## Board plans for policy revisions

The Chelsea School District Board of Education received more details about the county-wide consolidated transportation system at its meeting Monday. However, Superintendent David Killips said that no decision to join the WISD is being considered right now.

The district may decide to participate in the entire program, or partner with the WISD to transport special education students.

"It's clear that we have to cut costs in transportation in some way," Killips said. "But safety is always a priority."

Board members also held first readings for potential new policies and policy revisions on topics such as parent participation in Title I programs, school sponsored publications, security, Internet usage, and chaperones for student trips.

### In other board action:

After weeks of negotiations, the Michigan legislature passed a package of bills last week reforming the pension system for public school employees. One bill encourages older public school teachers to retire by boosting their pension benefits, allowing the state to hire younger teachers at lower pay rates. A second bill passed at the same time requires public school employees to contribute 3 percent of their salaries toward their eventual retirement. Killips expects that a list of retirees will be coming before the board in the near future.

## Remembering Morgan

Friends, family honor teen's memory at Relay for Life

The sense of community and connectedness at Chelsea's Relay for Life on May 23 was palpable as folks walked around a makeshift track at Pierce Lake Elementary School.

The event - newly relocated at the elementary school this year - even pulled groups of people from beyond Chelsea and Washtenaw County.

Morgan's Marathon was one of the new teams this year that brought residents by the dozen from as far away as Pinckney and Jackson.

The team was formed by Megan Laughlin to honor her friend Morgan Carey, who succumbed to a rare form of brain cancer that is untreatable.

"When we found out that she had cancer we did a whole bunch of fundraisers and after she died everything ceased until we thought of doing this a few months ago," Laughlin said.

She led her team to raise several thousand dollars in a short three month period, and her team displayed childlike energy and exuberance at the event.

The team won the spirit award - a fitting honor for a team created to honor a girl who had a special spirit, Morgan's father Kevin Carey said while walking the track.

"She was a special girl who touched her friends even during her final days," Carey said. He thanked Megan and the rest of Morgan's circle of friends whom she befriended in the eighth grade prior to her diagnosis.

Doctors expected her to only

last a couple of months once

it became clear that the tumor was growing larger, Carey said.

"Without her friends I don't think she would have stayed with us for 17 months like she did," he said.

"They lifted her

spirit up and accepted her even in the end when she couldn't communicate - at one point she couldn't see."

Raising money for a cure is important, but most people including Carey and Laughlin focused on raising awareness about cancer and building bonds within the community.

When Carey first got the call from his wife

to fly back to Michigan when his daughter was diagnosed, he had no idea how his life was going to change.

"We stayed night and day at the hospital," Carey said.

When a doctor said that he would not be able to operate on the tumor, Morgan decided to end her treatment.

Carey said during his daughter's illness, often he would lean on the shoulders of strangers who changed his life.

"We wouldn't have gotten through this without support

## McKay to join artists at Painter's Fair

Fundraiser set for  
June 5 at Chelsea  
Community Hospital

Art has played a huge role in the life of Chelsea artist Gwyn McKay - sometimes landing her in hot water.

"I got into trouble for drawing - mostly horses - on my school papers and in catechism, even though it was in pencil," she said. "A pleasant early memory is discovering the colors in the crayon box, and in parochial school my most memorable art class project was making 'The Three Wise Men' out of macaroni. I enjoyed having more independence and variety in my art classes at Dexter High School."

Art enthusiasts can enjoy McKay's work at the 37th annual Chelsea Painter's Art Fair from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. June 5 and 6 on the grounds of Chelsea Community Hospital, 775 S. Main St. in Chelsea.

She is one of 25 award-winning artists who will display and sell original fine art and cards in a variety of media - watercolor, acrylic, oil, pastel, gouache, encaustic, monotype and mixed media.

McKay has lived an adventurous life. After traveling to Indonesia to learn more about batik - a form of fabric decoration using wax and dyes - and earning a bachelor's degree in art from Valparaiso University in Indiana, she lived and worked in many places, including a 6-month stint on an Alaskan fish processing ship.

Some jobs were related to art, such as her job as a security guard at the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis, Minn. and a job selling batik T-shirts at Pike Place Market in Seattle, Wash.

"Wherever I lived, making

and seeing art was a priority," she said.

When her father retired in 1984, McKay came back for the party and has lived in the area ever since.

She was living in Ann Arbor, working in a frame shop, weaving, and doing art when she met her future husband, an engineer at General Motors.

"The best thing I ever did was marry Neil and have my children," she said. "Life is a blur before the kids. They have had a big influence on my art."

The family moved from Royal Oak to Chelsea in 1995.

McKay exhibited at Art and Soule Gallery in Chelsea. After it changed ownership and became Chelsea Gallery in 2002, she was encouraged by the new owners to bring in floor cloths - painted canvas art rugs. She had made her first floor cloth for her family after moving to

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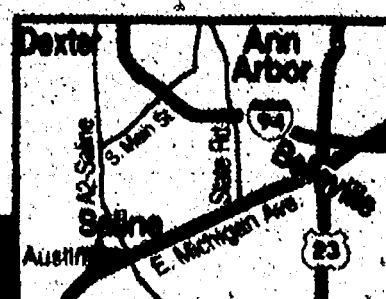

from people in Livingston County and as far beyond as Chelsea, Jackson and Alpena," Carey said. "Strangers came and made us meals. Mission Church in Pinckney has maybe 43 members and it felt like 200 people were caring for us."

"We didn't know any of these folks - it's not easy for me to accept help, but I did and it changed our lives."

Carey considers his time

at the relay and his team's fundraising efforts another step in a long journey to rebuild after his daughter's death.

Laughlin said she is coming back in 2011 and bringing an even stronger presence to Chelsea's relay and is resolved to raise even more funds.

Having only been a team member in two past relays, she said that building Morgan's Marathon from scratch was a daunting task.

"I had no idea how many hours and hours of work this would entail," she said.

The team bought 1,100 purple Relay for Life bracelets to sell. They also had a dunk tank fundraiser and a coin drive, raising more than \$2,500 not including pledges and other donations.

Laughlin feels that the memories built at Relay for Life are a perfect extension of her last memories of being at Morgan's bedside during her final days.

"I cried when I saw the slogan on the back of the T-shirts during the survivor walk. The birthday song is a victory song," she said.

On the other side of the

track, Michelle Mrocko led Manchester's relay team.

She said that she hopes to spread Relay for Life to Manchester in 2011.

"This is our fourth year coming to Chelsea's relay - it's been amazing walking around and seeing all of the church groups, families and groups of kids," Mrocko said. "People say kids don't do enough - they should come see the kids here. They're a good representation."

Chelsea, and between 1995 and 2008 made about 30.

"If made properly a floor cloth should lie flat, be waterproof, and be a pleasure to have," she said. "I enjoyed making floor cloths and may do them again, but for now I have a stronger desire to paint wall art."

McKay has painted in oil, watercolor, acrylic and mixed media. She often starts with a drawing, but ends up with a painting. She has many ideas

of what she wants to do with her art, and is grateful for a supportive husband and the space and time to be creative.

"I think it takes a kind of boldness to erase from your mind the work you have put into a piece and focus on the result - to push beyond good enough might mean ruining it," she said. "The most profound thing I learned in my art classes was that you must destroy to create. I think it comes naturally for me to be bold with art. I'm not so bold in most other aspects of life."

"Another thing that comes naturally for me is being alone, which is very compatible with

painting."

McKay, who has exhibited in Chelsea, Jackson, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Dexter, Birmingham and Detroit, said her goal is to express the many visual ideas permeating her mind - from nature, people, and experimenting with new media.

"Making art is a continuous, joyful, mesmerizing, and challenging journey," she said.

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# Girls on the Run culminates in race

**10-week training includes tips for healthy living**

Thousands of people came together last weekend to celebrate Girls on the Run, marking the culmination of weeks of training and hard work that came to an end as the program hosted its end-of-season 5K race.

The event drew almost twice as many participants from previous years.

"It was absolutely huge this year," said event director Beth Gillespie. "In the past, the most we had is 1,200 total. This year, we had over 1,000 girls and over 2,100 total participants."

Girls on the Run is a grassroots organization that relies on word-of-mouth promotion

to grow around the county and nation. Each year, more people learn about the program and its goals, Gillespie said. This year, Girls on the Run invested time and energy into marketing, which was partially the result of the program growing enough to sustain several full-time employees rather than just volunteers like in past years.

"I think part of the power of the Girls on the Run program is that you can't help loving it once you hear about it," Gillespie said. "People want to help and get involved."

"We were able to have a very active marketing campaign promoting our 5K this year. We worked really hard to get the word out," she said.

The end-of-season race is a 3.1-mile run meant to empower young girls participating. They train with peers for a series of weeks in the fall and spring seasons, which culminate in the New Balance Girls on the Run 5K.

During the 10-week training process, girls meet with volunteer coaches for a healthy snack and a discussion about body image, peer pressure and other social issues that young women face. Afterward, they participate in outdoor and indoor activities that keep them moving and engaged.

The race is open to anyone, and often the families of the girls will join in and walk or run with them.

"We get not only parents, but aunts, uncles, brothers, sisters, grandparents and friends coming to support these girls. They want to help and be inspired because the look on the girls' faces when they finish that race is incredible. Everyone involved gets to witness that sense of accomplishment and it's undeniable," Gillespie said.

The 5K is organized as a family-friendly event with entertainment and games. The girls had their faces and hair painted for the day, and group photos were taken. There was also a Bounce House, a children's play area and snacks for race finishers.

"I think this program will continue to grow and grow because it helps the community for the future," Gillespie said. "If we can give the girls the tools to have the power of awareness of their bodies and the confidence to do good things in the future, then that benefits the whole community. It's a safe place for them to do that whether they're athletes or not."

"As the program continues to grow, too, we need more

coaches and volunteers. This year we had 240 coaches and 150 volunteers for the race. The bigger we get, the more help we need to reach all the girls in the area."

## Study beneficial to colon cancer research

**Project looks at the impact of diet on cancer**

Having a strong family history of cancer can create genuine fears about eventually developing the disease. Elaine Reed, a therapeutic artist at the University of Michigan, had lost her mother, aunt and uncle to colon cancer. When she discovered that university researchers were testing a cancer prevention diet, she volunteered to help.

The study, "Healthy Eating for Colon Cancer Prevention," is designed to examine the impact of diet on a person's risk of developing colon cancer. Researchers will specifically compare a Mediterranean diet with the Healthy People 2010 diet.

Dr. Zora Djuric, principal investigator, said that the purpose of the study is to find non-toxic ways to keep the colon healthy.

"We know that we can decrease inflammation in the colon with aspirin, but

aspirin causes ulcers and gastrointestinal problems," she said.

Djuric's goal is to find an overall eating pattern that inhibits or slows down the enzymes that create inflammation in the colon, because inflammation has been shown to lead to the development of cancer.

The study began three years ago, and Djuric hopes to complete it this fall. Volunteers are randomly placed in either the Mediterranean diet group or the Healthy People 2010 diet group. Over a period of six months, participants will have three study visits, and also receive periodic dietary counseling by phone.

Eligibility requirements are for healthy adults age 21 and older who have had a previous polyp or colon cancer, or have a family history of colon cancer; are not expecting changes in lifestyle or hormonal therapies in the next six months; are willing to keep food records; read and understand English; and have a telephone.

In addition to the benefit of receiving individual dietary counseling, lab tests, and tissue samples at no charge, volunteers receive a

total of \$300 compensation for their efforts and parking vouchers for visits.

"The money is a nice perk," said Reed, who completed her participation 18 months ago. "I had a personal interest in it, of course, but it was educational and it's nice to know you're helping other people."

Researchers expect to find some beneficial changes in volunteers on the Healthy People 2010 diet, as well as those on the Mediterranean diet.

"The Healthy People 2010 diet is still better than what the average American is eating," Djuric said.

Maria Cornellier, dietitian, outlined the intervention schedule.

"I have contact with participants once a week for a month, then every other week until the third month, and then monthly until the sixth month," she said. "Each phone visit is about 20 minutes long."

Cornellier said the Healthy People diet is new to most people, but it's basically what the American Heart Association recommends.

Volunteers on the Healthy People diet are asked to eat two fruits, three vegetables (one either dark green or

orange), and at least three whole grains each day. They also count saturated fat grams to keep the total at 10 percent of their total caloric intake.

"Decreasing saturated fat means they are getting rid of the unhealthy animal fats," Cornellier said.

The main focus of the Mediterranean diet is to choose monounsaturated fats or MUFAs, which protect and possibly increase the "good" HDL cholesterol while lowering the "bad" LDL cholesterol. They are found in olives and olive oil, avocados, and certain nuts, such as hazelnuts, pistachios, almonds and macadamia nuts.

MUFAs work with Omega-3 fats, the second focus in the Mediterranean diet. Omega-3s have an anti-inflammatory effect and lower triglycerides. They should be eaten about twice a week, and are found in salmon, lex, hering, whitefish, sardines, anchovies, ground flax and flax oil.

The Mediterranean diet targets 15 to 20 servings of fruits and vegetables each day, which includes one that is high in Vitamin C. The Mediterranean diet also includes garlic and onions, herbs and three or more

whole grain servings each day.

"All of the components of the Mediterranean diet work in synergy," Cornellier said.

Getting adequate calcium and limiting sodium is common to both eating plans.

Cornellier uses an exchange list to help participants make changes gradually over time, based on their personal likes and dislikes. Diet goals for the Healthy People 2010 plan were reached in about a month on average, and goals for the Mediterranean diet were reached in about two months on average. Both diets were found to be sustainable.

"At first, the fish stuff scared me because I'm not a big fish eater, but with the exchanges, I'm able to substitute shrimp and scallops," Reed said. "I use flax oil in salad dressing, and I put flax seed on top of yogurt and cereal, or add it to muffins."

"I can't say enough about what a good experience this was. It's easy, the food is good, and the people running the program were so nice."

