Ex-firefighter files whistleblower suit

A former officer that resigned from the Chelsea Area Fire Authority late last year is claiming department officials retaliated against him for speaking out publicly against a superior, according to a federal lawsuit filed earlier this month.

Matthew Rose, a former lieutenant with the department, says that he was demoted, subjected to a significant pay reduction and forced to tolerate a poor work environment after he felt a higher-ranking officer made a poor decision that impacted the care of a gunshot victim in July, federal court documents show.

The suit names the Chelsea Area Fire Authority and Chief Jim Payeur as an individual. He declined comment and referred all questions regarding the suit to Ronald Richards, a municipal law specialist based in Lansing.

Richards also declined comment Monday and said he would be filing a formal response to the suit in federal court within a few weeks."

Rose, now a paramedic with Huron Valley Ambulance, seeks

past wages, punitive damages. equitable relief for the time he was allegedly retaliated against, and any court associated costs, including attorney fees.

The suit was initially filed in Washtenaw County Circuit Court, but then transferred to the federal court because it is the proper venue. The suit is filed under the Michigan Whistleblower's Protection Act, which protects employees from retribution for the disclosure of violations of law.

The law specifically prohibits employers from firing, threatening to fire, or discriminating

against any employee who reports or is about to report a violation or suspected violation of law to a public body or authority

An unpopular decision

The suit stems from a July 18 incident where members of the department's second shift. including Rose, were dispatched to assist a woman who was shot in the torso and in transit to a local hospital in a civilian vehicle.

Firefighters intercepted the vehicle and began administering treatment when Capt.-

Chris Smyth ordered them to transport the woman to Chelsea Community Hospital.

Rose, a Chelsea resident, objected, and noted the sirens of a Huron Valley Ambulance could be heard fast approaching. He also knew that the hospital would not have the appropriate trauma-level equipment or expertise that could be needed to treat the critical wound, and noted that the woman's complete vital signs had not been taken to determine if Smyth's order was the best course of action.

Meloche to instruct Dale Carnegie class

Linda Meloche, an instructor of the Dale Carnegie course in Ann Arbor, will offer the program for the first time in Chelsea, her home for over a decade.

The 13-session personal and professional development course will be held at 6 p.m. on Monday evenings at the Comfort Inn starting March 14.

Meloche, who recently celebrated her 25th year teaching and marketing the Dale Carnegie program, previously worked in sales - a great position with a car and perks, but Meloche found the job mindless. Then she took a job with a nonprofit, a more meaningful job but with a low salary.

"I was looking for a happy medium." she said. "I wanted to find a career that left me feeling like I was doing some good in the world, but was also paid fairly for it."

The third time was a charm when this MSU graduate heard about the Dale Carnegie program. She went through the 13week course, became a graduate assistant and eventually became an instructor.

"It's an incredibly good job and a really a life-changing program," she said.

Since its inception in 1912, the Dale Carnegie program has helped people to face fears, whether speaking in front of groups, dealing with people more effectively, being an out-

Commission OKs new police station plans

The new Chelsea Police station construction project is back on track after receiving combined preliminary and final site plan approval from the Chelsea Planning Commission

Tuesday night.

Despite the council's initially strong enthusiasm to approve the plan, the city's planning lion dollar building include commission has held the project many concessions such as a to very high standards, rejecting prior drafts in the past year. The commission, which

included members whose terms were not renewed by the council, originally denied rezoning parcels where the station would have been built.

More recently the current planning commission tabled the combined site plan approval process last month amid several concerns.

- The drawings for the now 6,600 square foot, \$2-to-\$2.5 million dollar building include reduced size and other reconfigurations brought about last year.

Concerns from last-month's planning commission meeting. such as Casey Blair's concern for a property owner across the street from the building, were discussed but affected no change in the approved plans.

The two driveways on Orchard Street will remain despite the property owner's concern about lights shining into her windows. Darlene Stanley maintained that landscaping could solve the problem, but the commission Tuesday ruled that it was within the city's purview to acquiesce to the property owner's concerns or not.

Planning Commissioner Ann Valle did not relent in her concern, calling for her colleagues to "put (themselves) in the posi-tion of (the) homeowner" and warning that it would be a mistake to trust the city to address

the issue. City Council member Cheri Albertson took exception to the comment, adding that she had been in personal contact with the homeowner and that the city would address her concern:

pedestrian walkways were further highlighted, as well as adding windows to bring the police station more in line with the city's Comprehensive Plan which calls for buildings on Main Street to have 50 percent window coverage on a building's front.

Trees were repositioned as well, addressing a prior concern that some of the evergreens in the plan would overlap when fully grown.

The commission had also expressed concern that the new police station would not fit into the Chelsea aesthetic,. which was addressed by Overheiser.

'(This) tries to be a blend between contemporary and blending what's already in Chelsea without outright copying (other noteworthy buildings)," he explained.

Haselschwardt continued to be concerned about the setback after expressing a desire to "pull back" the building from Main Street.

When the council overrode the previous commission's refusal to rezone the three parcel last year, the property became C-5 zoned, which has no setback requirement and left the planning commission no recourse to pull the police station back.

Concerns aside, the planning commission praised the alterations to the design plan, which fuses elements from the Clocktower complex. the post office building and

McKune Library. City officials believe the construction phase of the project will commence this spring and take roughly a year to reach completion.

The police station's construction was supposed to be well underway by now, according to estimates. However, this estimate was prior to the failure to receive rezoning approval from the planning commission and public outcry over the necessity of a new police station and the potential costs to taxpayers last year.

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



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Local woman honored for event planning

A Moment In Time Wedding

and Event Production, an event planning firm based in, Plymouth, has won the award for four consecutive years, and House's business has received several other honors during the brief time — just five years - since House made wedding and event planning her full-time job.

"I'm so grateful to have been honored with the Bride's Choice Award again this year," said House, who is a certified bridal consultant. "A Moment In Time could not have won without the feedback, positive reviews and support from the amazing couples that we work with."

House said that the award is based on the number of reviews and scores on those reviews, mostly unsolicited, and that makes the award more meaningful to her.

In addition to winning the WeddingWire Bride's Choice four years in a row, AMIT was also a "Best of Weddings" 2010 pick on The Knot, a wedding planning and resource website.

House said she's not really sure what makes someone a good wedding and event planner.

"I think you're born with the DNA-or something to be a wedding planner," she said. "You have to have a bit of a 'Type A' personality. You have to be social, organized and love social

House said she may have gotten some of those traits and talents from her mother, who was always the party organizer in the neighborhood and threw extremely popular parties at her childhood home.

"She could make everyone feel comfortable coming to our home, and we did not live in a big house until my teens. So it was a tiny little house, but we'd have barbecues, winter birthday parties, Super Bowl parties."

For many years, House looked at event planning as a hobby, not as a serious long-term

career choice. She worked at the nonprofit Shelter Association in Ann Arbor and was part of their event planning team, and she also helped friends plan

weddings and parties.
"After a while, Frealized this could be a niche for me," she said. "My boyfriend at the time, now my husband, said, 'You should pursue this.' So, I got certified as a professional bridal consultant. I thought I'd do it on weekends, and it would be fun to plan an event here and there." =

House said she took on a lot of events for free at first.

"Anything I could get my hands on," she said. But then eight months after

launching her website, www. momentsintime.biz, she quit her day job because the event planning business was going so well. She transitioned to doing wedding and event planning full time in 2006, and has since added a half-time lead planner. She also takes on a few interns each season.

House said she has a few ideas about why her business became so popular so quickly.

"I think it has to do with a lot of things, but one is that I'm nicknamed 'the friendly planner.' I have a lot of clients who come to me who have met with other planners, and felt the others were too controlling. They hear I get things done with a smile. The vendors I work with also like that — they know I'm not going to micro-manage them. You get > more flies with honey."

