


The newest plan was submitted the first week of September and will go before the Planning Commission on Oct. 21.

## Shopping center slow to come back to life


It's been nearly five months since a fire devastated the Chelsea Shopping Center on May 5, damaging seven businesses and shutting six of them down temporarily.

Rivaling the massive effort by firefighters to save the structure from the flames, an equally intensive effort has been made to get the doors open again.

Immediately following the fire, several merchants said they would reopen in a matter of weeks or perhaps August at the latest, but there are still some significant hurdles to clear before that will be possible.

Doug Sills, a partner in the shopping center's "landlord," First Holding Management Co. of West Bloomfield, said the owners of the property are "deeply committed" to returning the shopping center to full activity as soon as commercially viable.

"The owners are deeply commit-rience," Sills said.




Dr. Romine has been practicing in Saline for 20 years, working out of the present office for eight years.







plan in November or December; January is probably the latest for final site plan approval.

#### **Federal Screw Works**

The hotly debated plan for redeveloping the former Federal Screw Works site on South Main Street is still several months from becoming reality.

Developer Rene Papo of Magellan Properties faces many regulatory hurdles before he can begin to convert the former factory site into mixed commercial and residential use.

"The only thing the Planning Commission has done is approve an area plan," Drolett pointed out.

"He needed to know the area plan so he knew how much brownfield area he would need to remediate."

That must be approved by the Downtown Development Authority, the City Council, Washtenaw County Brownfield Authority, the County Commission, and Michigan the finally Department Environmental Quality.

"(Papo) is in the midst of a very complex process," Kinzer said. "That process is the best part of a year at least to have everything done."

#### The Village Plaza

(a.k.a. Old Polly's)

Across the corner from the proposed Walgreens development, the former Polly's supermarket has stood vacant since the store moved farther down Main Street about four years ago, but remains in the hands of the Kennedy family of Jackson.

Spokesman Shawn Kennedy recently concluded negotiations with the U.S. Postal Service to relocate the Chelsea Post Office in the building, but it would occupy only about 7,000 of the store's approximately 30,000 square feet.

"Kennedy has submitted plans showing a future post office area and three other retail spaces, two of which appear to be spoken for," Drolett reported.

"That's as far as it's gotten, officially.'

Kinzer confirmed that no plans for the property have come before the commission, but "may be in the pipeline."

"We've had some prior discussions on the site, but nothing new," Kinzer said.



## Planting the seeds of safety in farm workers

This is National Farm Safety Week in the United States, dedicated to raising awareness among farmers of the dangers associated with their livelihood.

With hundreds of deaths and tens of thousands of injuries reported every year nationwide, every farm worker must keep safety uppermost in their minds.

That's how it works at the Fusilier Family Farm and Greenhouses in Manchester Township.

"Only people with experience are allowed to run the equipment - it makes it easier on us," said Mike Fusilier.

"The kids think the tractors are cool, but they are the low man on the totem pole when they're hired, so they do a lot of the work by hand at first,"

Kathy Fusilier agreed. "We tell them to be safe

and be smart; if they get hurt it takes all the fun out of it," she said.

Mike added: "If they are not sure how to do something I want them to come to us and ask; it only takes a minute."

With all the young people who work on the farm, especially during the summer, Kathy takes the perspective of a mother of three.

"There's no fooling around here, if they fool around they're busted - and that includes my own kids," she said.

"We hire a lot of kids and they become friends with our kids; it's like a big family. You want to protect them and look out for them."

Mike said the hard work can sometimes take its toll and care must be taken to minimize mistakes being made.

"The worst part is when long week, you're tired and unit is perched precarious-

In 2007, 715 deaths and 80,000 disabling injuries in the United States were attributed to agriculture.

The 2006 national death rate for farmers and farm employees was 28 in 100,000, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The 2006 injury rate for farmers and farm employees was 6 in 100.

With agriculture continuing to be one of the most dangerous occupations in the world, the National Safety Council annually shines a spotlight on farming and ranching during National Farm Safety and Health Week, Sept. 21-27.