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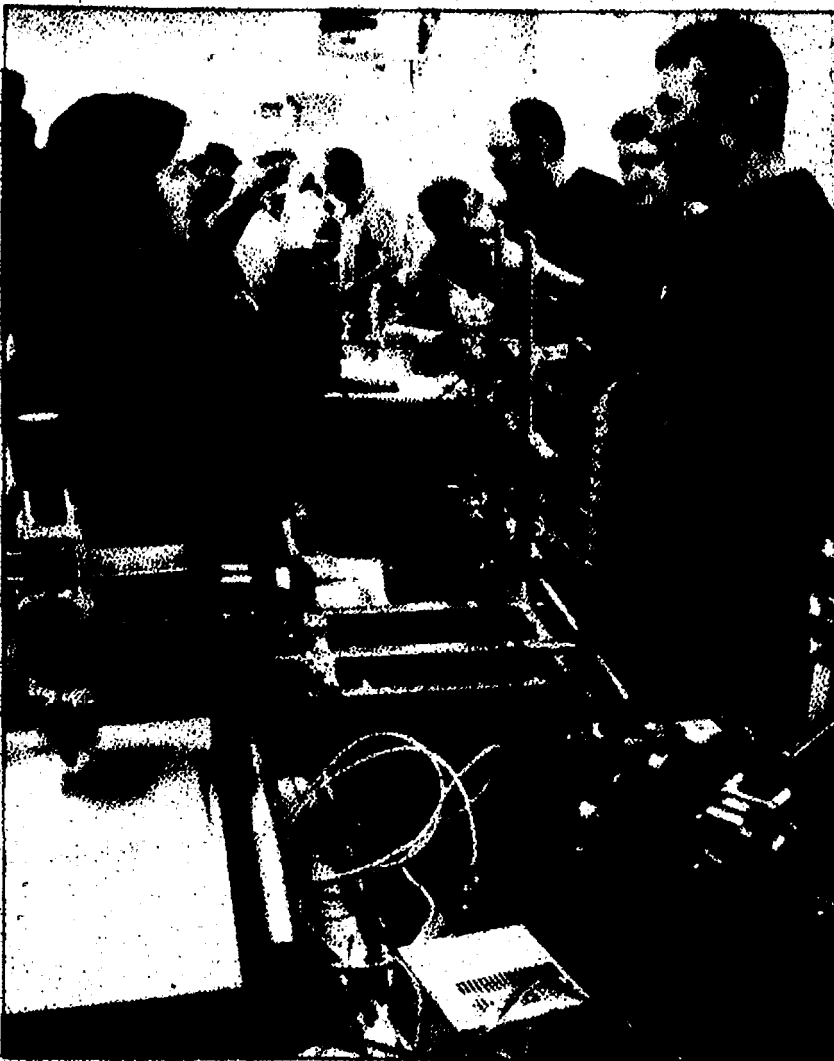
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An exhibitor at last year's event showcases a FlipFlap, a 3-D fabricator that can produce some of its own parts.

Last year's event was the first and was a local spinoff of the much larger Maker Faires in the Bay area. Last year's local fair drew between 1,200 to 1,400 from the area to the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds near Saline for a day of inventions and exhibitions.

## Debate focuses on road commission

### Expansion idea to 'diversify' board met with resistance

A proposal to expand the three-member board of the Washtenaw County Road Commission has already met with some resistance as members of the Board of Commissioners approved a public hearing for July 7.

During the public hearing, county officials hope to listen to residents' thoughts and concerns on expanding the road commission to five members. Currently a chair, vice chair and member are each paid an annual stipend of \$10,000. Road commissioners serve six-year terms.

The expansion aims to diversify the road commission board, ensuring that all of Washtenaw County is represented.

Wesley Prater, D-4th District, a former road commissioner, was one of several commissioners who voted against setting the public hearing, saying there should be more time allotted for the public to become informed on what could be an important public policy shift.

"I would suggest that this be denied," he said. "What is going to happen is that we are going to hear from the public over the summer, and we can have public hearings on the matter to hear concerns from

the public. We don't need this on the docket right now."

Commissioner Kristin Judge, D-7th District, echoed Prater's comments, saying that most of the county's public hearings are very lightly attended, and with a hearing set for just a few days after the Fourth of July holiday, they would more than likely get even less response than normal.

"I have always been an advocate for more diversity on the road commission, but we need to do our due diligence before we hold a public hearing," Judge said. "Typically, attendance for our public hearings is zero. If we have this two days after the Fourth of July, we are going to have less than zero."

Barbara Levin-Bergman, D-8th District, said she had concerns and questions, and she agreed that some preparation needed to be done, but added that was no reason to delay what could be looked at simply the beginning of a process.

"I am going to support having a public hearing. We will get citizens' concerns and begin to get answers for those concerns," Bergman said.

Conan Smith, D-10th District, and chairman of Ways and Means, agreed saying the issues was also time sensitive.

"If we delay very much, we will risk not being able to do this at all in this session," Smith said.

And as far as attendance at the July 7 public hearing, some commissioners commented on the fact that all residents have an opinion on the deteriorating state of county roads, and the hearing should be well

attended.

"I think that this resolution is the beginning of a process ... the timing has to start somewhere," said Leah Gunn, D-9th

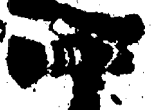
District. "There is not one person who doesn't have an opinion on the service or lack of services (provided by the road commission). Expansion may

be good or may not be good. I think we should give it a try."

The current road commission board is comprised of David Rutledge, chairman; Doug Fuller, vice chair-

We need structural reform to break the two-party gridlock (yes, they are both special-interest groups with deep pockets) wherein the good of our country and its people lose out to unbending ideology, party loyalty, and the wishes of one's benefactors. We need congressional term limits to ensure fresh ideas and evolving ideology to better keep pace with current trends, domestic and international.

Two recent polls inform us that 40 percent to 42 percent of American registered voters consider themselves "independents," 30 percent Democrats and 25 percent Republicans. It's independents who win elections — neither party can win without them — and yet, with rare exception, it's Republicans and Democrats taking office.

We need the ideological pendulum, the swings from right to left and from left to right, which we've had throughout our history, and which form

the vanguard of our democracy. We need the independent voters who lean left when we become too conservative and lean right when we become too liberal.

I fully agree with Mr. Cruz that the country is in a perilous situation — the cause of which, I believe, is our gridlocked partisan politics. I've intentionally steered clear of specific issues in this letter. I trust that with appropriate structural changes we can elect intelligent, thoughtful members of Congress, and together — Right, Left and Center — they will govern, well.

The true beginning lies with us, with you and me. By our votes, we must tell Congress that if they continue to refuse to govern, they will be out of a job.

They are both running a brilliant general election campaign; problem is, they should be running a primary strategy instead.

For example, every time "official Lansing" takes a swipe at Snyder it plays right into his image as the non-politician running from the outside hoping to get inside.

Everybody who plays the game in this town knows that candidates have to debate.

Tell that to Team Snyder. "If you look at all these comments, they are coming from the career political people," Snyder said, which just gives him another chance to tell the voters: "I'm a non-politician. I'm doing things a different way."

Likewise with Dillon. One of his calling cards is that when it's time to stand up to the special interest groups like organized labor, he has the guts to do it even against the

advice of his political brain trust.

Independent voters admire candidates who think for themselves and don't go along to get along, so both gentlemen are onto something. But it's the wrong something for a primary election, where those voters don't decide the outcome.

In a general election, the impact of unions, chambers of commerce and a wealth of other special interests is diluted because more unattached residents vote to mute their power.

But in a primary, special interests wield more influence.

Snyder, for example, refuses to fill out questionnaires from a host of special interest groups, even though some of them would give him a second look.

He's not even getting the first look, and while he may be cool with that, the special interests aren't and some think he is arrogant for not playing the game.

Snyder either doesn't get it or he doesn't care, but if he wins, these are the very groups he will have to influence to move his agenda. To stiff them now is short-sighted — or just

plain ignorant.

Dillon faces the same challenge as he struggles with his self-perceived organized labor opposition.

"I'm not the devil," he likes to say. But it doesn't matter what he says. The bulk of the labor guys are behind Virg Benero and that will count for something, and it trumps Dillon's independent cache.

Being from the private sector, it should come as no shock that neither of these candidates is a whiz bang with the media. Raised in cloistered boardrooms where the glare of lights and snoop reporters are verboten, they were not trained to be 10-second sound bite wonders.

Snyder is more content hawking his 10-point plan, which takes more than 10 seconds to digest.

Dillon is more into thinking with his head than thinking on his feet to combat some snotty question from an equally snotty reporter.

Two peas in a pod? Maybe not, but they're closer to that than you think.

## OUR TAKE: Editorial Election season to bring out issues

Political advertisements have been hitting the airwaves and making the newspaper quite regularly since the last election.

But with the filing deadline for the Aug. 3 primary election just passed, it's now officially campaign season. So, hang on for that barrage of ads from candidates telling you they're for change and they are independents and will serve you, the taxpayer, and not the political party. But if only that were true in most cases.

Unfortunately, our political system doesn't favor the independent thinker — usually, he can't gain the financing to successfully run for office.

If it appears there are more people running for office in the primary this year, you're right. It may not be a record, but this year's ballot is seeing some strong grassroots resurgence.

In some respects, the political fervor is an extension of the 2008 elections, when President Barack Obama made history by becoming the first black man to lead this nation.

"I think this is one of those periods where governments come under a lot of scrutiny," says Oakland County Clerk Ruth Johnson. "The 2008 election was an historic election and, as a result, we're seeing a lot of grassroots energy and effort, from the Tea Party movement to people seeking to be precinct party delegates."

In reference to the latter, Johnson reports numbers are significantly up over the past couple years. For the Aug. 8, 2008, primary, there were 721 Republican and 502 Democratic candidates seeking delegate status. For this year, there are 1,130 Republican and 624 Democratic candidates.

Certainly the high-profile races are packed. For example, five Republicans and two Democrats are seeking to replace as term-limited Gov. Jennifer Granholm. They include Republicans Oakland County Sheriff Mike Bouchard of Birmingham, U.S. Rep. Pete Hoekstra of Holland, Michigan Attorney General Mike Cox of Livonia, Ann Arbor businessman Rick Snyder and state Sen. Tom George of Lansing. Democrats have State House Speaker Andy Dillon of Redford facing Lansing mayor Virg Bernero.

Other races are also stirring heated campaigning. Four Republicans want to unseat first-term incumbent U.S. Rep. Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield Township. They include Rocky Rachowski and Paul Wexley, both of Farmington Hills, Richard D. Kuhn of Waterford Township and Anna Janek of West Bloomfield Township.

Some say Peters won on the coattails of Obama's landslide victory. We'll see just how long those coattails are.

The primary and November general elections are critically important. Winners will be leading local governments, counties and the state through a swamp of economic morass that will not quickly go away.

We need leaders at all levels of government who can be creative, diligent and, most important, have the ability to not just work with their own party members, but with those in the opposite party.

He was born in Owosso, Mich., proudly attended the University of Michigan for two years before serving his country in World War II. He then came back to Ann Arbor to finish his degree through the G.I. Bill.

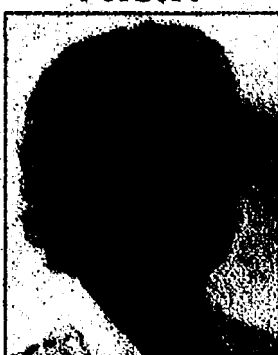
My dad didn't like to talk about "The War" much — no matter how much I prodded him.

When I'd ask him what it was like to carry a gun and shoot at the enemy, he would give a little chuckle and change the subject.

My dad didn't wear a ball cap that called attention to the fact that he was a veteran. He preferred wearing one with a block "M."

But we did go to a lot of parades together when he would come to visit me. And

when fellow veterans would walk by I caught him wiping more than one tear away as they passed.

My dad was one of the more than 16 million who served in the armed forces in World War II. More than 400,000 soldiers died and I guess he considered himself lucky not to be one who came home in a casket draped with an American flag.

I tried to get him to visit the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C., but he wasn't interested in seeing it.

My dad died on Flag Day, June 14, 2009, exactly one week before his 88th birthday.

And after I cover the Memorial Day ceremonies in Ann Arbor, I'll head to Allmendinger Park in Ann Arbor and sit a while on the bench that bears his name.

It's our family's memorial to him — facing The Big House, his favorite place in the whole world.

I haven't been back there since September when we held a service for him before the first home football game of the season.

"It might be cheesy, but that's what it is," he said.

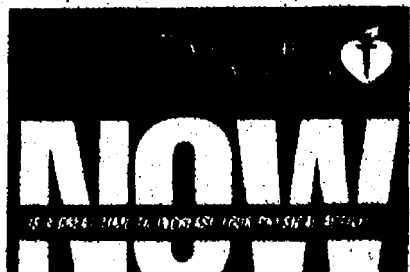
"It's your typical small town America with children waving American flags and standing at attention."

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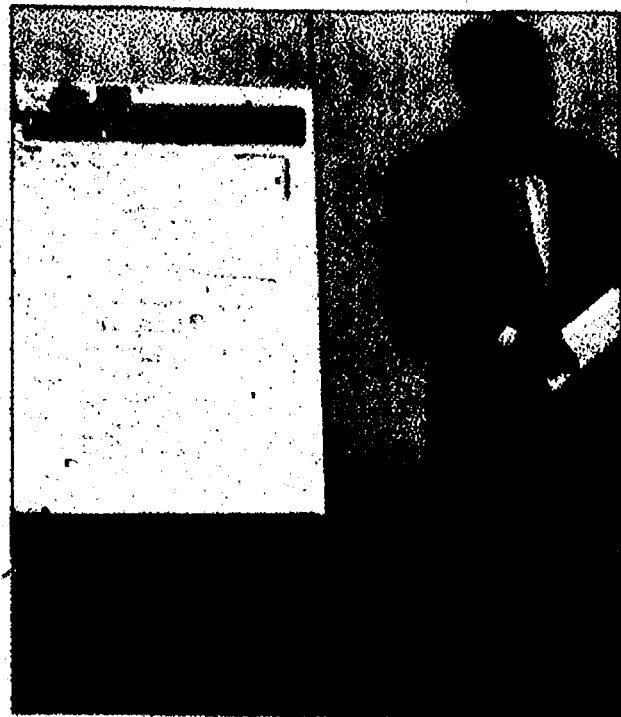

## County, United Way host get-together

In a fact-finding mission May 20, representatives from area nonprofit groups participated in a problem-solving workshop hosted by the Washtenaw County and United Way to determine how the county can best aid residential services in the western and southern parts of the county in the upcoming fiscal year.

"I was extremely pleased with how many people turned out. We had representatives from Whitmore Lake, Saline, Milan, Manchester, Chelsea and Dexter," Ouimet said. "There was valuable information exchanged specifically on issues that challenge each of these communities."

Ouimet said the desire behind the workshop was to get service organizations communicating with each other, as well as formulate a plan to help the county's most vulnerable residents.

"I think the workshop accomplished both objectives," he said. "It was a chance for the county and the United Way to listen to the needs — whether it's monetary or logistical — and point people in the right direction."

Ouimet said beginning in the 2010-2011 fiscal year, the county will reduce funding to service organizations by 20 percent.

"The budget is done in a two-year cycle, so the reductions won't all be done over the course of the first year," he said. "Clearly, the county is facing its own challenges in a time where we should be putting more and more energy into our local communities. The county faces the tough responsibility of filling in the fiduciary responsibilities where the state government falls short."

