Chelsea Schools face budget crisis in 2011

State cuts could leave district with \$700K in debt by June 2012 By Crystal Havduk

A presentation to the Chelsea Schools Board of Education on Monday painted

CHIELSEA

a dismal financial

picture for the district by 2011. Teresa Zigman, executive director of finance, told the board it is possible that the district could use all of its fund equity and be nearly \$700,000 in debt by June 30, 2012.

We'll continue to travel a treacherous road for the next six to nine months,' Superintendent David Killips said.

Adding to the problem is the Michigan Legislature's inability to agree on a state budget.

Factors affecting the budget include decreased state revenue, declining student enrollment, loss of the federal ARRA funding after next year, and decreased foundation allowance from the state.

Special education funding will decrease in the 2011-2012 school year from 84 percent to either 55 percent or 25 percent, depending on whether or not voters renew the special education millage next year;

The district must also bear the burden of increased costs associated with retirement, health insurance and miscellaneous expenses such as utilities.

Zigman reviewed the three types of funds available for district expenses. The general fund is limited and controlled by the state. It can be used for any expense; however, the district makes every attempt to keep this money for student and operating costs.

Sinking funds and bond funds are created by community vote. These funds cannot be used for operating costs. Sinking funds can be used for major repairs and renovations. Bond funds can also be used for major repairs and renovations, as well as technology, buses, furniture and equipment.

Over the next week, the district will review the second proposal for Race to the Top federal funding. The first phase of funding was awarded to Delaware and Tennessee,

in other action:

•The board voted unanimously to accept two anonymous donations more than \$1,000 each - one for the Chelsea Scholarship Committee, and one for the Chelsea Orchestra program.

 North Creek Principal Marcus Kaemming and teacher Lisa Kaemming presented a lit-eracy report to the board. They focused on assessment results of current first graders who have received extra help with reading. A significantly greater number of students reached goals related to comprehension and fluency than last year's first graders. The teachers credit full-time kindergarten for providing the basis that contributed to the higher achievement.

•There are plans for the school to work with the Chelsea District Library to create a system to help parents and children select books for a particular reading level.

•The next school board meeting will be held at 7 p.m. May 24 at the Washington Street **Education** Center

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
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Local family shares their story of Lyme disease

endy Schryver has boarded an airplane bound for Texas to care for and hold the hand of a woman recovering from major surgery. This may sound typical of anyone going to the aid of a loved one, but the difference here is that Schryver has never met this person.

Nonetheless, when the telephone rang, the request was made, a plane ticket was provided and the Saline resident started to pack:

The woman she is visiting is Desiree and she is a "Lyme friend" or "Lymie," as members within their community affectionately refer to each other, and she has put out a call for help. Schryver is the one "they" call. She is the one with the information, connections, generosity and determination. She has a heart as big as the state of Texas she is visiting, and makes herself available to all of them -hundreds of them - because she is one of them.

Schryver and her family are experts on Lyme disease because they have been living the nightmare of chronic Lyme symptoms since 2000, when their youngest son Jeff;



then 9 years old, discovered a tick embedded in his scalp, five days after returning from a vacation in Tennessee. Wendy's symptoms began a year later.

The symptoms between mother and son were very different, but this is often the case with Lyme disease, as many people suffer in varying degrees with varying symptoms, thus the difficulty in identifying the disease.

After three painful and frustrating years of misdiagnoses and multiple treatments, and watching their son deteriorate neurologically, both were finally correctly tested and confirmed as infected with Lyme disease and still are fighting it.

According to the Center for Disease Control, Lyme disease is the most common arthropod-borne illness in the United States. More than 387,000 cases have been reported to the Center for Disease Control since 1982.

A CDC report from April 2010 also states that Lyme disease cases are unreported by 10-fold, which equates to more than 3,800,000 cases. In 2008, 76 cases were reported in Michigan. Jump forward two years and multiply that number by 10, and that is a lot of cases in Michigan.

The most prevalent areas affected by Lyme disease appear to be along the East Coast, with case numbers in the thousands for New York and Connecticut, but Michigan neighbor Wisconsin is considered high risk with more than 500 cases reported in 2008.

According to the ALA website, "The prevalence of Lyme disease in the northeast and upper Midwest is due to the presence of large numbers of the deer tick's preferred hosts - white-footed mice and deer -- and their proximity to humans.

White-footed mice serve as the principal "reservoirs of infection" on which many lar-

vous system. Late, delayed, or inadequate treatment can lead to the more serious symptoms, which can be disabling and difficult to treat.

The Schryvers know this well. Wendy Schryver takes more than 40 pills every day, and would take intravenous antibiotics if she could afford ït.

"I try to cram them (pills) 🖉 all in, in the hours I'm awake,' she says


One of her symptoms is chronic fatigue, with intermittent bouts of insomnia, sometimes for 40 hours at a time. A typical day for her may include chronic pain in her legs, joints and lower back, migraines, skin pain, tingling, itching and feeling hot all of the time, as well as major vision deterioration and burning feet.

'If I stand up, in less than one minute I feel like my feet are going to crumble underneath me," she says.

Her husband, and No. 1 advocate, Dan Schryver, says he notices the cognitive changes.

'She (Wendy) has lost the ability to organize," he says. "Its Wendy, everything is there, but it's like everything is dampened — only 35 percent of her is there."


