CAFA Brings New Ladder Truck Home

The Chelsea Area Fire Authority's (CAFA) new bright red \$700,000 aerial truck, Tower One, arrived at its 200 West Middle Street home August 7.

Chelsea Fire Chief Jim Payeur, Capt. Augustine

Syrovy and the authority's three newest lieutenants - Lance Baird, Scott Basar and Colt White - took turns driving it home from Appleton, Wisconsin before it was parked inside the downtown fire station Tuesday night.

"I always drive the first hundred miles," Payeur said when asked if he took a turn at the wheel. "It rides nice and drives like a car."

Because of its width, backing Tower 1 into its new bay in the refurbished fire station is a tight fit Payeur said.

The new ladder truck is 42foot long and about 11 feet, 7-inches tall, and replaces the authority's 35-year old ladder truck, which is now for sale.

While the old aerial has an 85-foot ladder; the 2012 aerial has a 105-foot ladder and reaches above a Jiffy Mix tower. It has a 2,000 gallon-perminute pump capacity, and a 500-gallon water tank.

The old ladder truck was the fourth truck out of the station on a fire call, Payeur said, but that order will change with the new ladder truck.

"In the city, it will be the first one out," he noted, adding that in rural areas, it will be the third truck out on a scene.

The new ladder truck can be used as a standalone suppression vehicle, Payeur explained, but provides firefighters with more versatility because it can perform multiple tasks.

The ladder can be safely positioned vertically or horizontally. "It can be used for rope rescue and assist in trench rescues," he said.







Children's Parade to Kick-off Chelsea Fair



Local Schools Could Save More Than\$8.7 Million **Under State Reform**

Washtenaw County public schools located in the 52nd House District could save more than \$8.78 million in the next two years alone under a landmark school reform approved by the Michigan House, according to nonpartisan analysis released

today by Rep. Mark Ouimet. Saline Public Schools could save more than \$3.5 million in the next two years, according to the nonpartisan House Fiscal Agency. Dexter Public Schools could save \$2.3 million; Chelsea could save \$1.6 million; Whitmore Lake would save \$709,772; and Manchester Public Schools would save \$669,925.

"It's remarkable how tangible and immediate the savings could be for our local schools if this important reform effort is formally enacted, said Ouimet, R-Scio Township. "The growing debt associated with

the school retirement system will continue to hurt our kids if we don't follow through on these reforms."

All local school boards agree that reforms are needed. The Washtenaw Alliance for Education, comprised of superintendents and school boards from the 10 Washtenaw County school districts and the Washtenaw Intermediate School District, approved a resolution urging the Legislature to give MPSERS reform their highest priority.

The legislation, Senate Bill 1040, reforms the Michigan Public School Employees' Retirement System to eliminate long-term pension and health care liability for

Michigan's public schools. Statewide, the savings for public school classrooms over the next two years is expected to reach more than \$927 million.

Since July, Corey conducted his own informal survey to measure public support after discovering a petition was circulating among local business owners rallying around the event. "It's pretty obvious to me the businesses support it," summarized Corey, adding the vast majority of downtown Stockbridge business owners/managers signed the petition, "I want to make sure we're being receptive to something that can be good for our town." Corey added.

Council member Molly Howlett agreed with Corev. adding she signed the

Council member Greg Uihlein also voiced his support, adding the qualification that Stockbridge Police Chief Johnnie Torres' recommendations for traffic control are followed. "Anything that can come to Stockbridge is a plus for Stockbridge as long as it stays within the village laws and ordinances," said Uihlein.

Byrd responded that many of the complaints were spurred by the fact the event takes place on a Sunday when businesses are closed. "But I don't care what comes here as long as it is done legally," clarified Byrd.

In a later interview, Greenway confirmed her commitment to hold the event in Stockbridge indicating flyers have recently been sent. "I love this town. My address is this town. It's full steam ahead, now let's have some fun!" said a pleased Greenway.

In other village council news - after approximately two months of blocked access to the village's dump site, residents are now permitted to dump grass and leaves only on weekends from 5pm Friday to 7am Monday. Curbside brush pickup will occur the first and third Fridays of each month from August 17 through October 31. Brush should be placed at the curb by 7 am Friday to ensure pickup.