"We need to get ahead of the curve and start planning for the future. How many counties have such fine social agencies and a quality hospital that makes sure the needs of the county are dealt with?"

Lynn Booth of Chelsea First United Methodist Church said one concern for her is lack of transportation for residents seeking to apply for the Bridge card.

Cynthia Maritato, director of the Washtenaw County Department of Human Services, said not all applications for food assistance require face-to-face interviews and forms can be downloaded and

filled out on the Department of Human Services' website.

In addition, services such as the WWestern Washtenaw Area Value Express public bus system and the income-qualified Dial-a-Ride service are available to provide transportation services to the county's residents.

Doug Smith of the Chelsea and Dexter Faith in Action group said he would like to see more help with low-income housing and eviction prevention services.

Donna Palm of the Dexter Area Service Association said she would like to see increased basic needs services for seniors such as food and housing.

Cynthia Martin of the Department of Human Services said from October 2009 to this March, the caseload for food assistance rose 44 percent in the county. She said 36,700 individuals receive assistance, equating to \$5 million a month in costs.

"We have to do a better job at keeping residents aware that there is much we can do to help them before their situation hits the crisis level," Ouimet said.

Verna McDaniels, Washtenaw County administrator, said she is committed to making resources available to residents in need. "It's important to have forums like this to talk to the communities and understand what their issues are, and how we as a county can make our priorities," she said. "The western portion of the county is just as important as the other parts of the county, and we don't want to ignore it. We don't want to take anything for granted."

Ouimet said he was pleased McDaniels and other county administrators attended the event. "It shows the level of concern that the county government has for social needs," he said. "We've never done anything like this before in the western part of the county. It was quite a feat to join with these organizations to identify and deal with human service needs."

Ouimet said he plans to take a synopsis of the workshop back to the Board of Commissioners, as well as the United Way.

"In the coming weeks and months, all of us as a collective group need to set measurable goals to help our communities and give them the tools they need to leverage their assets better," he said.

## Townships ink road agreements

### Dust control, non-motorized pathway on the docket

The Washtenaw County Road Commission inked road work contracts with several townships at its recent meeting.

#### Augusta Township

Residents will see two applications of dust control on all local gravel and limestone roads at a price of about \$38,000.

In addition, Hingham, from Willow to Rosbort, will have about \$55,300 in restoration work, and Talladay Road from Hingham to Whittaker will have about \$22,900 in drainage improvements and restorations.

The total work is estimated at about \$116,334, but by using Road Commission matching funds, the township will pay about \$83,000.

#### Bridgewater Township

About \$39,400 in dust control will be applied in the township, and Willow Road from US-12 to McCollum will have about

\$76,100 in restoration work, including grading, berm work and limestone.

The total work is estimated to be about \$115,500 and the township will pay about \$97,645 once matching funds are applied.

#### Saline Township

Two applications of dust control will be applied to all certified local gravel and limestone roads in the township at a cost of about \$21,600.

The township will pay about \$12,200 of that total once the Road Commission's matching funds are subtracted.

#### Superior Township

The Road Commission and Superior Township have agreed to construct a non-motorized pathway along Geddes Road from Prospect Street to Andover Drive.

The total cost of the hot mix asphalt paving, timber boardwalk, prefabricated bridge and grading work is about \$455,200 and federal funds will pay for about \$372,600.

The township will be responsible for \$82,600.

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## AN EAGLE EYE VIEW MEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK TEAM WINS 21st MAC CROWN

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (EMUEagles.com)** – In dramatic come-from-behind fashion, the Eastern Michigan University men's track and field team did what it had done 20 times previous, as it captured another Mid-American Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championship Saturday, May 15, here at the University at Buffalo Track.

The title, Eastern's 21st in the 36 years in which the MAC has awarded it, also gives the Eagles the first Indoor-Outdoor title sweep in the MAC since 2007 when it was again the Green and White taking home both crowns.

Eastern entered Saturday's final day of competition in fifth place, trailing first-place Akron by 40 points. The Eagles wasted no time in making up ground, however. In the first men's event of the day, the 4x100-meter dash, the Eagles' quartet of **Vanier Joseph, Ackeem Forde, Koleon Prescott** and **Clint Allen** raced to victory in a time of 40.27.

Allen backed that relay win up with a championship run in the 100-meter dash in 10.50, while Prescott took third (10.70).

Forde continued his brilliance as the senior won the 400-meter dash in a time of 47.27.

The Eagles thrived in the distance races, making up the most ground with a 1-2-3 finish in the 1,500-meter run by **Cole Sanseverino, David Brent** and **Austin Hendrix**, and a 1-2 finish in the 5,000-meter run by **Terefe Ejigu** and **Curtis Vollmar**. Ejigu was named the Most Valuable Performer of the championships after earning his second title. He won the 10,000-meter run on Thursday, the first day of competition.

At that point, the Eagles still trailed Akron by a slight margin, as the Zips were placing well in the events also. But Eastern was able to catch up with UA when freshman standout Joseph earned another MAC title by winning the 110-meter hurdles.

Going into the 4x400-meter relay, the final event of the day, EMU had made up a 40-point disadvantage and needed to finish one spot ahead of UA if they finished third or better in order to lay claims to the unprecedented, 21st MAC title.

After an intense first leg of the race as the Eagles and the Zips were fighting neck and neck for the advantage, UA's Phil Ferguson was called for a violation for going outside of his designated lane, thus disqualifying Akron from the race after the Zips had won the relay. With the Akron DQ, EMU would move into second in that race, giving the Eagles the championship.

In addition to winning the MAC title, the Eagles also placed eight performers on the All-MAC squad with Ejigu, Brent, Forde, **Oliver Wether**, Joseph, Sanseverino and Allen all named to the first team. Curtis Vollmar was a second-team selection.

Ejigu was named the meet's Most Valuable Performer, and Interim Head Coach **John Goodridge** was named the Coach of the Year, an award he also garnered at the finish of the indoor MAC Championship season.

## Sentra SL tops Nissan's compact line

When you're behind the wheel of the Nissan Sentra, you can really see the journey compact cars have made in the past few decades.

I recently tested the Nissan Sentra SL, the top of the line model, except for the hot-rod SE-R. Costing \$21,080.00, it's four grand more than the base model, even if it's \$1100 less than last year's model. Naturally, these are list prices. Negotiations start from that new MSRP price.

Made in Mexico, this North American vehicle comes from the very flexible Nissan global "C" platform, so there's plenty of adaptability. This means the Sentra can be a roomy and capable compact, but with a few changes, turns into a fun-to-drive and capable sport model like the SE-R.

Sentra is offered in 2.0, 2.0 S, 2.0 SR, which adds some sportiness to its looks, and finally the 2.0 SL. All of these models are powered by the standard 140 hp, 2.0-liter 4-cylinder engine.

This 16-valve 2.0-liter DOHC engine generates 147 lb-ft of torque. All except the base model are equipped with Nissans continuously variable transmission - and you can opt for it on the 2.0 instead of the 6-speed manual transmission.

This front engine/front-wheel drive car comes with front disc brakes and rear drums. While it may sound sinful not to have disks all the way around, with the kind of driving most Sentra owners do, this simply isn't an issue. But it saves enough money to make it worth doing.

I guarantee you'll never be able to tell

there are drums in back from the driver's seat of the Sentra you own. The brakes are power-assisted, though. You also get anti-lock brakes and electronic brake force distribution with all but the base model. They're an option on the 2.0 and should be considered a must-have, if you ask me.

The suspension is a conventional front strut setup with a stabilizer bar and the rear torsion beam suspension includes an integral stabilizer bar. As with the brakes, you're not looking to push the limits in this class of car. You get electric power steering, even though this is a fairly small car.

By small I don't mean tiny. The wheelbase is 105.7 inches, and the car's 70.5-inch width allows for 97.7 cubic feet of passenger volume and 13.1 cubic feet of cargo space. This may seem small in the sports-ute world, but for a compact, it's a healthy amount of people space.

I like the looks of the car, which have been evolved slightly for 2010. The changes more clearly represent the Nissan design language. There's a new front fascia and grille on all but the SE-R, and revised headlights and tail lights.

In addition, there's new body-side molding with bits of chrome and a new bit of chrome on the rear end.

While the base model still comes with 15-inch wheels and tires, there are new 16-inch wheel covers on the 2.0 S and new 16-inch aluminum-alloy wheels on the 2.0 SL.

Inside, the cabin looks as it should in a car like this. You'll not think you're riding in an Infiniti, but you'll be comfortable and like the looks of the place. Yes, it's got cloth seats, which look nice and will wear well. This isn't something I mind, especially in a small and

inexpensive car.

But there are some pretty upscale offerings inside the Sentra. One of the most noticeable is the new optional navigation package. This brings to a conclusion the acceptance and public demand for navigation, as it's now available in pretty much every price range. Nissan bills this as the industry's least expensive integrated navigation system.

Integrated means it comes with the car, not a personal GPS that you plug in and stick to the windshield.

Nissan says their research shows that an integrated nav system is a high priority of those who have and use a removable system.

It uses the 4.3-inch color display audio head unit with iPod and Bluetooth controls, standard on the 2.0 SL, and you can even get a rear-view camera. This is something that I didn't appreciate much until living with a few of them - you quickly get comfortable and find yourself depending on them, even if you're good at turning and looking over your shoulder when you back up.

Spending a week in this car, I was just constantly reminded how much better cars are now. The Sentra is solidly built, drives well, is comfortable and doesn't use much gas. It does, however, carry the people and their things that you expect to be able to carry, and it does that job comfortably and competently.

On the highway, it drives smoothly, the steering staying nicely centered so there's not a lot of sawing on the wheel. It's quiet enough and peppy enough that you don't spend your time wishing you were a little richer.

That's the real difference in where compact cars have become good. It's attractive, it's safe, its stereo will turn up loud, it's got a good warranty. The compromises you make to buy an inexpensive car aren't nearly as great as they used to be.

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# Firefighters train for agricultural mishaps

## Countywide team to handle special situations

After two serious accidents on local farms in consecutive years, Saline Area Fire Chief Craig Hoeft knew that despite countless hours of training in traditional settings, emergency first-responders in Washtenaw County rarely prepared for agricultural mishaps.

However, getting consensus — and, more importantly, manpower and resources — dedicated from fire departments across the county to proactively address farm emergencies was a tall order. So, Hoeft put the issue on the backburner.

Still, the idea for developing a countywide team that could handle highly-specialized rescue situations in any setting was born. After several years of fundraising, research and careful coordination among multiple communities, the Washtenaw County Technical Rescue Team officially became fully operational in January.

Though they've yet to be deployed in a major emergency, its 37 members are ready to respond to a variety of scenarios and potential workplace disasters ranging from the county's manufacturing base on the east side to rural industries to the west.

Hoeft said he couldn't help but recall the farm incidents in October 2003 and 2004 when the WCTRT recently conducted its first grain bin rescue training session in Milan.

He was among those on scene when York Township farmer Aaron Rogers, then 24, lost his foot after it was caught in an auger located inside the tank of his combine. Rogers was working alone and luckily had the wherewithal to call for help with a cell phone while rapidly losing blood and in shock.

Roughly a year later, Saline resident John Marion died of suffocation after he was trapped inside the funnel area of an over-head corn bin at his granary. He was 69. Saline-area firefighters responded to a 9-1-1 call, but had difficulty finding him inside the bin from the open top. Members of the WCTRT team specifically trained for that type of emergency scenario during the four-hour long session at Schettenhelm's Inc. in Milan. Roger Ward, a safety expert with Maumee, Ohio-based Andersons Grain, led the training session attended by more than two dozen people.

Having a team at the time might not have prevented the tragedies, Hoeft said, but at least training for something like it

would have familiarized first responders with the challenges they faced.

"We had no idea that it was going to be so difficult and time consuming to attempt these rescues, and it lit a fire to come up with a Washtenaw technical rescue team that could do that kind of thing," he said.

The timing was opportune as well, as organizers received roughly \$750,000 in federal grants from the Department of Homeland Security over the past few years to purchase equipment and a rapid-response vehicle dedicated to the team. The county's Homeland Security Task Force and the Washtenaw Area Mutual Aid Association played intricate roles in the team's foundation, officials said.

Team Director Dan Cain, a veteran captain with the Ypsilanti Fire Department, said the group was modeled after the decade-old Washtenaw County Hazardous Materials Team, which is consistently recognized for achievements in statewide competitions. The vehicles and equipment are housed at the Pittsfield and Saline fire departments. An executive board comprised of fire chiefs from across the county oversees operations.

Members attended monthly training sessions and meetings for the past 18 months, becoming experts in several specialty disciplines, including rope rescues, confined space rescues, trenches and collapsed structures, Cain said.

The grain bin rescue training combined a few of the areas and is a scenario first responders could see in the field given the deep-rooted agricultural industry in Washtenaw County, said

Carl Hein, an assistant team leader who coordinated the recent exercise.

"We needed to do this training because we have to be prepared for an environment that a lot of our residents live and work in, particularly on the western half of the county," said Hein, a lieutenant with the Ann Arbor Fire Department.

"It's pretty unique that we can bring people together with diverse skills and experiences in the fire service to do this type of work."

Members took turns trying to locate victims in the grain and repelling with ropes down the shaft to initiate rescue attempts. They also trained in how to use shields to protect potential victims from the suffocating grain.

The group will follow up the training in June with a focus on removing the injured farmer from the galvanized steel containers, which are upright and typically between 30 and 80 feet

tall.

Hein said he expects the training and emphasis on rural scenarios will continue as farms continue to be among the most dangerous workplaces in the country.

The National Safety Council estimates that farm accidents and other work-related health problems claim as many as 1,300 lives and cause another 120,000 injuries a year in America. Each year there are roughly 270 deaths nationwide that involve farm tractors alone, statistics show. Broadened out to include all types of farming accidents, the death rate across the country is an astonishing 22 for every 100,000 workers.

"Statistics show that it's consistently one of the most dangerous occupations because farmers are using big, powerful machines, are often working alone, and are in a sense in this race with Mother Nature," he said.

# Committee responds to report on airport

## Group says assessment is not valid

After months of preparation, a group opposing an extension of the primary runway at Ann Arbor Municipal Airport has submitted its response to an environmental assessment report that weighs the merits of the proposed project.

The Committee for Preserving Community Quality, a group that launched the website [www.stopA2runwayextension.org](http://www.stopA2runwayextension.org), has argued that the environmental assessment is a rubber stamp for airport officials' plans to extend the runway by 800 feet toward Lohr Road and make a 150-foot shift to the southwest, which officials say will improve visibility.