Somehow, despite her symp-

Wendy Schryver may be the one at the helm of Lyme advocacy, but Dan is the family advocate. He keeps the stories straight between his son and wife, and is Wendy's backup when Lyme has her in a fog. Dan rattles out blood count numbers and bacteria names. tests and doctors and government court cases. Like his wife, he knows his "Lyme," and is passionate about awareness and the need for legislative change in Washington. Why the need for law changes? This is where the discrepancy among

val and nymphal, or juvenile, ticks feed and become infected with the Lyme disease spirochete. An infected tick can then transmit infection the next time it feeds on another host (e.g., an unsuspecting human)." Other sources cite infected persons in every state in the U.S."

Ticks hide in shady, moist ground litter, but adult ticks also can be found above the ground clinging to tall grass, brush and shrubs. They inhabit lawns, gardens and especially at the edges of wooded areas. They cannot jump or fly, and don't drop. from above.

- Ticks are acquired by direct contact, and not all ticks carry Lyme disease. Once a tick latches onto human skin, it climbs upward until it reaches a protected or creased area like the back of the knee, groin, armpit, ears or nape of, the neck.

There is a lot of controversy surrounding the subject of Lyme disease. What is it? We know it's tick-born, but is it carried by all ticks? Is it truly only rampant in certain parts of the United States? As long as you catch it right away, you can be cured, right? You would certainly see or feel a tick on you before it had time to do any damage, wouldn't you? Can't we trust the screening test if it is positive?

The answers to these questions are highly debated among medical professionals, government regulators and insurance companies. The subject of Lyme disease is exploding and, in some states, making headlines on a daily basis. There are national organizations, high-profile court cases, physicians state-hopping to be able to keep their practices, conspiracy theories and downright denial. The basic definition, however, is agreed upon.

Lyme disease, or lyme borreliosis, is an emerging infectious disease caused by at least three species of bacteria belonging to the genus Borrelea. The disease is named after the village of Lyme, Conn., where a number of cases were identified in 1975. Early symptoms may include fever, headache. fatigue, depression and a characteristic circular skin rash or bull's eye. Left untreated, later symptoms may involve the

toms, she is fueled by those who need her. First and foremost is her own Tamily, then her "Lyme" family.

'My phone is available 24 hours a day," she says. Dan chimes in, "It's not , unusual to wake up at 3:30 in the morning and find her out on the porch, talking to a Lyme friend who is having a bad night.'

 Those in her Lyme community find her irreplaceable. They gush over her, "can't say enough" about her, "don't know what they would do without her," "thank God" for her, even send her airplane tickets to Texas.

Most of these people are people Wendy has never met, but continually reaches out to, to help because Lyme Resources are so limited when it comes to treatment. Schryver has a Facebook page strewn with articles, court hearings, and postings from physicians' offices, medical journals, investigation findings and fundraising events for awareness. She writes to officials, gets petitions signed and answers her constantlyringing phone.

With all of her illness, what is it that drives her? She says, "A mother should never have the same disease as her child. I know. I see every day what my child goes through. I know. the pain he is in.

Wendy Schryver may be a Lymie, but she is a mother first. This is another bond she forms within the Lyme community. With so many. children afflicted, there are concerned and panicked parents with each case.

Recently, while researching Lyme disease on the web. Schryver noticed the comments of a woman named Jennifer from Rhode Island with a very sick 13 year-old daughter whose health had deteriorated greatly over the last 10 months.

She had nobody, I had to help her," Schryver said. Schryver went immedi-

ately into advocate mode. drafted an e-mail to a contact at the Rhode Island Lyme Association and found a doctor in Boston available to take the appointment. Within 24 hours, the young girl had been driven to Boston and started in treatment. Jennifer posted onto Wendy's Facebook page, 'No words can express my

medical professionals and regulatory guidelines begins.

The Infectious Disease Society of America guidelines state the treatment for Lyme disease to be no longer than two weeks at the onset, and possibly four weeks if needed of oral antibiotics. Physicians specializing in Lyme disease, who have treated thousands of cases, also prescribe antibiotics, but for more like two years intravenously, instead of four weeks orally.

. The argument is ongoing regarding the best course. treatment for sufferers of the disease, and whether chronic Lyme disease even exists. This is the main issue for the Schryvers and many other families nationwide. They live Lyme disease every day, year after year. For them, there is no question that chronic Lyme exists.

It took seven years for the Schryvers son, Jeff, to test positive "enough," according to" CDC guidelines. Until then, he only showed a "strong antibody response," which, though was specific to the disease, wasn't a definitive test result.

The Schryvers feel confident that had there been a better test nine years ago when their son was bitten, he would be cured today. In fact, the CDC in April reported "the problem is that these are antibody tests and Borrelia burgdorferi, the bacterium that causes Lyme disease, has been shown to be an intracellular pathogen that has the ability to evade the immune sys tem. Therefore, antibody tests cannot always appropriately indicate whether or not a person is infected. Even the ALA states patients are restricted to 'limitations of currently available serological (blood) tests."

