Police receive grants for equipment

Department to purchase new high-tech tools

The Chelsea Police Department will soon have new bulletproof vests, fingerprint readers and Breathalyzers thanks to grants from the Courts and Law Enforcement Management Information Systems (Clemis).

Chelsea Police Chief Ed Toth said the department was recently awarded a grant to purchase two BlueCheck fingerprint readers - devices that are capable of automatically reading 3 million fingerprints in the Michigan database in seconds.

The devices, which cost about \$3,000 each, will be used in two marked city police cars.

Toth told the Chelsea City Council on Oct. 26 that it was unusual for a department the size of Chelsea's to be awarded a grant for this type of equipment.

"Usually the larger departments get this stuff," he said. Officer Tom Gilbreath said he's amazed at the advances in technology available to police

departments. He said the fingerprinting device, which is about the size of a cell phone, can produce results in seconds.

The department is currently working on a policy for BlueCheck use, Toth said, adding the devices will be used in a manner that does not violate civil rights.

"They are a tool for officers to help them identify people who do not have identification on them when stopped for an arrestable offense or a crime on foot," he said.

To use the new fingerprinting device, pointer fingers are scanned one at a time by placing them on a pad, Gilbreath said.

The device automatically reads both fingerprints and checks them against the Michigan fingerprint database.

The BlueChecks will be placed in operation in the next few weeks, Toth said.

The department was also awarded a \$1,625 grant from the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program through the U.S. Department of Justice. The grant pays for half the cost of the bulletproof vests, Toth said.

Each vest costs about \$650 and they must be replaced every five years, he said.

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

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School board awarded positive financial report

Audit shows district is financially stable

The Chelsea School District's annual financial audit shows the district is in good standing.

Mark Perry of the financial services firm Yeo and Yeo told the Board of Education at its meeting Oct. 25 that the district's finances were given an unqualified or "clean" opinion.

Perry reported that the district's fund equity at the end of the 2010 school year was at 20 percent of annual expenses, right at the recommended 15 to 20 percent mark. Perry pointed out that the district earned \$473,000 in interest during the 2007-08 school year, but earned only \$32,000 in interest during the 2009-10 school year. The drop in interest earned is reflective of the state of the economy.

The audit showed that the district is financially stable and currently suited to withstand the economic impact of the immediate future.

"As bad as the current economy is, the reason you're doing okay is because of how you handled things in the past," Perry said. "You've weathered the storm, but the forecast isn't great. It's a hard environment."

Board member Jeff Crowder asked Perry how other public schools were doing.

"Everyone has cut back to

bare bones. On paper they look okay, but the cutbacks have been tremendous. The landscape looks way different than it did four years ago," Perry said.

In other news:

• Superintendent David Killips attended the legislative breakfast and reported that in the coming lame duck session, "mammoth changes" are not expected.

• Killips also reported that the Washtenaw Intermediate School District board will be making a county-wide decision regarding whether to ask voters for a 0.965 millage renewal for Special Education funding.

• The board voted to accept the policy committee recommendations to change district policies to reflect state and federal laws. Employee policy revisions include those for nondiscrimination, anti-harassment, HIPAA, and family and medical leave of absence policies. Student policy revisions include those for cell phone and electronic device uses.

Hospital opens infusion center

New wing will treat for blood, cancer patients

This week, Chelsea Community Hospital opened a new donor-funded Infusion Center in collaboration with Ann Arbor Hematology Oncology Associates for patients with blood disorders and cancer.

"One of the hospital's goals was to expand its oncology services for residents in the Chelsea area," said Kathleen Griffiths, president and CEO of Chelsea Community Hospital.

Located in Suite 204 on the second floor of the professional building, the center was completed through donations and will see its first infusion patient on Nov. 2, said Jennifer Berry, marketing director for the hospital.

There are six treatment bays - five open bays and one private one. All have amenities such as comfortable furniture, a flat screen television, a media and entertainment library, refreshment stations and warm blankets.

Each bay has a picture-window view of the woods on the hospital campus and a plaque recognizing the donors' names.

Major donors to the effort include Carol and Howdy Holmes, Bob and Jan Lyons, Jiffy Mix, Pause For Pledge, Chelsea Community Hospital Auxiliary, the Feeney family, Tarra and Robert Gombarski, Patti Harris, and "It's a Great

Day to Be Alive.

Griffiths said the center will start slowly and build as the demand increases and it is the first step in providing expanded cancer treatment services at Chelsea Community Hospital.

She said she hopes the center will provide radiation services in the future.

"Having service close to home is really important for patients," she said.

During a hospital auction in May, more than \$51,000 was raised for the bay amenities during the "Pause for Pledge" portion of the evening. The hospital set a goal of \$21,000 to outfit three rooms and it was exceeded by more than \$30,000.

In addition, a group of Dexter residents raised more than \$20,000 during a fundraiser called "It's a Great Day to Be Alive" to support the new cancer center.

Included in the space are a check-in area and waiting room with original artwork by Mary Beth Koeze of Chelsea, two physician offices, a nurse's station, and three exam rooms in addition to the treatment bays.

"We are delighted with the collaboration with Ann Arbor Hematology Oncology Associates and to be able to provide these services," Griffiths said.

Chelsea Police Department, which includes full-time, part-time and reserve officers.

"All the officers wear vests," Toth said.

The grant, which will be matched by police department funds, will pay for about five new vests this year, and the department plans to continue applying for this grant to replace additional vests during the next few years.

The department also received a grant for two new preliminary

breath testing devices called Lifeloc FC10 PBTs, which will be placed in the department's marked cars, Toth said.

The new devices cost about \$600 each and give an immediate alcohol level reading rather than having to push buttons to activate and deactivate the machines.

The new Lifeloc FC10 PBTs will replace the department's current Alco-Sensor3 devices, which will be placed inside the police department for use in court-ordered breath tests.

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Walberg takes back U.S. House seat

In an ironic flip-flop of the 2008 election, U.S. Rep. Mark Schauer, D-Battle Creek, was ousted from his seat by Republican challenger Tim Walberg of Tipton Tuesday night.

Walberg garnered 44,460 votes as of midnight according to Fox 2 Detroit. Schauer received 39,047 votes. Schauer was also challenged by Green Party candidate Richard Wunsch (1,233 votes), Scott Aughney of the U.S. Taxpayer's Party (1,546 votes), and Greg Merie of the Libertarian Party (1,253 votes).

Schauer narrowly defeated Walberg in the 2008 presidential election with 49 percent of the vote, uprooting the congressman from Tipton after only one term. The seat itself has changed hands every cycle since 2006, when Walberg defeated Rep. Joe Scharz, a one-term Republican from Battle Creek.

Walberg said he attributes the success of the election to

voter turnout.

"I think voters wanted change," he said. "And guys like me, grassroots organizations, the Tea Party, and others now have the opportunity to limit government and reduce spending."

Walberg said one of the biggest issues facing the 7th Congressional District has been government healthcare reform.

"I will be signing onto a bill as soon as I can to repeal 'ObamaCare' and restore the Bush tax cuts," Walberg said.

With the Republican Party assuming control of the House of Representatives, Walberg said he vows to work with elected officials to fight for energy reform, taxes and Social Security reform.

"I think the Republican Party is going to press hard to return government to the people," he said. "If the Democrats are willing to work with us, then I'll be delighted to work with them, if not, I think it will be a struggle, but we're not going to back down."



Upon returning to Washington, Walberg said he will pickup where he left off before being ousted by Schauer in 2008.

"A key concern for our constituents in the district is affordable health care and a great amount of fear of what has been done by the federal government," he said. "My plan goes back to my bill that I introduced while I was in Congress that is a patient-centered affordable approach that says let's look at things like expanding the use of health savings accounts. Let's offer association health plans for small businesses so they can join together in an

economy of scale to produce health insurance that is affordable employees."

Walberg said he would also like to see Congress tackle tort reform by putting a cap on non-economic damages and reducing "frivolous" medical lawsuits.

Social Security reform is also a high priority.

"We need to put a lock box on Social Security. It would mandate that no funds from that trust fund could be used for anything other than Social Security purposes," Walberg said.

Walberg said, overall, his campaign was very successful spreading a message of

reform.

"I would say it went very well. We won," he said. Walberg said he is proud of the volunteers who helped during the months leading up to both the primary and general election.

"We were outspent significantly, but I always knew that if we could get our message out there, we could win," he said.

Walberg said over the next year, he plans to hold several meetings throughout the district to speak with constituents on issues they would like to see addressed.

"I love meeting with constituents on a level that isn't scripted," he said. "That's why we held close to 200 meetings when I was in office before. I will push to do the same again so that I can be open and receptive to the needs of the district."

Schauer's campaign was unavailable for comment as of press time early Wednesday.

Some new faces on County Board

Editor's Note: Candidates for Washtenaw County Districts 3 and 10 ran unopposed. Republican Alicia Ping was elected to the third district, and Conan Smith to the 10th.

District 1

With nearly all precincts being counted, it appears as of press time early Wednesday that Republican Rob Turner has defeated political newcomer Adam Zemke for the Washtenaw County Board's District 1 seat.

As of 12:50 a.m. Wednesday, all precincts except for those in Scio Township had been accounted for, showing Turner with 5,923 votes to Zemke's 4,545.

Turner gave high praise to the 27-year-old Zemke, whom he said ran a very good race. "Adam is very young and energetic, and he has nothing to hang his head over. He has a lot to be proud of," Turner said Tuesday night.

Turner then thanked the voters for supporting his bid and said he was looking forward to the new challenge after serving for many years on Chelsea school board.

Despite the loss, this isn't the last the county has seen of Zemke. He said that he has every intention of running again and staying involved.

"This is my first foray into elected politics and it has been an experience that is indescribable and inspiring and it will not be the last," Zemke said.

District 2

Incumbent Commissioner Ken Schwartz appeared to be in a dogfight to retain his seat in District 2 late Tuesday.

With 43 percent of the county precincts tallied, Schwartz, D-Superior Township, showed a lead of just 212 votes over Republican Dan Smith.

Schwartz said his own campaign tallies show he lost Webster Township, but took the Scio Township portion of the district by more than 200 votes. Several precincts had not yet reported, and many that did still needed to tally absentee ballots.

"It's going to be close either way, no doubt about it," Schwartz said.

Smith, a Northfield Township trustee, ran on a platform of fiscal responsibility and won the August party primary with more than 70 percent of the vote. He did not respond to messages Tuesday.

District 4



After more than 20 years of involvement in local politics, voters in Washtenaw County's District 4 have decided to return political veteran Wesley Prater for another term on the County Board of Commissioners.

According to unofficial election results, Prater was leading Republican challenger Robert Van Bammelen 6,439 to 4,602 with all precincts counted except for those in Augusta Township.

At 76 years old, Prater has no intention of slowing down his government activity and is looking forward to another two-year term on county board.

"We have worked really hard throughout the district. We did a lot of walking and knocking on doors, and it paid off for us," Prater said.

For Van Bammelen, an Ypsilanti Township resident, he is not sure if he would run again for office, but said he has taken some lessons from what has been an "interesting" experience.

"Whether I would run again remains to be seen," said Van Bammelen. "(Prater) is a good guy and I hope that he continues to do a good job. And that goes the same for everybody that was elected. I hope they all served in the people's best interest at the local level."

District 5

With only two precincts reporting for Washtenaw County's District 5, the race could not be called as of press time.

At 1 a.m. Wednesday, unofficial results show incumbent Rolland Sizemore with 1,674 votes to Republican challenger Bill Emmerich's 686 votes. There were 11 more precincts yet to be accounted for as of press time, including all of Ypsilanti Township.

If re-elected, Sizemore said he plans to continue the projects and goals he has focused on during his four terms in office. He currently serves as chairman of the board.

"Also, we need to step it up another notch on account of the county's financial situation," Sizemore said.

District 6

According to unofficial results in the race for the Washtenaw County Commission's District 6, incumbent Ronnie Peterson will be returned to the board after defeating Republican challenger David Raafaub.

