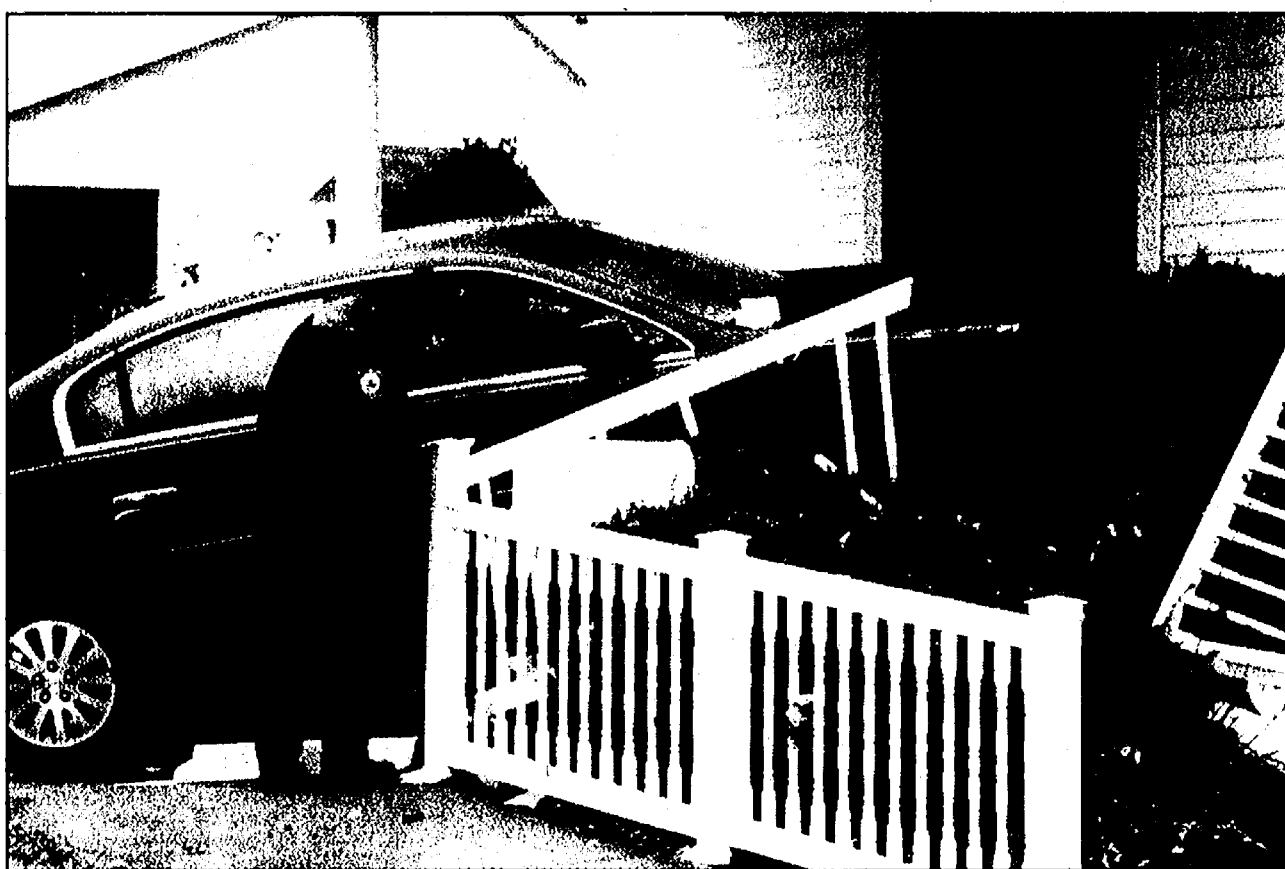

Wind and Age Suspected In Crash On Wilkinson in Chelsea

Two women were heading southbound on Wilkinson Street in Chelsea on October 30 when the 84 year old driver lost control of the car and crashed into the front of Chelsea Christian Fellowship Church.

Chelsea Police Chief Ed Toth said weather was definitely a contributing factor in the accident that occurred on the 25 mile per hour residential street. "The weather was really blustery from hurricane Sandy. There were 40 mile per hour gusts and squalls."