House earned a degree in human services—a blend of psychology, sociology and communications — from Eastern Michigan University and has worked in the counseling field before. As a result of those experiences, she said she knows how to work with all different kinds of personalities, which is important for event planners.

"Every couple is incredibly different. Some are quiet and shy, and aren't quite sure what they want," she said. "Others are really outgoing and outspo-ken and know exactly what they want down to a T, and they just want me

to make it happen."
House said that being friendly and outgoing and assertive, but not aggressive, is another important trait for an event planner.

"Some planners are aggressive, some are passive, but clients are usually looking for someone in the middle - someone who can express an opinion, but not run them over with that opinion," House said.
"It's important to learn to

listen and be quiet and let the client get out their wants and needs. Instead of jumping in, I take notes. It's important, too, to be really delicate with the pros and cons of what they've decided."

She said clients sometimes have "off-the-wall" ideas that may work in theory, but may be hard to execute, and she tries not to shoot down those ideas immediately.

"I like it when people think outside the box," House said. "I love traditional and classic weddings, but I do 35 to 40 weddings a year, and it's nice to have something different."

Some of the more unique

weddings she's helped plan have included a wedding at the Detroit Institute of Art, a vintage barn wedding with vintage tea table cloths and an Arabian Nights-themed wedding with belly dancers and cigar rollers.

At another wedding held at Cobblestone Farm in Ann Arbor, the client wanted to include lawn games as part of

the reception.
"The bride went out there with a croquet mallet, and the guests were having more fun playing lawn games than the traditional partying and flancing. It was so creative and great."

House said the biggest challenges of her work include budget and money issues, keeping all the relatives happy and unpredictable weather.

Boy, do I have weather stories," House said. "I might wake up and it's sunny and 85 degrees, and then dark clouds that weren't predicted roll in, and then there's a monsoon going on and the bride is crying.

House said even her own wedding experienced unpredictable weather.

"I had a 60-degree day in



January when I got married," she said with a laugh. Looking to the future, House

said she is booked halfway through 2012 and expects to keep doing mostly wedding planning through 2012, though she does occasionally plan other types of events. Eventually, she would like to start a family, but plans to keep working in some capacity.

She said she always hopes to keep A Moment In Time a small, intimate company, because most brides want one person they can depend on as a liaison, rather than being shuffled around to various "team members" at a larger company.

"I'm always thinking like a

bride," House said. "If I were a bride, what would I think, what would I want?"

House grew up in Ann Arbor and went to Pioneer High School. She and her husband moved to Milan about seven years ago because, she said, they thought it was going to be a good real estate investment. Milan was predicted to be an "up and coming" community like Saline, but then the real estate bubble burst.

"When we moved into this house in Milan, we thought of this as starter home," she said.

"But now, we've fallen in love and really love living here. It's a great city where you know your neighbors."

"I had heard a great version of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony on the radio one morning. I was singing it while riding to work, realizing I could hardly even hear myself because of the traffic noise around me," said the Ann Arbor resident. "I thought, "This would be so much better with 20 others singing.'

"So, I started tentatively talking about the idea and eventually found Greg Furlong, who became our fearless choir director every Monday night and every gig for 10 years. When Me stalted the dike choil fu Toronto, I was able to sing every ranging repertoire, including

Ann Arbor in early 2006 to work with Sustainable Mobility & Accessibility Research & Transformation, a University of Michigan project, she brought the idea with her.

"Laura Russello, the executive director of Michigan Peaceworks, invited me to make a presentation on sustainable transportation in Ann Arbor. For some reason, I started talking about the Toronto bike choir. I can't remember if I actually sang one of the songs, but it's possible," she said. "Laura approached me after and said something like, 'We so need that in Ann Arbor,' and she immediately started organizing the first meeting at Ann Arbor Brewing Co., which actually drew more people than we thought it would — and

we've never looked back" The choir sings a wide

classical, jazz, world, pop and theater, changing the words and customizing the songs to sing the praises of bicycle transportation, Songs include "Mass Ride," "Thoughtless Drivers," "Two-Wheel Tango," "Way-O," and "Bicyclized Ode to Joy."

The cycling choristers have performed at several venues in the area, including the annual Peace Concert at The Ark in December, the Ann Arbor Brewery on the Worst Day of the Year Ride, last fall's potluck of the Ann Arbor Bicycle Touring Society, the 90th birthday of an AABTS member and at Kerrytown during last May's Bike to Work Week.

Zielinski, who is passionate about two-wheel transportation, has a commuter bike specially designed for commuting year round in a city like Toronto or Ann Arbor, and a foldable bike that fits into her two-seater nyoria monaa insight car or can be folded up and carried on a

Time for local governments to prepare for emergencies

The new governor was not a Boy Scout, but he has quickly adopted the group's motto: Be prepared.

Faced with the high probability that some cities could end up in bankruptcy on his watch, Gov. Rick Snyder has ordered his team to hop to it and prevent such an occurrence.

The new administration is moving on two fronts:

(1) It is training new emergency financial managers to run financially challenged cities.

(2) It has asked lawmakers to revamp the EFM law, which has opened up a new can of worms pitting labor unions against the new gover-nator.

When the word went out that the state needed help, 200 applicants applied for the chance to become bureaucratic czars. The state could not handle them all in one sitting, so about 65 showed up, eager to learn the ins and outs of running a city in a financial mess.

And there are plenty of them.

The perfect storm has hit many municipalities. They live off the local property taxes, but as home values fall off the cliff, the incoming tax collections go right along with them.

tin them.

Combine that with the ever-decreasing

amount of state aid to those entities, and let's just say, going into the red is not just a thought any more.

The Snyder folks don't want to wait until that happens. The last thing the business guy governor wants is nationwide headlines that shout, "Michigan Cities Go Bankrupt."

But in addition to sending these EFMs in early, lawmakers are considering beefing up their powers to avert a financial meltdown. This is where the

fun begins.

Under the proposal pending in the Michigan House of Representatives, the emergency manager would have the authority to — get this — void current contracts with government employees; revamp their pensions; force the consolidation of services; and, if a city owns a utility, the money-czar can sell it.

Does this remind you of a dictator? State Rep. Maureen Stapleton (D-Detroit) says, "It sure does."

Her city owns water and makes money by selling to the suburbs. If Detroit goes into the red, it could lose this lucrative asset.

And then there are the labor unions that

And then there are the labor unions that represent city workers. They have contracts that were created fair and square, but this

czar could tear them up.

State Rep. Al Pscholka (R-Stevensville) has introduced this legislation and is taking incoming fire from local governments. In Benton Harbor, the City Council adopted a resolution condemning him personally.

He points out that there will be "due process" before any of these Draconian unilateral decisions. Workers will be given the chance to slash their own benefits first, but if they don't, it will be done for them.

Robert Bobb, who is the EFM running the Detroit schools because they are in debt up to their eyeballs, warns that cities better

act now before the state takes them over.
All of this leaves the Michigan Municipal
League in a quandary.

It represents local governments. On one hand, it has to defend the time-honored tradition of local control.

But on the other, faced with mounting labor costs, including health care and retirements, cities might jump at the chance to cancel all those and start anew.

This situation has "ugly" written all over if. Let's see if the non-Boy Scout governor can dialogue his way out of this one.

our take: Editorial Everyone should get their financial house in order

Balancing budgets has been in the news for the past few years. It has particularly taken on a new focus because of the recession.

Usually, news stories discuss the horrible debt and financial situation of the federal government, as well as state and local entities.

Certainly all three levels of government need to get their financial acts in order. But for average citizens, there's not much they can do other than hope their elected officials get serious about making expenditures match revenues.

However, on a personal level, there is a lot that individuals can do to straighten out their finances — and there's plenty of help available.

of help available.

National financial expert Dave Ramsey has gotten the attention of numerous Oakland County churches that are sponsoring what Ramsey calls his Financial Peace University classes. The two-hour sessions that meet once a week for 18 weeks are videotapes of Ramsey detailing his methods for becoming debt free and, as he puts it, "becoming wealthy."

becoming debt free and, as he puts it, "becoming wealthy."