Says Dan from his chair, 'They'(IDSA and CDC) won't even listen," expressing frustration about the entire ordeal. After years of trying, there aren't many local physicians available to treat long-term Lyme because of the IDSA guidelines. And if the treatment is received elsewhere by a physician who is willing to treat, there isn't an insurance company that will cover the treatment because it's in violation of the IDSA.

The Schryvers travel out of state every six months to see their "Lyme" doctors. In the last five monthsalone, they have traveled to

Connecticut, South Carolina and Washington, D.C. They went on five trips last year totaling 5,000 car miles, none of it covered by insurance. They follow their doctors from state to state, as they are forced to move their practices.

Dr. Joseph Jemsek is one of the more renowned "Lymeliterate" doctors in the United States. Between 2003 and 2006; he took on an average of 80 new patients per month coming from 46 different states at his clinic in North Carolina. He was eventually sanctioned by the North Carolina Medical Board for failing to follow IDSA guidelines in the treatment of Lyme disease. This event allowed a lawsuit to be filed by Blue Cross Blue Shield. to recoup fees they had paid for unauthorized treatment. Jemsek was forced to file bank ruptcy. He moved his practice to South Carolina, and his patients followed.

Lyme doctor's like Jemsek have a very loyal following. The Lyme movement is getting so large and so controversial that it's getting more and more coverage. One such vessel of information is the 2010 Academy Award semifinalist film "Under Our Skin" by Open Eye Pictures (www.underourskin.com). It's the winner of four different national and international film festivals, and is sweeping the country with community showings this month in conjunction with May as Lyme Disease Awareness Month The film sets Wendy Schryver into advocate mode.

She and her family have arranged to have a screening of "Under Our Skin" in Saline_ as part of a Lyme Disease Awareness Night.

"I want people to be educated so they don't have to go through what we've gone. through," Schryver says, "If one person learns something. from our awareness night, then it will have been a success."

Summer is coming. The awareness night is for parents and other adults who want to ___ has her family behind her. be informed. The film is not recommended for young children.

. If you garden hike, camp, hunt, work or spend a lot of time in woods, brush or overgrown fields, when temperatures exceed 45 degrees F. here are some preventative measures you can take:

 Wear enclosed, tight weave and light-colored clothing to easily spot ticks, remember ticks will crawl from clothes looking for exposed skin.

Scan skin and clothes. often

Stay on cleared trails. Use insect repellent with DEET (Diethyo-meta-toluamide) on skin and clothes, though for children follow product directions or advice from your pediatrician.

Avoid sitting on the ground or on stone walls.

Keep long hair tied back. Do a final, full body tick check when leaving the outdòors

Clothes can be spun in a hot dryer for 20 minutes to kill any unseen ticks.

A shower and shampoo will remove crawling ticks, but not attached ones, inspect carefully alterward, keeping inmind nymphal licks are the size of poppy seeds, adult ticks the size of apple seeds.



U of M music therapy program helps cancer patients

Tony Samuels will tell you that although he doesn't wish it on anyone, cancer is the best thing that ever happened to him.

The Plymouth resident was diagnosed with a brain tumor in January 2009 and was given about a year to live.

Not only has he outlived his diagnosis, but he also has recorded an album and appeared on stage several times."

Samuels says he has made the most of his cancer diagnosis and embraced what's really important to him, which is his family, friends, faith and music.

"Cancer has changed my life," he says. "There have been so many wonderful lessons from it."

Including a vision, he says, during which God told him, "You can better know me by knowing my people."

Samuels took this vision to heart, and says he made sure to learn more about all the terrific people who cared for him during his monthlong stay at the hospital.

"I made it a point to get to know all of my caregivers," he says. "I put God's words to good use.'

Every aspect of his life has changed because of it, he says. Samuels will tell you that he went through a number of therapies at the University of Michigan Comprehensive **Cancer Center**.

But his wife, Joann, found another one.

And although all of the thera-

pies were helpful in one way or another, music therapy provided the key to his steady recovery.

'My job and my identity had been taken from me. I didn't know who I was anymore." Samuels says of his malignant brain tumor. --

Rediscovering music changed all of that.

"Music therapy sessions provide a familiar, comforting and non-threatening form of comprehensive treatment for patients and families at the U of M Comprehensive Cancer Center," says Megan Gunnell, a music therapist there.

"The potential of creativity in song writing, for example, or the soothing effects of music to help promote relaxation can contribute to the healing process overall," she says.

Patients and families have been enjoying the benefits of music therapy at the hospital for about four years.

And in Samuels' case, music therapy was so successful that it helped him to refocus his life and embrace something that he had forgotten was once important to him.

Prior to his diagnosis, Samuels admits he was a workaholic who spent little time with his family.

'We used to share a roof; we now share a life," he says of his 25-year marriage and relationship with his two special-needs children.

Samuels says before the brain tumor, he was on the road a lot as vice president of sales for Teradata Co., then he became an industry vice president,

which meant even more travel. 4 What cancer taught him was a sense of purpose, he says.

Samuels says he had been in a garage band while in college, and had songs in a folder that had been collecting dust for years. So he brought them to his first music therapy session with Gunnell.

This led to a session in a recording studio where he made an album titled "At Times."

Samuels describes his music as pop-rock and his lyrics as "intense."

He has been invited to play and sing at two of his former company's annual conferences, which included being the opening act for Cheap Trick in Cancun, Mexico. He also recently performed at The Voices Gallery at the cancer center.