The two women had just left the Pines Retirement Community and ended up driving over the curb onto the east side of the street. The vehicle glanced a utility pole, took out the "Keep Hope Alive" sign in the front yard of the church, rolled up the church stairs then knocked down one of the columns that support the roof of the church porch before slamming into the building.

Nobody was injured in the crash. However the women were trapped in the vehicle until rescue workers arrived and the car was towed off the church porch.

Chief Toth explained that standard procedure in this type of accident is to file a OC-88 form, which is a request for driver evaluation from the secretary of state's office. This takes place when police think there may be an issue with the driver's health that could infringe on their ability to drive.

Toth said he is sensitive to the needs of seniors and that his department has helped with transportation problems on occasion. "You know 20-21% of our population is senior citizens and we try to help them out as much as we can when we are available," he said.

Trinh Pifer, Director of the Chelsea Senior Center, said that the loss of driving privileges can be devastating to a senior citizen. "Driving is key to having independence," she noted. "We offer regular elder driver safety courses that are led by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). If a senior fulfills both days of this AARP course a lot of insurance companies will lower their premiums."

For those who are no longer able to drive there is a program at the Chelsea Senior Center "each one reach one" which can help with transportation to the

center. This program is in a partnership with Neighborhood Senior Services, which is under the umbrella of Catholic Social Services.

Neighborhood Senior Services also provides help with medical transportation, running errands, and grocery shopping. Anybody in need of these services should call the senior center at (734)475-9242 to be matched with a volunteer driver in their area.

The Western-Washtenaw Area Value Express (VAVE) bus is also available and offers door-to-door service to Chelsea and Dexter residents and for seniors who live out in some of the surrounding areas. The charge for this service is two dollars one way. There is also a free route on WAVE which loops around town on a regular basis and stops at predetermined locations including. To contact WAVE call (734)475-9494 Monday through Friday 9am to 3pm.