This year's theme is "Farm Safely - Protect Your Investment."

Agriculture's death rate ranks first among all occupations, according to the U.S. Department of Labor.

Mining ranks second with 27 work deaths per 100,000 employees and construction is third with 10 deaths per 100,000 workers.

#### FB Safety Seminar

Lenawee and Washtenaw County Farm Bureaus sponsored a one-day seminar on Feb. 12 in Clinton to increase the awareness of local farmers to hazards they might face in their operations.

A major emphasis was on tractor rollovers, which are one of the most frequent accidents.

The presenters emphasized the importance of doing an annual inspection of your farm to identify potential hazards and hopefully develop a plan to remove them before an accident happens.

Lenawee, Monroe and Washtenaw Conservation Districts Groundwater Technician Amy Gilhouse joined Clinton Fire Chief Dennis Keezer and Manchester Township Fire Chief Bill Scully in assisting local farmers to complete Farm Emergency Preparedness Plans.

The plans help to prepare a farm family in the event of an emergency and help to protect first responders in the event of an agricultural emergency.







Skubick folks in Lansing are suffering through another bout of lack of trust ... the same malaise that engulfed lawmakers and the governor last year and placed them on a collision course with history, a rare shutdown of state government.

Here we go again. The stakes are not nearly as high, but the lack of trust still

Last week Gov. Jennifer Granholm confidently told correspondents that a deal on a new energy package was close at hand.

But her GOP dancing partner was not waltzing to the same tune: Sen. Mike Bishop informed everyone that Granholm's announcement was "news to me."

The disagreement is nothing new to them.

This is the same couple that last year, during the contentious and brutal debate over raising taxes, had big-time trust issues. On two occasions, Granholm walked out of negotiations to announce a deal and Bishop said, "What deal?"

The trust thing is not unique to these two. It's all over the joint. House Democrats don't trust House and Senate Republicans and vice versa. House Democrats are even a little shaky on predicting what their own governor will do.

On energy, for example, some Dems are worried Granholm wants a deal so badly that she will sell them out to get it.

Lack of trust is pervasive in the lobby corps. One veteran confides that if a lawmaker says he or she will vote yes on a bill, you're never sure until you see the green light on the voting

And yes, there is even a lack of trust among newshounds who cover this town. Years ago, if the chairman of a committee told you a bill would pass, by God it did.

Now you would be foolish to report such a predication because the story changes six ways from Sunday before you get on the air or into print.

There is this lack of trust, in part, because House members are up for re-election. A yes vote on the energy thing could end up being used against that lawmaker.

It's already happened in Muskegon, where the GOP challenger is running ads against the incumbent Democrat. The Republican says the Democrat voted to raise monthly utility bills, which she did, but there is an explanation. But that will never find its way into the commercial.

The fact is the state will at some point need more energy. You can buy it from other states like we do with foreign oil or you can make it cheaper in your own back yard. Either way, the cost will go up.

It's an issue ripe for political exploitation and lots of lawmakers are scared their careers will be over. However, once more saving one's neck trumps doing what may be best for the public.

## It's the place to go for official information

here was a time when getting official information from the federal government felt a little like old-time prospecting. It took lots of time, sifting and patience just for the possibility of uncovering a few gold nuggets.

These days, the best link between government and citizen is www.USA.gov. That's not the creators and managers of the site speaking; it's Time magazine, which rated USA.gov one of the 25 Web sites "we can't live without," and the Brookings Institution, which recently named USA.gov the best

government site. Interestingly, USA.gov is a product of the U.S. General Services Administration, best known as the government's procurement arm and landlord. GSA's traditional job has been to provide goods and services at best value to other agencies so they can focus squarely on their core missions. USA.gov, to our great 'delight, has helped redefine the GSA mission.

We're also pleased that Brookings rated our agency Web site, www.gsa.gov, as the third best site in the federal government. Expanded content, improved navigation and a customized search engine have all made gsa.gov more valuable and user friendly. Popular topics include government per diem rates and forms, how businesses can get on the GSA schedule, and how to buy surplus federal property.

