## Chelsea's Sounds & Sights announces 2009 lineup

It's evident that Summer is just around the corner with the announcement of the 2009 lineup for Sounds & Sights on Thursday Nights in downtown Chelsea. Every Thursday night from June 25 through Sept. 3, from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m., the streets of Chelsea will overflow with patrons coming to enjoy as many as 10 musical acts, children's entertainers, and other attractions performing simultaneously at various stages around town. The series is the combined effort of the Sounds & Sights Committee, the Chelsea Area Chamber of Commerce, the Chelsea Center for the Arts, downtown merchants. The event is generously sponsored the Chelsea DDA.

In addition to musical performances, there will be a variety of children's attractions and activities including face painters, jugglers and magicians. New this year is a self-guided walking sculpture tour. "Sculpture Walk Chelsea" is a year long community arts project sponsored by the Chelsea Downtown Development Authority. Ten sculptures were juried into the outside exhibit. The works will be placed on concrete pads in high profile locations in the downtown area. Rebecca R. Hart, the Associate Curator at the Detroit Institute of Arts, juried the exhibit. The River Gallery in Chelsea is the project manager with support from CCA and the City of Chelsea.

Also new and exciting for 2009 is outdoor cinema and screening of free movies at dusk. Films will be shown on a 40-foot wide screen

# 'A humble spirit'

Dexter's Leonard makes his first stop in life's journey in Niger with the Peace Corps

Tom Leonard of Dexter spent the past two summers abroad in Taiwan teaching English. He also spent half a year in France becoming fluent in French during his time at Hillsdale College, where he majored in French.

During his senior year in college, Leonard wasn't quite sure what career path to follow until his mother, Peggy, handed him a newspaper article about entering the Peace Corps. Then that path became clear and obvious.

"It made a light go off inside my head," Leonard said. "I followed it up, and in September, I started the process."

Leonard was nominated in November, and then received an invitation to come to Niger, where one of the official languages is French, in early May. He will leave on this two-year adventure in July, where he will act as a community and youth educator.

"After I reflected on different job opportunities, and I was heading into my senior year, I had a breakthrough that international relations was a good field," he said. "I had been considering teaching English abroad, and then I thought about the Peace Corps."

The first step in the application process was to fill out an online application, with letters of recommendation, resume, essays, and health status. He attended a regional interview in Ann Arbor, and another interview in Chicago.

"Then there was a little bit of waiting," he said. After he received his invitation to Niger, he had a lot of literature to read about the Peace Corps policy, and his host country. He had to submit Visa and passport forms.

"I've heard that it is more competitive because there are fewer jobs elsewhere," he said. "I've heard that 30 percent of the people who apply actually go."

Leonard said during his research of Niger he discovered that it ranks as one of the poorest countries in the world. "A few years ago, it was 177 out of 177. Recently, it is 174," he said. "The only export is uranium."

He said that 80 percent of the country is desert, with the people living in the remaining 20 percent of the land, where the fertile Niger River Valley allows crops to grow. There are 15 million people living in Niger, which is twice the size of Texas. Most of the people - 90 percent - are Muslim.

Leonard said he is looking forward to learning about this religion, which he says is much more regimented than

# CHS soccer field targeted by vandals

Blowtorch wielding vandals targeted the soccer field at Chelsea High School last month.

They burned "DHS" and an accompanying graphic depiction into the center of the field.

While the damage has been fixed when maintenance placed new sod over the affected areas, the district is still looking for those who would undertake such a malicious act.

The damage was done the day before the final game between Chelsea and Dexter High School.

"All we know is that sometime during the late hours of

the night or early hours of the morning someone used what appears to be some kind of torch to inscribe DHS, which we're assuming refers to Dexter High School and a pretty graphic picture of a male organ," said Chelsea Athletic Director Wayne Welton.

Physical education classes had been held earlier in the day May 15 and the field was untouched at that time.

No one noticed until the game the next day. "Our team was the first to discover it when they came out to play the next day."

The district acted quickly to repair the damage, due to the fact that the grass slowly

died over the following week making the damage more visible and the inappropriate depiction even more pronounced.

Welton said camera footage did not answer the key questions that Chelsea police and the district had.

He said he didn't want to speculate at this point: "To point a finger at anybody would be unfair. We don't know (if Dexter kids did it). Did some of our kids do it to make it look like Dexter did it? We don't know."

Fortunately the field was shut down for the following couple of weeks after the incident, allowing time to cut sod from another field and install it over the dam-

age. While the grass is fixed, Welton said those fans and families that came out May 16 will probably never forget the incident.

"To (have had to) play Dexter on Saturday morning and see it out there it was not real fan or parent friendly for sure," Welton said. It was somber. It didn't feel good from anybody's standpoint."

Welton added that he hopes no one in either Dexter or Chelsea decides to escalate things with another act of vandalism on either campus.

Pranks are nothing new during this time of year, but this one really stood out in Welton's mind.

"It's not the first time something like this has happened," he said. "It's always particularly disappointing because we've gone to such great lengths to maintain

these facilities. My staff and I often joke that that's one of the finest pieces of grass in Washtenaw County."

Students are advised to stay off of the field until June 15 so the new sod can properly take hold on the field.

"The lineup this year is again packed with talent," says co-organizer Craig Common. "It was difficult to select acts due to the overwhelming level of talent from our auditions. 

# Lima Twp. supervisor moves forward with land case

Lima Township Supervisor Kenneth Unterbrink has instructed township attorneys to take another pass at pursuing part of the Beach family farm property in the state appellate court.

The appellate court ruled last month that title over property privately dedicated in a subdivision plat can be acquired through "adverse possession," which was a decision in the property owner's favor.

Unterbrink said attorney Victor Lillich is seeking reconsideration in the appellate court. They are

also seeking counsel from the Michigan Township Association.

Unterbrink approached property owner Florence Beach in 2004, initially to purchase the property from her so the township and the Chelsea Area Fire Authority could construct a fire substation on six parcels that the township purchased in 2004.

Sometime over the course of the litigation the substation plan fell off of the table until recently, according to both Unterbrink and CAFA Chief Jim Payeur.

Unterbrink feels that the township has a strong claim to the two parallel

strips of Beach farmland that border on the six parcels where the substation would go.

"We're researching it and sending off something to the Michigan Township Association to see if they would help as well, because it will affect a lot of issues throughout the state," Unterbrink said. "It involves and will affect) the Land Division Act and how you proceed with plats.

"Everyone I've talked to including our assessor and the road commission and the county equalization department all think that the decisions that were made were not correct and

even the Michigan Attorney General's office has agreed to go forward with us with an amicus brief."

Unterbrink further explained that the case was about protecting the rights of the people in the plat "because these were roads platted within the plat."