Police Ask For Public's Help Investigating Church Break-In

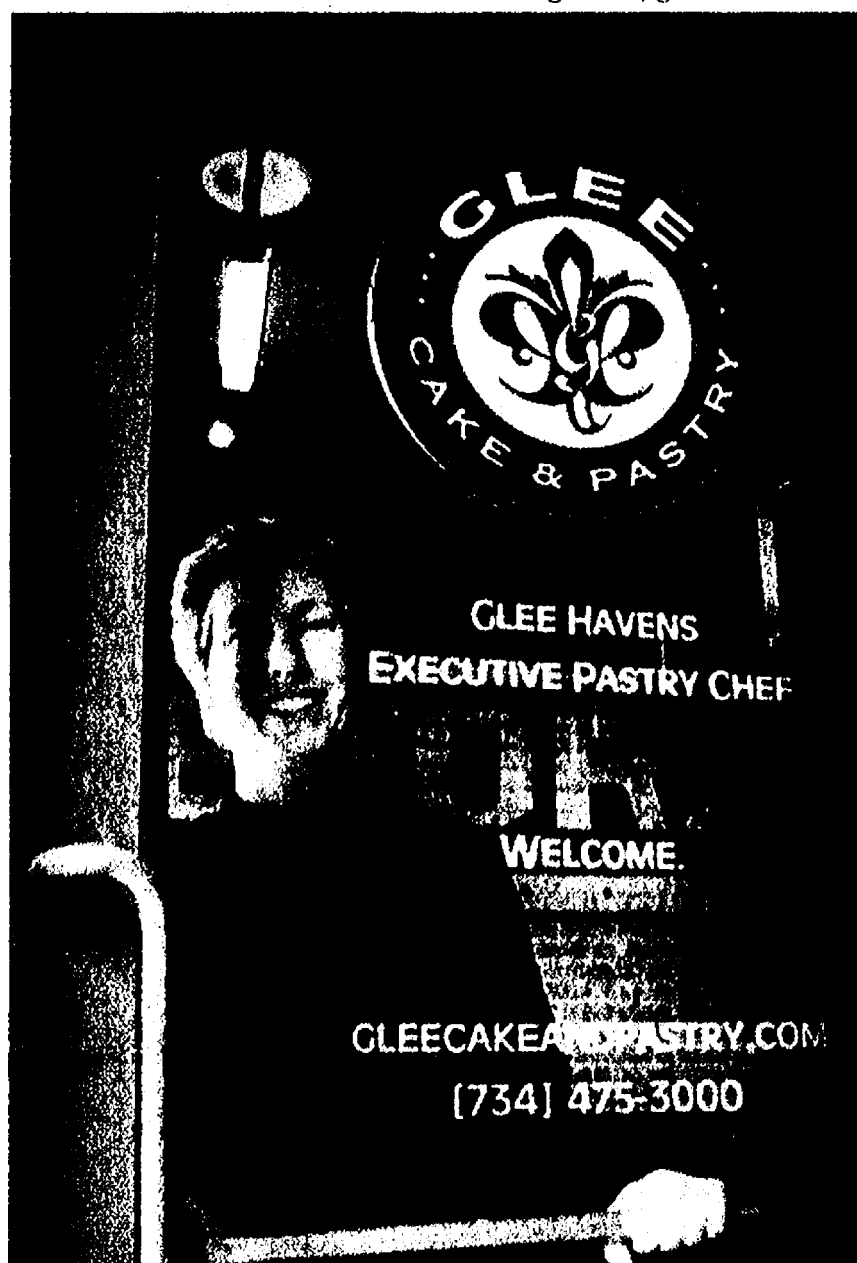

DNR Encourages Support For Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger

With more than 1.1 million Michigan residents annually seeking food assistance, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages hunters to keep this critical need in mind as they head out this season.

The DNR asks all hunters to consider making a donation to Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger (MSAH) when purchasing hunting licenses this year. Donations will be used to support the processing of deer donated to participating processors. Last year, the venison donated to local food banks and food kitchens throughout Michigan supplied enough meat to provide more than 100,000 meals with a source of nutritious protein.

"Today, we have the opportunity to continue a tradition started by hunters before us, who hunted to provide food for early settlements in Michigan," said Raymond Rustem, DNR liaison for MSAH. "Hunter donations of funds or venison can help those who are still experiencing hard times in our state."

When renewing fishing or hunting licenses, residents should tell the license vendor of their intent to make a monetary donation to the Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger program. Anglers and hunters can donate in amounts of \$1, \$5, \$10 or \$20. The vendor will simply add the donation amount to the overall purchase price and it will show up as an additional item on the license.

Those who would like to donate a deer should visit the MSAH website, www.sportsmenagainsthunger.org, to find the nearest processor.

Rustem pointed out that even individuals who don't fish or hunt can still support this important program by visiting the Michigan eStore at www.michigan.gov/estore, click on Tax-Deductible Donations, and

then choose the Help Feed the Hungry option. Fill in the information about the donation and add the item to the cart. "Many people continue to struggle in this economy," he added. "Donating to this important effort is a simple way to help."

Rustem reminded donors to save any receipts or forms. Donations to Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger are tax-deductible.

Since 1991, Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger has been working to create linkages between donors, wild game processors and charities that feed needy individuals. MSAH is an all-volunteer organization led by sportsmen and women concerned about making a positive difference in the community. Gregory Native Biking Across America to Raise Awareness About Health Care

Ericka Bramlett of Gregory, a 2004 graduate of Stockbridge High School, plans to ride her bike 3,400 miles from San Diego, California to Washington D.C. starting March 17 and ending May 14, 2013. She is part of the non-profit organization Ride For World Health (R4WH).

This organization has three goals - Education, Fundraising and Advocacy - and was created in 2006 with a few, very simple ideas in mind: there are many people in the U.S.A. and abroad who are not receiving proper healthcare; there is a significant link between poverty, disease and lack of access to healthcare; something can be done about it beginning with education.

During the ride, participants will deliver a coast-to-coast lecture series to all age groups, from elementary and high school students, senior citizen centers and rotary clubs to major medical centers and universities.

Issues of discussion range from good hygiene skills,

childhood obesity and health maintenance for the baby boomer generation to disease in poverty, women's and children's health, access to healthcare, politics on foreign aid and the pathophysiology of infectious disease.