Members in each congregation are allowed to decide what times and what days the sessions will be conducted. In many cases, because they are churches, Ramsey sells the programs to congregations at discount rates. Online, the program sells for about \$119 and includes materials. Discounts can be as low as \$99 per family.

Ramsey's system may seem extreme to some and is often difficult for others to follow because of the poor spending habits they've developed over the years. But the program works and can help anyone — in any income level — to become financially independent.

One of his basic principles is to pay off all credit card debt and never charge again. In fact, for the best results, he suggests people tear up their credit cards while they pay down and eventually pay off their balances. His philosophy is, if you haven't got the cash to make a purchase, you can't afford

Obviously, banks and other financially institutions aren't excited about Ramsey's methods, which also include tips on investing after you're debt free to grow your wealth and to be disciplined enough to support your local church and other charities. The latter is probably why the financial guru is so popular with churches throughout the country.

Of course there are other sources for financial help and many of them are free. The MSU Extension has free, threeweek classes from time to time.

Many people, admittedly, won't make the effort to straight en out their finances. They is continue to spend, even if they have t got the cash, fising some convoluted look; that they're entitled now to whatever they want to purchase. The reckless spending will eventually catch up with them.

In the meantime, those people who are trying to get their personal finances in order shouldn't be afraid to read or take advantage of the help that is available. Some of it is free; for some of it there's a fee. But you'll never know what useful financial tip you'll pick up unless you explore and examine the resources at your disposal.

The Civil War and the safety net

With this year marking the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, get ready for grand pontificating on its meaning for whites, African-Americans, the nation, and the world.

Here's what it meant for my family.

My great-grandfather, Albert Cordner, was a private in the Union Army. In a pocket-size diary, he recorded battlefield experiences that were the stuff of moviee

"Commence the fight at daylight," he wrote on Sept. 17, 1862: "First we drove them and then they drove us. Then we drove them back again. The fight lasted all day."

The next day's entry: "No fighting today. We are burying the dead."

This was the battle of Antietam, the bloodiest day in U.S. history, with 23,000 casualties.

Few movies have bothered to explore what happened to Civil War soldiers after the South surrendered. Looking at greatgrandfather Albert's experience, I'm struck by the efforts

of a young nation, ravaged by war, to invent new ways of creating economic opportunities and protections — at least for one segment of its citizens.

As today's deficit hawks push

for massive spending cuts, it's revealing to look back at these early experiments with social safety nets.

After three years at the front, Albert mustered out with all of his limbs still attached. He was one of the lucky ones. One out of every three men who served in his unit wound up dead, wounded or missing.

Back in Rhode Island,
Albert got a job as a mail carrier on a route from Westerly
to Newport. During the war,
President Abraham Lincoln had
introduced free postal delivery
service in a few areas. In peacetime, the government expanded
the service, in part as a way to
create jobs for former soldiers.

Some years later, Albert set out for new adventures as a home-steader in Dakota Territory. The Homestead Act required that applicants spend five years on a plot of land before they could claim ownership. As a Union Army veteran, Albert could

deduct his time served from the residency mandate.

Homesteading was no picnic for this East Coast city slicker.

"Mr. Cordner has been unfortunate in grain raising," the Bismarck Tribune reported in 1890. "His crops have been hurt by hail twice since he located here and one fall he lost his barn and several head of stock and some farm machinery by fire."

In these rough times, Albert got another leg up from the government. According to his pension records, which my nephew and I found at the National Archives, his payments began in 1890. They started at \$6 per month and rose to \$24 in 1906, which would be \$566 in today's dollars. After he died, the pension passed to his widow.

The Civil War pension system was a precursor to Social Security at one point accounting for 37 percent of federal expenditures.

It's important not to paint too rosy a picture of these benefits programs. Some historians note that the pension system was biased against African-Americans.

At 160 acres, Homestead Act Institute for Policy Studies

plots were so small that it was tough to make a decent living off farming them. Far too many veterans lived out their postwar lives in grinding poverty.

war lives in grinding poverty.
And yet, we should reflect on how these modest benefits from long ago may still be paying off.

My great-grandparents had received good public educations in Rhode Island and probably would have been fine without these perks. But the public jobs and land giveaway programs certainly expanded their horizons — and their children's.

Albert's son followed his path into the U.S. Postal Service and became the North Dakota postmaster. The security of that post helped insulate the next generation from the Great Depression. It paid for my mother's advanced education, which she used to teach children, including her own.

So thank you, 19th century legislators, for making those early steps toward-building a nation that cares for its citizens. Let's hope we aren't about to take a massive slide backwards.

The lawsuit states that protocols implemented by the Washtenaw/Livingston Medical Control Authority - which administers medical and firstresponder guidelines - specifi-cally state a patient must be stabilized before firefighters are to transport them anywhere.

"By not taking the fully prescribed vitals, not waiting for the ambulance to arrive and not immediately taking the patient to a level one trauma center, there , was a likelihood of an ultimate waste of time, which could place the patient's prompt and proper treatment and optimum recovery in jeopardy," the suit states.

The woman was moved from the truck to a waiting ambulance as soon as it arrived at the hospital, and that ambulance sped her to the University of Michigan Medical Center, the closest location with a critical trauma care

The suit estimates that Smyth's decision delayed the proper care by more than 19 minutes. Her condition was not detailed in the suit and was unknown at press time.

Rose noted the fire truck was unsuitable for patent transport, and as a result, the woman was forced to lie down on a bench seat in the cab of the truck for the ride.

He voiced his frustration after a nurse and Huron Valleyparamedics reacted negatively to Smyth's decision upon arrival at the hospital. He ultimately apologized to Payeur, the suit states.

Still, Rose was switched to third shift directly under Smyth's command, and placed on an unpublished probationary period, the suit claims. His salary was also scaled back to match one of the three lower-paid Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant positions within the department.

The aftermath

Rose claims that he was deliberately forced into an intolerable working environment that would get to the point where he had to resign, which he ultimately did-

Not only had the department

switched his shifts and reduced his pay, but Rose went from an officer's status with some degree of job security and seniority, to the SAFER grant position, which is set to expire in 2013. =

In the 13-page claim, Rose's attorneys said he was acting as a concerned citizen while voicing his opinion and that his freedom of speech is guaranteed by the Bill of Rights.

Payeur's actions violated Rose's First Amendment rights and have the potential to silence other employees from raising concerns in the future, they

argued.
"Payeur and the CAFA fostered a chilling effect on free speech by creating a paramilitary atmosphere of antagonism, hostility and distrust from employees," the lawsuit states.

The lawsuit also recounts an internal memo that Payeur reportedly sent to Rose on Nov. 9, 2010, that admonished the veteran for conduct unbecoming of an officer.

You need to know that a lack of confidence in you on the part of your leadership skills and abilities has been brought to my attention," Payeur wrote, according to the suit.

"There's a feeling out there that you don't have their backs. You lost a lot of credibility from your actions on the engine transport; speaking out in public against the action taken by Capt Smyth.

"Professionalism, responsibility, and maturity would follow the chain of command, and in a manner that does not embarrass the Department.'

Rose's departure was not the only notable loss for the department since last fall. Just before the end of the year, Lt. Mike Milliken left the department for another job. And in January, eight-year department veteran Capt. Sam Norton, Rose's direct supervisor prior to the July incident, resigned following an internal investigation into conduct that Payeur described as creating a hostile work environment.

Norton was placed on paid administrative leave in December amid allegations that he brought a rifle to the station and allegedly pointed it at a co-worker. Police found no evidence of a crime.

Chelsea City Manager John Hanifan said he was aware of the lawsuit but that the fire department operates under the Chelsea

Area Fire Authority, and that it would be inappropriate for him to comment.