One of the greatest challenges for government in any generation is figuring out how to use technology to better serve citizens.

This has the obvious practical benefit of disseminating information, but it also helps establish a closer bond between Americans and their government.

As well, high-tech information delivery methods hold special appeal for younger Americans more accustomed to clicking than calling.

USA.gov, the U.S. government's official Web portal, offers RSS Feeds, e-mail updates, videos and much more on everything from hurricane information to government benefits to consumer protection for seniors.

A state-of-the-art search engine provides documents, images, frequently asked questions and other information from federal. state and local Web sites in a variety of formats, including mobile. And let's not forget GobiernoUSA.gov, USA.gov's Spanish-language counterpart, which offers the same latest and greatest information en español.

Six years ago, President Bush issued a direct challenge to those of us in the citizen services arena. To deliver citizen-centered electronic government of real value, the president said we needed to provide, "custom information from Washington when citizens want it, not just when Washington wants to give it to them."


Many agencies took that challenge to heart.

At GSA, we sat down, considered our existing Web sites, programs and initiatives, and thought long and hard about how to recast them in a way that would get us closer to the president's objective.



## Little known disorder affects local children

Then Ann Cobb was in kindergarten, the teacher made a phone call to her mother, Carla. Ann was clearing her throat and blinking her eyes so excessively that it was distracting to others.

A visit to the Ear, Nose, and Throat specialist revealed nothing was wrong with Ann's sinuses. A comprehensive eye exam determined her vision was fine. Those who cared for Ann were baffled.

But one day, while sitting in front of the television with remote control in hand, Carla found a documentary on the HBO Family Channel that was of special interest. The children on the show reminded Carla of Ann. "We took her straight to her pediatrician and he agreed that she had signs of Tourette Syndrome," Cobb said.

Watching that show, "I Have Tourette's but Tourette's Doesn't Have Me. solved the mystery for the Cobb family. Now Ann is under the care of top neurologist Harry Chugani at Detroit Children's Hospital.

Tourette Syndrome (TS) is a genetic neurological disorder that is characterized by tics, which are sudden, repetitive, involuntary movements or sounds. As many as one in 100 exhibit a mild form.

"A diagnosis of Tourette Syndrome is made when the tics are both motor and vocal in nature." said Dr. Chugani. "The vocal tic could be a word, but is more often a sound such as a groan or a grunt. The tics would need to go on for at least a year before we would label it as Tourette Syndrome, Many people have tics that go on for just a few weeks and then are gone."

Dr. Chugani explained that most children are diagnosed in early childhood. Generally, symptoms worsen between the ages of 12 and 14. a tough time for most kids anyway as they enter adolesTSA staff visits Chelsea

Art Abbott, vice chairman of the Michigan Chapter of the Tourette Syndrome Association, visited Chelsea on Aug. 26 to speak to interested parents and teachers. The Tourette Syndrome Association (TSA) exists to provide support, education, and awareness; and raise money for ongoing research.

TSA is staffed by volunteers. They run support groups and publish a newsletter to help families with children of TS. They also provide outreach to schools and hold teacher in-services upon request.

TSA has an indirect involvement with research by making its members aware of ongoing research studies. "We make people aware of it, and one of our members funds much of it through an endowment of a chair at Wayne State University, partnering with Detroit Children's Hospital. Children's Hospital hopes to form a TS treatment center, which would be devoted specifically to TS and house all the staff you need to adequately treat the great variety of TS cases that exist," said Abbott.

"Eighty percent of kids will find their symptoms begin to lessen at around 16-17 years old, and by the time they are adults very few will need medication to control the symptoms," he said.

"The severity of the tics wax and wane," Dr. Chugani said.

In other words, tics come and go. A child can have one type of tic that comes on slowly, gets worse for a while, and then gets better. It can then be replaced by another tic of a different type or in a different loca-

Some children who have TS will also have other conditions such as Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder or Attention Deficit Disorder. No two cases are alike.