His album is for sale for \$6.99. Through June 1, proceeds from . the album's sale will be donated to the cancer center.

"For Tony, these music therapy creative song writing and music making sessions also offered him a renewed sense of purpose," Gunnell says.



The first: Finally passing a smoking ban that went into effect May 1 for workplaces and restaurants.


The second: Passing a ban on texting while driving, which will take effect July 1.

Have you ever been driving down the road in your commu-nity and seen something that you felt needed action or you thought that something should be done, either on the local or county level, but then felt frustrated because you weren't sure how to report the problem? Well, Heritage Newspapers' new access to SeeClickFix.com may not guarantee the problem gets solved, but it will make sure it gets some attention — and that's always the first step

sure it gets some attention - and that's always the first step In finding solutions.

The types of problems can vary. Many may involve your local streets. The Oakland Press, part of the Journal Register Co., owner of Heritage Newspaces, has been editorializing for the past couple of years that the state needs to put a much higher priority on fixing our horrible roads. So far, there's been a lot of debate but few, if any efforts to actually fix our deteriorating highways.

That's ridiculous and a poor testament to our legislators. However, until we can wake up and get our Lansing leaders moving in the right direction, the website could serve as a medium for focusing on particularly rough roads.

Maybe there are potholes that pose a dangerous threat because they could cause an accident or severely damage your vehicle. This online feature will now allow residents throughout the area to report and identify problems such as potholes, broken streetlights, blight and more.

The tool is intended to highlight non-emergency problems that need addressing and utilizes Google Maps to pinpoint the location of the problem. Moderators in high places then will spot your note and target a solution in the proper municipality.

This expanded tool from SeeClickFix.com continues the effort to empower the community to improve itself and strengthens the partnership between the newspaper and area residents, SeeClickFix, which will be added to our home page at www.heritage.com, requires a summary and street address of the problem, with additional space for an optional description, image, name and e-mail address. You can then check out the map and examine problems identified by others.

We look forward to partnering with community officials in getting problems identified and hopefully fixed. As Kevin Haezebroeck, senior publisher of JRC's Michigan publications, notes "It's a great first step in allowing the residents to participate in the process of improving their communities." More than 30,000 problems from speeding school buses to bad drinking water and blighted buildings have been reported by residents using the tool across the United States. More than

Those who decide to take us up on this offer are cautioned to be sure that they report property-type problems. Complaining about a neighbor's dog barking or his music playing too loud isn't a good use of this Internet tool. When reporting problems, people should be as detailed as possible as far as what they believe is wrong and exactly where it is located. This is your chance to not only relieve some frustration

with problems in your community, but also spotlight them for

Smokers being encouraged to, quit altogether

Debra Carline said she has saved nearly \$5,000 over the past 21/2 years.

While smoking a pack of cigarettes every day at a cost of more than \$5 per pack, her habit has contributed to the deterioration of her health, as well as her pocketbook.

It has been 2 1/2 years since Carline stopped smoking and not only has her health improved, but she has even found a great alternative to the money she has saved since kicking cigarettes.

"My husband was able to take me on a trip to Alaska to celebrate one year without smoking because of all the money I've saved from buying cigarettes," Carline said.

With the new smoking ban in effect since May 1, Carline, said that smokers should take advantage of the opportunity . to follow the route she has

"I hope to inspire one more person to just take advantage of this situation and to look at this as one more opportunity to quit smoking," she said. "Smoking these days consumes so much time and energy. Trying to plan where you're going to have that next smoke is very time consuming and exhausting."

Carline admitted that quitting was one of the hardest things she had ever done, having been a smoker for 37 years prior to quitting in 2007.

"I was the poster child for not quitting," Carline said. "I absolutely loved to smoke. I enjoyed every moment of it. Unfortunately, I started to get sick from it. I began to lose. circulation in my leg. I had to have an aunt have her leg amputated from smoking. It wasn't until I got chronic bronchitis that I started thinking about quitting."

While some people may explore the option Carline did, others simply create new ways of going about getting in their drags now that smoking in public places is illegal in Michigan. William Toney, a self-

described frequent patron of Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor bars and night clubs, said that he will start to visit more places that have outdoor patios to accommodate smokers.

Smoking ban presents challenges

"I don't have a major problem with the law because while I do like to smoke in public places, I understand that other people don't and shouldn't be stopped from going out because other people want to smoke." he said. "A lot of places are designating smoking areas and allow people to reenter clubs now after they leave for a smoke. I like going to places like Aubree's and Tap Room because of their patios anyway, so I'll keep going to those places."

Ypsilanti's Savoy, formerly known as Club Divine, recently rebranded itself as a live music venue, and a large number of its customer base are smokers. Kim Anderson, general manager of Savoy, said that she hasn't seen a drop off in clientele because of the smoking ban.

"Quite a few people have made reservations for upcoming shows already and they've said that they want to come to a smoke-free environment."

Anderson said. "(The smoking ban) is one of those things where it's the good with the bad. Some people will love it and other people will hate it.

"The state did it at a good time of the year. If they did it at the middle of winter it would be different. People will be used to it in the winter and won't have a huge problem just going outside to smoke. It also makes downtown Ypsi look a little more lively because a lot of people are standing around outside instead of staving inside the establishments.

