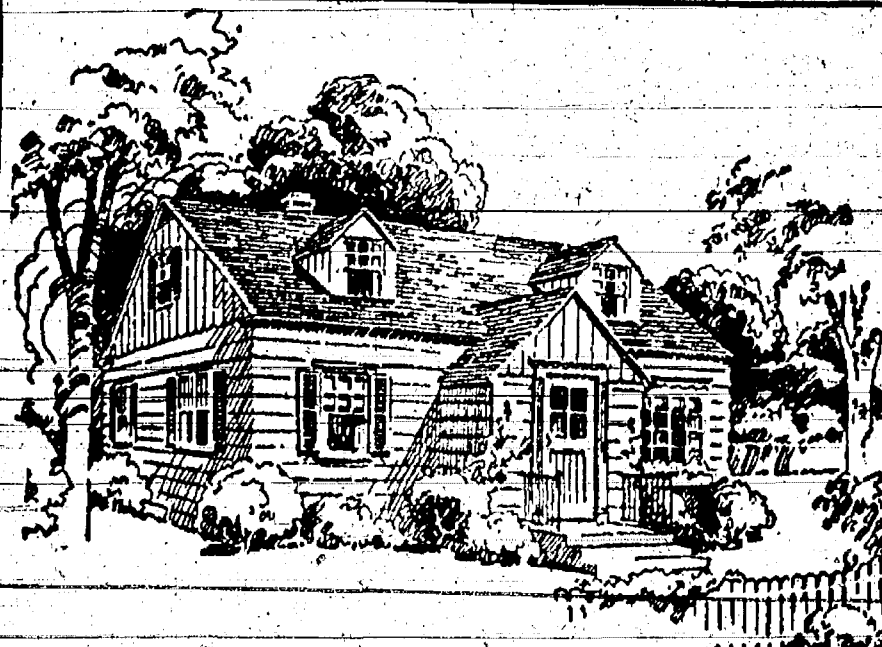

The Chelsea Public Library has completed its fifteenth year with each year showing an increase in service to the community. Every year the item of Books Loaned has increased in size, and this year although many temporary residents have left the Village, there is an increase of nearly 1000 in books loaned over last year's figure. The library is open an additional four hours—Thursdays from ten to two, making 24 hours per week. Eight valuable basic reference books have been added.

Last Friday Gene Miller moved to Paw Paw, Michigan. The class will miss Gene very much. He was an outstanding student, a good leader, and interested in sports.

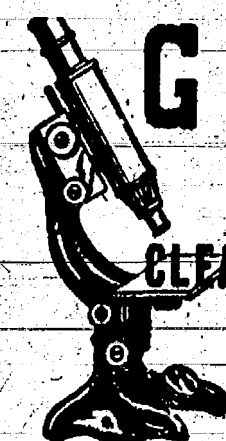
Last week we received a letter from a girl who lives in Madison, Georgia. This came as a complete