Carla Cobb said that in Ann's case, she did not require medication at first, but when she developed multiple tics that became more disruptive, she did go on medication to help control them.

"As the kids get older and their bodies change, the medication often needs to be readjusted," Cobb said.

There is no medication that is specifically for TS, but doctors have borrowed mood stabilizers and muscle relaxChelsea, said most teachers learn about TS when they have a student with it in the classroom.

"The special education staff is aware and welcomes additional information from the families," Stieber said. "When there is a child with TS in the building we will typically have a general discussion at a staff meeting so all staff is apprised of individual student needs."

Stieber explained that children with TS fall under the special needs category . that makes them eligible for an Individualized Educational Plan, or IEP.

Once a physician makes a diagnosis of TS, the parent would notify the school. The principal then initiates a referral for the IEP. An assessment of the child's needs takes place using various members of the educational team, including the teacher consultant, speech therapist, and school psychologist or social worker.

The parent is included when the results of the assessment are discussed to determine the best course of action for the child's educa-

"...the child is placed on a 504 plan, which means that the student's progress would be reviewed and monitored yearly," Stieber said.

"The most important thing is to treat each child as a special individual and provide them support to be successful and develop positive self-esteem," Stieber said.

Cobb said it was a terrible thing to hear that Ann had Tourette's.

"We have had to do a lot of research, and we had to learn to parent a whole new way compared to how we raised her three older brothers," she said. "It takes a lot more patience than usual. Right now, Ann doesn't like to be where things are over

**Tourette Syndrome Fact Guide** 

What is Tourette Syndrome (TS)? It is a neurobiological disorder characterized by tics-involuntary, rapid, sudden movements and/or vocal outbursts that occur

What are the most common symptoms? Symptoms change periodically in number, frequency, type and severity-even disappearing for weeks or months at a time. Commonly, motor tics may be eye blinking, head jerking, shoulder shrugging and facial grimacing. Vocally: throat clearing, sniffing and tongue clicking.

What is the cause of the syndrome? No definite cause has yet been established, but considerable evidence points to abnormal metabolism of at least one brain chemical called dopamine.

How many people are affected? As TS often goes undiagnosed, no exact figure can be given. But authoritative estimates indicate that some 200,000 in the United States are known to have the disorder. All races and ethnic groups are affected.

Is it inherited? Genetic studies indicate that TS is inherited as a dominant gene, with about 50 percent chance of passing the gene from parent to child. Sons are three to four times more likely than daughters to exhibit TS.

Is obscene language (coprolalia) a typical symptom of TS? Definitely not. The fact is that cursing, uttering obscenities, and ethnic slurs are manifested by fewer than 15 percent of people with TS. Too often, however, the media seize upon this symptom for its sensational effect.





"We have discovered that certain things seem to affect the tics, like diet. We have her on the Feingold program, which means we avoid artificial colors, flavors, and preservatives. Stress makes the tics worse, so we try to minimize stress as much as possible."

Cobb said exercise improves things, too.

"If Ann is concentrating on playing, then she will have fewer tics," she said. "She enjoys water, so swimming provides exercise, and a shower can be stress reducing."

Parents and professionals agree that one of the most important things for chil-

dren with TS is to feel accepted by others. Stieber said that the staff of Chelsea Schools encourages children to be "bucket fillers." Being a bucket filler basically means that children are kind to others. Teachers frequently read aloud stories that express understanding others as a main theme.

"We promote the concept that everyone is unique and has special needs," she said

Cobb said that she still finds it difficult when her family is in a public place and others look at Ann's behaviors unfavorably.

"People aren't familiar with it, so they don't know," she said. "Even though she doesn't have a physical disability that others can recognize, she still has a disability. My advice to people is 'don't judge.""