Anderson also said that the 700-person venue has seen a greater audience from people in surrounding cities because people feel they get an added value with the live venue since the ban was enacted.

We're also looking at bringing in national acts and I think the ban will attract a lot of them to venues like this." Anderson said. "But only time will tell how successful it will be and how receptive people are to it all."


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
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
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


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Service helps mothers cope with loss

Mother's Day is a day to celebrate new life and to cherish offspring.

But for those with fertility problems, or those whose children have suffered an untimely death, it can be one of the cruelest reminders on the calendar

The Rev. Doris Sparks of Zion Lutheran Church in Chelsea said that she learned that a parishioner did not attend church services on Mother's Day because it was too painful to see the mothers recognized, and to feel her own loss anew.

"I was talking to a friend who said she doesn't go to church on Mother's Day because she has fertility problems and it just breaks her heart," Sparks said. "I've talked to other women who have lost children in utero. They've tried to have children, but they haven't conceived. In their hearts, they are mothers." Sparks decided to have a special service titled "Mothers With Empty Arms," for grieving mothers. This year, nearly 20 people attended. During the service, Sparks recalled Jesus' pain when Mary

recalled Jesus' pain when Mary and Martha were in mourning over their brother Lazarus' death. She also told the story of Horatio Spafford, who wrote

the words to the hymn "It Is Well With My Soul."

Spafford was a prominent lawyer in Chicago with a large and growing family until his only son died of scarlet fever. soon followed by the Chicago fire. His four daughters were later killed when the boat they were traveling to England on collided with another boat and sank,

He wrote "When Peace Like a River," as the tune is also referred, when the ship he sailed on passed over the water where his family had drowned.

"It is hard for us to predict how we would feel under these circumstances," Sparks said. "But we can be certain that God does know our pain and God will carry us when we can go no longer."

Sparks blessed each person who attended with a special individual blessing before the ceremony's conclusion. Among those who attended

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the ceremony was Kathy Pantolin, whose son was diagnosed with Trisomy while still in the womb. She learned that he would likely be stillborn. He died after 28 weeks. At the time. Pantolin was also carrying his twin sister.

She and her husband named her stillborn son William. something that is not always done, and had a funeral service for him, which Sparks officiated.

"We gave him a name and honored him," Sparks said. "He was alive. He just wasn't alive outside his mom."

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Scott and Sally O'Neal drove all the way from Canton to attend the service.

"The service was very nice." Sally O'Neal said. "It was nice to be with people who understand what we are going through."

She said that their daughter died 37 weeks into the pregnancy when the umbilical cord wrapped around her neck.

"It will be two months on Tuesday," she said.

She said she found out about the service when her boss e-mailed her with information about it. The couple has attended a service like it at St. Joseph's Hospital in Saline to help them with their grief.

They held a funeral service for their daughter at the hospital, during which time they named her Ike because that was how they referred to her when they were talking to her

Sally said she plans to write a letter to the church thanking them for doing the service.

"I want to thank them for thinking of us mothers," she said.

Sparks said she planned to offer the service every year.

"You do what you need to do," she said. "The person who suggested this service to me is a friend of mine. She didn't come. She goes out of town for Mother's Day."

Sparks said that the entire framework for the service is complete.

"And the hope is always there." she said.

Heers to display outdoor sculptures

Local artist Wendel Heers will present his outdoor sculpture exhibit fitled "Site and Sound" from May 15 through June 19 at his home in Ann Arbor. An exhibit of indoors sculptures will also be on display at the River Gallery in Chelsea.

A reception will take place from 2 to 5 p.m. May 15. Guided tours will take place Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Set carefully on every surface around his studio, among rusted tools bearing histories from a now distant time, are the granite rocks that Heers harvests as he moves through his world.

They are entrancing though common forms, subtle in color, even subtler as variations on a uniformly rounded egg-like form. Neither exotic nor precious, they are mundane and easily overlooked. In their calm, near anonymity they seem to simply be,

On the farm where he grew up in Minnesota, these stones would be pulled aside and stacked into walls

and foundations, or tossed into the gulley as a hindrance. "The utility of a wall comes with its own rules and requirements, but when utility alone rules, we lose something essential in the capacity to think," Heers said.

When Heers picks up these stones, he enters the open space of play, free curjosity nurturing a natural, keen intelligence.

"Material reality talks back to us, resisting our projections, correcting our casual ideas about how the world should be," he said.

When Heers takes one of these stones and joins it to the fragment of a cast iron farm implement, he may not quite know where he is going, but he understands that to get there he must contend with the unbendable rules of the physical world, gravity, mass and density. His play is not an escape from those rules, but an elaboration of them, using the physical qualities of his materials to alter their relationships.

Here is the heart and mind of an impeccable craftsman,

The point of contact where intelligence meets complexity is, literally, in the joint. The fit. The capturing technique. One form held to another through an understanding of what its material nature allows it to do. How heated metal expands just enough to firmly clasp a stone when it cools. How a tree heals the scar of a cut limb to draw tight around a stone face. How drying ash logs, laced in trails from another kind of user, will shrink around a spike, holding firm the notched logs to become. an elegantly soaring tower.