He added that without those Harford roads the six parcels, three of which have frontage on Jackson Road,

would have "no access to the main roads, because those roads were platted along with the plat."

He also alleged that the tax bills reflect that no one has paid taxes on those

platted roads, despite the fact that they aren't actually roads.

"The tax description of the property is only referred

A brief chase ensued past the dirt portion of Sibley after the officer turned his lights and sirens.

The suspect turned onto Conway Road and broke away from the officer, who ended the chase due to the dust and intensity of the chase.

The officer described the driver was 18-25 years old, white with dark short hair and slender. He was wearing a white t-shirt, according to the officer.

There were three people in

the vehicle, including the driver.

The officer returned to the scene to investigate and found a Swisher Sweets wrapper on the ground and fresh brown tobacco on the ground next to it.

Chelsea police officers responded to a domestic abuse call in the 200 block of Pierce Street at 8 p.m. May 24.

The homeowner told officers that after a fight one of her assailants retreated to the 500 block of Maywood and another drove away in a vehicle.

One of the women, who gave the homeowner injuries, including scratch marks on her right shoulder and other signs of a scuffle, was her aunt.

Apparently the aunt thought the victim's boyfriend had given her the finger while the two passed each other on the road in Stockbridge. The aunt then came and confronted her about the matter.

The victim and her boyfriend were in the backyard of their residence when the aunt arrived. She complained about being disrespected and a fight broke out, which ended in the boyfriend breaking it up and "dragging" his girlfriend inside their home.

Brawling commenced once-

more when the two women came together again in the front driveway near their vehicles.

Witnesses say that both women were engaged in the fight. A neighbor called the Chelsea Police Department when the swearing and verbal exchanges were loud enough to carry throughout the neighborhood.

The aunt came into the department later to talk to police. She told officers that being flipped off with her small daughter in the vehicle bothered her and is what instigated the situation.

She also said that when she entered her niece's yard to confront her and her boyfriend they were smoking marijuana. She told officers that the fight began with the two calling her names and her niece forcibly trying to silence her by covering her mouth.

She told officers that after some hair pulling, scratching and kicking the fight stopped and then resumed again in the front yard where fists were used.

Both women had abrasions, scratches and bruises.

No charges were pursued after officers placed a follow up call with the niece and inquired about the alleged marijuana use.







# Cedars of Dexter celebrates, looks ahead

Employees of United Methodist Retirement Communities responsible for organizing the first Pig Roast & Community Picnic at the Cedars of Dexter development site severely underestimated the number of people who would attend the event and the amount of enthusiasm those people would have for the senior living community.

A large crowd of home-seeking seniors, curious relatives and Cedar's Charter Members - those who have already spoken for 24 of the 60 cottages - lounged under a party tent listening to the Dexter Community Band play silver and golden-age tunes, in between touring the existing models to discuss optional creature comforts and core services available to those who ultimately decide to call the Cedars at 201 Katherine Way home.

"We're very pleased with the turnout," said Cathy Gallagher, director of business development for UMRC. "We counted 145 people signing up for the door prizes and there are many who didn't. It's the first time we've done something like this - we were thinking maybe 125 (would

come in total)." UMRC is still signing people up within the pre-sale "Charter" period in an effort to not only get the first wave of Cedars residents committed so their cottages can be built to specification, but also

to reach predetermined financial thresholds to justify the progression of the project construction. The shells of units are already springing up across the street from the two model units and several lots have been cleared and

are ready to be built up into spoken-for units, most of which are on the side of the property closest to Gordon Hall.

That side of the development will also face the spot where a winery has been proposed on a neighboring piece of the historic property. Not only will that winery be a nice piece of scenery, but proceeds from the property sale or lease would be reinvested into Gordon Hall, either paying off the remainder of the mortgage or shoring up funds for the restoration of Judge Samuel Dexter's home to its original glory.

Another Cedars hotspot is the inner-ring of cottage lots surrounding the clubhouse. These units are nestled away from the outskirts of the property.

Gallagher describes the process by which the Cedars community is growing as a natural process of community building that requires little or no sales push. "People are really afraid if they come up that somebody is going to come and sell them something, and that's not what this is about. We simply give them

the information and they sell themselves if it's the lifestyle they want."

Charter members, some of whom devoted Dexter community folks will recognize, are also very much driving the process of building the Cedars community by effectively choosing their future friends and neighbors.



"When I show people around I introduce this as 'my house,'" said Lou Ceriani, who will eventually be living in what is currently "Model #1," which is the most frequently toured of the two existing unit models. "When we heard that the people from the Chelsea retirement community were interested in the land on the Gordon Hall property we called and said put our names down right away."


Ceriani was the fifth Charter member to sign up, as early as five years ago. He was originally going to retire in Chelsea, but he said he couldn't pass up the opportunity to become part of a senior living community within the Dexter community that he loves so much and has devoted so much time to as a member of the Dexter Lions and the keeper of "Louie's Gate" during Dexter Community Schools sporting events.

"We didn't want to leave Dexter and the models here look the same as the ones in Chelsea, so it's been great ... this has been a great opportunity," Ceriani said. "We're still lively enough and now we'll be close enough to associate with other people in Dexter."

UMRC President and CEO John Thorhauer said, he was quite pleased with the way the pig roast went and how progress on Cedars is moving within the timetable set forth at the project's outset.

"We have had 17 of our original group (of Charter members) convert to 10 percent deposits, which allows us to go to the next step and start construction," Thorhauer said. "We're actually five units ahead of where we thought we would be right now."

Charter members is just another 30 days, according to Thorhauer. During that remaining window rates are still reduced compared to what they will be and UMRC is still offering free upgrades. "We're still offering \$1,500 in upgrades for free right now."

Construction is expected

to start "within the next few months" and the first Cedars residents will settle in sometime during 2010. Thorhauer said, adding that he is looking forward to the second annual Pig Roast & Community Picnic next year. "We've never really done this before ... it's been a big success."

## Candidates can't solve the economy

Just like the old-time snake oil salesman hawking his magical elixir to cure your every ache and pain, this next batch of candidates for governor will try to sell you on the notion that they can fix

Michigan's ailing economy. Buyer beware. They can't. Just as it was in 2006, the major theme in the next race for governor will be the economy. Dick DeVos and Jennifer Granholm ran on a platform of turning the economy around.

"I'm a businessman; I know how to do this," lectured DeVos at every turn.

Incumbent Granholm countered: "We've started the job. Let me finish it."

