservatorship and settlement of estates,

wills and mental health determinations.

She is one of two probate court judges, alongside Washtenaw County Probate Judge Darlene O'Brien. Francis handles the personal protection orders (PPO's) and judgment cases, so her case volume is more than

Q: Why are you running for Washtenaw County drain commissioner?



Deitering

A: "A number of reasons. I think that the drain commission's funds could be better used to get more

done for the money.

We have drains in this county that haven't been touched in more than 100 years. With that arises other health issues dealing with stagnant water and more mosquitoes, which increases equine encephalitis as well as the West Nile virus. We need to do more to eliminate mosquito issues for the health and welfare of the county.

I also feel that there could be much better communication and work between municipalities and the drain commission to get more done.

Additionally, I would like to be much more aggressive in the Adopt-A-Stream program, in which we could offer better tax incentives for people to get involved and lower the cost of maintaining the drains.

Q: What are your objectives if elected?

A: One of my main priorities would be to get the drains flowing better. I would also like to develop tougher standards for development, which would require either more stringent guidelines for development or have independent

drain studies done when any major development goes in.

That's not an attempt to divert new development in the county, but more to make sure that are drains and streams can keep up.

Q: Why do you think you would be an effective drain commissioner?

A: Augusta Township has by far the most drain dis-

tricts of any township in the county and, as a township supervisor, I had to get quite involved with the drain commission. I have an understanding of the law and as a water distribution operator, I have a comprehensive understanding of hydraulics. By combining the two I think I can get our drains flowing more effectively.

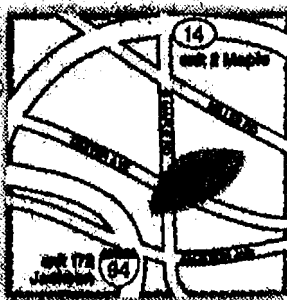

Washtenaw County clerk, treasurer run unopposed

The Washtenaw County clerk and treasurer incumbents are running uncontested in the 2008 general election.

Catherine McClary is seeking her fourth four-year term as county treasurer, while Larry Kestenbaum is looking for a second term. Barring a successful write-in campaign both will return to office.

First elected in 1996, McClary came to the office of county treasurer after

serving 14 years on the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners.

During that time, she worked as a stockbroker and investment banker. She holds a degree from the University of Michigan and is a certified public finance officer.

As Treasurer of Washtenaw County, McClary is a constitutional officer for the county and has statutory authority to protect public funds and collect delinquent taxes. She manages

the investment of \$200 million, collects \$28 million in delinquent property taxes, issues delinquent tax notes, and receipts, and reconciles an annual cash flow of half a billion dollars.

McClary is a member of various professional organizations and has received several awards for her community activities. She grew up in Washtenaw County having lived in Augusta, Ypsilanti and Webster townships. She currently resides in the city of Ann

Arbor with her husband and two children.

Last year, she was awarded a 2007 Achievement Award from the National Association of Counties for her Property Tax Foreclosure Prevention Program.

Leading up to his first bid for county clerk, Kestenbaum participated in nearly every aspect of the election process, serving as an election inspector, poll challenger, director of voter registration drives and as an attorney in recounts.

An attorney, Kestenbaum is a member of the Sierra Club, the American Civil Liberties Union and the Pittsfield Union Grange.

As a side interest, Kestenbaum is the creator of politicalgraveyard.com, a popular Web site on U.S. political history.

Married and with a 6-year-old daughter, Kestenbaum lives in Ann Arbor, where they are active members of Temple Beth Emeth.

Over the course of his next term, Kestenbaum said

he would lead the effort to automate court records.

"Automation of court records is something that's long overdue," he said, adding that he also plans to continue making progress in improving the system of calling juries.

"Locally, we've made progress," he said, "but every county is struggling with (jury selection) and I'd like to see it solved statewide."

half of what the county's probate court handles.

Her advice to those who find themselves in probate court is given with custody and divorce proceedings in mind.

"It's very important to be respectful of the opposing party and not try to speak over them or degrade them," Francis says. "Try to see their point of view."

She also recommends identifying points that one could compromise on early in order to achieve a "balance" between the interests of both parties.

"One thing that we frequently don't see here in cases involving children are parents who are thinking beyond themselves," Francis said. "We don't see people who are thinking about their children and how things are going to work out for them."

The worst situation that she sees in her court room is what two good parents get embroiled in a battle over

time with the children.

"I'm seeing more cases coming to the court where people just say they are going to have shared time, because they realize that neither of them can have full time anymore," Francis said, pointing to a growing trend of parents understanding the reality of the situation - that if you are no longer going to be together, both parents care about the children, and the children want time with both parents that no one parent can have all of the time that they want.

Francis says that she is still expecting to see 3,500 cases by year's end, which has held steady despite the declining population of Michigan.

Another trend that she sees - this one actually changing - is the use of PPO's, which she said were originally created to protect woman in domestic violence situations.

"A number of people are bringing claims against others (who don't share traditional criteria)," Francis said. "Just this morning I heard a case of two neigh-

bors bringing (PPO's) against each other."

She says that most of the time PPO's are an effective way to stop a situation from getting worse and protecting victims from escalated or continued offenses.

One of the cases that still makes her think about it at night involves the murder of a woman who had sought a PPO against her murder prior to the killing.

"I recognized a name from my docket and looked through my PPO list, because the worst thing you can imagine is someone getting murdered who has been on your docket," she said. "I had ordered a PPO for this woman, but she never served it on this man, and I often wonder if it had made a difference."

"It would have been interesting had she served it. Would he have stayed away? I did everything I could, but I often wonder what could have been."

Francis says the job is difficult and funding for court services are scant, but she tries to "make decisions that help people."