There is a gracious and accommodating narrative embodied in how these pieces come together and what they become in their new state. This polished stone turns on a spindle and that metal collar is spring loaded to react to pressure. This massive sculpture can be taken apart and reassembled. Pegs, collars, joints can be separated. Fittings can be reversed.

"The task of gaining an adequate grasp of the world depends on our doing stuff in it. Our vision is improved by action, and the quality of ourthoughts follows," Heers said, "The pleasures of clear vision and any hope for a less solipsistic consciousness depend upon a closer apprehension of the world as it really is."

Heers lives and works in a daily gathering of waiting encounters with tools, objects and materials, their makers and their users, past and future. He meets the world in these encounters with balance. patience and precision.

Brothers put Chelsea on map with car

While archiving Chelsea history material over the past several years at the McKune Library. I kept coming across references to automobiles made in Chelsea.

The Hollier, made by the Lewis Spring and Axle Company, was one with which I was familiar. The Globe is mentioned in several articles from the old newspapers, but I believe it was made in Jackson.

Then there appeared in two papers a mention of the Welch automobile. One of the papers was written by Ms. Nina Bell Wurster and contained a detailed description of the two Welch Brothers who started the company in Chelsea in 1903.

Following leads from various sources, 1 contacted the Skillman Automobile Division of Detroit Public Library, and they sent me a collection of papers regarding the company. Unfortunately, all of the information was about the Welch cars made in Pontiac or Detroit after the company was bought out and incorporated into General Motors.

My next source was the Antique Automobile Club of America in Hershey, Pa. They sent me the information that I was hoping to receive. The documents contained photographs of newspaper ads for Welch cars made in Chelsea. They identified the Welch "Tourist." made in 1903 as "perfectly safe and reliable in any weather."

It appears that two brothers, A.R. and Fred Welch set up a bicycle shop in Chelsea in 1901 and soon began experimenting with automobile engines. They put together a car to test their engines and had it ready for the road that year.

They had such success that they offered the Welch "Tourist" at the Chicago auto show in 1903. The Chelsea Manufacturing Company built the car. Unfortunately, within the next year financial problems cropped up and the Chelsea plant was closed.

However, the brothers decided to move their plant to Pontiac and in 65 days put together a four-cylinder car for the 1904 Detroit auto show. It was a huge car that featured a telescoping steering wheel that could be adjusted from the inside, shaft drive, hexagonal hood-and radiator shell,

By 1907 they offered a convertible model and an open touring car. These cars ranged in price from \$4,000 to \$8,000 and sold well at the time.

A larger plant was built to meet the demands of the public for these cars and they introduced a smaller model named the "Welch Detroit."

Near the end of 1909, General Motors took in the company and expectations were high that the Welch would be their leader. The death of Fred Welch that year also spelled the end of the Welch car in the future for General Motors. The Harrah Antique Automobile Collection in Reno, Nev. Has a 1909 Welch car in its collection.





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
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

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Byrnes' class teaches cooking basics for seniors

State Rep. Pam Byrnes, D-Dist.52, is a big fan of slow cookers. Meals are nutritious. inexpensive and easy to prepare - just put ingredients in and let them cook for a few hours and a hot meal is waiting later in the day.

Byrnes has launched a new project through the Pamela Byrnes Foundation. which supports diverse cultural and educational experiences to improve the lives of Washtenaw County residents.

The new program provides classes in basic cooking with a slow cooker. A nominal feeincludes a free 2-quart slow cooker and "starter kit" ingredients, and gives participants confidence to prepare healthy meals on a budget.

"In a time when people are struggling with the challenges of a very difficult economy, this is a program that can help people balance an important part of their life.", A new class, which is

already full, is set for May 15 at the Dexter Senior Center. 7720 Ann Arbor St.

Classes are planned for Ypsilanti and Ypsilanti Township in coming weeks. A full Washtenaw County schedule will be released in the summer.

A similar class held at the Chelsea Senior Center with 20 participants was "a big success," according to Byrnes' husband, Kent Brown.

"We're primarily focusing on senior centers to begin with and would be happy to work with groups anywhere in Washtenaw County," he said.

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



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
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




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Ouimet files candidacy for state House








Physical play in soccer is part of the game -as long as it's clean

There was a line on the soccer-field Thursday night when Saline hosted Chelsea in a soccer match between two very good teams. That line wasn't in front of the goal or cutting across the middle of the field. It was an imaginary line between physical soccer and dirty play



And from where I was standing that line wasn't crossed by either team.

There were more than a few instances where fans from both sides would stand and yell about a physical play. Bodies were certainly flying and the game was stopped a couple times because of injuries. No one will deny that this was a physical soccer game.

And so was the Chelsea-Dexter game earlier in the year. That's what happens in games between rivals and in games matching two good teams. Playing physical is part of the game and more often than not in girls' soccer, the more physical team. wins the game.

We never teach to play dirty, but we also know that physical play especially in high school soccer is what it's about," said Saline coach Dana Restrick. "You have to play physical to win games. And unfortunately in soccer, if you play physical and misjudge something it can end up in a foul. That may look dirty, but it's never the intent of any of our players.

The Hornets challenged every ball and if a Chelsea play-


Saline coach Dana Restrick said the Hornets played one of their better games so far this season.



Someone very close to me has had significant health problems arise over the last few weeks. One day everything was fine and now the future seems cloudy and unknown since we don't have a prognosis.