The report was finished in March and residents and local government stakeholders were given a period of time to submit written comments.

Committee members, in partnership with the Pittsfield Township Board, are hopeful that their separate-but-similar rejection of the environmental assessment will enlighten state and federal officials as to the risks of extending the runway at the Ann Arbor airport.

As for forming a response to submitted comments, Molly Lamroux from the aeronautics division of the Michigan Department of Transportation said they are working on responses to nearly 100 different written comments from residents and they expect that information to be available within the next two weeks.

She did say, however, that roughly only 20 percent of the submitted comments supported the runway extension.

"...80 percent of the comments actually opposed the plan," Lamroux said. "The biggest concern we got concerned the migratory geese presenting a hazard to aircraft. There were issues raised about the technical basis of the document and quality of life issues such as noise. All of those comments are being reviewed very thoroughly."

### Purpose and need

Andy McGill, who along with his wife, Kathe Wunderlich, helped launch the committee opposing the runway extension and the website, said the environmental assessment report uses unreliable and outdated information to convey the notion that the project would have little to no impact on the surrounding area.

"There's hardly any research in the environmental assessment that could actually be considered valid," McGill said. "On a number of criteria, the report is not meeting the purpose and need (for the extension)."

The committee, with the help of Williams Aviation Consultants, questioned a number of issues submitted in the report, including the overall purpose and need for a runway extension that airport officials contend will improve safety and interstate commerce by "...pro-

viding sufficient runway length to allow the majority of category B-II small aircraft ... to operate without load restrictions."

In their response, Williams Aviation states it isn't necessary to extend the runway if accommodating B-II small aircraft is the primary thrust of the extension. The Federal Aviation Administration has determined that B-II small planes are Ann Arbor Municipal's "Critical Aircraft," which is defined as the most demanding aircraft-type that performs more than 500 annual operations.

"There are no aircraft in the B-II small aircraft classification that require a runway length of 4,300 feet to conduct normal operations," according to the Williams' report. "All B-II small aircraft are capable of operating out of the current runway (3,505 feet long) without the need to reduce weight..."

And how did they come up with that determination?

McGill said consultants at Williams looked at all current B-II small aircraft and weight requirements pertaining to runway length. Airport officials have stated that some aircraft avoid Ann Arbor because they would have to unload passengers and/or cargo to land.

The report also takes issue with the classification of the critical aircraft, stating the environmental assessment should have studied "itinerant operations," in place of the airport's annual operations to make that determination. McGill said the FAA directs airport officials across the country to use the number of itinerant operations - defined as any aircraft that takes off and departs to another airport, or lands coming from an outside airport - for the critical aircraft.

"They should have only looked at the itinerant operations," McGill said.

If the itinerant operations would have been separated from the annual operations, the committee's report states there would have been a drop-off in the number of critical aircraft take-offs and landings.

Not only does the committee's report take issue with how the critical aircraft was determined, but the group is concerned as to when that determination was made, as well. McGill said they should have taken an average of operations between 2004 and 2009 at Ann Arbor Municipal rather than "arbitrarily" use the year 2007, which MDOT officials contended would best indicate normal activity at the airport. Since 2007, economic constraints have wreaked havoc at Ann Arbor Municipal Airport, with a projected 586 total operations for the current year. The airport reached a peak of more than 1,050 operations in 2009 and 2001, and had 750 in 2007.

"The reason 2007 flight data was requested ... for analysis is that we felt it is the most recent year of record that would be indicative of 'normal' activity at Ann Arbor Municipal Airport," said Mark Noel, manager for the Project Development Section for MDOT's airport division, in an e-mail to McGill from June of last year. "Our thoughts were that the current recession could pos-

sibly have affected the 2008 operational levels in such a way that 2008 year records would not be a true indicator of a post-recession return to normal operations at the airport."

But according to MDOT's own projections, the agency doesn't expect "normal" operational levels to return to the airport for another 20 years, begging the question as to why MDOT chose to use data for a current project that would reflect something that won't happen until 2030, McGill said.

"They should have at least used a five-year average, and they didn't do that," he said.

### Rural setting?

There is a map featured in the environmental assessment used to depict the area surrounding the airport that includes a number of subdivisions such as Stonebridge, Brian Hill, Lake Forest, Lohr Lakes Village and more totaling more than 2,000 homes.

The map, however, has some obvious gaffes such as depicting Lohr and Textile road as unpaved and shows the Ypsilanti Regional Psychiatric Hospital, which was located at Bemis and Platt roads more than 20 years ago.

McGill believes the use of this map is part of an effort to convey to FAA officials that the Pittsfield Township area making up the proximity of the airport is less developed than it actually is.

"It would certainly appear that what they are trying to convey to a far-away decision maker that there's nothing out there anyway, so why not build an extension?" McGill said. "When, in fact, this is a cosmopolitan area with a lot of residential."

Relating to the population density around the airport is the issue of groundwater, which McGill contends had not been fully addressed in the assessment report and has now generated a strong response from Washtenaw County's drain commissioner, Janis Bobrin, who states in a memo that "...it is not understood," how the assessment concluded that there would be little to no impact on local streams and floodplains.

McGill said there are three wells on the property that, until recently, accounted for 15 percent of Ann Arbor's water supply. The committee's report states that the airport is located on top of a porous sand and gravel formation, and that historically the land surrounding the airport was originally purchased by the city of Ann Arbor for water rights in 1929.

The report goes on to state that because of the importance to area drinking water, the assessment report should have dedicated more effort than a "few passing words."

No matter what happens in the coming months, McGill and others supporting the movement to stop the Ann Arbor Airport from expanding, have said they plan to keep fighting and will take legal action, if necessary. McGill is hopeful it won't come to that and FAA officials will see the flaws in the assessment report and, at the very least, demand an environmental

impact study, which goes well beyond the scope of an assessment report.

He is also hopeful that cooler heads will prevail in the city of Ann Arbor administration and they will see that the extension will only benefit larger and heavier airplanes flying over densely populated areas, which has remained at the core of the committee's argument.

"Our concern is from a safety standpoint because of the larger planes that this extension would attract would be passing over homes in the area of the airport at altitudes of 300 feet or maybe less," McGill said in a previous interview. "It's safe to say that the invitation for larger planes is there. The dip in the economy is short term, but that invitation and that risk to area homes is permanent."

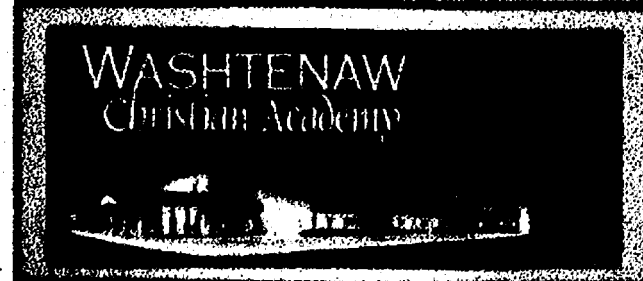
## Pittsfield Township's response to EA echoes group's opposition

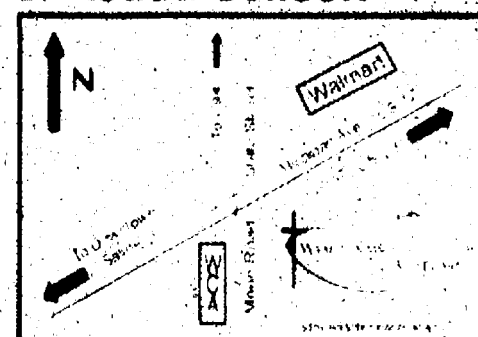
The airport, which is actually located in Pittsfield Township but owned by the city of Ann Arbor, has been the subject of scrutiny since airport administration announced its intention to extend the primary runway to a total length of 4,300 feet toward Lohr Road and a 150-foot shift to the southwest, which airport officials say will increase visibility.

At a recent meeting, one of the organizers for the committee, Andy McGill, who is a Stonebridge subdivision resident, gave a brief outline of their response and exacted support as elected officials indicated they will send their rejection of the environmental assessment to the Michigan Department of Transportation, as well as the city of Ann Arbor.

Supervisor Mandy Grewal said they have formed a partnership with the committee to stand united against the project. Elected officials even approved splitting the cost of retaining the law firm that composed the written response to the EA report.

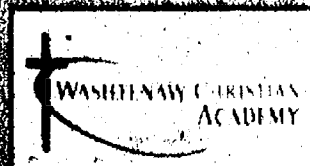


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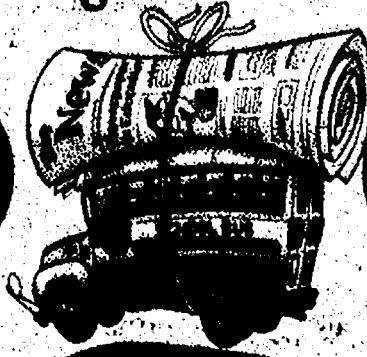
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# Encore offers summer theater program

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# Road Commission may seek a plan for Klinger Bridge

Lima Township may be given more time to discuss funding options for the closed Klinger Road Bridge.

He looked for someone with a great record, someone with the same core mid-western values and someone who was known in the region, which would help with recruiting.

To me Tim Walberg fits that same description. During his time in Lansing and in Washington he has proven his conservative values. His voting record shows he is pro-life, for lower taxes and for cutting spending and is working to reduce the size of government. Unlike Rooney, he has lived in this district most of his life, raised his children here, and understands that his constituents are made up of hard working farmers, blue collar workers and small business people.

From what I see, Rooney has surrounded himself with liberal Republicans and Ann Arbor "elites," most of whom don't even live in this district.

The scouting community will continue to hold a food drive every three to four months at Polly's Country Market for Faith In Action to continue to help feed the community.

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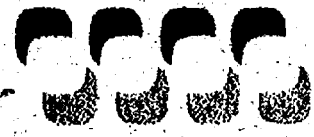
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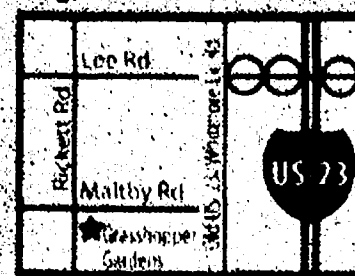

Recycling has always been important for Beverly Hill, a sixth grade science teacher at Dexter's Creekside Intermediate School.

For the past 28 years, she has been collecting paper, bottles and cans with students to take to the recycling center for collection.

"We recycle for the whole school," Hill said.

She also plants trees and teaches children about the Earth.

"I'm really into trying to make sixth graders aware of their world. There's not a lot a sixth grader can do. But they can recycle," she said.

Recently she stumbled on a recycling program that she feels can benefit her students.

"I read about this TerraCycle program (in Reader's Digest), which directly uses the items recycled. It looked like what we wanted to do," Hill said. "I was thinking it was just a small program, but then I saw it in a Better Homes and Gardens ad," she said.

She said items brought in to be recycled — such as Lay's potato chip bags and Capri Sun pouches — are not first broken down, shredded or pulped to be reused in a different form.

thus using additional energy to make the items useful again. Instead, the items are used as is, directly in the product, a term known as "uncycling" by the manufacturer.

The items are sold in many stores, including Target, Meijer and Home Depot.

"We chose Capri Sun because it is 100 percent juice. We did not want to do potato chips or cookies. At a school, we wanted to do something 100 percent healthy," Hill said.

The students collect the pouches in the lunchroom, or bring them from home. She said that some of the students have purchased the TerraCycle items and they seem pretty durable.

She said she had initially introduced the project at school, suggesting participants stay after school to help out.

"I thought I would maybe have three or four students," she said.

Twenty-five students expressed interest. Students spoke at Creekside Middle School and Bates Elementary School to increase awareness about the initiative.

Students collect the Capri Sun pouches from students at Bates and Creekside, and wash them out. The items are then collected for free by the TerraCycle collection trucks, where they pay four cents for each Capri Sun pouch to use as a donation to a charity.

"We're going to donate the

proceeds to Gordon Hall," Hill said. "I'm not doing it for the money, but just so the kids learn to recycle."

Currently, the students have amassed about 5,000 Capri Sun pouches, which are stored in Hill's room awaiting collection at the end of the year.

The students said that they really enjoy the recycling program, and the chance to participate in a project that is student-led.

"(If the pouches went into the landfill) they would stay for millions and millions of years," said sixth grade student Jane Kokmeyer. "So they made it into a lunch bag, or a binder or a pencil case. It just helps our environment."

"Sixth graders Elizabeth Oberg and Megan Porterfield said they like the recycling program because it is not hurting the environment."

"They are just connecting (the pouches) together, not heating them up to break them down," Oberg said.

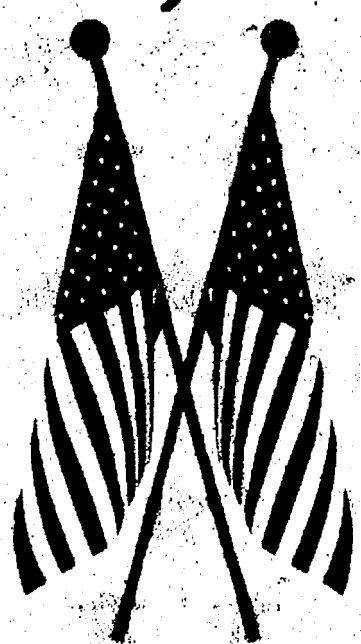

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# Local candidates share views at mixer

U.S. House of Representatives hopeful Tim Walberg believes the political tide is shifting toward the Republican Party and he has entered the race for Michigan's 7th Congressional District with renewed vigor and enthusiasm.

"I've learned I don't like to lose. Let's cut to the chase," Walberg said.

Walberg was narrowly defeated in the 2008 general election by Democratic challenger Mark Schauer of Battle Creek.

Walberg was among 80 local, state and federal candidates to attend the Ann Arbor Chamber of Commerce's candidate mixer at the Polo Fields Country Club May 14.

"We learned we have to do better by turning out the vote. We did better than Sen. John McCain by 10,000 votes in 2008, but that wasn't enough," Walberg said. "This time it is going a lot better."

Though he is currently leading opponents Marvin Carlson of Manchester and Brian Rooney of Jackson by 35 points, Walberg said he is leaving nothing to chance in the August primary election.

"That's nothing because it can change overnight," he said. "We have to find a way to do better making sure our base is energized and gets out to vote."

"At this point in time, the political climate has almost reversed itself. People have

seen that the hope and change — the change from the Bush administration — was not true. But they've also seen a renewed Republican Party that stood up and took notice of the people and voted right this last term in Congress."

Carlson said he thinks most voters are tired of electing incumbents to office and his chances of defeating Walberg in the primary are "fairly good."