Attempts to reach LuAnn Koch, director of the CAFA and Sylvan Township Clerk did not return messages seeking comment.

The sued parties have 21 days from Rose's filing to respond before U.S. District Judge Robert Cleland.





Authorities catch up to man who tried to assault police, motorists

An Ann Arbor man who allegedly confronted police after swinging a tire iron at moving traffic on New Year's Eve is expected in court this week for a preliminary hear-

Zehua Zhu, 45, is charged with malicious destruction of police property and two counts of resisting and obstructing officers for the Dec. 31, 2010, incident in the 4500 block of Washtenaw Avenue.

Officers responded to reports of a man swinging an object at about 6:30 p.m., according to police reports. They found the man standing outside an Ann Arbor Transportation Authority bus screaming at the driver to let him in. -

He had a silver object that was later determined to be a tire iron in his right hand and a mailbox in the other, reports stated. Officers commanded him to drop the items, and he

started to walk toward them. Just as one officer was about to deploy a Taser, the man turned around and returned to his vehicle parked along Washtenaw Avenue.

He pulled away from police and parked behind a business nearby, where officers blocked him in, according to reports. He then backed his vehicle

into one of the police cruiser. Officers then deployed the Taser and arrested him. He was referred to a local hospital for a psychiatric examination, and released while prosecutors reviewed the case. Court records show Zhu did. not appear for arraignment on charges.

He was arrested Feb. 17 by Washtenaw County Sheriff's deputies assigned to Scio Township, according to reports. He was arrested in the 700 block of Miller Road by deputies attempting to serve an arrest warrant on the multiple felony charges.

Deputies arrested him without incident and he was transported to the Washtenaw County Jail.

Summer murder trial set for three suspects in drugrelated heist

The three men charged in the drug-related shoot-

ing death and robbery of an Ypsilanti Township man last fall will stand trial together in June.

Court records show James Daniel Lester, Keywone Walker and Willie Walker will stand trial on open murder and armed robbery charges on June 13 in Washtenaw-

County Circuit Court. They are accused of trying to rob 28-year-old Jason Hoover inside a residence at the Schooner Cove Apartments in the 5000 block

of Bosuns Way on Nov. 6, 2010. Hoover was shot once in the chest and was declared dead on arrival at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Washtenaw County Sheriff's detectives identified and arrested the men within days of the shooting. Willie Walker, 30, is accused of firing the handgun.

Lester, 22, was inside the apartment at the time, and Keywone Walker, also 22, allegedly drove the men there for a drug deal.

All three suspects stood mute to the charges at a recently pretrial hearing and not guilty pleas were entered on their behalves, records show. They remain in custody at the Washtenaw County Jail without bond.

Pittsfield Township rape suspects delay initial court hearing

The preliminary hearing for two men charged with sexually assaulting a Pittsfield Township woman multiple times was adjourned until next month.

Maurice Ron Manning and Michael Martell-Deshawn Brown each opted to delay the hearing in Washtenaw County District Court last week until

March 3, records show.
Manning, 22, is charged with four counts of firstdegree criminal sexual conduct, one count of unlawful imprisonment, and one count of prostitution and pandering.

He faces between 15 years and up to life in prison if convicted, court documents show. He remains in custody at the Washtenaw County Jail on \$300,000 cash bond.

Brown, 32, faces six counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct, unlawful imprisonment, prostitution and pandering, and assault with a

dangerous weapon. He was denied bond at -arraignment.

Police said the alleged

COURT BRIEFS assault occurred Feb. 1 in the 2700 block of Golfside Road, and that the victim required medical attention. No further

details were released. Manning is currently on probation for a criminal sexual conduct conviction in 2006, prison records show.

He pleaded no contest to assault with intent to commit sexual penetration, and was sentenced to probation.

He was required to register as a sex offender, refrain from drug and alcohol use, and complete treatment.

Manning's probation discharge date was set for this November.

Independent psychological exam ordered for indecent exposure suspect --

A man accused of repeatedly exposing himself outside the occupied homes of residents in several different communities across western Washtenaw County will have an independent psychological examination before his criminal case proceeds.

William Engle, 48, was granted permission to have an independent psychologist evaluate his capacity to understand the charges against him and assist with his own defense, records show. He is scheduled to appear

in Washtenaw County Circuit Court March 10 for a pre-trial hearing before Circuit Judge David Swartz.

Authorities arrested Engle in August after he allegedly left the scene of an indecent exposure complaint at a Lima Township home. He is suspected in at least a dozen other similar incidents in Scio Township, Dexter Village and Ann Arbor, and is charged with four counts of indecent exposure by a sexually delin-

quent person. He waived his preliminary hearing in district court late last year as his attorneys with the Washtenaw County Public Defender's Office indicated they would seek the insanity defense, court records show.

Records claim Engle lacks the understanding of criminal

responsibility.
A judge ordered a mental competency examination at the Center for Forensic Psychiatry in York Township following a similar examination at the Veterans' Administration Hospital in Ann Arbor after his arrest. Engle is a veteran of the U.S.

Guard Earl Boykins, a four-year letterman for the Eagles from 1994-98, and an honorable mention All-American as a senior, will be the fourth EMU basketball player to have his jersey raised to the rafters.

Boykins' No. 11 Jersey will join former men's greats George Gervin, Grant Long and Kennedy McIntosh along with women's standout Laurie Byrd as the only basketball players to have their jerseys retired.

Boykins will be honored at halftime of the EMU-Western Michigan University Mid-American Conference West Division game which is set for a 2:07 p.m. start, Feb. 27, in the Convocation Center.

The first 500 fans will receive a free Boykins "Shersey" at the game. All EMU alumni can attend the game for \$3 which includes a hot dog, pop and ticket. Anyone 18 or over can enter to win an IPad.

Boykins began his career as a freshman in 1994-95 and became an instant starter at point guard, a position he would own for four consecutive years.

Boykins averaged 12.5 points and 4.5 rebounds in his first season and helped the Eagles finish with a 20-10 record and a berth in the NIT post-season tourna-

In his sophomore season, Boykins averaged 15.5 points and 5.8 assists as the Eagles recorded a 25-6 overall record, a Mid-American Conference Championship with a 14-4 record and an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

The 5-foot-5 Boykins helped the Eagles defeat Duke in the first round of the NCAA before bowing out to a No. 1 seeded UConn team. He was even better as a junior, scoring 19.1 points a

game and averaging 4.7 assists as EMU finished with a 22-10 mark.

The star point guard saved his best play for his senior year, finishing second in the nation in scoring at 25.7 points a game, earning the MAC Most Valuable Player Award at the league tournament and being named. an honorable mention All-American. The Eagles were 20-10 that year, winning the MAC Tournament title and earning another NCAA Tournament bid, losing to Michigan State in the first round.

He left EMU as the second-leading scorer in history with 2,211 points and is still playing professional basketball, this season with the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks.

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
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Gov. Snyder to slash state aid to schools

Officials fear major impact of proposed cuts

Michigan public schools could face a potential \$700 per pupil reduction in spending based on Gov. Rick Snyder's proposed budget plan revealed Feb. 17.

The reduction figure hails from three sections of state proposed plans. Snyder's plan recommends cutting 4.1 percent per pupil in spending, which is about \$300 per student. However, two other key figures weigh funding down - a secondary cut carried over from last year would take away \$170 per pupil for schools, and an increased retirement rate for public schools would seize \$230 per student.

'It is a devastating total," said Shawn Lewis-Lakin, superintendent of Manchester schools.

Lewis-Lakin said the retirement rate increase skyrocketed from 16.54 percent to 24.46 percent between 2009 and 2011.

"This is not a cost over which local districts have control," he said. "Rather it is a function of the retirement plan design, which needs to be addressed by the state Legislature. I urge them to

Mary Marshall, Dexter Community Schools' superintendent, said it has to be noted that a retirement increase of even a few percent means a loss of "hundreds of thousands of dollars

, Marshall said the current proposed cuts will equal no less than \$1 million in funding for her district.