With all except three precincts counted, Peterson was winning the race as of press time by 78 percent.

A sexual harassment lawsuit against Peterson's rental company, First Pitch Properties LLC, and manager Glenn Johnson, who is Peterson's cousin, apparently had no effect on voters who overwhelmingly approved Peterson's bid for re-election. The lawsuit was settled in August and Peterson has said that he was completely unaware of his cousin's actions.

He said is grateful to Ypsilanti residents who have given him another vote of confidence.

"It is my plan to carry out my original focus on economic development, creating jobs in eastern Washtenaw County and the county at large, and we need to all collectively work together to create the right environment for job creation," he said.

One of Peterson's primary issues in the coming months will be to establish a reliable funding source for the newly revived land bank.

"We need to stabilize and enhance the value of homes and assist stopping the foreclosures," Peterson said. "We must do more to prepare, and we must meet these challenges and that's what the people are saying. They are expecting results."

District 7

Washtenaw County Commissioner Kristin Judge, D-Pittsfield Township, had a 321-vote lead in her bid for a second term with five precincts reporting.

Results on the race between Judge and Republican challenger Sean Gray didn't start coming in until about 11:45 p.m. By midnight, Judge posted 1,979 votes to Gray's 1,658, according to the unofficial results tallied by the Washtenaw County Clerk's Office.

The 7th District encompasses all 11 voting precincts in Pittsfield Township. Judge said she visited them all throughout the day, greeting voters, meeting staff, and informally gauging the results after what turned out to be a long and intense campaign.

"It's been tough," she said traveling between polling locations earlier Tuesday. "But I'm proud of the work we've done."

If re-elected, Judge pledged to continue to bring transparency and openness in county government to a new level.

One aspect is her monthly newsletter sent to constituents with highlights of county activities and programs.

"People want to be engaged, but they just don't really always know how or know much about county government," said Judge, 43. "I'm hoping to change that and keep them informed."

Regardless of the outcome, Gray, a high school teacher and author, reflected fondly on the entire campaign experience in his first run for public office.

"It was a highly-concentrated campaign that was tough, challenging and yet a great experience," Gray wrote in an e-mail. "I had the opportunity and distinct pleasure to meet a diverse, thoughtful and interesting array of Pittsfield residents."

He also credited his family, friends and fellow Republicans for their strong support.

District 8

In the District 8 County Commissioner race, Democratic incumbent Barbara Levin Bergman upheld her seat for an additional term after receiving 1,077 votes, or 71 percent, as of midnight Tuesday. She defeated Republican challenger Melinda Day, a graduate student and research assistant, who received 407 votes, or 26.94 percent, as of midnight.

Levin Bergman has served nine terms for a total of 18 years as Washtenaw County commissioner. During the campaign, she mentioned the importance of maintaining services to vulnerable citizens, as well as continued fiscal vigilance and responsibility.

"We are working closely with our community non-profit partners and County/Ann Arbor Community Development to maximize the dollars we have available for services," Bergman said in a previous interview. "All commissioners and staff are alert for ways to achieve savings."

She was thankful for her supporters and their confidence in her abilities, and promised to continue to earn that confidence.

Her opponent, Republican Melinda Day, focused on issues such as balancing the county budget at a level representative of its cost and maintaining a strong public safety department.

Day could not be reached for comment Tuesday night.

District 9

In the District 9 County Commissioner race, Democratic incumbent Leah Gunn retained her position with 1,975 votes as of midnight Tuesday, defeating her Republican opponent, Mark Tipping, who received 670 votes, or 25.19 percent.

Leah Gunn, a University of Michigan alumna, serves on dozens of public and community service committees and is focused on preserving county services despite economic challenges, as well as retaining the county's commitment to long-term fiscal stability.

She could not be reached for comment Tuesday night, but spoke at length leading up to the election about the tough tasks ahead.

"In the ensuing years, we must keep a very close eye on both revenue and expenditures because we are not out of the woods yet," she said. "We were affected greatly by the loss of both Pfizer and the General Motors plant, and it's a struggle to preserve our needed services."

Republican opponent Mark Tipping could not be reached for comment.

District 11

In District 11, Democratic nominee Yousef Rabhi, who previously won the Democratic primary by a single vote, won by a significant margin against Tea Party Republican nominee Joe Baublis. Rabhi received 3,823 votes as of midnight on Tuesday, or 75.87 percent, while Baublis received 1,180 votes, or 23.42 percent.

Rabhi is a University of Michigan student and Huron High School graduate focused on protecting human services and forging a sustainable future. He works for the Natural Areas Restoration at the University's Matthaei Botanical Gardens and Nichols Arboretum.

Rabhi could not be reached for comment Tuesday evening.

Baublis, a Kalamazoo College and Eastern Michigan University alumnus and a handyman, saw the election as an opportunity to provide something different to voters.

"I don't label the vote results as a win or a loss, but rather as a change of public policy or not. I congratulate by good fellow Yousef Rabhi..."

Financial lifestyle choices must come before retirement

As retirement looms, crucial financial and lifestyle decisions you may have put off for years suddenly assume more importance. Retirement Bottom Line
You've been marshalling your finances for years, and while you may have had intermediate goals, funding a pleasing retirement lifestyle has probably been a long-term objective. As you near your last day on the job, it's time to make adjustments.

First, you may want to

realign your portfolio's asset allocation, especially if you've been an aggressive investor with a high tolerance for risk. In retirement, your time horizon is shorter, recovering from major market downturns is more difficult - and you'll probably want a regular income stream to pay your bills.

Your retirement could be lengthy, so if your wealth is sufficient, you may consider dividing your portfolio into two parts. One would be devoted to producing a regular income while the other would be allocated for growth. 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DIABETES IS A TRIPLE THREAT TO YOUR VISION

Diabetes causes many health problems, not the least of which affect vision. Persons living with diabetes are especially at risk of developing Diabetic Retinopathy, Glaucoma, and Cataracts.

If you have diabetes, or a family history of diabetes, you should have a dilated eye exam or retinal scan once a year. Also, follow your physician's regimen for controlling your blood sugar level. A major study has shown that better control of blood sugar slows the onset and progression of diabetic eye disease.

Diabetic Retinopathy: Diabetic Retinopathy weakens and causes changes in blood vessels in the back of the eye. Untreated it can cause "floaters", cloudy spots and, ultimately, blindness.

Glaucoma: Diabetes is 40% more likely to develop Glaucoma. This leads to damage of the optic nerve, which results in vision loss or blindness. There are usually no symptoms or pain associated with the onset of Glaucoma.

Education stimulus unfairly leaves charter school teachers behind

The recent approval by Congress of some \$10 billion in the Education Jobs Fund sends a discouraging, dissimulating message to many of our nation's teachers.

It could well have been called, "Leave Some Teachers Behind," due to some recently unearthed provisions written into the bill in response to pressure from the National Education Association and the American Federation of Teachers.

Parents of students who attend charter schools should be incensed that teachers in their schools are unlikely to see any benefit whatsoever from this huge outpouring of federal fodder (more than \$300 million for Michigan).

The money allocated to most charter schools must remain unspent, due to the law's stipulation that the funds must not be expended for contracted employees.

According to a Sept. 3 letter from the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools, "for varying reasons (including state laws), public charter schools across the country have employ-

ees who are NOT employees of the (local education agency) they are located in."

The irony here is that in spite of governmental support for parental choice in regard to school selection, Congress blindly ignored that concept by acceding to union influence to keep the money away from saving the jobs of thousands of charter school teachers.

Yet again, teacher unions demanded and received an unfair advantage leveraged by campaign contributions and lobbyist influences.

According to a July 1 article on the NEA web site, "NEA Members Get It Done! House Passes \$10 Billion Jobs Bill," NEA President Dennis Van Roekel said, "Today as a direct result of educators' voices and efforts, we are a step closer to making sure children do not have to bear the brunt of our nation's economic woes."

The quote sounds good, unless you're a child who doesn't have an NEA/AFT union teacher rehired with those federal dollars... so apparently the NEA thinks

that it's all right for those charter school students to bear the brunt of our fiscal nightmare.

The impact in Michigan is substantial, in that some 80 percent of the state's charter schools contract with management organizations, making them ineligible to receive the federal funds to save teacher jobs.

So, sadly, students and teachers in most of Michigan's charter schools will receive a harsh and unfair judgment when it comes to this issue of support from Washington.

In addition to the issue regarding contracted employees, acquisition of the federal funds has been slow in coming to the states and some states have met with rejected applications for the funds.

According to an article in the Sept. 7 edition of the EdWeek Update, "(Texas) state officials balked at a provision in the federal law that requires... additional assurances about how its schools will be funded for the next three years."

That state is dealing with a fundamental conflict between the

federal legislation and provisions of their state constitution that could well prevent Texas from receiving any federal support at all. Michigan would certainly find it impossible to meet that type of expectation. Michigan's Legislature has of late been unable to figure out a school-aid budget in a timely manner for a single year, let alone having the ability to plan for stability in the future.

Yet, perhaps the more important question really is, what happens when the federal funding dries up, and what will be the ultimate impact of our schools' sudden reliance upon Washington?

The phrase "we're from the government and we're here to help" resonates in this discussion.

General Motors was able to rebound with intervention from the feds, but can Michigan's schools do the same?

OUR TAKE: Editorial House shouldn't approve outlandish tax

There's an outlandish tax proposal in the U.S. House that our local representatives say doesn't have a chance of passing. We pray they're right.

An internet version of the plan references House Resolution 4646, sponsored by Rep. Chaka Fattah, D-Pa., which would place a 1 percent tax on all transactions at any financial institution — banks, credit unions, etc.

Sylvia Warner, press secretary to U.S. Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Howell, says the Internet summation appears to combine HR 4646 with HR 1068, the Let Wall Street Pay for Wall Street's Bailouts measure, which creates a \$1 trillion excise tax on securities and commodities. The size of this tax would rise and fall depending upon the net carrying cost of the Troubled Asset Relief Program.

Warner says taken together, which is probably not fair because HR 4646 has no cosponsors and Fattah is not a cosponsor of HR 1068, the two bills would create a tax system that would tax all investment, savings and commercial transactions.

However, she says there appears to be little chance that bill 4646 will ever get voted on and it's highly improbable that 1068 will see any action.

Other Oakland County representatives expressed similar sentiment. So let's hope that both — but definitely HR 4646 — die a silent and permanent death Dec. 31, when the current Congressional session officially ends. The bills would have to be reintroduced next year to a new Congress.

As horrible as HR 4646 is, there might be a lesson here. Maybe it's similar to the one that Rep. Jim Bunning, the former Tiger pitching star and now a Republican senator from Kentucky, was trying to teach. He was vilified for opposing an extension of unemployment benefits, which admittedly should have been and was passed.

But we believe he wasn't the heartless soul many made him out to be. Rather, he was trying to make a point — Congress needs to finance or pay for what it spends.

The overriding question with all of the TARP, bailout and stimulus expenditures is how are we going to pay for the debt they brought? And, to be honest, we have to blame ourselves for the spending mess we're in. We, the people, elected these representatives and it's up to the "people" to monitor them.

As a newspaper, we do our best to report their actions and activities. In the meantime, individuals should keep writing their representatives in Congress and watching what they do and what they say. No matter who won Tuesday's election, somehow they and their Congressional counterparts will need to find a "moderate and reasonable" solution to our debt problems — and it may or probably will take some kind of tax increase. Hopefully, not a ridiculous one.

Balancing the budget won't be easy. It probably will mean taxpayers have to swallow a bitter pill, but hopefully not an insane one.

If we don't find something reasonable, then we're liable to end up with legislation that is as disgusting as a transaction tax. Something that literally taxes every breath we take.

U of M's assertion about training on animals nonsense

Regarding the story "USDA Clears U of M Medical School's Use of Animals in Training" published Oct. 19, whether or not its legal, it defies science, ethics and common sense for the University of Michigan's Survival Flight program to continue using cats and pigs to train flight nurses like myself in emergency medical procedures when realistic simulation mannequins that accurately mimic human anatomy and physiology are readily available on campus and are endorsed by leading experts and medical organizations.