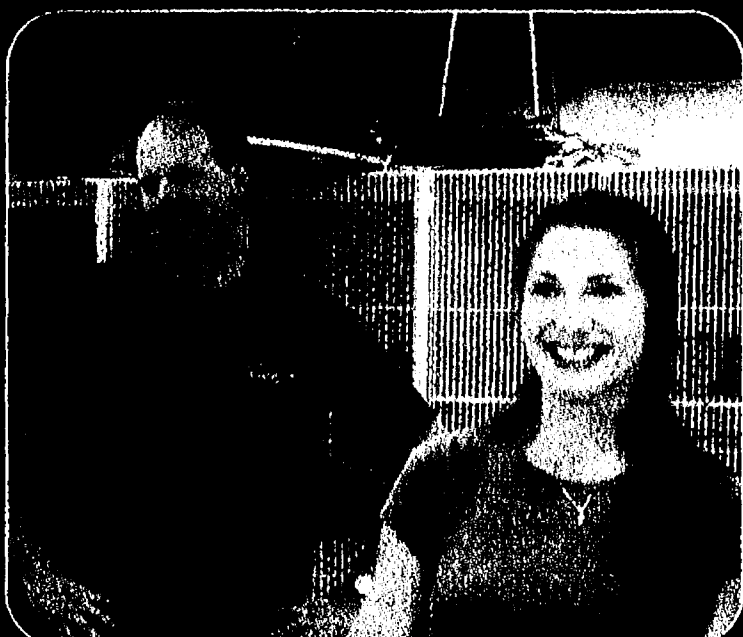

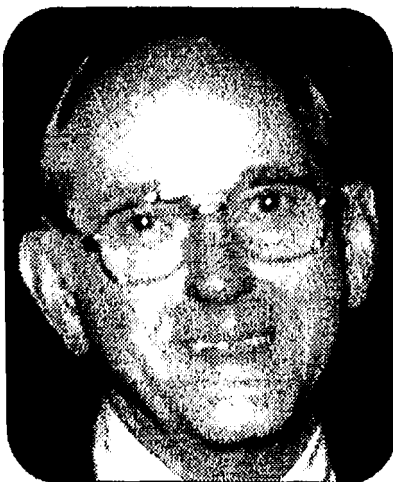
Gertrude A. Pototzki of Chelsea passed away on Friday, July 11, 2008 in her home surrounded by family and friends. She was 90.

Michigan Farm Bureau supports water legislation

The Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB) is applauding Gov. Jennifer Granholm's signing last week of new water use legislation, calling the package of bills a historic agreement that ensures Michigan's abundant water resources will be used efficiently to balance the state's economic, social and environmental demands.

"Michigan farmers rely on water to produce food. As such, this legislative package accomplishes two things that are critical to the continuation and growth of agriculture in this state. One, it protects the Great Lakes from diversion by ratifying the Great Lakes Compact into Michigan law. Secondly, it implements a water management system that includes the adoption of a first-of-its-kind water use assessment tool that will help water users to understand if a new use will adversely impact the environment," said MFB President Wayne H. Wood.

The legislation signed is a compromise package reached between the House and Senate. Pre-agreement, MFB had supported the Senate's water package and opposed the House version, but the compromise legislation fulfills a majority of MFB member-developed policy regarding water use.

