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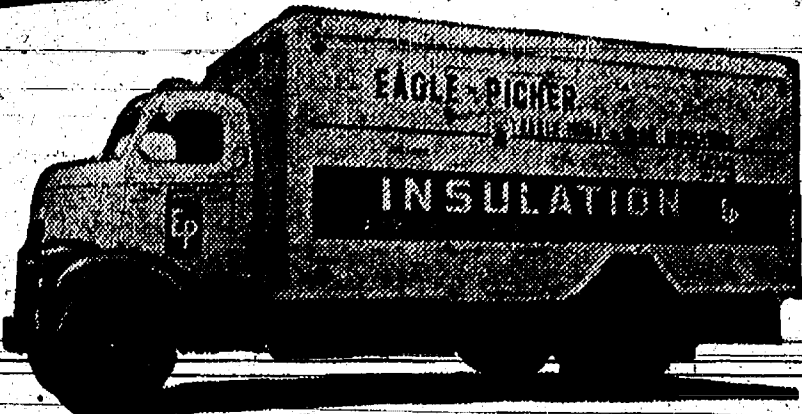

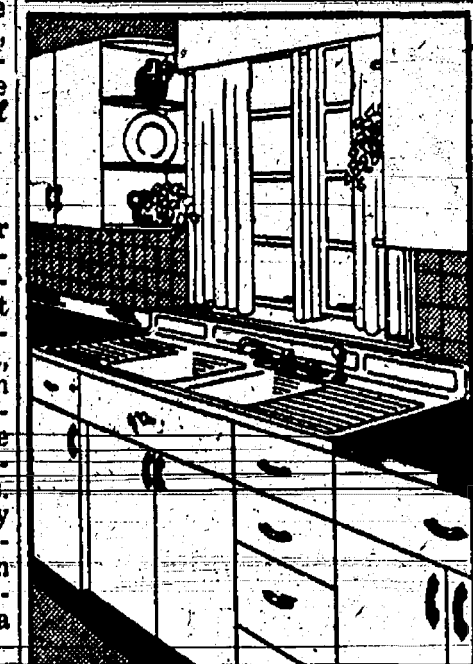

Veteran Services To Continue After OVA Terminates

The Office of Veterans' Affairs will terminate on June 30. Arrangements have been made with other state agencies to carry on most of the programs now being operated by the OVA.

One of the most important programs, the 20 psychiatric clinics, will be taken over by the Mental Health Commission. Services to the veterans in the field of psychiatric help will be uninterrupted. Under the new arrangement, eventually this new plan will provide better services because the Mental Health Commission has more facilities, more trained personnel and more latitude.

C. A. Wagg, Secretary of the Mental Health Commission, has stated that plans are under way to establish permanent adult psychiatric clinics in six key Michigan cities. After this is accomplished, the veterans' clinics in these particular cities will be merged.

Western Michigan College of Education will assume responsibility for the Michigan Veterans' Vocational school and the Board of Regents of the University of Michigan, through the University hospital, for the Veterans' Readjustment Center.

The Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund Board of Trustees will continue the Student Loan Fund program, liaison with the local counseling centers and will maintain positions in the policy making at the Readjustment Center and the Vocational school. General service to veterans as formerly provided will be continued by the Trust Fund Board of Trustees, under the direction of Lawrence J. Lalone, Executive Secretary. The Trust Fund offices are located in the same building as the Office of Veterans' Affairs, 411 West Michigan Avenue, Lansing.