Flight nurses' own professional organization, the Air & Surface Transport Nurses Association, sponsors a three-day training course called the Transport Nurse Advanced Trauma Courses, which covers the skills taught in U of M's Survival Flight course. The ASTNA has recently stated that 29 of 30 TNATC courses offered this year have used simulators instead of animals.

In simulation laboratories, trainees can practice procedures until they get them right, are given immediate feedback about their performance and measures can be taken to faithfully recreate the high-pressure environment that flight nurses and other specialists are required to operate in.

On the other hand — and I say this as one of the original developers of the most prominent pediatric life support training course in the country — animals do not represent the correct anatomy that nurses will actually be practicing on, anesthetized animals do not respond to medical treatments the way live humans or human simulators do, and animal laboratories do not allow trainees to repeat procedures until they are proficient.

For U of M to say that effective training of flight nurses requires the use of animals is nonsense. There is no scientific, educational or ethical justification for such a practice.

Board should take another look at policy wording

Regarding the Saline school board policy statement that the Saline High School Spectrum group is campaigning to have amended, I agree with those who have commented that you cannot legislate behavior and that changing the wording in a document is not going to stop bullying in a school, regardless of what the bullying is based on. However, what I think the Spectrum students are asking is that their school board not live by the "do as I say, not as I do" mentality. Let us think that there are no guidelines against bullying in Saline schools, it should be made clear that students have been told they cannot harass others because of gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, among other things.

As stated in the student handbook, "Harassment or bullying" is any gesture or written, verbal, graphic, or physical act (including electronically transmitted acts (i.e., Internet, cell phone, personal digital assistant (pda),

or wireless handheld device) that is reasonably perceived as being motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression; or a mental, physical, or sensory disability or impairment; or by any other distinguishing characteristic." However, the policy statement from the Saline Board of Education Policy Manual concerning discrimination reads: "The district will not discriminate against any person based on sex, race, color, national origin, religion, height, weight, marital status, handicap, age, or disability." So, while the student handbook, which deals with acceptable and unacceptable student behavior, specifically mentions "gender, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression," the Saline School Board Policy Statement on discrimination, which addresses student behavior, as well as the behavior of the teachers, administrators and school board members, does not include this same language.

The Spectrum students are merely asking that their school

board, teachers and administrators adhere to the same standards in their discrimination, policy as they themselves have been told to adhere to regarding harassment.

It's counter to everything logical regarding the education and rearing of children to ask them to adhere to rules that you, yourself, are not willing to follow. And, if you are willing to follow those rules you compel the students to follow, then you need to be willing to write those same rules into your policy manual. It's nonsensical to tell students that they can't harass others based on certain criteria when you are not willing to say, in writing, that you will not discriminate based on those same criteria.

Will changing these words ever stop bullying in Saline High School or any school? No. But it will show the students of Saline High School, and others who may be paying close attention to this issue, that the board that governs how they are mandated to behave is not a hypocritical demagoguery that can talk the talk, but won't walk the walk.

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
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
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
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Voters renew natural areas millage

Washtenaw County voters were asked to renew a millage proposal for the Washtenaw County Natural Areas Preservation Program in Tuesday's midterm election. As of early Wednesday morning, it appeared voters had approved the proposal by a margin of 28,746 votes, or 56.13 percent, to 22,463, or 43.87 percent.

The tax of 0.2409 mills will be levied for a period of 10 years beginning in December 2011.

The millage was first approved in November 2000 with 64 percent voting in favor of the countywide tax, which will have

generated more than \$27 million between 2002 and 2011. The Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners established the NAPP with the goal to "protect and preserve the natural, ecological diversity and heritage of Washtenaw County, complement the existing network of publicly and privately protected lands, and maximize the public's benefit from those lands," according to the county's website.

The program is managed by the Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation Commission, which reviews nominations for new additions to the collection of protected lands and maintains all purchased lands.



This year's proposal renewed the 2000 millage at a rate not to exceed one-fourth of a mill for a period of another 10 years, generating approximately \$3.5 million in the first year. The funds are to be used to purchase natural areas for preservation, operate the land preservation program, and maintain current land preservations.

Land donors like Elizabeth Beaudoin, who contributed land to a preserve, feel the program adds great value to Washtenaw County.

"I think they've done a wonderful job over the past 10 years since the proposal first passed," Beaudoin said. She was a land donor to the Leonard Preserve, just one of many parcels out of the 1,811 acres pro-

ected by Washtenaw County's NAPP.

"I love the outdoors, and as much as possible I take walks and spend time outside."

Aside from simply enjoying the preserves, however, there were also voters who saw added value for the county in the millage proposal. Ray Berg, president of the Manchester Area Chamber of Commerce, hoped the millage would help with another Washtenaw County initiative.

"The proposal is important to the Gateway Communities Project in communities such as Manchester," Berg said. "Promotion and use of the

Leonard Preserve in Manchester ties in directly with our goals.

"Use of the Leonard Preserve and our other local NAPP-funded preserves also stimulates the healthy living objectives set out by the Manchester Wellness Coalition and the Chelsea Area Wellness Foundation."

Those who voted against the renewal, however, were concerned with their current tax levels.

"It might only be one-fourth of a mill, but all the millages add up and I don't see this as a priority over those," said Ann Arbor area resident Thomas Brown.

The millage will be levied through 2020.

DOVE Missions founder visits Ann Arbor

When Minneapolis resident and mother Liz McKie first visited the Dominican Republic, she had no idea her short trip would turn into a life-changing experience that would put her at the helm of an international charity association.

"I went on a vacation in 2002 and I did not even know where the Dominican Republic was," said McKie. "I thought Haiti was its own island. I went online to see what our hotel would be like and I found this homeless children's vocational school."

McKie decided to bring supplies for the children and on her first day she visited the school to deliver the supplies. The school was located directly across the street from the hotel, and McKie ended up visiting the children every day.

"The woman who was the social worker at this school... she started telling me the stories of these children, and they were so joy-filled and loving and sweet and I was just blown away."

"I was really taken, and I thought, I've always had a heart for missions and I never thought, you know, being a hairdresser, I could do anything and I found out I could. So, I committed to myself that I was going to do more."

started having compassion."

McKie relocated to Haiti in 2007.

"It was the hardest thing I ever did... but it was the best thing I ever did," she said. "I was leaving my friends and family. I didn't know the language, well, I knew some and I thought, 'I must be crazy to do this.' Everyone pretty much thought I was crazy."

It was there that McKie was introduced to Gymps (pronounced James) Sunel, a resident of Haiti who lost both parents at an early age. Sunel left the country to attend school, but eventually returned.

"I couldn't do this without him," said McKie. "He wanted to come down and see our center. And the boys that I had met, the street boys that were around the same age as my son, they're in their teens now. They're my heart, but they're the most difficult boys to work with because they were a part of a pedophilia ring and we were just trying to get them out of the pedophilia ring and it was just difficult."

"But Gymps became their role model and their mentor and, really, he's the only one in the country — male or female — that can work with these kids. He's like a miracle worker."

"I come back (and help these kids) because the problem Haiti has, they don't work together. If I leave the country, I go outside and I can never come back," said Sunel.

"Because the country doesn't do anything for others, (there are) people with big money. That's the big problem; people don't stay. And I was an orphan, and there are so many orphans in Haiti. I want to help the kids because they don't have anything. We're supposed to help them. If I can find three or four persons like me and we can work together, we can see what we can do for all these kids because they need help."

Hal and Kim Chrisman, who live in Chelsea, partnered with DOVE Missions. Hal recently became the chairman of DOVE Missions in August.

"One of the things from our perspective was I read a book by the founder of World Vision that talked about a story where he says, 'What would happen if a plane crashed today?' It would have all this attention — 265 people on board; it would get a lot of attention," Hal Chrisman said.

"Well, what would happen if 100 of those planes crashed every day. You've got 26,500 people dying every day. That's

what's happening in the world every day. You've got poverty-related deaths — 26,500 kids — every day. And this is our way of trying to prevent that."

"You can go and visit the family and you're down there. We've been down five times in the last year and a half. We have a 12-year-old and a 7-year-old and they gave up Christmas gifts last year to go at Thanksgiving, because they couldn't wait from August until spring break came to see those kids again," said Kim Chrisman.

"They have nothing. Things that every human should have, they don't and they still have so much happiness and so much joy," Kim Chrisman said. "It really blows you away when you experience it. You can talk and explain to people, and they really don't know. I had no clue until I really experienced it for myself."

In 2010, DOVE partnered with Our Lady of Perpetual Help Orphanage in Haiti with plans to generate funding to provide food, clothing and shelter, as well as basic medical and hygiene needs for families who have been affected by the earthquake.

"Since getting independent from France, Haiti was bad before but not like this. So after the earthquake, Haiti is worse — so many people in the streets, so many kids. They don't have anything. It's a big, big, big problem. If you went to Port au Prince now, you would cry," said Sunel.

Despite being a small humanitarian organization, DOVE Missions has impacted the lives of many residents by creating a Boys and Girls Club, providing food and safety for children, providing job training and English language instruction, and working to strengthen families by providing children and mothers with marketable skills for the future.

"Our goal is to No. 1, change the mothers," said McKie. "How can we do that? By teaching them to read and write, and we've got a sewing project. But also (teach them) responsibilities. They have to have their children enrolled in school."

DOVE Missions offers opportunities for assistance with its Sponsor a Child program in which individual families can help with a monthly sponsorship of a child who attends the DOVE Missions Youth Development Center. The sponsorship helps pay for the children's school uniform, covers their costs in the center,



and provides the family with a food voucher each month used toward groceries.

"You can sponsor kids in World Vision or Compassion International and big organizations, but this is something where you can do it on a personal basis and know," said Chrisman.

Individuals and families also can sponsor an activity such as the music program, which is in desperate need of funding.

"We're in the process of trying to produce a CD," said McKie. "We've just found music is a wonderful expression of your frustration, your anger, your hope and lessons learned, and children all over light up when they hear music, and it's a great learning tool as well."

DOVE Missions also offers those who want to support their cause to book a volunteer vacation.

"You can still have your vacation and your time to be with family, which I think is important anyway," McKie said.

"But you can also spend a day helping others, which is also fundamentally an important lesson to teach your children. You're not sending your child on a mission trip, you're able to talk and say, 'Now, when we go back home, is it really devastating if you don't get an iPhone?'"

"We owe it to our young people to give them a heart for service because we're all in this big world together. Eighty percent of the world lives in such dire poverty that we can't even comprehend here, especially with our young people."

"My son, who was 12 years



old at the time, and he came along with me (to Haiti) and I saw the transformation in him. When he came back, it was nothing dramatic immediately, but as we went along, he went from having to buy designer jeans to shopping at Goodwill with me. He didn't need new shoes and games.

"I just saw such a transformation in him at such a young age. It formed him into a completely different person in just one week."

"You're not empowering anybody by giving them stuff.

You're going to demean them, degrade them and rob them of their self-respect. But if I walk with you, along side of you, my life is better, your life is better because I cared. That's what it's all about."

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Diabetes Health Fair set Nov. 13

Marking the American Diabetes Association's National Diabetes Awareness Month and the United Nations' World Diabetes Day, the University of Michigan Comprehensive Diabetes Center will host its fourth annual U of M World Diabetes Day Health Fair from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Nov. 13.

The purpose of the diabetes health fair is to inform the public about how to manage diabetes and its complications and, ideally, how to avoid them.

At the U of M World Diabetes Day Health Fair, clinical and research professionals from the U of M Comprehensive Diabetes Center and the U of M Health System will provide the latest information on diabetes prevention and treatment, based on their groundbreaking research at U of M.