### Byrnes: 'We cannot afford to ignore our roads'

Last month, sections of three once-paved, primary roads in Montcalm County were converted back to dirt roads due to a lack of funding. Clearly this demonstrates that we must change the way we fund transportation. Building a modernized transportation infrastructure is necessary to compete in the global marketplace as businesses will not operate in areas with crumbling roads and bridges. If we continue to under fund our roads, Michigan residents stand to see a dramatic reduction in services that keep our roads viable. With all that is at risk, the Michigan Legislature must act quickly on legislation that addresses transportation funding.

Based on a November 2008 report from the

bipartisan Transportation Funding Task Force (TF2), our transportation funding methods will soon be so insufficient that we will lose out on federal funding because Michigan will be unable to generate enough state and local matching funds to clear all the federal dollars available. According to the report, the Michigan Department of Transportation alone will lose almost \$600 million in federal aid beginning in 2011, and \$1.9 billion between 2011 and 2013.

The report also unequivocally stated that "the one choice we cannot afford is to do nothing." As a TF2 member and the Chair of the House Transportation Committee, I believe we must heed these recommendations. Task force

members have worked to develop legislation that will allow for a "good" level of investment in transportation. As stated in our report, a "good" level of investment will sustain 126,000 Michigan jobs, attract new business and open new global markets for Michigan products and services. In total this investment will yield roughly \$41 billion in other economic benefits for all sectors of the Michigan economy.

Without adequate funding, citizens will see a decrease in services they've come to expect, from litter pickup to roadside mowing. Snow removal also could be restricted only to primary roads, and road resurfacing and sig-





Christianity, in that there rules about eating the right foods, fasting and praying five times a day.

"I have been reading blogs of the people who are currently there, and there is no reason to go up to the north where there is desert," he said, adding that he has heard that Niger is the safest country in the region, even though there have been some concerns about tourists being captured in the north.

"When I think of Niger, it is very little in the headlines," he said. He added that he is expecting that it will be less visited than other countries, and may have retained more of its cultural heritage.

In Niger, he said that in the country, native tribe languages prevail, but the educated speak French.

"Some speak Zindar, or Tamashek, which is related to Arabic or Berber. I will most likely learn Hausa, which is the biggest or most used language. The people there know it across ethnic lines," he said.

When he first gets to Niger, he will spend three months of intense language study. During those three

months, he will spend time living with a host family and getting to know the country. He does not yet know in which city or village he will be stationed.

"I could be living in a mud hut, or an apartment," he said. He is hoping to have running water and electricity at least part of the time. He is hoping to use a laptop computer to write with and that there will be access to the internet so he can check emails.

"I will probably not have it, but Peace Corps will have it at their regional headquarters," said Leonard.

His job description will be community and youth educator and will be responsible for training students in decision-making skills, training trainers and continuing existing clubs. He might also be expected to help raise awareness of AIDS, and other issues that youth in Niger are dealing with.

"They don't allow you to teach in the classroom," he said. "I haven't worked in administration before."

Leonard said he will get more specific training once he gets there and expects that the culture, climate, language, food and job will be quite a culture shock at first. There are new medical supplies to take, such as malaria pills, immuniza-

tions against yellow fever and Hepatitis.

"I'm glad I've done something like that before," he said. "I've made a heat and food adjustment before in Taiwan. But this will be much more extreme. I will have to be extremely flexible."

Leonard said he is looking forward to adapting to the culture.

"My experience so far is that you learn so much more when you learn the culture from the inside out as much as you can," he said. "You can't change your race or your (language), but if you come in with a humble spirit, and don't assume, you necessarily have all of the solutions, or even see the problem the way it ought to be seen."

He said that he took a class in African political systems this year, and learned through one of the books he studied that the best approach is listening first.

"In the past, people have come in with the best intentions, and upset the system, overturned the native cultures and traditions," he said, adding that Peace Corps doesn't do it that way. "It's a big organization that's well known, with a good track record."

nage replacement projects will be reduced. That's not to mention cuts in local bus and transit systems, as well as reduced maintenance to roadside parks that help support Michigan's tourism industry.

In response to those staggering numbers, the plan ensures that we capture those federal funds by tying taxes to wholesale gas prices and gradually increases vehicle registration fees over a five year period. After being phased in over five years, the plan would provide about \$1.8 billion in additional transportation revenue per year that will go toward maintaining the roads and bridges you drive on every day.

Ultimately, spending money on our transportation infrastructure has to

be viewed as an investment that pays off over time. We cannot continue to operate under a funding structure that forces us to revert to dirt roads. The ability to move people and goods safely and efficiently is an absolute must for Michigan to rebound and emerge stronger from these economic

times. Creating jobs is the only way to restore prosperity. Investing in our roads will attract businesses, create new jobs and allow our hard-working families to get back on the job. Doing nothing will not only hamper our ability to make steps forward, but it will actually push us back.



## House passes Schauer amendment to assist small businesses

Congressman Mark Schauer, D-District 7, joined colleagues on both sides of the aisle last week to pass the Job Creation through Entrepreneurship Act (H.R. 2352), a bill that gives small businesses and entrepreneurs the tools and resources they need to succeed and thrive.

As part of last week's vote, the U.S. House of Representatives overwhelmingly voted to pass a Schauer amendment that helps small manufacturers that are transitioning into growth sectors.

"My wife and I own a small business in Battle Creek, and I know this bill will offer a much-needed boost to small businesses at a time when we need it most," said Schauer. "Michigan has lost 400,000 manufacturing jobs since 2000 due to unfair trade policies. My amendment will help level the playing field for small manufacturers by offering them additional resources to assist with the transition into growth sectors, increasing demand for high-tech jobs."

This bipartisan legislation marks the first major overhaul in a decade of the Small Business Administration's entrepreneurial development programs, such as Small Business Development Centers (SBDCs), Women's Business Centers (WBCs), and the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE). Congressman Schauer's amendment includes \$2.5 million in competitive grants for Small Business Development Centers to assist small manufacturers for the transition into high-growth sectors of the economy.

For instance, an automotive Tool and Die Company would get assistance to transition into aviation manufacturing under the grant program. Each state SBDC could apply for up to \$250,000 through the competitive grant pro-

gram to help small manufacturers. "The Michigan Small Business & Technology Development Center is currently working aggressively with small manufacturers to diversify their operations into new market areas," said Carol Lopucki, state director for the Michigan Small Business & Technology Development Center.

"Increased funding would allow our statewide network the additional resources needed to effectively ramp up and provide a turnkey solution to serve the tremendous needs of Michigan manufacturers."

"We have the tools and infrastructure in place to do this important work." It has been estimated that for every \$1 spent on these programs, there is a \$2.57 return to the Treasury. In 2008 alone, entrepreneurial development programs also helped create 73,000 jobs nationwide and 3,379 jobs in Michigan.