Council voted 5-2 to adopt a firework ordinance restricting the use of fireworks to thirty days of the year. The ignition, discharge, or use of fireworks by any person is now limited to the day preceding, the day of, or the day after a national holiday. Further, a permit is required for firework usage on property owned by the village. "This is the strictest ordinance the village can adopt," said Village Clerk Tim Sadowski. Prior to its implementation, the village had no firework ordinance effectively legalizing firework usage 365 days a year. Trustees Uihlein and Phylis Stowe voted against the ordinance.

Village Clerk Tim Sadowski received a stellar evaluation from Council and was congratulated for recently earning a Master of Business Administration degree from Walsh College of Troy. Michigan. "He's not asking for a raise at this time, but I hope Council sees how important he is when his contract needs to be renewed next year," commented Byrd.

Chelsea Farm Market Now Accepting Bridge Card

The State of Michigan Food Assistance program's Bridge Card is now accepted at the Chelsea Farmers Market. Residents who use this program can purchase fresh, locally grown produce during the Saturday market. "Our local farm vendors raise fresh and healthy food, and we're pleased to be part of a program that improves access to this food for all of our area's residents," said Stephanie Doll, manager of the Chelsea Farmer's Market.

To participate, Bridge Card holders should visit the Bridge Card tent at the Saturday Chelsea Farmers Market. There, shoppers determine how much they would like to spend, present their Bridge Card and receive tokens equal to that amount.

Shoppers then use their tokens to purchase eligible food products at participating vendors. Vendors cannot give change, but will work with shoppers to make sure they get their money's worth. Tokens do not expire, so if shoppers don't use them all that day, they can use them on their next market

The Michigan Farmers Markets (MIFMA) Food Assistance Partnership is working to help low-income Michigan consumers get to thow their local farmers. This group received a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Market Promotion Program aimed at supporting the use of Bridge Cards at Michigan farmers markets.

During the 2012 season, 104 of the state's approximately (1994) farmers markets are accepting Bridge Cards. The goal of MIFMA's Food Assistance Partnership is to have 50% the state's farmers markets accepting Bridge Cards by the end of 2013 and to have a farmers market accepting Bridge Cards in 50% of Mich. counties by 2015.

ventilation at a fire scene." There are anchors on both sides of the vehicle, which stabilize the truck, making it safe for many situations that might confront firefighters on a fire or rescue scene.

"It's the best aerial in the county," said Firefighter A.J. Ellwein.

The fire authority put \$150,000 down on the truck's purchase from its truck. replacement fund and the rest will be financed over a 15-year period at about \$48,000 per year. There's a 25-year life expectancy.

The authority also owns two fire engines, a tanker. tower and two rescue vehicles "We thank the (fire) board and the community for the continued support that allowed us to purchase the aerial." said Firefighter Roger Chapman.



VILLAGE OF STOCKBRIDGE - ORDINANCE NO. 2012-003 TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 13 FIRE PROTECTION AND PREVENTION ARTICLE II. FIREWORKS - THE VILLAGE OF STOCKBRIDGE ORDAINS: Chapter 13 Fire Protection and Prevention - Article II. Fireworks Sec. 13-49. Definitions. (a) "Agricultural and wildlife fireworks" means fireworks devices distributed to farmers, ranchers, and growers through a wildlife management program administered by the United States department of the interior or the department of natural resources of this state.