In addition to the exhibits in the Michigan Ballroom and lobby, there will be two presentations in the Pettit Room:

•9:30 a.m.: "Diabetes Headlines: What Are People Talking About?" with Dr. Jennifer Wyckoff, assistant professor of internal medicine and medical director of the U of M Health System's Adult Diabetes Education Program.

•12:30 p.m.: "Mindful Eating and Diabetes" with registered dietician Sacha Uelmen, director of the U of M Health System's Adult Diabetes Education Program, Division of Metabolism, Endocrinology and Diabetes.

The health fair offers attendees the chance to talk one-on-one with U of M diabetes experts. Topics to be covered include:

- Food portion control.
- Mindful eating.
- Glucose monitoring.
- How to fit exercise into your lifestyle.
- Weight loss.

- How to handle sick days.
- Making proper nutrition choices.

Other U of M health professionals will provide information on the effects of diabetes on the eyes, kidneys, heart and teeth/gums.

All types of diabetes will be covered, including type 1, type 2, pre-diabetes and diabetes during pregnancy.

A special emphasis will be placed on avoiding diabetes and/or its complications by maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

This year, more interactive booths have been added. Visitors can participate in activities such as trying out simple exercises, selecting fake food portions to "Rate Your Plate" and guessing the sugar and fat content of foods and beverages.

Free blood glucose, cholesterol and blood pressure screenings will be available. A new addition this year will be kidney screenings, offered by the National Kidney Foundation of Michigan. Kidney disease is a severe complication of diabetes.

Free body-mass calculations and waist-to-hip ratios also will be offered to assess obesity and determine the likelihood of developing type 2 diabetes.

Diabetes medical supply and pharmaceutical companies also will be on hand to display their latest products and to answer questions.

U of M researchers looking for participants to join their clinical studies will be present to explain what their studies involve and who is eligible.

For most studies, payment is provided upon successful completion of the requirements. If applicable, study medications are provided at no charge as well.

In addition, many studies need healthy subjects and individuals with diabetes to serve as "con-

trois."

Type 2 diabetes is on the rise in Michigan and the United States. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the number of Americans diagnosed with diabetes increased 13.5 percent between 2005 and 2007.

The American Diabetes Association estimates that 24 million children and adults in the U.S. currently live with diabetes - which represents about 8 percent of the population - and an additional 57 million people are at risk for type 2 diabetes, the most common type.

The health fair will be held at the Four Points by Sheraton Hotel, located at 3200 Boardwalk in Ann Arbor.

Those who register in advance are eligible for door prizes, but walk-ins also are allowed.

Ann Arbor's Concordia University will celebrate Veteran's Day Nov. 11 by giving scholarships of \$5,000 to service members and veterans from Washtenaw County.

Veterans Day at Concordia

Concordia University in Ann Arbor will honor veterans and service members from Washtenaw County Nov. 11 with a day of celebration and scholarships for veterans.

"Concordia students, faculty and staff have been doing things individually throughout the Afghan conflict to support vets," said Jon Luker, university liaison and military specialist for Concordia. "A few years ago, soldiers in Iraq honored and thanked the students by flying a flag over Saddam's palace, and then they gave the flag to Concordia. We scheduled a flag presentation for Veterans Day to turn the spotlight back on veterans."

Luker said that during the inaugural event, the public was invited to see the flag flown, and the annual tradition of honoring veterans has grown from there. University officials predict that this year's event, the third for Concordia, may be the largest yet.

Charles Winterstein, president of Concordia, said the event was born out of a sense of appreciation for men and women in the armed services.

"We've felt a very close connection with the armed services. We've done care packages and letters, and things like that in the past," he said. "It's a way for Concordia to show gratitude and love for the men and women who have done so much for our freedom. It's a phenomenal day of celebration."

The 2010 Veteran's Day event marks the first time Concordia is partnering with the Homefront Hugs. Part of the proceeds raised during the salute to veterans will go to the nonprofit, which supports military members and their families. Homefront Hugs organizes drives to send care packages to troops, and volunteers provide support to military families, from giving rides to medical appointments to simply providing a sympathetic people for military families to talk to when needed.

Additionally, before the event and on the day of the event, the university is offering the opportunity for loved ones to purchase a star in honor of veterans. These stars will be displayed on the university lawn, and proceeds will go to Homefront Hugs. To purchase a star, visit www.vetsdaycelebration.com.

The day's offerings will include a job fair featuring companies looking to recruit veterans or their family members, a "family support fair" consisting of local businesses and organizations set up to assist military members and their families, a movie marathon, a display of military vehicles and various military demonstrations.

Additionally, attendees may bring donations to be packed into boxes to be sent to troops, and children can draw pictures that will be included in the care packages.

Any local veterans or current military personnel who attend will be offered a scholarship to Concordia. The military member may use the scholarship himself or may pass it on to a spouse, a child or another veteran.

Luker said that the first year, about 35 veterans were given \$5,000 scholarships to attend Concordia, each renewable for four years. The second year, the school gave closer to 50 scholarships. This year, Luker said the school hopes to give away as many as 200 scholarships.

"We thought it would be nice to give veterans who show up some concrete sign of appreciation, not just words of thanks," Luker said.

Winterstein said that, in addition to the officially scheduled events, he hopes more casual, friendly interactions will happen between veterans and the general public Nov. 11.

"I've watched students in the past connect with older veterans from World War II and the Vietnam era, and I saw a true appreciation for the time served and lives given," Winterstein said. "It was very touching to see those connections happen. You cannot go through the day witnessing these things without coming to tears at some time."

Winterstein said that road construction off Geddes Road and near the university will be finished by the day of the event, and the public will be able to see the new and improved "gateway to Ann Arbor" in addition to celebrating the contributions of veterans.

"I have every reason to believe this year the celebra-

tion will be even better than in the past," Winterstein said.

In the days leading up to the celebration, Concordia officials are urging community members to get the word out to military families and veterans in Washtenaw County, letting them know they are welcome to the event and will have the opportunity to receive a scholarship.

"We certainly welcome any and all folks to come experience the day and the displays and to interact with veterans, faculty students and staff," Winterstein said. "It's our Christian and civic duty to honor those who have served, and that's what we're doing."





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Results mixed for Michigan House

Much like the rest of the elections across the state and country, the race for the Michigan House of Representatives was a mixed bag for both Democrats and Republicans this year.

In the 52nd District, Republican Mark Ouimet had a slight edge over Democrat Christine Green as of press time early Wednesday. According to Fox 2 News Detroit, Ouimet garnered 9,932 votes to Green's 7,500 votes.

Green, a trustee for Scio Township and civil rights and employment discrimination attorney for 25 years, said she has no regrets with her campaign.

"I'm so proud of my campaign and the job that all of our volunteers have done," she said. "I think our message of job creation, education and reform has really resonated with voters."

Green said the election was too close to call at 10:30 p.m. Tuesday.

"There's still some major precincts out there that we're waiting on," she said. "It's too hard to tell right now."

Green said one thing that she has taken away from her campaign was her ability to connect with thousands of voters on the campaign trail.

"Voters really connected with our message and I loved going out and meeting so many people in the district," she said.

Ouimet, a former Ann Arbor City Council trustee and current vice chairman of the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, said he will immediately begin working with members of the House and Senate to bring jobs back to Michigan.

"As you know, we've been focused on jobs since Day 1. Jobs have been the cornerstone of our campaign and we've stayed the course," Ouimet said.

"In order to do this, we must create a business-friendly climate by altering the state's current tax structure in a manner that will encourage businesses to open their doors in Michigan and to attract new business to the state."

Ouimet said, if elected, he will work in a bipartisan manner with other members of the Legislature.

"These aren't Democrat or Republican issues, these are Michigan issues and it has always been my goal to focus on the needs of Michigan."

Ouimet said he was pleased to hear about fellow Republican Rick Snyder's victory over Democrat Virg Bernero in the gubernatorial race.

"Voters identified with Rick Snyder as an agent of change and I think Rick will be a great leader to help bring jobs back to Michigan," he said.

In the 53rd District, Democratic nominee and Washtenaw County Commissioner Jeff Irwin was winning by a substantial margin as of midnight Tuesday.

With 18 of 59 precincts reporting, Irwin commanded nearly 80 percent of the vote, gathering 7,516 to Republican Chase Ingersoll's 1,882 votes.

The district includes Ann Arbor, Pittsfield and parts of Scio Township.

On his campaign website, Irwin told voters he has the experience for the job.

"Lansing is broken and I want to help fix it," he said. "I have a wealth of experience in local government after serving on the county board for 10 years."

He described some of his political endeavors.

"I have considerable policy experience in Lansing having worked in a legislative office and having advocated on behalf of environmental issues for many years," he said. "I understand the gravity and the importance of the decisions entrusted to me."

Irwin said he promises to focus on schools and universities, clean air, clean water and wise stewardship of natural assets.

Prior to the August pri-

mary elections, Irwin discussed his political strategy for these initiatives in a survey conducted by Heritage Newspapers.

"Michigan's economic strategy starts with the best schools and universities," he said. "To attract jobs, grow native businesses and improve our communities, we must get back on track with funding education. The first step is to pass school budgets on time."

Irwin also considers himself an advocate for the Great Lakes.

"I will propose changes to our pollution permit fees that gives incentives for pollution reduction, and enable more vigorous enforcement of our basic clean water and clean air protections," he said. "I will hold polluters accountable for the mercury pollution in our water and our fish, and I will introduce the strongest right-to-know laws in the nation. As a parent, I want full disclosure of the toxic elements in the products we buy."

Irwin is also in favor of new transportation options within the state.

"Finally, I will propose measures to make our cities more livable by investing in mass transit and supporting biking and walking with our transportation investments," he said.

Irwin, 33, is married and has one daughter.

Democrat David Rutledge was winning his bid for the 54th District seat late Tuesday night, apparently defeating challengers Richard Deitering, Clifford McKinney and David Palmer.

With 15 of 46 precincts counted, the vote had Rutledge with 5,508, Deitering with 2,014, Palmer with 474 and McKinney with 107.

The 54th District includes the city of Ypsilanti, Ypsilanti Township, Salem Township, Superior

Township and Augusta Township.

"I believe that my demonstrated history of leadership and public service in the areas of township, county and state government, and higher education provide a unique set of credentials that would allow me to be effective immediately as your state representative," he said. "In this era of term limits, there is simply no time for on-the-job training."

"Now more than ever, strong, competent and decisive leadership is needed at the state level."

Rutledge vowed to focus on economic issues troubling the state.

He said he wants to "get the Michigan economy moving again" through job creation by offering creative incentives to businesses, improve public education with a focus on early childhood readiness to learn, increase access to health care, reform the Michigan tax system and protect Michigan's unique, natural environment.

Rutledge said his political experience, combined with a willingness to help breakdown traditional party-based squabbling, makes him the right man for the job.

"I've been involved in politics a long time and on the ground working on issues like transportation, education funding and job creation," he said.

Republican candidate Deitering is pastor of the Ypsilanti Free Community Bible Church and former Augusta Township supervisor.

Independent candidate Palmer is a small-business manager in Ypsilanti and said he was inspired to run as a result of what he perceived to be the other candidates' shortcomings.

"I just looked at the field of candidates and I had no faith that we would get any-

thing different from them than what we've always gotten," he said.

With 30 percent of voter precincts reporting at midnight Tuesday, Rick Olson, a newcomer to Michigan state politics, led the general election for the 55th District, with 57 percent of the vote.

Olson, a Republican, had received 4,186 votes and led Democratic candidate Mike Smith, who had received 3,097 votes, according to news reports.



The election is to replace current Rep. Kathy Angerer, who was term-limited after three two-year terms in office.

Olson's highest priorities are to restart the Michigan economy, primarily by reducing or eliminating the Michigan Business Tax, and to more effectively control state spending.

"We must get the wage and benefits costs for public sector employees under control, and more in line with those received by comparably talented private sector employees," he said. "Now that we are ranked 37th among the states in terms of per capita income, we cannot afford the present levels without job-killing tax increases."

Olson, who described himself as semi-retired, had used the available time to run for office, having begun to campaign on Labor Day,



over a year ago.