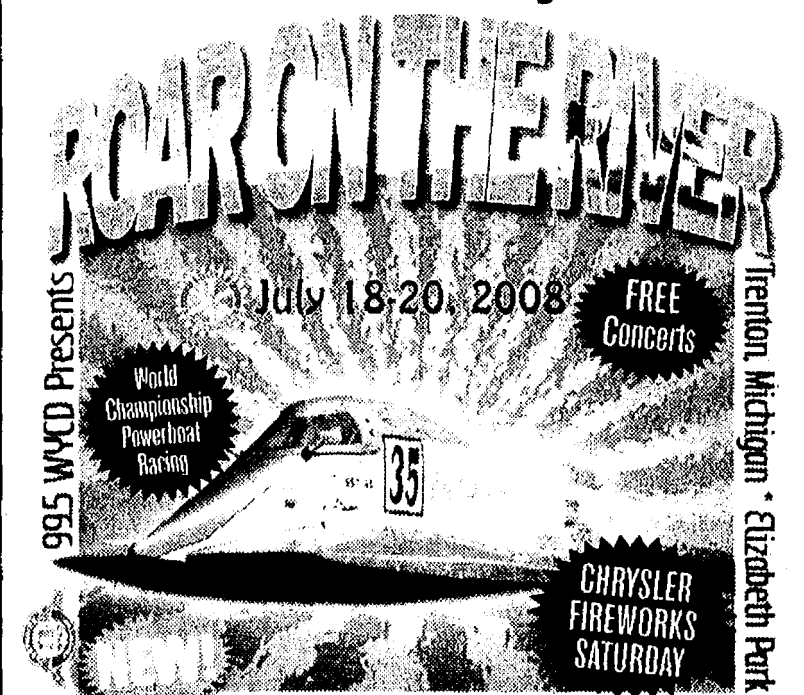

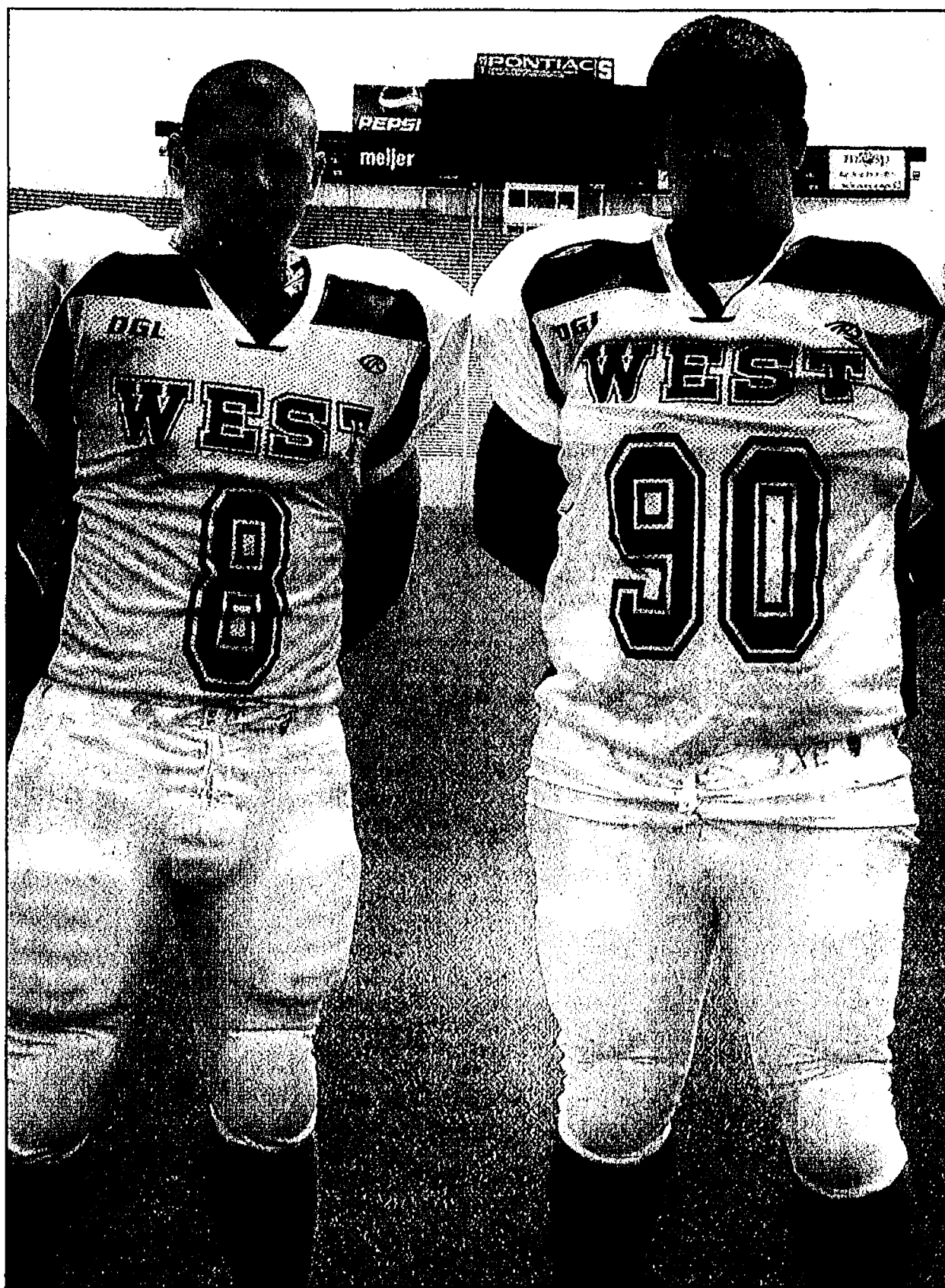

Marsh said he didn't even know about the game until he was a sophomore.

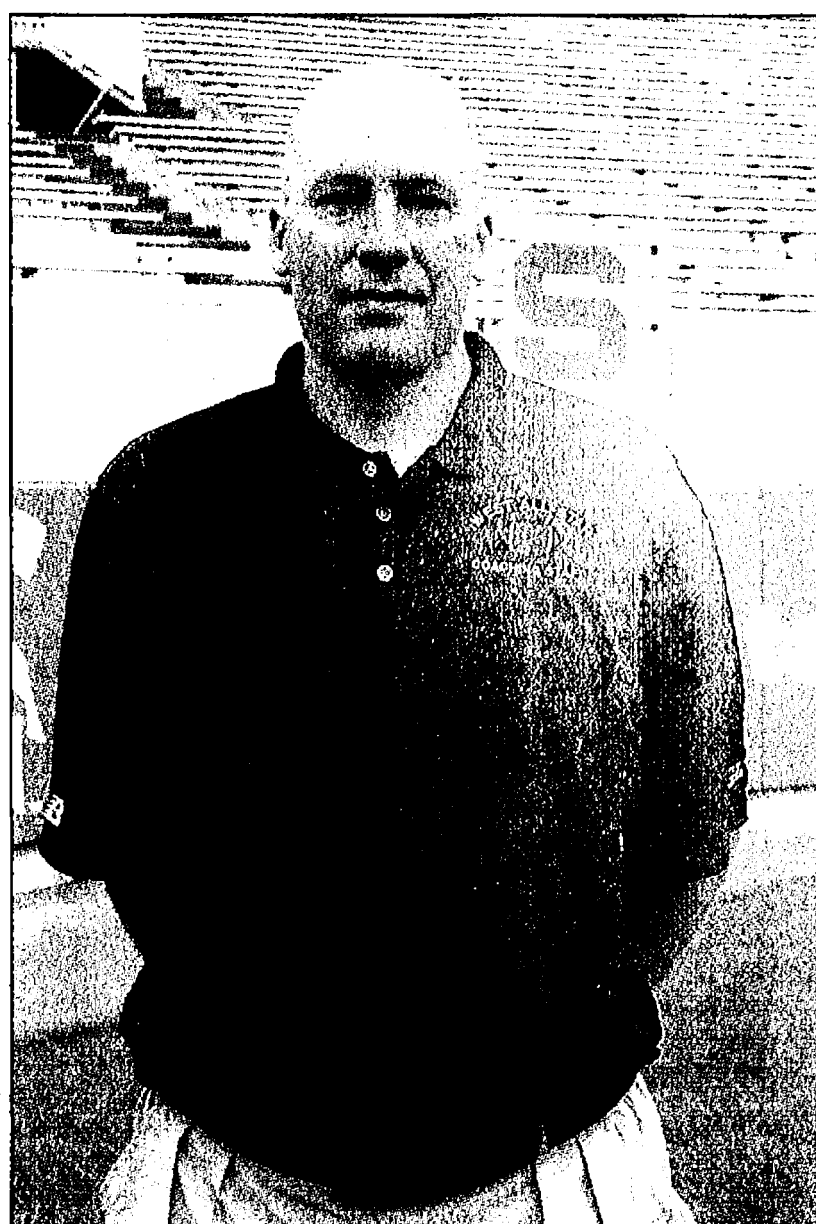

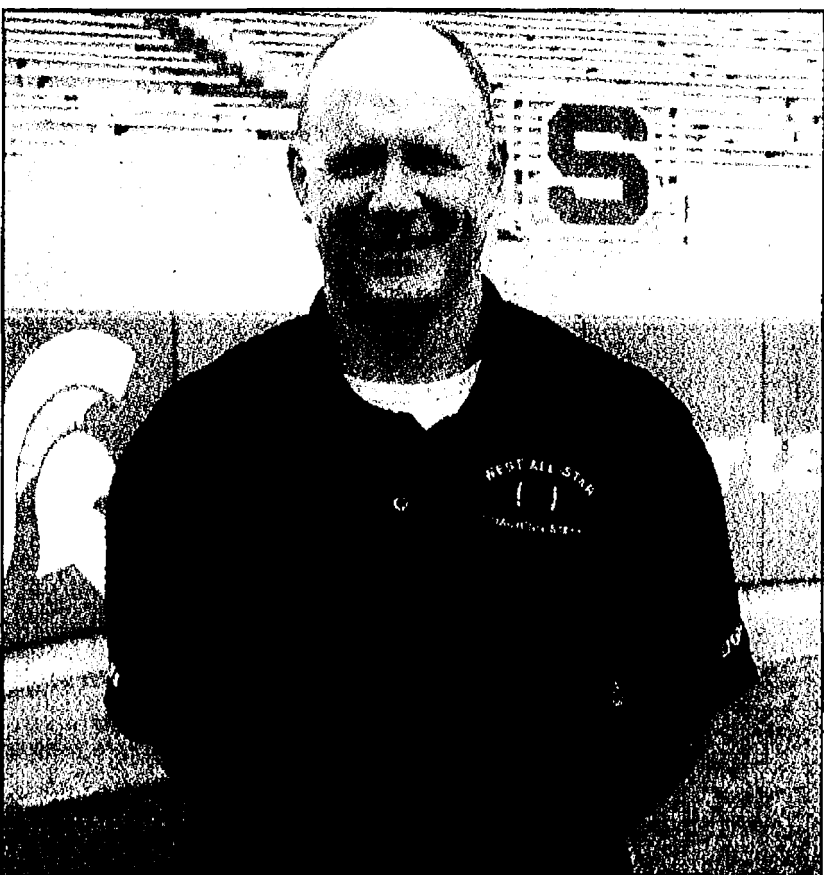
All three players have been thorns in Fanning's side over the years as opponents of Chelsea.