Since 2006, R4WH has donated over \$500,000 to support innovative non-governmental healthcare organizations. For 2013, the organization has chosen two beneficiaries, Village Health Works, a well-established organization that runs a clinic for 50,000 patients and supports wellness in Kigutu, Burundi, Africa using a sustainable community focused approach oriented towards food security, education, livelihood skills, and gender-based violence and environmental protection (www.villagehealthworks.org).

The second beneficiary of R4WH efforts is Empower and Advance, a recently founded organization that aims to train community members to be health workers in vulnerable communities through an interactive video curriculum to triage and treat medical emergencies. Their pilot program is in Haiti, but the curriculum is animated and intended to be language interchangeable so that it may be used in countries suffering the consequences of war and natural disasters (empowerandadvance.org/).

R4WH advocates for the freedom and health of all people. In America they support the efficient and safe delivery of health care to anyone in need, regardless of age, sex, race, illness, or ability to pay. Abroad, they support the efforts of the World Health Organization and the United Nations Millennium Development Goals, which range from cutting extreme poverty in half to halting the spread of HIV/AIDS and providing universal primary education.

Bramlett is asking for donations of any size to help meet her personal fundraising goal of \$2,700. Hospice of Michigan Honors Veterans With Special Services

The patient was quiet, as veterans often are. In the final throes of congestive heart failure, he seemed to have nothing to say – until Dr. Michael Paletta walked into his room.

Not only is Paletta the vice president of medical affairs for Hospice of Michigan (HOM), he is a retired Colonel and flight surgeon who served a tour of duty in Iraq.

Paletta sat down next to the dying man, who assumed he was yet another physician coming in with yet another round of medication and questions. Then Paletta began to talk – not about the patient's conditions or fears of his impending death, but

asking questions about the patient's time as an Army Air Corps crewman aboard a B-17 bomber.

The patient brightened and began to tell Paletta about his service in England and France during World War II, how homesick he was while he was far away from his family, defending his country. And in those brief moments near the end of life, it was not simply patient and doctor, but veteran reaching out to veteran to express gratitude at end of life for the sacrifices made to serve in the military.

Last year, HOM became a participant in the We Honor Veterans program, which is designed to enhance care for veterans at their end

of life. The program is a partnership between the Veteran Administration and the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, or NHPCO.

Participating hospices receive training to recognize and treat the unique issues facing military families, provide access to community resources and facilitate cooperation between Veteran Administration health agencies and hospice services.

HOM, the largest not-for-profit hospice in the state, is in the process of training its care teams in 56 counties across Michigan to recognize, understand and support veterans and their families at the end of life.

We Honor Veterans contains both clinical and ceremonial elements. Paletta, who also serves as the executive champion of the program for Hospice of Michigan, worked with other HOM professionals to develop a professional curriculum that "trains the trainers" to better address the special needs of veterans.

As a population, veterans have their own culture and language that outsiders often find difficult to understand. For example, their military training teaches them not to say anything if they are in pain. Admitting to being in pain is perceived to be a sign of weakness. But at end of life, in order for hospice to be effective, that attitude needs to change. HOM nurses, physicians, social workers and other clinical staff are sensitized to this and other unique issues when working with veterans.

The needs of veterans are not one-size-fits all. They face different health risks depending on their age and service. For example, Vietnam veterans are more likely to be struggling with substance abuse, post-traumatic stress disorder and depression. Younger veterans who fought in Iraq or Afghanistan face more mental health and environmental issues, such as high-altitude illness.

Participation in We Honor Veterans has prompted HOM to change some of the ways it approaches patients. For example, it now begins the intake process with a new patient by asking for a military health history. Questions include whether the patient faced combat, receives benefits or medication from the Veteran Administration or has a preference for caregivers with military backgrounds.

During the past year, HOM has also established stronger relationships with community Veteran Administration resources throughout the state to ensure that veterans are receiving the proper healthcare, survivor and burial benefits to which they are entitled.

Additionally, HOM has conducted more than 50 pinning ceremonies at nursing homes and other veterans' facilities around the state. These ceremonies serve as a formal thank you to veterans from the Navy, Army, Air Force and Marines, who receive a certificate reflecting their branch of military service and an American flag pin honoring them for their military service.