## Doing what comes naturally

Hollenbeck helps park visitors see the forest AND the trees

ome folks know what they see when they look at wildlife, but not everyone knows the "whys and wherefores"

when it comes to nature That's the job of an Interpreter - someone who makes the connections, knows what causes plants to grow in a certain place, animals to habitate, trees to die, birds to nest. They know the environment, in addition to the habitants, and can explain it all to little children, medium sized children, big kids and adults, in a way that makes the subject come alive. They can turn the black and white picture into real life color.

That's Jennifer Hollenbeck's role in the scheme of things along the Huron River - from Delhi Park, through Dexter-Huron, Hudson Mills, and Huron Meadows and Indian Springs to the north. She graduated from Dexter High and earned a Bachelor's degree in history and anthropology at Eastern and a Master's degree in Interpretation. She has been Park Interpreter since May 2000, replacing the position of naturalist.

She comes by her interest in nature "naturally." Her father, Jim Jaworski, recently retired as long time biology teacher at Dexter High School and her husband, another Dexterite, Rob Hollenbeck, will be teaching high school level biology in the spring. Her mother-in-law, Claire Hollenbeck, collects pine

cones for Hollenbeck's projects at the Park. It's a family thing.

Hollenbeck says there has been "a big change in stewardship, a regeneration of habitats and volunteer participation in DNR organized cleaning and clearing of invasive plants, like autumn olive trees and honeysuckle. Fly fishermen, who fish in the park areas, help keep the river banks clean."

Other groups clean up after themselves, making the park their own.

Another change,
Hollenbeck notes, is the
economy. Each year the
schools have to evaluate
how they can afford to come
out to the park for the various programs available.
Gas for school buses is the
major cost, since the park
charges only \$1 per school
child for admittance.

Rising and falling water levels have revealed and sometimes obscured, features in the parks - the remnants of the old mills that dotted the Huron, a section of mill stone found when the water was low; treasures of the past still waiting to be discovered again.

Hollenbeck conducts hikes with flashlights and owl calls in the woods so visitors can see the barred owl and others who roost in the area.

She reports that "a pileated woodpecker has taken up residence near the golf course; a beaver has been spotted near one of the smaller parks, river otters have been seen and their tracks identified" – the forest, grasslands, marshes and river are constantly providing material for her classes and hikes.

She conducts the "Critter Paddle" in September; a two-hour adventure on the river; a Stewardship Network Paddle this month examining river ecology, natural history and the human influence for adults; Bird and Owl hikes, Orienteering Projects, and programs geared '--

Scouts of various levels earn badges in the outdoors.

Asked what she would like to have for her program, Hollenbeck answered "A separate Nature Center with a classroom that wasn't in the path of other park functions. A real "sugar shack" for one of the popular springtime programs gathering maple sap and making maple syrup."

Volunteers help make the program run by making interpretive signs for the trails and woodlands; by building an amphitheater for outdoor classes, building bluebird nest boxes; helping to remove invasive species; making the parks part of the Scout's Community Service program.

Ouimet is on that list. I've seen him at more community meetings and functions than I can remember, and he usually has something enlightening to impart to local elected officials

He guesstimated that his average workload is 60 or more hours per week with all of the meetings – sometimes two or three in the same day. He probably doesn't have to show up as frequently as he does, but he still does anyway.

I voiced my concern in the form of a question. "With so many people who are simply going to vote a straight Democrat ticket, what would you say to them?"

"I hope everyone takes the time to review the ballot and select the people running on their qualifications and what they've been able to achieve," he responded.

I don't think I've ever heard Mark make a statement that was divisive, derisive, intellectually offensive, or anything resembling the garbage you see on the 24-hour news channels.

Local politicians also emulate those negative qualities and express those little idiosyncrasies, so it's not as if all local politicians are immune or above that fray.

But not Mark - in fact, we've had little off-therecord talks about the baseball of local politics, and he has been pretty astute about who will end up where after the votes are counted. Those who talked about solutions and had done something tangible are keeping their seats, and all of those who didn't live up to one or both of those standards are looking for other things to do with their free time.

"I think I got that overwhelming support from the people I-work with because they say I stay focused on issues and not get embroiled in party politics," he explained.

