Farmers in Ancient Ireland Pre-war discovery of a grain of wheat below the foundations of a prehistoric settlement at Island McHugh, in Baroncourt lake, County Tyrone, Ireland, throws an entirely new light on the life of the first inhabitants of Ireland. Two archéologists. Oliver Davies of Queen's university, Belfast, and C. F. Mitchell, Trinity college, Dublin, report that the grain was found at the new Stone age level, dating about 2000 B. C. 