The pinning often include a special "Missing Man" ceremony honoring MIA/POW servicemen and candle-lighting ceremony honoring the sacrifice of family members of veterans.

State and local community leaders often assist, supported by honor guards made up of veterans from American Legion and VFW posts throughout the state.

Finally, upon the death of a veteran, HOM ensures that the body or coffin is draped with an American flag as they take their final journey.

The Chelsea Wellness Coalition's Eat Better Subcommittee Launches A Healthy Grocery Initiative

Smart shopping is the first step to better eating at home. This is the thought behind the Healthy Grocery Initiative designed by the Eat Better Subcommittee of the Chelsea Wellness Coalition and funded by the Chelsea-area Wellness Foundation. The Chelsea coalition has extended an invitation to participate in the initiative to the other four coalitions served by the Wellness Foundation – Dexter, Grass Lake, Manchester and Stockbridge.

The group took the first step in implementing its grocery initiative the week of October 15. More than 40 people, including local business owners, representatives from local hospitals and health systems, professional dietitians, interns and students attended a seminar, *Promoting Health While Increasing Your Bottom Line*, and a consultant visited local grocery and convenience stores at their request to discuss the topic as it applies to their businesses.

During the seminar, consultant Jennifer Wood presented a wealth of information and ideas for grocery and convenience store owners.

The best thing about the ideas she shared was that they are all field-tested examples of successful practices such as recognizing that some customers may not know how to cook and at 4pm, the majority of people don't know what they're having for dinner. Wood suggested ways for retailers to make healthy choices simple for their shoppers. A store can provide easy recipes using a variety of foods – but not too many, demonstrate how to cook, and make the choices budget-friendly as well as healthy. Shoppers who walk into the store not knowing what's for dinner can leave with what they need for a tasty meal they can prepare themselves at a reasonable cost.

"I'm glad I took the time to go to the seminar. I enjoyed it," said Denise Burnette, who owns The Point at Cavanaugh Lake Road with her husband Steve. "Jennifer Wood knows her stuff. The information she presented gave me ideas that I think would work. Being new in the business, I'm willing to try things, to put the ideas in play."

Hearing Ms. Wood, owner of Dietitian on Wheels, a Minnesota-based business, gave local dietitians, dietitian interns and students an opportunity to interact with a registered dietitian who has extensive experience in nutrition education, community collaboration, program development and marketing. It's the Eat Better group's view that the seminar helped increase the number of local people who have both the

capacity to move the grocery initiative forward and an interest in doing so.

Polly's Country Market in Chelsea, New Chelsea Market, The Point at Cavanaugh Lake Road, Country Market in Dexter and Ransom's in Stockbridge took advantage of the opportunity to schedule a site visit by Jennifer Wood during her stay in Chelsea. These businesses will receive a letter from Wood with recommendations on how to help shoppers identify the smart food choices available in their stores.

"Having her visit the store and getting the chance to talk one-on-one was more personal for me than a seminar," said Veronica Hackworth about Wood's visit to Country Market in Dexter. "We are doing many of the things she talked about, but there's always something to learn."

Francisca Fernandez, co-owner of New Chelsea Market shared her thoughts about the seminar and Wood's site visit to the store. "Jennifer's input gave us a perspective on national food trends and validation of our focus on specialty items such as gluten free, vegan and organic. She was also quite strategic in combining winning sales strategies such as tastings, recipes and

cooking demonstration with great customer service. It fits great with our philosophy of providing nutritious and delicious foods at a fair price for Chelsea and surrounding areas."

Between now and February 2013, members of the Chelsea Wellness Coalition's Eat Better Subcommittee will be planning next steps for their initiatives, including the Healthy Grocery Initiative. They are eager to hear from interested community members who want to join the subcommittee or have comments and suggestions to make.



HONORING GARY LILLIE

Each year CSB has featured a local Veteran in our Veterans' Day recognition ad. Gary always made it a point to contact us after the ad would run to thank us for paying tribute to our local heroes. There was no call in 2011 as Lillie died after a suspected drunken driver hit him on Marshall Road.