We've been enduring ts for the last seven or eight years," Marshall said. 'To find another million of expenses to reduce — it's no longer possible for us not to touch programs that affect kids. We have tried really hard to keep cuts away from programs, but we're at a point now where it's no longer pos-

In addition to employee retirement costs, Marshall said another key issue for state officials to recognize is the lack of ways schools can raise funding.

The superintendent said it's unlikely that her district will be able to recoup the losses any time soon by putting a millage to a vote.

"We have got to fix our funding system in our state," Marshall said. "It's critical

that we fix our funding. We can't grow as a state if we don't focus on education ... We have got to fix system because it is broken." For Intermediate School districts, Snyder's budget cuts go even deeper. The governor's budget plan would cut 5 per-cent from ISDs, where public schools face a 4.1 percent

"A 5 percent cut to this (state aid) funding will mean an additional \$75,000 lost that would have been used to help support innovative programs that impact student achievement such as our community's early childhood education program," said Rick

reduction.

Leyshock, interim superintendent of the Washtenaw Intermediate School District.

Leyshock said state aid for the WISD has been reduced by more than \$600,000, or more than 32 percent, since

"We will work with our governor and our legislators to do our part," Leyshock said. "But, with the size of the cuts and next year's school budgets going in to effect July 1, four months is not enough time for districts to adjust to these significant losses."

Leyshock said he invites area legislators to learn more about the implications for students and to continue to

work with the WISD to minimize the impact.

In addition to public and intermediate school district cuts, the governor's budget plan also slashes support for university and colleges. Higher education will receive about 20 percent less in operations funding under the proposal.


And in an attempt to drive tuition increases down, Snyder's plan would have universities share \$83 million in funding as long as the institutions keep fees increases below 7 percent.

For the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, the state reduction would be \$47.5 million, a 15 percent loss from fiscal year 2011, providing that the school would meet the tuition increase require-

U of M President Mary OColeman said at a recent board of regents meeting that the university had anticipated areduction in state funding!* and has been preparing for continued cuts for several years.

There is no denying that this will be painful," Coleman said, "but we are fully prepared to do our part.

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


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

Honda Civic sets the company's pace in U.S.

Accord may be Honda's bestseller in the United States, but the Civic is and always has been the heart of the lineup.

Introduced in 1972 as a subcompact coupe, Civic represents the second-longest continuously sold nameplate from a Japanese manufacturer behind the Toyota Corolla, introduced four years earlier.

Although Honda is correctiv known as a Japanese brand, North America was the motorcycle maker's proving ground for autos and its most important market. The first Civic's charm and reliability impressed baby boomers in much the same way the Apple Macintosh would a few years

With its flagship Ohio plant in Marysville producing Accords, Honda now ranks as the fourth-largest manufacturer of autos in the United States. In Canada, Civic is the best-selling model for 13-years running, while in Japan the compact came to the end of its run in 2010.

"Over there, we meet con-sumers' small-car needs with a variety of smaller vehicles, and Civic has not played a major sales role in many years," said William Walton, manager of Honda product planning for American Honda Motor Co. "It's a decidedly different story in North America. In fact, our customers are continuing to make Civic a top-10 selling vehicle in the U.S. in 2010, and Civic is our No. 1-selling vehicle in Canada.'

The eighth-generation Civic continues to attract younger buyers, introducing on average more than 90,000 new-car customers under age 35 to the

brand every year, company officials say. More than 95 percent of all Civics sold in the U.S. were built in North America at manufacturing facilities in either Greensburg, Ind., or

Alliston, Ontario in Canada. U.S. Civic sales rose to 260,218 at the end of 2010, representing a 0.8 percent increase over 2009. But Civic has some catching up to do in 2011, as Chevrolet blazes a bright trail in the better-equipped and more fuelefficient Cruze and Hyundai plays one-upmanship in the new Elantra.

To regain its lead, Honda introduced the 2012 Civic in Detroit's North American International Auto Show as a concept car that will enter production this spring.

John Mendel, executive vice president for sales at American Honda, said that the new model would deliver 40 mpg on the highway and that a hybrid version would still be available. The hybrid with the first lithium ion battery pack is just one of several Honda initiatives to run cleaner, more efficient cars, including a Civic GX fueled by natural gas.

'Civic has an incredible legacy, consistently one of the industry's most popular and trend-setting vehicles," Mendel said. 'Along the way, it earned the trust of our customers as the most trouble-free car in its

Mendel did not announce prices and withheld other details, but gave the Detroit show goers a look at the new design for the Civic sedan and

The Civic is known for providing a balance of 'justright' packaging, fun-to-drive character and outstanding fuel economy, at a price that even first-time buyers can afford,"

Mendel said.

With the widest array of engine choices available in its class, the 2012 Civic includes a sedan and a coupe bearing the "one-motion" mono-formshape. Both versions feature steeply raked windshields, wide stances and bold character lines along the profile. The lower character line on both models broadens toward the rear fenders. The front fender surface treatments form a three-dimensional look, adding depth against the deep-set headlights.


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

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ASK DOCTOR CRANKSHAFT

Does reader really need to have these things replaced at 60,000 miles?

Q: My car, a 2004 Taurus, has close to 60,000 miles on it. I change my oil every 5,000 miles, but if I go to the Ford dealer, they'll want me to change all the fluids, oil, antifreeze, transmission, rear axle.

They'll also want to charge for a list of inspection items and the costs will be over \$600, which I don't have budgeted. Can you tell me if I really need to have these things replaced at 60,000 miles? Thank you. - Robert

A: The short answer is a "qualified" no, but you should have the car's overall condition assessed by a shop to have a baseline from which

Every manufacturer publishes inspection/replacement intervals for components in their models and these are listed in the owners' manuals. Each item on the list and the mileage at which it should be serviced is based on statistical data only, as so much is affected by the type of use. These mileage intervals are very conservative and are meant to help the owner practice preventive maintenance, if so desired.

Antifreeze should be replaced every 3-4 years to maintain its anti-corrosion properties and things like belts, brake pads, tires, transmission fluid, etc., should be replaced when significant

wear/discoloration is observed.

Q: How long does a car float? If somebody accidentally drives into a flooded road and it's deeper than it looks, how long will the car float to give enough time to get out? My roommates and I disagree on whether you could get out the window in time or the car would sink.

Is there a formula to figure this out?

—Stan in Poughkeepsie, NY

A: There's no such formula because no two different makes/models are manufactured in the same way. How quickly a vehicle will sink depends upon the quality and fit of the door seals, openings in the body shell where wires and lines has through weight and several oth and lines pass through, weight and several other factors, but the key issue is that it will definitely sink.

The problem with driving into a flooded roadway isn't so much the depth of the water but the flow rate. Even if the water level is just 2-3 feet, in a flowing stream, you'd be in serious danger because the stream would push the vehicle along

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Local dirt: Edible plants, herbs help control pests

Gardeners pondering what to plant this spring should seriously consider co-mingling vegetables, herbs and edible ornamentals among showy annuals and perennials, advised Linda Whitlock, an advanced master gardener

Whitlock, a consumer horticulture coordinator at the MSU Extension Service, spoke at a recent Chelsea Area Garden Club meeting. She said that in addition to providing scent and flavor, edible flowers and ornamentals bring color, texture, repetition and intriguing shapes - all elements of good landscape design - to home and public gardens.

"Herbs planted along walkways are a wonderful way to welcome guests," Whitlock said.

Strongly scented herbs, including basil, oregano and thyme, also are great deterrents

for deer and rabbit. Whitlock uses those herbs to protect hostas from four-legged predators. She keeps slugs at bay by creating a barrier of sharp, rough stones used as mulch around the plants.