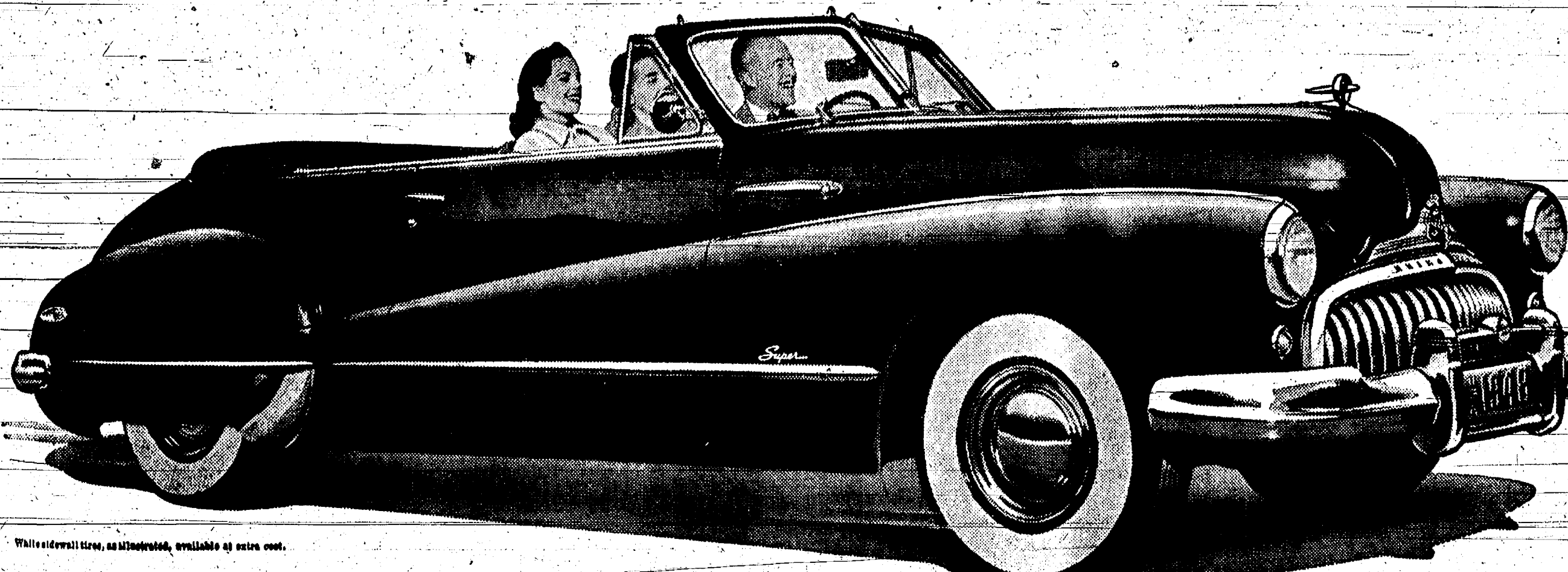

34 Years Ago

Thursday, June 11, 1914

The Chelsea baseball team had a grandstand crowd at their game with the McKinley street. The new stand has a seating capacity for about 275 persons.

William Paul, who for 41 years has been a resident of Lima, died at his home in that township on Monday, June 8, 1914. Mr. Paul was born in Scio, April 9, 1852, and was the first son of German parents born in that township, and was the first to be confirmed within the borders of the county. He witnessed the arrival of the first locomotive on the Michigan Central, when the road was completed to Dexter. In early boyhood he used to make the trip from the farm home to the flour mill at Waterloo, which was made with an ox team and usually consumed four days. Both going to and from the mill he used to camp for the night at Mill creek opposite the residence of John Geddes. There were no buildings on the present site of Chelsea, and the road was a mere trail. Whenever he related incidents of pioneer life they proved very interesting.

Last Saturday evening several items were taken from vehicles on the streets here. About 11 o'clock the numerous thefts were discovered, and reported to officers McKune and Cooper. A suitcase was stolen from the buggy of Joseph Heim last Friday evening which the thief left on the premises of B. Steinbach, and which was turned over to police upon discovery. After being notified of the numerous thefts, officers Cooper and McKune started out on a hunt. On the corner of East and Middle Cooper met the man and informed him that he was wanted and started up town with him. When in front of the residence of E. B. Hammond, the man dropped two pairs of shoes and a coat that he had stolen, but which he claimed were his, and as Mr. Cooper stopped to gather up the goods the man started on a run, going east on Middle street. Cooper started after him but the thief proved the better runner. Two pairs of shoes were stolen from Julius Kaecher, a coat and a pair of lard from George Knoll, and an air pump from the auto of Chas. Riemenschneider. All of the goods but the air pump, and pair of lard were recovered.

