Two Delayed Cases Settled with Pleas of Guilty, Fines

Police Officer Frank Reed this week reported final disposition of two court cases pending since July. One was the result of a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor and without an operator's license, and the other a drunk and disorderly count.

Jack Williams of Manchester, picked up on the Chelsea-Manchester road July 16 for driving while under the influence of liquor and with not having a driver's license, was required July 17 to post a \$100 cash bond to insure his appearance in court July 28. He forfeited the bond and went to Indiana. On his return recently he contacted Reed, saying he wished to straighten out the matter. Thursday, Oct. 19, he appeared in Municipal court in Ann Arbor and pleaded guilty as charged. He was fined \$100 and sentenced to five days in jail. The jail sentence was to be 30 days if he failed to pay the fine.

The second case involved drunk and disorderly charges against Dona Osborne following an automobile accident on Manchester road July 31. He was a passenger in the car involved. He pleaded not guilty and posted a \$15 cash bond. The case was scheduled for Aug. 17 but was carried over until this month when Osborne pleaded guilty and paid a fine and costs amounting to \$15, Reed reported.

'Bill of Rights' Offered for Happy Family Relations

Mrs. Donald Tewes of Ann Arbor, speaking at the High School PTA meeting Monday night on the subject, "Family Relationships," presented what she called a bill of rights for happy family living.
