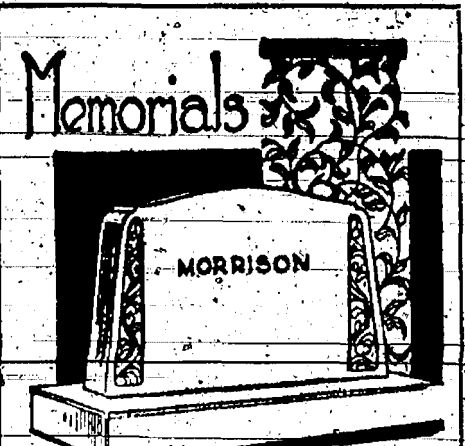

Metropolitan Bee

Friday, May 17, four girls were excused early from school to attend the Metropolitan Spelling Bee in Detroit. Eva Geddes, the runner-up, and Naida Olson and Mary Christwell accompanied our district champion, Eva Harris, who was to compete for the title of "Michigan's Champion Speller". They were chaperoned by Mrs. Fred Harris and Miss Mabel Fox.

Confidence based on dozens of hours of study and self-possession based on a beautiful new spring outfit enabled Eva Harris to withstand for over three hours all attempts to get her out of the bee. Spelling began shortly before two o'clock. Our representative spelled perfectly on the lists prepared for the district championship and on the prepared list for the state contest. She lasted approximately forty-five minutes in a "four-prize" word list which eventually finished the bee. About five o'clock she was asked to spell "chronology", a word which was not in her vocabulary. She missed. Another contestant also missed on the same word, leaving only eleven children still in the contest.

Those children had "spelled down" by 5:30. Every one of the fifty-three children participating were champions in their own districts. Chelsea has every reason to be very proud of Eva Harris' performance. Spelling down forty of such a select fifty-three is no mean achievement at any time; in the presence of such a huge crowd as filled the Coliseum, it was a triumph.

For the comfort of the children participating, spelling was not continuous, but was interrupted to give contestants a rest. Refreshments were served. Among those who expressed encouragement to the spellers were Governor Luren D. Dickinson, Mayor Jeffries of Detroit, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Eugene Elliott, Frank Cody, Supt. of Detroit schools. One of the interesting features of the bee was the presence of a child who was totally deaf, Irene Hill, from the Detroit School for the Deaf. She spelled for nearly two hours, lip-reading the words pronounced by the judges.

The bee was won by Lee O'Connell of Dearborn. This is the second time since the bee began in 1925 that it has been won by a boy.

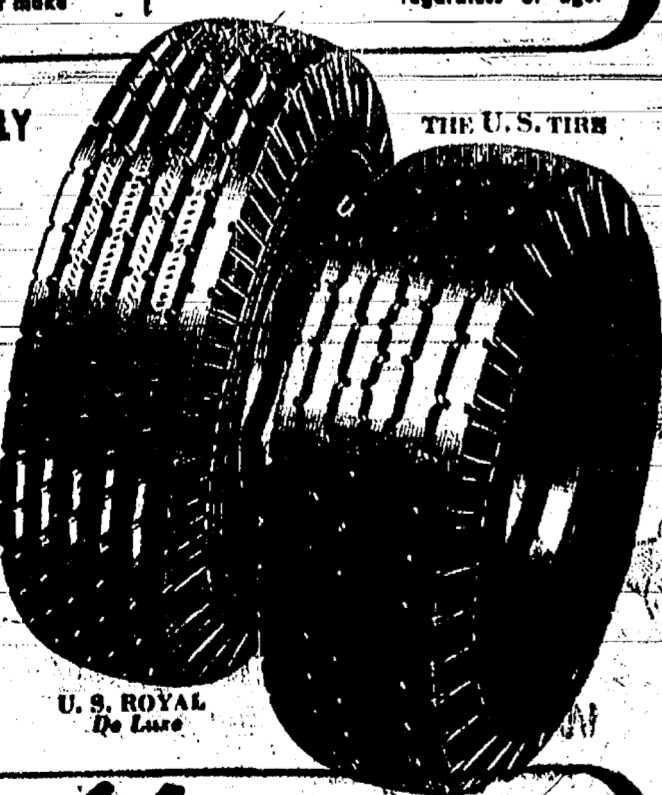

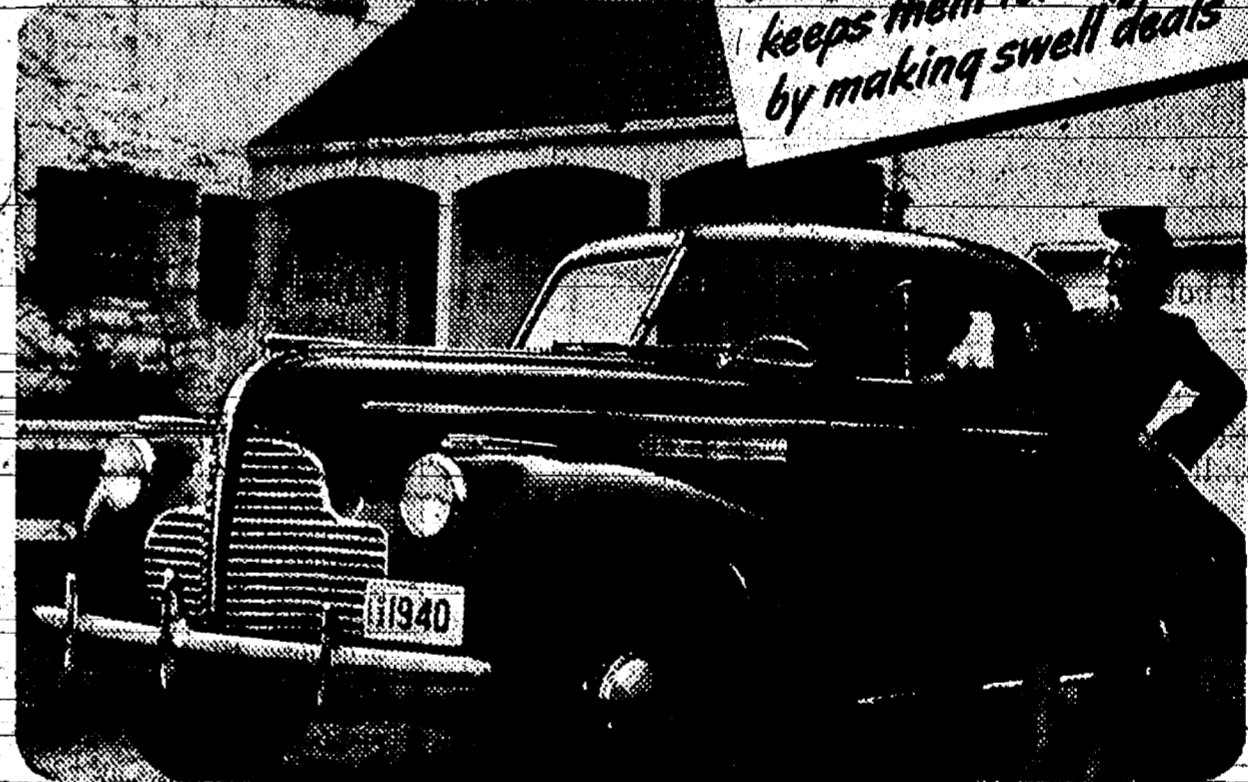
