Cottonglass Curtains

Cottonglass curtains can usually be washed satisfactorily. Brushing and shaking removes the loose dust, after which they can be soaked in lukewarm suds, then washed three to five minutes in suds as hot as the hands can comfortably stand. Thorough wringing is essential. Water should be squeezed out carefully, avoiding any wringing or twisting. As starch attracts insects and tends to weaken the material, omit it during storage.

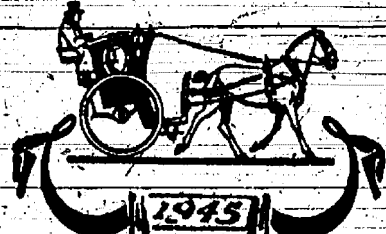

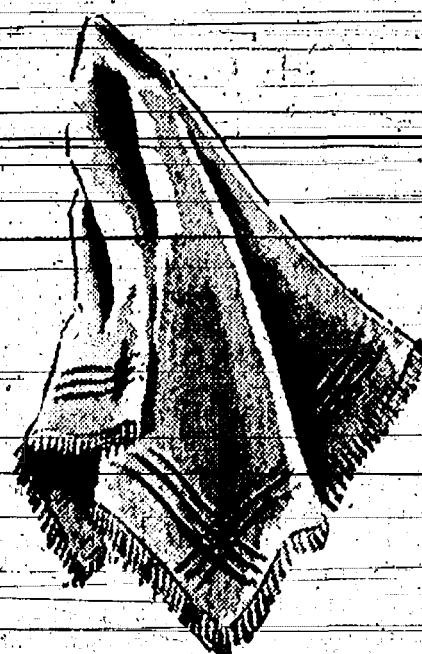
