ALUMNI-HIGH SCHOOL DIVIDE HONORS IN OPENING GAME

High School Girls Win and Boys Lose in First Basket Ball Tilt of the Season.

With approximately two hundred fans cheering from the sidelines, some for the high school and others for the stars of other years, Chelsea High school and alumni basketball teams divided honors in the opening game of the season at the public school gymnasium last Thursday evening, when the high school boys lost to the "has-beens." Score of the former game was 7 to 15 and the latter game ended 16 to 23.

High school girls put their game "on ice" during the first quarter, making eight points to the alumni girls' two. And it is well they did for in the final quarter the graduates made four points to the students' nothing. Rather reversing the expected order the alumni girls strengthened while the students weakened and slowed as the game progressed. If five points made during the second quarter helped the high school maintain their early lead. In the third quarter they made two points.

Clean playing and some mighty fast work featured the boys' game, and, as in the girls' game, the high school boys took an early lead over the alumni, rolling up a total of seven points to the latter's three during the first quarter. The team broke about even in the second quarter, the students making three points to the alumni's 2. However, with the third quarter came a streak of luck for the former students when they rolled up 12 points to the high school's 2, Clayton White tossing 8 of these points from the field. Five of these gained during this quarter proved too much for the students, and the third playing period gave the high school 4 points and the alumni 6, for a total of 16 to 23 respectively.

That the alumni chalked up a larger score than the high school does not necessarily mean that the high school boys are a weak aggregation. For, while the students have only about five first string players who can be counted on from start to finish, the alumni played two complete teams during the game, working in relays to save their wind—which was good strategy. Numbered in these two teams are several of the stars of former years as can readily be seen by the line-up. Because of these facts the high school team deserves considerable credit for stacking up as high as they did in Thursday's game. And because of the way they played the game against a picked aggregation of several years experience there is every reason to believe some of the other high schools hereabouts are going to run up against a stone wall when they meet the local team. Chelsea high has not had a better center in years than is to be found in the person of Steger, who with his height, reach, easy, rhythmic motion and head work promises to outclass any center he meets this season. Steger is captain of the team. Dancer, playing a forward position, is an excellent basket shooter, and while short, manages to go under, rather than over his opponent, to make his shots. Beach is another good forward, more lengthy, but with an eye for the basket, and good control of his shots. Faust and Weber at guard will hold a good many bigger men than they without batting an eye, and it will be a mighty good forward who shoots baskets over their heads. Steiner at guard also plays a good game.

With this material in the hands of Coach Jerome it's only to be expected a decided improvement will follow which will make the games interesting and exciting to the public. Good crowds encourage the teams and add to the fighting spirit—something that is being developed and is evident in the local team's playing. Manchester High, both boys and girls, will meet local boys and girls teams on the gym floor Friday evening of this week. Manchester has promised a big crowd of fans to celebrate the first game with a visiting team on the new floor, and Chelsea should do no less.

PROBATE COURT HAS BUSY YEAR IN 1926

More than a thousand separate cases were handled in the court of Jay G. Pray, probate judge, during the year 1926. About one-third of these involved the settling of estates. There were more than 200 cases of afflicted adults, and almost an equal number of cases of afflicted children.

Following is a list of the nature of the cases handled by the court: Estates, 327; afflicted adults, 233; afflicted children, 193; guardianships, 125; dependent children, 55; delinquent children, 34; insane, 43; incompetents, 21; adoptions, 10; neglected children, 19; feeble minded, 5.

CHICAGO-DETROIT BUS CRASHES INTO TRUCK

Unable to stop because of icy pavement, an eastbound Chicago-Detroit bus crashed into a creamery truck at the Finkbeiner curve, about five miles east of Chelsea, at five o'clock Tuesday morning. Several persons were injured, three of whom were taken to an Ann Arbor hospital. One man, Edward Tifani, of St. Louis, Mo., suffered a fractured skull, and his condition is serious. Other occupants of the bus, as well as the driver, a Chicago man, escaped injury.

