"Teacher shortages are such that it will take from four to five years to supply the demand for teachers on a high school level, from eight to ten years to supply the demand for early and later elementary teachers.'

He declared that demands come to him from coast to coast and even from Alaska and Hawaii. There is a particular shortage in fields of home economics, speech and forensic work, mathematics, music, art, French, Latin, Spanish, special education for the deaf, blind, orthopedic, the slow-learn-ing, and for school librarians. These requests for teachers come from everywhere, yet the institution he serves cannot fill one-tenth of the demand even for Michigan schools. The meeting was called by the Washtenaw County MEA president. Mabel W. Fox, at the request of interested rural teachers of the county. According to Dr. Butler, average salary for 1946-1947 for teachers placed by the Ypsilanti institution on a state limited certificate was \$1,981.32, average for all teachers was \$2,514.20. This year's teachers are being placed at substiantially higher figures than those of last year. Salaries paid to Wash tenaw county teachers are substantially lower than in surrounding counties.