West's 9-7 win.

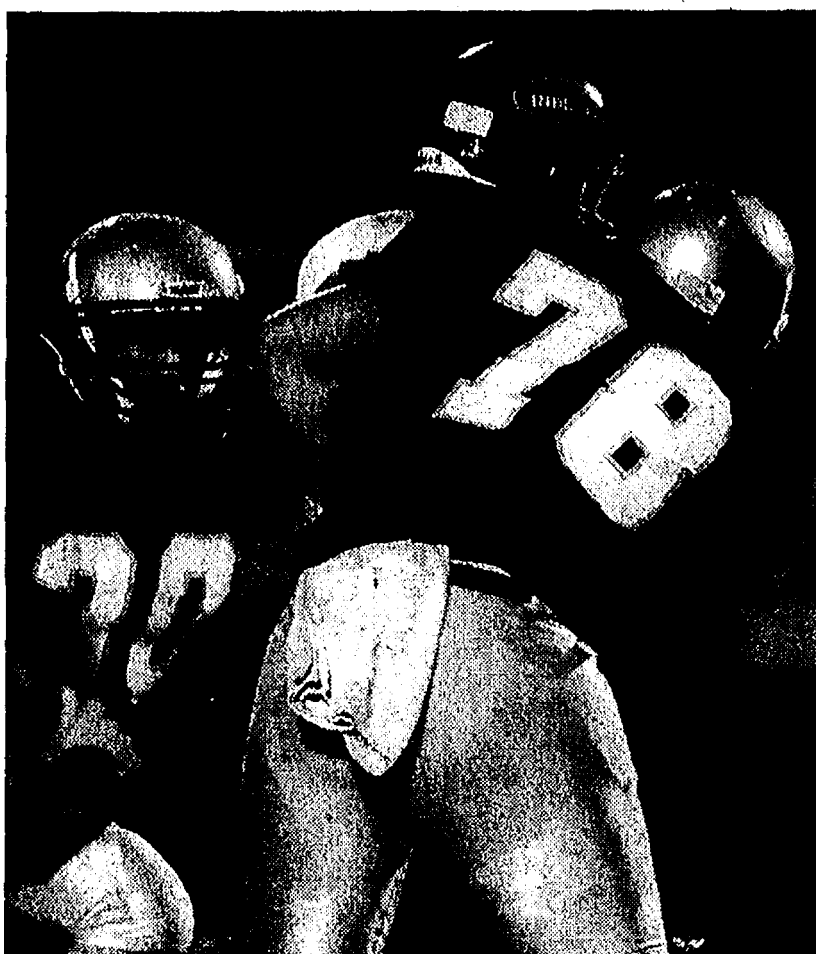

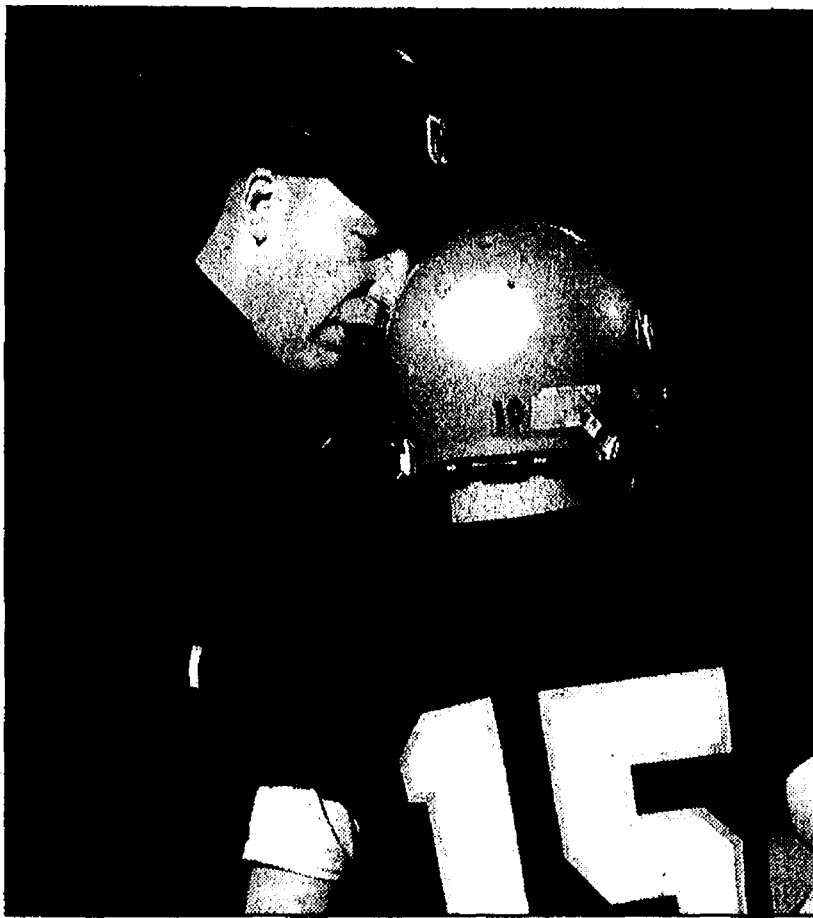

Dexter doctors test weight loss 'cures'

Whether you need to lose just a few pounds or a significant amount of body fat, it can be hard to find the path to thinness.

We know that obesity rates have been growing steadily in the United States for years, but no one really knows why. Obviously lack of exercise and poor diet play a role, but we can't seem to point to one cause for the rapid increase in overweight and obese people in this country.

Without a clear cause, many people are willing to do almost anything to lose weight - fad diets, weight loss drugs, herbal supplements, even surgery.

Do these methods work? The following treatments have been touted as weight loss "cures," so let's look at how they have stacked up in clinical studies over the past 10 years.

Prozac (anti-depressant prescription drug): initial weight loss, but you gain more weight in the long-term.

Phentermine (prescription appetite suppressant marketed under many brand names): Five pounds lost over placebo, but it raises blood pressure and can cause insomnia.

