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

Osborn's Outline Caused Specific WASHINGTON Attention.

"Michigan's lower peninsular forest reserve, according to the results of the conference in Washington between the state and federal officials, will amount to 210,000 acres," said President Snyder of the M. A. C. He would like to raise the amount to 700,000 acres and hopes the next legislature may do it.

'There are 40,000 acres of agricultural college lands," said Prof. Sny der. "At first it was planned to add 40,000 acres to these, but it is decided now also to add the government lands in the lower peninsula, about 170,000 acres. Besides these there are 500,000 acres of tax lands. abandoned and not desired, belonging to the state, all of which could be turned into forest reserves.'

A commission was appointed under an act of the last legislature to look over these lands with view to reforestation. If 500,000 acres could added to the lands already set aside, Michigan could begin one of the greatest works of reforestation and conservation in this country

The conference of governors centered its attention largely on the forestry question as the central problem. exactly as outlined in Chase S. Osborn's letter to President Roosevelt. In this problem of reforestation Michigan seems to be taking a lead.

Michigan interests long-have regarded reforestation as a mighty problem, but academic and hard to solve in a practical manner. The solution of the problem and reforestation projects on a grand scale are Michigan results from the great conference and all other states are sure to follow. It is certain that the governors' Chautauqua will be fruitful of practical results of all kinds in many forms of

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



BUILDING WIRE FENCES. How One Man Can Put It Up , Stretch It Himself.

One man can build a wire fence us assisted if he has a chance to div a horse with a pair of front when near to the fence. Put an iron about two feet long, or a crowb through the holes in the wire reel as let it go down in the hole where the

rocker bolt goes through the axle, Fasten one end of the wire to post or tree where you wish to start will need a steady horse, as one that Any garden soil that will grow good does not pull steadily is liable to break the wire.

After the wire is stretched, san Farm and Home, and made fast by the rope start with hammer and staple where you first fastened it. Lift it 14 feet or more from the ground, and m along to each post and drive your staple about half way in until you reach the end. If the posts are ag on a straight line you may have to slacken the wire, otherwise you may have to draw a strain on it the second time. Start again at the further end and drive the staples in tight.

In putting up the next two wire proceed in the same way and sprey them apart the length of your hammer handle on each post and you will have a fence that no cow can get through and if they go over a fence of that height they are only fit for the bed barrel.