Herbs and edible ornamentals work well in formal and

semi-formal settings as well as informal cottage gardens, where plants are expected to "mingle and form relationships," she noted. Two of the many eye-catching combinations she suggested were mixed lettuces among pansies, and multiple cabbages co-planted with parsley.

Parsley and fennel, with their fern-like leaves, make beautiful filler for container gardens and in garden beds, and thyme is an excellent ground cover, she said. For drama, artichokes, chard and kale are stars. Basil plants, which come in a variety of colors and sizes, make attractive borders, particularly when allowed to bloom.

Many gardeners plant marigolds around tomatoes and other vegetables to ward off insects, Whitlock said.

Marigolds and salvia planted around the base of tomato plants also help hide the discolored bottom leaves that develop on tomato plants in late sum-

Selecting the right plants can help gardeners maintain a healthy, bio-diverse environment while limiting the need for pesticides. Whitlock recommended choosing plants that have lots of nectar - parsley,

alyssum, cosmos, tansy and violets - to draw in birds and predator insects, which also feed on garden pests. Lady beetles, parasitoid wasps, praying mantises, assassin beetles and dragonflies are among the most effective predator insects. Frogs and snakes also help rid gardens of unwanted pests, she

Borage, chives, daylilies, impatiens, nasturtium, roses and squash produce some of the most popular edible flowers. For cooking and eating, the blossoms are best harvested mid-morning when they are fresh and dry, according to Whitlock.

As part of her talk, Whitlock showed images of gardens from around the world, including Chicago's Grant Park and the Chicago Botanic Garden, where designers frequently combine edible ornamentals and flowers, fruit trees, herbs and vegetables.

She also talked about the Gagie School Garden, which won the Kalamazoo Garden Council's 2010 Inspiring Garden Award. Colored peppers, varieties of lettuce, spinach and millet thrive among annuals in the garden maintained by students attending the kindergar-


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
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Historic artwork featured at fair

Rounding out the eclectic group of artists that will be at the 38th Annual Pioneer Arts Fair March 19 are broom maker Ron Lindgren and fly

tier Rusty Kalmbach.
Although they may not be considered art in the traditional sense by casual passerbys, Lindgren and Kalmbach hold that their serves a message both aesthetic and historical.

"The techniques I use to make the brooms date back to the colonial era in the United States," explained Lindgren.

Later devices were developed that allowed broom makers to bind the fibers onto handles with wire. These devices are known as "kick winders" and are widely used today, according to Lindgren.

He learned how to make brooms in Norfolk, Va. in 1993 just prior to retiring from the

"The method I use is a foot spindle to tightly bind the brooms ... the fibers are all broomcom, a plant related to sorghum which at one time was used to make sweeteners," Lindgren said.

All of the brooms he makes are hand tied, either to a handle for use as a hearth broom, floor broom or cobwebber.

The smaller whiskbrooms are bound-fibers, which are then covered with stalk material using a "plaiting" or weaving technique which serves as a decorative but functional

"The types of brooms I make vary from a small 'cake tester' which consists of a bundle of broomcom fibers tightly bound that are then used to test baked

The variety of brooms Lindgren makes include whisk brooms, round and flat; Turkey Wings and Fantails, as well as many different hearth brooms.

Lindgren says there's a story behind each and each is unique in its own way, and that he finds his unique handles from northern Michigan woods where he lives along the shorelines of the Great Lakes when he isn't buying Sassafras, Hickory or Hawthorne woods from the south.

Kalmbach's fly tying goes back centuries as fly fishing, which always goes hand in hand with fly tying, has a history as "a sport of King's."

"Fly tying has always gone hand in hand with Fly Fishing," Kalmbach explained. "It has been a part of early American History with roots dating back to the mid 1860's in the Catskill region in up state New York."

Fly Fishing and Fly tying in Michigan has been around almost as long with Michigan's Au Sable river being known historically as a Blue Ribbon quality trout river, according to Kalmbach.

"We are truly favored in Michigan to have this fishery available for sport fishing," he said. "Modern fly tying falls into two categories: people learning the sport before the movie 'A River Runs Through It,' and those who started fly fishing after.

"I first learned to tie flies and fly fish in the Upper Peninsula with my grandfather in the mid-1960s. At the invitation of a close friend, I became more involved in Fly tying in the late

1970s and began teaching in the mid-1980s."


During the process, a few promising candidates were identified but declined a call to the church for varied reasons.

Cat emerges from charred home days after fire

Julia Clark didn't have much use for superstitions in her life. but if you ask her now, there's a time-tested saying about cats that she now firmly believes.

Cats do have multiple, if not

The relatively new Saline resident had hoped it to be true earlier this month on the day after a fire in the residence downstairs at 658 W. Michigan Ave. gutted the structure's interior and caused enough smoke damage to incapacitate four household pets left home alone during the afternoon. Three out of four survived, but Clark's cat, Picasso, was nowhere to be found and pre-

sumed dead by first responders. Clark, who rescued the grayhaired tiger cat from an innercity shelter close to a year ago, had a hard time letting go. And a harder time believing her 2year-old companion was gone.

Just in case, she filled up Picasso's food bowl with his usual meal the day after the fire and hoped for the best.

"I was in total denial and wasn't going to accept it," the 56-year-old Toledo native said.

Animal instincts


No people were injured in the Feb. 4 blaze, which remains under investigation, but firefighters wanted to be sure and went in looking for human survivors to rescue. Instead, they located four household pets that were unconscious and close to death.

Clark's golden retriever, Gracie, was found upstairs and had the least amount of smoke inhalation exposure among all the animals. She was treated by a local veterinarian and released to Clark later that

The other dog and two other cats were found huddled under-

neath a couch on the main floor, also unconscious and clinging to life, officials said. They belonged to Janie Young, who lived in the downstairs apartment with her teenage son.

The animals were rushed to the Huron Valley Ambulance outside and a paramedic immediately began administering oxygen through standard breathing masks. They saved three of the animals, but one .cat could not be revived. Young received all of her

animals back from the Saline

Veterinary Service within a few days and they all are expected to make full recoveries, officials said.

In the sense of emergency, Hoeft said it's common for an animal's survival instincts to kick in. Many are able to escape on their own, but it largely depends on how long they've been exposed to the smoke and the contents of what's burning.

If they can't get out, they go somewhere familiar when

"In that situation, they're

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like children in the sense that that they go somewhere that they think is safe to try and wait it out," Hoeft said.

'Going batty'

With Gracie safe and many of her most cherished personal belongings spared the bulk of the damage, Clark couldn't help but worry about Picasso.

She said she thought often about how he earned his name by repeatedly stealing her-paint brushes and hiding them in different places around her home.

Had he been smart and nimble enough to get out? Was he hurt somewhere? And if everyone else was right, did he suffer? The thoughts swirled for two

more days until she returned to the scene to pick up more belongings and the food bowl was completely empty.
She crept into the bedroom

and called out to him, and out from a crawl space in the closet he came, blackened with soot. "I just knew. I just felt that

I'd see him again, and if anybody heard me at that moment they would have thought I was batty. I was really freaking out," Clark said recently via

telephone from a friend's house

She said she plans to stay there temporarily while fig-uring out long-term living arrangements.

She later learned the property owner was able to reestablish the heat the day after the fire to avoid freezing pipes, which coincidentally probably prevented Picasso from freez-


'I have no idea how he survived that smoke or soot, but it was an amazing sight," she said. "But he's always been an odd sort of a cat."

Odd enough to avoid contact with the scores of firefighters, investigators, property owners and maintenance workers who were inside the structure on _ numerous occasions before he surprised Clark.

She said she thinks Picasso had the mentality Hoeft described, apparently, hiding away and waiting to appear until he heard a familiar voice or a trusted face.


The cause of the fire remains under investigation and has been labeled as potentially suspicious because investigators have not been able to determine an accidental cause or reasonable explanation for what sparked it, according to police reports.