Silbutramine (prescription drug Meridia): Ten to 16 pounds lost over placebo, but it raises blood pressure.

Orlistat (over-the-counter drug Alli or prescription drug Xenical): Loss of five to six pounds, but causes upset stomach.

Bupropion (anti-depressant known as Wellbutrin or Zyban): Ten pounds lost at six months, but can raise blood pressure and increased risk of suicide.

Rimonabant (new prescription appetite suppressant): Ten pounds lost more than placebo, but increased suicide risk.

Overall, these treatments average a modest loss of eight to ten pounds. But remember, even small amounts of weight loss contribute to lower blood sugar and blood pressure, and bet-

ter health.

Surgical treatments also get a lot of attention as a "quick fix" for weight loss. Although liposuction is desirable (though expensive and risky) for many people who want to get rid of excess fat in targeted areas such as the abdomen or thighs, liposuction does not reduce blood pressure and cholesterol, and does not improve other health parameters.

Gastric bypass and other weight-loss surgeries are becoming an increasingly attractive option for those who are very overweight and suffering negative health effects. Talk with your doctor about options if you fall into this category.

Changing your diet and activity level is a proven way to lose weight, and best of all, improve your overall health.

Educating kids and their parents about the importance of wearing a helmet when riding a bike, and buckling up and riding in the back seat of the car, could help to cut down the more than 30 million injury-related emergency room visits that occur each year in the United States.

And one of the best places to teach families about injury prevention is in pediatric trauma centers and emergency departments, say researchers at the University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's Hospital.

Their study shows that screenings and brief interventions for at-risk kids admitted to pediatric trauma centers and their parents provides them with the information needed to help curb risky behavior and even prevent future injury.

In fact, 97 percent of families

involved in the study were able several months after their intervention to recall information about how seat belts save lives, and the importance of placing kids in the back seat of a car and having them wear bicycle helmets.

"We know that children who are admitted to a trauma center for treatment of an injury tend to be more likely to engage in high-risk behavior," says study lead author Peter F. Ehrlich, M.D., M.H.S., director of the Pediatric Trauma Center at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital. "So when we have them in our care, it provides us with an opportunity, or a 'teachable moment,' to provide an intervention to counter risky behavior that could

result in injury."

These "teachable moments," Ehrlich says, can be used for any risk-taking behavior, and do not necessarily have to be focused on the condition that brought the child in for medical treatment.

Ehrlich and his colleagues studied the effectiveness of such screenings and interventions for bicycle and car safety risk-related behavior at two level one pediatric trauma centers: C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and West Virginia University Children's Hospital. Both hospitals have several hundred patients, ages 7 to 17, admitted each year to their pediatric trauma services. At U-M, 7,000 children are seen in the emergency department each year for injuries.

As part of the study, children were

Now is the time to declare financial Independence Day

As we recently celebrated the 4th of July, you may want to take this opportunity to think about another celebration of liberty - your own "Financial Independence Day."

However, unlike the 4th of July, Financial Independence Day won't just show up on the calendar - you have to work to make it happen.

Here are a few suggestions for doing just that:

Liberate yourself from debt. You don't have to be a free spender to rack up a lot of debt - the cost of living is high, and sometimes you need to use loans and credit. But the more money you owe, the harder it is to

achieve financial independence, so try to reduce, consolidate or eliminate as many debts as possible. You may have to drive that old car one year longer or postpone that vacation until you can pay for it up front, but these and similar moves may pay off down the road.

Emancipate your investments. To achieve your long-term financial goals, you need your investments to provide you with the combination of growth potential and income that's appropriate for your individual needs.

To accomplish this, though, these investments need to be "free" from being raided constantly to pay for the costs of everyday life. That's why you

should establish an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses. By keeping this fund in a liquid account, you won't have to tap into your investments the next time you have a major car repair, need a new appliance or face an unexpected medical bill.

Unchain the potential of your retirement accounts. Every time you get a raise, boost your contributions to your retirement plan at work - i.e., your 401(k), 403(b) or 457(b). Your money has the potential to grow on a tax-deferred basis, and you typically contribute pre-tax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your annual adjusted gross income will be. But if

you're not contributing the maximum allowed, or at least as much as you can afford, you're putting "shackles" on the ability of these plans to help you attain the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

Free your family from threats to your income. Without your income, would your family be able to pay off the mortgage? Or send your children to college? Or meet any of the financial goals you've set? Financial

independence will always be elusive unless you protect your family from the potential loss of your income - and that's why you need adequate life insurance, especially in the years when your children are young and you're still paying on your house. At the same time, you may need disability insurance to replace your income if you can't work due to illness or injury. Your employer may offer a disability policy, but

it might be insufficient to meet your needs, so you may need to add extra coverage.

By taking these and other steps, you can go a long way toward turning Financial Independence Day from a goal to a reality - so take action soon.

screened based on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommendations for bicycle and car safety. Those who revealed that they do not always wear a bike helmet or a seat belt - or, if under age 12, do not always sit in the back seat of the car - received a brief intervention. Not always wearing a bike helmet was the most commonly reported risk-taking behavior.

Interventions were led by a trained therapist at each hospital, and occurred after the patient had received medical treatment. The interventions included separate conversations with the patient and his parent/guardian about car and bicycle safety practices, adverse consequences of continued risk-taking behavior, and recommendations to improve their adherence to car and bike safety regulations. The families were also provided with written materials.

After three months, the families that took part in the interventions were contacted for follow-up interviews. Those interviews revealed:

- 79 percent of the families found the information provided during the intervention to be helpful.

- 53 percent reported that they learned something from the intervention.

- 75 percent felt the trauma center or emergency department was a good place to learn more about car and bicycle safety.

- While all parents reported having prior knowledge about the importance of seat belts and bike helmets, 100 percent of the families with children younger than 12 had not been educated about the importance of having children in this age group sit in the back seat of a car.

- 24 percent of children who had a positive screen-

ing test and underwent the intervention had changed their behavior (e.g. they were now using a bike helmet). This finding in particular, Ehrlich says, is very

promising: For every 10-percent increase in helmet use, there could be an approximately 9 percent to 11 percent reduction in head and facial/scalp injuries.