If elected, Carlson said he would hone in on national spending and push for a balanced budget amendment.

"We need to restore a common-sense approach to job creation. Mark Schauer has clearly demonstrated how ineffective and inefficient the government is in doing that," he said.

Carlson said 12,000 jobs were eliminated in Michigan last year.

While some candidates took time to lay out their political platforms, others stressed the importance of change at the local and state levels.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Pete Hoekstra of Holland said if elected, he will push for less government control for small businesses.

"We believe every person

in Michigan has at least one good idea about how to bring Michigan back," he said. "We're talking about getting government out of the way and getting the bureaucracy out of the way so Michigan people can do what they do best."

"You don't need one big idea. We need to create a good business climate so that small businesses can go

off and hire 10 more people or two more people. Everything doesn't have to go through government. The problem is too many people are trying to manage a huge economy and manage it through government."

Before coming to the candidate mixer, Hoekstra said he spent the afternoon working for a company in Ypsilanti as part of his statewide Michigan Jobs Tour.

"I'm talking to businesses all over the state," he said. "Just about every place that I go to identifies either regulatory burdens or barriers that have been put in place by the state to hinder growing their business."

Lonnice Scott, Democratic candidate for Michigan's 54th House District, said he is running to bring legislative expertise to Lansing.

"In an era of term limits, we

don't have time to be training someone on the job, which is what is happening," he said. "We saw the last budget debacle, and if you ask the majority of the freshmen class if they knew what was going on, they would tell you nothing. They can't take votes when they don't know what's going on."

"I decided I couldn't let 14 years of service for Alma Wheeler Smith go to waste. The difference between myself and the other candidates is that I can hit the ground running on the first day."

Patricia Lesko, candidate for mayor of the city of Ann Arbor, said she is also looking for change.

"I have 20 years of experience in management and finance, and I think it's important to bring that kind of experience to Ann Arbor city government," she said.

"At the moment, although our city brings in about a billion dollars in taxes, fees and debt service every three years, our government is being allowed to spend every penny of it and then some. If the city government would have saved just 1 percent over the last three years, we would be sitting on a \$35 million surplus. I've been talking to merchants throughout Ann Arbor and their message has been the same: 'Cash in, cash out.'"

"We have to live within the means of the people who provide our income, and that's taxpayers. I want to return us to

the basics, which is responsible spending."

Lesko said she does not concern herself with "the horse race" of political elections. "I can tell you I am not

running against Mayor John Hieftje. I am running past him because we are two very different candidates."

# Schools provide students with healthy meal choices

If you are worried about your kids eating the right foods, send them to school for the first two meals of the day. It's the one place you can count on them getting the nutrition the federal government and doctors recommend — the fruits, vegetables and whole grains we hear about constantly.

School nutrition programs covering breakfast and lunch are the most highly regulated and monitored systems in the country. And, in spite of that, Dexter Community Schools Food and Nutrition Director Sara Simmerman loves her job.

Doing it right and giving kids what they need to keep their bodies and minds growing is what Simmerman thrives on.

She and her crews in the schools make sure that each day there are delicious, nutritious, and tempting offerings

on hand for the 1,800 students who come for breakfast and/or lunch.

Breakfast is served at Wylie Elementary, Creekside, Mill Creek and Dexter High School, as well as lunch, which is also served at Cornerstone and Bates. Every day, a main entree, hot vegetable, salad bar, fruit and vegetable choice, 100 percent fruit juices and low fat white and chocolate milk are on the lunch menu. Breakfasts include a main entree, a serving of fruit or juice and a serving of milk.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture strictly specifies portion size, minimum calorie amount, vitamin, nutrient, fat and sodium content of each school meal. Schools are required to follow Dietary Guidelines for Americans program, and their menus are designed to meet or exceed the meal requirements for cal-

cium, iron, vitamins A and C, saturated fat, cholesterol and dietary fiber.

In order to do that, the nutrition program at the schools uses whole grain chicken nuggets and low fat mozzarella cheese, eliminates added salt, in all recipes and uses low sodium products whenever possible. Deli meat is low fat turkey and nitrate-free. Ground turkey is used for taco meat and turkey sausage is used as well.

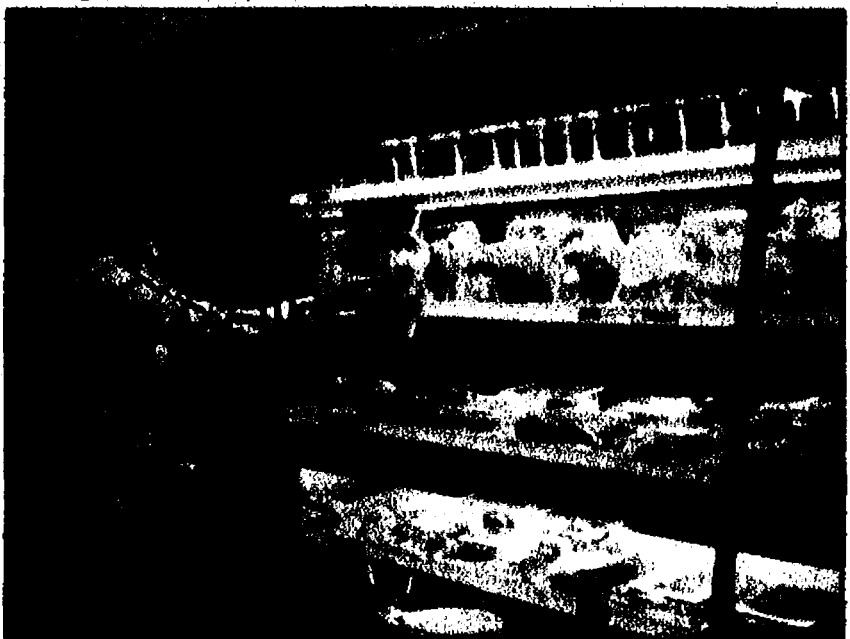
It's doubtful that home meals are as well rounded and geared to dietary guidelines. In the schools, none of the menu items are deep-fried or grilled. All of the products are oven baked to reduce fat content and fat retention.

A study conducted by Dr. Alice Rainville, a nutritionist from Eastern Michigan University, concluded that students who ate school

lunches consumed less calories from fat than students who brought their lunch from home. Research also found that students eating school meals consumed three times as many dairy products, twice as much fruit and seven times as many vegetables, compared to those who didn't.

Pizza from Classic Pizza on Tuesdays, meets the dietary test, as does tacos, hot dogs, chicken nuggets, calzones, "sports nuggets" (chicken nuggets mimicked to look like baseballs, basketballs or footballs), nachos, curly fries, whole grain chips, and other delights — always with the fruit juice and milk to wash it down.

Besides Simmerman, there are 25 employees who make the meal programs possible. Simmerman has background in public administration, nutrition, food service and restaurant experience.

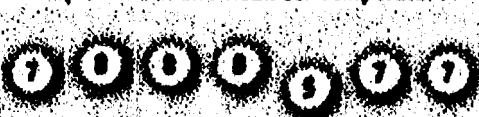

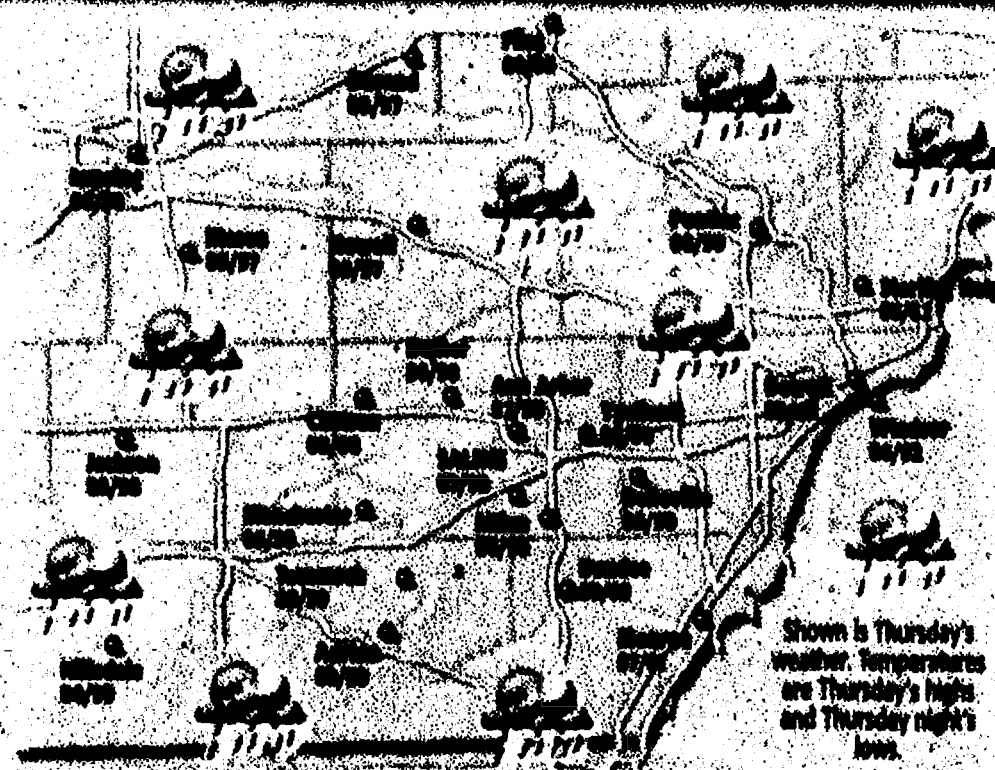

## Joe Welton ready to go from player to coach

Joe Welton was driving back from his Aquinas College baseball game last Wednesday night. Outside the car it was dark, cold, rainy and nasty. Inside the car it was "surreal."

You see this was no ordinary game Joe was driving home from. This was his last game. And not just his last game

of the season or even the last game of his four-year Aquinas career. But very possibly it was the last game Joe will ever play of a competitive nature. He's been playing baseball since he could walk. Now, on a cold, rainy Wednesday night, Joe talks about walking away from playing the game he loves.

"I'm really not expecting to play anymore," said Joe, the son of longtime Chelsea Athletic Director and baseball coach Wayne Welton of Chelsea and Jeanne Christianson of Dexter. "If it happens, great. I haven't totally ruled out going to a few (professional) tryouts, but I doubt I will."

Welton, who will turn 22 later this month, has been a mainstay on the Aquinas baseball team since graduating from Chelsea High School in 2006. His four-year career came to a disappointing end Wednesday night when they lost to Madonna University in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference tournament at Madonna.

"It's surreal right now," he

said. "It will hit me more over the next couple of days that my career is over especially when I don't go to practice on Monday and when I don't go over to the field anymore."

Aquinas finished the season 28-24 overall. But Joe's season ended in "disappointment" because of an injury.

"I've been dealing with a really bad blister on my pitching hand," he said. "I tried to pitch with it on Monday but had to come out in the first inning. It was a tough way to go out."

But Joe quickly adds, "I had a lot of fun though."

Joe is a positive kid. A proud, young man who played baseball for the love of the game. And he was pretty good, too. In high school, he helped lead the Bulldogs to the state semifinals and was named All-State and to the Dream Team during his senior year.

He also was the quarterback on the football team until he broke his leg two days before the season-opener against Novi. That injury, which also cost him his senior year of basketball, is still "with me today," he says. "I still have the plate and eight screws in my leg."

While he may have finished his senior year at Aquinas with a blister on his finger, he also finished it in blistering fashion, earning an All-Conference first-team selection. He was the team's ace, going 6-2 on the year with a 2.83 earned-run average as a left-handed starter.

"Joe developed into a very good college baseball player through hard work and dedication," said Aquinas coach Doug Greenslate. "He has earned the respect of his teammates because of his efforts to become