Deputy sheriffs called to the scene to investigate the accident, did not hold either the truck or bus drivers. The creamery truck was stopped on the pavement when engine trouble developed, and the bus driver started to go around but was prevented by a car approaching from the opposite direction. Brakes were applied and an attempt made to stop but because of the icy condition of the pavement they did not hold and the heavy car crashed into the truck. Passengers were forced to wait at the scene of the accident for another vehicle before they could resume their journey.

The bus, with the front end badly smashed, has been brought to the Mohrlock garage, Chelsea, to await repairs.

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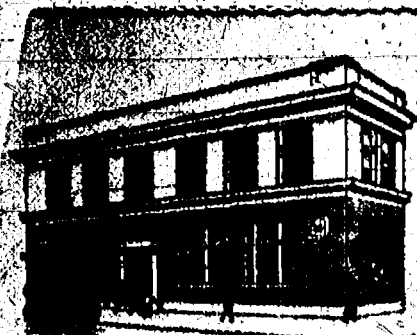

Here's a quaint old paragraph found on a yellow program of the Covent Garden Theatre, London, with the date 1817—

"The proprietors respectfully inform the public that an entirely new method of lighting the theatre has been adopted, effected by a magnificent chandelier which from the center of the ceiling diffuses a soft and brilliant light around, without obstructing the view of a single spectator. In its effect the body of lights is directly equal to 300 lamps!"

What a fluttering of polite interest was manifest as the audience began to gather, hoop-skirted ladies with demure beauty spots and graceful fans, courtly gentlemen in powdered wigs and buckled shoes! It was one of the early farewells to the old oil lamps—this lighting of the gas at fashionable Covent Garden 109 years ago.

This theatre was one of the first buildings in London to be piped for manufactured gas. Now, from that momentous night, gas has taken its place to London's millions, but for cooking and heating, extensive and growing use.

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Editorial

JOYS OF LIVING

Who has not wished that he had lived in some remote and happy time? The magnificence of Rome, the glory of Greece, the golden chariots, the alabaster vases and the ivory chairs of Tutankhamen fascinate and enthral. Looking about upon a sick and weary world, nerve-shattered and hungry, it is not difficult to imagine how pleasant life must have been in an easier golden day.

Yet, if we had been living in the days of the pampered Pharaohs, the vast majority of us would have been digging the irrigation ditches, sweating over the great stones that went into the pyramids, or—if we had been particularly clever—perhaps hammering the gold that went into the ubiquitous statues of the king. The comforts of life were only at the top in 1500 B. C. and even the hope for improvement had not permeated to the bottom. There may be some consolation for the dissatisfied man of today in this thought—that his lot would have been infinitely worse 3,000 or more years ago.

It's easier to live today than ever before. Nearly all the woes from which the world suffers might have been prevented. But when an ancient civilization was over-run by a savage horde, or when plague or famine decimated the population of the fairest cities, the wisest of those peoples couldn't help themselves.

Migratory tribes have since been pretty well billeted and ticketed, railroads and steamships have conquered famine, and intelligent sanitation and magnificently brave and curious medicine is less respectful of disease with each passing year.

VIGOROUS DAYS

These are days to step briskly with a swinging stride, to raise the chest, hold back the head and breathe deeply. These are the days when the cold, crushing winds blow from the north as though to test the manhood that is so powerful under a warm sun. These are days, indeed, to stir to its utmost, days of activity.

A brief interruption of cold weather and heavy rain spoiled snowy slides, but many of these have been repaired by applications of water. Sledding on ice is quite as dangerous as on snow, more swift and more thrilling. Young America will not be cheated of pleasure. Full grown America, also, can be heard shouting with delight as a small sled sweeps down a steep incline.

Few sports are more delightful for spectators than skating, and none apparently is enjoyed more by participants. Arm in arm, racers practicing hockey players and skiffers claim attention in turn. Glowing cheeks and bright eyes, gracefully moving figures pass in review—charmed and charming—even as were the Norsemen on their runners hundreds of years ago.

These are the vigorous days, more delightful for those who love them because they are so rare. For the same reason they should not be displeasing to those who dread them.