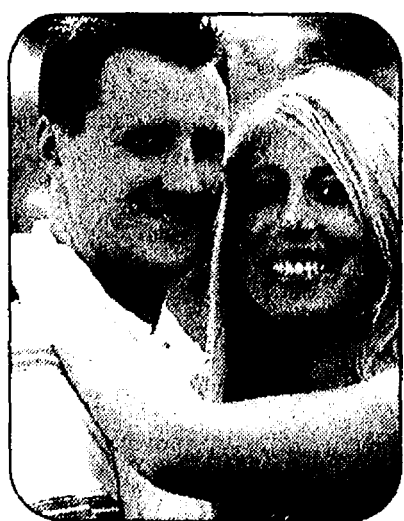

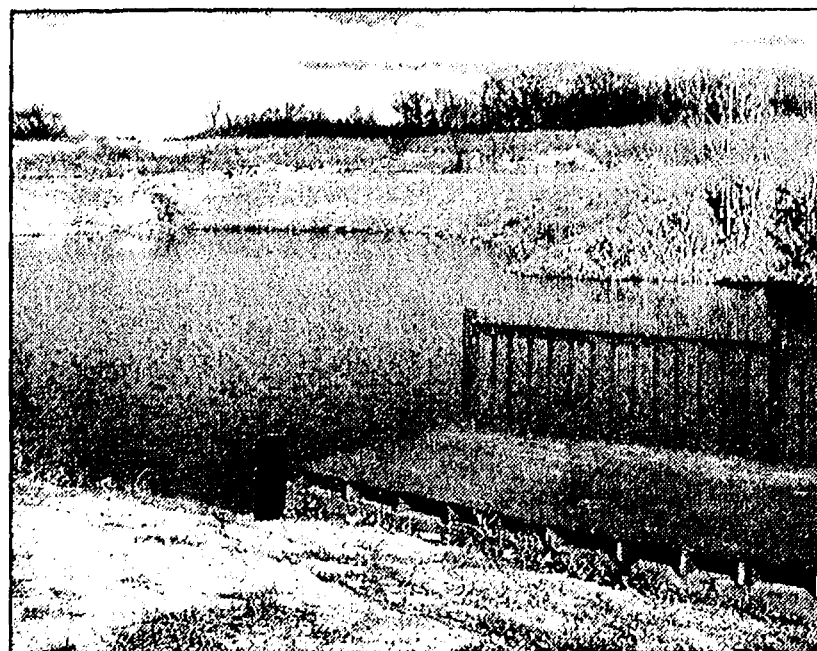

designed to help students discover their full vocal and physical potential. Cost for the class is \$300.

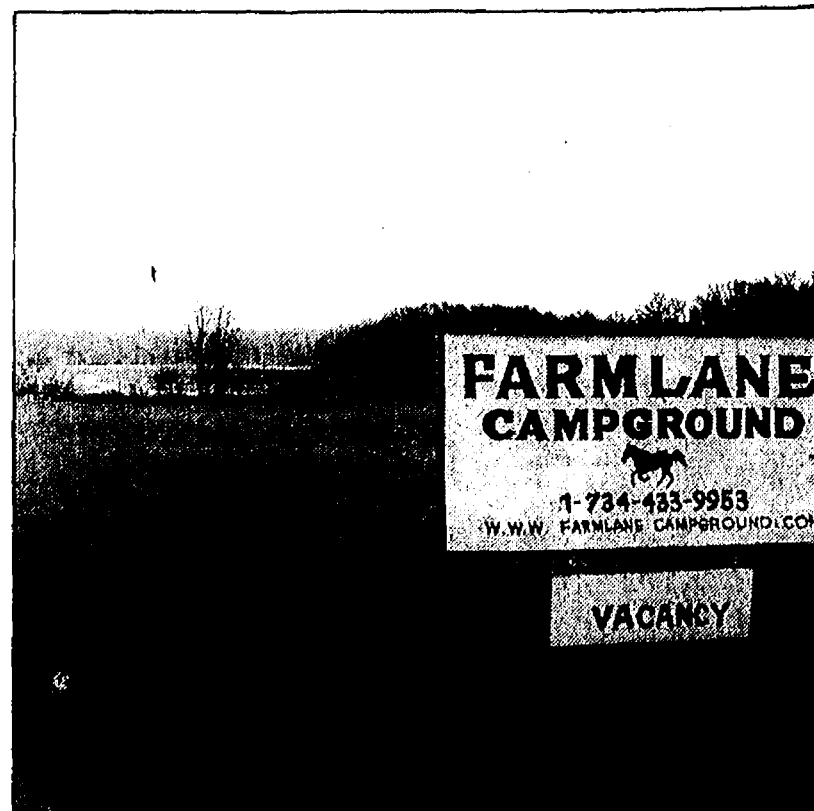

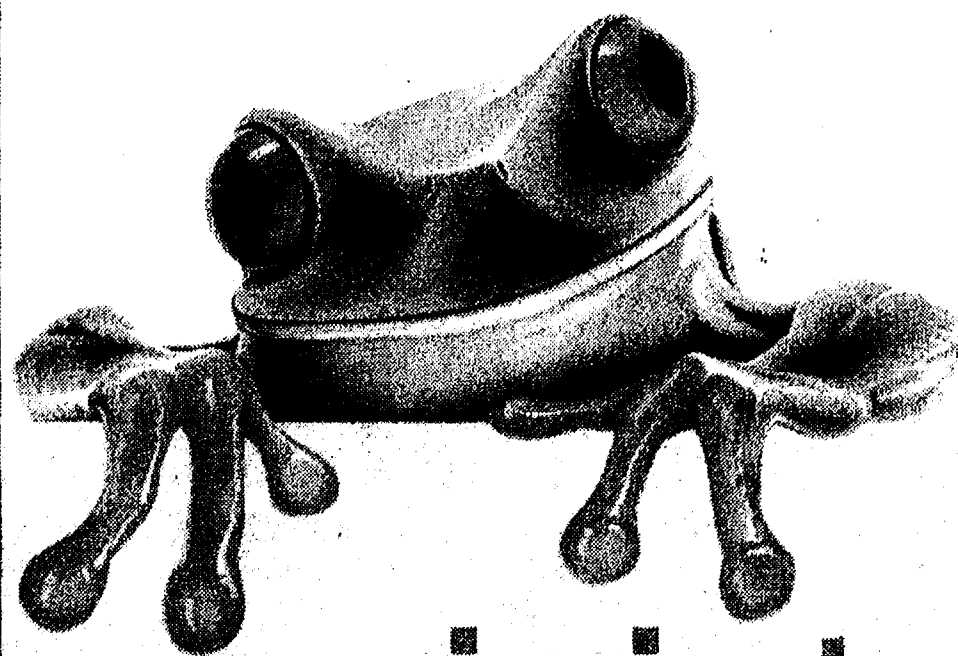

Shakespeare, Shaw festivals offer plenty of artistic enjoyment

If you're going to insert the name Shakespeare into your Theatre Festival after 50 years, you may as well kick off the season with "Hamlet."

Ontario's re-dubbed Stratford Shakespeare Festival has done just that. It's their eighth "Hamlet" since 1957, and we couldn't imagine a better one.