(b) "APA standard 87-1" means 2001 APA standard 87-1, standard for construction and approval for transportation of fireworks, novelties, and theatrical pyrotechnics; published by the American pyrotechnics association of Bethesda, Maryland. (c) "Articles pyrotechnic" means pyrotechnic devices for professional use that are similar to consumer fireworks in chemical composition and construction but not intended for consumer use, that meet the weight limits for consumer fireworks but are not labeled as such, and that are classified as UN0431 or UN0432 under 49 CFR 172.101. (d) "Consumer fireworks" means fireworks devices that are designed to produce visible effects by combustion, that are required to comply with the construction, chemical composition, and labeling regulations promulgated by the United States consumer product safety commission under 16 CFR parts 1500 and 1507, and that are listed in APA standard 87-1, 3.1.2, 3.1.3, or 3.5. Consumer fireworks does not include low-impact fireworks. (e) "Consumer fireworks certificate" means a certificate issued under section 4. (f) "Display fireworks" means large fireworks devices that are explosive materials intended for use in fireworks displays and designed to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation, as provided in 27 CFR 555.11, 49 CFR 172, and APA standard 87-1, 4.1. (g) "Firework" or "fireworks" means any composition or device, except for a starting pistol, a flare gun, or a flare, designed for the purpose of producing a visible or audible effect by combustion, deflagration, or detonation. Fireworks consist of consumer fireworks, lowimpact fireworks, articles pyrotechnic, display fireworks, and special effects. (h) "Local unit of government" means a city, village, or township. (i) "Lowimpact fireworks" means ground and handheld sparkling devices as that phrase is defined under APA standard 87-1, 3.1, 3.1.1.1 to 3.1.1.8, and 3.5. Sylvan Township **Narrowly Passes Millage**

Sylvan Township voters will likely petition for a recount after Tuesday's primary election resulted in a seven vote margin in favor of a 4.4 mill tax levy for 20 years. The highly anticipated vote count totaled 480 votes for the millage and 473 against, including absentee ballots. The Washtenaw County Clerk's Office reported a voter turnout of approximately 43 percent.

Director of the Elections Division Ed Golembiewski said there have been numerous inquiries about a recount, although no registered voter has formally filed a petition to date. Voters have six days to request a recount after the County Board of Canvassers completes a canvassing process which declares election results official.

A ten dollar deposit is required by the petitioner, but will be returned if the recount results in a changed outcome. The potential recount would be a scheduled event where officials would hand count ballots in the presence of the public. County officials anticipate a recount to take place during the week of August 20 or possibly August 27. All three Sylvan Township Republican incumbents were

defeated in the primary by the Sylvan Clean Slate ticket candidates. Doug Smith received 659 votes for the clerk position, while incumbent LuAnn Koch received 255. Rod Branham won 647 votes for the treasurer position, while incumbent Arlene Grau won 261. Vying for the trustee positions, Republicans Kurt Koseck with

634 votes and Roy Schmidt with 622 votes will face Democrat Sandy Egeler and Independent Alex Slocum in the November election. Republican incumbent Reuben Lesser received 237

Republican candidate for the supervisor position, Scott Cooper, having received 569 votes, will face Independent incumbent Bob Lange in November.

Incumbent Treasurer Kris Lauckner, filed as Democrat, and opponent Gary Allen, filed as Republican, and they will square off in the November 6 general election.



Presented by the DNR After a week of intensive electrofishing and gill netting activities in Sandusky Bay, Maumee Bay and their main tributaries, officials have found no bighead or silver Asian carps in western Lake Erie. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service continue to work together to assess the current status of bighead and silver carp within western Lake Erie bays and select tributaries.

"The sampling results are very encouraging, especially since we intensely focused on areas where we believed we had the greatest chances of finding these fish," said Rich Carter, ODNR executive administrator of fish management and research. "We look forward to the results of the environmental DNA (eDNA) analysis that will help us define future actions,"


'We are committed to supporting our state DNR partners in the field," said U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Midwest Deputy Regional Director Charlie Wooley. "Service staff will continue to work side-by-side with DNR employees both on the water and in the labs as we try to answer the question, 'Are there any live Asian carp in the Sandusky and Maumee areas?' This week's sampling has not provided any physical evidence

waterways." Jim Dexter, Chief of the Fisheries Division, MDNR noted that this effort presented an "excellent effort to accompany the more sensitive eDNA testing." The MDNR looks to this effort as a baseline of information and as a foundation upon which to build any future sampling efforts.

Fish sampling activities took place in response to six water samples taken from Sandusky and north Maumee bays in August 2011 that tested positive for the presence of Asian carp eDNA. Additional eDNA sampling activities occurred July 30-August 4, and those findings will be announced in a few weeks.