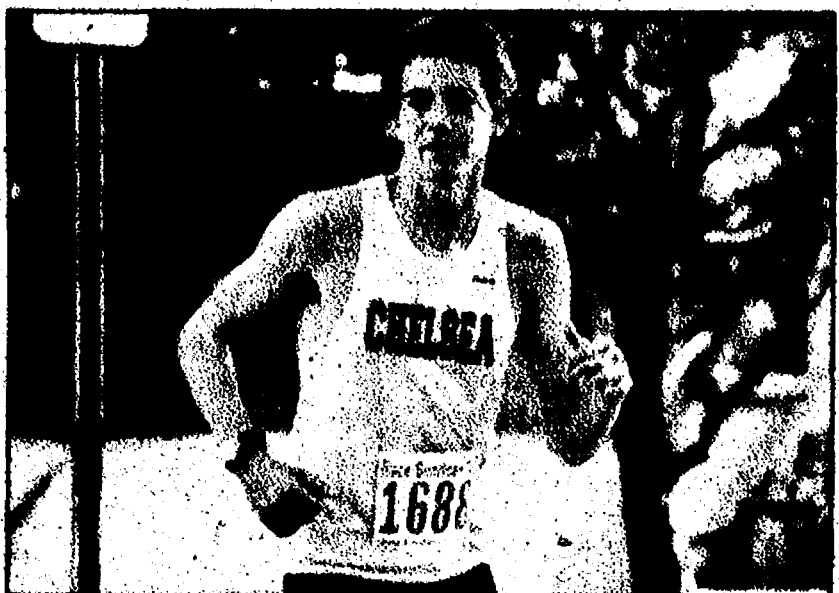

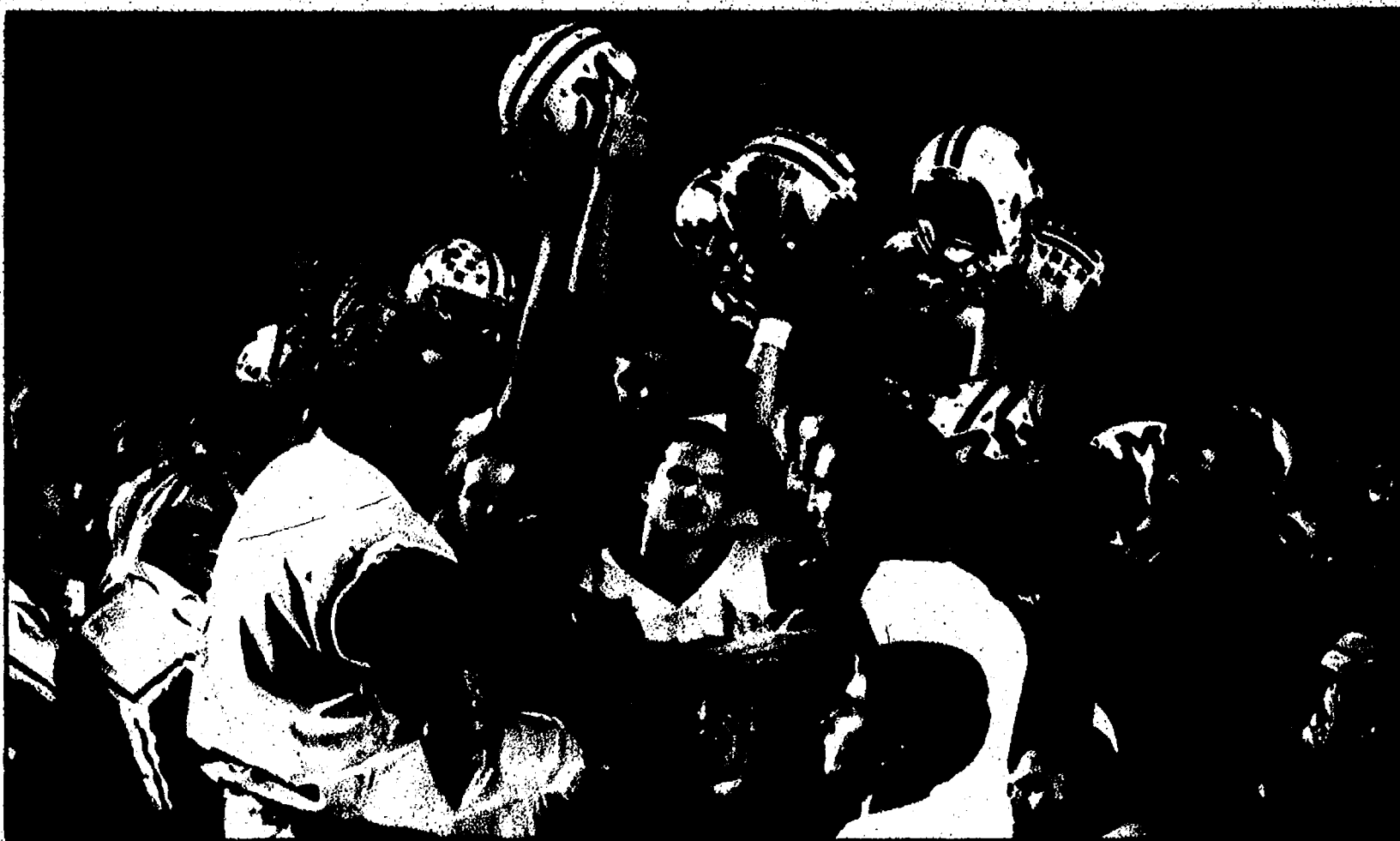

## Setting the course

### Athletic directors have multiple tasks, responsibilities

While they are not always visible to fans once game time begins, the on-field production is the direct result of their time and efforts.

The life of a high school athletic director carries many roles. They are part administrator, part supervisor. The athletic directors serve as mentors to coaches and players, set schedules and even act as liaisons for their departments to the community.

They schedule game officials, work behind the scenes on game day and converse with fellow athletic directors across the state.

And while the athletic directors across the Heritage Newspapers West Region - Wes Gall (Manchester), Wayne Welton (Chelsea), John Robinson (Dexter), Chris Gill (Milan), Rob White (Saline), Chuck Fuller (Ypsilanti), Eve Claar (Ypsilanti Lincoln), Rod Fisher (Belleville) and Torrence Green (Willow Run) - each have their own approaches in running their respective departments, all share the same goals.

"Our job is to emphasize the importance of educational athletics, how it can teach kids beyond the classroom and the valuable lessons they offer," Ypsilanti Lincoln Athletic Director Eve Claar said. "We want to create better young men and women by the time they leave high school."

### Many different roles

Since taking over as the athletic director in Saline four years ago, Rob White has learned that the everyday operations of an athletic director are anything but "everyday."

"There is not a typical day for an AD or an administrator, but that's what makes it exciting," White said. "There is always something that needs attention. Behind the scenes I'm working with coaches and how they relate to the kids, and then I spend time supervising events and making sure they go off correctly."

A large portion of the athletic director's role involves scheduling games and officials. White says that he spends a large amount of time during the school day going through e-mails regarding schedules and making sure officials are available to work the contests. After the school day ends, the attention shifts to the supervision of events.

According to White, athletic directors have more of a public relations role in the community than in the past. White says that he spends a lot of time in the Saline community marketing and advertising the athletic department.

"It's becoming more of a role for AD's to look for ways to promote the department in the community," White said. "With there being fewer dollars in the district's general fund, we have to be creative with our funding strategies."

White also feels that getting the community involved also teaches a life lesson to the Saline athletes.

"It's a message that the community is behind the athletes," he said. "They're not only representing the school, but they're representing all those who support them."

As a former baseball and basketball coach at Willow Run, White is used to having daily interactions with coaches and players. While he doesn't have the same relationships with the students in his current role, White tries to have conversations with them to make sure their experience is a positive one.

"I work more with the coaches and their relations with the kids," White said. "The coaches are pros in their role, and with the number of sports Saline has, I can't have the knowledge needed for some of them. But I know how to coach and how to help coaches and kids get the most out of their experience."

White also works with other athletic directors. He is a top officer with the Southeastern Conference and serves on the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Administrators Association representative council for Region 6 (southeastern Michigan).

"It's good to get out and see what other AD's are doing and share ideas," White said. "The AD's in the conference have a wealth of knowledge and I draw from that. It's helped me grow as an athletic director."

### Strong community support

Wes Gall has been synonymous with the Manchester High School athletic department for the better part of three decades. He began teaching in 1975 and joined the varsity football program as an assistant coach the following year. Since then, Gall has served as a head coach for several Manchester teams, including his current roles as varsity football and varsity softball coach. Since 1999, Gall has served as Manchester's athletic director.

Gall doesn't view the job as day-to-day but rather as a seasonal operation.

"Right now we're wrapping up the fall season scheduling and starting on the winter season," Gall said. "We're sorting out the end-of-the-year awards and getting organized to wrap up the spring."

The supervision at games also varies by the seasons. According to Gall, the fall season is a bit easier, since volleyball is the lone sport using the gym and there are more road events than home matches with varsity football as the lone sport on Friday nights. The winter and spring seasons, however, are not as laid back.

"Supervision is a monster during the winter with basketball

## Kids learn about salmon

One of the Department of Natural Resources and Environment's most successful natural resources education programs for youngsters is Salmon in the Classroom.

It's a year-long program in which teachers receive fertilized salmon eggs from a DNRE fish hatchery, hatch them out, feed and raise the fry through spring, and then release the young salmon into a local river.

The program teaches youngsters about everything from the life history of fish to the importance of the Great Lakes and fishing to Michigan's culture. There's a whole curriculum that goes with it.

But recently, a group of concerned West Michigan salmon fishing enthusiasts thought that something was missing from the program: a hands-on opportunity to see what fishing is all about.

The Saugatuck-Holland Area Charter Boat Association asked teachers in the Salmon in the Classroom program at Douglas Elementary School if they could arrange a field trip for the fifth graders in the program to take them fishing on Lake Michigan. And once the ball got rolling, it couldn't be stopped.

So on a recent windy May morning, more than 70 fifth graders spent the morning on big-lake boats, trolling Lake Michigan waters for salmon.

Despite some moderately obstinate weather, the event was a huge success.

Numerous youngsters not only enjoyed their first fishing outing, many of them caught their first fish.

Dave Engel, a well-known charter boat skipper out of Saugatuck, said his group has been sponsoring the local Salmon in the Classroom program, by providing the funding for the aquariums and water chillers, for the last several years. The idea of a field trip came up at an association meeting, the group proposed it to teacher Jacque Groenendyk, who began the program at Douglas Elementary, and the idea of a fishing trip took hold.

Groenendyk presented the idea to the principal and the school board.

Both went all in. "The school board backed us 100 percent," said Teya Lober, principal at Douglas

Elementary. "We had total community support—20 people offering up their boats free of charge. It's amazing."

Not all the boats were charter boats. Some private boat owners picked up the challenge and offered their boats, too.

"It took a little work, but everybody chipped in, the sportsmen of Saugatuck as well as the charter boats," Engel said. "It went real well."

The boats left the port at around 7 a.m., each with three to five youngsters aboard. The game plan was for all of them to be back in by noon for a picnic—including a fish fry.

A good time was had by all.

"It's so cool," said 11-year-old Taylor Castillo, who was one of the first on her boat to reel in a salmon. "I think it's a great experience for us to learn about salmon."

Castillo said she never thought she'd be one of the people out catching fish, "but I definitely wanted to try it."

So did her classmate, 11-year-old Brenda Bekins, who caught a 13 1/2-pound Chinook salmon—tied for the biggest fish of the day. Bekins had never been fishing before.

"I can't believe I caught a 30-inch salmon on my first fishing trip," she said. "My first trip! Great fishing!"

Groenendyk, who said the event was "just phenomenal," said her efforts—taking the idea to the school board, getting permission slips signed by parents and arranging to get all those 11-year-olds to the dock by 6:45 a.m.—paled in comparison to the work by the charter boat association.

"I think the guys had the bigger job," she said. "To rent a charter boat for a half day isn't pocket change. It's phenomenal."

The Salmon in the Classroom program has been around for almost 15 years, but it's only in the last several that the momentum has really built. This past year, 116 schools—involving youngsters from third grade through high school—participated in the program. DNRE outreach specialist Shana McMillan, who works out of Wolf Lake State Fish Hatchery—where most of the classrooms get their salmon eggs—says 27 additional schools have signed up for the 2010-11 school year.

twice a week and two, sometimes three games each night," Gall said. "There's more supervision in the spring with doubleheaders, but by doubling up (baseball and softball travel to the same site for games), that helps with our transportation and officials costs."

The athletic department also takes an active role in the Manchester community and vice versa. While it doesn't have involvement with non-school programs, the department helps with scheduling spaces for youth sports so there is no conflict with varsity and middle school teams. Gall is also involved with the Manchester Youth Basketball program, which uses both the high school and middle school facilities.

The department also has a close relationship with the Manchester Athletic Boosters. In the past, the boosters and Gall have worked together in raising money for the current Manchester Athletic Complex.

"There are very good officers in the boosters organization, and they're very supportive of our athletes," Gall said. "I'm glad that we only have one booster club that's involved with all the teams rather than boosters for each individual team."

Gall feels that his coaching duties have benefited him in becoming a successful athletic director. Having good relations with people and being able to handle multiple responsibilities

are also keys to the job.

"You need to know the problems that your coaches go through," Gall said. "It takes a lot of initiative and the ability to see the things that need to be done. You put in a lot of hours and need to be able to wear any hat during a given season."

## Learning a new culture

While she is new to the Ypsilanti Lincoln School District, Eve Claar is not a rookie when it comes to running an athletic department.

Claar spent three years working in Bloomfield Hills Lahser's department and three years at Ann Arbor Pioneer. With her first year at Lincoln coming to a close, Claar has become better adapted to her new district.

"This year is going fine, and there's always something new to get involved in," Claar said. "It was a bit overwhelming for the first year, and there was a lot to do, but over time I started to feel more comfortable."

One of the first things Claar had to do when she took over as Lincoln's athletic director was to gain an understanding of the district. During her first weeks on the job, Claar looked over the previous policies of the Lincoln athletic department to see how her approach would fit in.

"I had to get to know the culture of a new building and the teams and where they want to go, and I tried to learn from that," she said. "I had ideas that worked well in my previous experience, but were they a step

forward for us and well-suited for this environment and culture?"

Claar looks at her job as a two-part day. During normal school hours, she is busy with preparing for events. Scheduling games and officials, setting up transportation and facilities, getting people to work the games and providing trainer services are handled during the day.

After the bell rings at 2:30 p.m., the focus shifts to the management of that day's home events. Many times, Lincoln will have several teams in action at the same time.

Along with getting to know Lincoln's culture, Claar also spends time evaluating her coaching staff and athletes.

"With the evaluation of coaches, we focus on how they are teaching the kids and how they interact with them, and we monitor the athlete's grade-point average," Claar said. "We look at the number of kids in the athletic program and evaluate that over the course of the year. With this being my first year, I have a baseline to look at areas where we can generate more interest and address those issues."

Like Gall, Claar believes that districts are looking for people with prior coaching experience to lead their athletic departments. She also said that sports management degrees, which many colleges are starting to offer, is another thing that is attracting interest in potential directors.

the best player he could be. Joe trained hard in the off-season, conditioning and lifting weights to improve his ability. This year he has seen his hard work pay off, becoming one of the top pitchers in the Wolverine Hoosier Athletic Conference.

Joe said, "I have a lot more to learn and I'm looking forward to coaching."

Joe said his proudest moment at Aquinas didn't happen on the field, but off of it when he was selected as his team's Champions of Character recipient. The Champions of Character team is comprised of one player from each school in the conference who best exemplifies the five core character values of respect, responsibility, integrity, servant leadership and sportsmanship.

"Yeah, that award means more to me than the all-conference team because it's based on what my teammates and coaches think of me as a person and as a teammate," he said. "It really meant a lot to me."

Whereas, the Dexter Township Board desires the continued existence of the Dexter Township Planning Commission;

Now therefore be it resolved, the Dexter Township Board, by a vote of the majority at a regularly scheduled and duly noticed meeting held this 18th day of May, 2010, adopts Ordinance Number 38, an Ordinance to create and continue the existence of the Planning Commission of Dexter Township as authorized by Act 33 of the Public Acts of 2006; and

Be it further resolved, that the Township Clerk shall cause a true copy of Ordinance Number 38, as attached hereto, to be published in the Dexter Leader and Chelsea Standard and that the effective date of Ordinance Number 38 shall be sixty three (63) days after publication.

## DEXTER TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NUMBER 38

PLANNING COMMISSION ADOPTED MAY 18, 2010, EFFECTIVE JULY 28, 2010. AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE AND CONTINUE IN EXISTENCE THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR DEXTER TOWNSHIP AS AUTHORIZED BY PA 33 OF 2006, AS AMENDED, BEING THE MICHIGAN PLANNING ENABLING ACT, M.C.L. 123.3801 ET SEQ. FOR THE PURPOSE OF HAVING PLANNING AND ZONING IN DEXTER TOWNSHIP TO CREATE, ORGANIZE, AND ENFORCE POWERS AND DUTIES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND SUBDIVISION OF LAND; TO PROVIDE FOR THE COORDINATED AND HARMONIOUS DEVELOPMENT

OF DEXTER TOWNSHIP, AND TO FUNCTION IN COOPERATION WITH OTHER INCORPORATED AND UNINCORPORATED AREAS WITHIN THE STATE WHERE DEXTER TOWNSHIP EXISTS. THE TOWNSHIP OF DEXTER ORDAINS:

### SECTION I

1. CREATION. There shall be a Dexter Township Planning Commission pursuant to PA 33 of 2006, as amended, being the Michigan Planning Enabling Act, M.C.L. 123.3801 et seq. hereinafter referred to as the planning commission with the powers and duties as therein set forth and as hereinafter provided. This Ordinance shall be officially known and described as the "Dexter Township Planning Commission Ordinance."