Europe Slow to Make Use of Pyrotechnics
The first European display of fireworks was at Florence, Italy, 561 years ago. A crude pyrotechnic spectacle began then arranged by a Florentine inventor. It was not until the latter part of the sixteenth century, however, that fireworks were exhibited as a spectacle on anything like a grand scale in Europe, although the Chinese invented and used fireworks in remote times.

The first big fireworks display in England was in 1607, when \$80,000 was spent on a display to celebrate the peace of Byzurck. Another memorable display was seen in London in 1748, following the peace of Aix-la-Chapelle.

Our forefathers of Revolutionary days knew little of fireworks, and it was not until after the Revolution that fireworks spectacles on a grand scale were introduced to celebrate Independence day.

Original Cinderella
An authority says that the story of Cinderella is founded on fact, and that she lived 2,000 years before the Christian era, being known in history as the "Roses Cheeked Queen."

The story runs as follows: "One day a lady named Rhodope was bathing in the Nile and the wind carried one of her sandals and laid it at the feet of the king of Egypt, who was holding a court of justice in the open. His curiosity was excited by the singularity of the event and the elegance of the sandal, and he offered a reward for the discovery of the owner. Rhodope claimed it, and the sandal was found to fit her exactly. The king married her."

Totem Poles Significant
Alaskan Indian mythology forms an interesting study. There were four large tribes and each had several animals for symbols. No matter whom they married they retained and clung to these symbols and the crests have continued to mark the offspring of the original founder of each family. An Indian visiting in an Indian village need be at no loss for shelter; he at once goes to the house belonging to one of his crest which he can tell from the totem in front of it. When a pole can be purchased, which is seldom, about \$2,000 is the price—Boston Transcript.

The lottery was first heard of in England in Elizabeth's reign (1558) and it was not until an act of parliament was passed in 1688 that it was legalized. It was then called the "National Lottery" and it failed to attract much success.

No Possible Ruling for Hours of Sleep

The need for sleep varies from one person to another. Children whose growth is very rapid requiring more sleep than the average child of the same age, says Dr. Max Schlem in Hygienic Magazine. Girls, especially during menstruation, require more sleep than boys. More sleep is needed in winter than in summer. The child in the primary grades needs a minimum of twelve hours of sleep. No child between twelve and fourteen years should have less than nine and one-half hours of sleep.

The quality of sleep is also important. Noise, excitement, irritating music and strenuous play before retiring induce a state of emotional fatigue which interferes with falling asleep and is associated with fear and night terrors. Crowded sleeping quarters and bad ventilation are also disturbing to sleep.

If two children must share one room, a separate bed should be provided for each of them. They should retire at the same time, or else care must be taken so that the one retiring later does not disturb the sleeping one. Improper food, especially if eaten a short time before going to bed, robs many a child of his needed sleep.

"Wakes Sunday" Long Festival in England
A peculiar religious festival known as "Wakes Sunday" used to be held, and is still observed in the north of England and elsewhere in honor of the day of dedication of the parish church. On this anniversary it was customary for the younger parishioners to keep watch in the church upon the night preceding the festival, from which is derived the curious name "wakes."

About the middle of the seventeenth century, however, it was ordained that all church wakes were to be held upon the first Sunday in October instead of on different dates as had previously been the case, and for about two hundred years later, Wakes Sunday and the day following was a recognized national festival, akin to the modern Bank holiday. In Herefordshire the following Wakes Sunday was "Thanksgiving Monday," an allusion to the fighting that took place on the day of the battle of Tewkesbury.

In Cornwall, Wakes Sunday was known as "Feast Sunday." Another name was "Hopping Sunday," derived from the dancing which took place.

Breath Transfusion
Just as it is practicable to transfuse blood, it is becoming possible to use the human breath for restoring and revitalizing a patient. Recently a house surgeon at Bedford hospital, England, kept a man alive for some time by breathing into his lungs and though he failed to prevent death, he was compensated for his heroic action. A few years ago Dr. Henry Duvellie of Paris treated a boy who had contracted acute pneumonia and his life was in danger. The doctor covered the affected parts of the tissue with a thin towel, and filling his lungs with pure air, breathed heavily, endeavoring to penetrate the body. The treatment was continued for several days and, after a week, the boy was pronounced out of danger.—Vancouver Province.