"As a small business owner myself, I know these programs provide the counseling and technical resources that can make the difference for an entrepreneur trying to get off of the ground," said Rep. Heath Shuler, the Chairman of the Subcommittee on Rural Development, Entrepreneurship and Trade. "I commend Rep. Mark Schauer's leadership in providing an amendment that would help small manufacturers gain the skills and resources necessary to transition into growth sectors."

### Stabenow applauds new law

U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow, D-Michigan, last week commended President Obama for signing the Fraud Enforcement and Recovery Act of 2009 into law. The new law will impose smart regulations on private mortgage brokers and lenders to prevent the same corporate frauds that helped lead to the col-

lapse of our economy. It will also provide a blueprint to increase resources for law enforcement agencies, so they can effectively prosecute those responsible for engaging in fraudulent mortgage activity. The legislation passed the Senate in late April.

"Holding irresponsible brokers and bankers accountable for their actions is a strong and clear signal to those who would contemplate risking our country's financial future for personal gain," said Stabenow. "These focused, targeted regulations will help prevent the practices that damaged the foundations of our economy. I am pleased President Obama has signed this bipartisan legislation into law. It is truly a victory for consumers and our economy as a whole."

### Provisions in the law:

- Imposes smart regulations on private mortgage brokers and lenders by amending the definition of a "financial institution" to include a "mortgage lending business." This will ensure these companies are held fully accountable under federal fraud laws.

- Lays the ground work to allow the Department of Justice and the FBI to hire 410 new prosecutors and agents, as well as double the number of mortgage fraud task forces throughout the country.

- Makes sure taxpayer money that is currently being made available to banks will not be used fraudulently or illegally. Funds distributed through TARP or the economic recovery package will be subject to the same federal oversight.

- Creates a Financial Markets Commission charged with fully investigating the near collapse of the banking system and housing market in order to learn how to prevent a repeat of this crisis. The 10 member committee will be comprised of six Democratic members and four Republican members.

### Amateur Radio Club

The Chelsea amateur radio club is a fully non-profit (501c-3) organization. They are dedicated to the continuation of Amateur Radio and the radio art. The group's members are also very active volunteers with the Chelsea police, Washtenaw County Emergency Services Department and the National Weather Service SKYWARN service. They provide emergency communications in times of natural and man-made disasters. They maintain 4 local radio repeaters, one of which has 24/7 emergency backup power. Their annual swap is the group's major source of income to fund these and other amateur radio activities.

means there will be more tough days ahead, I am confident this process will ultimately put the industry back on a path to long-term viability.

"If there is a bright spot in the news, it is that the GM Delta Township Assembly plant will likely stay open, and its world-class workers will continue producing the award-winning cross-over vehicle. I commend GM CEO Fritz Henderson for making the right call to continue investing in this facility, which I believe will help lead the way to the company's rebirth and resurgence.

"The auto industry is the engine that drives America's middle-class. That's why I'm committed to working with the administration and colleagues on both sides of the

aisle to ensure that we protect workers, parts suppliers and Michigan communities throughout the next 30-60 days, as we pave the way for GM and Chrysler to emerge from this process stronger, leaner, and more competitive than ever."

After years of struggling to compete, General Motors Corp. on Monday filed for bankruptcy with a push from the federal government. President Barack Obama, who is ready to commit an additional \$30 billion to help the automaker turn things around, hopes GM emerges quickly from bankruptcy court. He said the government would own 60 percent of the new GM, similar to its partnership with Chrysler.

U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow said bankruptcy for GM was "unavoidable."

"Like families and workers across Michigan, I am disheartened by today's news," she said. "Although

bankruptcy proved unavoidable, it is important that all of the work done by management, the UAW, bondholders and the auto task force will make a quick, efficient bankruptcy possible. I am confident that GM will emerge a stronger and viable company.

"If we have learned one thing from the global economic crisis it is that in order for our economy to thrive we must build things in this country. Now is the time for America to recommit to a strong manufacturing strategy that will rebuild our middle class."

## AN EAGLE EYE VIEW

### EMU'S GERSHAM AND KARANJA ADVANCE TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Two Eagles set personal bests in qualifying

YPSILANTI, Mich. — Eastern Michigan University track athletes Josh Karanja (Ottawa, Ontario, Canada-Napean) and Gerald Gersham (Southfield, Mich.-Southfield) and turned in the best performances of their careers last weekend (May 29-30) to qualify for the NCAA National Championship, June 10-13 in Fayetteville, Ark.

Both runners were part of a contingent of Eagles that competed at last weekend's 2009 NCAA Midwest Regional Championship at the University of Louisville's Cardinal Park.

Karanja ran a lifetime-best of 8:37.20 in the 3,000-meter steeplechase to earn runner-up honors to Louisville's Corey Thorne, who edged out Karanja by .24 seconds. Additionally, Karanja and Thorne's times were the fastest of all the NCAA Regional Championships contested last weekend. Karanja's time also ranks him fourth in EMU school history behind Corey Nowitzke, Mark Smith and Jordan Desilets.

Gersham tossed a lifetime-best mark of 59-09.75 on his fifth overall throw of the shot put to place fourth and earn an automatic ticket to the NCAA Championship. In addition, his improvement puts him fourth overall in EMU school history.

Curtis Vollmar (Grand Blanc, Mich.-Grand Blanc) and David Brent (Monroe, Mich.-St. Mary's Catholic) also competed in the steeplechase, with Vollmar finishing 14th and Brent 21st.

The 4x400-meter relay quartet of Kevin Lanier (White Lake, Mich.-Lakeland), Ackeem Forde (Haynesville, Barbados-Cambridge & Parry), Kyle Fortin (Fairview, Mich.-Fairview-CMU) and Nate Blackwell (Kalamazoo, Mich.-Central) ran a season-best time of 3:10.69, finishing 17th.

Also competing for the men at the regional were 1500-meter man Neal Naughton (Walled Lake, Mich.-Western) who finished 22nd overall in that event and high jumper Xavier Clais (Paris, France) who 13th in his specialty.

The Eastern Michigan University women's track and field team sent three student-athletes to the NCAA Regionals.

Beverly Elcock (Ft. Wayne, Ind.-Northrop) finished 11th in the 800 meters with a lifetime-best mark of 2:09.04 and just missed the field in the finals. In the pole vault, junior Jessica Novakowski (Wixom, Mich.-Walled Lake Western) cleared the opening height of 12-00.00 but was unable to clear the next bar, finishing 27th.

Junior Jasmine Gates (Virginia Beach, Va.-Tallwood) did not make the opening height in the high jump and did not advance.

job, and had always prided herself on being able to take care of her family. She paid her bills on time, worked hard, attended her kids' school events, but then suddenly she's struggling to keep food on the table and keep the lights and heat turned on," Paul recalled.