During the campaign, he pointed to his ability to hit the ground running in Lansing if elected, having acted as a legal adviser to a Republican caucus in the Washington State Legislature in the 1980s.

Regarding his career, he said, "I've had to reinvent myself several times."

"It's been one steep learning curve after another," he said, adding that the varied experience has helped to prepare him for the office that he is seeking, and the term limits imposed by state office.

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EMU MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY TEAM WINS ANOTHER TITLE
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THREE RIVERS, Mich. (EMUEagles.com) — The Eastern Michigan University men's cross country team kept the Eagles' championship tradition alive here Saturday in the 2010 Mid-American Conference Men's Cross Country Championships.

The Eagles scored 66 points en route to their 15th conference title, led by first team All-MAC honoree, sophomore **Terefe Ejigu (Mount Cook, Wellington-Wellington College, New Zealand)** who took first place honors. Ejigu became the 18th EMU runner to win the individual championship in the 30th running of the MAC meet when he ran a winning time of 24:08 over the 8,000-meter course.

Senior Captain **Matt Hammersmith (Wolcottville, Mich.-Prairie Heights)** suffered an unfortunate injury during the race and was unable to finish for the Eagles, but Head Coach **John Goodridge** was proud of how his team stepped up.

"Our captain got injured during the race," said Goodridge. "His teammates saw that, but thankfully they responded the right way and picked up the slack to bring home the title."

Not only did they step up in place of their fallen teammate, but they overcame the pressures that lingered from last year's runner-up finish to the 2009 MAC Champion, Kent State.

"Six of the seven runners today were from last year's team which did not win," said Goodridge. "We had a four-year streak of conference titles and were looking to break an EMU record of five in a row, so that hurt last year after our second-place finish. It created a lot of pressure on our guys to bring the championship back to Ypsilanti, but they overcame and did just that."

by-exhibiting at the River Gallery.

"This year the gallery owners decided not to participate, so I started looking for a place to show my work that day in downtown Chelsea," she said. "The old West of the Moon space was empty. Landlord Bill Ballagh was willing to rent it to me for November and December, and an idea occurred to me. Rather than setting up a store, I'd do six small shows throughout the season, with eight artisans featured each Saturday.

"The purpose of these shows is to offer local shoppers a vari-

ety of high quality, handmade arts and fine craft products in a personal setting, and to afford artists and crafts persons an opportunity to sell their work in an intimate setting in busy downtown Chelsea. I think the concept of a changing show with something different offered each week will be an interesting concept for shoppers, and will generate excitement in the area."

Items, provided by artists from Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Ann Arbor, Saginaw, Hanover, and Bath, will include baskets, dolls, glass, jewelry, pottery, paint-

ings, textiles, and handmade soaps.

Ann Arbor artist Susan Falcone will bring a selection of new nature watercolor paintings and prints, note cards, and handmade ornaments.

"When Marsi brainstormed this idea, it struck me this was a new idea for a lovely former venue in which many of the upcoming exhibiting artists had already shown their work," Falcone said. "Judging from the speed with which all Saturdays were filled by artists eager to once again show work, or to show work for the first time, in the old Moon space, we

were all sure this was a winner of an idea.

"Because the space for each artist is smaller than at a regular art fair, we will showcase our art by selecting such pieces that would not only highlight our own work, but would be both contrasting and complementing to the other artists."

Cheryl Braun Fontana, owner of Cheryl Braun Basketweaving on Huron River Drive in Dexter, has recently traveled to Missouri, Vermont, Virginia, Georgia, and Ontario, Canada, to teach her craft.

"I now have 28 copyrighted original basket patterns, and I'm learning more about baskets every day," she said. "I find myself with a surplus of baskets and I am clearing 10 years worth of my inventory to make

room in my shop for new ones. Never again will people be able to purchase heirloom quality baskets at these prices.

"Marsi's concept is a great opportunity for artists to keep their inventories and displays fresh and new, and an even greater opportunity for shoppers to see a variety of high quality local art for several weekends in a row, right before the holidays."

Dexter resident Mark Hiser coordinated the project for Phoenix Contractors.



2011 Ford F-150 Power Play

Make no mistake: This is a story about four new engines

The 2011 F-150 might look the same on the outside, but between the front fenders it's a whole new truck game.

In one lightning-strike move, Ford's top-selling hauler unleashes a drastically different powertrain lineup that, depending on your selection, allows you to travel further on a tank of gas, tote a heavier payload and pull a heavier travel trailer. There are also more safety and convenience features.

It's common for automakers to refresh their more popular models after a two- or three-year period, but for Ford to bring out a quartet of new V6 and V8 engines is nothing short of astonishing. It will also likely send the competition back to their respective drawing boards to devise some sort of response.

Reducing fuel consumption is important to everyone, but it's of particular importance to truck owners. Whether they use them as mobile offices or for personal/recreational use, these normally thirsty rigs tend to consume more than their fair share of petroleum products. Obviously any move to reel in consumption is money ahead for truckers.

On this front, Ford appears to have all the bases covered, although there are no hybrid or diesel powertrains in the mix.

For light-duty use, the F-150 is offered with a base 3.7-liter V6 that makes 302 horsepower and 278 pound-feet of torque.

The 3.7 is the first V6 available in a full-size Ford pickup since the 2008 model year when a 202-horsepower 4.2-liter unit was offered.

Next up is a 5.0-liter V8 that generates 360 horsepower and 380 pound-feet torque rating.

Sharing architecture with the 412-horsepower Ford Mustang engine, the 5.0 replaces the duo of 4.6-liter V8s, the best of which developed 292 horsepower.

For heavy lifting and for off-roading duties, the most muscular engine in the F-150 garage is a 6.2-liter V8 that puts out 411 horsepower and a road-ripping 434 pound-feet of torque. The new 6.2 is standard in the F-150-based SVT-Raptor, a specially equipped, uniquely styled, off-road-capable truck that was launched for the 2010 model year. For 2011, the Raptor comes in a four-door model in addition to the two-door extended-cab version.

Wait, we're not quite done yet. Later in the model year, Ford will offer its 3.5-liter twin-turbocharged "EcoBoost" V6 with 365 horsepower and 420 pound-feet of torque. Ford claims that the regular-gas-burning EcoBoost will achieve a 20-percent fuel-economy improvement compared to the outgoing 5.4-liter V8 with its 310 horsepower and 365 pound-feet of torque, however actual fuel consumption figures for all F-150 engines have yet to be announced.


Six-speed automatic transmissions with manual shift control will link all

powerplants to either rear- or optional four-wheel drive-trains. You'll also be able to limit the transmission to its lower gear range, which is useful when towing heavy loads and/or when climbing a steep grade.

For 2011, the model and trim availability list is as long as several arms. The existing XL, STX, XLT, FX2/FX4 and Lariat are joined by the XLT Custom and Lariat Limited (the latter featuring the beefy 6.2-liter V8 as standard).

Regardless of trim, cab size, box length or drive system, the F-150's engine-upgrade program was long overdue, if rather sudden. Ford's full-size pickup peers have literally been gaining strength of late and it was clearly high time for Ford to respond in kind.

With plenty of powertrain choices to suit a multitude of work and play applications, the F-150 stands to gain considerable ground — and credibility — in the pickup segment.


The completed interviews and documentaries will be made available online and in the library's local history section available for check-out.



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Hands-on workshop set for Saturday

Harvest season may be coming to an end, but creative and sustainable projects are possible at home or in the garden and woods, extending the growing season and recycling what we've got.

Several sustainable and lower-energy skills will be taught and demonstrated at the "Use What You've Got - Use It All" conference at Michigan Friends Center Nov. 6.

Transition Town Chelsea and the Michigan Friends Center have been working together to bring the second annual "Living Lightly Transition Conference" at the Michigan Friends Center.

Herbal wisdom, hoop-house building, bicycle repair, canning, re-purposing old clothing, rug braiding, composting, cutting and burning wood and permaculture are some of the hands-on skills to be taught by local experts.

"By profession, I'm a computer guy, but I love to get out in the woods. I've been cutting and burning wood for over 20 years," Mike Muha said.

Muha will teach the "From Wood Lot to Fireplace" class. Muha will demonstrate using hand tools, chainsaw safety and sharpening, and how to harvest a tree and build a fire.

"To avoid an accident, you need to know how to gauge which way a tree will fall," he said.

Muha will demonstrate the use of tools,

selection of wood to burn, and heat potential of a variety of wood from local trees.

Nathan Ayers of Ann Arbor will explain a new method of land use with "Permaculture Approach to a Conscious Future: from Consumers to Producers." It is the design of ecological landscapes that produce food for perennial food production.

The central theme of permaculture integrates renewable energy, natural building, water systems, transportation, waste recycling and land stewardship.

Building a hoop-house extends our Michigan growing season, and composting skills are essential to successful gardening.

Crafty participants will enjoy the rug braiding and re-purposing clothing. Finally, after the potential hard work of being sustainable, "Relaxation as Rejuvenation" is one more skill to

learn at the end of the day.

Run over - and out

**Bulldogs fail to get the offense
 on track in loss to Harper Creek**

The game wasn't as lopsided as the final statistics might indicate, but the only stat that matters showed a convincing 31-3 victory for host Battle Creek Harper Creek over the Chelsea Bulldogs Friday night on a clear but chilly evening in a first-round football playoff game.

Finishing with negative net 29 yards rushing can't be a good thing. Especially when your opponent rushes for 313 yards on the ground. Those numbers added up to trouble for the Bulldogs.

Chelsea stumbled into the football playoffs after losing its last two games and never could get back on track at Harper Creek. They played similar to how they finished the regular season, just never getting things going.



"We felt like we should have been winning the game at half-time," Bush said. "We got the ball down deep in their end of the field twice and didn't get any points. Then we had a drop that was a sure touchdown. Those really hurt us."

Bush said the team fell flat in the second half.

Chelsea cross country coach Eric Swager doesn't really remember the first time he saw August Pappas run. Pappas may be one of the best distance runners in the state, but he hasn't always stood out from the pack.

"He was decent in middle school, but not incredible," Swager said. "He is not the most purely talented runner I have coached or even the most talented on this team."

Swager says Pappas is "very coachable" and a "fierce competitor."

"What he has, above all else, is a commitment to hard work," Swager said. "He puts more miles and hard work in than anyone I have ever coached. Pure and simple."

Pappas may not have hustled out of the blocks at a young age or been handed a natural gift for running from above but he has proven that hard work and passion go a long way in whatever one chooses to do in life. He has been an excellent role model for

Chelsea's younger runners. They see every day what hard work can accomplish.

They also can see one of the best runners in the state work on his craft.

"My goals for this year are to win the state meet and qualify for the Foot Locker Nationals," Pappas said. "Most of all I wish to earn the prestigious Mark Kerr 'Man Up' Award, which is desperately sought after by every Chelsea runner."

Not every runner can set such lofty goals. But one who puts in the miles, hours and dedication that Pappas does can set the bar as high as he wants.

"My training is based on high mileage, so on an average week I'll go 70 to 90 miles, with various tempo runs, speed work, recovery, and long distance dispersed throughout," he said.

"My favorite workout is the Switchbacks, a notoriously onerous hill that's usually scattered with large rocks and horse droppings. It's a blast. I run all year round, including indoor track during the winter."

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


Dunia Ismail, Lincoln

Science behind the swing

Kendall golf pro Scott Hayes talks about his approach to teaching the game he's grown to love

The following is a Q&A with Ann Arbor resident Scott Hayes, a teaching pro at Kendall Golf Academy located at Miles of Golf in Ypsilanti.

When did you first started playing golf?