My mind drifts off into space as I sit and worry about things I cannot change. I have a front-row seat to this show and it's one I don't want to watch. I'm also witnessing the psychologi-

cal toll this has had on this person along with the physical concerns. TAYLOR MADE

For more than a year now, you've come to know my 9 year-old son in some of my stories. He's a smart, funny and full of life character that touched my soul even before he was born. Ricky suffered his first seizure six weeks ago and has had two more in the last week. All of his seizures occured in the public eye and most people in my town already know about it which is why I bring up his health issues in my column.

I'm thankful for the ambulance services, paramedics and neurologists that have helped us. Yet, we're not alone. There are many of you out there who have health issues and it makes me wonder what would happen should you get hurt while

enjoying the outdoors.

I was so consumed about our health issues that I began to think about how lucky we are to have the University of Michigan Hospital so close. But, whether it's U-M, St. Joseph's or your local clinic we must be thankful that a short drive to the hospital can make the difference between living and dying.

So, my question to you is this: Do you have an emergency plan when you go hiking, fishing, hunting or camping?

It's taken a medical issue to scare me half to death in realizing that I need an emergency plan. I can only guess that you might need one to.

This plan would include telling people where you're going to be and for how long. It's very possible that you could get seriously hurt and not get to help in a timely fashion. You really should have people know where you are in case of a medical emergency

Does your cell phone work in the area you're going to be at? If not, then you might consider an Emergency GPS beacon. These devices can save your life by simply pushing a button if you get lost or seriously injured. This device will notify search and rescue and give your exact GPS location anywhere in the world.

So, you've brought along your cell phone and your GPS unit to help prevent you from getting lost. But, did you wear your safety strap while deer hunting 20 feet in the air? Would you believe that I didn't for the longest time? For

13 years I climbed telephone poles for a living. I traveled the country stringing fiber optic lines and cable TV. I worked from Miami after Hurricane Andrew to Lake Havasu in Arizona and

everywhere in between. My job was inherently dangerous and I scoffed at wearing a safety belt while hunting.

That all changed about five years ago after meeting someone who fell from a tree stand. I helped a real estate client purchase a condo in a new development. The sales person was a husband and father to a couple of kids. We talked about hunting from time to time and he told me about failing from a tree while treestand hunting. He fell and has no feeling from his abdomen on down and is confined to his wheel chair for the rest of his life. This story changed my views on hunter safety and I hope it

makes you think twice as well. I had another experience that scared me half to death about 10 years ago. An older friend of mine worked all the time and hardly had the opportunity to hunt. I convinced him to come out bow hunting one afternoon and things were going great.

Well, they were until he collapsed,

I asked if he was alright and his answer still resonates inside of me. He said "No." My friend didn't tell me that he had blood sugar problems. He needed something really sweet and he didn't have anything. It just so happens that I love sweets and had a handful of Jolly Ranchers in my backpack.

These simple candies saved him from going into shock, a coma or perhaps even death. We were almost a mile away from my car and the nearest road. It would have been impossible to get him out by myself.

This could happen to you so be careful out there. Please make an emergency plan and don't forget to use it. It doesn't work if you're lazy, so please be diligent.

The summer season is fast approaching so please consider wearing your life preservers while boating. There's a reason why they call them "life preservers." And please consider mak-ing an emergency plan whether you enjoy camping, boating, fishing or hunting. You owe it to yourself and the ones who love you the most to live.



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



On the other hand, you'll get tired faster if you're hungry. Have a light snack a couple of hours before, preferably one that includes protein and complex carbohydrate. For example, peanut butter on whole-grain bread, low-fat yogurt and fruit, or a handful of nuts and raisins will provide energy without weighing you down. • Drink up before you lace up. Dehydration is not only detrimental to performance; it can be dangerous to your



Wellman had no chance. It was a perfect shot.



The SEC Invitational is Wednesday and hosted by Ann. Arbor Pioneer.








Farmers petition for bridge repair

Klinger Road Bridge remains closed due to WCRC budget strains By Lisa Allmendinger Heritage Newspapers

James Bristle, Ted Hinderer and Trent Satterthwaite own and farm property surrounding the closed Klinger Road Bridge in Lima Township. For the last four years,

they've driven LINA TOWNS their

heavy farm equipment around the short, closed structure, which crosses Mill Creek and cuts through their fields.

Generally, these fields are planted with corn and soybeans, they say.

All three farmers have waited patiently for the bridge to be fixed, expecting the Washtenaw County Road Commission would take care of it.

Meanwhile, to make a living, they've had to drive sometimes three or four miles around the closed structure at 20 miles an hour on busy roads with expensive and heavy farm equipment. And they say they are faced with the consternation of motorists - who don't want to travel that slowly - and speed past them.

Traveling back and forth across the Klinger Road Bridge,~ which is about 15 feet wide and 28 feet long, kept them off the main roads, they say.

'That small bridge is important to us," Satterthwaite says. Hinderer agrees, and says

he's had a lot of "close misses." with cars. Bristle says almost half of

his property is on the other side of the Klinger Road from his farm.

"Although there were no houses on this road, (when it was open) there was a lot of traffic that went across this bridge," he says, cutting through from Scio Church to Sager Road.