### SECTION II

1. MEMBERSHIP. The Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members appointed by the Dexter Township Board of Trustees. The members shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees to be a member and remain a member of the Planning Commission. The individual shall meet the following qualifications:

A. Shall be a qualified elector of Dexter Township, except that one (1) member may be a non-qualified elector.

B. Shall not be an employee of Dexter Township, except this condition shall not apply to the Dexter Township Board of Trustees' representative to the Planning Commission.

C. After an individual's first appointment and before reappointment, he/she may be required by the Township Board of Trustees to attend training for Planning Commission members, pursuant to Section IV of this Ordinance.

D. Shall meet the conditions provided for each individual member in Section 11(2), Section 11(4), and Section 11(5) of this Ordinance, except the geographical location of the individual's residency may be considered optional.

2. TERMS. Planning Commission members shall be appointed for three-year terms. However, when first appointed a number of members shall be appointed to one year, two year, or three-year terms such that, as nearly as possible, the terms of one third (1/3) of all planning commission members will expire each year. If a vacancy occurs, a new member shall be appointed by the Dexter Township Supervisor for the unexpired term, subject to approval by a majority vote of the members of the Dexter Township Board of Trustees.

3. TOWNSHIP BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPRESENTATIVE. One member of the Planning Commission shall also be a member of the Dexter Township Board of Trustees, whose term of office shall coincide with his or her elected term of office on the Dexter Township Board of Trustees.

4. REPRESENTATION OF INTERESTS. The membership of the Planning Commission shall be representative of the important segments of the community, such as the economic, governmental, educational, and social development of Dexter Township, in accordance with the major interests as they exist in Dexter Township, such as agriculture, natural resources, recreation, education, public health, government, transportation, industry, and commerce.

5. GEOGRAPHIC REPRESENTATION. The membership of the Planning Commission shall also be representative of the entire geography of Dexter Township to the extent practicable, and as a secondary consideration to the representation of the major interests.

### SECTION III

1. STAFF. The Planning Commission, in its Bylaws, may name staff to the Planning Commission. The purpose of staff is to provide certain Township and quasi-Township officials the ability to participate in discussion with the planning commission and addition to speaking in public participation, and nothing else. At a minimum staff shall include

A Planning & Zoning Department staff, and their agents, and consultants.  
B Other staff provided for in the Planning Commission's Bylaws

### SECTION IV

1. EDUCATION AND TRAINING. Appointed members of the Planning Commission may be required by the Township Board of Trustees to attend educational programs designed for training members of Michigan planning commissions if the adopted Dexter Township budget for that fiscal year includes funds to pay for tuition registration and travel expenses for the training. Nothing in this paragraph shall deem a member who has not had training from finishing his or her term of office unless the member resigns or is removed by action of the Dexter Township Board of Trustees. The member may be ineligible for reappointment at the conclusion of the term of office if he or she did not attend training. The Planning Commission shall include in its Bylaws what training programs qualify to meet this requirement.

### SECTION V

1. REMOVAL FROM OFFICE. The Dexter Township Board of Trustees may remove a member of the Planning Commission for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in office upon written charges and after a public hearing. Exceptions may be made if absences are due to illness, injury, sudden emergency, or the conduct of other business as authorized by the Planning Commission. Willful or intentional failure to disclose a potential conflict of interest shall be considered malfeasance in office. The Planning Commission shall define in its Bylaws a conflict of interest. Failure to consistently attend Planning Commission meetings (per Section V(2) below) shall be considered nonfeasance in office.

2. NONFEASANCE. The secretary of the Planning Commission shall report to the Dexter Township Board of Trustees any member who has missed three (3) consecutive regularly scheduled meetings or four (4) meetings in the previous twelve (12) months. Exceptions may be made if absences are due to illness, injury, sudden emergency, or the conduct of other business as authorized by the Planning Commission.

### SECTION VI

1. MEMBERSHIP VACANCIES. If a vacancy occurs, a new member shall be appointed by the Dexter Township Supervisor for the unexpired term, subject to approval by a majority vote of the members of the Dexter Township Board of Trustees.

### SECTION VII

1. MEMBERSHIP TRANSITION. The transition from the previous Dexter Township Planning Commission and the Planning Commission established in this Ordinance shall be gradual and shall take place over the next three years. The Dexter Township Board of Trustees shall continue to make annual appointments, appointing approximately one-third (1/3) of the membership of the Planning Commission as specified in this Ordinance, so that three (3) years from the effective date of this Ordinance the membership, representation, and number of members have completed the transition to fully comply with this Ordinance. 2. All other aspects of this Ordinance shall have immediate effect.

### SECTION VIII

1. MEMBERSHIP COMPENSATION. All members of the Planning Commission shall serve as such with compensation equal to, or less than, the per diem of the Dexter Township Board of Trustees per meeting.

### SECTION IX

1. MEETINGS. The Planning Commission shall meet at least once every month and a majority of the Planning Commission shall constitute a quorum.

2. ADOPTION, OR RECOMMENDATION FOR ADOPTION, OF ANY SITE PLAN, PERMIT, ORDINANCE, AMENDMENT, OR MASTER PLAN OR AMENDMENT TO THE SAME. The affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the total number of seats for members of the Planning

Commission, regardless if vacancies or absences exist or not, shall be necessary for the adoption, or recommendation for adoption, of any site plan, permit, ordinance amendment, or master plan, or amendment to the same.

### SECTION X

1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Planning Commission shall have the powers and duties set forth in PA 33 of 2006, as amended, being the Michigan Planning Enabling Act, M.C.L. 123.3801 et seq. and PA 110 of the Public Acts of 2006, as amended, being the Michigan Zoning Enabling Act, M.C.L. 123.3101 et seq.

### SECTION XI

1. MEETINGS, RECORDS. The Planning Commission shall adopt Bylaws for the transaction of business and shall keep a record of its resolutions, transactions, findings, and determinations, which records shall be a public record.

### SECTION XII

1. APPROVAL, RATIFICATION, AND RECONSTRUCTION. Any project review or process taking place at the effective date of this Ordinance shall continue with the

Planning commission created by this ordinance, subject to the requirements of this ordinance and shall be deemed a continuation of any previous Dexter Township Planning Commission.

### SECTION XIII

1. SEVERABILITY. In the event any provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provisions thereof.

### SECTION XIV

1. PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be published once in a newspaper having general circulation in the Township of Dexter and shall take effect sixty three (63) days after publication. This Ordinance was duly adopted by the Board of the Township of Dexter at its regular meeting called and held on the 14th day of May, 2010, and was ordered given publication in the manner required by law.

I, BARREY B. 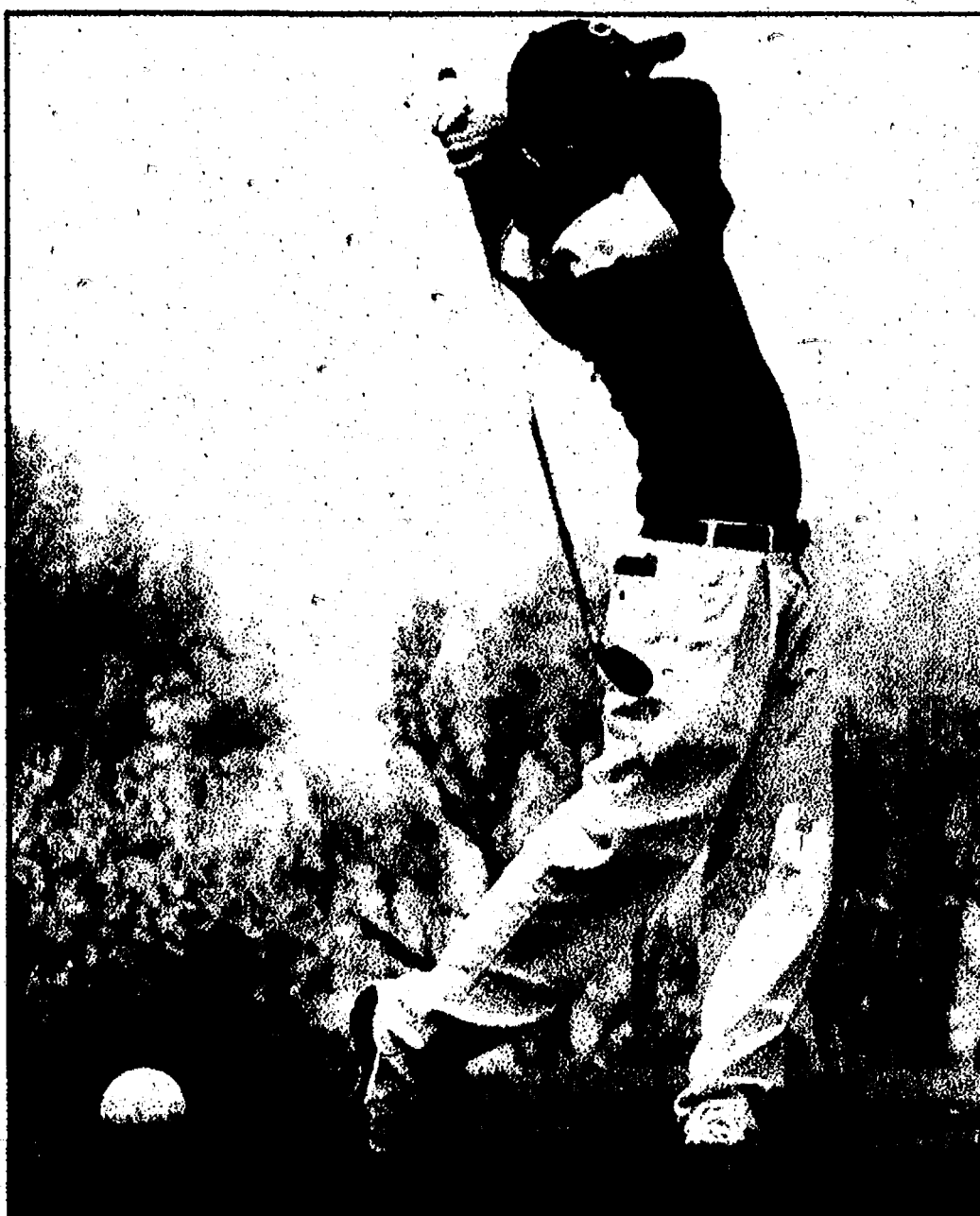

- The base of the tower shall be fenced with a minimum eight (8) foot chain link fence, and all structures associated with the communication tower shall be located therein.
- The related unmanned equipment structures shall not contain more than three hundred and sixty (360) square feet of gross floor area per user or be more than twelve (12) feet in height. No part of these structures may be located more than fifty (50) feet from the associated tower. Multiple users will be strongly encouraged to share an equipment structure with a common wall.

Section 3.  
THE DEXTER TOWNSHIP 2003 ZONING ORDINANCE is amended by deletion of Sub-Section 16.24A(2), and the substitution of the following provisions in its place and stead:

B. Special Performance Standards:  
16.24A. All signal and remote control conductors of low energy extending substantially horizontally above the ground between a tower or antenna and a structure, or between towers, shall be at least fifteen (15) feet above the ground at all points, unless buried underground or within the required fence enclosure.

Section 4.  
THE DEXTER TOWNSHIP 2003 ZONING ORDINANCE is amended by deletion of Sub-Section 16.24B(1), and the substitution of the following provisions in its place and stead:

16.24B. Special Performance Standards

17. Collocation  
a. Statement of Policy. It is the policy of the Township to minimize the overall number of towers established in locations for communication towers within the community, and encourage the use of existing structures or towers while promoting the public health, safety, and welfare and minimizing negative impacts of such sites. If a provider fails or refuses to permit collocation on a facility owned or otherwise controlled by it, where collocation is feasible, the result will be that a new and unnecessary additional structure will be compelled, contrary to the Township's policy for collocation. The provisions of this subsection are designed to carry out and encourage conformity with the policy of the Township. All permits for communication towers or collocation, therefore, shall be conditioned upon, and shall require binding commitment of the owner to permit collocation upon its facilities pursuant to the standards of this ordinance in recordable form, as approved by the Zoning Administrator.

b. Feasibility of Collocation. Collocation shall be deemed to be feasible for purposes of this section where all of the following are met:

- The communication provider entity, under consideration for collocation, will undertake to pay market rent or other market compensation for collocation.
- The site on which collocation is being considered, taking into consideration reasonable modification, is able to provide structural support.
- The collocation being considered is technologically reasonable, and the collocation will not result in

unreasonable interference, given appropriate physical and other adjustment in relation to the structure, antennas, and the like.

- The height of the structure necessary for collocation, will not be increased beyond a point deemed to be permissible by the Planning Commission, taking into consideration the standards contained in this Section.

Requirements for Collocation:  
1. A permit for the construction and use of a communication tower shall not be granted unless and until the applicant demonstrates that a feasible collocation is not available for the coverage area and capacity needs.

2. All new communication towers shall be designed and constructed so as to accommodate collocation.

3. If a party who owns or otherwise controls a communication tower shall fail or refuse to permit a feasible collocation, and this requires the construction and use of a new communication tower, the party failing or refusing to permit a feasible collocation shall be deemed to be in direct violation and contravention of the policy intent and purpose of the Township, and consequently such party shall be in violation of this Ordinance.

d. Collocation as an approved Accessory Use. Subject to the standards and conditions set forth below, collocation shall be approved administratively by the Zoning Administrator under the following circumstances:

- Collocation is permitted as an accessory use on any existing communication tower in Dexter Township regardless of whether or not the communication tower was approved prior to adoption of this Ordinance.
- The communication provider entity under consideration for collocation shall be subject to the same regulations, restrictions, and conditions of approval, if any, that were placed on the communication tower by the Planning Commission at the time of its approval.
- A communication provider entity under consideration for collocation may be permitted to construct related unmanned equipment structures, subject to Section 16.24A(4), and a cable bridge between the existing building and tower, subject to 16.24B(4), provided there are no grading changes.
- There shall be no increase in the height of the tower. Furthermore, no collocating antenna shall exceed the height of the tower.
- There shall be no additional lighting permitted on the tower.
- Any additional structural support for the communication tower structure that does not conform to the standards of Section 16.24, such as guy wires, shall be prohibited.
- If there is no existing fence around the base of the tower or the existing fence does not meet the requirements of Section 16.24A(3), the communication provider entity under consideration for collocation shall construct a fence, in accordance with that subsection. Collocation shall not take place until a Zoning Permit has been issued by the Zoning Administrator per Section 3.03 of this Ordinance and a Building Permit has been issued by the Building Inspector, if required. In addition to all applicable information required

for a Zoning Permit application, the following additional information shall be provided by the applicant:

- Written consent to collocate by the owner of the tower or its designee.
- Written approval of the Federal Aviation Administration or Federal Communications Commission if necessary.
- The building plans must be stamped and signed by a licensed structural engineer, qualified to approve the plans.
- All existing and proposed utilities shall be shown on the plans.
- A signed acknowledgement and acceptance of all the applicable standards of Section 16.24.