After his discharge in 1967 he moved to the Ann Arbor area and began his own commercial real estate firm, Gary Lillie & Assoc. Incorporated.

This year, we are recognizing Gary Lillie as a true, local hero. We salute and thank Gary, and all of our Veterans.

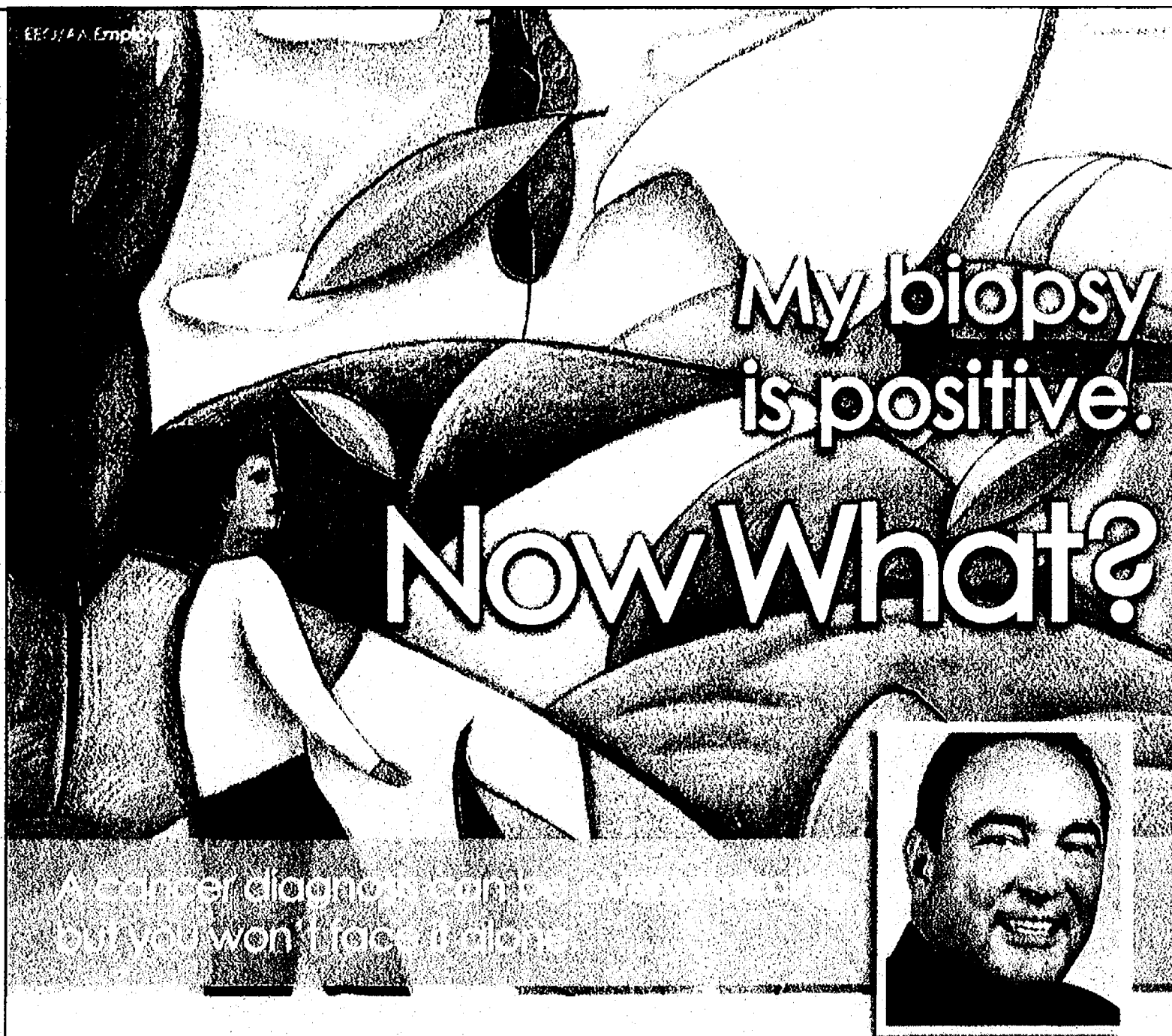

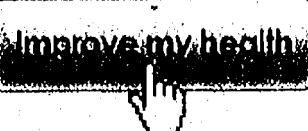

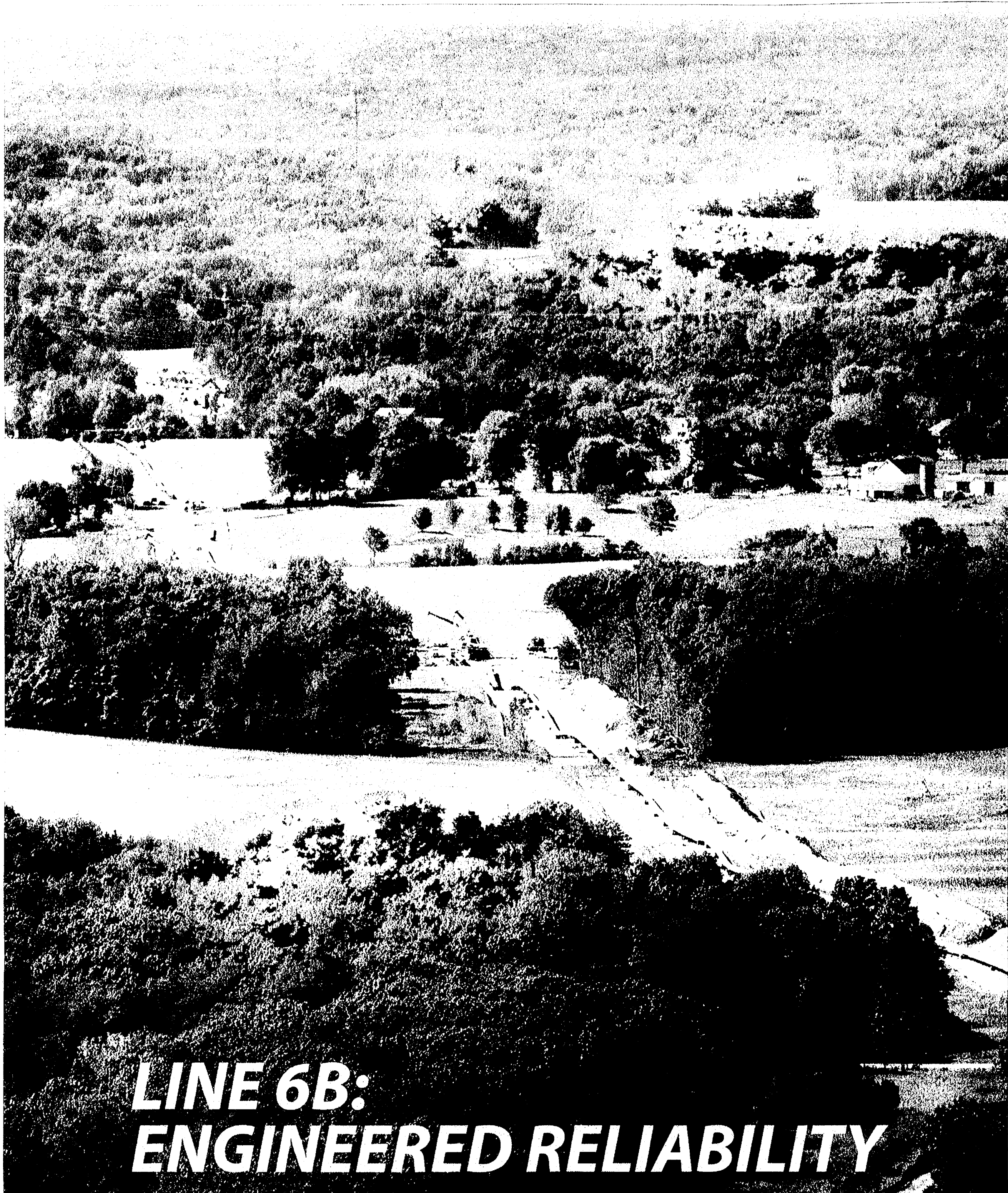