"They also help with our 'afternoon show every Friday,' he said. "Sports radio is often imperfect and these guys are very flexible and helpful to get on the air."



We need to be able to play defense, rebound and make our free throws to have a chance at a postseason run," he said.





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


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Chelsea Junior Grace Martin plays tough under the boards in a recent game against Dexter.




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



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Turtle City' prepares oil-contaminated reptiles

There's a new housing complex in Marshall. The developers call it "Turtle City." The 471 residents don't call it anything. That's because the residents are 470 turtles and one toad.

The housing complex is a large, heated, pole barn-like building filled with metal stock watering tanks.

The turtles (and toad) are survivors of last summer's oil pipeline leak that fouled miles of the Kalamazoo River. They were brought in for treatment after running afoul of the oil and are spending the winter in a warm environment instead of hibernating in the mud.

Turtle City is one of the projects oil-pipeline company Enbridge, Inc., has in place to help restore the Kalamazoo River corridor recover from the more than 830,000 gallons of oil that flowed from a burst pipeline last July 26.

The thing that has fascinated me about this project was the degree to which everyone got the sense that saving the wildlife was important," said Bob Doherty, a consultant assisting Enbridge on the oil spill clean-up. "The whole community of people involved in the spill response felt that way the spill response felt that way. We'd get calls from landowners or workers out on the project -that they saw an oiled goose or a turtle -- and we'd send someone out to get the animal. And sometimes people would bring a turtle to us in a box."

Stock-watering tanks range in size from 100 to 600 gallons. They're fitted with sand filtration units – sort of like the systems used for swimming pools – and supplied with groundwater from the area that's flowing into the river. The water is filtered and tested for contaminants and pH and is "pretty close to what's in the river as you would expect,"

Doherty said.

There are a wide variety of turtles wintering at Turtle City. Common map turtles are the most numerous, but the residents include painted turtles, snapping turtles, Blanding's turtles, soft-shell turtles, musk turtles and one common box

The more easy going species - painted, Blanding's and map turtles – are in community
housing, up to five or six in a
tank. The more aggressive turtles – snappers, soft-shells and
musks – have their own digs.

But even the communityliving specimens are assigned roommates according to their needs, explained Jenny Schlieps, the animal care manager from Focus Wildlife International, a West Coast company that specializes in rehabilitating oil-contaminated animals.

"It depends on the social hierarchy," Schlieps said. "You don't want three strong alpha turtles in with a turtle that is weaker."

The turtles have been cleaned up after their oil exposure, though some have medical needs – skin burns or lesions – caused by the spill. They're receiving veterinary care from nearby Binder Park

But the majority of the tur-tles are healthy and just waiting until the time is right to return to their natural homes. Doherty said animal handlers took GPS coordinates when they picked up the creatures so they can be returned their old

neighborhoods. The tanks are outfitted with basking platforms, built from branches to simulate wild river conditions, and have heat lamps to mock sunlight so the creatures can resume as much of their normal lifestyle as

they can, considering the circumstances.

The turtles are fed "nutritionally balance pelletized diet for freshwater turtles as well as natural prey items that they would normally eat in the wild in Michigan," Schlieps said.
"Depending on the species, that would be snails, crawdads, pan trout worms and nighters where trout worms and nightcrawlers. Snapping turtles may get fish, but the large map turtles have more of crustacean based diet.

"Natural prey items are live, though some of the fish are not, depending on the species of fish."

The idea is to make sure the turtles can be self-sufficient when they leave. Schlieps said the tanks are set up so the critters have minimal interaction with humans and do not become habituated.

'We want them to be as wild as they can be after being in captivity for this length of time," Schlieps explained. "If everything continues to go well, we'll see a lot of happy turtles when we release them."

Jason Manshum, a senior advisor for community relations with Enbridge, said building Turtle City just some-thing the company could do to restore the area,

"We made a big mess in this community and we affected the lives of many, many people - and it's not just the people, it's the wildlife," he said. "We want to make sure we get this area back to the condition it was pre-spill and we can't really do that unless we do something for


"We want to be a good neighbor," Manshum said. "This wildlife center we established is just part of being a good neighbor."

The wildlife intervention project has already been quite is successful, Schlieps said.




The Saline hockey team knocked off Chelsea 4-0 last Wednesday at the Arctic Coliseum.


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New treatment fights cancer, protects brain

Receiving the diagnosis of a brain tumor can be terrifying.

Learning that the treatment needed to save your life may also cause serious side effects, including personality changes, memory loss, blindness or even paralysis can be equally as terrifying, if not more so. So what would you

Thousands of Americans face this dilemma each year; 210,000 people are

diagnosed annually with primary brain tumors or metastatic brain tumors (cancer that spreads from other parts of the body to the brain), according to the National Brain Tumor Society.

The American Brain Tumor Association (ABTA) cites brain tumors as the second leading cause of cancer-

related deaths in children younger than 20, the second-most fatal type of cancer among men 39 and younger, and the fifth leading cause of cancer-related death in women 20 to 39.

A cancer diagnosis is always fright-ening even though advances in treatment mean many patients survive their disease and go on to live long, productive lives. For people diagnosed with brain tumors and brain cancers, the treatment - or more specifically its potential side effects - can be as frightening as the disease itself.

Standard radiation, one of the most common cancer treatments, can damage healthy tissue at the same time it is destroying cancer cells. When the target of the treatment is the brain, life altering, serious side effects can result. Radiation therapy can cause decreased intellect, loss of memory, confusion and even personality changes, according to

Karen Schabes, 22, of Chicago, was diagnosed with a form of brain cancer after she collapsed at work in June 2010. An MRI revealed her cancer.

After having surgery to remove the tumor, Schabes was referred for radiation therapy but learned the position of her tumor, near her optic nerve, could mean the treatments would leave her

Concerned about the risk, she sought out another opinion.

Her neurosurgeon recommended she consider proton therapy. Schabes had heard about proton therapy on the radio and knew that a new proton therapy center had recently opened in the Chicago area.

"I did my research and found out that the proton therapy beam is much more precise than standard radiation therapy for brain tumors. Less of my healthy

brain tissue would be exposed to radiation so it was an option worth pursu-

ing," Schabes says.
Better precision means the cancerkilling radiation focuses on the cancerous cells, causing less damage to surrounding tissue.

In the human brain, with its sensitive tissue and critical role in all our body's functions, less damaged tissue means less risk of potentially life-altering side

effects like vision or hear-Karen Schabes, ⁴ ing loss, speech impairment, memory loss, personality changes and loss of cognitive functions.

Like standard X-ray radiation therapy, proton therapy kills cancer cells by preventing them from dividing and growing. Unlike X-ray radiation, protons deposit most of their energy directly in the cancer

tumor, meaning brain tumor patients can receive higher, more effective doses, with less damage to surrounding tissue.

Studies have shown proton therapy to be effective in treating a number of types of cancer including brain, central nervous system, gastrointestinal, head and neck, lung and prostate, tumors at the base of the skull and along the spinal cord as well as sarcomas and many pediatric cancers.

Proton therapy is particularly pre-ferred for treating children, because they are very sensitive to the side effects from radiation treatment.

Although proton therapy has been successfully used to treat cancers for decades, many doctors remain unaware of it because only a handful of centers in the U.S. offer the therapy nine in all, with the new CDH Proton Center, A ProCure Center opening last October in suburban Chicago

For Schabes, proton therapy not only gave her renewed hope of beating her cancer, it spared her eyesight. "Because of the location of the tumor - it was a frontal temporal tumor - traditional radiation would have passed right through my optic nerve, causing serious damage," she says. "Instead of blindness as a possible side effect, which may have resulted had I been treated with standard X-ray radiation, I experienced only minor, transient side effects with proton therapy"

"I'm very thankful my doctor recommended proton therapy. Lurge other patients to be sure they have looked into all their treatment options," Schabes says. So far, follow-up MRIs have shown no sign of remaining cancer for Schabes. "It looks like I'm going to have a normal life."