"Quite frankly, I think in today's environment people are tired of what goes on in Washington and what goes on in Lansing, and the reason I got those endorsements was because of the things we were able to accomplish here in this First District in Washtenaw County."

I debated with myself a bit about my style for referring to Republicans and Democrats in this article, but I decided to leave it, because it's silly.

Simple labels are silly, and all they do is give bad politicians cover (mostly provided by the good ones). But labels simplify the process, and are necessary until we have the education and social infrastructure in place to have a more complex view of and discussion about politics in this country.

But that doesn't mean we can't start now, and maybe Mark Ouimet is as good a place to start as any.

# The basics of horse play

The two main types of wagers.

1. Straight wagers (These wagers only involve one horse):

Win: You collect only if your horse finishes first.
The minimum wager is \$2

Place: You collect if your horse finishes first or second. However, if your horse wins, you only collect the Place payout. The minimum wager is \$2.

Show: You collect if your horse finishes first, second or third, but you collect only the Show payout. The minimum wager is \$2.

Across The Board: You are wagering on a horse to Win, Place and Show. You receive one ticket for all three wagers. If your horse wins, you receive Win, Place and Show payouts. If your horse finishes second, you receive Place and Show payouts; and if your horse is third, you receive the Show payout. Because you are actually placing three wagers, the minimum wager is \$6.

2. Combination or "Exotic" wagers (These wagers involve two or more horses):

Daily Double: To collect. you must select the winner of two races. For example, you must select the winner of the first race and the second race. Of course, you must place the wager before the first of your two races!

Exacta: To collect, you must pick the horses that finish first and second in exact order. For example, if you play a 3-5 exacta, the #3 horse must Win and the #5 horse must Place (come in second) for you to collect.

Exacta Box: Is made to guarantee the outcome of the first two finishers regardless of which horse wins. For example, if you box the #3 and #5 horses and either the #3 or the #5 horse wins and finishes second, you win.

Trifecta: Is similar to an exacta, except you must pick the horses that finish first, second, and third in exact order. This is a challenging wager that often yields large dividends.

Trifecta Box: Is made to guarantee the outcome of the first three finishers regardless of which horse wins. For example, if you box the #3, the #7 and #5 horses and either the #3, #7 or the #5 horse wins, finishes second and third, you win.

Pick 3: To collect, you must pick the winners of three consecutive races. And, of course, you must make your selections before the first race of your Pick 3 wager. An excellent wager that offers great excitement and opportunity to score Big!

Superfecta: Is similar to an exacta and trifecta, except you must pick the horses that finish first, second, third and fourth in exact order. This is also a challenging wager that often yields dividends even larger than the trifecta.

Where do I go to collect my winnings?

So, you've made a winning wager. After the race has been declared official, simply take your ticket to any of the mutuel windows or self betting terminals to collect. If you decide to keep your ticket and cash out at a later date, please check with your local track to determine ticket expiration dates. Each state has different guidelines to cashing tickets.

## Knights of Columbus host 'End of Summer'







Chelsea will hold its Homecoming dance Oct. 18.

#### **Dexter: Community** Involvement

When Homecoming Week arrives at Dexter High School, school spirit can be felt throughout the town.

"With Dexter being a small town, everyone comes out for the football game," Deb Marsh, Dexter's senior class adviser said. "It's really a whole-town event."

Members of the Student Council, the Leadership Class and class advisers work together on the production of the Homecoming activities. The school's Spirit Week, which takes place Oct. 6 through 11, features many dress-up days, including Hat Day, Team Day, Pajama Day, and Maroon and Gold Day.

Each class builds a float throughout the week based on the theme for Homecoming. The theme for this year's event is board games.

Most of the events are run by the Student Council and their advisers. This year, the administrators are in charge of organizing the halftime show at the football game.


"The students do most of the work," Glatz said. "The Student Council and their committees are in charge of each event during Spirit Week."

"People from anywhere are invited to participate in the parade," Mata said. "We've had over 50 groups in the parade before."