But the worse was yet to come: "Diane got sick and couldn't work for months," Paul explained. "Those two hits were followed by foreclosure and bare cupboards. Fortunately, a friend told her about Faith in Action."

As a Chelsea United Way member agency, Faith in Action receives funding to carry out their mission.

"Because of Chelsea United

Way, we are able to provide food to families, help pay utility bills when 'turn-off' notices threaten, and help people find affordable rental housing," Paul said. "Sometimes we're able to work out a deal with landlords or mortgage companies to buy more time for the family."

Chelsea United Way's 2008-2009 campaign drive continues and the organization is at working towards their goal of raising \$100,000.

This year, the organization is targeting those agencies that meet the most critical local needs in terms of food, safety, health and community impact.

"We recently held our annual review of each of member agencies," said Rick Eder, president of Chelsea United Way. "Each of our agencies' missions are compelling. The work they do for

our community is incredible. We have 21-member volunteer board and all of us are amazed at what each of the agencies are contributing to the quality of life in Chelsea." Paul sees the Chelsea United Way as key to Faith in Action's success.

"We are blessed with broad support from the congregations of Dexter and Chelsea and community members, but our single largest source of support is Chelsea United Way," she said. "We couldn't do it without them."

With the help of Faith in Action, "Diane" was able to obtain free legal services enabling her to find and make her ex-husband start paying child support. And while her life is regaining some normalcy, "Diane" and others like her know how it feels to be one-pay-check-from-homeless.

to ownership as lots X, Y and Z of block number 1, 2 and 3 on the plat, no one has ever paid any taxes on any of the roads and that's a fact even of today," he explained.

When asked why a slice of land platted as a road, but not actually a road demanded special consideration along these lines, Unterbrink explained, "They are on the plat ... the taxes are property tax we're talking about. The land, the 66 feet, never has there been any taxes paid on that 66 foot, because they were part of the plat."

He further explained that it's about "who has a right to use the roads in the plat ... that's what we're talking about."

Additionally the fire substation is back on the table after township and CAFA officials learned that they might be able to apply for stimulus money

to pay for the construction costs, although American Recovery & Reinvestment dollars typically cannot be used for upkeep, maintenance, staffing or any other recurring costs, which has been an albatross that local school districts have received part and parcel with the promise of stimulus dollars.

"That area (where the substation would be) is right in the center of the township," Unterbrink said. "If we have a fire substation there we could service the entire township."

Right now the eastern third of the township is covered by the Dexter Area Fire Department, which will change because of the millage passed in May, according to Unterbrink.

Presently the average response time for CAFA in Lima is five minutes and 58 seconds, according to Payeur.


Under the millage jurisdiction CAFA could continue contracting with

DAFD to cover the east third of Lima, but that wouldn't have to be the case with a substation in on the township owned parcels in the heart which are situated in the heart of township.

When asked how CAFA intended to pay for additional costs of a new substation or how the costs not covered by ARRA money worked in light of the recently passed millage, Payeur wasn't sure of the details.

"We would have to look at what our staffing options would be and we would really have to look at financially how we would go about doing that," Payeur said.

While the agenda for Monday's 6:30 p.m. meeting at Lima Township Hall doesn't include a vote on how to proceed with the case in the appellate court, there are public comment periods available for residents to give feedback to township officials on the matter.



They do insertion. It's not intrusive. People go in as individuals and assimilate."

He said volunteers shouldn't enter the system thinking they're going to save the world.

"I'm a guest, not an all-knowing foreigner," he said.

Leonard is the son of Carl and Peggy Leonard. He has two older brothers, Ben and Nate, and a sister, Anna.

While his family has traveled to Europe, his paternal grandfather has done engineering work in Africa, and his maternal grandfather has done medical work abroad, no one in his family has done the extensive length of time within a country that he expects to experience during his two years.

"I thrive on adventure," said Leonard. He added that one of his friends is a Peace Corps volunteer in Suriname, in South America, and he has met other people since he signed up who are in the Peace Corps.

Among the items he plans to pack are books that he hasn't had a chance to read over the course of his college studies.

"They will be a good way to pass the time," he said.

Another item will be durable sandals, and light clothing.

"Not jeans or sweat-shirts," he said. A laptop computer will accompany him, and a journal. He may be able to purchase a bicycle there, if he needs one.

"I don't want to bring anything too close to my heart," he said. He adds that he intends to buy clothing when he reaches Niger, as well as furniture, because then he won't stand out in a crowd as a new person to visit the country, showing off his wealth.

"I'm looking forward to living a little slower there," he said. He has 48 days of vacation a year, and he looks forward to spending some of that time with his brother, Ben.

Leonard admits to being a little anxious about which village or city he will

be stationed at.

"I want to know where I am going to go, and what I am going to do," he said. "But I have to be flexible and patient."

He added that he is not concerned about his safety.

"It has been a stable democracy for more than a decade," he said, adding that the Peace Corps stays in good contact with the government in case anything adverse happens.

"I am confident that this is the Lord's will for me. He will watch out for me," he said.

He added that he is not concerned about whether there will be Christian churches to worship at in the primarily Muslim country.

"My spiritual life is something that is part of me, not something that depends on show or external surroundings," he said. "Christians throughout the

ages have not had the physical (churches) and they have survived."



Hamilton won the Division 2 state title with 61 points. Williamston was the state runner-up with 38 points, while Jackson County Parma Western was third with 30 points.

Chelsea ended up 49th in the state with three points.

"They (Mason) dominated play in the first half," Orlandi said. "They were ranked honorable mention in the state and favored to win the district."


Orlandi said he told his team at halftime that they hadn't had a shutout since early May.

In the long jump, senior Victoria Kingsinger measured a 14-7, while junior teammate Christina Coffman had a mark of 13-7 for Chelsea.

In the 400-meter relay, the Bulldog team of senior Erin Benjamin, Coffman, DeTroyer and Carpenter crossed the line fourth in a school record 50.2.

In the 800-meter relay, the foursome of Benjamin, DeTroyer, Carpenter and Coffman finished second in the state with a school record time of 1:44.3.

In the 1,600-meter relay, the Bulldog group of freshman Megan Hall, DeTroyer, Carpenter and Benjamin placed second in 4:05.7.

Benjamin anchored the 1,600-meter relay, the meet's final race.

"Erin took the baton and with a great surge moved us up to a second-place finish," Clarke said. "Erin has had a brilliant four years on our team. We will miss her next season."

Clarke said Carpenter also came up big for the Bulldogs.

"Corinne had her finest day ever," he said. "She ran three PRs (personal records) in the relays and made All-State three times."