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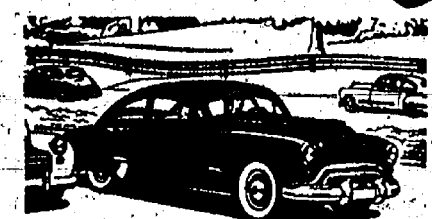
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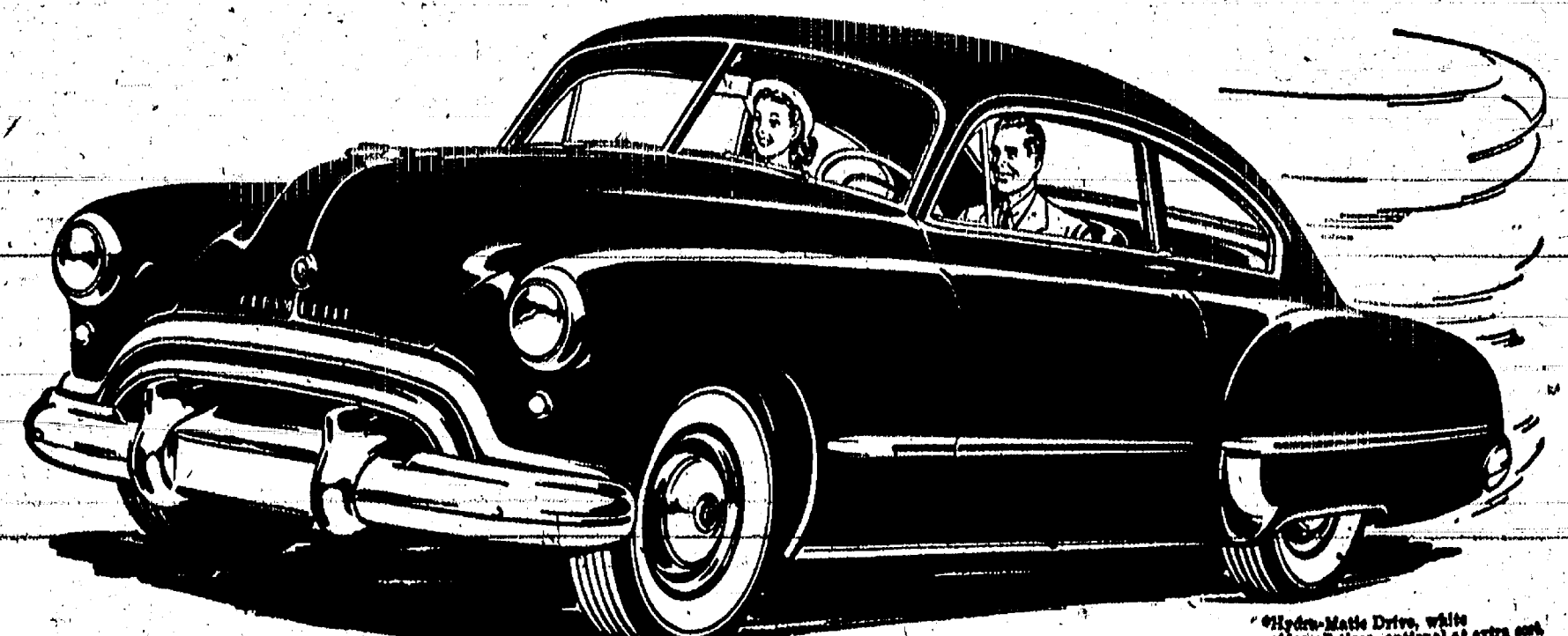
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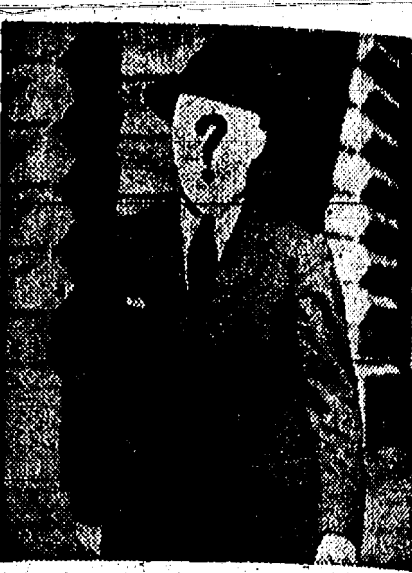

Very dry weather in western upper Michigan accounted for most of the fires burning 533 acres in the upper peninsula last week, while the lower peninsula loss was 145 acres. But conditions were so dry in Big Bear swamp near Lake Margrethe, Crawford county, that exposed parts of deadheads in the creek were burning in a forest fire there.

Most unusual forest fire of the season occurred along highway M-55 south of St. Helen, Roscommon county, in sight of the look-

out in the Indian Springs tower. An old abandoned car caught fire, the fire shorted the wiring, and the burning car, which had been left in reverse gear, was backed into the woods by the driver to set the trees ablaze.
