"Ordinarily, two or more pounds of milk are expected for each pound of required when production is increased above normal. At a time when a vastly increased milk production is immediately needed, more liberal use of grain may fill an urgent defense need, he continued.

"Department of Agriculture experiments over the last four years show that, unless a farmer is already feeding at extremely heavy rates, he can safely assume his cows have a 20 per cent reserve capacity. In other words, a cow producing 5,000 pounds of milk at about standard feeding levels can raise her production to 6,000 pounds year if given an extra 1,000 pounds of grain. If grain costs less than milk sells for, it is good business to

use the extra grain.