Fueled by Ben Carlson's stunning performance, its three hours (including intermission) whiz by. Directed with razor-sharp clarity by Adrian Noble, former artistic director of England's Royal Shakespeare Company, the plot and the poetry mesh perfectly. The production poses the play's questions — whether Hamlet's madness is feigned or real, for example — and offers answers. The answers may not suit every Shakespearean scholar, but seen through this company and this actor, they make irrefutable sense. Calling a Shakespearean staging "accessible" is a cliché, but when it fits, it fits. It fits here.

The Danish Prince whose uncle murdered his father and then married his widowed mother is often portrayed as confused and brooding, but Carlson is a vigorous Hamlet. His reluctance to act swiftly results not from indecision, but from his desire for perfect timing.

Carlson's performance is inspired. He's a physical Hamlet, reacting to his father's ghost's revelations with a tantrum-like paroxysm of grief, and his advice to the players is boundlessly energetic. Carlson also finds new vocal rhythms; "...rogue and peasant slave" and "To be or not to be..." are both familiar and constantly surprising.

Here, Polonius's advice to Laertes is played straight — it is, after all, sound counsel — and mercifully, Hamlet's boudoir scene with his mother is free of overt incestuousness. Adrienne Gould's piano-playing Ophelia breaks your heart as her girlish innocence succumbs to madness. Scott Wentworth, known to this writer from his appearances at the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey, is an oily Claudius.

The stage is bare at the start, but for a traditional "ghost light," a stand-

ing lamp by which theater ghosts perform their roles. The first scene centers on the appearance of the King's ghost, and the solitary prop is eerily effective. The production's Edwardian-period costuming is relatively modern without sacrificing the formality of the Danish Court.

Hamlet is not a one-man show, and Ben Carlson's performance, awesome on its own, is perfectly integrated. He and the play are worth the trip to Stratford.

Seated among several hundred middle-school students at a matinee of Romeo and Juliet, I thought, "Uh oh...no peace this afternoon." But once the lights went down, there was nary a peep. It wasn't lost on the teen audience that Juliet is only 13 and Romeo a couple years older. (The actors are older, but the point gets made.)

Allowing audience reaction to influence a review is a no-no, but sometimes it can be illuminating. While I admired elements of the production, several uninspired performances made this three hours seem even longer. The kids in attendance apparently thought otherwise. They were moved to laughter, sighs and sniffling. I was not, which hardly matters.

The play, set in Verona, Italy, circa 1300, is timeless. If all-consuming young love has changed in 700 years, nobody told today's teens. The families' "ancient grudge" (the cause is not revealed) updates all too easily, and the play's several violent outbursts might as well be taken from our front pages. (One startling example in the opening scene is like an errant drive-by.)

Stratford's R & J is set in two time periods, and the shift between them is accomplished via an innovative costume maneuver. (I'll not reveal how it's accomplished, but it's pretty slick.) Inter-racial casting among the principals further illustrates Shakespeare's message of forgiveness and tolerance.

"What a scourge is laid upon your hate," the Prince says as the families make peace over the bodies of their star-cross'd children. He ends the play: "For never was a story of more woe than this of Juliet and her

Romeo." Then the young audience erupted in cheers. Flawed it may be, but this Romeo and Juliet does its job.

The so-called "darkening" of musical shows has taken hold in the past 20 years. In Oliver, Nancy's fine life is downgraded to her hard-knock life, and Billy Bigelow (Carousel) is a wife beater. Even Oklahoma now emphasizes Jud Fry's neuroses and his violent nature. However, Stratford's darkening of Cabaret is redundant.

Cabaret is a blistering indictment of the social and political climate that gave rise to Nazism in 1930s Germany. A 1998 Broadway revival pulled fewer punches than the original, but Stratford's pushes the envelope.

The musical was adapted from John van Druten's play, "I Am a Camera," which was in turn inspired by Christopher Isherwood's "Berlin Stories," in which an expatriate American writer falls in with a cross-section of Berliners. Set in his shabby room and the decadent Kit Kat Klub, where he's picked up by singer Sally Bowles, Cabaret contrasts the Klub's forced merriment with the menace lurking outside.

There's little such contrast at Stratford. Near the end, the writer tells Sally, "The party in Berlin is over." True, but if there was a party, we weren't invited. The Kit Kat's degenerate Emcee, sharply-etched by Joel Grey in the original, is here a disheveled Fatty Arbuckle type who would hardly lift anyone's spirits, even subversively. The production leaves little room for imagination. (The "If You Could See Her" dancing gorilla is exposed as an Aryan woman. Can you say 'overstated'?)

As Sally, Trish Lindstrom belts out the bawdy "Don't Tell Mama" and delivers the title song without undue dramatics. Best are Nora McClellan and Frank Moore as the landlady and the Jewish fruit merchant. (The "Pineapple Song" is a hidden gem.)

The Kit Kat denizens are not having a good time. Throughout, they appear in salvation-seeking tableaux. My companion turned to me. "This is what hell must look like," she said. That's obviously what director Amanda Dehnert and choreographer Kelly Devine intended, but they might have trusted us to figure it out.

The Stratford season also includes Shakespeare's Taming of the Shrew, All's Well That Ends Well and Love's Labour's Lost as well as The Trojan Women, The Music Man and Brian Dennehy in a double bill of Samuel Beckett's Krapp's Last Tape and Eugene O'Neill's Hughie. Also, a production that is luring me back in August, Christopher Plummer in Caesar and Cleopatra.

