

CHS Cage Quintet Defeats Dexter Team Tuesday Eve for Third Consecutive Win

Scrappy Manchester Five Downed Friday on Our Home Court

The Chelsea Bulldogs rang up their third straight win of the season last Tuesday evening, as they journeyed to Dexter and nosed out the Bulldogs in a close, exciting game, 33-28.

It was a nip-and-tuck affair all the way, with the score being tied seven times, and the lead changing hands five times during the first three quarters. The Bulldogs finally took the lead toward the end of the third quarter and held through the final period.

Dexter led at the end of the opening stanza, 5-7, but Chelsea tied it up at 16-16 by halftime.

Myers, Bulldog forward, opened the scoring for the night, but Dexter came back to tie it up, and that's the way it went through the first half. The largest lead was three points, Dexter leading midway in the first quarter at 8-5, and Chelsea ahead at one point in the second frame, 12-9.

At the end of the third quarter Chelsea led, 24-21, and despite losing big Dave Myers on fouls in the last quarter, they protected their lead until the final horn.

Little George Heydaufl stepped into the breach for Myers and came through with flying colors and five big points at a time when they were needed.

Bobby Vogel led the way in scoring for the Bulldogs with 12 points, but Marland Howard, Dexter forward, was high for the night with 9.

Next Tuesday night, Dec. 14, the Bulldogs will travel to Manchester for the second engagement with the Flying Dutchmen. Let's back this outfit all the way this year. See you at game time!

Chelsea High's Bulldogs staged a fine second half rally last Friday night at the local gym to come from behind for a prized victory over Manchester's Flying Dutchmen, 34-27.

Manchester scored on an early 8-0 lead in the first quarter, as Wayne Trolz, center, and Bill Cannon, forward, hit for two quick goals apiece. Chelsea had as many shots as Manchester but never on it.

Late in the quarter Marty Tobin broke the ice for Chelsea but at the quarter's end Manchester led, 10-3.

The Bulldogs managed to slow the Dutchmen's attack in the second period but their offense still failed to click effectively. They netted 5 points to the visitors' 4, however, but still trailed 8-14 at the half.

Chelsea continued to dominate the play in the last quarter, outscoring the visitors 12 to 5, and finishing in a breeze for their second win of the young season, 34-27.

Dave Crocker led the Bulldog attack with 10 points, but surrendered high point total for the game to Bill Cannon, who dropped in 11 markers for the losers.

This last win in itself isn't as much food for thought as the fact that the team came from behind to achieve it. This is unusual in the "mark of a champion" and it's promising when a young team such as this year's Bulldog quintet does it.

Chelsea made a clean sweep against the Dutchmen as the Reserve squad won, 24-24. Buddy Johnson netted 17 points for the locals while Brieniewicz and Merriman made 6 each for the losing visitors.

Second of Dairy Ext. Discussions To Be Held Next Tuesday

The second meeting in the series of dairy discussions that have been scheduled during the winter will be held next Tuesday, December 14 at 10 a.m. at the Farm Bureau south of Ann Arbor and at 1:30 p.m. at the Chelsea High School.

Jim Hayes, well known specialist at Michigan State College will be present and his discussions will include: (1) Winter Feeding of the Dairy Herd, (2) Use of minerals in the Dairy Ration, (3) Importance of so-called trace elements in the Dairy Ration, (4) Quality feeds and breeding tools, (5) Quality roughage and pasture in the dairy ration, and (6) Home Grown vs. Commercial Mixes.

According to H. S. Oster, County Agricultural Agent, efficient dairy feeding is very important as it constitutes 50 per cent of the milk production costs. Any economy in feeding the dairy herd means more dollars in the dairyman's pocket.

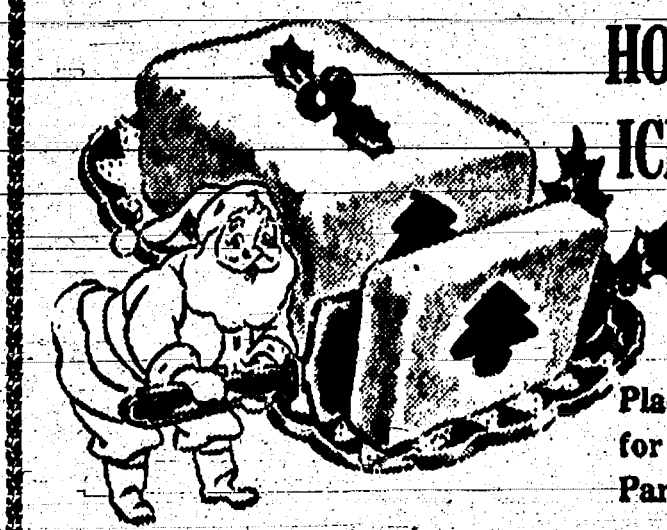
every student's diet each day, how many calories they expend through activity each day, and the number of proteins they eat in a day. By doing this, the "calorie counters" learn if they are eating enough food for their age, size, and activity and if they are eating the right kinds of foods.

In addition to the class work, a movie, "The Modest Miracle," was seen. The movie told about the discovering and the development of vitamin B-complex.

Christian Erykman, a Dutch doctor, was sent to Java in 1887 to discover what was causing a strange illness, beri-beri, among the natives. After three long years

of work he found out that it was something lacking in the white rice. Casimir Funk, who also helped in the discovery of this vitamin, gave vitamin its name, "vita" meaning "life" and "amine" meaning "substance pertaining to protein."

Robert Williams, a chemist, was sent to the Philippines in 1911 and there he started his work on vitamin B-complex. Twenty-five years later he was able to synthesize Thiamin. This just illustrated how long it took science to discover and develop one vitamin. If ever you are in doubt whether you are eating the right foods, ask a Red Cross student; she will be able to tell you.