Is your home causing your health concerns?

When you get the sniffles - do you blame your allergies, or the air inside your house? Surprisingly, air pollution trapped inside your home could be the cause of many of your family's health concerns - especially if members suffer from asthma or allergies.

Poor indoor air quality is a health threat. Indoor air is one the top five environmental threats to the country, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. And in the winter months, your family is probably spending a lot more time inside, breathing in the pol-

luted air.

Indoor air pollutants come from many different sources. The combustion fuels you use - oil, gas, kerosene, coal and even wood? add chemicals to the air. So do tobacco products. Newer homes are built to be more air tight, which helps to keep the heating bill lower in the winter months, but does nothing to freshen the air inside the house.

Minor health consequences from breathing poor quality indoor air include watery eyes, a scratchy throat and runny nose. But more serious consequences could show up after years of breathing in poor quality indoor air, and those include respiratory diseases, heart

disease and even cancer, according to the EPA.
You can clean the air inside your home to help reduce the pollutants, dust and dander in several ways:

Take a peek inside your air ducts. Use a flashlight and mirror, or a digital camera to see if the walls of the ducts are coated in dust bunnies and grit. That build up of dust signals you need to have your heating and cooling system cleaned. Your heating unit will continu-

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ously circulate any dusty and dirty air throughout your home, so that your family is always breathing it in. Hiring a National Air Duct Cleaners Association member to clean your HVAC system will help you keep the air circulating throughout your home free of dust, pollen and dander. NADCA members must carry general liability insurance and must have at least one certified air systems cleaning specialist on staff.

"Cleaning your ducts isn't something a do-it-yourself-er should try to tackle," says Bill Benito, board member of NADCA. "NADCA-recommended contractors will loosen contaminants with brushes and compressed air, then use negative pressure collection equipment to collect all the debris so that nothing is blown into your living areas." Visit www.nadca.com to find a NADCA member near you.

* Replace your furnace filter frequently, and use the highest efficiency filter recommended by the manufac-

turer of your heating and cooling system.

* Run bathroom and kitchen exhaust fans when needed, and make sure these units circulate to the outdoors, rather than blowing back into the house. If you have the opportunity, take the covers off the fans and clean off the fan blades to help remove additional particles from the air.


* When the temperatures warm up, open up your screened windows and doors to help circulate the air

inside your house.





Helping children cope with cancer treatment

As frightening as a cancer diagnosis is for any adult, it can be infinitely more terrifying for parents hearing the dreaded diagnosis applied to their child's illness.

Parents of children with cancer not only must make daunting medical decisions on their child's behalf, they also face the challenge of helping their child cope with the emotional impact and physical side effects of cancer treatment.

While innovations in cancer treatment mean many children who are diagnosed with cancer will go on to lead long, full lives, the life-saving treatments can be painful and cause stressful side effects, such as chemotherapy-induced nausea, weakness and hair loss. It's important for parents to help children deal with these side effects both physically and emotionally.

Emotional side effects

From the stress of having a chronic illness to physical and emotional isolation from their friends, cancer and cancer treatment affect children on a deeply emotional level. Children seek guidance on how to cope with their own feelings, and how to talk to their friends about their illness. Online resources like kidshealth.org can offer parents a wealth of information and good advice.

Cosmetic side effects of chemotherapy

Cosmetic side effects of chemotherapy can be particularly stressful for some children. Hair loss, a common side effect, is an outward sign that a child is sick and he or she may feel very self-concious about it.

Parents should reassure children that their hair will grow back when their treatment is over, and discuss options for the meantime, including wigs, hats, or even shaving their head before the hair falls out.

Parents should be sure to seek help for their children in dealing with emotional issues related to caricer. Physicians, nurses, psychologists and clergy can all be resources for families.

Physical side effects

Cancer treatment can cause numerous physical side effects, including nausea and vomiting, fatigue, nutrition and eating problems, fever, skin changes and even confusion and memory problems, according to The National Cancer Institute.

Cancer nausea and vomiting are among the most common side effects, and can be particularly troubling for children, who may already be suffering nutritionally from a lack of appetite. While some medications can effectively treat nausea, parents may hesitate to add yet another drug to the combination their child is already receiving.

Acupressure is proving helpful in

relieving nausea and vomiting for chil-,, dren undergoing cancer treatment.

A study of children undergoing cancer treatment at Brenner Children's Hospital in Winston-Salem, N.C. indicated that acupressure provided by the Sea-Band brand wristband helped reduce nausea and vomiting among the children, ages 5 to 19, who participated in the study. A plastic stud inside the wrist band places mild pressure on an acupressure point that is associated with relieving nausea and vomiting.

The Brenner study notes that "in general, acupressure was safe and well-received, and the patients believed it to be efficacious ..." The study authors also called for more research into the use of acupressure to prevent chemotherapy-related nausea and vomiting in children.

"Sea-Band wristbands can give patients a sense of control, and they are simple enough for children to use effectively," says Leonard Nihan, president of Sea-Band Ltd. 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Tips to keep diabetics in step with good foot health

It makes sense to take care of your feet at any age and any health level after all, they're the foundation on which we walk through our daily lives.

For people with diabetes, however, caring for their feet takes on a new importance, as diabetes related complications prompt the amputation of more than 1.5 million feet and legs every year.

In fact, more than 60 percent of nontraumatic, lower-limb amputations in the U.S. are performed on people with diabetes, according to the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA),

If you or someone you love lives with the disease, knowing how to take care of your feet, and how to recognize signs' of diabetes-related complications, is an important element of successfully managing the disease.

"Research has shown that up to 25 percent of people with diabetes will develop a foot ulcer in their lifetime," says Dr. Kathleen Stone, president of the APMA. "Foot ulcers and infections are the most common reason for hospitalization of those with the condition. However, these problems are largely preventable."

Common foot problems related to diabetes include neuropathy, skin changes, calluses, foot ulcers, poor circulation and infections.



Because diabetes can cause nerve damage in extremities, a person with the disease may not immediately be aware of, or feel pain from, an injury or ulcer. Small wounds or cuts on the foot that are slow to heal can develop into ulcers, which, if left untreated, can become infected and lead to partial or

full amputation of the foot or lower leg, according to the APMA. However, regular care from a podiatrist can reduce amputation rates 45 to 85 percent.

amputation rates 45 to 85 percent.
People with diabetes should inspect their feet daily and be vigilant for these warning signs of ulcers, the most common type of diabetes-related foot complication:

- Irritation
- Redness
- Cracked or dry skin (especially around the heels)

• Drainage on socks

Ulcers can appear anywhere on the foot or ankle, but are typically found on pressure points on the foot, like the ball of the foot or bottom of the big toe.

If you discover an ulcer or have any symptoms, see a doctor immediately.

In many cases, the foot can be saved with early treatment by a podiatrist working as a member of the health care team caring for a person with diabetes.

In addition to examining your feet every day, and keeping your blood glucose in your target range, make sure to follow these foot health tips:

Trim toenails straight across and

file the edges.

 Never go barefoot. Shoes should be comfortable and fit well (the APMA website, www.apma.org, offers guides on how to choose footwear that fits properly). Check the inside of shoes before putting them on to be sure there is nothing inside the shoe that will irritate or harm your feet.

Since diabetes risk can be hereditary, people with diabetes should talk to their families about monitoring their own blood sugar and foot health.

When sitting, elevate your feet.
Wiggle toes and move your ankles up and down several times a day for five

• Diabetes is a hereditary disease, and is often passed down from parent to child. Families affected by diabetes should openly discuss the hereditary nature of diabetes, and its negative physical effects.

"Podiatrists are an integral part of the diabetes management team, and are experts in wound care," says Stone. "They can help patients with diabetes avoid ulcers and treat foot problems that

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
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Stay healthy and avoid making difficult decisions