Coffman earned All-State recognition twice for Chelsea.






On May 19, Chelsea finished fourth in the Southeastern Conference White Division match hosted by Adrian at Wolf Creek Golf Course.



# State's forests are healthy and sustainable

Michigan has more than 19 million acres of forest land that provide recreation, products such as paper and lumber and beautiful vistas. Our forests protect soil, air and water quality, support biological diversity, wildlife and aquatic populations, and maintain diverse plant communities.

In recent years, many citizens and stakeholders here and throughout the world have asked that forest managers demonstrate they are practicing sustainable forest management. Sustainable forest management means meeting the needs and values of today without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs and values.

Over the past decade, forest certification systems have developed to assess forest sustainability. Each system has a set of standards or principles that address legal compliance, forest productivity, reforestation, forest health, biodiversity, planning, and soil and water protection, as well as monitoring and improving practices.

In the United States there are three prominent certification systems, each with a slightly different approach: the Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI), the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) Standards and the American Tree Farm System (ATFS).

The SFI program has its origins in the U.S. and is focused on applied forest management and on maintaining a high standard of forestry performance. The FSC program is an international system that emphasizes social values and the environmental value of natural forest ecosystems, to which it adds an important economic dimension.

## Outdoors

The ATFS program is geared toward private family forest landowners. All three certification systems require an evaluation by qualified, independent, third party auditors, and a certification certificate is issued only if acceptable conformance with the standard is demonstrated.

In 2005, at the direction of Governor Jennifer Granholm and the Legislature, the Department of Natural Resources certified its 3.9-million acre state forest system under both the SFI and FSC programs, becoming the largest single dual-certified landowner in Michigan and one of the largest in the nation.

"Michigan is now one of only 10 states dual-certified under the SFI and FSC programs," said Dennis Nezych, DNR forest certification specialist in Marquette.

To become certified, the Michigan state forest system underwent a rigorous two-week audit in September 2005, whereby on-the-ground forest practices were appraised against a set of forest certification standards that address environmental, social and economic issues.

"The auditors appraise how effectively current management maintains forest health and productivity," Nezych said. "Certification is critical to Michigan from an economic standpoint. Major wood product consumers, such as Time Warner, now require the paper they use be produced from a certified forest which is well-managed and legally harvested. Certification of Michigan forests demonstrates that our forests

are managed in a sound and comprehensive way."

In order to maintain certification, annual surveillance audits are conducted in order to verify continued conformance with the standards. Certification must be renewed every five years with a large-scale renewal audit. It is an adaptive system that strives for continual improvement.

"Forest certification keeps our forests competitive with forests in other states and around the world in terms of timber products and goods," said DNR Forest, Mineral and Fire Management (FMFM) Division Chief Lynne Boyd. "It is fundamental that we maintain certification to retain and create jobs, continue to manage forests for wildlife habitat and recreation opportunities, and maintain overall forest health."

The Michigan state forest system recently celebrated its centennial, and DNR personnel continue

to dedicate themselves to maintaining a healthy and productive forest. During the October 2008 surveillance audit, auditors noted "the sustainable forestry program of the Michigan DNR has many clear strengths which factored strongly into the finding of continuing conformance with the certification requirements."

The auditors stated, "On-the-ground collaboration between the FMFM, Wildlife, and Fisheries divisions is a very positive aspect of Michigan DNR's management, and demonstrates the staff's commitment to managing for multiple ecological values. Overall, DNR's management of the state forests is on a steady course despite the increasing challenges associated with budget reductions and staff limitations."

Consumers can identify wood products coming from certified, well-managed forests by product labeling. Both SFI and

FSC have unique labels that you can search for the next time you purchase lumber or paper products.

Before a product may carry the SFI or FSC label, all stages of the production, from the certified forest to the finished product, must be tracked and independently evaluated. Certification of Michigan's state forest system clearly demonstrates a commitment to excellence and to sustainable management, and since certification in December 2005, the DNR has demonstrated continuing conformance with the SFI and FSC standards.

\* The strength determination shall be computed from concentrations determined by 24-hour composite samples.

**AMENDMENT TO LYNDON TOWNSHIP SEWER USE ORDINANCE FOR THE SEWER DISTRICT OF THE MULTI LAKES AREA WATER & SEWER AUTHORITY**

**ORDINANCE NO. 46-D**  
The Lyndon Township Sewer Use Ordinance No. 46 enacted pursuant to the authority of Act 246 of the Public Acts of 1945, as amended, Act 191 of the Public Acts of 1939, as amended, Act 233 of the Public Acts of 1956, as amended, and Act 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, as amended, for the area served by the Multi Lakes Area Water and Sewer Authority to regulate private and public sewers, sewer connections, industrial waste pretreatment facilities and discharge of industrial waste into the Multi-Lakes Water and Sewer Authority publicly-operated treatment works and to provide for pollutant limitations, data collection, monitoring and sampling and to preserve, promote and protect the health, safety and general welfare of the persons and property within Lyndon Township; to provide for the enforcement hereof; and to provide penalties and remedies for the violation hereof, and to amend certain provisions regarding the determination of equivalent residential unit and the metering of flow and imposition of additional charges.  
The Township of Lyndon, County of Washtenaw, State of Michigan, ordains:  
Sec. 1.0 **Amendment**  
The Lyndon Township, Sewer Use Ordinance, No. 46, adopted September 10, 1996, and as amended in 2001 and March 22, 2007, is hereby amended by the addition, modification, and substitution of the provisions of this Amendment:  
Section 3.25 **Equivalent Residential Unit** is amended by the deletion of the present provision and the substitution in its place and stead of the following provision:  
**Equivalent Residential Unit** shall mean a single housekeeping unit or each unit of a multi-unit structure, which unit shall be a common unit for living and sleeping purposes and having a separate bathroom and kitchen facility. For purpose of connection fees and other charges based upon the design capacity of the system, an Equivalent Residential Unit shall mean a discharge of 6,000 gallons or part thereof of water discharged to the public sewer in any month.  
For purposes of calculation of monthly maintenance and operation charges, capital charges, debt services and improvement/replacement charges, an Equivalent Residential Unit shall mean a billing unit determined by the Authority Board, which is based upon all available information of the amount of wastewater collected, including actual metered use of non-residential users. The first determination is effective as of January 1, 2008. Future determinations shall be done on three (3) year intervals thereafter, the first being effective January 1, 2011. Users who have prepaid debt service shall be given credit for the amount of such prepayment.  
Sec. 2.0 **Reaffirmation of Sewer Use Ordinance:** The remaining Sections of Ordinance No. 46 and all amendments are hereby ratified and reaffirmed to the extent not inconsistent herewith.  
Section 3.0. The within amending ordinance shall be effective twenty (20) days after adoption and publication as provided by law.