What's new?

Recently, the farmers discovered that the WCRC does have plans for the bridge.

The commission has applied for Michigan Department of Transportation funding that would pay to have the bridge removed completely.

Not replaced. In fact, applications for funding for five bridge projects

- through the MDOT Local Bridge Program - were unanimously approved by the Road Commission board last week.

Funding was requested for the removal of Klinger Road Bridge, along with the replace. ments of two bridges on Austin Road in Saline Township, one on McGregor Road in Dexter Township and one on Ford Boulevard in Ypsilanti Township.

Klinger Road Bridge was included on the project list because after five years, the federal government takes a bridge off its books and renders it ineligible for federal funding.

Such was the case with the Bell Road Bridge in Dexter Township.

If the Klinger Road Bridge project is funded, it will be removed, the stream bank and bed restored to its natural flow, and permanent closure barriers will be placed at the stream crossing, says Steve Puuri, WCRC executive director

Rather than relying on second-hand information about the fate of the bridge, the three

farmers, as well as Washtenaw **County Farm Bureau President** Ken Siler, spoke to the commission on May 4.

 The news they heard wasn't good, and the problem is funding.

According to a recent MDOT press release, the state reduced its 2011-2014 road and bridge program.

"Due to declining state gas tax and vehicle registration revenues, MDOT is faced with a shortfall of at least \$84 million to match available federal funding beginning in 2011," the release states.

In fact, more than 575 bridge repair projects will be delayed due to the lack of funding.

Funding bridge repairs

Federal money is given to the state, and MDOT receives 70 percent, while local agencies, such as road commissions compete for 25 percent.

Washtenaw County is one of about 83 counties in the state and about 650 cities and villages that compete with project applications for less than \$50 million statewide, Puuri says.

"Over the last 20 years, that pot of money hasn't increased." he says. "Yet there are more and more project needs throughout the county'

Puuri says there are 111 bridges throughout the county. Of that number, 43 are in good condition, 30 are in fair condition. 22 are in poor condition and 16 are in critical condition.

In addition to Klinger Road Bridge, there are two others in the county that are closed.

Once a bridge hits the 4-ton weight limit, if it deteriorates further, the next step is closure.

According to the state's funding formula, Public Act 51, the **Road Commission must secure**

50 percent of its funding for a project from another source. This is where the townships come into play.

Each year, representatives from the WCRC and the townships meet to set priorities for roadwork to take place in each municipality. What's picked is based on how much money is available.

In Lima Township's case, for the last few years, about \$30,000 has been allocated by the township for road projects and it's been used for dust control on its dirt roads.

This year: WCRC officials brought six gravel road projects and three drainage projects to township officials, but it's up to the township to decide which ones are completed.

In addition, the WCRC and Lima Township officials have discussed the condition of the municipality's six bridges.

"We've had more than one discussion with Lima Township and we stand always willing to see if there is a way forward; we'd be willing to meet with you and the township," WCRC board chairman David Rutledge told the farmers

Hinderer asked, "What's the plan for Waldo Road and Sager Road bridges? If those are closed, we'll be doing zigzags across the township.

In the southern end of the township, the Lima Center Road Bridge has a 4-ton limit. and if upcoming spring inspections find a need to reduce the

weight limit further, the bridge will be closed.

Dancer Road Bridge, along with Klinger Road, are already closed.

Liberty Bridge has a 7-ton limit, while the Guenther Road Bridge, south of Liberty has a 20-ton limit and nearby Jerusalem Road Bridge has a 42-ton limit.

"Priorities have to be set." Puuri says, and those decisions are up to the township.

The farmers haven't given up, however. They plan to speak to township officials about the situation to see if there's anything that can be done. Lisa Allmendinger can be reached at 877-995-NEWS



FINANCIAL FOCUS **Beneficiaries List – Update Frequently To Avoid Problems**

Every year, it seems, stories "emerge about the "wrong" person inheriting money probably intended for someone else. More often than not, this happens because the original owner of the accounts or property failed to update his or her listed beneficiaries. It's not uncommon to overlook this vital task, but if you're at all concerned about who will-

inherit your IRAs or other property, make sure you check the beneficiaries listed on your accounts to ensure they reflect vour current intentions.

Start with your IRAs and any other pension plans you may have. Are the designated beneficiaries and contingents, or secondary beneficiaries, listed according to your wishes?

Problems commonly arise because former spouses or deceased relatives are still

named when the account holder dies. In such cases, the courts have ruled that the designee inherits your IRA money - even if it is a long-forgotten ex-spouse or the relative who never returned your lawnmower. If a beneficiary has died, the money reverts to the estate and will be subject to any probate taxes and fees.

Annual Ritual

While it may sound like drudgery, you might want to make it at least an annual task to ensure that the names of deceased relatives are removed and that other names and addresses are updated. Provide very specific identification by Social Security number, if possible. And keep track of social events, updating names as people marry or divorce. In addition, be very specific if you have relatives with similar

names - use middle names. initials or birthdates to make your intent clear. No one else will be able to straighten things out after you are gone. The beneficiary named on your IRA will inherit it, for example, no matter what your will says.

Inheritance errors are not limited to IRAs, of course. Check your insurance policies. investment accounts and any other aspects of your estate that list specific beneficiaries.