Section 5. The remaining provisions of Ordinance 34 and all amendments thereto are hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

Section 6. In the event that any provision of the within amending ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or void for any reason, that provision shall be struck from the amendment and severed and the remaining provisions shall be enforced according to their terms and provisions.

Section 7. The within amending ordinance shall be effective seven (7) days after publication.

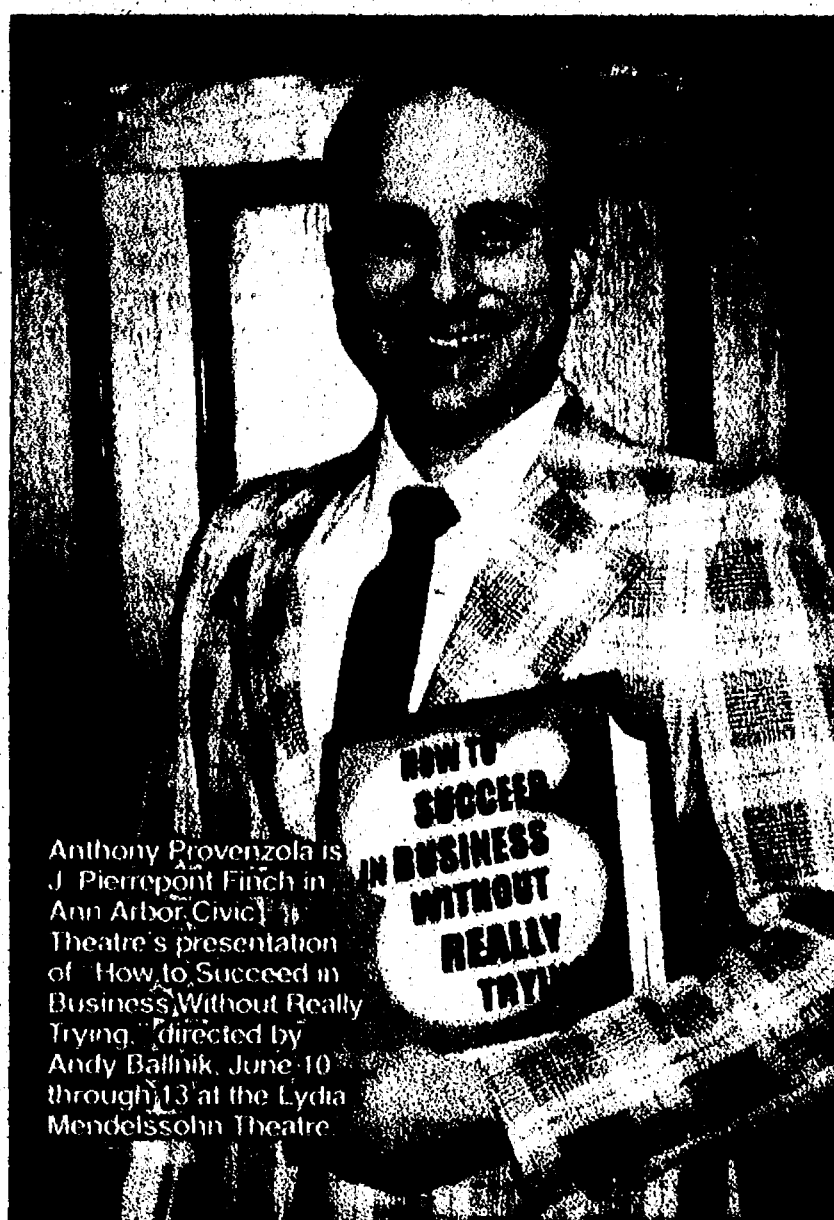
"How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" is one of my favorite musicals," says director Andy Ballnik.

The money raised is used for gardening projects throughout the city, Ritz says. The sale is held the first

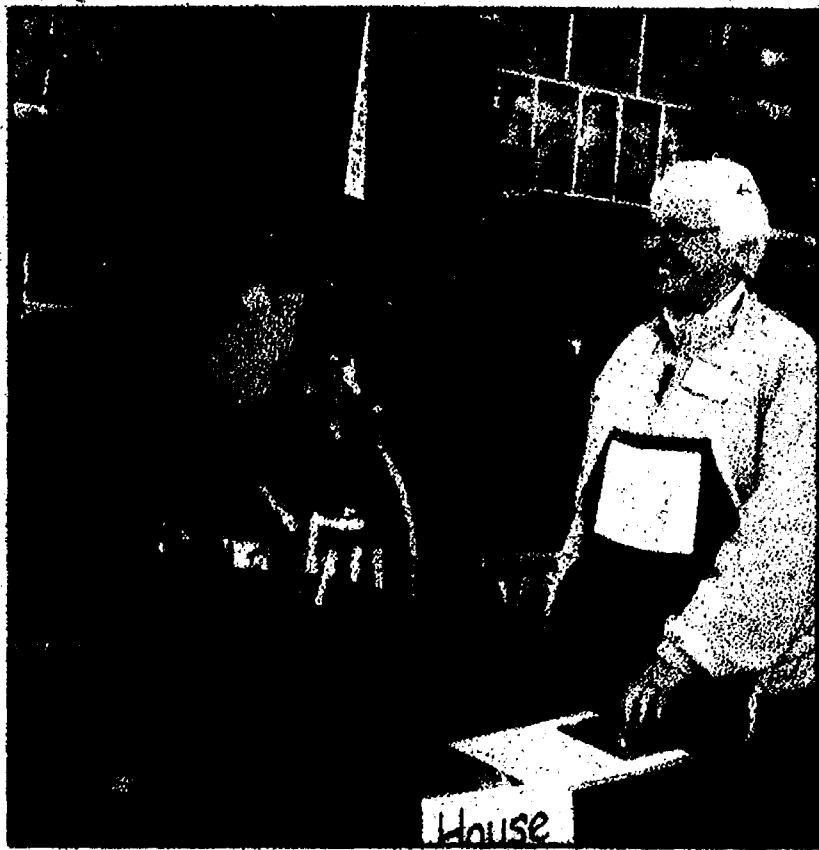

## Volunteers clean up area cemetery in Lima Twp.

Local residents Bill Coury, Don Laier, George Hellner, Ed Greenleaf, Ron Herrst, Craig Maier, Bob Bulmon, Chuck Chamberlain and Tom Bater spent many hours last week cleaning up a small cemetery in Lima Township.

"There are a lot of people who don't even know this cemetery is here," Greenleaf said.

With its oldest grave dating back to at least 1801, the cemetery borders the Beach property and I-94.

Barbed wire fence separates the cemetery from the farm fields that surround it.

The residents, all volunteers, brought their equipment, sweat equity and community pride to begin the task of unearthing the Beach Cemetery off Jackson Road.

"We're donating our time to make this look presentable," said Bulmon.

The timing of the project was planned just before Memorial Day.

Small American flags flank the graves of known veterans — many of which were placed there by Don O'Dell of the Chelsea American Legion.

But there could be more — and it's hoped that all the names of those buried at the cemetery will be discovered once the heavy lifting has been completed.

The 10 men began their efforts to clear and cut fallen and dead trees, clear out underbrush and find old gravestones May 19.

Greenleaf, a township planning commissioner and member of the cemetery committee, is leading the effort.

The volunteer crew of 10 to 15 men was doing their best to get as much done before Memorial Day and once it's cleaned out, it will be maintained, they say.

Greenleaf said there is a three-member cemetery committee that includes himself, Laier and Chamberlain.

They plan to contact as many families with members buried in the cemetery to begin the next phase of restoration.

The men hope that the broken gravestones can be repaired and

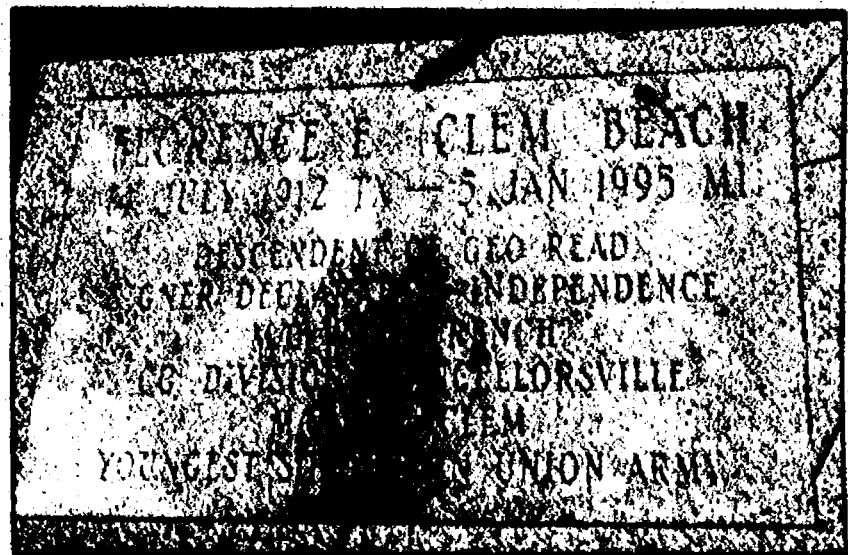

## Cooking classes open to area teens, children

Local area children will learn about healthy, easy-to-prepare foods at a free four-session cooking and nutrition course sponsored by the Cancer Project, a national nonprofit dedicated to advancing cancer prevention through education and research.

"The Food for Life Nutrition and Cooking for Kids series is a youth-centered spin-off from the Cancer Project's adult courses, which are designed to help cancer survivors and their families learn new tastes and easy food preparation skills."

Each class will include a nutrition topic and activity followed by a cooking demonstration by local instructor Jan

Kemp and a sampling of the food prepared. Classes are open to children ages 9 to 11, and parents and guardians are welcome to attend. Students will receive two booklets, including a workbook with activities, puzzles, recipes and room to add their own illustrations.

"It's never too early to learn to eat — and cook — right," said Jennifer Reilly, a senior nutritionist for the Cancer Project.

"With childhood obesity at a record high in America, it is more important than ever for children to learn healthy food habits at an early age. The lessons learned at the Food for Life cooking classes are ones they will carry into adulthood."

Reilly said a good way to stay healthy is to load up on fruits, vegetables and whole grains that are naturally low in fat, full of fiber, and filled with cancer-fighting antioxidants and phytochemicals.

"Cut down on fatty foods and added fats and oils, particularly saturated fats, which have been linked to an increased risk of breast, colon, and prostate cancer in adulthood," she said.

## Dexter sets 2010 funding priorities for projects

The six year Capital Improvement Plan recently drafted by village staff and adopted by the Dexter Village Council represents major project funding priorities into 2015.

The CIP includes 82 overall projects including cooperative and Downtown Development Authority projects.

One change in this year's CIP is the amount of funding for those projects, which is down 58 percent from the \$34,261,000 earmarked in the 2009-2014 plan.

Village officials said that the decrease is attributed to

unknown project costs and refined cost estimates particularly with regards to water and sewer projects.

Construction bid prices have also come down due to the building market, and some projects from last year have already been partially completed.

This year's CIP funding is \$19,973,000, with \$4,355,000 earmarked for village projects in the first year.

With the next phase of the Mill Creek Park project expected to move to the permitting phase, the village expects to spend over \$1 million next year for parks and recreation.

Five projects in the plan are considered urgent, including

Mill Creek Park, Central Street streetscape, equalization basin, water system improvements and emergency water storage.

These projects are being funded by grants, federal stimulus money, DDA contributions and loans in addition to village funds for a total of \$7 million.

More than 27 percent of CIP project funding comes from stimulus money, federal loans and federal aid.

The new CIP contains a list of completed or partially completed projects including new sidewalk construction on Alpine Street, sanitary sewer rehabilitation, construction of a new well, upgrades to high service pumps, replacement of a catch basin and soft road maintenance.

Projects included in the CIP are considered necessary for the economic health of the village, the health and safety of residents and overall quality and efficiency of village services.

As the actors in the show-within-the-show take their final bows, the star collapses. Lt. Frank Cloffi (played by Leo Babcock of Saline), shows up to investigate the death,

which appears now to have been a murder. At the same time, being a fan of theater, he attempts to fix the show's problems, which have so far been preventing it from receiving any critical success.

The first rehearsal is combined with a business meeting

in which all of the scripts are passed out, and the cast receives welcome folders. The folders explain all of the expectations, such as rehearsal protocol, a contact list of the production staff, welcome letters from the director, music director, and choreographer, and a ticket order form. The cast and production staff introduces themselves, discovering the wide variety of the community members involved.

This cast has a range of experience, from veteran actors and professional musicians, to community members who have only been in a few productions.

The common factor among the cast is that they all believe, as Lt. Cloffi states in the show, "putting on a musical has got to be the most fulfilling thing a person could ever hope to do."

Kennedy Shuck, an eighth grader at Mill Creek Middle School in Dexter, has been involved in theater with DCP and other local groups for the past two years.

"The first rehearsal went really well. We got everyone acquainted, which probably made us all feel comfortable so it's not so overwhelming. There were some people who were familiar and some who weren't and now everyone isn't nervous. And the chorus got to feel a part of it from the beginning," he said.

After the business portion of the first meeting is done, the cast reads through the entire script. Many cast members have not seen this show, nor read the script, because this is a new musical. Each cast member gets a script, and they begin

to read through the entire show. The hilarious lines are soon revealed, and at the same time, some of the actors begin to develop their characters.

The concept of the show-within-the-show allows for characters such as a pompous British director, a chorus girl who wants to be a star, a brassy Broadway producer, and a divorced ladies' man who is one half of the composing team, along with his ex-wife.

Among the many entertaining storylines, characters and jokes, the show contains some "inside jokes" for theater people.

"The story is really funny and I can relate to it so well because I know it. This is totally what you see behind the scenes, which tells the story, which is really intriguing," Shuck said.

Curtains will be performed July 23 through 25 at Dexter High School's Center for the Performing Arts. Tickets are \$15 at the door, \$12 in advance via [www.dextercommunityplayers.com](http://www.dextercommunityplayers.com), or \$10 apiece in packs of 10.