## INDUSTRIAL AGE BRINGS GROWTH &amp; CHANGE



By the end of the 19th century, industry had come to Chelsea and with an outstanding number of employees and variety of products, these factories aided in the continued growth of the village. In addition, the owners of these industries had an important impact on the development of Chelsea. Many were involved in village government, influencing major decisions of the day; they provided a fair wage, encouraging local commerce; they accumulated their wealth, adding to the village landscape; and they raised their families here, contributing to the overall community.

Local industry and manufacturing expanded through the WWI years and into the Roaring 20's. At that time, factories were running day and night, employing 200-300 area citizens. With the Depression, there was a period of layoffs and closures in Chelsea, like elsewhere in America, but with the onset of WWII, industries once again flourished.

The Glazier began Chelsea's stove industry. Glazier Stove Works was founded in 1881 in two small buildings on Main Street. After a devastating fire destroyed the buildings, he bought up land from Main Street along the north side of the street. By 1907, the Glazier Stove Works had developed to include a factory covering more than 10 acres. At its zenith, the "Brightest of Chelsea" was a leading manufacturer of stoves, assembling 600 stoves a week and shipping all across the country. In 1908, the Glazier Stove Works was purchased in 1908.

These factories would occupy the street corner thereafter. A few years later, the Glazier's son, Grant S. Wood, who manufactured ball bearings for the Flanders Manufacturing Co., and the Flanders Motor Car Co. and the Flanders Auto Co. were also in Chelsea. The Flanders Motor Car Co. was a local supplier of automobiles and was producing the Hollier Six and Hollier Eight automobiles there. Several hundred of the automobiles were produced in Chelsea between 1915 and 1925.



A long-lasting industry in Chelsea was that of Federal Screw Works (FSW), which was founded in 1912 as the Chelsea Screw Works. In 1925, this company merged

with a company operating in Detroit since 1917. The company made special screw machine products. FSW struggled through the Depression, but during WWII it expanded into every available factory building in town. It continued to be one of Chelsea's principal employers for many years, being only recently

Another enduring manufacturer in Chelsea was Central Fibre Products. Jabez Bacon along with his son Donald Bacon and Howard S. Holmes organized it in 1920. For years, their sole product was paper-made cords used in upholstery for furniture and automobiles. In later years, they produced a number of wires used especially for vehicles. During WWII, they manufactured parts for the 80 mm anti-aircraft gun used by the U.S. Army. Central Fibre continued to operate until 1980.

Yet another long-lasting industry is the Chelsea Milling Company (CMC), which was incorporated in 1901. Harmon S. Holmes, a successful Chelsea businessman with a number of ventures, bought CMC in 1908. Since then, it has been owned and managed by a member of the Holmes family, presently by Howdy Holmes, the fourth generation. In 1930, CMC marketed Mabel Holmes' prepared baking mix. As a result, "Jiffy" Mix has become a staple in America's cupboards. During the Depression years, when other area manufacturers and companies faltered, CMC was a leading industry, employee 30 local residents.

Chelsea also experienced a steady growth in its mercantile business and professional services in the early part of the 20th century. The stores of H. S. Holmes Mercantile, Schneider's Grocery Market, Palmer Motor Sales, Winans Jewelry and Heydlauff's, to name just a few, had loyal customers and regular business. There were doctors, dentists, veterinarian services, attorneys, a theatre house, good schools, and a retirement home. Main Street was paved in 1910, and others soon followed. The street lamps were converted from kerosene to electricity, two railroads served Chelsea, and there were many other conveniences that would grow a vital village into a dynamic city of modern times.

## Reflections: Norm &amp; Lorena Wenk

Born on Jan. 18, 1918, Norm Wenk was raised speaking German on his family's 80-acre farm south of town on Fletcher Road. Like his wife, Lorena, he couldn't speak a word of English when he began first grade at the nearby one-room schoolhouse. A 1935 graduate of Chelsea High School, he had graduated from Cleary College and was working for a Chrysler dealership when war was declared.

Men go to war to defend their country and to defend the people they love. I met Lorena at an ice cream social at the Bethel Church. My best friend, Ted Brueckner introduced us. We've been married 66 years now.

I used to love hunting. Lorena and I were rabbit hunting on swamp land on Dec. 7, 1941, the day Pearl Harbor was attacked. I had my gun and she had hers. When we saw a rabbit, she yelled, "There he goes!" instead of shooting it. She left the shooting to me. Maybe that was a sign of what was coming. When we went back into her house, we heard the news about Pearl Harbor on the radio. We didn't know how to feel or what to say when FDR came on the air.

I was drafted in February 1942, and the Army sent me to Camp Wallace for basic training, and from there to Fort Crockett in Galveston, Texas. I applied for the Air Force, but didn't get in. Later, though, I was told I could transfer to the Air Force artillery. By that time, I was in the coast artillery as a member of the 319th Infantry, Serial number: 2028897.

Lorena visited Fort Crockett with my father in July 1942, and when we had some time alone, we decided to get married when I went on furlough. My furlough came up on Aug. 29.

My brother grabbed Norm off the train and took him directly to the church, to the wedding rehearsal. He didn't have time to breathe or think. Bethel Church had been destroyed during

a hurricane, and then rebuilt. Ours was the first church wedding—and it was beautiful. It was early in the war years, so people were still having fancy weddings. I wore a long white gown. Norm's brother, my brother, and Ted, the friend who introduced us, stood up with Norm. I had three bridesmaids, a flower girl, and ring bearer. Ralph and Betty Gesterle came. So did Duane and Elsie Wiest.

We were married at 7:00, with 300 people watching. After we had a cake and ice cream reception at the church, we drove to Ann Arbor to have our pictures taken. Being German, you know what we had when we returned to my parents' home: pretzels and beer! Then the shindig—the horning—began. Many, many of our friends all gathered to make as much noise as they could, banging, twanging, blowing horns, hooting and hollering on the lawn at my parents' house. That lasted into the night—or until the pretzels were gone. This was a traditional German wedding. We spent one night at a hotel in Ypsilanti, and our friends had a wedding shower, or party, after the wedding. Norm and I visited friends and relatives until he had to return to Fort Crockett.

Lorena worked in a bank in Ann Arbor while I tried to find housing on the base. It wasn't until November that I found an apartment for rent.

We lived in Crockett Courts, a travel court. The apartment was tiny. It had a Murphy bed that pulled down from the wall, a sofa, chair, my trunk, which we used for a table (I still have that trunk), and a kitchenette full of cockroaches, but we were so happy there. We made life-long friends through the Lutheran Church, and in 1968, we took our children to visit them.