"I hit my first golf ball at such a young age that I do not remember what happened. But my dad tells the story quite often. My parents were young and finishing college at CMU. We lived in an apartment complex with a circle area in the middle with a playground. My dad was waiting tables on days he didn't have class. He came home one afternoon with a 7-iron he had cut in half and re-gripped by Scotty Dielman. If you have ever played golf in west Michigan, then you know 'Diels.' My dad teed up a real ball in the grassy area adjacent to the swing-set and insisted I go ahead and hit it with this club. Apparently, I made contact on my first attempt and sent a real ball flying about 75 yards and through a neighbor's window. Not a bad shot for a 30-pound kid in diapers. I was pretty upset and thought I was in trouble so I started crying. That anxiety lasted a few seconds when I saw my dad running around, cheering, and congratulating me on such a great shot. I guess I was hooked ever since."

When did you realize that this was a sport you wanted to be involved in your whole life?

"I played about every sport growing up except hockey. I liked all of them except soccer. My problem was that I was always very slender and my peers were much bigger and stronger than me. Eventually, I quit football, baseball and basketball and continued playing sports where I wouldn't get over powered. But sometime in college I realized that I wanted to make a career of golf. I saw golfers that had more control over their ball than others and I wanted to know why. And so began my pursuit of proper swing mechanics. It was so intriguing to me that I made it my life's passion."

When did you first start teaching?

"I first started teaching in college when my teammates would ask me to look at their swing. I really didn't know what I was looking at and only offered suggestions based on what I knew they tended to do. I continued to work with youngsters through the U of Michigan Junior Camp summer programs. I spent three years teaching 10-14 year olds

how to properly fix a ball mark, rake a sand trap and clean the dirt out of their grooves with a broken tee. I was working at Miles of Golf doing club-fitting and my passion was in equipment knowledge. When I graduated in 2001, I split my time between club-fitting and doing Beginner Golf Schools at Miles of Golf. I then began my teaching career advising adults how to choose the proper club,

develop a pre shot routine, and use the logo on the ball as an alignment aid. It took me a few years before I felt comfortable actually changing somebody's swing."

What is it like working at Kendall Golf Academy?

"Dave Kendall and the entire Miles of Golf staff have been absolutely fantastic to me. Everyone is on the same page.

U-M's Harris takes a shot at the NBA

In just three seasons as a Michigan Wolverine, Manny Harris (2008-10) established himself as one of the most productive University of Michigan men's basketball players ever to don the Maize and Blue. When he decided to forgo his senior season to turn pro, Harris left U-M ranked in the top 10 in a number of statistical categories, including 10th in scoring, third in free throws made and free throw percentage, seventh in steals and ninth in assists.

Harris earned just the second triple-double in U-M history and is one of just five Wolverines, along with Bill Buntin, Cazzle Russell, Glen Rice and Jalen Rose, to score 500 points in three different seasons.


Though he was not selected in June's NBA Draft, Harris joined the Cleveland Cavaliers during the summer and, after months of hard work and preparation, made the Cavs' opening night roster. Cleveland will open the 2010-11 season on Wednesday (Oct. 27) when it hosts Boston.

Harris recently talked about his Michigan experience and how it prepared him for his dream of playing in the NBA.

What's the most difficult part about adapting your game from college to pro?

"It's more about learning the tricks and trades that these professional guys have. You have to compete 110 percent every time, especially on the defensive end, because you are going against professionals. There were some great players in college, but every player on the court at this stage is very good and they aren't taking plays off. It's also moving at a different speed, a much faster pace."



How did you feel when you learned you made the team?

"Coach (Byron) Scott came to me after practice and told me congratulations. He told me to stay ready and keep learning. It feels good because it was a dream of mine but at the same time, I know it's still a grind and I have to continue to work hard. I didn't dwell too much on it. I have a lot of work to do still."

Are there any similarities to Coach Scott's offensive scheme and Coach Bellein's here at Michigan?

"Yeah, a little bit. Both run a two-guard front. Some of the plays are similar but with a different name for things. It works the same in a lot of ways, but there are a lot of differences in how they run things and stuff like that."

What advice would you share with future players about the mindset it takes to make an NBA roster?

"I would say just to stay in it mentally and physically. And keep working hard, that's the main thing. Pay attention to every detail. You don't want to be one of those guys who messes up on plays. You don't want to be the teammate that looks like you can't pick up on things quickly. Stay focused."

A few of your ex-teammates are still here at Michigan preparing for the season, any advice to those guys?

"Continue to work hard and believe in one another. Just work. Even after practice or whatever. Just continue to work and believe."

Looking back on your decision to enter the draft, what type of mindset did you have to reach your goals?

"The whole process. I knew it

was going to be a grind. I knew that in my circumstances, I'd have to open some eyes. My whole mindset was to work hard regardless of what happened. You have to work hard until you get there. That means spending extra time in the gym, extra time running, doing whatever you can until you make it. I still don't feel like I've made it yet. I am one step closer to my dream, though. I'm doing pretty well."

Did you use the fact that you weren't selected in the draft as extra motivation to make this team?

"Definitely. I felt like I was a guy who was better than some of the guys that were taken in the draft. But at the same time, I don't make those decisions. I knew I'd have to continue to work hard and use that as my motivation."

What about the Cavaliers was attractive?

"They approached me and I got a call right after the draft. They had a lot of interest in me. It worked out as planned. Cleveland isn't that far from Detroit, so being close to home is definitely convenient, but anywhere would have been good. This is a great opportunity and I am in a great position, right now."

What number will you be wearing?

"No. 6. They called before summer league and told me to pick a number. They started by telling me ones I couldn't pick. Every other number I wanted was taken, and I wanted a

number in the single digits, so I settled on six."

How did your experiences as a Wolverine under John Bellein prepare you for the Cavs experience?

"I wouldn't say it prepared me for the Cavaliers, but it prepared me for anything I would have done after Michigan. It was a great experience, even if I wasn't still playing basketball. The University of Michigan as a whole developed me as a person. I can't really explain it, but it made me a better man."

Now that you are part of the team, what are the general feelings surrounding the Cavaliers post-LeBron James?

"We've got a team that's confident. There's a whole lot of belief here, right now. We have guys that have, and will continue to, put in a lot of work. Coach Scott has done a great job of preparing us every day in practice. The players on the team really want to win. We really want it. We have some vets who have been there before. It's all good right now. We have very good chemistry."

What does making it this far mean to you?

"I'll know the answer to that question once I establish longevity in this league. It feels good right now, but at the same time, know anything can happen. It's that sense of urgency. I haven't done anything yet. I just have to continue to do things and as I have success in this league, it will hit me more. I'm just going to continue to get better, work as hard as I can and let everything pan out."

Provide the best service, information and facility possible. Dave has built a beautiful academy with four teaching bays that are all sheltered and heated for year-long teaching. Dave is very diverse in his success. He has been recognized as a teacher, as an integral part of the Michigan PGA Section, and as a player who has won several state section events. Chris Mile and his indoor staff have built and managed a pro shop and fitting facility that continues to expand and is recognized annually as one of the country's best. Casey Baker properly manages the shop inventory so every piece of product on the shelf is current and of extremely high quality. Doug Davis and his outdoor staff have effectively cared for a huge range and practice facility. The club-fitting staff led by Brent Norton thrives on scientific data from launch monitor technology that directly and immediately affects the flight of the golf ball and is observed instantly when any change occurs in shaft or head design. I am so proud to

be a part of this huge team that has such integrity."

What is your philosophy when it comes to teaching?

"My entire philosophy comes from the science involved with golf stroke mechanics. I have studied every high-profile instructor's system. I have researched many pioneers in the golf swing industry. But nothing completely satisfied my curiosity or could properly answer all my questions. So I turned to the best players for help. I read everything I could find from Hogan, Snead, Nelson, Nicklaus, Faldo, Watson, Woods, etc. Certainly history's most dominant players knew the answers? So I watched their swings in slow motion while drawing lines all over the screen and still could not figure it out. My search finally ended four years ago when I found The Golfing Machine book written by Homer Kelley. He was a genius and engineer who spent the last half of his life detailing the golf swing from a purely scientific standpoint. His work finally answered all my questions. And the proof is in the laws of physics and the proper geometry that governs all organized motion. I teach the geometry

of a circle and the physics of a rotating lever system operating on a selected inclined plane with a hinge action that dictates the proper rotation rate of the club face."

What's the most challenging part of being a teacher?

"By far the most challenging part is the actual execution of new mechanics. The golf ball tends to hinder someone's progress because golfers are constantly concerned with the immediate feedback provided by ball behavior. For example, if I am working on changing a certain component in someone's swing and he tries to hit a shot while incorporating this new component and the ball doesn't behave properly, he will adjust his next swing to try and hit the ball straight. The best way to learn is to understand the concepts and how they lead into the mechanics. Then make swings repeatedly without a ball to incorporate the new alignments and over-ride the past history in old muscle memory. The desire to hit the ball straight in combination with old swing habits creates an influence on a golfer's ability to change. With time, this can be overcome. But it's not immediate and takes some

effort and awareness."

What are your future goals when it comes to golf?

"My goals are two-fold. Firstly, I will continue to make my students better at golf so their time spent practicing and playing is more enjoyable. Secondly, I want to make those interested in golf swing science aware of The Golfing Machine. I spent over a decade of my life studying instructional books, instructional tapes, swing video sequences, physics textbooks, player testimonials, etc. searching for answers to my questions. I am appreciative of this self-education I have achieved through determination and demand for the truth. But for someone who is dedicated enough, there is a much more efficient way."

What else should people know about you?

"I am the first and only Golfing Machine Authorized Instructor in Michigan and have been issued a Golf Stroke Engineering Bachelors degree. Like any degree, the certification is only a piece of paper. I am more interested in educating curious golfers about the proper physics and geometry that operate during the action and motion of a golf stroke."

on Saturday. The Dexter-Chelsea game was the third annual "Volley for the Cure" event hosted by Chelsea.



Chelsea volleyball will be sending a check to Susan G. Komen foundation for more than \$1,500.


"The parents donated their time and great items to help us raise money," Cleveland said. "We really appreciated the generosity of the Chelsea parents and community members."





regular-season games. Both of those teams made the playoffs and both lost on Friday night.

Harper Creek advances to play Adrian next week.

The Beavers marched right down the field on their opening drive to take a 7-0 lead. The drive went 89 yards in 16 plays and took 7:21 off the clock. The Beavers dominated on the offensive line and all 16 plays were running plays.

They converted on three third-down plays on the opening drive, including a third-and-two play from the Chelsea 3-yard line for the touchdown. The big play was a seven-yard run on a fourth and one at the Chelsea 39-yard line.

"We knew they were going to be physical up front, but after that opening drive, we shut them down in the first half," Bush said. "Our defense did a really good job after their first drive. Our defense wasn't the problem in the first half."

The Bulldogs answered on their opening drive. Chelsea responded with a 9-play, 54-yard drive that resulted in a 27-yard field goal by Charlie Hess. Starting at their own 36-yard line, Brian Paulsen connected with Mason Borders on a terrific pass and catch along the sidelines for 25 yards on Chelsea's second offensive play of the game. Later in the drive, Paulsen hit Kyle Rodriguez for another 25 yards on a third-and-11 call from the 39-yard line.

But the drive stalled at the 10-yard line and Hess knocked through the three points for Chelsea.

Unfortunately for the Bulldogs, those would be the only points they would put on the board all night.

Harper Creek started its second drive with a pass. After running every time during their successful opening drive, the Beavers used a play-action pass that resulted in a 59-yard gain. Spencer Mykala's open field tackle saved a touchdown.

The Beavers drove inside the Bulldogs' 10-yard line, but on third down Chelsea's Conner Townsend and Ray Zielinski stuffed a running play to force Harper Creek to kick a field goal.

Down 10-7, the Bulldogs' offense stumbled on their second possession of the game. A rush for loss, an incomplete pass and a sack added up to a Nate Udell punt.

But again, the Chelsea defense would make a stand,

this time not allowing any points. On fourth down at the Bulldogs' 21-yard line, the Beavers went for it. Chelsea's outstanding linebacker Logan Yordanich stopped the running play before it reached the sticks and the Bulldogs took over.