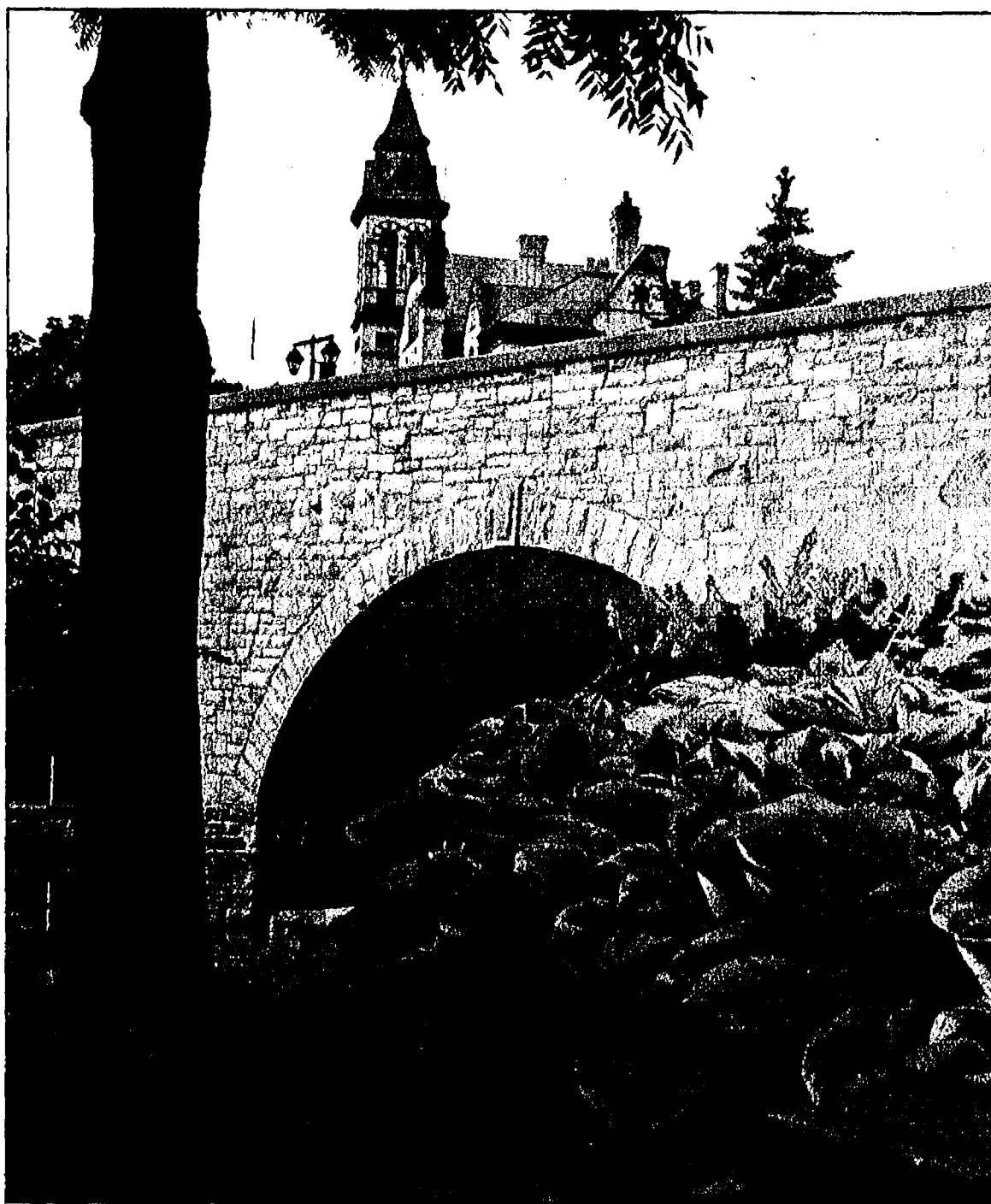

Shaw Theatre

Further east, in Niagara-on-the-Lake, just north of the Canadian Falls, another Theatre Festival is dedicated to George Bernard Shaw, who, for the record, wrote more plays than Shakespeare.

Founded in 1962, the Shaw Festival includes plays written by Shaw's contemporaries and plays written about the period (1890-1950). Thus the 2008 season includes Shaw's Mrs. Warren's Profession and Getting Married as well as plays by J. B. Priestly (An Inspector Calls) and Terrence Rattigan (After the Dance). Also, Leonard Bernstein's musical Wonderful Town, set in 1940, and Lillian Hellman's southern-gothic The Little Foxes.

One of the pleasures of attending the Festival is discovering Shaw's lesser-known plays. In past seasons, The Philanderer and Fanny's First Play have filled that bill. This year it is Getting Married.

Written 100 years ago, Getting Married might well remind you of last night's dinner conversation with especially witty companions. It's about marriage and divorce and how tradition and the law affect both those institutions. Shaw discourses on love, sex, parenthood, honor and religion — all with his challenging cynicism.

Wedding plans hit a snag when both the bride and the groom express doubts. The extended family, which includes a divorcing couple (scandalous at the time), an aunt who desires a child but not marriage (forbidden then by law) and a pompous military General (some things never change), debates the situation with great sense and greater humor.

In Getting Married, Shaw lobbies for separate vacations for married couples "to remain fresh" and for the right of a single woman to be a mother without a man "trying to make me a wife". Those concepts were beyond radical in 1900; today they're beyond common. To say that Shaw was ahead of his time is understatement.

The eleven-play season includes The Stepmother, an engrossing early 'soap opera'; Stephen Sondheim's A Little Night Music; Belle Moral, a gothic whodunnit; and The President, a Ferenc Molnar farce. Hurdle obstacles, value your spouse

I stumbled upon a couple of things that got me thinking. The first one was about The Lord's Prayer.

"When we say 'Hallowed be Thy name,' we are praying, 'May the whole of my life be a source of delight to You and may it be an honor to the name which I bear, which is Your name. Hallowed be your name.'"

The trouble is that we so frequently know there are great areas of our lives that are not hallowed." (Jesus Teaches on Prayer by Ray C. Stedman)

Throughout the Bible, you will notice that every area of life becomes eligible for being lived God's way, for being hallowed: Work, family, recreation, time, talents, power, government, entertainment, stress-ful, creative areas, money...and sex. All

of life finds its fulfillment within the intended purposes of the God who created us.

After I read Stedman's words, my mind went back to another thing I had read recently.

In his first letter to the church in Corinth, Paul writes extensively about marriage.

Now, we often use 1 Corinthians 13 at weddings ("Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs.")

You've probably heard it. It is a great passage, a poetic passage; a passage I've used at many ceremonies. But it's not the passage I'm talking about.

If you turn back just six chapters in that same letter, you see a very different type of instruction on marriage.

1 Corinthians 7 is apparently in response to a letter the Corinthians sent Paul. "Now for the matters you wrote about," is the way Paul begins. And what follows may surprise you. Take a look. Paul's going to talk to us about the birds and the bees.

"The husband should fulfill his marital duty to his wife, and likewise the wife to her husband." (v4)

Did you hear that? The Apostle is telling the husband and wife that they need to be together. That intimacy is a part of our "marital duty" to our spouse.

Does that shock you? When's the last time you heard the Church instructing

people to have sex?

The Church often gets the reputation that we're trying to keep people from being intimate and enjoying each other. Not necessarily. Read on:

"Do not deprive each other except by mutual consent and for a time, so that you may devote yourselves to prayer." (v8a)

Think about that for a moment. The only reason Paul lists for not being with our husband or wife on a regular basis is to PRAY. How many couples have been so committed to prayer that they fail to take time to "fulfill their marital duty"?!

I know praying is important but I don't know too many people who want to pray