# What about Karma?

I understand that the concept of karma as part of the eastern religions (mainly Hinduism and Buddhism) has many variations and can get quite complex. But basically, the teaching of karma is a belief that every action, word, and thought has consequences: consequences, not just for the person who performs it, but for those around the person, and extending to the entire universe. Also, most people who embrace karma believe in reincarnation, and therefore hold the view that every action, word, or thought also carries consequences for future lives. Such

consequences can be favorable or unfavorable, depending on whether the original action is good or bad. Some who believe in karma think of God or some deity being in control, and dishing out the consequences for people. Many, however, hold that karma is entirely the result of natural principles: The universe is relentless and will not let you get away with anything. In either case, one's karma depends entirely on the person; it's completely up to us to determine whether we improve our lot in life by good, or worsen it through evil. Can these views be reconciled with the Christian faith? Yes, to a point. The Bible says, for example,

"God will give to each person according to what he has done" (Romans 2:6, NIV translation.) God is 100% fair, and in the end He will see to it that no action, word, thought, or desire is left unaccounted for. That certainly is consistent with the teaching of karma. One could also argue that, according to the Christian faith, our actions, thoughts, and words affect all of God's creation. There is a huge difference, however, in the Christian faith: The Christian faith teaches "grace." "Grace" means, literally, "free gift." The main message of the Bible is that we don't have to get the bad consequences we

deserve. God chose to love the human race, and sent His Son to take all the bad consequences of our actions, words, thoughts, and desires on Himself—all of our "bad karma," you could say—and suffer the full price for all of them on the cross. Anyone who comes to believe in what God's Son Jesus did can look forward, not to future incarnations where life will be either better or worse, but to immediately entering eternal happiness once this life is over. Grace is the only thing that could make things turn out in our favor. While the teaching of karma is based on the belief that human beings are moral agents who are free to make

their own choices, the Bible teaches (and experience confirms) that people, as they are by nature, consistently fail to make choices that would lead to good karma. Regardless of our good intentions, actions and words, we are filled with selfish and self-seeking desires inside. We are thankful that our God has chosen not to give us what we deserve. Anyone who rejects the free grace that Jesus came to bring and insists on getting the karma they deserve, will get it—and will regret it. # VETERAN

My next stop was Fort Jacksonville, where I was promoted to become an administrator for the field artillery.

We spent that year wondering what would happen and spending every minute that we could together.

Then I was told to report to Fort Dix, New Jersey. My Dad came to say goodbye, and he brought Lorena home to Chelsea. Then I took a train out East. On New Year's Eve 1944, my friend Gibb (Gilbert Brown) and I went into New York City to see the doings at Times Square. We stayed at Fort Dix four or five days before we shipped out. I was ready to go. Everyone was patriotic, and we all wanted to serve our country.

The Ann Arbor Bank asked me to come back. Workers were in short supply. I worked until August 1, shortly before our daughter was born. It was good to have something to occupy my time. I felt awful and I cried a lot. I was so worried about what would happen to Norm. Everyone lived in fear, desperate to hear the war news, but afraid of what we'd hear.

The ship I boarded had been a German commercial boat that was commandeered in South America and revamped. It carried 300 or 400 soldiers. The trip took four days. We traveled in a convoy to LeHavre. From there we went to Camp Lucky Strike, an all-artillery camp. They sent us to a place in France that had, until recently, been occupied by the Germans. From France we went into northern Germany and we started seeing the damage from battles and bombs. Whole areas were flattened. But the fighting was over when we arrived.

Our unit, the 763rd Field Artillery, had four 155's. We'd fire our guns—they could hit targets a mile away—over French and Germans who were working to rebuild bridges. We went from place to place, following the German Army as they retreated back into Germany. It seemed to us that the German people we met were glad that the war was about to end, relieved,

you might say. We took many prisoners.

Eventually, we were assigned to a section of Bavaria. When I was in Nuremberg, I was promoted from staff sergeant to 2nd Lieutenant Battery Motor Officer with the Third Army. I dealt with many German civilians. Since I'd been raised speaking German, I could communicate well with them. It was strange to visit the land where my grandparents had been born as a member of the occupying army.

One day some Germans came to ask if they could hunt deer. "With what?" we asked. "We have hunting rifles," they told us. Colonel Ernie Studding, a captain, a driver, and I went with them to a hunting cabin and found seventeen guns. We brought them back—no Germans were allowed to have firearms of any kind in those days. I took a shine to one of those guns. I polished it and kept it clean, hoping that I'd be able to bring it home with me—but that didn't happen.

I remember Norm writing to tell me that it bothered him how some of our soldiers would go into the Germans' homes and take what they wanted. Then they'd go to the next home, see something better, smash what they'd stolen, and leave with other things. It bothered him terribly.

The Army tried to give us good meals for Christmas and holidays, but Army rations weren't always good. We were so hungry for fresh vegetables that we asked German farmers for corn. One told me, "Germans only feed corn to chickens." I still laugh at that. When I visited the area where my grandfather had been born, I looked up my relatives—but I never managed to

track any down, and I never did find out what happened to them during the war. In the late 1930s, our Pastor Thieme had left Chelsea and returned to Germany when he was told to quit preaching German in church. He didn't want to preach in English, so he left us. I looked for him, too, but I didn't find him.


The war with Japan ended on August 15, 1945, two days before our daughter was born. It took the Army two weeks to tell Norm that he had a daughter. At that time, I'd been sent to the Riviera for R&R. When they could, the Army would fly officers down to the beaches for breaks. That was some eye-opening trip! GI's didn't mind seeing the French women sunbathing. But when I finally heard the news from Lorena about our daughter, that's when I tried to get home.

Eventually, my unit was sent back to the States. We left Germany in February 1946. We boarded an aircraft carrier, and you can't imagine how happy we were to be heading home! The ship ran into a bad storm, and the crossing took us ten days. The storms drove us around the Azores and ruined our flight deck.

When I think of the war, I remember how much I wanted to get home alive. And I think of all the destruction. I heard Hitler speaking on German radios, and I heard Roosevelt speaking on German radios. I feel good that I did my service. I have no regrets at all. But the best moment of the war came when I heard that the war was over. And the second best was when I tiptoed into Lorena's bedroom and saw my daughter for the first time. She was sleeping. Peacefully.

Men go to war to defend their country and the people they love.

He said the committee had some difficulty judging how their efforts translated into results, due to the weather.


"It's very difficult to say because it did pick up nicely after the sun came out after the horrible situation in the morning," Fecho said. "But as soon as the sun came out everything picked up."

Estimates place the number of cruisers at 1,000 or so despite many of the motorcyclists skipping the cruise for obvious reasons.