After a personal-foul call on Harper Creek gave the Bulldogs a first down at their own 33-yard line, Bush called a play that has worked all season. It was perfect timing for a big play. Paulsen handed the ball off to Udell coming around from the left side. Udell, like he has done several times this season, pulled up and fired a pass to Borders cutting deep across the middle of the field. But the usually sure-handed Borders couldn't bring it in and a big play turned out to be an incomplete pass.

Two more incomplete passes and the Bulldogs were forced to punt.

On second down, the Beavers ran a simple running play up the middle at midfield. The ball popped out and Chelsea's Sean O'Quinn had the presence to scoop up the ball and head down field. The linebacker was sprinting straight down the middle of the field for the end zone when he was caught from behind at the 5-yard line.

The Chelsea fans went wild. The Chelsea players were jumping up and down. And the Chelsea band started playing the school's fight song. Maybe this would put some fight into the Bulldogs.

On first down, Berkley Edwards picked up two yards. On second down, Paulsen's pass to Chris Ballow was incomplete. On third down, Truman Hadley

picked up another yard to the 2-yard line.

The Bulldogs decided to go for it on fourth down. Paulsen took the snap and rolled out to his left and appeared to have an opening. He sprinted to the goal line and looked to get in for the six points. The official however ruled him down at the 1-yard line.

Chelsea got the ball back one more time in the half but mistakes added up to another missed scoring opportunity and the Bulldogs trailed 10-7 at halftime.

The Bulldogs got the ball to start the second half but the offense again stalled as Chelsea went three and out.

Harper Creek returned to its first-possession formula and marched right down the field on nine consecutive running plays that covered 51 yards in 4:25. An eight-yard touchdown run gave the Beavers a 17-3 lead.

After Chelsea failed on a fourth-and-eight call, the Beavers went 53 yards on six running plays to take a 24-3 lead.

The stat sheet was much uglier than the game. Harper Creek outgained Chelsea 411-89 in total yards and the Beavers had 22 first downs to eight for the Bulldogs. Chelsea was only 1 of 13 on third-down conversions while Harper Creek was 7 of 11. The Beavers had the ball twice as long as Chelsea did, finishing with 31:15 in time of possession.

Paulsen and backup Tyler Frank combined for just 10 of 25 passing for 118 yards. Udell led the Bulldogs with five catches for 36 yards while Borders had two catches for 39 yards.



Bulldogs still have plenty to be proud of, despite loss

Playing in the state playoffs is a whole different level. No one knows that more than the Chelsea Bulldogs, who have made the postseason pilgrimage a regular part of their schedule every year.

And before we get into Friday's game, it's important to acknowledge that reaching this level isn't easy. Just look to the east at the Dexter Dreadnaughts. They have NEVER been to the MHSAA state playoffs in football. Never!

Chelsea's incredible success in football is a testament to a program that begins long before Friday nights in September. It's hard work. It's attitude. It's dedication. It's preparation.

It starts with a head coach at the top who surrounds himself with quality people. Not just coaches, but everyone associated with football and Chelsea. In fact, when the season kicks off every year, the hard part is already done. The players, coaches, support staff and everyone else associated with this program have been well prepared to snap on that chin strap, get down in their stance and start winning football games.

All they have to do now is execute. Which brings us back to Friday night in Battle Creek.

The Bulldogs simply didn't execute. And at this level when you don't execute, things can get out of control in a hurry. The final stat sheet shows that this game more than got out of control. But when Harper Creek kicked off to start the second half, the Bulldogs were down only 10-3. And they shouldn't have been down at all.

This game was lost in the first half. And those mistakes carried over in the attitude and approach of the second half. Rarely do you see a Chelsea team come out and get totally outplayed and outworked. But after Harper Creek scored its first of two third-quarter touchdowns, you could see the expression on the Bulldogs' faces change. They didn't give up. But they didn't fight back either. Reality had sunk in - and in the state playoffs it can happen before you know it.

They fought back in the first quarter after Harper Creek marched right down the field on Chelsea. The Beavers went 89 yards on that opening drive, establishing control on the line of scrimmage from the first snap of the ball.

That's where the problems began for the Bulldogs. Harper Creek dominated the line scrimmage when Chelsea had the ball. But that's not where the problems ended.

The Bulldogs were off. Not by much, but enough where at this

Boys Cross Country

Bulldogs run 'out of their minds'

The dynasty runs on! For the ninth consecutive year, the Chelsea boys' cross country team will be competing in the MHSAA state championship meet at Michigan Speedway on Saturday. "Simply put, the guys ran out of their minds," Chelsea coach Eric Swager said. "The pre-race rankings (based on season best times) had us scoring roughly 105 points, and finishing fifth." So much for the rankings. The Bulldogs ended up with 75 points, good enough for third place and a spot in the state meet. Mason took first overall with 37 points

with Gull Lake in second with 71 points. Vicksburg was fourth with 83 points out of 14 teams participating at Saturday's regional held at Ella Sharpe Park in Jackson. There was no surprise at the top of the race. Chelsea senior August Pappas ran to another first place with a time of 15 minutes, 45 seconds. And right behind him was teammate Bryce Bradley, who finished second in 15:59. "August won the race, and all six of the other guys ran lifetime best times, moving up through the race to capture the third and final qualifying spot," Swager said. "This was arguably the toughest regional in the state, featuring two of the top five ranked teams, as well as hon-

orable mention Vicksburg. "Our 75 point score was better than even my best prediction. Notice that we ended up a mere four points from Gull Lake (ranked No. 4 in the state). Amazing." The rest of the Chelsea lineup "bringing home the money" included Austin Horn (14th place, 17:00), Avery Osentoski (28th place, 17:47), Bram Parkinson (30th place, 17:49), Charlie Miller (41st place, 18:04) and Sean Owsley (54th place, 18:31). "This is at least the fourth time in the past 10 years that we came into regionals ranked 'out of the money,'" Swager said. "But our high mileage training and race time strategy seems to always have our guys running their

best at the end of the year. I couldn't be prouder of the whole squad." Pappas and Bradley were dominant, just running away from the field in the second half of the race. Horn had his third straight personal best time, improving his best by more than 90 seconds from a month ago. Osentoski and Parkinson sealed the deal with a sizzling last half mile. "They went out conservatively, and were relentless in the final 2 kilometers to pull away from that Vicksburg squad," Swager said. "A month ago, I thought that a state final's berth was ludicrous. Now, I am once again amazed at how well we here at Chelsea close out the season."

Pappas' strategy once the race begins is all about the preparation and execution. "My racing strategy is based on high mileage and mental toughness," he said. "It's always my goal to run the second half of my race faster than the first half, which few people do in cross country. I don't have great leg speed so coach Swager has adopted a training plan for me that stresses a high lactate threshold, or 'pain tolerance.'"

The "pain" that goes with hard work has certainly paid off. Earlier this season, Pappas broke a 28-year-old school record when he ran a 15 minute, 33.6 second race on Sept. 18 at the New Boston Huron Invitational. The senior broke the record set by Mark Broshan in 1982.

He has crossed the finish line first all season including at the Springport Invitational, Northville Mustang Invitational and the Southeastern Conference White Division meet at Tecumseh.

Pappas also finished first with a time of 15:57 at the Southeastern Conference league meet on Oct. 21 at Hudson Mills in Dexter. This was his third straight individual league title, an unprecedented feat.

One of his most impressive showings was Oct. 9 at the Portage Invitational. The Bulldogs finished 16th out of 40 teams and Pappas took first place in 15:34. "August came into this race wanting to win, pure and simple," Swager said. "He cruised easily through the first half of the race, then put the hammer down, opening up a 40-yard lead over the other best runners in the state."

Pappas said he first became interested in running in elementary school where he was "decent" in the mile run. "I was slightly competitive and began training by running around my block, which is a mile, each morning," he said. "I did that all throughout elementary school. I wasn't allowed to play football in middle school so I ran cross country and realized that I was OK. I met coach Swager and the high school team and immedi-

ately bought into the system. If my parents hadn't stopped me from playing football, I probably would have never been involved in cross country." While he often runs by himself, he hasn't reached this level of success by himself. "Any success I've had with running is due to my parent's support and coach Swager's training, which I consider to be by far the best in the area," he said. "Both my parents and my coach encourage me to work hard, and give me the tools to take care of business." Pappas also tips his hat to

those great runners who came before him. "I was a freshman in the heyday of Chelsea cross country when the likes of Nick Hewitt, Peter Wilke, Teddy Eyster and other such marauders (widely considered to be the manliest of all men) were upperclassmen. I hope to continue the legacy of toughness they left behind."

Pappas has had a scrapbook of success so far this season. What's been his greatest accomplishment? "My proudest accomplishment was eating 22 pancakes and 12 sausages at one of coach Swager's infamous 'Caveman Breakfasts,'" he said. "Coach Swager encourages us to eat as much meat as possible, but I've found that after a couple of plates of various meats my voice starts deepening and I get a sudden urge to chop down trees, so I try to stick to a well balanced diet, nothing unusual. I find that I get the best results from my mom's spaghetti or my dad's omelets."

Pappas also has big plans after high school. "I will attend music school," he says. "I'm a drummer, and I will major in percussion performance. I also intend to run in college."

So far he's looking at Michigan, Colorado, Indiana, Michigan State and Butler. But right now he's only looking at the finish line at the state meet. All his hard work is preparing him for that moment of truth. Whatever the outcome, Pappas has established himself at the greatest cross country runner in Chelsea history. He now has the record that others will train to try and beat.

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Swimming Bulldogs split with Ypsilanti, AA Pioneer

The Chelsea girls' swimming and diving team finished their final tri-meet of the season in Ypsilanti against Pioneer and host club Ypsilanti Phoenix last Thursday.


Olsen. The group finished first against Ypsilanti/second against Pioneer with a D3 state cut time of 2 minutes, 1.90 seconds.

Plymouth rocks Saline as Hornets are ousted

Saline football lost to host Plymouth 27-7 in a Division 1 pre-district state playoff game Saturday. With the loss, the Hornets finished the season with a 6-4 overall record. To reach the playoffs, Saline won its final four regular season contests.

"It's disappointing," said Saline coach Mike Glennie. "The kids worked hard all year. We had a four-game win streak to get here. But the better team won today. All year long we've played physical and fast and today we had some problems."

Glennie said Plymouth was a tough, physical football team.

"We knew from the start that they were a physical team and had speed, but we've played teams with speed all year, so I don't think there was an intimidation factor," he said. "They did well on both sides of the ball. It was just a matter of them coming off the ball well. Our defense gave us some opportunities, but we just didn't convert."

Glennie said the Hornet defense played well despite the season-ending setback.

"Defense and special teams have carried us all year long," he said. "Holding them to 27 (points) wasn't too bad. We had some opportunities to sustain drives and keep them (defense) off the field a little bit more, but it didn't work out."

Plymouth coach Mike Sawchuk said his defense was the difference, especially University of Michigan recruit defensive end Brennan Beyer (6-foot-4, 245 pounds).

"The kid is unbelievable," he said. "We're really going to miss him next year. He's hard to block one-on-one out there, especially when we bring him on stunts."

Sawchuk said a key to the Wildcats' victory was his squad's ball control offense.


"That's important," he said. "Anytime you can keep your defense off the field and the offense can score points, that minimizes their (opponent's) chances and you have a great chance to win the ballgame."

Sawchuk said his team was ready for Saline offensively, except for a few minor adjustments.

"We thought they'd run a little bit more buck sweep-type stuff, wing-T type stuff," he said. "We didn't think they'd throw the ball as much as they did."

Michael Lesznick hit pay dirt on a 1-yard touchdown pass from Sean Austin to open the scoring for the Wildcats (8-2). Kyle Brindza kicked the extra point for a 7-0 Plymouth advantage with 3:01 left in the first quarter.

On the Wildcats' following drive, Dante Fox scored on a 50-yard run. Brindza hit the point after touchdown kick for a 14-0 lead with 35 sec-

onds remaining in the first quarter.

Brindza booted a 34-yard field goal with 6:17 left in the second quarter for a 13-0 Plymouth margin.

On the Hornets' ensuing drive, Nick Ostrander hauled in a 54-yard touchdown pass from Trey Heren. Kyle Mulder drilled the extra point bringing Saline closer at 17-7 with 4:24 remaining in the first half.

With 1:18 left in the second quarter, Brindza, a Notre Dame recruit, blasted a 50-yard field goal upping the Wildcats' lead to 20-7.

Jerrel Jenkins scored on a 4-yard run late in the third quarter. Brindza kicked the extra point for the game's final 27-7 tally.

Despite the loss, Glennie said he was proud of his squad.

"I told the kids as a program the goal isn't just to get here (playoffs), the goal is to give yourself and opportunity in the second season," he said. "And what can you do with that opportunity. But we had our backs against the wall (since Week 5) and a lot of people said we couldn't do it (make playoffs). We're very proud of the kids. The program has sort of righted the ship. We'll be back."

he could be aware of what is happening in the community. Carson has served on the council since 2003 as well as the Planning Commission. "My interest in local government arose from a desire to positively affect the quality of life in the community," Carson said. "The economic challenges facing the government today energize me to continue."

Scio Township Trustee David Read was also unopposed in

the election this year. He is a Democrat who has lived in the township since 1992 and has served on the board since August 2009, when he was appointed to fill the vacancy left by resident Tom Hansen.

E. The proposed SUP will not be detrimental, hazardous, or disturbing to existing or future neighboring uses, persons, property, or the public welfare. (If it's not detrimental, that favors granting the SUP)
F. The proposed SUP will not create additional requirements at public cost for public facilities and services that will be detrimental to the economic welfare of the community. (If it will not create additional requirements, that favors granting the SUP)
G. The proposed special use must comply with all other applicable ordinances, and state and federal statutes, regulations, and laws. (If it complies, then that favors granting the SUP)

AN ORDINANCE, SUMMARY AMENDING SECTION 36 OF THE SCIO TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE AS STATED.
The Board of Trustees of the Township of Scio hereby ordains
SECTION 1 CHANGES TO TOWNSHIP CODE
The following amendments to Section 3637 General Sign Regulations are adopted. It should be noted that the following notice is a SUMMARY ONLY.
Amend Section 3637(4) Subback requirements for signs. Delete current sign setback language and replace with a uniform sign setback of 15 feet from adjacent road, R.O.W., property lines and driveways.
Amend Section 36368 Signs permitted in all districts. This amendment will allow "copy or company identification" of not more than two (2) square feet" as part of internal traffic circulation signs. Previously this had been prohibited.
Amend Section 36369 Prohibited signs. Amendment to allow "signs that are painted directly on to a wall or any other part of a building." These types of signs were previously prohibited.
Amend Section 36371(1) Permitted signs in commercial, office, and industrial districts. Amendment to allow two (2) freestanding signs when certain road frontage requirements are met.
Amend Section 36371(2) to limit the number of tenants (up to 3) that may be placed on a free standing sign for a shopping center or other integrated group of stores. To amend this section to allow two (2) freestanding signs when certain road frontage requirements are met. To amend the wall signs for a shopping center to allow more than one wall sign for multi-tenant commercial buildings. To amend the design materials and setback requirements for industrial park signs.
Amend Section 36372 (Outdoor advertising signs off-site signs). Amends the ordinance provision to clarify that billboards are subject to the illumination standards of this ordinance.
SECTION 2 INCONSISTENCIES REPEALED.
Any and all other ordinances or resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
SECTION 3 SEVERABILITY.
Should any section, clause or paragraph of this Ordinance be declared by court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the same will not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or part hereof other than the part declared to be invalid.
SECTION 4 SAVING CLAUSE.
That nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed, nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.
SECTION 5 PENALTIES.
Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each act of violation and every day upon which any such violation shall occur shall constitute a separate offense. In addition to the penalties stated herein, the Township Board of Trustees may enjoin or abate any violation of this Ordinance by appropriate action.
SECTION 6 AVAILABILITY.
The complete codified Township Zoning regulations and the Official Township Zoning Map, including the full text of all amendments, are available for inspection in the Township Hall in the Office of the Township Clerk at the Township Hall. 

'Hereafter' a wandering mess, 'Saw' sequel garbage

Hey, I'm Ryan Michaels, a 13-year-old writing movie reviews for Heritage Newspapers. I've been doing it for two years, and enjoy it a lot. Here's my review of 'Hereafter.'

Clint Eastwood is a famously economical director. He shoots most of his movies in fewer than 30 days and has made more movies in the last two years than most directors in the last decade.

If there's a way to make a camera shot simple and a way to make cutting easier, he does it. So why exactly is his latest film, 'Hereafter,' an aimless, maddening mess of a movie?

It's a multi-storyline epic in the vein of 'Babel' or 'Syriana,' in which all three main characters have a connection to the afterlife and whose paths converge by the film's end.

The main storyline concerns Matt Damon as George, a man who apparently has the power to communicate with the dead. He was once famed for this ability, but has retired to a quiet life working a San Francisco factory job. He finds himself in a romance with a woman who he's met at a cooking class, played by Bryce Dallas Howard, but is impaired by the fact that he constantly receives visions from the dead.

The other plots concern a French journalist, Marie, who comes close to dying in a tsunami and whose life is haunted afterward, and a young British boy named Marcus who is trying to come to terms with the

death of his twin brother.

Eastwood is a very restrained director who lacks any signature style. This is not a bad thing; it's just that he doesn't bring much directorial pizzazz to whatever he's helming. Basically, he's only as good as his scripts and the people who act them out. It's unfortunate, then, that the script to 'Hereafter' is heavily flawed.

The biggest problem of the film is that it never decides on what exactly it wants to be or to explore. It knows it's about the afterlife, but yet never knows what it wants to explore about it. It simply doesn't know where it's going and what it wants to say about its topic. Bringing up the afterlife is not the same as posing a deep question about the afterlife, and 'Hereafter' never realizes this.

It doesn't help that the entire film is built on a contradiction: The film makes the point that there may not be an afterlife,

yet in some CGI shots, visually conceptualizes and depicts it. These two conflicting viewpoints bog down the film a huge degree.

This brings up another point: The visual effects in this movie are horrendous. Both in these visions of the afterlife and in the opening tsunami sequence, their sheer cartoonishness takes me out of the movie every time.

Putting all these flaws aside, 'Hereafter' has some things going for it. The entire cast injects as much nuance and depth into their characters as the script will allow.

Damon, in particular, delivers a brilliant performance as the psychic/protagonist, George. Virtually every scene he is in is a highlight, and it's a testament to his versatility that his action-hero past as Jason Bourne never once entered my mind during the film.

Cecilie de Marie brings a tortured-yet-willful performance as the journalist Marie, and the McClaren twins (Frankie and George) play Marcus and his brother Jason in what are some of the stronger performances of the film. Both of them actually alternate playing characters in some scenes, which makes their bond as brothers seem all the more real.

In some scenes, 'Hereafter' achieves a quiet empathy and humanity that makes for some of the most compelling cinema this year. One moment where Damon serves as a medium between a young boy and his

dead brother is a tender, poignant moment that serves as both the pinnacle of the movie and a representation of how much better it could have been.

'Hereafter' is a mixed bag in every sense of the term. Although some aspects of the film are outstanding, such as Damon and some individual scenes, it simply never decides on what to do, what to say, what feelings to stir. It's a pity that such talent converged to make such an underwhelming film.

I give it two out of four stars.

'Saw 3D'

When did violence become entertaining?

For better or for worse, action and adventure always have been a part of cinema. But my question is not when did that arise, rather when did the pain and suffering of people in the most violent, vicious ways imaginable become a source of enjoyment or fun?

When did seeing people drilled, exploded, stabbed, shot, crushed, needled, decapitated, dissolved, frozen, gouged and harpooned become a legitimate, viable source of entertainment? Who OK'd this? Why is this rated "R," yet any sort of frontal nudity instantly an NC-17?

'Saw 3D' may be the most thought-provoking movie in recent times, but not so much because of its hopeless inadequacy as a piece of work, which, believe me, I'll delve into later, but because the movie is essentially a huge representation of

the place that Hollywood has arrived at — mass-producing incomprehensible gibberish, adding in gore to appease the fans, slapping "3-D" on a title and shipping it to theaters to make a huge profit.

'Saw 3D' is everything that is or that can be wrong with film, with Hollywood, and with us, the audience — always happily consuming this garbage, not thinking about what our enjoyment of this says about us, being blind to just how truly evil and sickening this is as a product.

The movie revolves around the legacy of Jigsaw, a man who constructs elaborate death traps for those he deems unappreciative of what they have. It's funny that he has been dead since 'Saw III,' yet still appears in every installment.

Sean Patrick Flanery plays Bobby, a self-help guru whose claim to fame is surviving one of Jigsaw's traps. The problem with that is he's a conman and a liar, and Jigsaw's apprentice, Hoffman, will do whatever it takes to ensure Bobby pays for his lies.

It's often humorous just how completely incapable this movie is, in every imaginable way. The acting is laughable. Cary Elwes returns to the series for the first time since the first installment and is absolutely horrible. I don't know where his talent as an actor has gone over the last few years. Tobin Bell, who is often times the best part of these movies, is reduced to a two-

minute cameo appearance. There are many moments in this movie where I sat in the theater thinking to myself, who thought this was a good idea? One character doesn't refer to another by her actual name, only by the word "crazy." Random dream sequences make absolutely no sense. The dialogue is some of the worst of the year, with some dramatic lines cracking up the entire theater.

Also, some characterizations are shifted entirely in the course of a scene. Bottom line, taken at any imaginable level, this movie makes zero sense.

Will this review change anyone's mind who wants to see it? No. The fan base is too devoted, too hooked. Do I blame them? Not really. But it makes me sad, both as a film critic and as a person, to see such garbage given such attention.

'Saw 3D' is not just a failure on a filmmaking level, but a mean-spirited, brutal, vicious attack on our senses, our minds, and our wallets. What in 2004 began as an effective exercise in suspense has since devolved into total, barbaric garbage. This may be one of the worst films of the year and possibly the worst of any year.

'Saw 3D' is the first film that I've reviewed to receive a 0 star rating.

U of M Library presents talk by reporter Nov. 11

The University of Michigan Library will present a talk 7 p.m. Nov. 11 by reporter Anthony Collings, author of "Capturing the News."

Media bias, excessive use of commentary, conflicts of interest, Collings talks about issues that get in the way of journalists gathering and reporting the truth.

"Capturing the News" is both a memoir and a critique of

journalism based on Collings' experiences over the course of 34 years as a print and broadcast reporter.

Collings served as an Associated Press correspondent, as Newsweek bureau chief and as a CNN reporter. He covered the Middle East, Rome, Moscow, London, Paris and Washington.

Additionally, some 30 years ago, Collings was part of the

team that established the first major cable news network.

He tells stories about those crazy early days at CNN and stories about hair-raising adventures in Russia, Poland and the Middle East.

He was detained by the KGB in Moscow in 1967, during his first foreign posting for the Associated Press.

Collings will present an insider's appraisal of what

some consider the American news media's failings and accomplishments. He brings insights to the Oliver North affair and examines how the press was "suckered" in its coverage of the Jessica-Lynch prisoner-of-war story in 2003.

He voices his concerns regarding oversimplified reporting of complex issues and poses questions about covering terrorism.

Collings has interviewed world figures from Brezhnev to Kaddafi and Arafat and won awards for covering Iran-Contra and the Oklahoma City bombing.

He is also the author of "Words of Fire: Independent Journalists Who Challenge Dictators, Dignitaries, and Other Enemies of a Free Press."

Collings is a faculty member in the University of Michigan

Department of Communication Studies in LSA and teaches "Ethics Issues in Journalism," "Supreme Court News Coverage" and "Foreign News Coverage."

The talk will be held at the Hatcher Graduate Library, Gallery in Room 100 on the campus of U of M.

This event is free and open to the public.

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
